

Council gets yearly refresher

Entering into the budget preparation period, members of the Wayne City Council are getting their annual refresher course in municipal economics.

"Financially and economically we are pretty solid," City Administrator Joe Salitros reported in his budget introduction overview. He said major projects such as the \$130,000 budgeted for a new refuse grinder and \$300,000 for the new storm sewer on Logan Street were the sole reasons for expenditure increases.

"Take those two things out and its almost a zero growth budget," he told council members Tuesday as he gave them the first draft of the city budget. He said the city's property valuation on which the tax revenues are based should go up by at least \$3 million this year due to construction growth. That figure could be higher if revaluation is forced on the county, he added.

Annexation proposals could increase the valuation and thereby the tax revenues of the city as well.

The initial budget request given to council calls for a general fund increase of from \$1.27 million last year to \$2.24 next year, with nearly all the increase in the street department where construction projects are reflected.

Council members recessed the Tuesday night meeting to resume during morning budget review session.

Formula leaves wondering

Even Speaker of the Legislature Ron Withem, a former Education Committee chairman and a key author of school funding measures,

isn't sure what happened with the latest changes to Nebraska's school financing law.

The state aid changes for next year range from a \$7 million increase for Omaha Public Schools to a \$2.1 million decrease for the Millard School District. The Wayne Schools suffered about a \$100,000

decrease.

What happened?

Withem is still looking at the new funding formula. He isn't sure what the full impact will be.

"We are only making guesses at this point," he said Wednesday.

One of the biggest municipal construction projects to come before the city in some time will be the construction in two years of the public library and senior citizen center and the city has appointed a committee of citizens to oversee the project.

The anticipated \$1.2 million project was approved in a sales tax vote in May and the 1 cent sales tax will go into effect in October. Nearly

half of the funding for the project is coming from private sources. The Wayne Library Foundation has already raised in pledges and cash, \$350,000 of its \$575,000 goal for the project.

Don't expect bond issue vote in '94

Voters will probably not be faced with a school bond issue vote in Wayne this fall. It may be next spring before the plans for the building needs of the district are sent to voters for their approval.

"We're past the time frame for having something prepared for the ballot this fall," said Dr. Dennis Jensen, Wayne Superintendent.

The school board is waiting for drawings and cost-estimates on including a new school building in Carroll for kindergarten through 4th grade students and for needed work to the Wayne Elementary School to bring it up to Americans with Disabilities Act standards.

A citizen committee appointed by the board had recommended building a \$9.2 million addition to the high school which would contain middle school and shared facilities including a second gymnasium and a 700-seat auditorium. The committee had not included needed work to be done in the elementary buildings in Carroll and Wayne, recommending instead that those building needs be taken care of out of the district's sinking fund.

Residents of Carroll recommended that the bond issues plans should include the elementary projects and board members are gathering the additional information needed as well as considering cuts in the overall plan to help make a four-building project more palatable to voters.

The board took no action on the bond issue matter at Tuesday's meeting.

In other business at the meeting the board agreed to:

- share the cost of a full time computer technology director with the Wakefield School District. The computer whiz will help teachers in both districts become more proficient in the use of the new technology being placed in the schools. The Wayne district budgeted \$10,000 for the position.

- agreed to include Farmer's and Merchant's State Bank in Wayne in the rotation of banks to be used as a depository for District Funds. The bank would be the school depository in 1997 according to the plan which was called a "thorny issue" involving the three banks in town. Previously, the funds had been de-

Former Soviet visitors look at progress here

A group of business leaders from Tajikistan will be visiting Wayne and Wakefield as part of a cultural and economic development study mission on July 25.

Coming out of a civil war, the fall of the communist government and serious racial conflicts, the business leaders in the former Soviet republic will be looking at the way Northeast Nebraskans manufacture and plan for the future, said John Farnan, executive vice president of the Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce.

Tajikistan is a predominantly Islamic republic in the southern part

of the former Soviet Union. It borders Afghanistan and is still occupied 25,000 Russian troops who are attempting to keep an uneasy peace in the racially divided republic.

Farnan said the group of 15 professionals, farmers and community leaders from the troubled republic will be looking especially at local development efforts which came out of the strategic planning process called START.

The group will arrive in Wakefield in the morning for a tour of Waldbaums and visits with local leaders and is scheduled to be in Wayne in the afternoon, said Farnan.

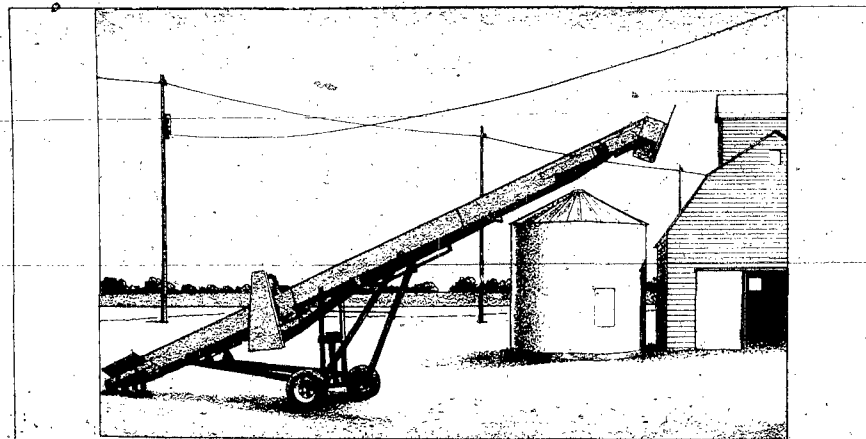

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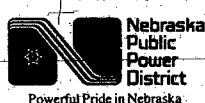

Lawmakers in 1990 approved a school financing law (LB1059) in an attempt to raise income and sales taxes so that the state could provide 45 percent of education funding. This year, the Legislature changed the financing formula of LB1059 by passing LB1290.

The new law bases state aid to school districts on property valuations adjusted to 100 percent of market value. The intent was to even out how counties valued property; it was also expected to penalize school districts in counties where property is undervalued.

The law also called for use of updated enrollment figures and current valuation numbers.

Next year, Department of Revenue officials again will calculate property at 100 percent valuation and certify numbers to the Department of Education, said Denny Donner, property tax administrator for the revenue department.

"I'd characterize this year as an alignment year," Donner said. "Next year, unless there are dramatic economy changes or changes to the formula, it should be more stable."

Withem said the state-aid formula is sensitive to changes in property valuation, other funding sources and the income of a school district's residents.

"If a change in those things takes place in a school district, it will affect state aid," Withem said. "State aid is a balancing factor. That's the

whole idea."

But when some school district officials this week starting crunching their budgets, there was bad news.

In Kearney, the Board of Education faces \$499,016 reduction in state aid for next year.

In 1992-93, the district lost \$511,440 under the formula. That boosted the local property tax levy from \$1.10 per \$100 valuation to \$1.29 per \$100 valuation. For a home valued at \$100,000, the increase would have meant a property tax hike of nearly \$200.

"From my perspective, the state played powerball lottery with state aid," said Superintendent Gary Hammack.

A looming \$472,124 cut in state aid has stalled Loup City School District reorganization plans. The district's Board of Education said plans are tabled until September.

In Cass County, the Elmwood-Murdock school district will lose a whopping 47 percent of state aid next year.

"It just knocks your socks off," Putnam said.

Elmwood-Murdock will receive \$209,698 in state aid this coming year, compared with \$669,000 in 1990-91 and \$397,000 in 1993-94.

sions this week.

Salitros told council that factors which could affect the future economics of the city included rises in solid waste costs and water system costs because of federal regulations. He added the government decision on what to do about a national health care system "will have a significant impact on the personnel costs for the city." Another costly government decision will be enforcement of OSHA regulations on municipalities.

Previously, small governments had been exempt from the labor safety rules which private industry were forced to live by. In the near future, those exemptions will be removed for municipalities, he said. "We don't know what that cost will be, but it will be onerous," he added.

Besides the budget discussion, council members dealt with another financial matter which will end up saving city taxpayers over \$100,000 in interest costs. The city refinanced a series of bonds to take advantage

of current interest rates and to finance the sewer outfall extension line in the northeast area of the city.

Council also rejected the bids for street and sewer construction work in the Sunrise Cove subdivision near the National Guard Armory. Being developed by Vakoc Construction, the only bids for the work were 11 percent over the engineer's estimates. Salitros said the problem with the bids does not mean the project is dead and alternatives are being investigated.

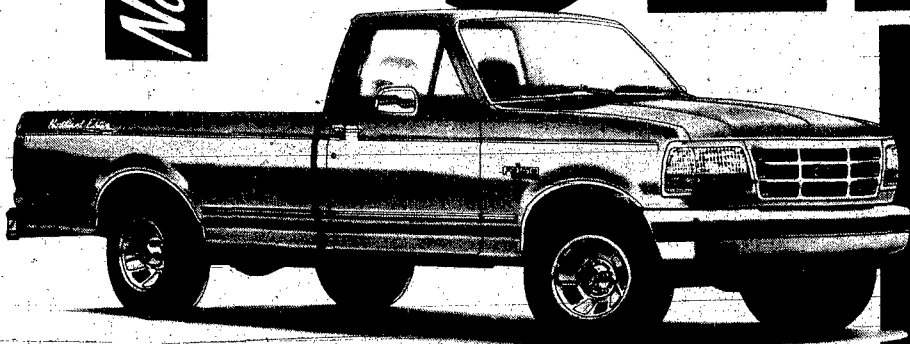

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NRD well sealing program revised; safe well abandonment promoted

The Lower Elkhorn NRD board voted to expand the sign-up period and increase the cost-share rate of the district's well sealing program in accordance with state requirements at the June board meeting in Pierce.

"The Lower Elkhorn NRD has helped landowners in the proper sealing of more than 400 domestic and irrigation wells since 1992", said Ken Berney, assistant manager. "The number of wells sealed in our district is more than twice the number of wells sealed in any other NRD in the state."

It is important to identify and seal these open wells because it provides a direct link for chemicals and contaminants to pollute groundwater, Berney said. And, landowners are required by law to seal any unused domestic or irrigation wells on their property.

L.B. 981 was passed in the Unicameral this spring, establishing a state fund for "decommissioning" or sealing abandoned wells. This law requires all NRDs to adopt a well sealing program and provides state funds to help finance these local programs.

The Lower Elkhorn NRD board voted to increase the cost-share rate for this program to help promote the proper abandonment of old wells and change the application process, according to Berney. The board voted to allocate \$25,000 for the fiscal year 1995 well sealing program.

The revised well sealing program will reimburse applicants for 75 percent of the actual cost of sealing an abandoned well after a licensed well driller or pump installer has properly sealed the well.

The adopted program will run continuously, beginning July 1. Well sealing applications must include necessary well date and a price quote, based on well date given to a local licensed well driller or pump installer. Applicants must have an approved request prior to sealing the well, according to Berney.

The NRD office in Norfolk and County Soil Conservation Service offices located within the district will have application forms and specific details on the well sealing program, according to Berney.

Interested individuals are encouraged to seek financial and technical assistance from the Lower Elkhorn NRD when planning to plug old, abandoned wells.

The next meeting of the Lower Elkhorn NRD board will be Thursday, July 28 in Oakland at the Logan East Rural Water System office.

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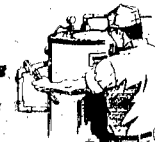
