City annex plan draws fire from industrial guns

Industry top guns in Wayne attended a city annexation hearing Tuesday to try to shoot down a city plan to annex industrial developments near Wayne, and thereby add to their tax load.

Council Tuesday had scheduled the reading of an ordinance to annex 112 acres in various parcels bordering or surrounded by municipal land. But council members delayed action following the unanimous objections of business leaders during the public hearing on the proposal.

Council had considered the tracts because they are all receiving city services.

One of the tracts included in the annexation proposal is the Heritage Homes industrial plant. Owner Rod Tompkins said including his operation on the city tax roles would cost him upwards of \$9,000 a year. He added it would be a reversal of the city policy to foster industrial development and would unfairly single out his industrial plant while leaving others out of the city limits.

"You would be departing from the cumulative wisdom of all of our previous community leaders," said John Vakoc, owner of Vakoc Construction, who spoke against the annexation plan. He said subjecting the major employers, who drive the business climate of Wayne, to an-

nexation would "send a message to our industry CEO's that would not be favorable."

Terry Hanson, Great Dane Plant Manager; Duane Schroeder, local attorney and member of the Wayne Industries board; Vaughn Kinney, manager of the Terra International Chemical Plant; Darryl Miller, an employee and part owner of Heritage Industries; Nick Sieler, developer of Cityside mobile home park; Gary Pick, owner of Logan Valley Implement, and others took to the podium Tuesday to denounce the industrial annexation plan.

"I need to know if you plan to annex me next," said Pick. "Because if you do, I will go someplace else." He said the city's decision on annexing Heritage Industries would cause him to change his own expansion plans.

The Great Dane Plant would be unaffected by the immediate annexation proposal because of a written agreement at the time the plant was built that the city would not annex the property. However, plant manager Hanson, said the city decision in the immediate case would be a clear indication of what its intent would be when the Great Dane agreement expires in ten more years. He and others indicated this decision might affect any future expansion decisions Great Dane might make in

Technology affects development

"Technology is changing the way we traditionally look at officing,"

Connie Justice told the members of the Northeast Nebraska Resource Conservation and Development District during their meeting in Wayne this week.

Mrs. Justice, who is the field representative for the Nebraska Department of Economic Development in the region

was explaining how she has been able to office out of her home in Norfolk rather than working from a base at Wayne State College.

She moved her office out of Wayne State this week.

With a portable computer, cellular phone, modem and notebook, Mrs. Justice said she looks at herself now as "an office on wheels."

"We're moving into the 21st century," she said. The change will allow her to be on the road more in the communities she works with in Northeast Nebraska and to be in

close contact with Lincoln and anyone who wants to get in touch with her at a moments notice.

In an overview report on economic development status in the region, Mrs. Justice said quality of life along with advances in technology are causing many businesses, especially those from Southern California, to relocate in this area.

She said there has been an increased number of heads (businesses) looking at Nebraska and especially at Northeast Nebraska.

She said many of them are anxious to come to the smaller communities where property prices are low and technology still gives them the opportunity to be in instant contact anywhere in the world.

She said it is encouraging to see renewed interest in this area.

3 murders; case draws guilty plea

SIoux CITY, Iowa (AP) -- A Sioux City man pleaded guilty to three counts of first-degree murder in four months in Iowa and Nebraska.

Juan Manuel Ortega, 18, admitted Wednesday that he killed Cleo Sherman of Macy, Neb., on March 22; Gary P. Miller of South Sioux City, Neb., on June 13; and Stephanie Woods of Sioux City on June 16.

Law enforcement officials in Nebraska and Iowa said the killing spree was the worst in recent history.

"This is the first incident of this magnitude that we've seen," said South Sioux City Police Chief Scot Ford, a 20-year veteran of the force. Dakota County Attorney Brien

Lawn robot to be displayed

Having trouble getting your 12-year-old to mow the lawn? The answer may be at the Wayne County Fair next week.

An automated, robotic, solar powered lawn mower will be demonstrated at the fair according to Brian Reinhardt, local representative for the national manufacturer which is developing the new product.

Only a couple hundred of the new machines, which have been featured on national television programs, have been manufactured so far and they are a bit pricey, at \$2,000 each, but Reinhardt says they are the wave of the future.

The machine automatically trims the lawn area while turning when it runs into obstacles. It stays within a predetermined area established by wires buried under the grass.

Free barbecue is fair feature

One of the highlights of the Wayne County Fair each year is the annual free barbecue on Friday night. The event usually attracts over 3,000 who feast on pork, beef and lamb prepared by Fair Board members, business volunteers and boosters.

This will mark the 32nd year for the free barbecue in Wayne.

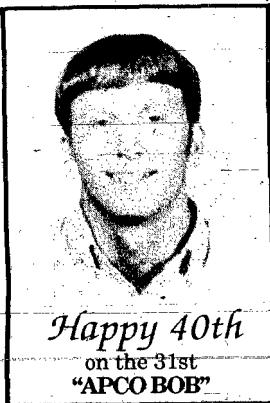

Fairgrounds Ave. would force his company to charge city sales tax on many of the items sold at the auctions there. He said over 500 buyers from all over the area come to the frequent sales there and he predicted they would object to paying city sales tax.

Kinney, whose Terra Chemical plant is outside the area currently proposed for annexation, told council its decision nonetheless might have an impact on his firm's plans to develop a regional distribution center in Wayne because of the change in trends. He said he could not sur-

Wayne.

"These are the engines that drive our economy," said Schroeder of the industries affected. He said there are valid reasons why industries are located outside city limits. "We need to keep this incentive in place," he said.

Vakoc pointed out that one of the prime reasons the Timpte Corporation (forerunner to Great Dane) selected Wayne for its plant was a discussion with its president had with Rod Tompkins and Tompkins' endorsement of the community as cooperative toward industry.

"This would be a major change from what has made this community a great community," said Tompkins.

None of the annexation dissenters objected to annexation of residential tracts. Sieler, who is building a new mobile home park did not object specifically to the annexation of his property but he did say leaving the industrial tracts outside the city would be practical.

Stan Baier, owner of Baier and Lage Auction Service, objected to the annexation of a vacant lot used for consignment equipment auctions, however. He said the lot off of

the additional tax and regulatory burdens that would accompany annexation.

"I do believe we really have problems when we start annexing industrial property," said council member Darrel Fuelleber. "I think we ought to think this out real well." He recommended against annexing industrial property and urged his fellow council members to make a clear statement of its intent for the future.

Council members Ralph Barclay and Jane O'Leary said they would prefer having a clear statement of position from members of the Wayne Industries Board. The development arm of the Wayne Chamber of Commerce, citing a desire to avoid political issues, failed to approve a statement opposing annexation.

Mrs. O'Leary said she would also like to hear opinions from other property owners in town before making a final decision.

Council agreed to return to the issue at its Aug. 16 meeting.

O'Brien said Ortega may be a serial killer.

"It looked that way," said O'Brien. "He did it once. He did it twice. He did it a third time. I don't know what would have stopped him (if he hadn't been arrested)."

Ortega's attorney said his client pleaded guilty partly out of remorse and partly to avoid Nebraska's electric chair.

The plea agreement declares that any sentence in Nebraska would be served after the Iowa sentence ex-

pires. In Iowa, conviction of first-degree murder carries a life sentence with no chance of parole unless a future governor commutes the sentence to a term of years.

"There are two ways for him to get out of prison in Iowa," O'Brien said. "One is in a body bag and the other way is for the governor to sign an order commuting his sentence. I don't think that's going to happen. We don't think he is ever going to see sunlight again."

Deputy Dakota County Attorney Robert Finney said Ortega picked

up Sherman, apparently a stranger, in downtown Sioux City and they drove toward Macy, "engaged in conversation."

Near Homer, Neb., Ortega apparently became enraged at Sherman, Finney said.

"He stopped, got a hammer from the back of the pickup, returned to the cab and repeatedly struck her in the head many, many, many times," said Finney. He then ran over her with the truck. In court, Ortega said he ran over Sherman to keep her from reporting him.

Over a month later, Ortega killed Miller, 55, co-owner of Milhon's Package Liquor in South Sioux City, after robbing the store.

"I shot Gary Miller so he would not follow me," said Ortega. "He died because I shot him."

Winside gains state aid

The Winside Public School will see no increase in the tax request for the general operation of the school for the 1994-95 school year.

In a budget workshop, the Winside Board was informed that the budget will increase approximately \$165,000 for the 1994-95 school year.

The bulk of the increase is due to salaries, salary related items, program expansion and programs mandated by law such as special education. The increase also includes funds to finance a new one-half-time gift program previously approved by the Board. The rest of

the increase centers around maintenance, equipment, library books, classroom furniture, repairs and supplies.

The Board of Education was informed that due to a higher projected end of the year cash balance and a substantial increase in state aid, no increase in taxes will be needed. The Winside school's state aid will increase \$103,578.75 (14.1 percent) from \$737,350.20 to \$840,928.95.

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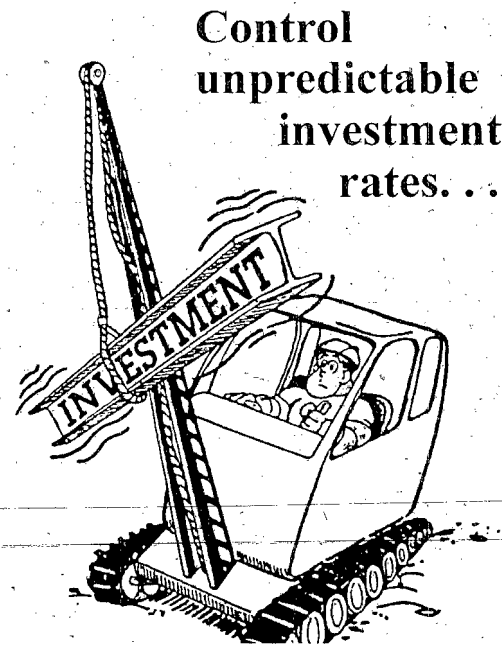

The second run came in the seventh inning as Jaimey Holdorf

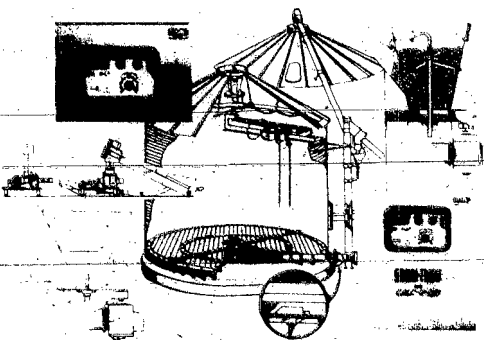
tagged a bunt single with two out and nobody on. Holdorf stole second and reached home on another West Point error. The Midgets improved to 19-10.

AN ORDINANCE TERMED "THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATION BILL", TO APPROPRIATE THE SUMS OF MONEY NECESSARY TO DEFRAY ALL THE NECESSARY EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES OF THE CITY OF WAYNE, NEBRASKA FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JULY 31, 1995; SPECIFYING THE OBJECT AND PURPOSES FOR WHICH SUCH APPROPRIATIONS ARE MADE AND THE AMOUNTS APPROPRIATED FOR EACH OBJECT OR PURPOSE; SPECIFYING THE DOLLARS TO BE LEVIED FOR EACH OBJECT OR PURPOSE; PROVIDING FOR THE CERTIFICATION OF THIS ORDINANCE TO THE COUNTY CLERK OF WAYNE COUNTY, NEBRASKA; AND PROVIDING WHEN THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND TAKE EFFECT.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska: 1. There are hereby appropriated the following sums of money necessary to defray all the necessary expenses and liabilities of the City of Wayne, Nebraska for the fiscal year ending July 31, 1995.
