# Helpful people key to fair success

It's the people. 'That's the answer," said Leland Herman, long time Wayne County Fair Board member as he analyzed the success of another Wayne County Fair.

fore, more activities than ever before and more fun than ever before were ways fair board members de-scribed the 1994 edition of the fair which closed Sunday.

No one got an exact count of the number of meals served at the free

barbecue Friday night, but it was clear that the number was well ahead of last year's 3,200 figure, said Delores Felt, recording secretary for the fair board

FINANCIALLY, THE fair was another good success said Herman helped keep the fair in the black in recent years. Fair board members are concerned that the buttons are being passed around as a means of circumventing admission prices, but a better alternative has not been

While other fairs in neighboring counties are facing difficulties with attendance and volunteer participation, Wayne County may be looking to broaden its scope. Several years back it was promoted as the greater Northeast Nebraska County Fair, and coming off this year's popularity, it might not be a bad idea to return to a more regional theme, said Mrs.

ONLY MINOR changes and problems were discussed at Monday nights Fair Board meeting and post fair clean-up event. The possibility of adding livestock holding facilities to handle the growing numbers of exhibits and the need for more space for the talent show and com-mercial exhibits was discussed.

We're not resting on our laurels," said Herman. He said the draft horse show would be a definite repeat next year as would the new tractor-drawn shuttle trams which were well-re-

the 42 acre agricultural park.

Addition of 10 acres to the park two years ago and a new horse show arena greatly enhanced the ability to handle the larger crowds which have been attracted to the fair in recent years. In the past the county would not have had the space to host a draft horse show while the other fair events were going on.

## Fugitive gives up after 16 years

HARTINGTON, Neb. (AP) - A man who spent 16 years on the lam has one word for others who might be ficeing the law: Surrender.

It will only cost them until they right it, set themselves straight, said Richard Lunderman on Saturday, one day after turning himself in to Cedar County Sheriff Elliot Arens after a run that took him through California, Arizona and Colorado.

The fact that I've wasted 16 years like this, I don't know just how I feel. It's a loss," Lunderman said from jail in this northeast Nebraska

Running from the law, lying to employers, marrying and having a son under an alias, drinking too much to relieve the tension, it all built up, Lunderman said from jail in this northeast Nebraska town.

"When this is over, I will have opportunities I never had before," said Lunderman, 37.

"I've become very interested in

drug and substance abuse counseling. This is a field I would like to

pursue," he said. Lunderman was convicted of burglary but escaped from the county jail in 1978 before serving his sentence of two to five years in prison.

He had broken into a U.S. Army Corps of Engineers office near Lewis and Clark Lake along the South

## Legislative aides visit area farms


A dozen legislative aides to urban members of Congress will visit Neto 1 enth year of Nebraska Farm Bureau's Legislative Assistants Visitation Program.



Dr. Stephen Glass, assistant professor of human performance and leisure studies at Wayne State College, is serving as editor of the Nebraska Journal for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance.

The Journal, published twice a year, provides a forum for the publication of original papers and reviews concerning issues and topics related to the goals and mission of NAHPERD (Nebraska Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance).

Glass will also serve on the Executive Board of NAHPERD.

Glass, who has been a Wayne State faculty member since 1993, earned his bachelor's degree from North Dakota State University, his master of arts degree from Ball State University, and his PhD. from Southern Illinois University.

Dakota border, Arens said. Lunderman lived in Yankton, S.D. at the time of the burglary but he grew up in Rosebud, S.D., on the

Rosebud Reservation. "Since the age of 16 I was an alcoholic," Lunderman said. "The life I came from then was not a good

But he came from a good family that supports his decision to serve his time and start over, Lunderman

His stepfather, a pastor in the Dakota Presbyterian Church in Fort Thompson, S.D., said Saturday he encouraged Lunderman to turn him-

"I said, tell the parole officer, so that he will have a life, so that he won't have to live under another name," said Everett Harrison, 63. "I told him don't be afraid of jail, because St. Paul was there with chains on Paul and a lot of prophets went to jail talking about Jesus Christ."

After escaping from jail and stealing a car, Lunderman drove to California and worked odd jobs there for about four years. He later moved to Arizona and lived the last few years in Fort Collins, Colo., Arens said.

The sheriff said he believes Lunderman will only have to serve his original sentence. The statute of limitations has run out on the stolen car charge and the escape charge was dismissed in the early 1980s, Arens said.



still got a lot of happiness ahead of me, if I work hard for it," Lunderman





## Keep welcome mat out

Wayne City officials are considering a change in policy established in the seventies which permitted industrial developments constructed on the outskirts of the city to utilize city services such as sewer, water and other utilities without being annexed into the city.

The policy was part of the package of inducements, along with other state and local incentives, which attracted major industries to the community and allowed some homegrown businesses to

Wayne has been cited as an industrial development success story throughout the state of Nebraska.

Now there's a carrot of several thousands of dollars in additional property tax revenues sitting just outside the city boundaries that is causing some to look with regret on the city's earlier largess

However, we fear a move by the city to annex industrial tracts which were established with the understanding that they would have long-term exemption from municipal taxes would, if not reverse the current trend of economic growth, in the least stifle it.

Industrial entities in Wayne contribute greatly to the local economy, and will contribute more when the current housing shortage in Wayne is corrected. They certainly contribute as much to a well rounded community as the two retirement housing projects being built in the city which have been granted tax increment financing.

All of these projects were attracted to Wayne on the promise of incentives from the community. The term of those incentives should be spelled out in the beginning and the city should live by

In today's competitive and highly mobile industrial development market, there will certainly be other communities willing to offer long term tax incentives to industries currently located in Wayne. We would hate to see the loss of hundreds of jobs and the

households that go with them because an industry believed Wayne had turned over its industrial welcome mat.

We still need to maintain a policy of clearly defining what is expected when city services are extended outside the city limits. Those should only be done after annexation agreements have been signed, except in the case of industries.

Where ever there have been extensions in the past, there should be annexation. But we think the exemption should be maintained for industrial tracts.

## 'Attack fax' common on campaign trail

LINCOLN - Life as a reporter sure has changed, particularly when it comes to covering political cam-

The days of chasing after a story,

note pad in hand, are disappearing. Even those instances of tracking down a news tip over the telephone

are becoming rarer.

More and more often, we get our news in the State Capitol from those obnoxious events called "news conferences" or the even more oppressive "news releases" sent via the mail or the fax ma-

This year's election campaign has been especially guilty of news release mania.

The fax machine in my office in Lincoln has hummed so frequently with the electronic mud-slinging of candidates that statehouse reporters have given them a new name: the Attack Fax."

Such attack faxes come snaking out of the fax machine at all times of the day and night. They slam public officials for this and condemn candidates for that. Some are printed; most are not.

Most attack faxes come from candidates, particularly Gene Spence, Patrick Combs and Jan Stoney, but many also come from the political parties, providing verbal support for their champions.

The attack faxes have been so common this year that the state's largest newspapers have both commented on the phenomenon.

The editor of The Omaha World-

Herald, G. Woodson Howe, recently wrote that political mudslinging through faxes and other mediums had become too common.

Howe put a new requirement on stories about personal attacks on candidates: that only the candidate themselves could initiate or respond

to a personal attack. That removed those quotable campaign managers, political consultants and party officials from making political attacks in print in the World-Herald.

It also prompted a few com-plaints from busy officeholders, including the governor, who say they don't have the time to respond to

all political attacks.

Ed Russo, the Lincoln Journal-Star's Sunday statehouse columnist, devoted an entire column to the attack fax issue.
So where does this leave the av-

erage voter who's trying to sort out who's the best candidate?

Not very well served or informed.

Newspapers, as a whole, can't cover every political event or proclamation, leaving candidates to lean more heavily on brief "sound bites" in television ads or radio or TV interviews — or such attack faxes. You don't learn much about an issue, or a politician's starce, in such small bites.

'/oters, on the other hand, don't seem as interested in long-winded issue stories for the most part. They tend to get more information from the short snippets on TV or from more-informed friends, or they don't vote at all.

What's the solution?

release or attack fax.


I'm not sure, but I think serious candidates, as a prerequisite for running for office, ought to be required to participate in a set number of debates of issue forums.

I see at your Wayne County Fair you revived the game that the Pioneers used to play - The Buffalo Chip Flip. I'm curious, where did you get the buffalo chips?

Industry needed Dear Editor: In his recent letter to the editor,

Gary Costilow has done a good job of representing the kind of shortsightedness that could cut off the stream of goodwill our industrial employers have for the community of Wayne. His unfounded allegations that those industries are on a "free ride" and "just taking" should not go unanswered. Although I'm not an authority on these matters, I do believe I may be better informed

than Mr. Costilow.

Generations of effort have contributed to the success Wayne enjoys with its sound, diversified industrial employment base that is the envy of other communities. That cumulative wisdom has recognized the advantages of recruiting the right types of industry and then supporting them in their growth without burdening

them with annexation. Those who have worked in the ast to bring industry to foster homegrown entrepreneurs have recognized the distinction between "industry" and its people. 'Industry" does not use our parks, library, senior citizens center, swimming pool, recreation programs, etc. The people who fill the jobs "industry" provides use those services and, as resident homeowners and renters, they pay the taxes that support them.

Yes, industry uses electrical power which, for the most part, is purchased at wholesale from sources such as NPPD and resold at retail through the City. The entire electric operation (plant, distribution and administration) however, is a pro-prietary fund which is separate from the City General Fund and is supported by electrical consumers, not taxpayers. A case might even be made that, in fact, those electrical consumers provide a subsidy to the taxpayers inasmuch as electrical revenues are used to pay certain administrative wages.

And yes, some industries use municipal water and sewer. Again, however, water operations are funded by users and not taxpayers and, in earlier years, users outside the city limits were charged higher rates. It is to the advantage of the city not to have private wells and septic systems within close prox-

So, what services constitute the free ride" that Mr. Costilow alleges? It can't be police protection because the industries rely upon the county sheriff's department and are not served by city police. They are served by the same inter-cooperative fire protection system that all of us in the area enjoy wherein city residents receive benefit of resources provided by taxpayers outside the city and vice versa.

Mr. Costilow seems to believe that Wayne is somehow unique in that we have not annexed our major industrial plants and he questions

how we can expect to grow without taking that step. There are countless examples of other communities as near as Norfolk that have assumed a similar strategy of supporting the growth of their major industries without annexation and enjoying the abundant residuals of the resulting jobs.

Of course there are benefits for

these industries to be located near our city but they pale in comparison to the benefits we receive as a result of their existence. What is really at issue is not whether the industries should pay a fair share but whether they should pay more of our share. The huge investment made by these companies in plant and equipment is a tantalizing annexation plum that will continue to tempt some. Let's be satisfied with the fruit that falls from the tree. If we begin shaking it we might be terribly disappointed with what falls





"Some dietary fat is necessary for good health," Dr. Martin said. "It helps in the transmission of brain and nerve signals, keeps our skin smooth, cushions internal organs, helps our bodies maintain temperature and provides the energy for the body's work. Fat is also necessary to help the body carry vitamins A, D, E and K."

consume too much. Americans over the age of two should consume a maximum of 30 percent of their calories from fat, but the average American is consuming 37 percent. People who have more fat than they need in a diet are often more obese, and at risk of certain types of cancer and heart disease.

While many Americans need to reduce their amount of dietary fat, they need to make sure infants and young children have enough fat and cholesterol in their diets for brain and nerve development.

"Remember that children's diets low in fat may be too low in calo ries if that came from fat are not replaced with adequate calories from other foods, such as bread, cereal, vegetables and fruits," Dr. Martin said.

For adults trying to lower their far intake, looking at the total fat and cholesterol eaten in a day is more important than just looking at foods individually.

"If you choose a food that is high in fat, balance that with an intake of fruits, vegetables and grains," Dr. Martin said. "Even though the symptoms of a high fat diet may not yet be exhibited, studies have found that plaque in the arteries builds up during the teen

## Are the 'terrible twos' so terrible?

QUESTION: Are the "terri-le twos" really so terrible? DR. DOBSON: It has been said that all human beings can be classified into two broad categories: those who would vote "yes" to the various propositions of life, and those who

would be inclined to vote "no." I can tell you with confidence that each toddler around the world would definitely cast a negative vote! If there is one word that characterizes the period between 15 and 24 months of age, it is "no!"

No, he doesn't want to eat his ce-

real. No, he doesn't want to play with his dump truck. No, he doesn't want to take his bath. And you can be sure, no, he doesn't want to go to bed anytime at all.

Perhaps the most frustrating aspect of the "terrible twos" is the tendency of kids to spill, destroy, kill and get into things. They also have a knack for doing embarrassing things, like sneezing on a nearby man at a lunch counter.

During these toddler years, any unexplained silence of more than 30 seconds can throw an adult into a sudden state of panic. What mother has not had the thrill of opening the bathroom door only to find Tony Tornado covered with lipstick from the top of his pink head to the carpet on which he stands?

On the wall, is his own artistic creation, with a red handprint in the center, and throughout the room, is the aroma of Chanel No. 5, with which he has anointed his baby brother.

The picture sounds bleak, and, admittedly, there are times when a little toddler can dismantle the peace and tranquility of a home. (My son, Ryan, loved to blow bubbles in the dog's water dish--a game which still horrifies me).

However, with all of its struggles, there is no more thrilling time of life than this period of dynamic blossoming and unfolding. New words are being learned daily, and the cute verbal expressions of that age will be remembered for half a century.

It is a time of excitement over fairy stories and Santa Claus and furry

puppy dogs. And most importantly, it is a precious time of loving and warmth that will scurry by all too quickly.

QUESTION: Why are men so insensitive to women's needs today? They seem oblivious to the longings of their wives, even when every effort is made to communicate and

DR. DOBSON: I question whether men have really changed all that much over the years. Rather, I doubt if men have ever responded as women preferred.

Did the farmer of a century ago come in from the fields to say, "Tell me how it went with the kids today?" No. He was as oblivious to his wife's nature as husbands are today. What has changed is the relationship between women!

A century ago, women cooked together, canned together, washed clothes at the creek together, prayed together, went through menopause together and grew old together. And when a baby was born, aunts and grandmothers and neighbors were there to show the new mother how to diaper and feed and discipline. Great emotional support was provided in this feminine

contact. A woman was never really alone.

Alas, the situation is very different today. The extended family has disappeared, depriving the wife of that source of security and fellowship. Her mother fives in New Jersey and her sister is in Texas, Furthermore, American families move every three or four years, preventing any long-term friendships from developing among neighbors.

And there's another factor that is seldom admitted: American women tend

to be economically competitive and suspicious of one another. Many would not even consider inviting a group of friends to the house until it was repainted, refurnished or redecorated. As someone said, "We're working so hard to have beautiful homes and there's nobody in them!"

The result is isolation--or should I say insulation--and its first cousin:







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#### Prozac is Recommended for

Eating Disorder Prozac is a beneficial prescription medicine that is used to treat/depression and obsessive compulsive disorders. Shortly after being approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for depression in 1987, there were reports of suididal attempts by some persons who took the drug. After an extensive investigation by the FDA, it was determined that there was "no credible evidence of a causal link between the use of antidepressant drugs, including Prozac, and suicidality or violent behavior. In other words, the FDA found that antidepressant medicines did not cause suicide. Now Prozac is in the news once again. In April, a panel of health professionals and scientists that provides information to the FDA recommended that Prozae be approved for use in bullmia, Bullmia is an eating disorder which involves eating binges followed by self- induced vomiting.

"Our three day total of 205, and Monday night's total of 53 is a large increase over the three to six per night we had been catching. Jarvi said. "However, to keep things in perspective, in 1991, one of the worst years for second generover 1,000 per night during a one week period."

First generation corn borer larvae are still being found ins talk cavities, extending the second generation flight through nearly all of

Producers considering treatment should remember it will not cause a very high percentage of second generation corn borer control. Instead, the goal should be to protect the corn plant's yield potential by preventing cavity formation during the critical silk and blister stages of growth. Once corn is in the milk stage, the physiological losses drop significantly.

"When the majority of the in-fested plants have either blackheaded egg masses, and/or small larvae can be seen in the leaf axils, it is time to treat," Jarvi said. "Resist the temptation to wait a few more days, because it will allow the early hatching borers to enter the plant and do the most damage."

Jarvi added that depending on each field, treatments in Northeast Nebraska could occur as early as Aug. 8-9, and through most of next week, and that the goal of effective treatment is to protect yield poten-

Remember, treatment is not necessarily going to result in the highest percentage of borers killed,"

Producers who need help deciding whether treatment is economical can contact their local extension

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

The barn I referred to in the first paragraph is a big old-timer, with limestone foundation and "post and beam" construction. It has fallen on hard times and desperately needs restoration. We plan to do this, but know it will be costly.

All summer, we've been adding to the brush pile south of it; as the wind brought down tree branches. Finally, one still evening about a week ago, Mike burned the pile. I laughingly yelled, "Don't burn the barn down!" as I left for a walk



about 8 p.m.

We'd been in bed for just a few minutes when a car drove on the yard, honking. I thought, "There's been an accident," and grabbed my robe, Immediately, someone was ringing the doorbell and yelling, your barn's on fire!"

Sure enough, some sparks had been carried up to the shingles, and there was an eerie glow on the south end. I went to the phone.

Murdock volunteer firemen had just left the firebarn after a regular meeting. They were all here in a very short time; and the long hoses, with water under pressure, soon had it out But the fire chief says another ten minutes and it would have been gone. 
Beeson was the winner of the senior division of the National Illustrated Speech Contest, which also netted him a \$750 scholarship.








