Hearing is set on draft plan

The Wayne County Joint Planning Commission will be conduct-ing a public hearing on Thursday, Sept. 1 at 8 p.m. in the Wayne County Court Room. The purpose of the hearing is to receive public input on the draft Comprehensive Plan prior to submittal to the County Commissioners and respective Village Boards.

The Comprehensive Plan presents goals, objectives and action strategies for all activities which affect growth and development in rural Wayne County and the Villages of Carroll, Hoskins and Win-

The Plan provides background information as well as recommendations for such components as population and economics, housing, land use, public facilities, the environment and transportation. The plan was drafted to be effective through the year 2004.

"The planning process is an or-ganized way of finding out what a community's or county's needs are and then establishing goals, objectives and action strategies for future development. In planning, the ultimate objective is for effective and efficient change which will make the communities and county a bet-ter place to live," said Jeffrey Ray, planning specialist with the consulting firm Hanna: Keelan Associ-

Planning helps shape the draft-ing and adoption of local zoning and subdivision regulations, he said. These regulations will assist the governing bodies and the Plan ning Commission in ruling on development proposals which would bring either small or large changes to the county and/or communities.

Zoning regulations are the next step in the process, once the com-

prehensive plan is adopted by the governing bodies.

The village clerks, Wayne County clerk and the local libraries have copies of the proposed Comprehensive Plan for public review and preparation of written com-

Wayne students score better in ACT testing

Wayne High School students last year scored well above both the state and national averages of students who take the college entrance lege Testing (ACT) in Iowa City.

Wayne students averaged 22.9 compared to a 21.3 average for the state and 20.8 for the nation. Approximately 75 percent of the graduating seniors last year took the test according to Wayne High School Guidance Counselor Terry Munson.

HE SAID MANY schools have only the top students taking the test which would increase their aver-

ages, but in Wayne's case the testing is encouraged for all students plan-ning to attend college after graduat-

"That makes our student averages even more significant," he said add-ing that Wayne teens have traditionbeen will above the state and national averages on the test. Last year's scores were slightly above the previous year's test scores, but Munson cautioned against comparing one class with another, suggest-ing rather that trends are a better indicator of comparing the success of school programs.

He said in the last five years, the scores have been "very, very good". ACT officials have said the best

given nationally, is for students to take as many courses as they can in the core curriculum.

THE RESULTS INDICATE students in Wayne are taking the course work offered. In a move to give them more schedule opportunities to load up on core curriculum courses, Wayne High School shifted to an eight period day last year, and Munson said that move may result in even higher scores for Wayne students in the future.

ACT calculates a different average for students who have taken four full years of English and three each of math, science and social

WSC becoming 'model' college

"Wayne State College is on the threshold of becoming a model re-gional public college of national distinction. All of the pieces are in place. The only missing ingredient is modest but steady support from the State of Nebraska," said Wayne State president Dr. Donald J. Mash at the college's opening faculty

meeting.

"We've helped ourselves finance our progress while the State wrestles with Medicaid and shrinking federal support of other social and infrastructure programs," added

"State support will continue to be our most important source of funding, and will improve when the State gains some control of these difficult fiscal issues, and when we fully understand that money spent to support public higher education is not merely additional State spending, but Nebraska's best investment for a bright future. In the meantime, our self-help aggressiveness must continue."

MASH CITED the college's

additional revenue from its dramatic growth, and private dollars from its first-ever national fundraising cam-paign, as the difference-makers in

the college's recent progress.
"The model regional public col-

lege of the future will remain af fordable to ensure access and opportunity will stress strong undergraduate teaching and personalized student support services, and will emphasize active public service programs directed at its service region's schools, communities and

citizens," said Mash.

Mash also emphasized the importance of a manageable size as a significant advantage in being able to provide an outstanding under-graduate experience. "All of the pieces are in place at Wayne State, Mash said.

MASH congratulated and praised his faculty and staff for their energy, their cooperation and their willingness to put the college's goals above those of their departments. He summarized the highlights of the growing college's "tremendous progress" over the last five years, and pointed to the things that will ensure continued progress for the remainder of the decade.

Assault charge filed on incident

Wayne County Attorney Michael Pieper has filed third degree assault charges against Neil Carnes of Wayne after an altercation at Riley's Pub on Thursday night, August 18.

Eyewitness accounts of the incident in question say Carnes unprovokingly, walked up to Wayne third grade teacher Roger Reikofski and punched him in the head as Reikofski sat in a booth with two other elementary teachers.

According to witnesses, Reikofski made no gestures of retaliation but several other people in the pub at the time confronted Carnes and several followed him outside to pursue the issue further.





RC&D Council plans knapweed meeting

The Northeast Nebraska Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Council held a Nebraska On-Line Training session prior to the Council meeting on Monday, Aug. 22. The session was given by Janet Gill, Bloomfield Schools, and Sandy Hatter, Cooperative Extension for Knox County with about 16 guests and Council members present. Janet demonstrated and talked about information that is available from Nebraska On-Line.

During the Council meeting, the Water Quality Informa-tion/Education Video was previewed. Eligible farmers can now apply for loans

Eligible family farmers in Dixon and Thurston Counties, who suffered physical and production losses in 1994 because of natural disasters, may now apply for Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) emergency loans, FmHA County Supervisor, Mark

Moser, said.
Burt, Cedar, Cuming, Dakota and Wayne Counties also became eligible under existing legislation which provides that family farmers in counties bordering on those which have been designated for disaster assistance, may also qualify for such assistance. Applica-tions for assistance will be accepted by FmHA until April 4.

Farmers in all seven counties have eight months in which to apply for emergency (EM) loans to help cover part of their actual

Family farmers who suffered a qualifying physical and production loss (at least a 30 percent reduction from normal) in a single enterprise from this disaster, who are family size operators, and are unable to get credit elsewhere, may apply for low interest loans to cover up to 80 percent of their actual production losses, or

\$500,000, whichever is less.
The loans carry a 3.75 percent interest rate, must show repayment and must be adequately secured. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock or to make payments on current real estate and chattel debts.

Mark Moser asked that those family farmers needing farm credit as a result of sudden thunderstorms and widespread hail, and who think they are eligible for FmHA assistance, make application at the FmHA county office, 709 Providence Road, Wayne, between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) -- If the Department of Agriculture goes on a budget-trimming rampage as expected, Midwest governors want Congress to redirect the expected \$3 billion in savings back to the farm.

The governors wrapped up a threeday farm bill summit Tuesday with a package of resolutions to give USDA and congressional leaders some ideas on how to spend the funds expected to be freed up over the next five years.

Gov. Ben Nelson said the governors don't want the agricultural sector to be victimized by the USDA's efforts to trim its own budget.

The farm bill won't be drafted until next year but Nelson said the idea of the conference is to start working with other Midwest povernors to try to protect their interests in the legislation.

"We hope it won't get taken and utilized for something else in the overall budget," Nelson said. "When money is tight and you get an administration looking for dollars, there's always that temptation.



Area teams set for openers

The start of the 1994 fall sports season begins next Thursday for Wayne Herald coverage teams. Football, Volleyball, Cross Country and Girls Golf teams will begin for the Wayne Blue Devils, Laurel Bears, Wakefield Trojans, Allen Eagles and Winside Wildcats.

The Wayne football team will have some new looks calling the shots this season as John Murtaugh returns after a year absence from the Wayne school system to call the defensive plays as defensive coordinator, replacing Don Koenig who resigned that post at the end of last season.

Dan Fehringer will help head coach Lonnie Ehrhardt with the offense as well as specializing with the offensive and defensive lineman. "After just one day of practice this season the technique and skill factor was improved from last year's first practice," Ehrhardt said. THE VOLLEBALL team will look to improve on last season's 11-12 record and with everyone off of last year's team eligible for another season of play, things appeared to be in place.

"I think by the end of the season we will have a solid girls team," Ruhl said. "Lack of depth is a factor so we have to make sure we work hard on staying healthy and we'll have a pretty good team."

Hix said one of the team goals is to break 400 by the end of the season and of course a team goal is to return to the state golf meet which is going to be held at the Norfolk Country Club this year.

THE LAUREL BEARS football team will be in search of yet another state playoff appearance which if successful, would be the third straight for head coach Tom Luxford who enters his seventh year at the helm.

Maskenthine Lake to receive help

When Maskenthine Lake was built in the mid-seventies, the designers left room for only a certain amount of sediment. By 1994, that sediment is more than the lake can handle.

The main concern is that Maskenthine Lake, as with all man-made lakes, was designed for a certain level of sediment loading," said Dave Shelton, NE extension agricultural engineer, "but recreational uses, such as fishing and swimming, were impaired, and the overall area of the take was reduced."

As a result, fewer people were using the lake, the wildlife was harmed, and the overall area of the lake was reduced.

This led the Lower Elthorn Natural Resource District, and the Northeast Research and Extension Center to develop an agreement

to help improve the quality of Maskenthine Lake. "It's a project trying to help reduce the amount of sediment reaching Maskenthine Lake," Shelton said, "One of the things is to

provide the land owners, operators, and others with educational materials. Shelton added that the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resource District

would help provide structural help in the water shed and creek areas, while NEREC would educate producers on ways to lessen the sediment problem.

"So the education and demonstration programs are only one aspect of the total project at the lake area," Shelton said.


