Warmth helps crops mature

Wayne County may have escaped another year without a 100 degree day. Though September is making a valiant effort to change that the high readings predicted for Friday and Saturday, weather observer Pat Gross reports the high so far for the year has been the 96 degree reading recorded June 15, followed closely by the 93 degrees recorded the day after school started, Aug. 25.

Two all time low records were set in August on the 5th (47 degrees) and 6th (46).

HOWEVER, AFTER Pospishil had left the meeting, it was deter-mined that a 75 percent majority vote is needed to approve a budget with a 5 percent tax increase. After a quick phone call from County Clerk Deb Finn; Pospishil reportedly refused to change his vote nor to return to the meeting to help ework the budget.

Thus commissioners Merlin Beierman and Robert Nissen reconvened the meeting, reduced the budget by more than \$27,000 to bring the tax asking amount below the state mandated 3 percent lid and approved the revision on a 2-0 vote

The cuts were made in the road maintenance budget and will mean less work will be done next year

COMMISSIONERS were under the gun to file an approved budget with the state by Friday said Mrs.

Earlier in the day the commissioners had accepted a bid from Nebraska Machinery for \$39,053 to purchase a used D9 Crawler Tractor for Pospishil's District 3. The machine had been leased by the county. Nebraska Machinery was the only bidder. The vote to purchase it was

Rep. seeks CRP extension

Rep. Doug Bereuter praised the USDA plan to offer farmers a one year extension option on Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). contracts while Congress debates the content of the 1995 Farm Bill.

Visiting in Wayne this week to discuss issues at the Wayne Rotary Club, Bereuter said he does not expect the new Farm Bill to have the same level of conservation program funding as the 1985 bill had, but he will be working to maintain conservation incentives in the bill.

HE SAID ITS passage would probably be delayed until Oct. or Nov. of next year and thus the plan to offer farmers the opportunity to extend contracts, some of which are set to expire next year, would be important in the farm plans for many this year.

He said he hopes to see an easing of provisions for having and grazing of conservation lands, perhaps giving the land owners the options of less in conservation payments for land they take out of crop production and convert to pasture.

The eight-term congressman saidhe would like to see provisions in the new farm bill's conservation programs to take care of the prairie fire problems which have been created during existing conservation programs which encourage the growth of large areas of tall grass, which

ards in some areas.

FEDERAL CROP insurance initiatives being suggested by the Clinton Administration are among the few areas where Berueter said he agrees with the president. He said the provisions in the administration plan would make low population states less vulnerable to isolated disasters and would make ad hoc disaster bills harder to push through Congress.

The plan he supports would require a \$50 premium per crop from farmers and in the case of a declared

WSC to celebrate 'success'

A major victory party is planned in Wayne Oct. 8 to celebrate the anticipated successful completion of the Wayne State College foundation fund drive. The goal of the three year private fund raising event was set at \$13.6 million.

The college is inviting area community leaders and foundation supporters to the black-tie optional event which will include a silent art auction, dinner and program.

Artists who have been associated with the college are being asked to contribute works for the silent auction and many valuable art items have already been contributed, according to Wayne Groner, executive director of the foundation.

Notable among the artists who will be participating is Herb Mignery, a Wayne State alumnus who will be returning to the campus to sculpt piece that will become a larger than life bronze statue on an educational theme for the Heritage Plaza that will be constructed in the eenter of campus.

A 20-inch bronze model of Mignery's planned Heritage Plaza statute will be on display at the silent art auction. Guests at the auction will have the first opportunity to reserve limited-edition numbers and signed copies of the statue at an introductory price, said Groner.
Proceeds from the sale of those

copies will help fund renovation of the old power plant building on campus into an art education facility.

Mignery, who lives in Estes Park,

Colo., is one of the nation's leading western artists and is one of only a handful of artists invited into the prestigious Cowboy Artists of America.

One hurt in 3-car accident

Harold "Bill" Stipp, 73, of Wayne ening three vehicle accident a mile east of Wayne on Highway 35 Tuesday evening.

He was treated and released from Providence Medical Center.

Nebraska State Patrol reported Stipp was west bound when his vehicle ran into the back of a side delivery rake being pulled by a truck driven by Edwin Hammers, 49, Emerson. Hammers had stopped on the highway to allow oncoming traffic to cross a bridge before pulling the wide piece of farm equipment across, according to the Patrol report.

The equipment was being hauled to the consignment auction in Wayne according to the Patrol report and did not have lights

After the initial collision, the Stipp vehicle, which ended up partially in the oncoming lane, was struck by an east bound car driven by Mary Ballinger, 44, Pender. The Stipp vehicle suffered major damage, said the Patrol. Other vehicles suffered moderate damage and the highway was blocked for over an hour while emergency crews cleared the wreckage from the bridge area

The fact that Stipp was wearing a seat belt was credited with protecting him from serious injuries according the State Patrol report. No citations have been issued pending completion of the investigation into the accident.


