

Tech Trek at Wayne

The Educational Service Units across Nebraska sponsored a special first-time event entitled Tech Trek Across Nebraska Feb. 5-8.

Stops were made at North Platte, Sidney and Hastings before the final stop in Wayne on Feb. 8.

"The single goal of the project was to offer as many teachers and administrators as possible, within the span of one week, a representation of current technologies to use in the classroom and central office," said Dr. Dennis Jensen, Superintendent of Wayne Public Schools.

Over 125 school districts are members of the four ESUs in N.E. Nebraska. However, turnout for the event was light.

"THE WAYNE Community School District was proud of the many presenters provided by the school for the Tech Fair," Dr. Jensen said.

Wayne State College provided the services of Dennis Lister as a presenter on how to implement networks in small schools.

THE TOPICS offered by the local faculty and staff included: cost effective and efficient network models; the Voyage of the Mimi/The Great Ocean Rescue; enhancing the art experience with technology; special needs students and technology and administrators and the Internet.

Other topics included acusan and saving money with the school lunch program; desktop publishing; Industrial Technology demonstrations; accelerated reader project; instruction and management of a computer lab serving 180 students; the Iditroo Race of Alaska and teacher/media specialist partnerships in computing.

Tech Trek Across Nebraska will be an annual project with different hosting sites selected every year. The site for N.E. Nebraska schools next year will be the Fremont School District.

"The Wayne Community School District was honored at being selected as an initial site," Dr. Jensen said.

"THERE WERE many exciting and interesting presentations offered throughout the day with 22 staff members from Wayne Community Schools displaying their special talents and technological experiences," Jensen said.

There were 27 vendors in the gym demonstrating the latest technical advancements to help students, teachers and administrators improve performance.

Approves gas rate hike

Council debates 'family'

A packed council room was on hand Tuesday night to listen to debate on the proposed ordinance to amend the definition of "family" in the Wayne zoning ordinance and hear of the proposed natural gas rate increases.

The council listened to a number of people who spoke against the ordinance which had been amended at the last council meeting to limit to three the number of unrelated persons living in a single family dwelling.

Brian Kruse, an off-campus senator on the Wayne State Student Senate told the council that the senate

had held an open forum on campus for the purpose of discussing this issue and asked the council to consider changing the number of unrelated persons back to four.

"LIVING OFF-CAMPUS is a part of life. Students are not going to move back into the dorms after they have lived off-campus," Kruse said.

Paul Campbell, who owns several rental properties in Wayne, told the council that he felt this was a bad ordinance.

"We don't need an ordinance to kick tenants out who are not following the rules; I have specific rules for my rental property and if I get calls in the middle of the night about my tenants, I will talk to them."

"We have ordinances to deal with noise and parking and this ordinance will make the housing shortage in Wayne worse. I feel that we don't have accurate numbers and need to gather more information before we can proceed with this issue."

COUNCIL PERSON Verdel Lutt stressed the council's concern about working families being able to afford housing in Wayne.

"We are not out to kick anyone out of their house. If there are four people in a house and there are no problems, they won't get caught. My concern is that if we raise the number to four, then there will be five people in the house and so forth," Lutt said.

After discussion, the council voted 6-1 to amend the ordinance to read four or more unrelated persons living in a single dwelling or five or more related persons living as a traditional family. The ordinance will be up for a third reading at a future meeting.

THE COUNCIL heard from City Administrator Joe Salirros on the proposal by Peoples Natural Gas to raise residential and commercial gas rates.

Last fall representatives from

Internet, grants topics at board meeting

A lengthy agenda was before the Wayne Board of Education at their regular meeting Monday.

The board voted to hold a special meeting at noon Feb. 26 for the purpose of adopting a resolution to call for a special school bond election on May 14, listened to an audit review, discussed the interlocal agreement for Internet access, heard the status of three grant proposals and discussed short term goals for the board.

The board also heard a report from Dr. Dennis Jensen, Superintendent of Schools on present legislation in the Nebraska legislature that will affect the district.

Several file for election

Several incumbents have filed for re-election in Wayne County this past week.

Douglas A. Sturm has filed for the First Ward Councilperson in the city of Wayne and Jane O'Leary has filed for Fourth Ward.

Robert Nissen has filed for Wayne County Commissioner in District 2 and Connie R. Bargstadt has filed for the Board of Education, School District 95R in Winslow.

Don Harmeier has filed for the Noxious Weed Control Authority.

The incumbent filing deadline is today (Feb. 15). The deadline for Challenge and political delegates is March 1. Those wishing to run for the Village Board of Trustees have until Aug. 1 to file.

Three bills, LB 1050, 349 and 1145, have been combined. One major aspect of the legislation would be to consider average income per capita for equalization.

Under this proposal, the Wayne district would lose \$76,000 in state aid because 19 more districts would be considered equalization districts.

DR. JENSEN also discussed three grant proposals that the school has applied to receive.

The 1996-97 School to Work grant will be considerably different than this year's format. The district received \$28,000 for this year but now single schools will no longer be accepted. Instead, Wayne High will work with Wayne State College, Northeast Community College and eight other districts.

The district is also applying for an MCI grant which focuses on teacher and administrator training. The grant asks for software for the math curriculum, equipment for teachers to take home over the summer and using Internet in classroom. The grant is valued at \$30,000.

The district did not receive

the gas company and the 94 cities served by Peoples met and negotiated what will amount to a two percent average increase in residential rates and approximately five percent increase for commercial users," Salitros said.

The total revenue generated by this increase will be approximately \$2 million, which is down from the \$4 million the company had originally requested.

Gas rates were last adjusted in 1992.

The council voted to approve the rate increase and waive the second and third readings of the ordinance.

THE COUNCIL voted to defer any action on involvement with WayNet, an interlocal agreement with Wayne Community Schools.

Council members voted to set public hearings on two proposals involved with bringing a dairy business to the Wayne area.

Salitros told the council that a purchase agreement has been signed for land west of Wayne that is one mile outside of the Wayne zoning jurisdiction.

The dairy, originally based in California, would be for the production of milk and would be the largest of the three that have come to Nebraska.

SALITROS ALSO said the dairy would create 10-15 jobs, including that of a full-time veterinarian. The business would use approximately \$1.5 million worth of feed and pay \$35-40,000 in taxes.

The council voted to set a public hearing for amending the Wayne Revolving Loan Fund Plan and a hearing on the dairy's request for up to \$98,000 in Revolving Fund monies. These hearings will be held on Tuesday, Feb. 27.

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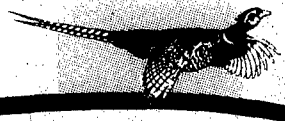

Write your state senator

Dear Editor:

State of Nebraska statute (77-1605) allows for financial assistance to Veterans', their departments and widows to provide for food, shelter, wearing apparel, medical or surgical aid, or funeral expenses for persons who served in the armed forces of the United States during a period of war (this includes WWI, WWII, Korea, Vietnam, Panama, Grenada, Lebanon and Persian Gulf conflicts).

On February 2, 1996 the Government, Military and Veteran's Affairs Committee of the Nebraska Legislature conducted a "hearing" to consider the merit of LB 1303 (which proposes to eliminate the 50 year old authority of the Veterans' Service Committees to establish the amount of "Veterans' aid" needed and to shift that authority to the County Boards).

It is apparently the opinion of many county boards and Senator Bud Robinson that there is either sufficient or too much money already available to help veterans and their families. According to Sen. Robinson, he has "never had a single veteran complain that their needs are not being met." Are there not veterans in need of financial assistance in Sen. Robinson's district, or are these veterans and their family members not aware of the County Veterans' Aid fund, or have you given up on being helped because of the attitudes of the politicians of your district?

Sen. Robinson believes that welfare, Medicaid, and the V.A. Medical Centers are the "answer all" to these veterans needs. How are the V.A. Hospitals meeting all the medical needs of you and your family? How many of you (or your veterans) have been financially destroyed by medical bills?

According to Sen. Robinson, this is either "not a problem" (because he personally does not

come in contact with veterans that are not as comfortable financially as he is) or if it is a problem it should be dealt with in the "democratic way" (i.e. if your county is not funding the County Veteran's Aid fund adequately, every veteran and all of their family members should flood to board meeting rooms to exercise your "democratic right". They should write and call the Board members and the State Senators and tell them if their needs are being met and vote those politicians out of office that will not be responsive to your needs).

According to Sen. Robinson, he is going to do "everything in his power to make sure that the County Board gains control of the establishment of the County's Veterans' Aid Fund."

The Veterans' service organizations say "Goodbye County Veteran's Aid if the County Boards gain control of the fund!"

In Buffalo County, the majority of the Board of Supervisors say \$ 6000 per year should be enough. I told Sen. Robinson "If the county boards in counties the size of Buffalo believe \$ 6000 meets the needs of all eligible applicants, then those board members are not living in the same world I am."

Please call and write your State Senator and Sen. Bud Robinson and your county board members and tell them if you or your veteran's needs are being met. Go to the county board meetings as often as you can and tell them who you think is "living in reality"! If you have already done this, do it again because they apparently can't hear you, so this time sound off about Veteran's Aid! Senator Robinson's number is (402) 471-2728.

Anti-gambling message sent

LINCOLN — The earthquake felt in eastern Nebraska last week was more than just the shifting of underground faults.

State senators sent an anti-gambling rumble across the state by routing the armada of well-paid lobbyists that were trying to win approval of a statewide vote on expanding legalized gambling.

The vote was a shocking 36-9 to kill the pro-gambling resolution. One senator calculated that the gambling proponents were able to convince about one senator per two lobbyists to support the idea.

Gambling lobbyists are expected to be paid more than \$400,000 this year. That, it now appears, is a pretty stiff price to see the casino gambling issue crash and burn — for the second year in a row — on first-round debate.

The death of the gambling issue opens up more room on an already crowded agenda for debate on several other interesting issues.

One issue that is emerging is whether the Legislature screwed up in allowing some state agencies to sell public records at a profit.

State Sen. Curt Bromm of Washoo and some other senators think senators did drop the ball.

He has introduced Legislative Bill 1375 to prohibit state agencies from collecting fees for public records. The bill has already been advanced from a legislative committee to debate by all lawmakers.

The issue heated up last summer, when a Lincoln insurance company, Farmers Mutual, sued the state and the Nebraska Library Commission.

The company alleged that the commission improperly gave exclusive rights to a private computer on-line service, Nebraska Interactive, to sell public drivers license records for a profit. That was done without legislative approval, the suit said.

Farmers Mutual also objected that the fees charged for such records was increased from \$2 to \$3 per record without legislative approval. The new fee was exorbitant, the company said, and was raised only so the on-line service could make money.

I don't know about you, but it always ticks me off as a reporter when I'm asked to pay money to obtain a public record. Public officials are paid public dollars to maintain public records for the public. That is a big part of their job. It is not to market such records for a profit.

Yet, in some state offices, you have to pay \$1 per page to get a copy of a public record. Sure, we should pay the actual cost of making that copy, but \$1 a copy? Get real.

The insurance company is making a similar argument. Previously, they got their motor vehicle records on computer tapes for \$2 per record. They aren't too thrilled with the new-fangled computer service that clips them for \$3 a record.

Two years ago, Sen. Don Preister of Omaha tried to raise concerns about making sure that the public had free computer access to legisla-

tive records. Unfortunately, other lawmakers didn't listen and Preister's bill got buried in a study.

Several senators wished they'd listened now because the commission's contract with Nebraska Interactive has reportedly been extended until the year 2000.

That means that even if Sen. Bromm's bill passes, the Legislature may not be able to do anything

to get correct this questionable deal.

Someday, we'll be able to sit down at a computer and access every government record. The debate over LB 1375 may help decide whether we have to pay for that privilege or not.

Sam wants to harness and control the Internet. Now Sam can, unless the nineteen groups joining the ACLU in suing Sam are successful.

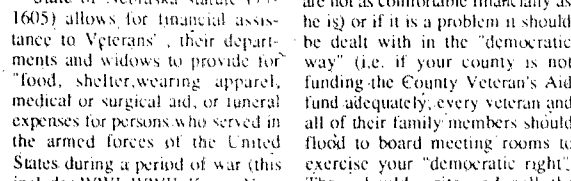

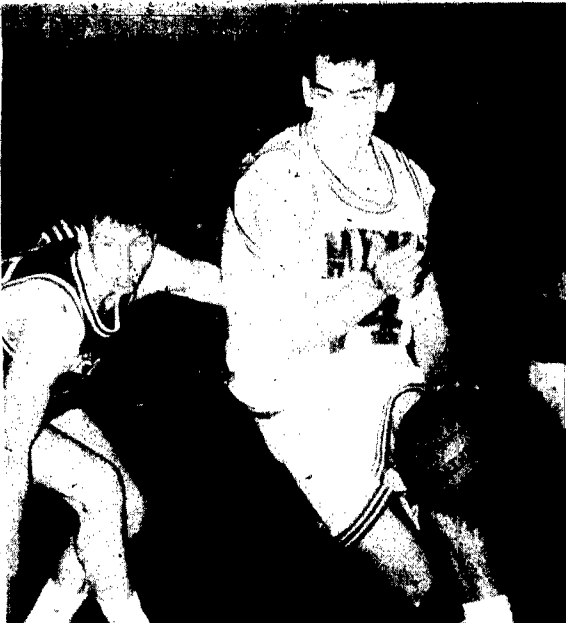

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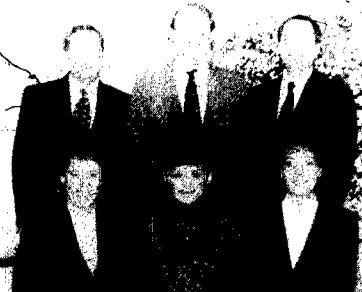
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WSC baseball team starts '96 season

Here's a look at how the 1996 Wildcats shape up.

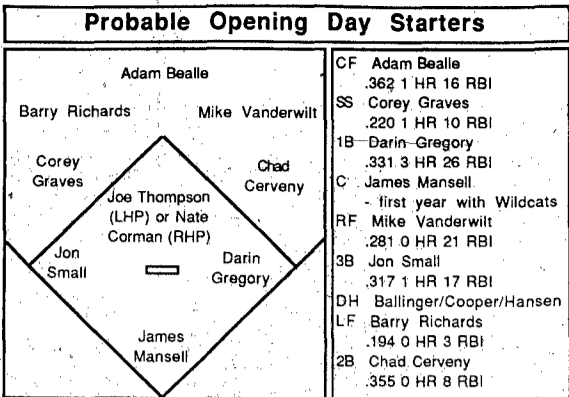
Pitching Staff

Head Coach John Manganaro feels that the quality of the four or five starters on the team will make the pitching staff the strength of this year's team. Senior left-hander Joe Thompson (2-5, 5.08 ERA, 28 strikeouts) returns to anchor the starting rotation, while junior right-hander Nate Corman (2-6, 3.52 ERA, 30 strikeouts) compliments him on the other side of the mound.

"Joe went to a camp last fall," said Manganaro, "and he's drawn a lot of attention from scouts that work the midwest area. Nate has just improved tremendously from last year. He's pretty smart. He has a great curveball, changes speeds pretty well and he knows how to pitch. He knows what he's supposed to get done."

Right-hander Pat Muller (Des Moines Area CC) and sophomore left-hander Aaron Garmong (0-4, 4.18 ERA, 26 strikeouts) make up the three and four spots in the rotation, while Junior righty Bryan Stockwell (1-3, 4.44 ERA, 25 strikeouts) will be the 'Cats fifth starter and closer.

Senior right-handers Tim Fancher (1-4, 5.24 ERA, 10 strikeouts) and Kevin Maulick (10 earned runs and 4 strikeouts in 5 innings) will provide spot-starting and middle relief help, as will junior college transfer Mike Benson.



Catcher

Sophomore James Mansell (Des Moines Area CC) will open the season behind the plate, while Scott Cooper (196, 2 doubles, 6 RBIs) will back him up.

"The catcher position was shored up quite a bit from last year when we acquired James Mansell," said Manganaro. "He's an outstanding catcher. He has a great arm and swings the bat from the left side with an enormous amount of power."

First Base

Junior Darin Gregory (.331, 3 HR, 8 doubles, 26 RBI, 20 runs scored) returns at first base for the 'Cats. Gregory was the only Wildcat to start all 35 games and led the team in home runs and runs batted in.

Second Base

Senior Chad Cerveny (.355, 4 stolen bases, 19 walks) is back for his fourth year as a starter at second base.

"Chad will provide a lot of leadership for us," said Manganaro. "He's a very good glove man and can turn two with anybody. He's a gap hitter at best, but he hits for average, draws a lot of walks and I expect him to do a great job for us."

Redshirt freshman Odell Santos will back up Cerveny and is being groomed to take his place for next year.

Shortstop

Junior Cory Graves (.220, 1 HR, 10 RBIs, 22 runs scored, 21 walks) will be the starting shortstop, while redshirt freshman Ben Humann will back him up as the 'Cats utility infielder.

"Cory can turn our whole team around from last year," said Manganaro. "We look for good things out of him. He has the athletic ability to be an outstanding shortstop."

Third Base

Junior Jon Small (.317, 1 HR, 17 RBIs, 20 runs scored) will man the hot-corner and will also back-up Gregory at first base. Sophomore Karl Laursen will backup at third.

"Jon hit .317 with a strained rotator cuff in his left shoulder," said Manganaro, "and that's very vital to swinging the bat. He played in a lot of pain last year and did a great job for us."

Left Field

Senior Barry Richards (.194, 1 double, 3 RBIs) will start in left field and will be backed up by

redshirt freshman Jack Hansen.

"Barry has improved tremendously," said Manganaro. "Barry is our leader. He's our guy that gets everybody going. We expect a lot of good things from him. He's improved immensely on defense and he'll help us out with the stick a little bit too."

Center Field

Adam Bealle (.362, 9 doubles, 1 HR, 16 RBIs, 25 runs scored, 6 stolen bases) moves from left to center field this year and will leadoff. Unfortunately, Bealle dislocated his shoulder during football season and is still not 100 percent.

"Adam is a very promising bright spot for us," said Manganaro, "but he is injured. He's going to have to start the season at about 80 percent. We're going to have to see how that arm is. If he can't throw very well, we'll flop him over to left."

When he's not pitching, Aaron Garmong (.194, 1 HR, 7 RBIs) will be Bealle's replacement in center.

Right Field

After starting out 0-23, at the plate last year, junior right fielder Mike Vanderwilt (.281, 6 doubles, 2 triples, 21 RBIs, 14 runs scored) came on to have a solid season.

"Mike had quite a few hits with people on base," said Manganaro. "He put the ball in play when we needed him to put the ball in play."

Junior Scott Ballinger (Des Moines Area CC) will be the Wildcats primary fourth outfielder and will also see some time in middle relief.

"He can really play all over the outfield," said Manganaro. "If Adam can't play in center because he's hurt, I'll move Mike over to center and Scott will play right field."

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

Self-worth is evaluated on intelligence

Q. What part does intelligence play in the self-esteem of adults?

A. It has been said that "a boy is the father of the man," meaning we "grown-ups" are direct products of our own childhood. Thus, everything I have written about self-esteem in children applies to adults as well. We are all graduates of the educational "fail factory," and few have escaped completely unscathed. Furthermore, our self-worth is still being evaluated on the basis of intelligence.

Dr. Richard Herrnstein, a Harvard University psychologist, predicts that a caste system founded on IQ is coming to America. He believes people will soon be locked into rigid intellectual classes that will determine careers, earning power and social status. Dr. Herrnstein's expectation is based on the disintegration of racial and sexual barriers to success, leaving only intelligence as the major remaining source of discrimination.

I don't agree fully with Dr. Herrnstein, although I am certain we will see the continuing importance of mental ability to self-esteem in our technological world.

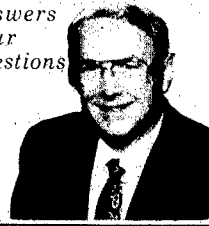
Q. I have suffered from low self-esteem for years, so I sought help from a psychiatrist during a particularly depressed period of my life. Rather than building my self-worth, however, he was cold and aloof with me. I had the feeling he was merely doing a job and never really cared about me. How would you approach a patient with my kind of problem?

A. It has been discouraging for me to see how often my professional colleagues (psychiatrists, psychologists and counselors) have overlooked the feelings you described as a most obvious root cause for emotional distress. Lack of self-esteem produces more symptoms of psychiatric disorders than any other factor yet identified.

Time and time again in my casework as a psychologist, I sat talking to a person with deep longings to be respected and accepted. How badly he needed human affection and kindness, as well as emotional support and suggestions for change. Yet if that same needy patient had gone to Dr. Sigmund Freud in his day, the immortal grandfather of psychoanalysis

would have sat back in detached professionalism, analyzing the patient's sexual repressions.

If the patient had sought treatment from Dr. Arthur Janov, originator of Primal Scream therapy, he would have been encouraged to roll on the floor and bawl like a baby. Other modern therapists would have required the same patient to assault and be assaulted by other members of an "encounter group," or remove his clothing in a group.

Believe it or not, one of the major areas of controversy at psychiatric conferences a few years ago involved the wisdom of female patients having sexual intercourse with their male therapists! Have we gone completely mad? Whenever men abandon their ethics, they cease to make sense, regardless of their professional degrees and licenses.

The most successful approach to the therapy for a broken patient, I firmly believe, is to convey the following message with conviction: "Life has been tough, and you have become acquainted with pain. To this point, you've faced your problems without much human support, and there have been times when your despair has been overwhelming. Let me now share that burden. From this moment forward, I am interested in you as a person; you deserve and shall have my respect. As best as possible, I want you to quit worrying about your troubles. Instead, confide them to me. Our concentration will be on the present and the future; together we will seek appropriate solutions."

Suddenly, the beleaguered patient no longer feels alone—the most depressing of human experiences. "Someone cares! Someone understands! Someone assures me with professional confidence that he is certain I will survive. I'm not going to drown in this sea of despondence, as I feared. I have been thrown a life preserver by a friend who promises not to abandon me in the storm."

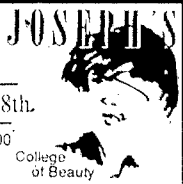
