Services will be held at nearly all cemeteries on Monday honoring those men and women who have served in the armed forces.

Guest speaker will be Ronald L. Behnke, a member of the Norfolk Legion Post.

Following a short service at Pleasantview Cemetery of Winside, a dinner will be served at the post home for the general public.

Street widening to begin soon

Members of Gill Construction, the general contractor for the Logan Street widening project met with the public Tuesday evening to discuss the project.

Plans call for the street to be widened from Second Street to Highway 35. The width will vary from 36 to 57 feet.

Construction is scheduled to begin June 10 with an anticipated completion date set for Sept. 6.

In addition to the street widening,

driveways will be replaced, wheelchair ramps will be installed and some work will be done on storm sewers.

Ron Gill of Gill Construction told the property owners present that the first phase of the project will be removal of "everything you can see" along the construction route. This will be followed by the underground work including replacing storm sewers and water lines.

"Approximately July 18 we

hope to begin the prep work, but the exact date depends on a number of things, especially the weather," Gill said.

There is a possibility that Fifth Street will be open to cross street traffic during a portion of the construction. There will be access to all businesses during the project.

Gill urged residents in the project area to stay away from stakes that have been placed along the

street. He also warned residents to keep children out of the area during the construction because of the dangerous equipment and noise.

Total cost of the project is \$770,000.

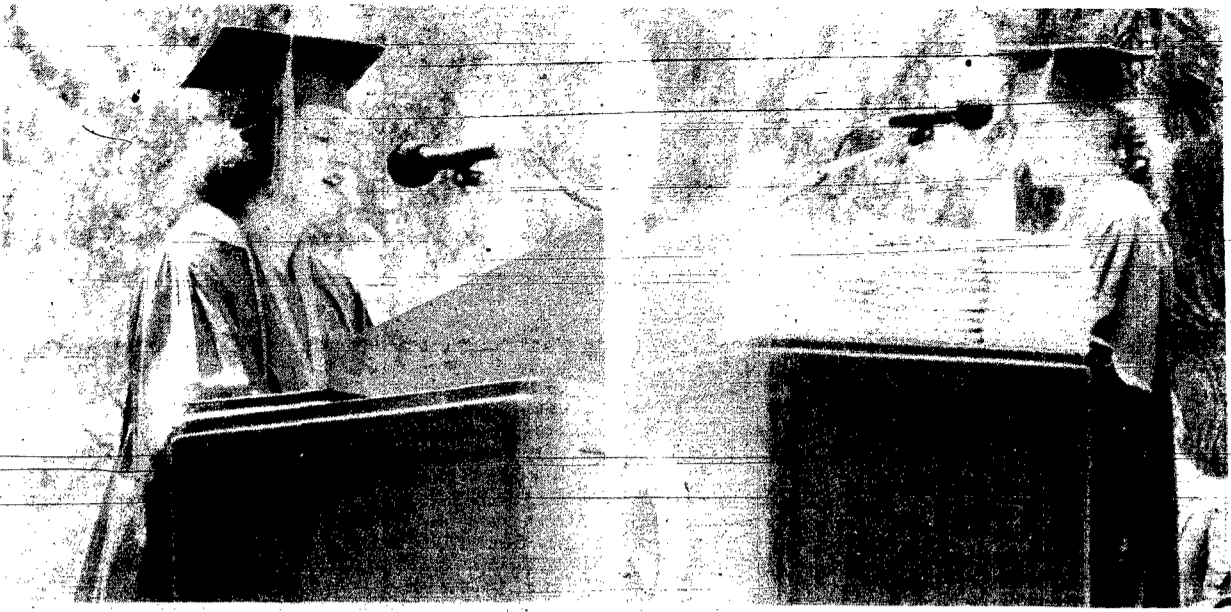

A time to use caution

Memorial Day weekend is here: a time when families reunite, joined by friends, to decorate graves, and pay tribute to those who have gone before.

Unfortunately, the weekend becomes "memorable" for hundreds, it being one of the deadliest due to traffic "accidents".

Disastrous airline crashes, such as the recent Valujet Airliner in Florida, receive extensive media coverage as 110 lives were lost. But news outlets seldom remind Americans that an equal number of people die every day of the week in ground vehicles. Such a blood bath receives little attention except in year-end statistics. Can one imagine the hysteria if over 40,000 died annually in airplanes?

Difficult to imagine that every 365 days over 40,000 people breath their last as the result of vehicular wrecks. That means there are over 40,000 more graves throughout the nation this weekend compared to a year ago. There are, of course, thousands more when considering all causes of death.

If Americans refuse to change their negligent driving habits, it means another 40,000 of us celebrating this Memorial Day will be absent 12 months from now. What a useless, tragic waste of humanity. Each is convinced, "it won't happen to me!"

Why do thousands trying to drive insist on believing they reign supreme on the road, proceeding to drive recklessly, exceeding speed limits, failing to stop for traffic signals, and in general acting like full-blown jerks?

No one knows why. But they do. Such drivers are as lethal as deadly snakes.

Many such drivers will be dead by Tuesday, as will their victims. Cheat death. Come home alive. Use great care.

Next election to be barnburner

Election Day has always been an exciting time for me. I was born on one, according to my mother, who has a better recollection of the event than I do.

Most winks in Lincoln figured that a low voter turnout and bad weather on primary day would help Attorney General Don Stenberg, allowing him to overcome the slick TV ads of Omaha businessman Chuck Hagel for the GOP nomination.

Wrong-o.

The hard-core Republicans and conservative Christians that were supposed to solidly support Stenberg didn't in the kind of numbers necessary. Hagel won in a cakewalk.

How come? My guess is that Hagel's "I'm a nice guy who is a conservative" ads won a lot of points with Nebraskans. The Tom Bodett/Motel 6-style fiddle music in the background was perfect. I kept waiting for the ads to close with Hagel saying, "I'll keep the light on for you..."

Those were killer ads. And, the negative attacks by Stenberg and later the Democratic Party didn't hurt Hagel and probably helped.

Hagel addressed the slams head on: he lived in Virginia because he was working in Washington, D.C. Where else was he supposed to live? (But it's no coincidence that as soon as he moved back to Nebraska, his name was being floated as a candidate for some office.)

On the \$1,000 contribution to Bob Kerrey's presidential primary bid, Hagel said he did that because Kerrey had helped him raise money for the Vietnam Memorial in Washington (of which Hagel was a prime organizer) and, heck, he was a veteran and a Nebraskan running for the highest office in the land.

Flip-flopping on issues, Hagel said he listed all of his campaign stands in a booklet months ago and his stands haven't changed. (Yes, but there's no doubt he was catering to conservatives when he altered his positions on abortion and gun control before doing the pamphlet.)

So, there's some fire in this smoke, but Hagel made no apologies and came off as sincere as a school superintendent. And Stenberg, for his slams, came off looking harsh, negative and behind.

In the end, though, Nebraska Republicans decided that Hagel had the better chance (and better pocketbook) to beat Nelson.

It will be a clash of millionaires from Omaha, small-town boys who made good in business and now are dabbling in politics. It will be a battle for the high ground, with each pledging a positive race.

Plus, it will be the first time that Nelson will face a candidate that not only has campaign funds, but a personality. Despite his popularity, Nelson faces a tough challenge. Unlike the past few months, the governor will have to take some tough stands on some tough issues, like whether he'll vote to re-elect Bill Clinton, who is about as popular in Nebraska as CBS News.

By November, election night ought to be a barnburner — for more people than just me.

Communications volunteer of the year is named by the AHA

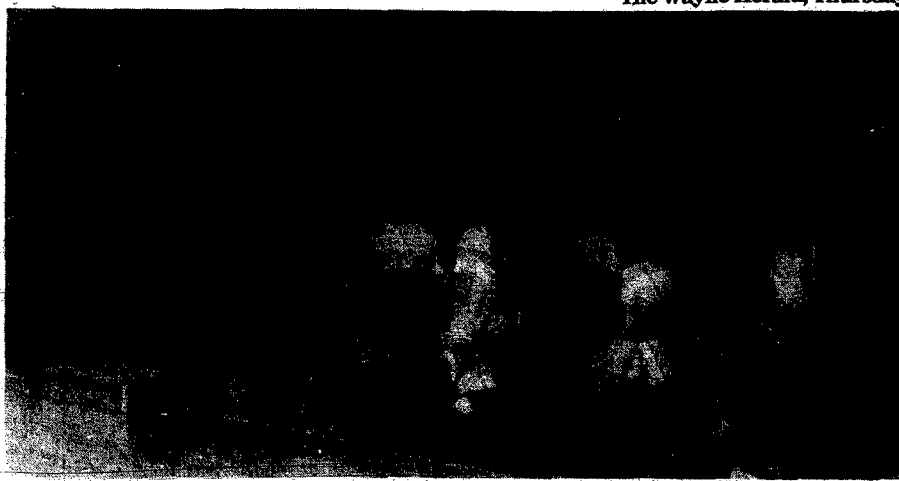

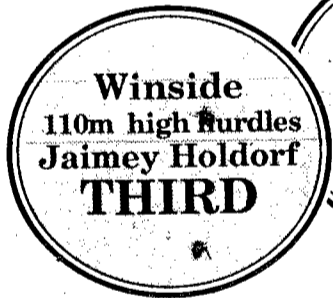

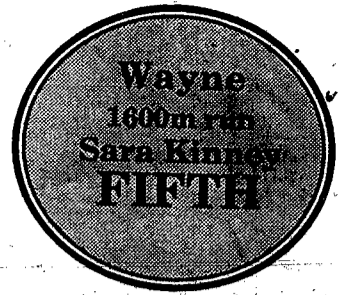

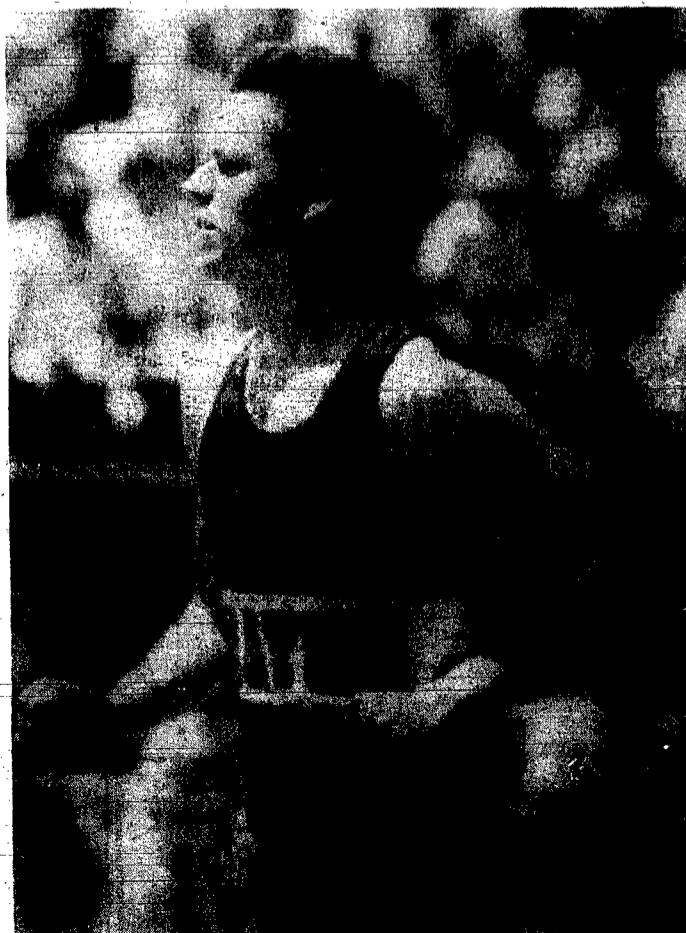


Wayne's Anne Wiseman concentrates as she gets ready for the start of the 3200 meter run.

Eleven athletes bring home medals

Area athletes felt both the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat at the State Track Meet in Omaha last weekend. The thrill was felt by Wakefield's 4 x 100 meter relay team, which set a new school record and claimed the Class C gold medal. The agony was felt the most by Laurel's David Pinkerton. Pinkerton collided with a hurdle during the 300 meter prelims, knocking him out of the race and fracturing a bone in his foot.

All-in-all, 11 area athletes picked up medals, placing in five events.

Wayne won two medals in Class B action. Sara Kinney placed fifth in the 1600 meter run on Saturday, clocking 5:26.65 to score the girls' only two points. On Friday, Spencer Stednitz scored the boys' only point, finishing sixth in the 3200 meter run with a time of 10:13.1.

Amy Close ran a 12:37 in the 3200 meter run, while Kinney ran a 12:52 and Anne Wiseman clocked a 12:57. The girls 4 x 800 meter relay team timed a 10:28, while Stednitz clocked 4:47.8 in the 1600 meter run. Brad Maryott clocked a 23.7 in the 100 meter dash prelims and marked 19' 9" in the long jump.

Gering won the Class B boys title with 55 points, while Beatrice took the girls title with 44 points.

Wakefield's boys scored 10 points in Class C. The 4 x 100 meter relay team of Justin Mackling, Matt Peterson, Ryan Hoffman and Jim Rusk eclipsed the school record and won the Class C title with a time of 43.78. Sutherland finished second in the race, clocking 44.00. Mackling also competed in the high jump, clearing 5' 10", but missing at 6' 0".

Alison Benson marked 33' 8", 33' 8 1/2" and 33' 10" in the triple jump prelims and reached the finals, but was unable to move up from eighth place. In the 100 meter high hurdles, Benson struggled over the final hurdle and finished sixth in her heat, clocking 17.0.

Winside's boys finished with six points. Jaimey Holdorf finished third in a very close final of the 110 meter hurdles. Chad Wiles of Wood River won the race with a time of 15.25, followed by Matt Puetz of Norfolk Catholic and Holdorf, each clocking 15.30. Holdorf advanced to the finals with a 15.30 time in the prelims. Last year, Holdorf didn't even reach the finals as he was disqualified for a false start in the prelims.

Chad O'Connor cleared 6' 2" in the high jump and marked 43' 3" in the triple jump, while Brock Shelton threw the discus 130' 8". Ann Brugger hurled the shot put 31' 6" and marked 100' 8" in the discus, while Stacy Wittler clocked 2:30.4 in the 800 meter run.

Laurel-Concord's girls earned six points on the strength of a third place finish in the 4 x 800 meter relay. Dena Stapelman, Tracy Ankeny, Mindy Eaton and Elly Harder clocked 10:11.40, 1.7 seconds ahead of fourth place Malcom. DeWitt Tri-County won the race with a time of 9:51.42 followed by Geneva in 10:02.79. Ankeny, Stapelman, Gina Monson and Katie Monson clocked 52.46 in the 4 x 100 meter relay and 4:19 in the 4 x 400 meter relay.

Stapelman also clocked 2:33 in the 800 meter run, while Ankeny finished the 1600 meter run with a time of 5:40. Elly Harder clocked 5:47 in the 1600 meter run and 12:38 in the 3200 meter run. Michelle Wiltse tied the school record with a 5' 0" effort in the high jump and just missed clearing the bar at 5' 2".

The boys 4 x 400 meter relay team of Vince Ward, Todd Arens, Jeff Wattier and Josh Anderson set a new school record with their time of 3:33.8. Wattier clocked 11.3 in the 100 meter dash prelims and 23.6 in the 200 meter dash prelims. Pinkerton looked to be on his way to the finals in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles before his race came to an abrupt halt.

Sutherland and Wahoo Neumann finished the Class C boys title with 36 points, while DeWitt Tri-County won the girls

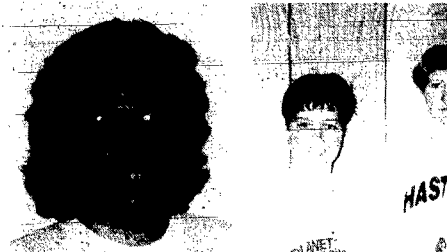

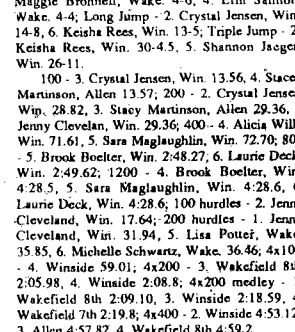

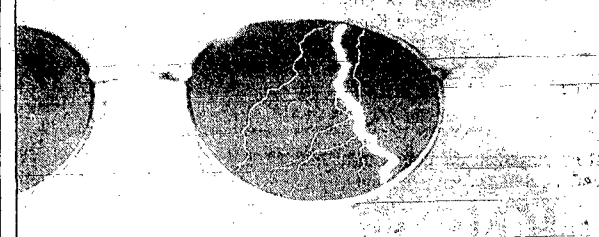

The Wakefield School Board met May 13. Jennifer Goos was present to talk about the school annual.

Principal Jeanne Surface reported on the Day Care Center's after-school program for school age children, summer workshops for teachers, migrant education and the Gardner Foundation modular technology grant.

Supt. Derwin Hartman reported that the board would need to amend the 1995-96 general fund budget to allow for additional special education expenses which are outside the expenditure lid. 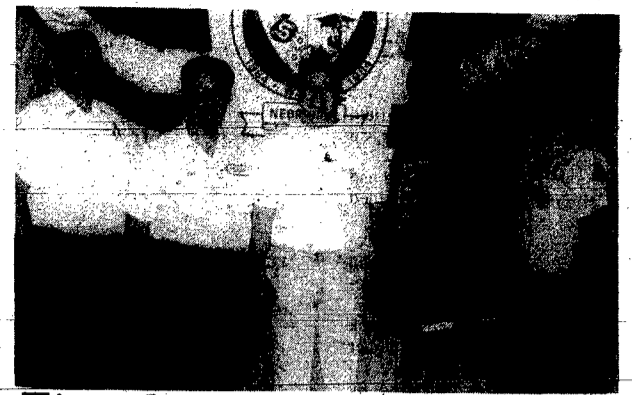
Vietnam veteran to be honored

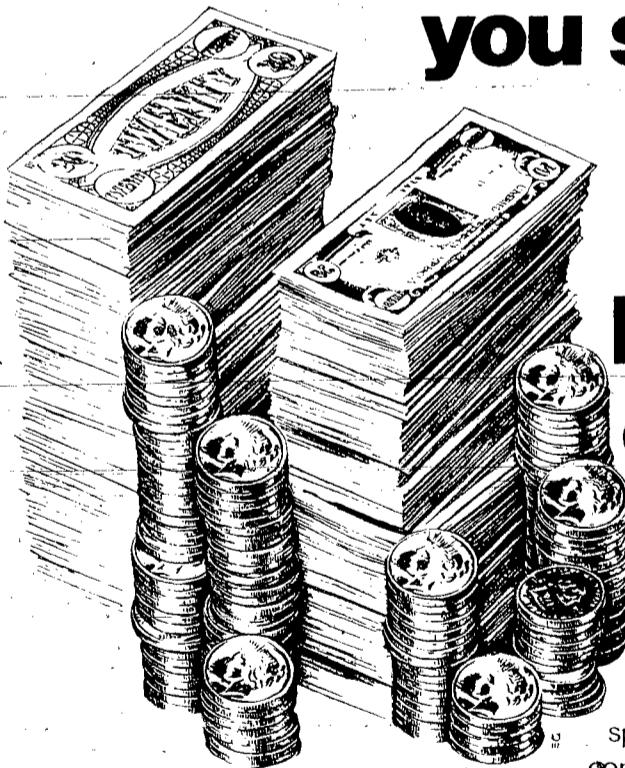

Wayne preschool manager earns management certificate

Diane Ehrhardt, manager of Stepping Stones Preschool in Wayne, has been recognized for completing a management training program designed to enhance the quality of services for children in her care, said Penny Gildea, training coordinator of the Nebraska Department of Education's Early Childhood Training Center. The recognition ceremony was held at the Nebraska Department of Social Services in Norfolk on May 14.

Funded by the Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben and the federal Quality Child Care Block Grant, the eight-month training program covered topics ranging from leadership skills and business practices to child development and providing healthy and safe environments for children. Twenty-eight managers of home and center-based child care and education programs in the Norfolk

area joined Ehrhardt in the training program, said Gildea.

"This training program reflects a significant community investment in children and families," she said. "Families are seeking well-qualified child care providers and research has shown that the quality of care children receive is directly related to the training of staff and administrators."

Those who completed the Early Childhood Care and Education Management Training Program are from 16 communities in the Norfolk area, said Gildea. Participants qualified for more than 75 hours of child care in-service through the

Department of Social Services. Nearly 40 child care providers and educators have completed an identical program in Omaha. She said funding is being sought to implement the management training program in other Nebraska communities during the next two years.

The pilot Management Training Program was a joint endeavor of the Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben's Family Preschool Committee of the Ak-Sar-Ben Youth Enrichment Task Force, The Early Childhood Training Center of the Nebraska Department of Education and Family Service of Metropolitan Omaha.

Lower insurance expense by forming your own insurance purchasing pool

Families and small businesses who gasp at the price they pay for their insurance need to take a closer look at Nebraska legislation that was passed in 1994 (LB1222) which allows residents to join together for the sole purpose of purchasing insurance. Changes in group health insurance law mean individuals may form groups of 25 or more for the sole purpose of purchasing insurance in Nebraska. These groups are called "insurance purchasing pools."

An insurance purchasing pool is a way to buy insurance as a group and bring the cost down for members of the group. This arrangement may fill a niche for people who cannot be covered by Medicaid or Medicare, or get their own coverage.

John Rink, actuary with the Ne-

inform communities about the recent revision and facilitate groups who might be interested in forming a pool through the learning process. Once the group is assembled, Rink said, an attorney may draw up association documents. These doc-

flexibility in developing the association documents. Once documents are in place, the group would approach an insurance agent or broker to obtain an insurance quote. As the size of the group increases, Rink added, the group should begin to have some power to bargain for a better rate.

Group insurance should benefit farmers and sole proprietors in Nebraska in obtaining more affordable health insurance, Rink said. Small employers will be able to purchase insurance through the group, but will purchase a separate policy due to other changes in the law. Several groups of 25 or more Nebraskans have already formed to purchase insurance, and many have made inquiries to the Department of Insurance.

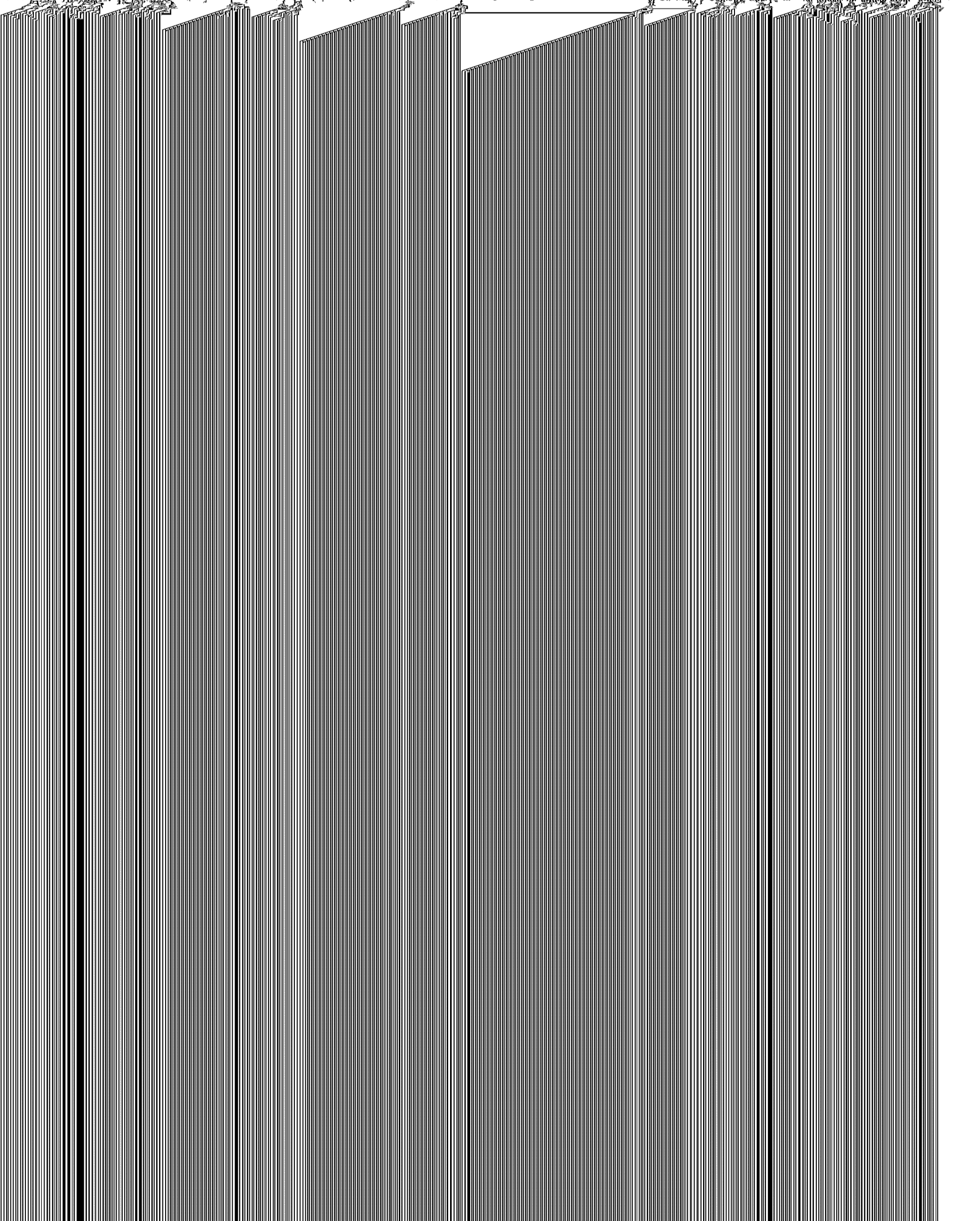

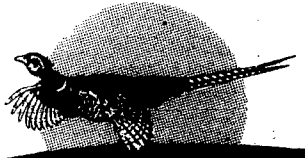

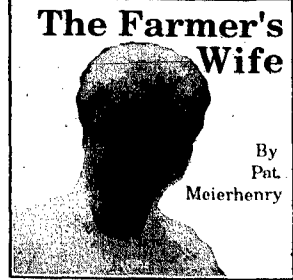

Approximately 980 chemigation safety equipment permits were issued by the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District in 1995.

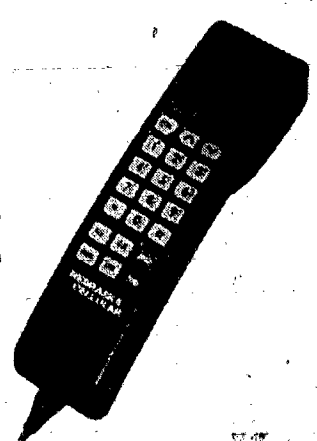

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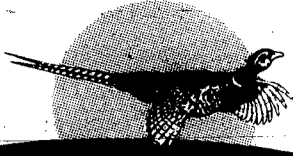

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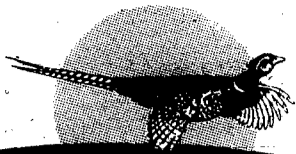
