A time to use caution

Memorial Day weekend is here: a time when families reunite, joined by friends, to decorate graves, and pay tribute to those who have gone before.

Unfortunately, the weekend becomes "memorable" for hundreds, it

being one of the deadliest due to traffic "accidents"

Disastrous airline crashes, such as the recent ValuJet Airliner in Florida, receive extensive media coverage as 110 lives were lost. But news outlets seldom remind Americans that an equal number of people die every day of the week in ground vehicles. Such a blood bath receives little attention except in year-end statistics. Can one imagine the hysteria if over 40,000 died annually in airplanes!

Difficult to imagine that every 365 days over 40,000 people breath their last as the result of vehicular wrecks. That means there are over 40,000 more graves throughout the nation this weekend compared to a year ago. There are, of course, thousands more when considering all causes of death. ...

If Americans refuse to change their negligent driving habits, it means another 40,000 of us celebrating this Memorial Day will be absent 12 months from now. What a useless, tragic waste of humanity. Each is convinced, "it won't happen to me!"

Why do thousands trying to drive insist on believing they reign supreme on the road, proceeding to drive recklessly, exceeding speed limits, failing to stop for traffic signals, and in general acting like fullblown jerks?

No one knows why. But they do. Such drivers are as lethal as deadly snakes.

Many such drivers will be dead by Tuesday, as will their victims. Cheat death. Come-home alive.

Election Day has always been an exciting time for me. I was born on one, according to my mother, who has a better recollection of the event than I do.

Now, as a reporter, election days provide a twice-every-two-years frantic dash to call every living candidate in the state to meet deadlines that always seem too early.

Judging by the voter turnout in last week's Primary, many of you don't share my excitement with election days.

But the way I figure it, if you vote, you automatically get a twolicense to gripe about everything done by the candidate you cither did or didn't vote for. The folks that don't vote, well, they can whine about the weather, the price of gasoline and the sorry price for cattle. But since they didn't vote, forget about complaining about government. You didn't vote.

But enough of that. Last week's Primary stumped a lot of the pun-

Most works in Lincoln figured that a low voter turnout and bad weather on primary day would help Attorney General Don Stenberg, allowing him to overcome the slick TV ads of Omaha businessman Chuck Hagel for the GOP nomina-

Wrong-o.

The hard-core Republicans and conservative Christians that were supposed to solidly support Stenberg didn't in the kind of numbers necessary. Hagel won in a cake-

How come? My guess is that Hagel's "I'm a nice guy who is a points with Nebraskans. The Tom Bodett/Motel 6-style fiddle music in the background was perfect. I kept waiting for the ads to close with Hagel saying, "I'll keep the light on for you...

Those were killer ads. And, the negative attacks by Stenberg and later the Democratic Party didn't hurt Hagel and probably helped.

on: he lived in Virginia because he was working in Washington, D.C. Where else was he supposed to live? (But it's no coincidence that as soon as he moved back to Nebraska, his name was being floated

as a candidate for some office.) On the \$1,000 contribution to Bob Kerrey's presidential primary bid, Hagel said he did that because Kerrey had helped him raise money for the Vietnam Memorial in Washington (of which Hagel was a prime organizer) and, heck, he was a veteran and a Nebraskan running for the highest office in the land.

Flip-flopping on issues, Hagel said he listed all of his campaign stands in a booklet months ago and his stands haven't changed., (Yes, but there's no doubt he was catering to conservatives when he altered his positions on abortion and gun control before doing the pamphlet.)

So, there's some fire in this smoke, but Hagel made no apologies and came off as sincere as a school-superintendent. And Stenberg, for his slams, came off looking harsh, negative and behind.

Republicans decided that Hagel had the better chance (and better pocketbook) to beat Nelson.

It will be a clash of millionaires from Omaha, small-town boys who made good in business and now are dabbling in politics. It will be a battle for the high ground, with each pledging a positive race.

Plus, it will be the first time that Nelson will face a candidate that not only has campaign funds, but a personality. Despite his popularity, Nelson faces a tough challenge. Unlike the past few months, the governor will have to take some tough stands on some tough issues, like whether he'll vote to re-elect Bill Clinton, who is about as popular in Nebraska as CBS News





Eleven athletes bring home medals

Area athletes felt both the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat at the State Track Meet in Omaha last weekend. The thrill was felt by Wakefield's 4 x 100 meter relay team, which set a new school record and claimed the Class C gold medal. The agony was felt the most by Laurel's David Pinkerton. Gering won the Class B boys title with 55 points, while Beatrice took the girls title with 44 points.

Wakefield's boys scored 10 points in Class C. The 4 x 100 meter relay team of Justin Mackling, Matt Peterson, Ryan Hoffman and Jim Rusk eclipsed the school record and won the Class C title with a time of 43.78. Sutherland finished second in the race, clocking 44.00. Mackling also competed in the high jump, clearing 5' 10", but missing at 6'

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Lower insurance expense by forming your own insurance purchasing pool

Families and small businesses who gasp at the price they pay for their insurance need to take a closer look at Nebraska legislation that was passed in 1994 (LB1222) which allows residents to join together for the sole purpose of purchasing insurance. Changes in group health insurance law mean individuals may-form groups of 25 or more for the sole purpose of purchasing insurance in Nebraska. These groups are called "insurance purchasing pools."

purchasing pools."

Aft insurance purchasing pool is a way to buy insurance as a group and bring the cost down for members of the group., This arrangement may fill a niche for people who cannot be covered by Medicaid or Medicare, or get their own coverage.

John Rink, actuary with the Ne-



inform communities about the recent revision and facilitate groups who might be interested in forming a pool through the learning process.

Once the group is assembled, Rink said, an attorney may draw up association documents. These docflexibility in developing the association documents. Once documents are in place, the group would approach an insurance agent or broker to obtain an insurance quote. As the size of the group increases, Rink added, the group should begin to have some power to bargain for a better rate.

Group insurance should benefit farmers and sole proprietors in Nebraska in obtaining more affordable health insurance, Rink said. Small employers will be able to purchase insurance through the group, but will purchase a separate policy due to other changes in the law. Several groups of 25 or more Nebraskans have already formed to purchase insurance, and many have made inquiries to the Department of Insurance.

Help is need to place small flags

Q. You have referred to a "system" of evaluating human worth in our culture, beginning with the most important attribute of physical attractiveness. What ranks second in significance?

A. It is the presence of intelligence, as expressed in scholastic aptitude. When the birth of a firstborn child is eminent, his parents pray that he will be normal . . . that is, "average."

But from that moment on, average will not be good enough. Their child

must excel. He must succeed. He must triumph. He must earn a stunning report card and amaze his teachers with his wit and wisdom. He must star in Little League, and later he must be the quarterback or the senior class president or the valedictorian. His sister must be the cheerleader or the soloist or the homecoming queen. Throughout the formative years of childhood, his parents give him the same message day after day: "We're counting on you to do something fantastic, son. Now don't disappoint

According to Martha Weinman Lear, author of The Child Worshippers, the younger generation is our most reliable status symbol. Middle-class parents vigorously compete with each other in raising the best-dressed, best-fed, best-educated, best-mannered, best-medicated, best-cultured and best-adjusted child on the block. The hopes, dreams and ambitions of an entire family sometimes rest on the shoulders of an immature child. And in this atmosphere of fierce competition, the parent who produces an intellectually gifted child is clearly holding the winning lottery ticket.

Unfortunately, exceptional children are just that-exceptions. Seldom does a 5-year-old memorize the Bible, or play chess blindfolded, or compose symphonies in the Mozart manner. To the contrary, the vast majority of our children are not dazzlingly brilliant, extremely witty, highly coordinated, tremendously talented or universally popular! They are just plain kids with oversized needs to be loved and accepted as they are.

Q. You say beauty and intelligence are the most critical factors in shaping self-esteem and confidence. What other influences contribute to the child's level of selfconfidence?

A. Let me list some of the more common variables that relate to self-

worth in our cultur 1. Parents have a remarkable power to preserve or damage the selfesteem of a child. Their manner either conveys respect and love or disappointment and disinterest.

2. Older siblings can crush the confidence of a younger, weaker child. The little one can never run as fast, or fight as well, or achieve as much as his big brothers and sisters. And if his words are perpetually matters of scorn, he can easily conclude that he is foolish and incapable

3. Early social blunders and mistakes are sometimes extremely painful, being remembered throughout a lifetime.

4. Financial hardship, depriving a child of the clothes and lifestyle of his peers, can cause a child to feel inferior. It is not the poverty, itself, which does the damage. Rather, it is the relative comparison with others It is possible to feel deprived when you are truly rich by the world's stan-

5. Disease, even when unapparent, may represent the child's "inner flaw." A cardiac condition, or other disorder, which forces Mom to nag and beg him to slow down, can convince a child that he is brittle and de-

fective.

6. A child who has been raised in a protected environment, such as a farm of a foreign missionary outpost, may be embarrassed by his underdeveloped social skills. His tendency is to pull inward in shy withdrawal.


7. Embarrassing family characteristics, such as having an alcoholic father or a mentally retarded sibling, can produce feelings of inferiority through close identification with the disrespected relatives.

Unfortunately, this list could be almost endless. In working with the problem of inadequacy, I have drawn this conclusion: Whereas a child can lose self-esteem in a thousand ways, the careful reconstruction of his personal worth is usually a slow, difficult process.

The American Heart Association (AHA) has updated its recommendations for treating strep throat and prevent ing rheumatic fever, an in-flammation of and damage to heart tissues. Damage to valves can cause heart murmurs. Persons who have had one attack of rheumatic fever are at high risk of having another attack following strep threat infections (caused by beta hemolytic streptococ Prevention of first attacks

requires proper identifica-tion of the causative organ-ism (throat swab and culture) and treatment with appropriate antibiotics. Penicillin is still the antibiotic of choice for strep throat. New AHA recommendations for children call for 250 mg of penicillin two to three times a day for 10 days. The adult dose recomended is 500 mg two to three times daily. Anti-biotics for persons allergic to penicillin include erythromycin, cephalexin, cedfadroxil, and azithromycin.
