

Students eligible for ROTC

Students at Wayne State College are now eligible for enrollment in the Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) thanks to an agreement the College has signed with the Army and the University of South Dakota, Vermillion

The agreement makes Wayne State one of only three sites in Nebraska where students can entoil in a ROTC program which provides military management and leadership training, college funding and an of licer's commission upon gradua

"It is basically another financial aid option available for students," said f.t. Col. William Fleser, commander of the ROTC program at Vermillion. "We are excited about the opportunity to provide enrollment and training to students at Wayne," he said.

Fleser said the Simultaneous

Membership Program offered to students at WSC and USD is very beneficial to juniors and seniors who qualify. He predicted that three to five students from Wayne Statewoold be enrolled in the program each year. They would technically be members of the USD ROTC unit while still maintaining status as full time WSC students.

He said he expects several of the WS' students currently enrolled in the National Guard while they are in college to be attracted to the ROTC program. Under the current structure, students from WSC, at tend a class in Vermillion one night a week. In addition, they will attend regular drifts and training with USD ROTC students.

The car seats that the group has available are the convertible-type designed to grow with a toddler.



These four ARC Disaster courses will be held in the Wayne County Chapter house at Ninth and Main Streets (formerly the Smart

Wayne County ARC Chapter must provide service in times of disasters in Wayne County according to the Wayne County Emergency Management Plan (LEOP). The chapter is charged with providing mass care-feeding, sheltering, etc and with providing the same services for single family

"In order for the chapter to provide these must services, it must have trained volunteers in each community in the county-Wayne, Winside, Hoskins, Carroll and Sholes," said Miron Jenness, said Miron Jenness, Wayne County Disaster Chairper-

Carroll currently has a trained ARC response team of approximately 20 persons.

Besides each community having a cadre of trained disaster response persons, the chapter must develop a disaster committee at the chapter level from the trained personnel.

-The National ARC has laid new operating ground rules for chapters. A chapter will no longer be able to exist in a passive status.

Who should consider the courses?

"The chapter would like to have a broad range of persons from each of the communities that currently lack trained ARC disaster personemergency management staff (Civil Defense), local governing persons and employees, law enforcement, city and county, fire and EMS, all levels of nursing and other interested community volunteerschurches, service organizations, American Legion, Eagles, Jaycees, Rotary, etc," Jenness said.

This is plea for the survival of our Wayne County ARC Chapter.

Each community must do its part for the overall county disaster planning, preparation, responding and helping to recover should a disaster take place in the county- tornadoes, straight winds, blizzards, and rain storms that cause sewers and water systems to be breeched.

These courses are open to other chapters and those persons who are in counties that do not have existing chapters such as Dixon, Cedar, Thurston and Pierce.

"These courses can be offered in the individual communities as was done in Carroll if someone in the community will head the effort, Jenness added.

Jenness is also the Zone 8 Disaster Chair which includes 23 N.E.braska counties and will be offering classes in a number of locations this fall

The Library Card This column is written occasionally to inform the Wayne area as to what types of reading material and other items are available at the Wayne

You all know the old saying, "The more things change, the more they stay the same!" Or, what goes around, comes around! We came across a couple of paragraphs in searching the microfilm files of The Wayne Herald. The then city librarian, Mrs. F.A. Mildner, wrote a library column entitled In Bookland. Her comments from the Aug. 16 and Sept. 12, 1956 issues are interesting and we repeat them here.

"There is a great deal of difference between an eager man who wants to read a book and a tired one who wants a book to read. We try to serve both at the Wayne public library. That is why we try to make our book stock as diversified as possible. There are still folks who think the library is a place to get a story book. True, we have many story books but they are only a fraction of the entire number of books we have on every subject imaginable."

"While the services of the library may have become indispensable to the community it seems that the librarians are not. This week our chief librarian, Mrs. Catherine Shell, resigned to take a teaching position in Wisner. She quit the library with great reluctance because she liked the work very much but since school teaching pays three or even four times as much s a librarian's salary, with shorter hours, fewer vacations and even less education required, it is not hard to under stand why people don't stay in library work. It was once suggested to your librarian that something had gone out of our American way of life since people no longer were willing to work for the love of the work like doctors and teachers used to do. The implication was, of course, that librarians should still feel that way about it. Unfortunately librarians must eat and wear clothes and, while they may be a peculiar breed, they also enjoy the comforts of life as well as other people. Possibly someday the taxpayers will understand what library work really is.

And this next really sounded familiar, although we have not been in quite this position!

"Eventually they bring them back!! We can prove that most books are returned to the library although we have to sometimes say "better late than never." To illustrate the point we had a book returned last week for which an overdue notice had been sent July 7, 1943. Yes, that's right ... 1943! The people who found it and returned it had been cleaning an attic and there it was among the things left by the previous occupant. Now think carefully ... do you have an overdue book lying around your house that you have forgotten ... perhaps forgotten so long that you are ashamed to bring it in? Still sorting out petition drives

An old friend, a cigar smoker, loved to repeat a famous saying by author Rudyard Kipling: "A woman is a woman but a cigar is a smoke,"

I took that to mean that cigars must be really good and that my friend must be pretty wise, particularly to be repeating such scholarly stuff. Thus, I fired up a stogic the other night in trying to decipher what happened to the citizens' right to gather signatures and pass laws via initiative petition.

It's been pretty messed up in recent years. Thanks to another court ruling, the system is in flux again and smoking a cigar didn't help me make any sense of it.

The Nebraska Legislature tried to fix the mess left by a Nebraska Supreme Court ruling in 1994 but didn't do a very good job,

That ruling, as you recall, said that a forgotten clause of a new law had served to significantly raise the

number of signatures required to put initiatives before state voters.

The ruling knocked some issues off the ballot in 1994.

The Legislature could have just lowered the signature requirement down to the original amount, but scnators got tangled up in a debate over paid circulators.

Those are the folks that pretty much attacked us as we walked to the local courthouse or shopping mall this summer.

They didn't know much about what was on those petitions, but at \$1 to \$2 each, they sure wanted

Many state senators think paid circulators are just plain bad. Like the carpetbaggers of the Civil War era, they just move into town overnight, gather up a bunch of signatures, and then take off. That's not the ideal picture of a petition drive, where an inspired group of citizens work to right a horrible wrong by putting an issue on the

So legislators adopted a require-

from coming to Nebraska. It required them to register to vote in Nebraska and wait 30 days before

circulating petitions.

That's an awful long time to be vaiting around to go to work. In 30 days, a professional petition circulator can make a few thousand dollars (heck, one Lincoln woman was paid more than \$100,000 for lining up circulators).

A nice idea, but a federal judge ruled last week that the 30-day rule

as also unconstitutional. People have the right to free speech. However, if you're trying to get something on the ballot and your circulators have to cool their heels for 30 days, that limits your ability to speak freely, or in this

case, get your ideas before voters.

So it's back to the drawing board for state senators. They have already formed a "special" committee for

Meanwhile, tossing out the 30day rule means that thousands of signatures will now be valid. I'm

betting that four initiatives will qualify for the November ballot. One, the property tax-elimination measure pushed by Atkinson rancher, Stan Dobrovolny, will fail

Two things are certain

Paid circulators, like paid political campaign workers and ads, are here to stay. Money talks, it's as simple as that, in petition drives and in political campaigns.

Setting the signature requirement nreasonably high encourages the hiring of paid circulators. Paying unemployed folks \$1 and \$2 a signature would not be as essential with a more reasonable limit.

Let's hope this citizen right is again put on solid ground.

BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY

In an effort to maintain a safe environment for your children during the upcoming school year, here are a few safety tips to consider.

SAFETY TO AND FROM SCHOOL

■ Know the routes your children take and have them travel with other children. Be aware of how much time it takes to go to and from school. Do not allow them to take shortcuts that may be langerous.

■ Tell your children to stay away from strangers, and strange vehicles.

■ Always walk on sidewalks. If there are no sidewalks, walk in single

file on the side of the road. Cross streets at intersections only.

■ Never accept rides from anyone other than persons you have designated beforehand. Inform school officials and day care providers who is authorized to.

pick up your children. Try to have the same person each day.

Advise your children's principal to notify you immediately if one of your children is absent.

At the earliest age possible, have your children rimmerize their fullnames; phone number and address. Teach them how to use the phone to call home, call 911, and how to make a collect call home.

REPORT SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Instruct your children to immediately inform school authorities of any criminal or suspicious activity they may witness: Informing your local police department or school about suspicious incidents may prove helpful in dealing with these situations, and may help resolve a potential problem. If you or your children see any suspicious activity, DIAI® 911 immediately.

KNOW YOUR CHILDREN'S FRIENDS

Know the names of your children's friends, where they live and know the names of your children's friends, where they live and how to reach them. Remember, your children make new friends each school year. Being familar with your children's friends will help you know where to look for them in the event they fail to come home from school on time. Children should also be taught to keep parents informed about their whereabouts.

SAFETY AT HOME

It is important to have a plan in place for your children to follow if they get home from school and no adult is there. You should have a well-defined list of what your children can and cannot do if they are



CRP bus tours N.E.braska

More than 100 N.E.braska landowners and producers met at Northeast Community College in Norfolk on Aug. 13 for the first Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) bus tour.

The tour focused on a variety of lternative uses for CRP land. Tour buses stopped at eight N.E.braska sites. At each stop, the land-owner(s) explained his/her experiences finding and implementing alternative uses for CRP

Doug Hall, a producer outside of Tilden, centered his efforts on returning switchgrass to soybean.

At another site north of Tilden land-owner Rick Sirek used former CRP acres for wildlife tree cover and food plots. The tour continued to the farm of Craig Braunsroth, north of Bloomfield. Braunsroth explained his experiences returning his acres of mostly switchgrass to production-through haying and azing cattle and buffalo.

The fourth stop was Kevin Kube's land, southwest of Crofton. Kube interseeded his CRP switchgrass with legumes. Northeast of Colderidge, at Craig Eberson's the tour bus mad its last stop before supper. Eberson explained his experiences returning CRP land to corn production.

Larry and Rose Mason's farm was the site for supper and the Mason showed participants former CRP acres currently being used for buffalo grazing. Participants also toured the Tarbox Living Prairie, another of the Mason's projects following expiration of their CRP

The tour continued to Steve Anderson's land outside of Concord Anderson showed participants around his place, while explaining how he returned his CRP acres to drilled and row soybeans.

Randy Dunklau's farm northwest of Wayne was the final tour stop. Dunklau explained how he replaced cool season grasses with soybeans. Tour participants also had the opportunity to view some of the CRP research plots at the Northeast Research and Extension Center (NEREC) in Concord.

Bob Emmick, director of Clay County Conservation Center in South Dakota, was one of the tour participants. With many of the contracts expiring, Emmick explained, people need to know what their options are. In addition to his duties at the Conservation Center, Emmick owns more than 1,000 acres of land currently enrolled in

"Demonstration sites give people concerned about CRP a chance to view different management techniques." said Melinda McVev McCluskey, NEREC CRP research coordinator and tour co-coordinator. She explained that the purpose of the tour was to allow people to see the alternative uses for former CRP

"People learn more by visually seeing this change than through discussion only," said McVey McCluskey

The CRP bus tour was co-sponsored by the Lewis and Clark and Lower Elkhorn Natural Resource Districts, the Natural Resource Conservation Service and the University of Nebraska Cooperative



They [the players] were disappointed in their season last the season," said Wagner. "This

year and I expect much better than 6-4," said Wagner. "It's great when players and coaches here are talking about being disappointed about being 6-4, because those used to be high standards here and that isn't the vay it is anymore.

Wagner hopes that this year's team has the right mix to set a higher standard— a trip to the NCAA Division II play-offs.

might be the best chemistry that we've had as a group since I've been here. In 1993 (when the Wildcats were 9-1), those guys were pretty close, but even then it took them a couple games to realize that bond was there. This football team has high expectations, but we're not going to talk about those until we get to that point. All we have to worry about right now is our first game against Emporia State."

Wayne State returns 24 letterwinners, including 13 starters from last year's squad.

"We have a number of returning starters on offense as well as number of players who played and gained valuable experience. Defensively, we only have four starters back, but we have a lot of kids that played and have experience. I really feel at this point that we're a better defensive football team than we were a year ago.
OFFENSE

The Wildcat offense will be under the direction of new offense coordinator Kevin Haslam. WSC ranked second nationally in total offense last season, averaging 470.1 yards per game. Expect more of the same in 1996 under Haslam's

"We're not going to change anything," said Wagner. "We're doing a lot of things the way we did before, it's just under the direction of Coach Haslam now.

Quarterbacks - Senior Jarrod DeGeorgia returns after starting six games a year ago. He passed for 1,773 yards with 12 touchdowns and only six interceptions. He completed 63 percent of his passes and his 141,6 passing efficiency rating ranked 14th in the nation.

"Jarrod finished the season on a very positive note and proved that he's our quarterback," said Wagner. DeGeorgia's back-up will be

Receivers - Kevin Swayne is the only returning starter at receiver. The senior led the 'Cats with 65 receptions and 818 yards

"Kevin Swayne is healthy," said Wagner. "He's put on 15 pounds, hasn't lost any speed and is getting interest from NFL scouts. I think, if he's healthy, he can prove that he's a great receiver like he did early in the season last year. 

Wayne State opens the season on the road against Emporia State in Kansas on August 31. Game time is 6:00 p.m.





World Health Organization warns of the possible spread of a growing number of untreatable infectious diseases in many parts of the world. Recent examples include AIDS and a deadly infection resulting from

the Ebola virus.

A study by the Centers of Disease Control evaluated all deaths in the U.S. between 1980 and 1992. It was found that infections, as a cause of death, increased 58 percent (from 41 to 65 per 100,000 population). Around the world, an estimated 17 million people die each year from infections. The biggest killers are infections of the lungs (including pneumonia) Deaths occur in spite of the availability of new and more powerful antibiotics each year. Many experts place part of the blame on the uncontrolled and inappropriate use of these medicines. If you receive prescriptions for any infection-fighting medicine, be sure to take it as instructed, and until

Teen wants to know about growing up

Q: I'm a teenager, so what should I know about growing

A: Many young people worry about their bodies unnecessarily dur ing this time. These kinds of questions plague them:

•Are all these changes supposed to

be happening?

•Is there something wrong with me?

.Do I have a disease or an abnor-

•Am I going to be different from other people?

•Does this pain in my breast mean I have cancer? •Will the boys laugh at me? Will the girls reject, me? (It's very common for people to feel they're not going to be attractive to the opposite

•Do some people fail to mature sexually? (Any system of the body can malfunction, but this one rarely fails.)

•Will my modesty be sacrificed? (It's common during the early adolescent years for you to become extremely modest about your body. may, worry about being in a doctor's office and having to take off your

clothes in front of other people.)

Let me say it one more time: These kinds of fears are almost universal during the early years of adolescence. Your sexual development is a normal event that is being controlled inside your body. It will work out all

right, so you can just relax and let it happen. However, you will have to control your sexual desires in the years ahead, and that will require determination and willpower. But if you can learn to channel your sexual impulses the way God intended, this part of your nature can be one of the most fascinating and wonderful aspects of your life, perhaps contributing to a successful and happy marriage in the years ahead.

Q: Do you think happily married husbands and wives should be able to live together without fighting with one another?

A: No. The healthiest marriages are those where the couple has learned how to fight--how to ventilate anger without tearing one another apart. There is a difference between healthy and unhealthy combat, depending on the way the disagreement is handled.

In an unstable marriage, the hostility is usually hurled directly at the personhood of the partner: "You never do anything right; why did I ever marry you?" "You are incredibly dumb and you're getting more like your mother every day." These personal comments strike at the heart of one's self worth and produce an internal upheaval. Obviously, such vicious combat is extremely damaging to a marital relationship. Healthy conflict, on the other hand, remains focused on the issue around which the disagreement began: "You are spending money faster

than I can earn it!" "It upsets me when you don't tell me you'll be late for dinner." "I was embarrassed when you made me look foolish at the party last night." These areas of struggle, though admittedly emotional and tense, are much less damaging to the egos of the opposing forces. A healthy couple can work through them by compromise and negotiations with few imbedded barbs to pluck out the following morning

Q: Do you believe real love can easily be distinguished from infatuation?


A: No, I do not. I must stress this fact with the greatest emphasis: The exhibaration of infatuation feels like love at its best, but it is never a permanent condition. If you expect to live on the top of that mountain. year after year, you can forget it! Emotions swing from figh to low to high in cyclical rhythm, and since romantic excitement is an emotion, it too will certainly oscillate.

How, then, can real love be distinguished from temporary infatuation? If the feeling is unreliable, how can one assess the commitment of his will? There is only one answer to those questions: It takes time. The best advice I can give a couple contemplating marriage (or any other important decision) is this: Make no important, life shaping decisions quickly or impulsively, and when in doubt, stall for time. That's not a bad suggestion for all of us to apply



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
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


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Olympic visitor thinks price gouging not needed






