## Elections, athletics, and academics are highlights of 1996

The Summer Olympics in Atlanta, Ga. and the presidential election will go down as highlights in 1996 nationally. In Wayne, elections also shaped up to be a highlight as well as a number of honors bestowed on individuals and teams.

A summary of events occurring in the Wayne has been compiled and is listed below.

### January

The Nebraska Cornhusker football team won back-to-back championships by defeating the Florida Gators in the Fiesta Bowl.

The possibility of voting on a school bond issue is again being discussed by the Wayne Board of Education.

A January blizzard caused temperatures to drop from 56 degrees to five below zero within a 24 hour period.

Terry Nicholson was appointed City Administrator in Wakefield.

Wayne State College set a new record for three-pointers in a men's basketball game against Northern State.

### February

Wayne was chosen as the first choice as a site for a new juvenile detention center by the Northeast Nebraska Juvenile Services.

The Wayne City Council amended the zoning ordinance dealing with the definition of "family."

The Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce is planning a Balloon Drop of 2,000 balloons promoting Wayne businesses.

Several Educational Service Units sponsored a Teck Trek at Wayne High School for teachers and administrators.

The Laurel girls' basketball team advanced to the state tournament.

A number of activities were planned for Heart Month.

Winside wrestler Josh Jaeger was featured after winning the 140 lb. championship at the state wrestling tournament.

Willis Wiseman was chosen Citizen of the Year.

The Wayne Rotary Club began

selling the "Game of Wayne."

### March

Laurel-Concord won 20 games this season before losing to Emerson-Hubbard in the semi-finals of the state tournament.

The Wayne Board of Education voted to join an interlocal agreement forming WayNet.

Lt. Governor Kim Robak spoke at the Wayne State College Women's Conference.

Wayne State College senior Lamart Cooper won the 55-meter dash to win the first NCAA championship in any sport since 1969.

Wayne High School was named the Nebraska winner in the 1996 Daimler-Benz Award of Excellence.

Wayne High School won the KNEN Quiz Bowl.

A spring blizzard left the area with five inches of snow and a number of electrical outages.

### April

Wayne resident Terry Meyer was among those runners running in the Boston Marathon.

Randy Pedersen was appointed to fill a city council vacancy after the resignation of Ralph Barclay.

The vote for the school bond issue was set for May 14.

"Snow White" was the production chosen for the 38th annual Wayne State College Children's Theatre. The production was viewed by more than 5,000 students.

Jolene Jager was chosen to be the Wayne Girls' State representative.

Rod Tompkins, owner of Heritage Homes and Heritage Industries, was named 1996 Small Business Person of the Year.

The community of Wayne set a new record of giving to the American Heart Association, raising more than \$14,000 through a number of activities.

Jeff Lutt signed a contract to play professional football with the British Columbia Lions of the Canadian Football League.

A number of articles were printed regarding the proposed school bond issue.

Gene and Linda Barg were selected as Ak-Sar-Ben Good Neighbors in Winside.

### May

The largest class ever, 418 students, graduated from Wayne State College.

Daniel and Jeanne Gardner were honored by the Nebraska State

## Council votes to rescind contract

In a special meeting on Monday, the Wayne City Council voted to rescind a previous resolution which would have allowed for a contract to be signed with Waste Managements Systems for residential garbage pick up.

After considerable discussion and dialogue with the present haulers, the council voted to continue garbage pick up as it is at the present time.

Both Lueders and Mrsny Sanitation plan to work with the city to make recycling trailers available at the current recycling center more frequently. Currently, the recycling center is open Saturday mornings from 8 a.m. to noon.

An arrangement has been made with a Pierce recycling firm to collect materials from the current site

on a bi-weekly basis. This is being done at no charge to the city.

The local haulers also indicated that should the increased availability of recycling not be successful in reducing the amount of solid waste going to the landfill within a two-year period, they will consider curbside pick up of recyclable materials.



# Our Savior proceeds with expansion

Another milestone has been reached in the brief history of Wayne's largest church organization, the nearly 1,200 member Our Savior Lutheran Church.

The two year-old congregation voted to proceed with the finalization of plans for a \$2.1 million expansion of its facilities. The expansion will occur at the church's present location at Fifth and Pearl Streets.

The ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America) congregation was formed on Jan. 1, 1995 as a result of the uniting of Redeemer Lutheran Church and St. Paul's Lutheran Church, which had been located one block apart.

The merger followed a two year study by the two congregations and was hastened by a fire that gutted the Redeemer facility in 1994. Worship services are being held the building that was formerly St. Paul's Church.

The major element of the expansion will be a 15,567 square foot addition to the south of the present facility. The addition will include a new sanctuary which will seat approximately 400 worshippers and a choir.

It will be designed to accommodate performances in addition to regular worship and incorporates audiovisual projection capabilities

to enhance both worship and non-worship activities.

The two-story, 3,000 square foot narthex that will feature dual primary entrances from both the east and west will separate the new sanctuary from the existing structure. The balance of the addition will house new administrative multi-purpose areas.

Within the past year the congregation has acquired adjacent property at Fifth and Main Streets that will become the site of a paved

parking lot for an additional 54 vehicles including designated handicapped parking.

The congregation has also purchased the existing library building and will utilize that space for education purposes beginning in the summer of 1997.

"The planning for the new facility has been a very deliberate and inclusive process that invited input from every member, committee and group within our congregation," said Pastor Martin Russell, senior

pastor at the church.

"Following the needs assessment phase of the planning process, the congregation prepared themselves for the subsequent challenges by undergoing a dynamic spiritual revitalization campaign entitled "Growing Together in God's Hands," he added.

As part of the revitalization campaign, the members of Our Savior pledged funds to facilitate the planned expansion.

"The planning process and the

"Growing Together in God's Hands" campaign have served to bond the congregation into a true church family," said Dave Olson, president of the congregation.

"Our Savior Lutheran Church is committed to providing a visible Christian witness to the community," Olson added.

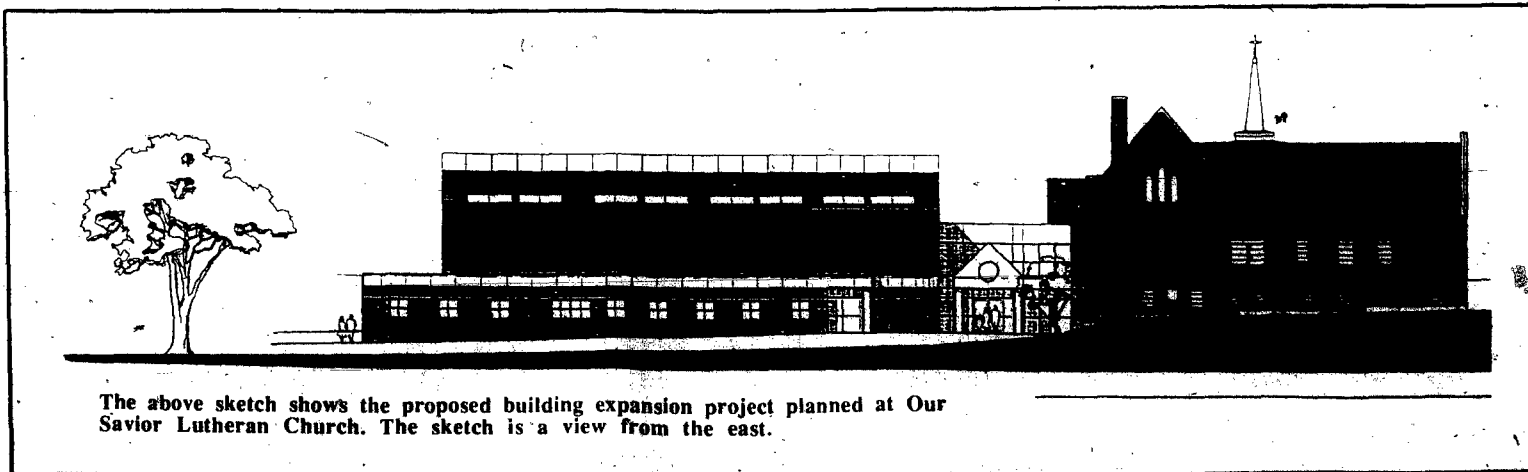
It is anticipated that bids will be taken for the construction of the addition later this winter and groundbreaking will occur on Palm Sunday, March 23, 1997.

The construction is expected to

take approximately 12 months.

"The construction of our new addition is but the first step in the development of a facility that will ultimately serve, not only our membership, but the entire Wayne community, including the students at Wayne State College," Pastor Russell said.

"Once the new addition is in place, we will begin to revamp the spaces within the existing facility to create the Christian learning and ministry center we envision," he said.



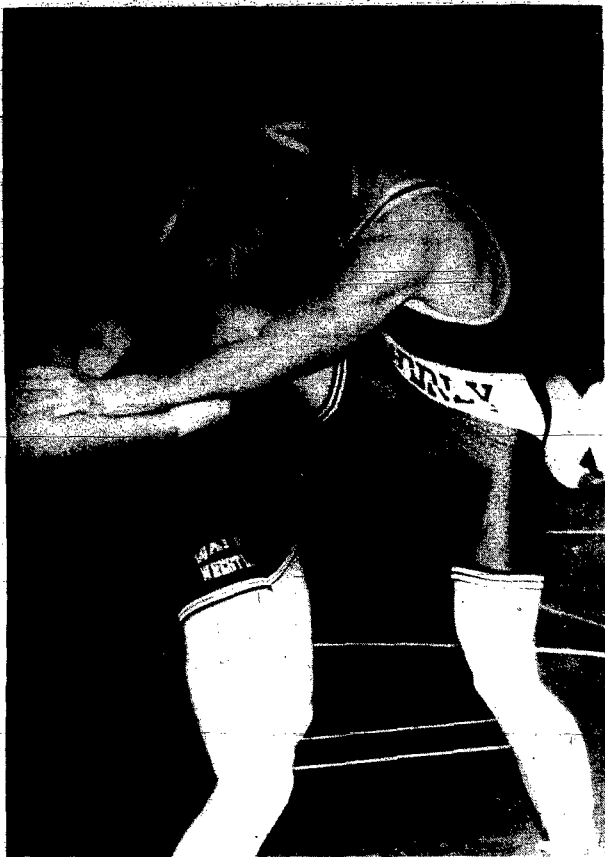
The above sketch shows the proposed building expansion project planned at Our Savior Lutheran Church. The sketch is a view from the east.

## Blue Devil grapplers earn runner-up at own invite

The Wayne wrestling team placed runner-up at their own invitational, Saturday with 155.5 points. Winside won the team title for the second straight year with 196 points.

Wisner-Pilger finished third with 150.5 followed by North Bend with 129.5 and Waverly with 113. Randolph headed the second five with 78 followed by Norfolk Catholic, 53; Unattached, 37; Father Flanagan, 27; Laurel-Concord, 23.

Wayne finished with two champions on the day and one runner-up while three placed third and four others medaled with four place finishes.

Jeremiah Rethwisch was named co-tournament most valuable wrestler for his three-pin performance en route to winning the 171-pound championship while Josh Murtaugh capped a perfect day with two pins and a 4-1 decision at 130 pounds.

Jay Endicott placed second at 119 while Dan Nelson (112), Tim Zach (160) and Casey Junck (189) each placed third. Fourth places were earned by Jody Campbell (140), Jeremy Meyer, (145), Darin Jensen (152) and Eric Hefti (215).

"I thought our effort was very good," Wayne coach John Murtaugh said. "We had a tough semifinal round but the kids did a nice job of bouncing back and winning

the runner-up trophy."

Murtaugh said there were a number of wrestlers who had fine performances on the day but he singled out Tim Zach. "He had his best tournament of the year," Murtaugh added.

The Wayne Blue Devil boys basketball team improved to 2-0 on the weather-shortened season to date with a 71-58 win over a scrappy Wisner-Pilger team last Friday night in Wisner.

Rocky Ruhl's team led 13-8 after one quarter of play but was out-scored 22-18 in the second frame to make it a one-point contest at the break in Wayne's favor, 31-30.

The Blue Devils came out in the second half, however, and took control with a 21-14 scoring run. They increased the lead in the fourth quarter with a 19-14 scoring advantage to post the 13-point vic-

tory.

"Wisner played hard the entire game," Ruhl said. "The difference in the first half and second half was rebounding. Wisner out-rebounded us in the first half and we pretty much dominated the boards in the second half."

In fact, Ruhl felt the strong rebounding efforts in the second half was the difference in the contest. "Our depth really helped us down the stretch as well," Ruhl added.

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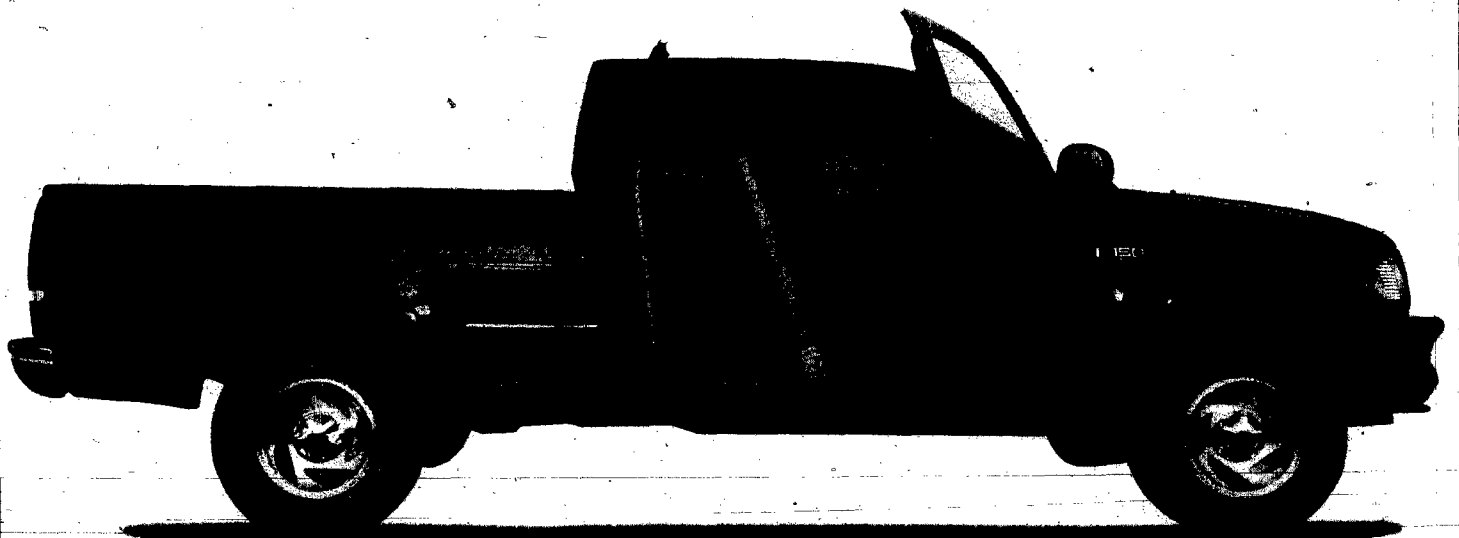

## 'Blame' should be a two-way street

**Q:** I have a friend who was married for nine years before her husband left her for another woman. I think she was a loving and devoted wife, yet she seemed to feel that the break-up of her marriage was her fault. As a result, her self-esteem disintegrated and she has never recovered.

**A:** It has always been surprising for me to observe how often the wounded marriage partner—the person who was clearly the victim of the other's irresponsibility—is the one who suffers the greatest pangs of guilt and feelings of inferiority.

How strange that the one who tried to hold things together in the face of obvious rejection often finds herself wondering, "How did I fail him?"

I just wasn't woman enough to hold my man... I am 'nothing' or he wouldn't have left... If I only had been more exciting as a sexual partner... I drove him to it... I wasn't pretty enough... I didn't deserve him in the first place.

The blame for marital disintegration is seldom the fault of the husband or the wife alone. "It takes two to tango," as they say, and there is always some measure of shared blame for a divorce. However, when one marriage partner makes up his mind to behave irresponsibly, to become involved extramaritally, or to run away from his family commitments and obligations, he usually seeks to justify his behavior by magnifying the failures of his spouse.

By increasing the guilt of his partner in this way, he reduces his own culpability. For a husband or wife with low self-esteem, these changes and recriminations are accepted as fact when hurled his way. "Yes, it was my fault. I drove you to it." Thus, the victim assumes the full responsibility

for his partner's irresponsibility, and self-worth shatters.

I would not recommend that your friend sit around hating the memory of her husband. Bitterness and resentment are emotional cancers that rot us from within. However, if I were counseling her, I would encourage her to examine the facts carefully. Answers to these questions should be sought:

Despite my human frailties, did I value my marriage and try to preserve it?

Did my husband decide to destroy it, and then seek justification for his actions?

Was I given a fair chance to resolve the areas of greatest irritation?

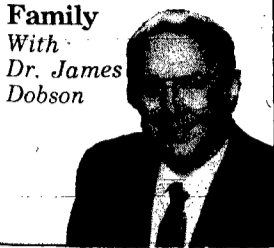
Could I have held him even if I had made all the changes he wanted?

Is it reasonable that I should hate myself for this thing that has happened?

Your friend should know that social rejection breeds feelings of inferiority and self-pity in enormous proportions. And rejection by the one you love, particularly, is the most powerful destroyer of self-esteem in the entire realm of human experience. She might be helped to see herself as the victim of this process, rather than a worthless failure at the game of love.

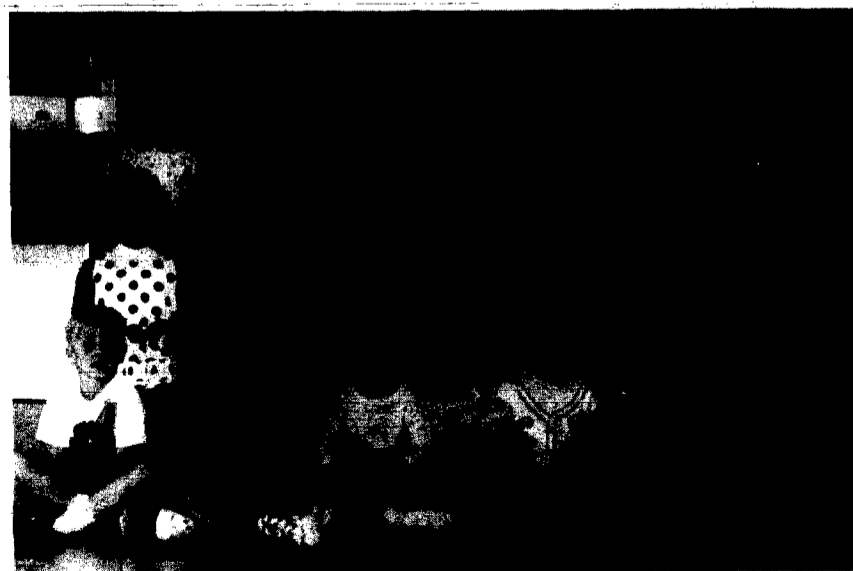


