Laurel man is injured in train accident at Dixon

Joel Lipp, 23, of Laurel was injured Sunday when the pickup he was driving was broadsided by a train at a crossing in Dixon. Lipp was taken to Marian Health Center in Sioux City, Iowa with what appeared to be a concussion and bruises. The driver of the train, W.E. Mathiesen of Osmond, was not injured in the accident which occurred at approximately 8:15 p.m. There was no damage to the locomotive. There are no warning lights at the highway crossing, which is located on the west side of Dixon.

1996 — The year in review

Editor's note: This is the second part of the review of events occurring in Wayne County during 1996.
July
Winside wrestling coach Paul Sok was inducted into the Nebraska Scholastic Wrestling Coaches Association Hall of Fame. Members of the 1956 Class B Championship basketball team met for a 40-year reunion. "Poli-Chicks in '96" was the theme of the 16th annual Chicken Show with estimates of up to 16,000 people attending the two-day event. The Wayne City Council gave its approval for removal of a traffic signal at Third and Pearl Streets and the installation of stop signs at that location. Wayne County Public District

and Northeast Nebraska Rural Public Power are studying the feasibility of a merger. Discussion continued on alternatives to holding classes in the Wayne Middle School. The Wayne 14 and Under softball team finished fifth at the State Tournament held in Wayne. Approximately 3,000 people attended the annual Carroll Tractor Pull. Wakefield voters will vote on a \$2.795 million bond issue for remodeling and construction at the Wakefield Community Schools. Wayne State College had seven people involved in the 1996 Summer Olympics. **August** Erlene Stubbs was hired as the new director of Rainbow World. The Wayne and Dixon County Fairs were both held the first week of August. The Wayne Community Theatre presented "Charlie's Aunt." The Wayne Board of Education voted to purchase 10 modular units to house middle school students

until a decision can be made as to what to do with the present building. US West Communications announced a rate increase for local residential customers. The Wayne City Council heard plans for the widening of Highway 35, slated to begin in the spring of 1997. The Wayne Kiwanis Club began a Car Seat Program which offered free car seats to residents who needed them. Several Wayne teen-agers from the First Presbyterian Church spent part of the summer doing service projects including building a house in Juarez, Mexico. New speed limits were set to go into effect Sept. 1. **September** Grace Lutheran Church planned an open house to celebrate the completion of a 6,400 square-foot, two-story addition to its facility. Kevin Peterson returned to the Wayne Herald as managing editor. A Style Show was planned by the Wayne Hospital Auxiliary to

raise funds for the purchase of Lifelines for Providence Medical Center. A grand opening was held for The Oaks, a retirement community in northwest Wayne. The Wayne Lions Club celebrated 35 years in Wayne. A 16-unit, low income apartment complex was opened at 208 West 13th Street. Two new faculty members, James Gagner and John McClarmen, greeted Wayne Elementary students. The Wayne City Council listened to complaints of disturbances at Riley's. **October** Kenneth Olds was honored at his retirement from the law firm of Olds, Pieper and Connolly. A petition was filed against Wayne dentist Richard DeNaeyer because of failure to meet education requirements. St. Mary's Church held an open house for its new rectory/office complex. VFW Auxiliary #5291 celebrated 50 years of existence.

A feature story told of education as the key to fire prevention. The Northeast Nebraska Juvenile Services made plans to build its new facility in Madison instead of Wayne as had originally been planned. The Wayne County Board of Commissioners listened to proposals for renovating and re-locating offices in the Wayne County Courthouse. Miron Jenness was chosen as the Volunteer of the Year for American Red Cross Nakota Council. The Wayne Middle School students and faculty moved into the 10 module units located just south of Wayne High School. The Wayne High girls cross country team repeated as State Champions. The boys team finished fourth at state. Japanese exchange student Emi Otsuka is spending the year in Wayne as part of the Rotary International Exchange program. Old Settlers plan committee meeting

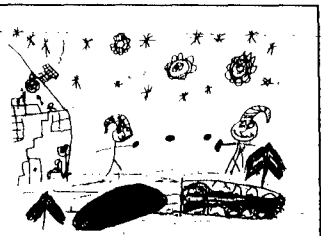

Red Cross receives second charter

The Wayne County Red Cross has recently been re-chartered according to a national mandate.

The original charter date for the Wayne County chapter was June of 1917. Mary Nichols and Sandy Hall worked to get the new charter for the chapter.

In addition to the new charter, a number of changes have been made in the chapter.

Loren Park will serve the role of Disaster Chairman and Mary Nichols will be the Health and Safety Chairman.

Lisa Hochstein has been hired at the Chapter Manager. Mrs. Hochstein began her duties Dec. 1 and will be available at the Red Cross office, located in the former Smart Set building at Ninth and Main Streets, from 8:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Miron Jenness will remain on the zone Disaster Committee, serving a large area of northeast Nebraska.

The chapter has become computerized and will be on the Internet soon to receive information from the national headquarters.

The Red Cross goal is to respond to disaster calls, especially single family fires. During 1996 the Wayne Chapter responded to three fires, providing between \$500-\$1,000 aid to each including shelter, food and clothes. The disaster history in Wayne is relatively low, so people some-

times do not see the need to get involved in the Red Cross programs," said Mrs. Nichols.

"However, we would like to develop a Disaster team in the county that would be available to rotate into emergencies," she said.

In the near future the Red Cross will be offering classes in babysitting, water safety, CPR and First Aid.

Approximately 50 people participated in classes offer by the Wayne County Red Cross last fall.

Nationally, the American Red Cross responded to more than 63,000 disasters—from single-family fires to tornados, hurricanes and floods.

Ninety-two cents of each dollar received by the Red Cross goes to

provide direct programs and services to the public. The ratio of volunteers to paid staff is 43 to 1.

"We would like to encourage anyone who is interested in any of the areas of education or disaster assistance that we have to offer to contact us," Mrs. Nichols said.

Survivors include one step-son, James and Joyce Goldston of Hardy, Ark.; five step-grandchildren; nine step great grandchildren; several nieces and nephews.

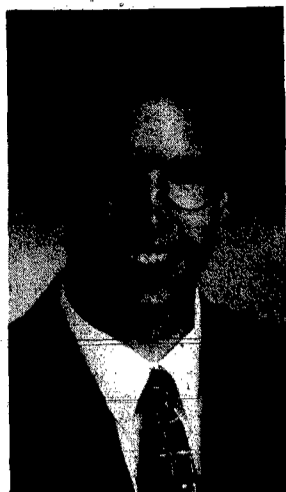

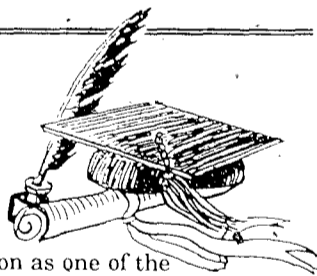
Administrators at Kirkwood House in Wayne have received word that the facility is in compliance with Nebraska Department of Health Standards.

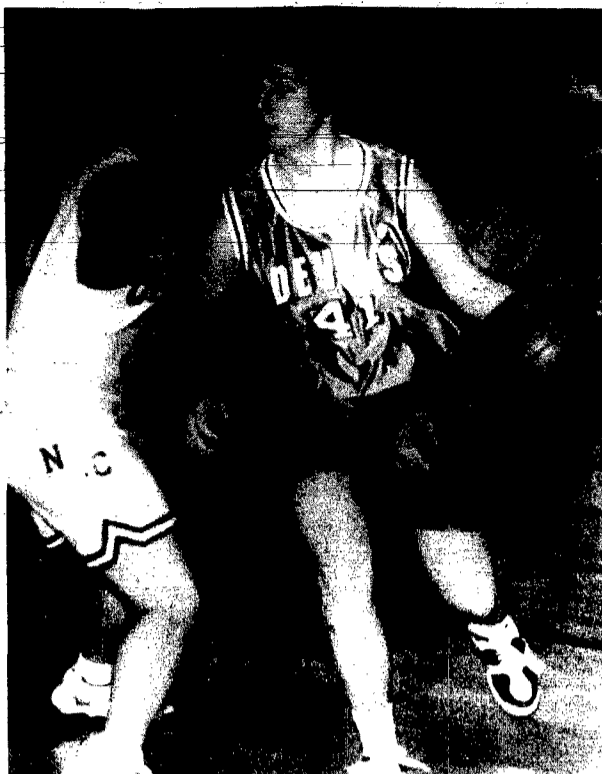

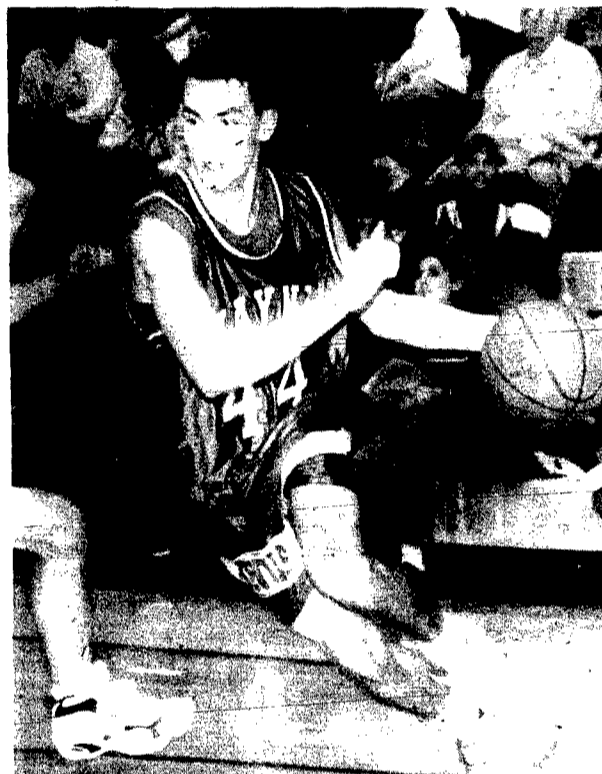

"The team did a nice job of improving each game," coach Dan Fehringer said. "Especially with 22 players generally seeing playing time each game."

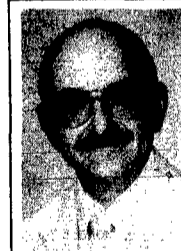



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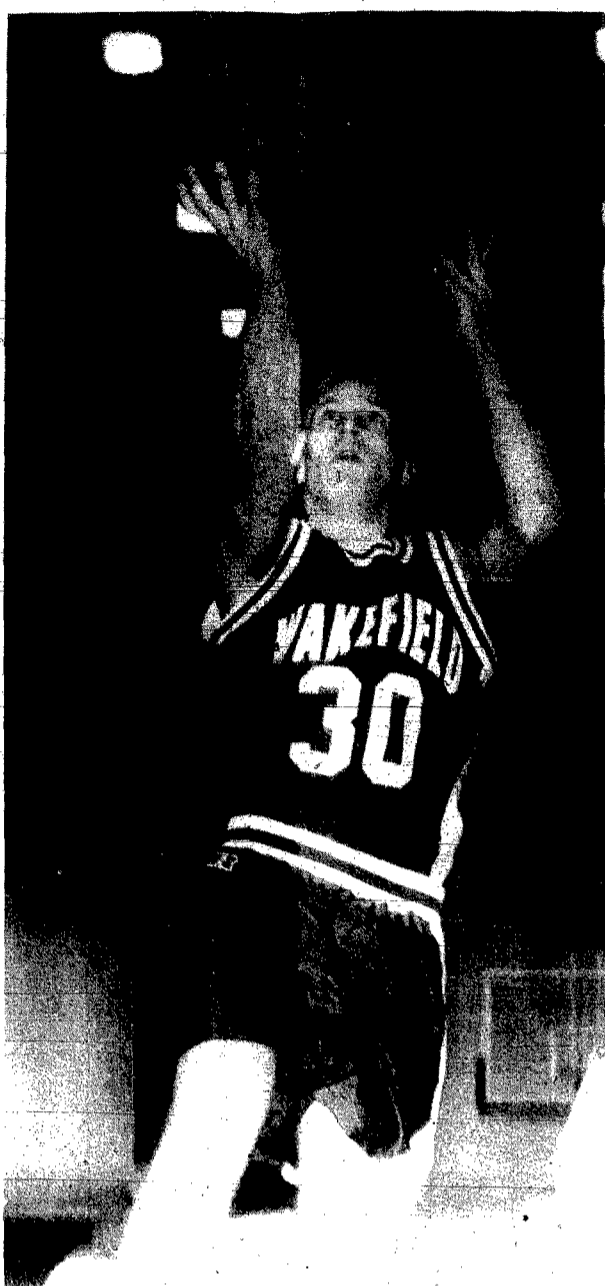
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Justin Mackling takes the ball to the hoop strong during Wakefield's tilt with Lyons Decatur-Northeast on Monday morning.

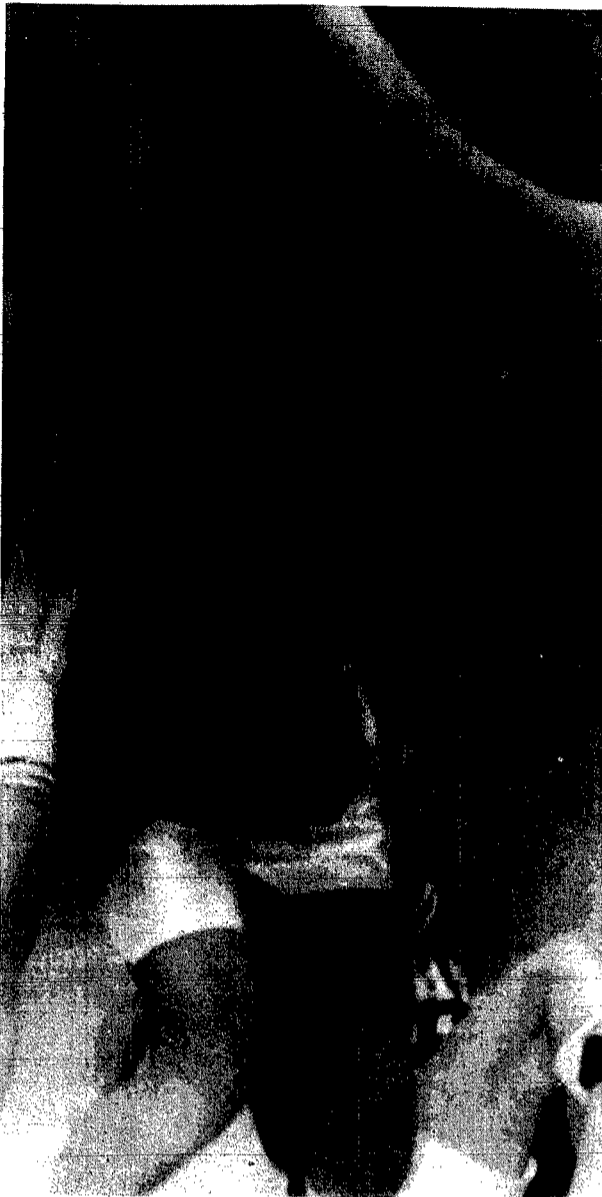

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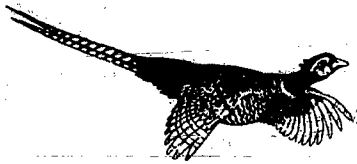

Helpful advice is being offered

Q: I don't think my husband understands the problems I experience during the menstrual cycle. Will you offer some advice to him about these physiological factors?

A: Having never had a period, it is difficult for a man to comprehend the bloated, sluggish feeling that motivates his wife's snappy remarks and irritability during the premenstrual period.

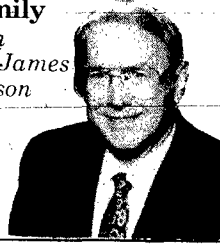
I am reminded of an incident related to me by my late friend Dr. David Hernandez, who was an obstetrician and gynecologist in private practice. The true story involves Latin men whose wives were given birth control pills by a pharmaceutical company. The Federal Drug Administration in America would not permit hormonal research to be conducted, so the company selected a small fishing village in South America, which agreed to cooperate.

All the women in the town were given the pill on the same date, and after three weeks, the prescription was terminated to permit menstruation. That meant, of course, that every adult female in the community was experiencing premenstrual tension at the same time. The men couldn't take it. They all headed for their boats each month and remained at sea until the crisis passed.

Going fishing is not the answer to monthly physiological stresses, of course. It is extremely important for a man to learn to anticipate his wife's menstrual period, recognizing the emotional changes that will accompany it. Of particular importance is the need for affection and tenderness during this time, even though she may be rather unlovable for three or four days.

He should also avoid discussions of financial problems or other threa-

tening topics until the internal storm has passed, and keep the home atmosphere as tranquil as possible.

Let me conclude by addressing a final comment directly to husbands. Because stress is such an influential factor in this problem of premenstrual tension, anything you can do to reduce environmental pressure is sure to help her feel better. If you are aware of the times when she is going to be feeling the strain, you should lighten the family commitments.

Eating out can reduce the obligation to plan and cook meals. Do what you can to keep the kids out of her hair, especially the noisy, younger ones. Take them to the park for an afternoon. Read to them or engage them in a quiet game, leaving their mother free to relax as much as possible.

Because your wife's sexual desire is at a low ebb that week, make fewer physical demands on her—but continue to be affectionate, reassuring and loving toward her. Remember that women often feel "ugly" when they are experiencing premenstrual tension, so let her know that you find her as attractive as ever.

In some ways, the husband's role during his wife's menstrual period should be that of an understanding, loving, gentle parent. Just as parents do more giving than receiving, this is a man's time to support his wife in every way possible.

In accordance with Section 15-02 of Wayne Zoning Regulations, public notice is hereby given that the Wayne Planning Commission has developed a recommendation to amend Wayne Zoning Regulations so as to incorporate provisions of Neb. Revised Statute Section 19-902 regarding manufactured homes.

A public hearing to consider comment on the recommendation is scheduled for Tuesday, January 14, 1997, at or after 7:40 p.m., in conjunction with the regular meeting of the Wayne City Council.

This is a general revision of existing provisions of the Ordinance, which may affect all areas within the zoning jurisdiction of the City of Wayne.

Content of the recommendation is as follows:

Whereas, the Nebraska State Legislature has enacted, at Section 19-902 Neb. Rev. Statutes, law which specifies the maximum restrictions which can be adopted or enforced by cities and villages regarding manufactured homes.

The Planning Commission has recommended to the Wayne City Council that Wayne Zoning Regulations be amended as follows:

That Section 303 Definitions be amended to include a definition for manufactured homes, and that such definition shall be as found in Nebraska Revised Statute Section 19-902(3) to wit:

For purposes of this [Ordinance] "manufactured home" shall mean (a) a factory built structure which is to be used as a place for human habitation, which is not constructed with a permanent hitch or other device allowing it to be moved other than to a permanent site, which does not have permanently attached to its body or frame any wheels or axles, and which bears a label certifying that it was built in compliance with National Manufactured Home Construction and Safety Standards, 24 CFR, 3280 et. seq. promulgated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, and (b) a modular housing unit as defined in Section 71-1557 bearing the seal of the Department of Health and Human Services Regulations and Licensure.

That the title of section 1011 be amended to read "Mobile Home Regulations, Manufactured Home Regulations."

That Section 1011.02 be amended to read:

Mobile homes and manufactured homes which do not qualify under Section 1011.03 of this ordinance, but where otherwise specifically allowed to be placed on individual lots within a zoned area, excluding mobile homes and manufactured homes within a mobile home park, shall comply with the following requirements:

(1) The structure shall be not less than 14 feet in width as titled by the State of Nebraska, and 800 square feet of finished living area and shall have an insignia of Compliance with HUD standards and manufactured after June 15, 1976.

(2) Foundations and Set-up. Mobile homes and manufactured homes shall be attached to permanent and continuous foundation which maintain at least 18" clear crawl space. The foundations shall be of sufficient strength to support the loads imposed by the mobile home, based on accepted engineering design standards, as approved by the Zoning Administrator. Foundation tie-downs, or other supports shall be provided to withstand the specified horizontal, up-lift, and overturning wind forces on a mobile home of manufactured home, based on accepted engineering design standards, as approved by the Zoning Administrator. All wheels and towing assemblies shall be removed.

That Article 10 Supplementary District Regulations be amended to provide for Section 1011.03 Manufactured Homes. A manufactured home bearing an appropriate seal which indicates that it was constructed in accordance with the standards of the Department of Health and Human Services Regulation and Licensure or the United States

Department of Housing and Urban Development, and installed according to the same standards for foundation system, permanent utility connection, setback and Minimum square footage which would apply to a site-built, single family dwelling on the same lot, may be located on any lot in a residential zone or where residential use is otherwise allowed in other zones of the City, provided that said manufactured home meets the following standards:

(i) The home shall have no less than nine hundred square feet of floor area;

(ii) The home shall have no less than an eighteen-foot exterior width;

(iii) The roof shall be pitched with a minimum vertical rise of two and one-half inches for each twelve inches of horizontal run;

(iv) The exterior material shall be a color, material, and scale comparable with those existing in residential site-built, single-family construction;

(v) The home shall have nonreflective roof material which is or simulates asphalt or wood shingles, tile or rock, and

(vi) The home shall have wheels, axles, transporting lights, and removable towing apparatus removed.

That Sections 601.02, 602.02, 603.02, 604.02, 605.02, 702.04(9), 703.04(13), 801.03(2) be amended to include the following statement:

Manufactured homes for residential purposes provided said home complies with all provisions of Section 1011.03.

Any and all persons in the zoning jurisdiction of the City of Wayne are invited to attend the hearing and voice their views in person or by proxy on this matter. Any written correspondence may be directed to the City Administrator's office.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on January 14, 1997, in the City Council Chambers, 306 Pearl Street, the Wayne City Council will hold a public hearing concerning an application to the Department of Economic Development for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG). This grant is available to local governments for community development activities.

The Wayne City Council is requesting the amended use of \$149,000 granted to the City in CDBG #91-HD-009 for the acquisition and clearing of properties to be used by the Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation (WCHDC) for development of low-income, family rental housing. Matching funds will be provided by the development budget for this project, which will include WCHDC-CHDO set aside HOME funds, Low-Income Housing Tax Credits, tax increment financing, and first mortgage financing by a local lender. The project will be constructed on scattered sites totaling 45-50,000 square feet. It will provide for removal of housing stock within the City of Wayne that has been identified as dilapidated and substandard, to be replaced with ten to twelve new units committed to the benefits of families earning less than 60% of the median income for Wayne County. 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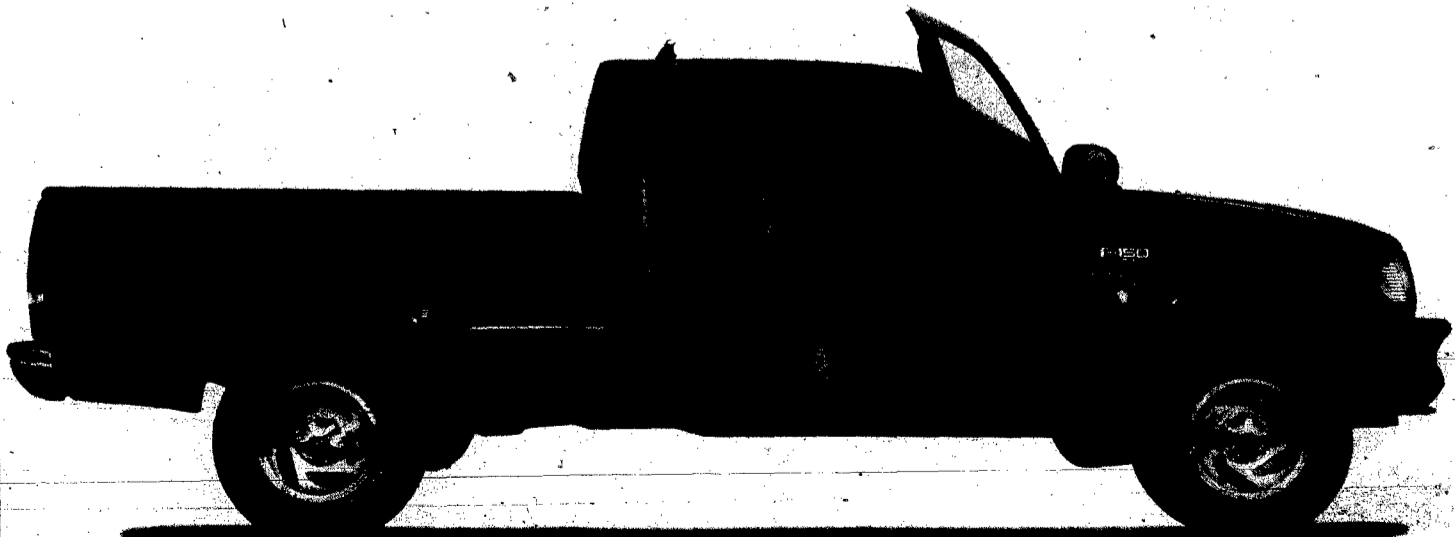
