College to graduate largest MBA class

Among the 373 candidates for degrees at Wayne State College's commencement, Saturday will be the largest class of MBA (Master of Business Administration) graduates since the program was established five years ago.

Fourteen new MBA degrees will be awarded by Wayne State College President Dr. Donald Math during the ceremony, May 10, in the plenary Willow Bowl. The event begins at 2 p.m., and the public is invited.

The College's Business Division began offering study toward the MBA degree in 1991 and to date has conferred 27 such degrees. Combined with the Winter Commencement, there have been 25 new MBA graduates at WSC this academic year.

"The MBA program was started to fulfill a regional service need," said Dr. Jeryl Nelson, who advises the MBA students. "Area businesses were looking for opportunities for graduate study relative to their profession," he added. Since most of the students in the program are full-time business professionals, many of them take up to five years to complete.

Besides the MBA graduates, Saturday's ceremony will honor students who have completed, or will complete, degree requirements through this summer's sessions at the College. In all, 316 bachelor's degrees will be conferred, and 57 graduate degree candidates will be honored.

The college will also take the opportunity to recognize four longtime faculty members who will be retiring.

The honored faculty members are:

Dr. Don Cattle, division head of the Applied Science Division, who joined the faculty in 1974 as an associate professor of industrial education. He earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Missouri in 1957, his master's from Colorado State University in 1968 and his Ed.D. from Oklahoma State in 1974.

Daryl Lawrence, director of ca-

reer services, who came to Wayne State in 1974 after serving four years as principal at Wayne High School and teaching for a number of years in California. He joined the College as director of special services and assistant professor of education. He was later named Director of Athletics and took over the career services department in 1986. He earned his bachelor's degree from Wayne State in 1956, his master's degree from California State College at Long Beach in 1964 and completed 31 hours toward his doctorate there as well.

Dr. Elroy Simpson, professor of human performance and leisure studies, joined the College as athletic director in 1968 and also served as associate professor. He was promoted to full professor in 1989. Simpson earned his bachelor's degree from Kansas State College in Pittsburg, Kansas in 1956, his master's degree also from KSC in 1961 and his Ed.D. in 1967 from the University of Arkansas.

Connie (Matthews) Webber, assistant professor of music, joined the College in 1966 as an instructor of music. In September 1971 she was promoted to assistant professor. She earned her bachelor's degree from Oberlin Conservatory of Music in Oberlin, Ohio in 1964. In 1966 she completed her master of arts degree.

The Wayne Police Department is investigating multiple incidents of vandalism to cars owned by Aron's Ford.


On two separate occasions within the last week and a half no unknown person has caused several thousand dollars worth of damage to cars parked on Aron's lot.

To date, over 10 cars have been damaged, including 1997 models.



Murphy's Law does seem a bit more malleable this year for some reason.


Ah! Graduation!

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Winside boys capture crown of Lewis & Clark conference

The Winside boys track team strided past the rest of the field of Lewis & Clark teams at the annual conference meet last Saturday in Winona.

Jim Winch's crew scored 41 points to notch an 18-point win over Emerson-Hubbard's 6.3 points with Newcastle placing third with 6.2. Hartington was fourth with 14 and Ossian tied Bancroft-Rosalia with 44 points each.

Carterville finished seventh with 10 points while Allen tallied 7.8. Homer scored 27 points and Reemer netted 22 while Ponca placed 11th with 16. Wakefield scored 13 and Wauneta 12 while Walthill, Whiteman and Wynot were shut out.

The Wildcats had five first place finishes with Jaimie Hurlin leading the way with a school record and conference record, getting them of 14.7 in the 110-meter high hurdles.

Landon Grotzke earned second in the 400 in 52.5 in the 400-meter dash while Daleen Johnson and Chad Elam both won the high jump with a 4' leap, the specie

relay team set a school record in winning the conference title with a 44.5 clocking with Holdout, O'Connor, Grotzke and Ryan Krueger and the mile relay team won first place honors in 3:14.9 with Grotzke, O'Connor, Scott Verwall and Rick Ristey.

O'Connor added a second place finish in the triple jump with a 44' 9 leap and Brock Shelton placed third in the discus after a toss of 131.6. Scott Wittler placed fourth in both the 1600 (4:59) and 3200 (10:32), while Holdout placed fourth in the 100-meter dash in 11.1. Krueger added a fourth in the 100-hurdles in 13.5 and the 1200 relay finished ninth in 9.51.

Carterville headed the second line with 12 points with Brianne Rovalle scoring 11. Winona was eighth with 10.5 points and Wakefield scored 7.7 for ninth. Becker tallied 20 points to round out the top 10. Homer finished with 15.5 points and Allen scored 11.2 while Lander-Hastings matched 10. Winona's next best point with Whiteman and Whiteman.

Allen's 28 points came from Eddie Bierman with a second place finish of 11.1 in the 100-meter dash and third place times of 10.85 in the 300-meter dash and 1:56.2. Bigstock was second in the long jump with a 17' 4 leap and fifth in the triple jump at 12.7.

Alego Beeson was third in the triple jump with a 44' 9 leap and she placed fifth in the 100-hurdles in 16.7 while Amanda Ebbing was 10th in the 1200 in 13:48 and sixth in the 1600 in 14:14.

Allen's 17 points came from Stacey Madsen with a best place time of 20.2 in the 300-meter dash and a fifth place time of 1.7 in the 100-meter dash.

WSC's Drickey chosen on all-star team

WAYNE Paul Drickey, a member of the WSC women's basketball team has been chosen to represent Athletes in Action overseas this summer in Bulgaria from July 26-August 12.

Athletes in Action (AIA) is an international Christian sports organization with a three-fold purpose: to encourage international goodwill through sports; to help athletes maximize their potential; to introduce sports people to a personal relationship with Christ while encouraging them to grow in their faith through the fellowship of a local church.

Founded in 1966, AIA has since grown to nearly 100 full-time and associate staff in 16 countries. Athletes in Action is the sports ministry of Campus Crusade for Christ.

Drickey, a junior from Spencer, Nebraska is a member of their campus crusade for Christ here at Wayne State. She applied to AIA through Campus Crusade and was accepted.

"This should be a great experience for her both on and off the court," WSC coach Jeff Coddington said. "She has excelled for Paul since she began her ministry here."

Drickey played in all 25 games for AIA, starting four. She averaged 4.7 rebounds per game, 1.4 points per game and 19.0 minutes per game. She also started along the backcourt and averaged 1.13 blocked shots and 1.1 steals per game.

State-of-the-art facilities were used at the 1996 Atlanta Games and the 1997 World University Games in Seoul, Korea. Drickey was selected to compete in the 100-meter dash, 200-meter dash, 4x100 relay and the 4x400 relay.

After a season hampered by Mother Nature, John Manganiello's Wayne State baseball team closed out the season with three consecutive victories including a sweep of highly ranked Northern Iowa on Saturday.

WSU played at UNI's approach field that was held to best place in the Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) Division II with a 10-12 record. The Cats won the opener by a 3-0 margin as Matt Johnson and Aaron Hartung combined to throw a 10 hit shutout.

The senior hurler Johnson struck out 10 and walked just one while Aaron Hartung pitched the final two innings and allowed two hits and struck out five.

The game was scoreless until WSU broke the game open with four eighth inning. WSU provided out some hits with two going for extra bases including Mike Vandevoort's home run.

James Mansell tripled and singled while Adam Bechtel and Pat Cary each doubled and singled. Only Bechtel, double and Tony Graves singled to round out the hitting spark for the-sweeps.

WSU won the nightcap, 3-0, over UNI with Pat Cary earning the pitching victory while Bill Meyer earned the save. Muller allowed five hits and four runs while striking out six and walking three with Krieg allowing just one hit in his one inning of action.

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

Area students receive scholarships to WSC

Brett Sachau of Allen and Melissa Weber of Wayne have received Cooperating Schools Scholarships to attend Wayne State College this fall. The awards are valued at over \$1,500 each over a four year period.

Sachau is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Sachau and is scheduled to graduate from Allen Community College this month. He plans to major in elementary education.

In high school he participated in FFA, the A-Club and has been a member of the football team.

Mrs. Weber is the daughter of Fred and Lois Weber and was

graduate from Wayne High School in May.

The high school individuals include National Honor Society, band and debate. She is a peer tutor and a member of the Spanish club and the volleyball, basketball and track teams.

Cooperating Schools Scholarships provide full tuition for five years of college and may be awarded to graduates of high schools where Wayne State students have completed their academic teaching requirements.

Recipients must rank in the top one-half of their class at WSC.

All learning that takes place at Wayne State College is not from text books.

The Cooperative Education program offered by the college places students in actual jobs to help develop a better understanding of the relationship between education and the working world.

The program was implemented in the fall of 1980 and is similar to an internship in that students gain work experience while attending college. The difference between the two, however, is that a COOP student is paid for his or her work.

To obtain COOP course credit, a student must be employed at least six hours per week in a job directly related to his/her major area of study. The student must also be able to accomplish meaningful and measurable learning objectives.

At the present time ten students, Bartel, Hapton, and Sarah Flood, are employed at Providence Medical Center in Wayne.

Providence Medical Center is one of a number of area businesses participating in the WSC COOP education program which allows the students the chance to gain experience in their chosen field of study.

Mrs. Thielken's son, Jason, from Humphrey, is majoring in business management and office administration. During this semester she

has worked an average of 12 hours a week at PMC in the business office.

The COOP program helps you gain more real life experiences that are not available in text books. "I like the hospital setting and the fact that I can work around my schooling," she said.

"She will continue working at the hospital through the summer."

Mrs. Flood, a senior from Newman Grove, will graduate this

week from WSC after having worked through the COOP program for two years. She has been working Tuesday and Thursday afternoon in the medical records department.

The Business administration/office administration major said, "I have gained a considerable amount of experience. I will be able to take with me after graduating. I feel this is a wonderful program to be involved in."

We appreciate the opportunity to work with Wayne State College in bringing their students into the workplace," said PMC Administrator Marlene Thomas. "It is a real plus having these students available to us."

Both women agreed that the placement office at WSC was helpful in placing them in the positions they have.

"Students can tell the placement office what type of employment they are looking for and the office will work with them to find a job," Ms. Thielken said.

The summer months are generally the busiest time for the COOP program. The program allows a student to work in their home town while earning credit. There are approximately 80 students who will be involved in the program this summer.

Students are evaluated based on paperwork completed by the student including the Learning Objectives, a mid term evaluation and the final report. The employer's evaluation of the student along with a site visit by a COOP staff member and/or phone conversations with the student and supervisor are also considered.


