They practiced writing skills, addressing letters, locating places on the flat map, and globe and being exposed to the diversity of different areas around the country that they might not otherwise get to see," Mrs. Hart said.

106 to we can maintain the sinking fund.

LB 1114 took away our sinking fund but LB 100 would put it back Jensen said. "We need a sinking fund for capital buildings and provide improvements" without it over time our buildings and grounds would deteriorate.

Wayne golf team records best score of year in win

The Wayne golf team captured top honors and notched their best score of the season with a 318 at the Harold Maciejewski Invitational at the Wayne Country Club, Monday.

The Blue Devils swept past the 15-team field by 10 strokes over runner-up South Shore City with a 326.

Laurel Concord placed third with a 338 and Pierce was fourth with a 340. Oakland-Craig finished fifth at 347 followed in order by Schuyler (351), West Point (351), Wayne reserves "B" (353), Norton (358), Wayne reserves "A" (359), West Point Central Catholic (368), Tekamah-Herman (367), Norfolk Catholic (369), Cedar Catholic

(372) and Battle Creek (373).

The winners were paced by Kurtis Keller who won a playoff with Justin Erikson of Tekamah-Herman for third place with a 77.

Klinton Keller lost his playoff for fifth place with Laurel's Jared Anderson as each fired 79's and Ryan Sturm edged teammate Ryan Dahl for seventh place with an 80.

Wayne had six golfers named out of the 15 total medals handed out. Adam Ellington fired an 81 and edged Jason Parks who also fired an 81 for ninth place.

South Shore's Tim Hordbeck edged his own teammate by play off, Jason Gilligan for top honors at each carded 76's.

Bob Conrad of West Point placed

11th with an 81 and Nate Furbhoff of Pierce was 12th with an 82 as was his teammate, Mark Meyer who placed 13th with the same score.

Laurel's Jason Penberick was 14th with an 85 and Oakland's Brett O'Mara was 15th with an 81.

Wayne's fifth varsity player was Nick Mull but his 87 was not included in the team's scoring.

Wayne's reserve "A" team was led by Parks with an 81 and John Daybough with a 91 while Paul Zalkowsky carded a 91 and Nick Hagmann, 94. Justin Sullivan's 98 was not included in the team scoring.

The Blue Devils reserve "B" team was led by Ellington's 81 while Ryan

Mollenberg carded an 89 and Robbie Stumpf, 91. Mike Lindau rounded out the team scoring with a 92 while Ted Schnokler's 99 not being included in the team scoring.

Wayne's top player finished five-over-par including two penalty strokes. Kurtis had three birdies and six pars to go along with six bogies and one double bogey.

The 80 fired by Ryan Dahl was his lowest score ever in competition and the sophomore had 10, nine putts and no three-putts.

Wayne will compete against Laurel and Norton in dual action before next Tuesday's district competition at Quayside Run in Columbus.

Brother tandem leading Wayne golfers to districts

As the Wayne golf team closes out their regular season play and prepares for district play, things are pretty similar to other years with couples that among teammates to make the final five which will represent the Blue Devils at districts and if things go well, at state.

This year's team has had three of the same golfers on the varsity line the entire year with the four and five

spots open to who ever is playing the best with plenty of competition to round out the final two spots.

"What makes this year's Wayne team so special?"

For the first time in school history, a brother tandem is heading the way for the Blue Devils not to mention they are ranked first and second on the team.

Kurtis and Klinton Keller, a senior and freshman have been battling each other the entire season for that number one spot. A dispute that is

a friendly battle.

"Ever since we were little kids we've been in competition with each other," Kurtis said. "It's just something that we're each used to."

Kurtis said he began playing golf when he was six or seven years old with his dad, Jim at the golf course in Gordon.

"We would go out and play and Klinton would just putt on the green and fill off the tee box," Kurtis said. "He actually started playing golf before I did."

Both boys took to the sport of golf and have evolved into very sharp players.

What is hard to explain, however, is that both play similar games on the same days even when they aren't playing in the same group which Day head coach Terry Klinton somewhat baffled.

"I've never seen anything like this," Klinton said. "Kurtis can play a hole a certain way and two hours later Klinton will play the exact same hole the exact same way. It must be some sort of telepathy."

"We've played so many years together during the summer and in practice that we just know each other's games inside and out," Klinton said.

After 15 rounds of golf in tournaments played formal this season, only

one stroke separates the two golfers and about six or seven of those came in one meet in which Klinton struggled after he was called for a technical violation of putting his ball when it was on the fringe.

After one of the three other players in his group mentioned it could be grounds for disqualification, the younger Keller was distracted for the next several holes in which he

put the numbers he hadn't seen to probably a couple years which led to a 50 plus round of golf.

Kurtis has enjoyed a very solid season as the Blue Devils number one golfer but he knows that it will be his little brother that could and may well edge as one of the most elite golfers ever to graduate from Wayne High by the time he's a

senior.

"I am going to attend Wayne State next fall and enter the pre-med program," Kurtis said. "I can't wait to watch Klinton develop into a stronger and better player than he is today because he's definitely got all the tools to do so."

But there is much more work ahead this season as the brother duo attempt to help propel the Blue Devils to a district championship and a state tournament berth.

"We're excited," Kurtis added. "We put up a great number at the Wayne meet and we feel we are peaking at the right time if our fourth and fifth guys can continue to step it up like they did on Wednesday, we'll be there."

Having golfing dads that think alike is it not surprising that when asked separately what is the hardest course they've played this season, both said the Elks in Columbus and both said that Quayside Run will be the toughest when they play it on Tuesday at Districts.

When asked what the hardest course they've ever played on is, both said Dakota Dunes.

The best scores matched by both players, 77 on the Wayne course last summer. Klinton holds the edge, however, on Dakota Dunes where he maintains a one stroke advantage on his brother after carding an 80 while Kurtis netted an 81.

"It's still too early for Klinton to decide what he wants to do after high school graduation. I would like to be able to receive a golf scholarship somewhere and play collegiately," Klinton said. "I plan on continuing to improve my game and working very hard during the summer months on it."

The younger Keller will have three more years of working on his game before he has to choose where he's going to go and by the looks of things today, he will have several options to choose from.

Kurtis and Klinton Keller are the sons of Jim and Bob Keller. They also have a daughter, Kara who is in the seventh grade.












The event will begin at 7 p.m. at Our Savior Lutheran Church at Fifth and Pearl Streets. The public is invited to attend.





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Teens want to be like friends

Q: I am a teenager and want to look and dress just like all my friends. My parents tell me I should be an individual and be willing to be different, but I just can't do it. Do you understand?

A: Sure I do.

Let me explain why you feel such pressure to be like everyone else. The answer involves feelings of inferiority, which are usually very strong during adolescence. You see, when you feel worthless and foolish, when you don't like yourself, then you are more frightened by the threat of ridicule or rejection by your friends. You become more sensitive about being laughed at. You lack the confidence to be different.



and said, 'Isn't anybody going to stop us before we get hurt?' The fist, you see, was something neither boy wanted. Their violent combat was directly related to the presence of the two adults, and would have taken a different form if the boys had been alone. Children will often 'hook' their parents' attention and intervention in this way.

Believe it or not, this form of sibling rivalry is easiest to control. The parent must simply render the behavior unpredictable to each participant.

I would recommend that you review the problem (for example, a morning full of hickering) with the children, and then say, 'Now listen carefully. If the two of you want to pick on each other and make your selves miserable, then be my guest (assuming there is a fairly equal balance of power between them). Go outside and fight until you're exhausted. But it's not going to occur under my feet anymore. It's over! And you know I mean business when I make that kind of statement. Do we understand each other?'

Having made the boundaries clear, I would act decisively the instant either boy returned to his hickering. If I had separate bedrooms, I would confer with each room for at least 30 minutes of complete freedom, without radio or television. (I would assign one to clean the garage and the other to mow the lawn.) (I would make them take a nap.) My avowed purpose would be to make them believe the next time I initiated a request for peace and tranquility.


What is most surprising is that children are happier when their parents enforce these reasonable limits with love and dignity. Instead of wringing their hands and crying and begging and screaming (which actually reinforces the disruptive behavior and makes it worse), a mother or father should approach the conflict with dignity and self-control.

National World Day of Prayer was observed by singing "What A Friend We Have in Jesus." Pastor Bartels presented the devotion taken from the LWMA charter.


