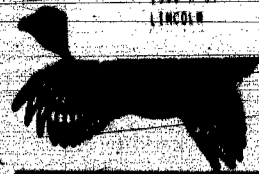

## Last classes leave District #25

A farewell picnic was held Sunday at School District #25 by about nine miles south of Wakefield on Highway 16.

The school is closing after more than 30 years of educating the area young people.

District #25 was actually the result of a merger of Districts #4, #25, #27 and #33 in 1960. The first classes were held in the new building in January of 1961. At that time there were a total of 41 students in the school.

Prior to that, on May 23, 1960, a \$15,000 bond proposition was voted on and passed. On June 14,

1960 just under two acres of land were purchased from Fred and Mita Jahnke for \$721.

Maurice Fleming, Robert Hansen and Alvin Westphal made up the first board of education.

Helen Kai taught the lower grades and Rosalee Taylor taught the upper grades in the two-room school.

Larry Kai and Connie Spangler were the first eighth graders to come out of the school. The first kindergarten class was made up of Randy Bird, Rocky Clausen, Carol Hennig, Terry Henschke, Keith Koppke, Jan Webster, Brian Kai and Ashland Hansen.

As surrounding schools closed, the school grew. Districts #2, #3, #33

and #4 also became part of District #25.

The largest number of students to attend the school at one time was 31 in 1961-62.

This year there were only nine students at the school.

School officials say the decline in numbers are due to a number of factors including home schooling, option enrollment at other schools and a decline in the number of school age children in rural areas.

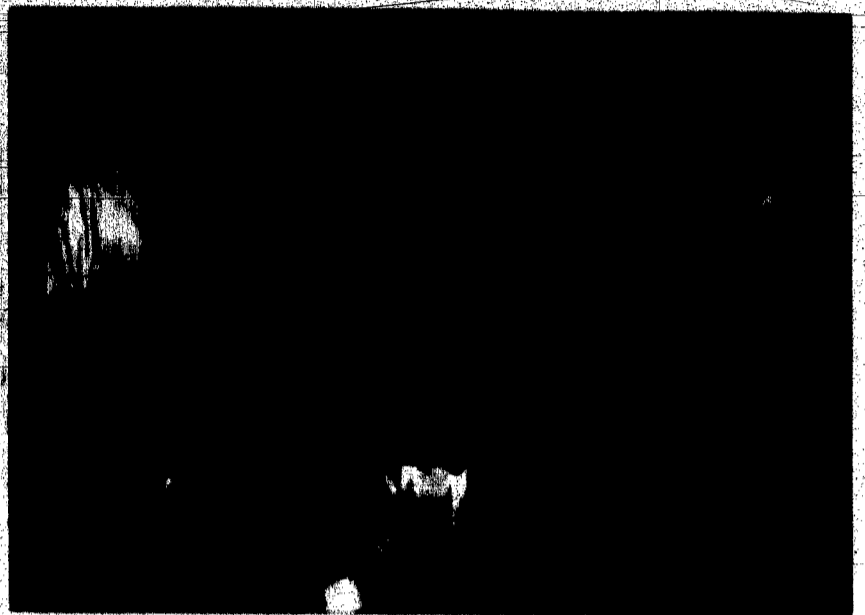
In the 37 years that the school has been open, there have been 212 students attend the school, 19 teachers serve the district and 18 members of the board of education.

A decision will be made in July concerning the future of the building. There is a possibility that it may continue to house students should the Wakefield Community Schools decide to use the facility as a satellite.

The district is approximately 60 percent affiliated with Wakefield and 40 percent with Pander. Students have also gone on to attend school at Waver and Wayne.

The district includes all of Lake, product and parts of Plum Creek, Logan and Butler products. In

Cory Peterson, 18-month son of Oona and Dick Peterson of Concord, will be among 16 Stansford children featured along with their parents on the ninth annual St. Luke's CME Champions Television Special Saturday and Sunday, May 31 and June 1 on ETV Channel 4.

The Petersons are scheduled to appear from 9:45-10 p.m. on Saturday and 2-3 p.m. on Sunday. They will talk about the care they received at St. Luke's Regional Medical Center.

Cory was struck by a automobile on March 23 when he was diagnosed with juvenile diabetes. He remained hospitalized until April 6 due to complications. Today he is home with his parents and after being almost 3 and the family is learning to cope with Cory's diabetes with the help of St. Luke's health experts.

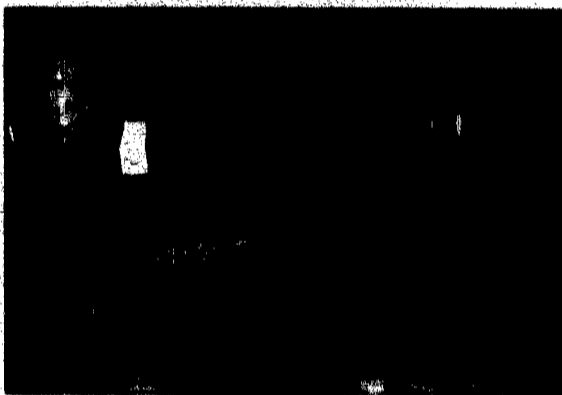
The mission of the Children's Miracle Network is to generate funds and awareness programs for the benefit of children treated by its associated hospitals. Among the children's health care areas benefiting from the \$175,240 raised locally in 1998 are St. Luke's Neonatal Intensive Care Nursery, Family Birthing Center, Pediatric Intensive Care Unit, Emergency Center, Burn Trauma Center, Pediatric Cancer and Rehabilitation Center.

The telecast begins at 8 p.m. Saturday and ends at 4-4:30 p.m. on Sunday. The first 40 minutes of each hour will come from the national headquarters at Disney World's new Wide World of Sports Complex and feature educational segments focusing on social problems, children's eye as well as health and safety issues for families, entertainment, sports, music and personal health stories of children recovering from illness or injury.

The last 20 minutes of each hour will air live from ETV's home city studios and feature interviews with charitable children and their parents, check presentations and visits with people who make a difference in the health of Stansford's children.

Cory is one of 16 young Stansford Champions cared for at St. Luke's Regional Medical Center in Wake City for their illness or injury who will be featured on the telecast, which has a goal this year of raising \$215,000.

Since 1989, St. Luke's has raised more than \$1.2 million to benefit children's health in Stansford. St. Luke's is one of 16 member hospitals in the United States and Canada that make up the Children's Miracle Network based in Salt Lake City, Utah.

## Council approves land annexation

There was no public input at this far or against, regarding the proposed annexation of a parcel of land into the city of Wayne during a public hearing at Tuesday's City Council meeting.

The land in question is a triangular-shaped piece of land just north of Highway 33 and just west of Continental Road on the east edge of Wayne, contains approximately five acres. However, the annexation includes the right-of-way to the north both to the south and east of it.

The Allous family of Waver have plans to develop the area into a truck stop through a project that is estimated to cost approximately \$1 million.

The council voted to waive the three readings of Ordinance 97-3 and give final approval to the annexation of the land.

A number of people spoke against the possibility of annexing the former Carl's center facility from its current zoning to an R-1 multi-family area.

At Elbert a property owner in the area said that he questioned whether or not the proposal was ethical. He also said that he did not oppose the annexation, but was opposed to the R-1 zoning and "not zoning is not logical."

"I do not think it is wise to re-zone one piece of property and

place more than 40 property owners at a disadvantage. I hope the decision that it made is one that won't come back to haunt us," Elbert said.

Craig Hedlike, who also owns property in the area and that he opposed the R-1 zoning and felt other solutions to the problem need to be looked into.

"I think we need to look into getting a public entity, such as the Wayne Housing Authority, involved with this property. This would require additional involvement if problems arise."

Janis Johnson told the council to hold a rezoning plan needs to be in place before any action can be taken.

"At the present time, there are too many unanswered questions. If the building were to come to R-1 and then hold anything could be done with it."

The council did vote to move ahead with the preparation of an ordinance which would amend the zoning map. That ordinance would have to be approved on three readings before it would become effective.

In other action, the council approved requests from the Kiwanis Club for one of tables during the Chicken Show and from the Chicken Show committee for financial assistance and permission to check all streets around Breeder.

## New counseling service is now open in Wayne

There's a new counseling service in Wayne which specializes in working with children.

Associated Psychologists and Counselors (APC) is located at 103 East Third Street and is a satellite office from the Norfolk location.

All Woodward manages the Wayne office and the licensed professional counselor says they do all variations of counseling including individual, families and couples. "I really specialize in working with youth and adolescents," Woodward said.

A native of Stuart, Iowa, Woodward has recently published an article which will appear in a book sometime this summer entitled "The Therapist's Notebook of Homework and Intervention." The publishers

will be Hawthorne Press out of New York.

"The article will be directed to office counselors," Woodward said. "I wrote a chapter on stress, talking interventions with children."

Woodward will also be presenting the same topic at the Iowa Association of Play Therapists annual conference in September. Woodward earned her Bachelor's degree in Psychology from Buena Vista and attended the University of South Dakota to earn her Master's degree. She is currently beginning work on her doctorate degree at UNB as well.

"I was a school counselor at Kingsley-Pearson High School in Iowa and Mt. Pleasant High School," Woodward said. "I've also

## New program for housing is being offered

The Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation (WCHDC) announced this week the inauguration of its newest program to help low-income families get into homes of their own.

The HOME Purchase/Rehab/Resell program will allow WCHDC to purchase inexpensive housing that needs a moderate amount of rehabilitation in order to bring it in line with existing building codes, correct those deficiencies and resell a quality home to a qualified family with 20 percent of the purchase price in down payment assistance.

In order to qualify for the HOME Purchase/Rehab/Resell program, family income needs to be at or below 80 percent of the

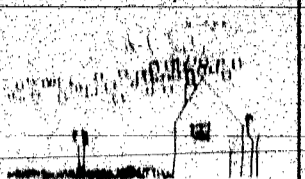

Wayne County median, as rated by family size. Any qualified family can proceed to identify a house for consideration for WCHDC rehabilitation.

Once a house is qualified, WCHDC can purchase the house, perform rehabilitation and resell the corrected house to the family. Additionally, WCHDC will offer the family 20 percent of the total purchase price as a down payment toward permanent first mortgage financing. This down payment takes the form of a no-interest, second mortgage that is forgiven entirely after the family has lived in the house for 10 years.

WCHDC will be working closely with the local Realtors to get qualified buyers together with qualified houses. However, qualified buyers can also be linked with qualified houses through WCHDC. Anyone who has a house to sell that is in need of some rehabilitation or modernization is encouraged to contact WCHDC for consideration under this program.

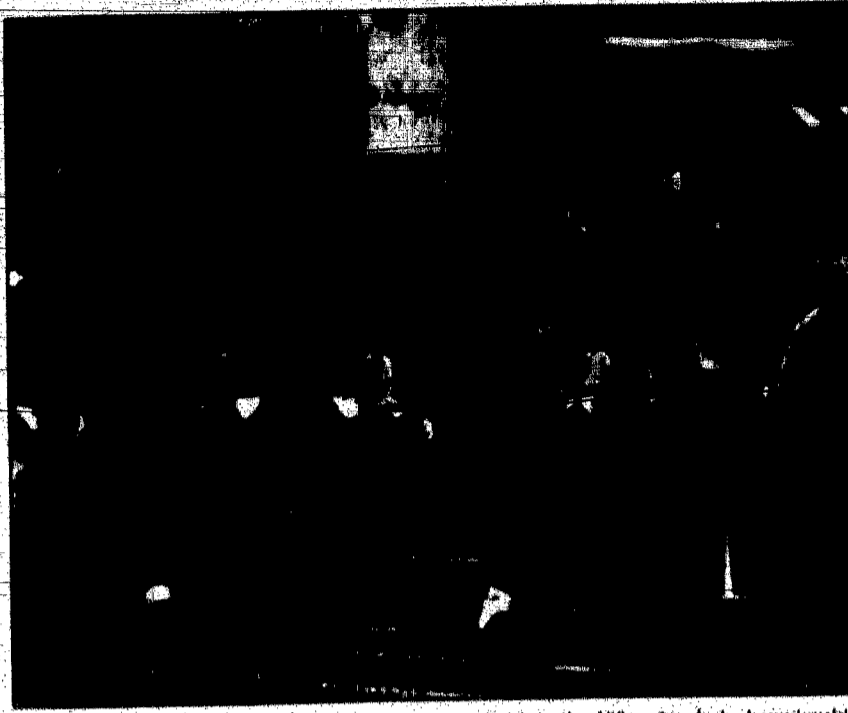

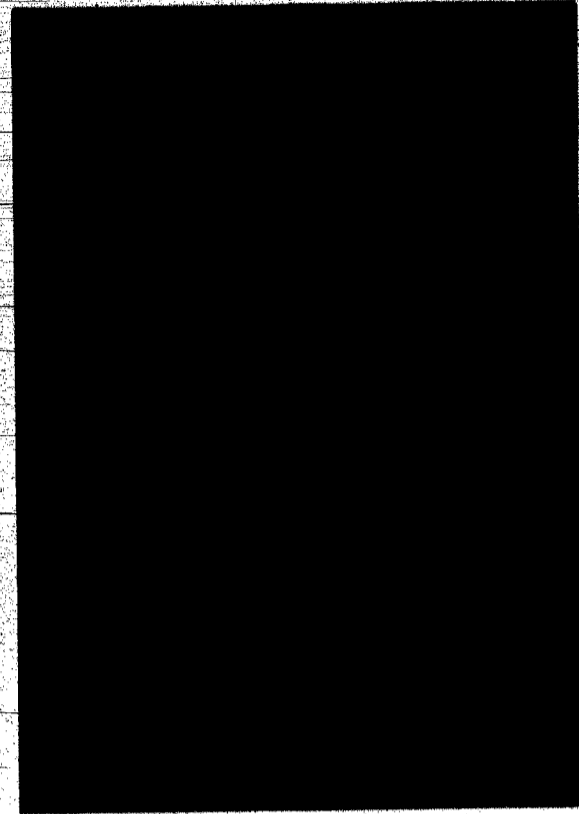

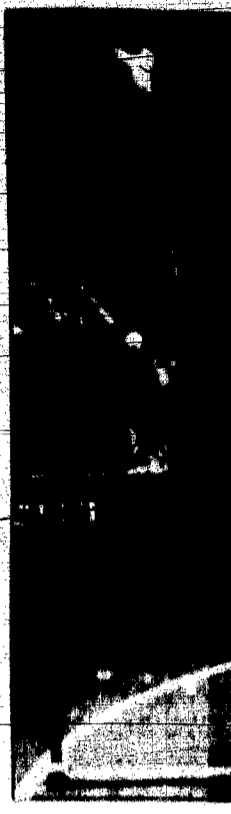

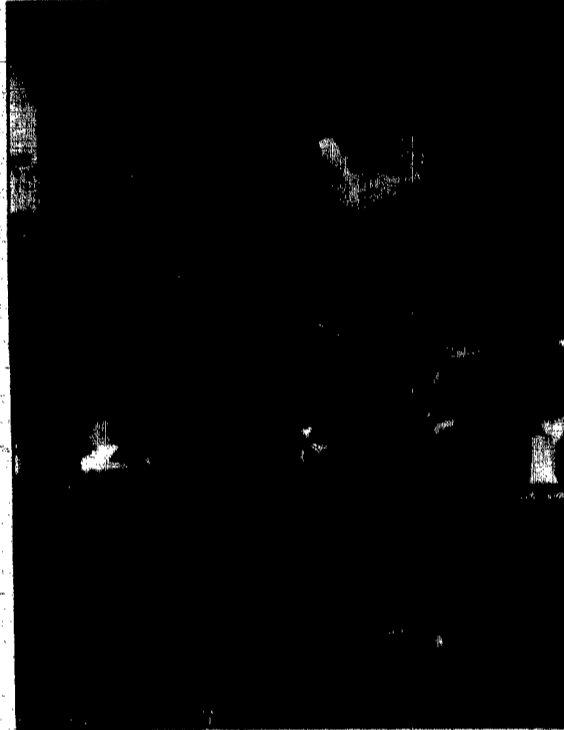
Matt Meyer sprints the last 50 meters before handing the baton off to a teammate in the 4x400 meter relay.

Brad Maryott clears past the 20-foot barrier in the long jump but the judge just missed qualifying for the finals.



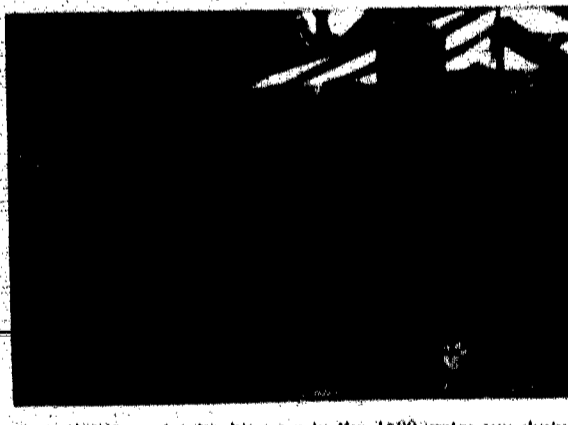

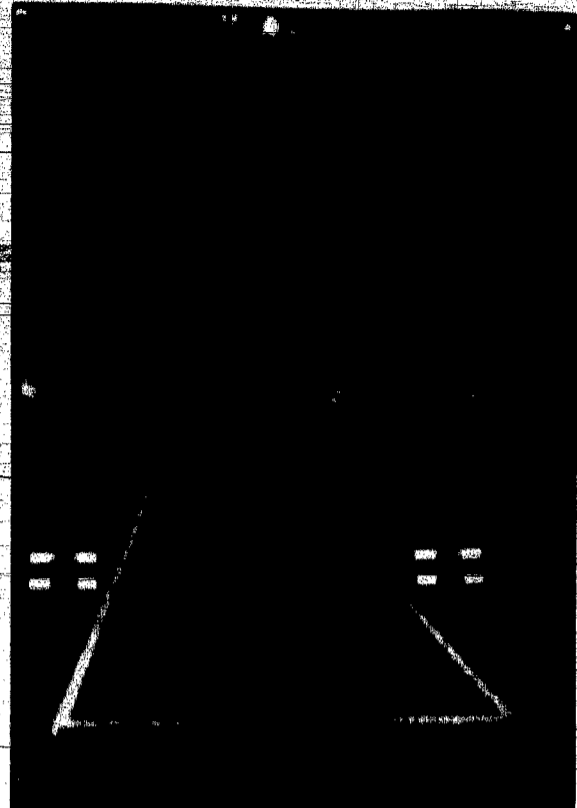

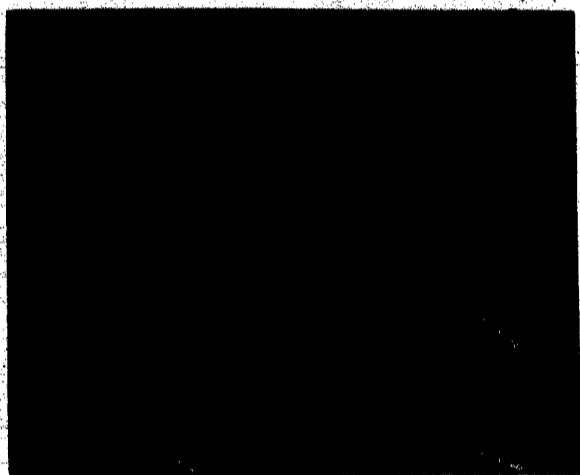

## Astrology influences millions

Q: I know many people who make their decisions on the basis of astrology. Even their business dealings are influenced by their horoscopes. Will you comment on the practice of astrology and whether there are any scientific facts to support it?



A: I have been amazed by television personalities, politicians and millions of American young people who refer to astrology.

How ridiculous it is to think that Abigail Miller, Queen Elizabeth, Harry Truman, William Shakespeare, Bing Crosby, Willie Mays, the Old Man, Celia Cruz and I should have everything in common because all of us were born under the sign of Taurus. How stupid to suppose that the success of our business ventures, our health and even our sex lives are predetermined by the position of the stars and planets on the day of our birth!

Yet there are more than 10,000 astrologers currently working in the United States, offering advice on everything from business deals to the compatibility of a marriage and so on.

There is not a scrap of scientific evidence to support the validity of such a magical notion. In fact, it was an all-knowing astronomer who advised Hitler to attack Russia. His biggest mistake? Nevertheless, millions of believers consult their horoscopes to obtain daily truth and wisdom.

I was recently introduced to a famous Hollywood actor while we sat waiting to appear on a television talk program. My wife was with me to observe the interview, and the actor commented on her attractiveness. He said, "I bet you are a Sagittarius because most pretty girls are born under that sign." I was so appalled by the silliness of his statement that I felt obliged to challenge what he said.

Typing out to meet his intelligence, I asked him if he had made any effort to prove his hypothesis. I pointed out how simple it would be, for example, to check the birth date of every girl referred to next year's Miss America or Miss Teen pageant. I soon learned that the best way to end a conversation with an astrologer is to begin talking about scientific evidence.

In 1960, the world's astrologers announced that the world combination of planetary influences in 25,000 years would occur that year. A sweep of some planets were to appear in a line which would impact upon the entire earth. Judging astrology was going crazy in these high and American astrologers were predicting everything from the dissolving of California to the catastrophic end of the world.

But the fabled day came and went of course with no more disasters than on any other day. When astrological advice is broadcast on radio or television stations, the announcers often repeat a disclaimer saying they are not attempting

to foster a serious belief in astrology and are providing the horoscopes for fun and entertainment.

How about it then? Is astrology just an amusing pastime for our enjoyment? What about those millions of Americans who depend on the stars to provide affection and love each day? Isn't it better that they believe in this myth than to believe in nothing at all? Should we foster a tolerant attitude toward astrology or should it be seen as an irrational philosophy to be opposed wherever possible?

A widely quoted psychiatrist recently professed that he urges his patients to depend on the astrologers, even though he admits that their predictions are scientifically worthless. I couldn't agree more! Astrology is not only mythical nonsense, but it is dangerous to those who accept its tenets.

One serious concern is that it offers a substitute for rational judgment and wisdom. A young man or woman, for example, may choose a marital partner on the basis of compatibility of their charts, without proper regard for the life-time implications of their decision. Others postpone or disregard needed action because of the "muffling" advice printed on their horoscopes.

It is impossible to estimate how many important decisions are based on the stars each day, mistakenly having a profound impact on family, business and even governmental affairs. How risky it is to determine one's destiny by the flip of a little coin!

The naive believer exchanges his understanding of facts, his common sense, his experiences and his better judgment for a "know all, tell all" pipe magazine of forecasts. He constructs the life of a man confidently leading against the wind while standing on top of a 10 story building. His body is seemingly held in check as he teeters precariously over the edge of the structure. But waves in later, the gusts will slacken and the man will suddenly plunge down ward in panic.

Likewise, the astrology convert is leaning against an aquation which cannot possibly hold him securely in place. sooner or later, when trouble and loaded circumstances beset him (as will come to everyone), he will reach frantically for something stable and firm to grasp. But he will find little support from the myth and superstition on which he has been leaning.

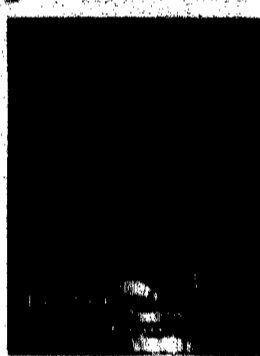

## Divorced parents to consider housing for children

It is estimated that nearly one half of all children will see their parents divorced by the time they reach 18.



When divorced parents have joint custody of a child, successfully creating two homes for the child can help to minimize a feeling of loss and maximize the relationship with each parent. When children believe that they have two homes where they belong and are wanted, they can gain a greater sense of continuity.

Each home should be encouraged to play a portion of the child's development and the other parent of each home (perhaps not to their best).

Following are some guidelines for creating two homes:

Children should be encouraged to exchange phone numbers and addresses for each home with other kids to allow for friendship development. Friends will soon learn the child's confidential information.

Each child should have his or her own space, a private bedroom if possible. If the child's room is attached to the design process, such as color and furniture choices, it would not be surprising if the bedrooms in each home are similar.

Children should be allowed to make choices about what toys, clothes, collections, etc. are kept in each home. Children may find sturdy copy favorite items between homes.

The bedrooms should contain places for toys and personal effects (such as drawers, studying and toy chests), a comfortable bed, desk and bookcase for studying and hobbies, a closet for clothing and a personal storage area. A minimum of three changes of clothes should be present in each home. If a bedroom must be shared, each child's furniture can be clustered with a divider separating individualized spaces.

Children should be allowed to have a portion of their collection of toys, clothes, collections, etc. are kept in each home. Children may find sturdy copy favorite items between homes.

Two transferable toilet articles for children need to be carried to the bathroom. Toothbrush, soap, deodorant and hair spray are items that should not be taken from one home to another. Perhaps a section of the sink area or a shelf can be designated as belonging to a child.

Children should be encouraged to exchange phone numbers and addresses for each home with other kids to allow for friendship development. Friends will soon learn the child's confidential information.

Pictures, drawings and projects relating to the children should be displayed throughout.

Basically these guidelines may assist parents in creating two more competitive physical and psychological environments for their children. A feeling of home is enhanced when children are asked to make input. The result will reinforce the idea of belonging to two families.

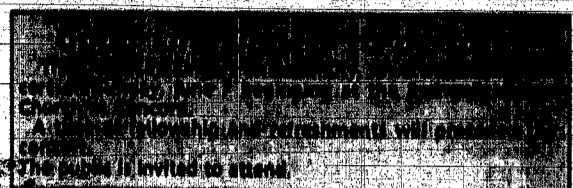

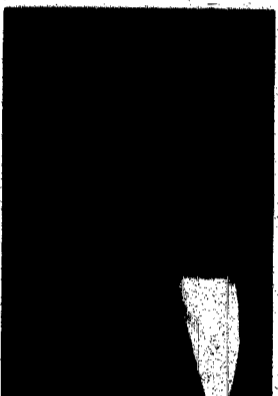

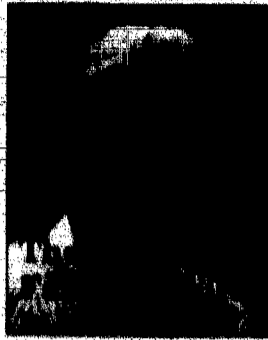
# Take time for important things
