After the influx of many students and to the delight of 2000-plus parents, area schools are beginning classes this week.

Students in Alice and Laurel Campion schools began classes Tuesday Aug. 21.

Classes for Allen students will begin at 9:15 a.m. on Thursday and Friday and dismiss at 1:30 p.m.

Beginning Monday Aug. 21, schools will begin regular class at 8:30 a.m. for 3-5 year-olds at the Kindergarten all-around school on Mondays. Wednesdays and Fridays.

The new County montessori will open Monday, Aug. 21. Applications have been turned in to each elementary school.

At United Methodist Church, classes will be held from 8:30-11:45 a.m. on Thursday and Friday Aug. 21, 22. Beginning Monday Aug. 22, classes will be held from 8:20-11:40 a.m. each day. Two rooms of kindergartners will be held. One room will have students in 3-5 year-olds Mondays and Fridays, and the other will have students as 3-5 year-olds Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.

First year faculty members have been hired at Engel, Union, St. Mary's, Wayne, Community Schools and St. Mary Elementary School. Classes begin Monday Aug. 22.

Students at Whipple Taylor Primary, Wayne Community Schools and St. Mary Elementary School begin classes Monday Aug. 22.

School hours at Wausa will be from 8:10 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. Students will not be allowed to enter the building before 8:15 a.m.

State Sen. Eric Chambers continues to hold the judiciary's feet to the fire over the way in the Douglas County Court.

Last fall, Senator Chambers filed a disciplinary complaint about County Judge Richard "Benton" Jones with the Judicial Qualifications Commission, the agency responsible in Nebraska for investigating complaints about judges.

The allegations Chambers makes against Jones are pretty damning. Among them: he harassed in the courtroom of fellow judge, Leek Brookhart, that he pushed a female judge and treated her inappropriately in an elevator that he used extremely bad language toward her and other female employees; this kind of language that could be used in public company that he made a definite threat toward another judge and he used fake names like "Abrah" (alter and black) during court proceedings.

Rightly or wrongly the press has passed all over the story. Partly it's because many have been thinking for months about problems involving conduct and ethics problems involving Jones and other judges on the Douglas County Court. In the meantime, chambers is continuing to pursue the case and bring matters to a head.

It will be up to the judges' Disciplinary Commission to determine whether this allegation against Jones is true. At least in the interim, though, there appears to be financial misgivings that at least some of those involved in this conduct are those of highly paid Douglas County officials including its trial attorneys.

There should be no mistake about it: if true, that conduct is reprehensible. They've reported that the judge has a preference for libertines and knows that they're good for their "bottom line."

After the stampede of highly publicized patterns of discrimination by Wayne State Teachers College, it was predicted that enrollment would not reach capacity by normal transfer dates without exceptionally warm weather. Wayne and area educators were included in this prediction.

and Women's softball team which the city does not want as part of the Recreation Department.

Three years ago the Men's and Women's teams were the only people playing at the Softball Complex. Now, the city's entire summer softball and baseball programs, except Majors and Legion, practice and play games at the Complex.

These extra groups of players have greatly increased the activity at the Complex. The softball activity was not mentioned, but Association logic has no place in trying to ruin this facility.

The only downside to this extra activity was the increase of the

utility bill. This increase was apparently figured at an increase of 200 percent from the previous year. Because of the significant increase, the Association decided to ask for the city's Recreation Department's assistance.

We felt a 50/50 split of the utility bill was a proper fee obligation. When this was presented to the Recreation and Parks Commission, they also felt a 50/50 split was fair.

The problem arose when our City Administration felt the proposed fee was not adequate. Just a two-thirds one-third split was. This is the reason why this issue ended up at the City Council meeting. At the meeting, they also decided a two-thirds one-third split was fair.

Finally, the number of participants from the Men's Association is about 170 people while the number of participants from the City's Recreation Department is about 320 participants.

Fourthly, because of the decision of the City Council or City Administrator, this year's Recreation Department party-party in softball and baseball were charged a fee to play. Why were these kids charged to play? The facilities they practice and play at costs the city nothing. Why the reason to charge?

With all three questions, the City Council still felt a two-thirds one-third split was fair.

I guess this just tells you where our Council and Administration stand on recreation in Wayne.

By the way, where does the City stand on the renovation of the City Auditorium? We can only guess what this will happen.





The conference, which is planned for Sept. 3 at the Sioux City, Iowa Convention Center is a joint effort of Nebraska and Iowa Cooperative Extension and USDA Rural Development.

For the long-term health of agriculture and rural communities, it is important that town and farm leaders work together. This conference offers speakers and workshops that share success stories of how this is being accomplished. Patent said

the keynote speaker is Dr. Duane Aker, a former university president and agricultural producer. Aker will offer a multi-faceted look at the role each segment of the community can play in encourage agricultural entrepreneurship within rural communities, including the value of diverse production, and the importance of local value added processing.

Mike Johnson, speaker Dr. John Atiles, USDA Extension Rural Sociology, will discuss how beliefs and values in rural communities affect challenges and opportunities to the overall development of the area.

The conference will offer two tracks of workshops for speakers.

One track relates to agricultural development, including communities and rural leaders working together, changing face of rural communities, value added agriculture, risk taking, changing technology to agriculture, environmental challenges and tools that work for family size producers.

The track will offer workshops that relate to community development topics such as housing development, community funds, tourism, collaboration among small communities, entrepreneurship in rural communities and child care.

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

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






