

Allen girl battles with brain tumor

Asking a nine-year-old what they would wish for if granted a wish, you would probably get requests that border on anything but ordinary if not literally out of the world.

Allen's Jennifer Lathenholz says the recipient of a wish recently, and the nine-year-old daughter of Diane and Michael Lathenholz left her only request surprised to say the least.

"Not because her wish was extravagant, just the opposite. But then again, Jennifer Lathenholz isn't your ordinary nine-year-old girl."

The Allen third grader suffers from a malignant brain tumor and her legal guardian, Diane and Darlene, Lathenholz, found out recently that her tumor is growing.

"Jennifer has been in and out of the hospital since she was a baby," Darlene said. "When she was two months old she had to have a shunt put in because of an expanding head."

"That was in the winter of 1988 and the first thing my job would powder go to the air where she had just given it."

Her shunt was replaced in 1994 but less than six months later she began suffering from symptoms her parents and grandparents had never seen.

"She would flip her left foot in physical education class with just being able to control it," Darlene added. "Then she would be carrying her lunch tray and she would drop it for no apparent reason."

The health care physician said something very out-right was wrong she would start walking up the sidewalk and her walking was drastically impaired as she was having to roll side-to-side.

Last February the eight-year-old was diagnosed with a brain tumor and within two days she underwent surgery at Mayo Clinic Center in Minn., City, back to remove it.

"When they went to operate the tumor they could not get all of it because it was in the middle of the brain. Once you pass it, it could have caused blindness or paralysis," Darlene said. "The tumor measures 7x7.5x1.5 centimeters and it's malignant."

The immediate reaction to the medication following surgery included blurred vision, seizures and swelling of the tissue around the brain.

Jennifer spent eight days in Sioux City before returning to her Wakefield home.

That stay would last just 48 hours as she was rushed back to Sioux City because of swelling and being unable to stand on her feet due to the medication.

She would spend the next week in Sioux City's Ronald McDonald House while the medication was adjusted.

On her return to home once again, Jennifer was taken to Wayne several times a week for physical therapy to regain coordination, motor skills and strength.

Her case is very rare. Doctors in Boston, Mass., know her case well after studying it and doctors at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., also know Jennifer Lathenholz as well as New York.

"There are two different cells in Jennifer's tumor which is very rare," Darlene added. "Through all of this though, Jennifer has remained extremely positive and it's her outlook that gives the rest of us strength to get through it."

Just this past November, Darlene and her friend from a cancer meeting removed a tumor in Jennifer's left ear, and further testing showed the remaining 10 percent of the tumor that was untouched was starting to grow.

"Since it's spreading down to the spine surgery is not an option," Darlene added. "The best way to stop it is to walk up the sidewalk but never the less it's spreading."


At the present time a Dr. Epstein in New York is studying the MRI's taken on Jennifer and he will decide the course of action.

Meanwhile, Jennifer continues to go to school and make the best of a situation that she doesn't deserve to face.

Recently, Darlene was sitting at home watching television when the phone rang and it was a phone call from a man trying to get donations to the Ronald McDonald Foundation.

While she admits to buying many of her Santas, Mrs. Sheahan's children and grandchildren have added a number to her collection.



The Wayne wrestling team clinched past Whiter Pilger 160-159 Monday night in the final match of 1997.







It was the first time in Goldstein's short tenure that Winona State won back-to-back games as they improved to 4-8.



Alcohol involved in many crashes

Alcohol is a factor in approximately 40 percent of all fatal motor vehicle crashes, and is a leading killer of young Americans. The New Year is among the deadliest times of the year on our nation's highways and impaired driving is a big part of the problem.

All states and the District of Columbia have 21 year old minimum drinking age laws.

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates that 21 year old minimum drinking age laws have reduced traffic fatalities involving 16 to 20 year old drivers by 13 percent.

An average of one alcohol-related fatality occurs every 30 minutes.

Two-thirds in every five Americans will be involved in an alcohol-related crash at some time in their lives.

Over 50 percent of fatal crashes on weekends are alcohol related.

Drivers 21-24 years old have the highest intoxication rates in fatal crashes.

About 30 percent of motorcyclists involved in fatal crashes are intoxicated.

More than one-third of pedestrains 16 years old or older killed in traffic crashes are intoxicated.

Twenty percent of young drivers (15-20 years old) killed in crashes are intoxicated.

Drivers are less likely to wear restraints when they have been drinking.

Between midnight and 3 a.m., 70 percent of speeding drivers involved in fatal crashes have been drinking.

Remember not to drink and drive. Have a designated driver for a safe trip home.







Recycling grant awarded



NATIONAL ASSESSMENT

Wakefield Community School is among 243 schools in 162 districts to represent Nebraska in participating in the 1988 "States Assessments" in reading and writing. The 1988 States Assessments provide state by state comparisons of student achievement and are part of the continuing National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) in various academic subjects.

In 1988, NAEP is designed to measure what fourth and eighth grade students know and can do in writing. The assessment will include a number of tasks that go beyond traditional multiple choice test questions. Materials that will be used in the 1988 NAEP were selected from authentic texts normally available to students in and out of school (e.g., magazines, story books, newspapers and passages from literature used in classroom instruction).

The reading assessment will measure student proficiency in reading for literary experience, to gain information and to perform a task. Students participating in the writing assessment will write essays, reports, letters, stories, articles and documents to prepare their written responses in narrative, informative or persuasive contexts. Over 40 percent of NAEP questions will require students to provide brief or extended answers to questions that are based on authentic texts and documents.

The NAEP project is authorized by Congress, directed by the US Department of Education's National Center for Education Statistics, and administered by Education Testing Service of Princeton, N.J. and Westinghouse Inc. in Rockville, Md., for more than a quarter of a century. NAEP has served as the nation's only on-going survey of student academic performance, and has produced more than 200 reports across a dozen subject taught in school. Since 1970, NAEP has monitored the performance of students at the state level.

NAEP is required by law to protect the confidentiality of student and school participants and higher education and student or teacher names listed; the project is designed to report on the academic performance of large groups based on samples that are representative.


