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Hall helps decorate FTD float

For Lois Hall, her dream vacation involved work.

Mrs. Hall was among those who were in Pasadena, Calif., not only to help decorate the floats in the Tournament of Roses Parade.

"It has always been a dream of mine to go to California and help with the Florists Transworld Delivery float. Three years ago I decided to go but was too late. This time I bought my plane ticket in July," she said.

Mrs. Hall left Nebraska on Dec. 27 and paid her own way to California. She met her sister in Santa Barbara.

On Dec. 31 the two sisters took a tour bus to Pasadena. When they arrived at the area where the floats were being constructed, Mrs. Hall told them in charge she was a florist and was immediately put to work.

"I spent three hours putting roses in vases of water. It was not a difficult or complicated job but at least I can say I helped put together a Rose Parade float," she said.

Mrs. Hall said she did not meet anyone that she knew while helping with the float.

Mrs. Hall said the entire area where the floats were being constructed was full of high school students who were volunteering their time with the construction.

The construction of each float is supervised by three people. All floats are made of roses, ferns, daisies, and grasses. Mrs. Hall noted that one float even used twigs of cauliflower for flowers.

The theme for this year's parade was "Having Fun" and the FTD float was entitled "Fantasy in the Sun." Carol Barnett was the grand marshal for the parade.

On Jan. 1, the actual parade starts. Mrs. Hall and the tour group paid the 100 fee to be able to sit in bleachers along the 3.172 mile parade route. She said she enjoyed all the floats and was espe-

cially impressed with a marching band from Sierra Falls, N.D.

"During the parade we were in the 3 1/2 mile section of bleachers. The temperature was 77 degrees and there was no wind. It

was just gorgeous," she said.

Mrs. Hall said that each day during her trip she wore a Nebraska shirt to let people know where she was from.

The arrival back in Nebraska on

Jan. 2, just in time to watch the Nebraska Cornhuskers play in the Orange Bowl.

"The trip was a lot of fun. I told the people they plan to be back in 2000," she said.

'Cats defeat Mustangs

Wayne State notched its 10th victory of the season against a solid Southwest State team, Tuesday night in Rice Auditorium, 79-65.

Craig McDermott's team trailed 1-0 early in the contest but outscored the visiting Mustangs, 36-18, the rest of the half for a 15-point cushion at the intermission, 36-21.

Southwest State of Marshall, Minnesota had come into the game with an 8-4 record and successive road wins over Minnesota State and Briar Cliff.

"This was a good team that we beat," McDermott said. "We kind of jumped on them early and played a very good first half of basketball."

The WSC mentor said the strength of the Mustangs game is on the inside but the 'Cats shot that down.

McDermott said Craig Philipp stepped up and played big for the 'Cats. "If we're going to be successful the rest of the season, Craig has to play a big part," McDermott added.

Philipp paced the 'Cats with 19 points and was one of four players in double figures as Tyler Johnson added 16, while Jon Dolliver and Eric

Henderson scored 11 each. Chad Nelson was close to double digits with eight points. "This was probably Chad's best game of the season," McDermott said. "He stepped up and hit some big shots for us."

WSC hit 28 of 56 shot attempts from the floor for 50 percent while connecting on 18 of 24 free throw attempts for 75 percent.

WSC out-rebounded Southwest State, 42-34 with Henderson notching 11 boards. His fourth consecutive game with double digit numbers in rebounds.

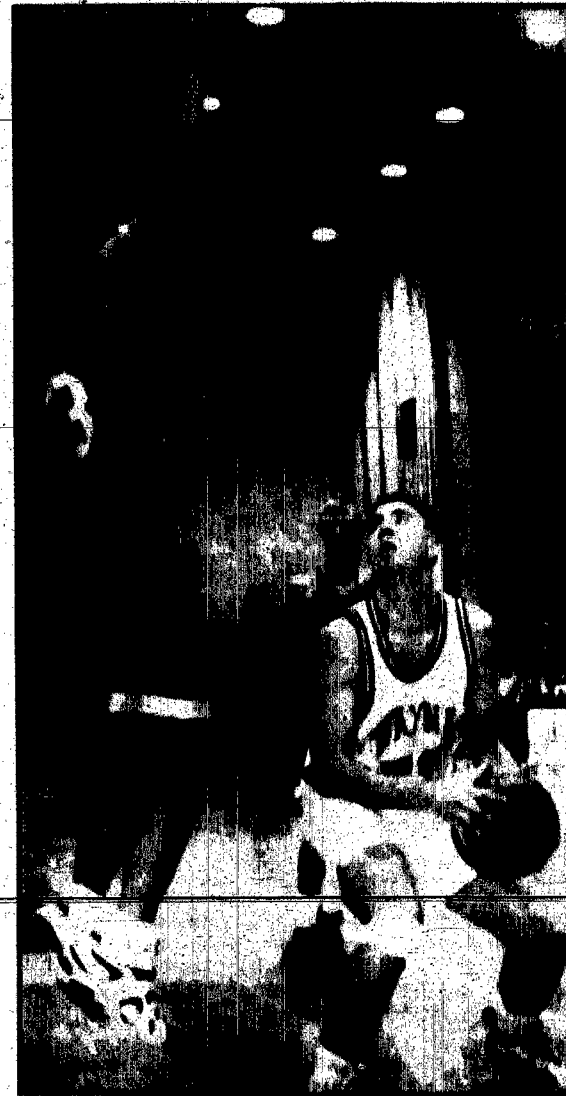

Wayne upsets rated Scotus

The Wayne boys and girls basketball teams hosted Columbus Scotus Tuesday night with Rocky Ruhl's boys tipping the seventh-ranked Mustangs by a 55-33 margin in overtime.

John McClarnon's girls fell to last year's state champs, 42-36.

Ruhl said the key going into the contest was for his team to put four solid quarters together in order to have a chance at beating a good visiting team.

"We didn't get the start we were hoping for," Ruhl said. "Scotus came out and scored 30 points in the first quarter."

The Wayne mentor called a time out, made a few adjustments and Wayne responded.

The Blue Devils trailed 12-11 after one quarter of play and was still down at the half, 28-25.

Wayne took the lead in the third quarter and took a 40-39 lead into the fourth period.

Scotus hit a shot in the final minute to tie the game at 50 which forced the four minute overtime period.

In overtime it was sophomore Joel Munson who stepped up and pulled a long jumper to tie the game at 53 and in the final seconds of the game, Justin Thiele drove to the would-be winning shot, was fouled and sank two free throws.

Scotus had four seconds left but the best they could get was a half court shot which drew nothing but air.

"This was a win we deserved," Ruhl said. "We had to have a win over a very good team, on our home court."

One of the biggest keys was the play of Adam Endicott who came off the bench to score a team-high 13 points while grabbing a team-high 10 rebounds.

Adam played very big for us, Ruhl said. "We need that kind of production from that position."

Justin Thiele and Joel Munson finished in double figures with each

scoring 13 points while Ryan Datt and Matt Meyer scored six each and Chris Dyer two.

Wayne, (6-1) will travel to play state rated, Florfolk, Catholic on Thursday before hosting Carroll on Saturday.

THE WAYNE GIRLS had their hands full with second-ranked Scotus, but John McClarnon's team played well.

"After a disappointing finish at the Wayne State tournament I felt we played with a lot of confidence and focus against Scotus," McClarnon said.

"I felt offensively we were very patient and worked for good shots. Defensively we did a good job of boxing out and rebounding the ball."

Wayne trailed 12-10 after the first quarter and 26-18 at the intermission. Scotus led 36-27 after the third period.

Heidi Johnson paced Wayne with 11 points while Cayle Olson chipped in 10 and Molly Hunter, as Jennifer Behrman tallied four and Kristina Hovak three with Jenise Ravelling adding two.

Johnson and Olson faded down night rebounds each for the Blue Devils who fell to 1-8.

Heidi Johnson scored 11 points to lead Wayne with Kelly Linder and Jennifer Brudigam adding seven each.

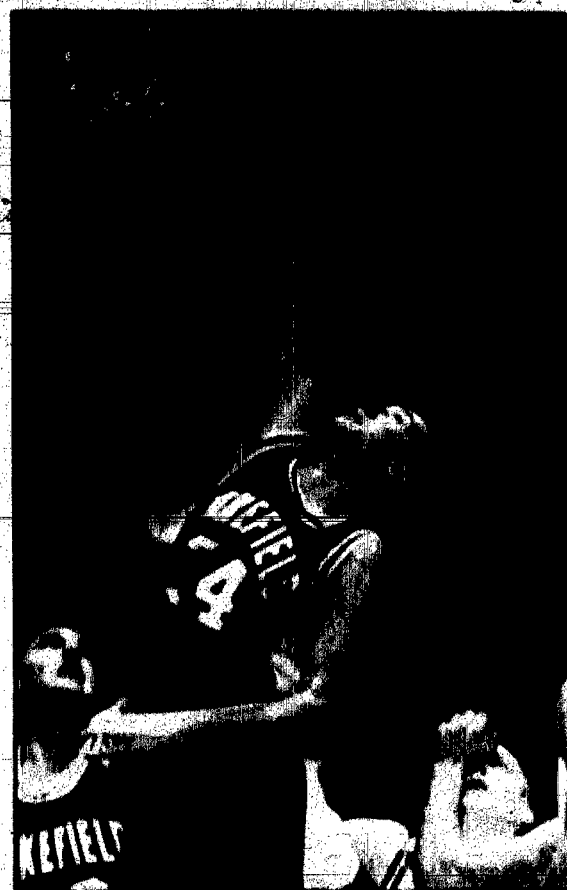
Gayle Olson added four points and Monique Hovak tallied three while Brooke Parker and Kimberly Black netted two each.

Amanda Lundman led the winners with 15 points. Egly netted one.

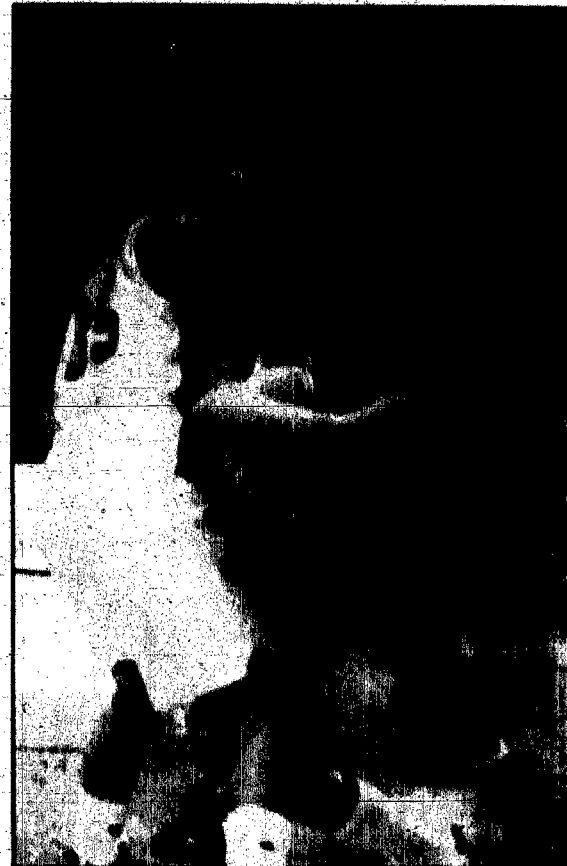

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

Suggestions offered for use of credit

In some parts of the United States, 90 percent of the bankruptcies being filed can be traced to the end result of out-of-control credit card use.

This statistic isn't so startling, considering that the typical American credit card user has a balance of more than \$1,900 per card. That's up from \$1,750 a year ago. With debt this large, most people pay only the monthly minimum payment, which can be a costly mistake.

It takes a long time to limit-rate credit card debt when only the minimum payment is made each month. For example, a balance of \$5,000 will take 221 months to pay off the entire bill.

Part of the problem with credit card misuse stems from how people perceive credit in the first place. There is a tendency to:

- 1. Not think of plastic as real money.
- 2. Look only at the interest on the bill instead of the total balance due.
- 3. Not remember the balance due on all credit card cards.

and

4. Think in terms of "If I can afford the minimum payment, I can afford things."

Credit card companies often don't help the spending situation. They will raise the limits on your card and will lower the minimum payment to 2.5 to 3 percent. This just helps keep the user in debt longer and paying more in total interest.

The best solution to managing credit card usage is to eliminate their use and pay cash for items. It is essential, however, to have a credit line. It comes in handy for emergencies, making reservations (hotel, airline, etc.), and establishing a history of purchasing with credit and an ability to pay off those debts.

The key is to limit the number of cards to one or two.

One card should be bank issued for emergencies or when cash flow is short. The card must be used and paid off each month, but the cardholder can make a monthly debit to the account.

The second card is for when payments can be made each

month. As each expense is accrued, it is paid off with each statement.

Limiting the number of credit cards now can be beneficial later when applying for a loan. Loan is more likely to be approved if you have a credit history, even if it is used and paid off.

If the potential exists to overextend on credit cards, they will consider the applicant a high risk borrower. Try to keep manageable credit history to 15 percent to 20 per-

cent of the annual take home pay. Finally, it may be helpful to track credit card spending daily. Wrap an index card around the credit card with a rubber band and write down purchases as they are made and how much was spent. This will keep the tally in view and may serve as a "check" before additional purchases are made.

The University of Nebraska Federal Credit Union describes these seven warning signs of a debt problem:

1. Using credit cards for routine purchases made with cash or checks.
2. More than 20 percent of the monthly net income is going to pay back credit cards and other loans (excluding a mortgage).
3. Borrowing money to make payments on existing loans.
4. The holder is frequently at, near, or over the credit card limit.
5. Paying only the minimum required on your credit card bills.
6. Paying bills late or putting off bills to the doctor because there might not be enough money.
7. Working overtime or a second job just to cover food, housing and other living expenses.

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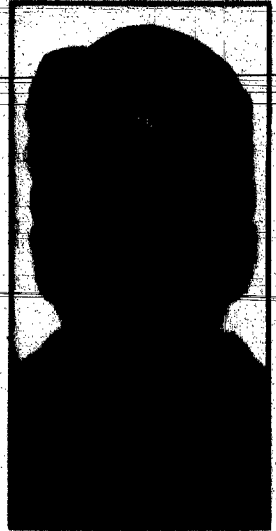

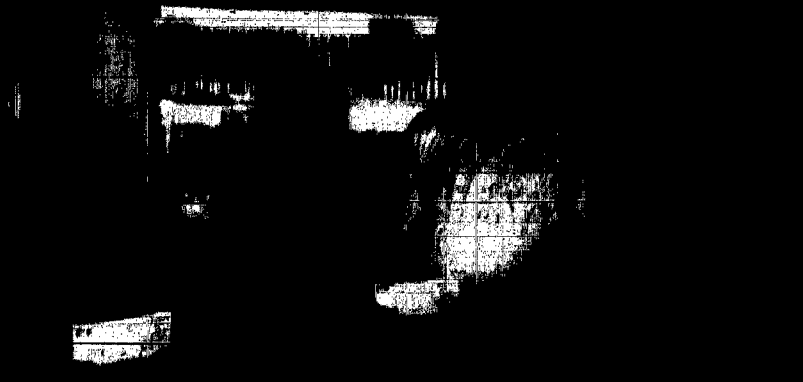
