

## Public forum held Auditorium discussed

Discussion of possibilities in regard to renovation of the Wayne City Auditorium was held during a public forum held last Thursday.

Approximately 60 people were on hand to listen to city officials ask questions and offer suggestions on the proposed renovation during the informational meeting.

When city voters agreed to a one-cent sales tax several years ago, a percentage of the money to be generated from the tax was earmarked for renovation of the auditorium.

The rest of the money was set aside for other two projects, storm sewer improvements and the renovation of the Library/Veteran Center. These two have been completed.

With just under two years of the tax left to be collected, it is estimated that between \$70,000-\$90,000 will be available for the auditorium.

Mayor Sheryl Duda told those in attendance that no decision has been made regarding the renovation project.

However, a facility evaluation five years ago identified four areas that needed to be addressed. These include the roof, the electrical system, the mechanical aspects of the building including plumbing and heating and meeting American With Disabilities requirements.

Public comments included the desire to keep the auditorium and working with the city and the county officials to find additional space for youth and recreational activities.

The addition discussion was held on the need to keep the stage and the status of the Women's Club Room.

The Club Room is under control of the Women's Club through an agreement set up when the auditorium was built. The Women's Club has rights of operating the space into the next century.

The auditorium was constructed in 1935 and the original electrical system is still in use. The current furnace is approximately 32 years old and is not energy efficient, according to the City Administrator.

Saltno told those present that there are no plans to do any of the work until all the tax monies have been collected. The work

would begin in 2000, after decisions are made regarding what will be done.

The Jan. 29 meeting was the first of several scheduled to allow for public input. Another will be held in approximately six weeks and may include dividing those present into groups to tour the auditorium to assess the condition of different areas of the building.

Saltno said that in terms of being successful, the meeting brought ideas and questions which are very necessary for this project. A number of ideas and possible uses for the auditorium were brought forth.

He added that even though certain areas need to be addressed, the question of what, besides taxes, can be done, allowed for a number of ideas to be brought out.



## Emergency warning sirens tested

The Wayne emergency warning sirens will be tested on a regular basis with the first test being at noon.

These tests will be held the first Monday of each month, beginning at 10 a.m. They will be conducted by the Wayne Police Department's emergency alarm staff and will include the siren warning system, the police broadcast radio system and the telephone system for the deaf (TDD).

Prior to the testing, the department will page the Wayne Volunteer Fire Department and

advise them of the upcoming test. The date for testing and the particular sirens to be tested will be listed.

March 2, (sirens) April 6, (deaf) May 8, (TDD) June 8, (sirens) July 6, (sirens) Aug. 3, (deaf) Sept. 7, (TDD) Oct. 5, (sirens) Nov. 2, (sirens) and Dec. 7, (deaf).

The siren system is a steady three-minute tone. The tone is an alternating high tone. The attack time is a sweeping tone of about 10 Hz.

In the event of severe weather conditions on the day of the

scheduled test, the test will be delayed one week or as not to cause undue stress upon the citizens of Wayne.

Lance Webster, Wayne Police Chief, emphasized that if there is an actual emergency, the city of Wayne does not sound an "all clear" tone.

"For example, if the tornado does go off a second time, it will mean that another possible tornado has been spotted, and that you should remain in your shelter," Webster said.

## Winside girl will undergo major brain surgery

While most 10-year-old girls are giggling about what they are going to be wearing to school, 10-year-old Winside girl, Sonya Slevers, is worrying about what she will look like without her hair. Sonya is currently in the Sloan City Pediatric Clinic Hospital undergoing a four-week period of brain surgery to relieve her of constant seizures.





## Conference covers farm issues

More than 140 people attended the fourth Northeast Nebraska Farm Management Conference held Saturday at Wayne State College.

Co-sponsored by the University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension and a number of local businesses, the conference featured Dr. Roy Laska as the keynote speaker.

Dr. Laska spoke during the opening session on a number of tax issues relevant to the farming industry.

He explained the benefits of contributing to IRAs, changes to inheritance tax laws.

Following Laska's presenta-

tion, participants were allowed to choose from a number of workshops of interest in their particular farming operation.

Among the workshops were those dealing with two generation farming and preparing to pass the farm on to another generation, priority rights, new technology in the seed market and Internet Agriculture.

The afternoon speaker was Colonel Jeff Phillips, a farm radio broadcaster who has been active in the community for over 10 years.

Phillips spoke of the need for small farmers to establish a niche

market where their products will be able to compete with large operations.

He cited several examples of hog farmers raising premium prices for raising hogs without any chemicals or implants.

At the conclusion of the day's activities, those attending were asked what the most important idea they gained from the workshop.

Answers ranged from marketing strategies to the fact that farming is a changing environment to ecological change taking place.



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

## Activities given for better health

Sometimes New Year's resolutions to improve a lifestyle turn out to be too ambitious, but the following simple habits are more doable and can salvage all that January enthusiasm.

By adding a couple new habits every week, anyone can establish all of them in a month or so. These suggestions were offered in "Choices for Living" (Winter, 1990).

1. Begin by eating breakfast 10 minutes every day. Eating breakfast will prevent overeating later in the day. A bagel and orange juice may be better than nothing. To keep satisfied for several hours, eat protein such as yogurt, milk or an occasional nut.

2. Walk for at least 20 minutes a day. Even 20 minutes can lower heart-disease risk. A standing walking date at the same time every day makes it harder to skip.

3. Take 10 breaths for 30 seconds daily, keeping flow at the office. Allow for productive use of time.

4. Drink eight cups of water every day. Even a tiny water deficit can

radically affect performance. Drink an extra cup of water for every 15 minutes of working out. Don't rely on thirst. By the time a person feels thirsty, she

is already dehydrated.

5. Stretch, give it at least five minutes, right after waking. It's a spin-time. Stretching is more effective when muscles are warm and malleable. Regular stretching keeps muscles and connective tissues more elastic and helps prevent lower back pain.

6. Buckle up. Never start the car without putting on the seat belt.

Wearing seat belts doubles a person's chances of surviving an accident.

7. Challenge your brain. Studies suggest that regular mental stimulation reduces both short and long-term memory loss. Do anything that's new: a crossword puzzle, chess, a card game.

8. Moisturize. This applies even to men. Apply moisturizer right after showering. Damp skin holds more moisture. Use a moisturizer that includes a sunscreen with a protection factor of at least 15.

9. Take a return. The average American gets only 100 to 700 milligrams a day, which is about half the amount recommended. The national Academy of Sciences recommends 1,000 mg for those 30 and under, 1,200 for those over 30.

10. Take time out. Scheduling time out in the daily planner makes it as serious as other appointments. Any break helps, but stress researchers recommend 20 minutes to change the tempo of the day.

And that's it. Ten simple activities to do every day for health. Just do it.

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# Helping others brings rewards

Thousands of Northeast Nebraska residents have given over 131,000 hours of volunteering to their communities during 1997. In return for working two hours helping others, they were able to purchase a food package at a 60 percent discount through SHARE Iowa.

Since expanding the program in 1996, area citizens have contributed a total of more than 194,300 service hours to their communities and purchased 16,617 food packages. The goal for 1998 is to grow an additional 25 percent by establishing new Host Sites and finding more volunteers. Four sites are located in the Omaha Metro Area, three in Lincoln and over 55 offices throughout Nebraska.

"We found this program meets both the physical and spiritual hunger in our society and recognizes that people are their own best resources," Kiefel said.

The food has a retail value of approximately \$30, but is purchased by SHARE participants for only \$14. The package content varies from month to month, but always includes a variety of fresh fruits and vegetables, meats and poultry, packaged food items and staples, like beans, potatoes and pasta.

SHARE Iowa is a private, non-profit organization and part of the World SHARE national network. It is dedicated to community development through the encouragement of volunteer service and the distribution of low-cost monthly food packages.

SHARE participants make a difference right here in Nebraska by participating in a variety of community service activities. Any service freely given to our neighborhood members including mowing an adult's lawn, yard, shoveling a neighbor's walk, visiting shut-ins, involvement in church-based groups or service organization (Kiwanis, Eagles, VFW, etc.), helping at school, coaching youth sports, being a tennis leader, even writing caps of mittens for other courts at SHARE service.

Anyone who voluntarily serves his or her community is eligible to buy the low-cost food package. There are NO INCOME requirements to participate. SHARE is designed to utilize all that people have to offer: their time, talents, goods and service. This forms a partnership that connects individuals to the community and provides a network for every one to help themselves lead a fuller life.



## Wayne county in CRP sign-up

Farm Service Agency (FSA) Nebraska State Executive Director Mark Bowen announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) accepted more than 178,000 acres in Nebraska in the recent CRP sign-up.

Nationally, 5.9 million acres of the nation's most environmentally sensitive cropland were accepted. Nebraska had 178,115 acres on more than 4,400 offers. The USDA emphasized that land accepted into the CRP would provide more environmental benefits than currently enrolled land.

"In Wayne County, about 42 percent of the offers submitted were accepted, 1,289.4 acres were accepted with an average rental rate of \$13.12 per acre," Bowen said.

"In Nebraska, 61 percent of the offers submitted were accepted with a rate above the national average acceptance rate of about \$9 per acre," Bowen added.

In Nebraska, 4,414 offers were submitted and 2,702 were accepted. Nationally, approximately 178,000 offers were submitted and approximately 73,000 were accepted. The state's average rental rate in this sign-up also increased to \$13 per acre.

Wayne County FSA officers notified their producers of whether their offers were accepted early this week. With these additional acres, the total acres in CRP in Wayne County is 12,952.1.

With these newly accepted offers, the number of acres enrolled in the CRP in Nebraska will increase from the current 1,001,925 acres to 1,003,214 acres. While most CRP contracts are 10 years, they can be as long as 30 years in length.

The goal of this sign-up, like that of the last sign-up, focused on obtaining the highest possible environmental benefits for the taxpayers money and keeping productive farm land in production," Bowen said.

The higher environmental benefits are due to a number of factors, including producer willingness to plant vegetation that provides more wildlife benefits, restore wetlands, offering acres with existing rare habitat and increases in the acres planted to trees.

"Without seeing the details on each offer accepted, the offers in Nebraska will probably be land that will benefit wildlife habitat, provide water quality benefits from reduced erosion, restore wetlands, provide more trees and provide more on-farm benefits from reduced soil erosion," Bowen added.

Persons whose offers were not accepted by USDA in this sign-up are urged to consider offering the land under the Continuous Sign-up which is available until 10/30/1998.

It has been indicated that it is likely there will be another sign-up in the fall of 1998.

"We are very pleased with the number of producers indicating a willingness to enhance their property contracts," Bowen said.

Nationally, this sign-up focused on soil erosion, wildlife habitat, water quality, air quality, conservation priority areas, long term retention and conservation.




## Student Center wins award
