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Two retirements announced at school board meeting

The Wayne School Board met Monday night at the high school.

A donation of \$6,700 from the Band Boosters for uniforms was noted. The date of their upcoming soup supper is set for March 19.

Attention was called to an honor given to faculty member Brad Webster from the International School of Band Masters. Webster was one of only 10 chapter members selected in Nebraska for this honor.

The regulations and retirements of two personnel were accepted by the Board. Ted Blumensaat and Carroll Heier are retiring. Blumensaat has been teaching art, drama and psychology at the high school and has been with the district for 28 years. Heier has been teaching in the business department and has been with the district for 10 years.

Dr. Zorn reported on the summer 1998 Drivers Education Program. He noted that a slight increase in student fees may be needed to offset increased costs to the district.

Recently residents pay \$125 and non-residents pay \$165 for the program. State aid funds used to be provided but must now be offset by residents.

The program has cost approximately \$41,000 with around \$2,000 coming in from tuition. There are 67 students signed up for the program with a few more possible.

A committee meeting is planned on March 26 at 7 p.m. at the Gardner Business Building on the Wayne State College campus to discuss solutions to faculty problems. The board has approved the Rando contract.

Proposals for the F.A. building were discussed. Three companies, Landis and Maels, Hamsywell and RW Bice have looked at the building and given their ideas for improvement. The latter company is top priority with thermally insulated windows, steel plates by pipes and roof as areas of needed improvements as well. The total amount for all of the improvements would be approximately \$400,000 to \$600,000. The proposals will be discussed further at the next meeting.

A federal grant of \$20,000 was received by the school for Distance Learning from the Department of Commerce. A demonstration was

given by Seth Northrup on the opportunities available to students near and far with the use of this program. Students will be able to access classrooms locally and work with the new technology.

The board approved the Sister School in Germany program which Fifth Administrator discussed with the group at the last meeting.

Dr. Jensen discussed legislation that has passed into law such as LB922 which deals with early retirement for teachers and LB1228, Education Quality Act, which uses lottery funds to promote state standards.

It was reported that mailing lists of Wayne High Alumni from the last graduation until present are being updated by Jean Blomensaat.

The next meeting is scheduled for April 13.

Time for choices

The time nears for selecting a school superintendent, and electing school board members. Figures available show 112 people employed in our school district, working with a budget of \$5,157,000. Eight hundred units of credit are offered in the high school. The district stands on the leading edge of computer technology, including a potential distance learning program implementing over 100 networked computers. We have a levy that ranks 201st out of 269 K-12's. Student enrollment numbers are over the 900 mark. Education plays a dominant role in any community, and is worthy of everyone's attention. Civic of education are felt by every property owner, consequently those who "invest" their taxes in education likely have a special interest in staff and board members qualifications. Now is the time for questioning those who desire school related positions. Public servants carry great impact upon children, consequently one should ask potential candidates regarding their perception of priorities. Questions one might ask: Does the candidate possess the necessary skills to function appropriately within an environment of diverse opinion? Does the candidate believe in conducting public business before the public, rarely using "executive session"? Is a candidate's vision unencumbered by any personal agenda? Why does the candidate desire the position? Candidates will likely be asked, "Why are you running?"

Does Nebraska need LB 1051?

Nebraska's senators may soon debate the passage of LB 1051. Already in the books is Nebraska Statute 29-2264 which permits a person who has been convicted of a misdemeanor or felony and is placed on probation by the court or is sentenced to a fine only, to petition the sentencing court to set aside the conviction. According to 29-2264, a courtly order to set aside a conviction shall nullify such conviction. LB 1051, still awaiting consideration, would allow the court to determine whether or not to expunge, erase, delete or destroy the records of a conviction which has been set aside by the court. If passed, the bill would allow any person convicted of drunk driving, among other offenses, and who also had an existing completed probation, to ask the sentencing judge to set the probation aside and wipe the offense from the defendant's prior record. But the embarrassment of having a DWI conviction on one's record is still a powerful deterrent to getting a second conviction. The Legislature must think very carefully regarding other by drinking and driving to have the same clean driving record as those who have no such conviction. You may want to voice your opinion to your senator.

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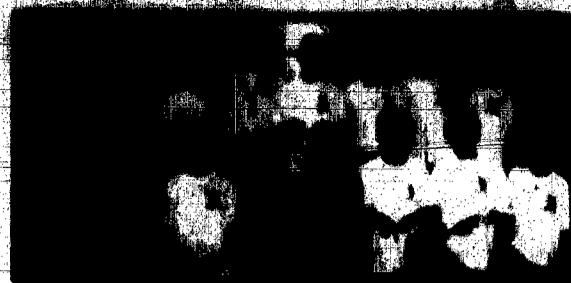

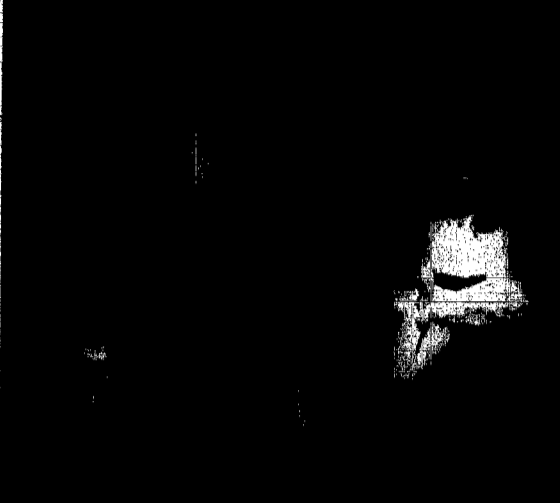

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Track & Field Teams Compete

The track and field teams from the Wayne County schools competed for the NEAA Division II Indoor Track and Field Championships with the victory of the NEAA invite.

McGowan, who earned All-America honors last fall in cross country, was clocked in a school-record time of 1:47.6 to beat many of the best distance runners in the state at any level. That time was well under the provisional standard of 1:52 and currently ranks him fifth in NCAA.

"James ran a great race," coach Brian Kavanaugh said. "He shed some weight. I think that's why he ran so fast for most of the race, then kicked him down in the final 200 meters for a 12-second personal best."

The rest of the track teams travelled to Vermillion, S.D. for the USD-Fast Chance Meet. Four more school records were set there, along with several personal bests.

For the men, Antonio Jackson broke the school record for the 60-meter high hurdles, clocking 1:09 seconds in the preliminary rounds and 1:06 in the final for fifth place. This was well under the old record of 1:14 set by Jerry Buckler last season.

The other school record on the men's side was Matt Knudsen's time of 26.19 in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles, which was good enough for third place. This was three-tenths of a second quicker than previous record set three weeks ago.

Other top performances for the men included Jeremy Murphy's first place leap of 22.1 in the long jump which was also a personal best by three inches. Antonio Jackson placed fourth in the 200-meter hurdles in 26:43 with 13 Killis placing eighth in 28:29.

Jeremy Covey placed fifth in the 3,000-meter run in a personal best time of 15:52.91, which moved him up to third at WSC. This was less than 24 hours after he ran a third personal best time in 16:00.00 for 10th place in the IJAT Invite.

Also, Malachi Brown placed sixth in the 60-meter dash in a time of 7.10, which set a second all time at WSC.

For the women, Maisha Knudsen nabbed her first individual school record, clocking 4:09.24 for third place in the 600. Her best was a second under the old school record set by Kandy Dalton in 1997. In addition, she outdistanced 4,800 other teams of Dave Erickson, Michelle Beatz, Amy White and Kyrilene Lawson of their school coached by Brian Reynolds, clocking 10:16.7 for fourth in the 1,600.

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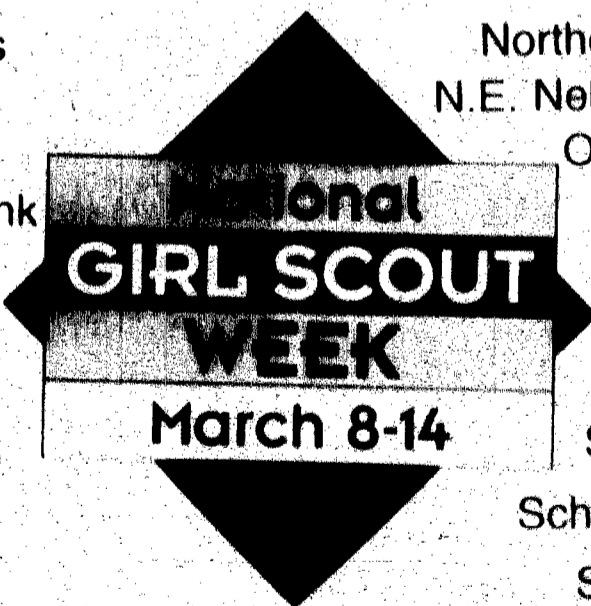

Irradiated meat safe to eat

While irradiation isn't a cure-all for food safety, it may be one tool for the future.

In fact, the national Aeronautics and Space Administration has used irradiated foods for years in the space program.

The Federal Food and Drug Administration on Dec. 2 approved irradiating red meats such as beef, lamb and pork. This approval is the last in a series of such decisions that clear legal hurdles to be able to use this technology to fight foodborne illnesses.



Measured doses of radiation can kill rapidly-growing cells such as those of insects, spoilage and pathogenic bacteria including E. coli O157:17.

The process has little effect on the meat itself because there is no cellular activity in food. Irradiation causes some minimal loss of very sensitive vitamins like thiamine in pork. Small amounts of vitamins change to another equally treatable form so there is no net loss.

Nine health organizations have endorsed irradiation, including the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the U.S. Public Health Service, the American Medical Association, the American Dietetic Association, the American Meat Institute, the Institute of Food Technologists, the National Food Processors Association and the World Health Organization.

The National Association of State Departments of Agriculture and the Army have also given their approval. Health authorities in about 40 countries worldwide have approved use of irradiation.

any residue. The food never has a radioactive substance but instead food passes through a low-level energy field.

Long-term irradiation, the kind that produces enough energy to kill bacteria and other pathogens in food, is possible in three ways. It comes from gamma rays produced by cobalt or cesium, or from machines that produce X-rays or streams of accelerated electrons.

However, irradiation cannot be used with all foods. It causes undesirable changes in dairy food oils and causes their softening in some fruits such as peaches and nectarines.

Much like pasteurization for milk, irradiation positively greatly reduces levels of bacteria and a longer shelf life.

Like light through a window, irradiation passes through food in the form of radiant energy without leav-

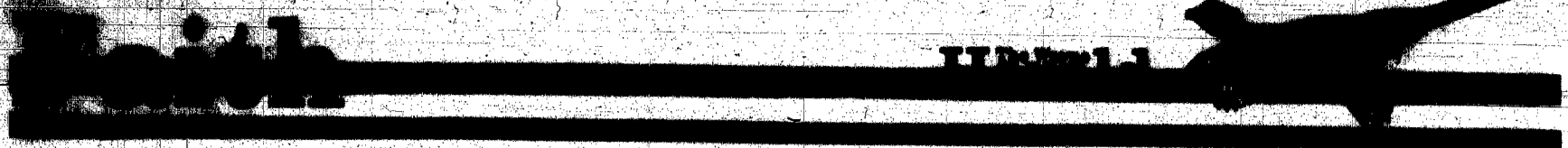

The Rev. Craig Holstedt gave the meditation and Phyllis He was pianist. Dorothy Stevenson took part in the reading, assisted by board members.

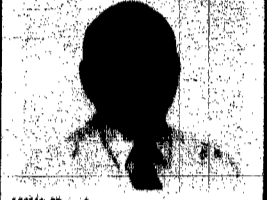

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Nose Sprays Give Migraine Relief

Absorption into the blood stream is rapid, and migraines may be relieved in as little as 15 minutes.

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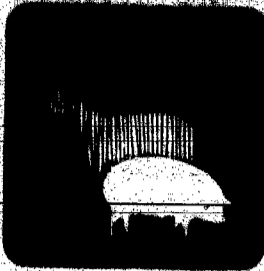

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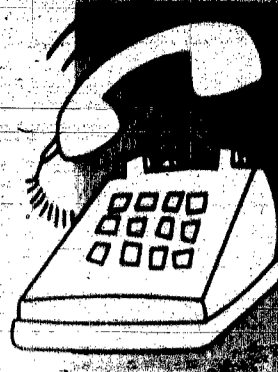

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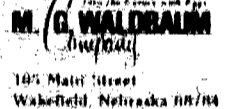
