

## Editorials

### Time for choices

The time nears for selecting a school superintendent, and electing school board members.

Figures available show 112 people employed in our school district, working with a budget of \$5,157,000.

Eight hundred units of credit are offered in the high school. The district stands on the leading edge of computer technology, including a potential distance learning program, implementing over 300 networked computers.

We have a levy that ranks 201st out of 269 K-12's. Student enrollment numbers are over the 900 mark.

Education plays a dominant role in any community, and is worthy of everyone's attention. Costs of education are felt by every property owner; consequently those who "invest" their taxes in education likely have a special interest in staff and board members' qualifications.

Now is the time for questioning those who desire school related positions.

Public servants can great impact upon children; consequently one should ask potential candidates regarding their perception of priorities. Questions one might ask: Does the candidate possess the necessary skills to function appropriately within an environment of diverse opinion? Does the candidate believe in conducting public business before the public, rarely using executive session?

Is a candidate's vision unclouded by any personal agenda? Why does the candidate desire the position?

Candidates will likely be asked to explain their opportunity to state their views.

### Does Nebraska need LB 1051?

Nebraska's senators may soon debate the passage of LB 1051.

Already on the books is Nebraska Statute 29-2264 which permits a person who has been convicted of a misdemeanor or felony and is placed in probation by the court or is sentenced to a fine only, to petition the sentencing court to set aside the conviction. According to 29-2264, a court's order to set aside a conviction shall nullify such conviction.

LB 1051, now awaiting consideration, would allow the court to determine whether or not to expand to waive, delete or destroy the records of a conviction which has been set aside by the court.

If passed, the bill would allow anyone convicted of drunk driving, among other offenses, and who had successfully completed probation, to ask the sentencing judge to set the conviction aside and wipe the offense from the defendant's prior record.

With the embarrassment of having a DWI conviction on ones record, it'll a powerful incentive to get that second conviction off the Nebraska court files. Whether it's a bigger offense, drinking and driving to have the same clean driving record as those who have no such conviction!

You may want to voice your opinion to your senator.

## Local News Summary

### Competitors

McGraw, who earned All-American honors last fall in cross country, was clocked in a school-record time of 14:47.6 to beat many of the best distance runners in the state at any level. That time was well under the provisional standard of 14:52 and currently ranks him fifth in NCAA-II.

"James ran a great race," coach Brian Kavanaugh said. "He chased most former UNL standout Ivan Harvey for most of the race, then kicked him down in the final 200 meters for a 12-second personal best."

The rest of the track teams travelled to Vermillion, SD, for the USD Fast Chance Meet. Four more school records were set there, along with several personal bests.

For the men, Antonio Jackson broke the school record for the 60-meter high hurdles, clocking 8.69 seconds in the preliminaries round and 8.76 in the final for sixth place. This was well under the old record of 9.14 set by Jerry Buckle last season.

The other school record on the men's side was Matt Knoll's time of 10.10 in the 100-meter intermediate hurdles, which was good enough for third place. This was three-tenths of a second faster than previous record set three weeks ago.

Other top performances for the men included Jeremy Murphy's first place leap of 21.1 in the long jump which was also a personal best by three inches. Antonio Jackson placed fourth in the 200-meter hurdles in 26.43 with J.J. Miller placing eighth in 28.94.

Jeremy Coyer placed 10th in the 500-meter sprint in a personal best time of 15.57.91, which moved him up to third all-time at WSC. This was less than 24 hours after he ran a third personal best time in 16.00. His 100-meter placement in the JAC Invitational.

Also, Michael Bravos played sixth in the 60-metre dash, with a time of 7.10 seconds, which was second all-time at WSC.

For the women, Martha Kneipel matched her first individual school record, clocking 10.92 for third place in the 100. She also tied a school record, the old record set by Kathy Hallen in 1997. In addition, the women's 4,000-meter relay team of Diane Hickey, Michelle Bratz, Amy Windz and Kristen however their school record by three seconds, clocking 10.16.73 for fourth place.

In the women's 3,000-meter

run, Kara Gibbons won in 10:04.4. Amy Vans placed third in 10:16.5, which was a 10-second personal best for her and Josie Vaneck was fourth in the long jump. Laura Martin placed second in 17.10, which was a personal best for her.

Dawn Collobit was not far behind, placing fourth in 18.11.5. She also placed sixth in the triple jump in 13.4.5, which equals her personal best. Kristen also placed third in the 400-meter dash in a personal best time of 8.1.04. Finally, Angie Kment broke the 40-foot barrier in the shot put for the first time, throwing 40.3 for a two-foot personal best and eighth overall.

#### WSC volleyball teams look over more

WAYNE—Northeastern junior college volleyball standout Kelli Parry has signed a national letter of intent to attend WSC and play volleyball for coach Darren Vans and the Wildcats.

Parry, a 5-10 inside blocker from Sterling, Colo., will have two seasons of eligibility remaining. She was an All-Region IX and Region IX, All-Tournament selection at Northeastern Junior College.

A 1996 graduate of Caliche High School in Riff, Colo., Parry earned all-conference and all-state honors as a senior. She was a three-year letter-winner in high school.

"With the addition of Kelli to our squad, we will be adding some experience at the middle position that we lost when we graduated three seniors," Vans said. "Although Kelli will be new to this year's team she comes from a very strong junior college program. A lot of our success will depend on how quickly she is able to pick up our offensive system."

Vans still hopes to sign two more players during the recruitment season, including an outside hitter and a setter. Parry follows the first player to ink with WSC, following Jessie Brown, Melanie Kersten, Courtney Koch and Lrika Vondrova.



## Irradiated meat safe to eat

While irradiation isn't a cure-all for food safety, it may be one tool for the future.

In fact, the national Aeronautics and Space Administration has used irradiated foods for years in the space program.

The Federal Food and Drug Administration on Feb. 2 approved irradiating red meats such as beef, lamb and pork. This approval is the last in a series of such decisions that clear legal hurdles to be able to use this technology to fight food contamination.

However, irradiation cannot be used with all foods. It causes undesirable flavor changes in dairy products and causes tissue softening in some fruits such as peaches and melons.

Much like pasteurization for milk, irradiation provides greatly reduced levels of bacteria and a longer shelf-life.

The light through a window-like radiation passes through food in the form of radiant energy without leaving electric fields.



Measured doses of radiation can kill rapidly-growing cells such as those of insects, to spoilage and pathogenic bacteria including E. coli O157:H7.

The process has little effect on the food itself because there is no cellular activity in food. Irradiation causes some minimal loss of very sensitive vitamins like thiamine in pork. Small amounts of vitamin C change to another equally preferable form so there is no net loss.

Nine health organizations have endorsed irradiation, including the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the U.S. Public Health Service, the American Medical Association, the American Dietetic Association, the Mexican Meat Institute, the Institute of Food Technologists, the National Food Processors Association, the World Health Organization and the Codex Alimentarius Commission.

The National Association of State Departments of Agriculture and the Army have also given their approval. Health authorities in about 40 countries worldwide have approved use of irradiation.


