Most of these ill-nesses and deaths occur, in the household where the cross-con nection occurs due to a higher concentration of the toxic substance being in the immediate area.

"If a person is spraying a chemical on his or her lawn with a hose sprayer and a construction crew sprayer and a construction a hits a water main, causing a momentary pressure loss. The chemical is sucked back into the house before the crew gets the water to the main shut off. After the main is shut off, the pressure returns to normal and the chemical may go to the kitchen sink where a child decides to get a drink, illness or death could occur by placing an air gap on water softener discharge hose

hose bib vacuum breaker is a small device designed to prevent backflow from getting into drinking water supplies. It is available for approximately \$10 at most hardware stores.

On outdoor faucets, the vacuum breaker installed must be a frost-free type.

"Anyone receiving a survey who does not understand the ques-tions, or anyone who is elderly or disabled and not capable of checking for cross-connections should contact the water department and ask for assistance," Reynolds said

Reynolds added that most necessary adjustments can be done by home owners at a minimal cost. Anyone with questions about the survey or cross-connections should contact the city's water department at 375-5250.

Who wouldn't like to save some money on a home improvement bill? But be wary of these time-honored scams designed to make you think you are getting a bargain. You may find out you will be paying more than you planned.

WE'LL GIVE IT TO YOU CHEAP IF YOU TAKE IT OFF OUR HANDS

This could be the pitch to entice you to buy a partial load of blacktop or concrete for your driveway. You have been meaning to repair it anyway, and this seems like a way to save some money. Later you find the price was much higher than you could have getten through a reputable pa contractor, and-a few weeks later the new concrete begins to break up, or you find dandelions growing through the new blacktop

"THIS MIRACULOUS NEW PRODUCT WILL FIX YOUR LEAKYROOF" "No need to re-shingle," you are told by the itinerant contractor. "This new roof paint" will do the trick." The "trick" is on you; as the first rain will wash that substance right off of the roof, and the leaks continue

"NEW SIDING AT-A DISCOUNT

An ad in the local paper or a telemarketing caller offers to side your home at a big discount. All you have to do is allow it to be shown as a "model home" for the company. It sounds like a great opportunity, so you accept But - the cost of the siding is so inflated you end up paying more than if you had comparison shopped.

Consumers will save time, money and aggravation by following some basic good sense rules:

- Use a local, well-established contractor. Ask for references and
- check with customers to find out if they were satisfied. * Get competitive bids on all work and be wary of any bid that seems too good to be true. DON'T accept high-pressure offers of offers that force you to make a quick decision.
- Beware the contractor who comes to your door with a
- business card containing only a phone number and no address
- or the one who is staying temporarily in a local motel.

It's hardly, worth being, a columnist if you only analyze what has already happened. So, I will go out on that perennial journalistic limb and say that, as of May S, it was my prediction that Bill Hoppner would emerge victorious in the Democratic primary, It was also my view (as of May 5) that Democratic hopeful Jim McFarland would do better than anticipated in Omaha

On the Republican side, it was slightly tougher. John Breslow; according to the view from here, effectively announced that he didn't expect to win. When he started running ads attacking Lincoln Mayor Mike Johanns, it meant that Breslow's personal polls showed behind Johanns and Rep. Jon Christensen, in that order. 10+ telling that Breslow attacked Johanns, not Christensen.) So, the forecast as of May 5

was that Johanns would harvest the GOP nomination. It was a tough call because it presumed that Johanns' would do well in central and western Nebraska (particularly in the Platte River Valley); and Christensen has campaigned as though he were run-ning for the 3rd District congressional seat and getting advice

from Billy Sunday. My thought in the final days of the campaign was that -Christensen needed to say something specific. Proclaiming that you're against crime and taxes and drugs and in favor of traditional values is a necessary jumping off point. When this was written, Christensen was still on the pier, but he hadn't set sail with any ideas. Johanns had his record as Mayor of Lincoln and with it the ability to tell local officials he understands what it is to deal with eral manufates. Breslow had his promise of a 25 percent property

tax rebate (and an accompanying promise not to seek a second term if he couldn't get it done).

As one addicted to watching the Republic's political doings, I'd give a good deal to know whether Breslow and Christensen suffered

net loss or gain as a result of their comments about gays. Sincere thanks to Joe Murray of

Firth for his letter concerning a re-cent column about Ernie Chambers, the Legislature and my thesis that too many citizens know too little about legislative and governmental process. Murray said some nice things

about our columns and went on to say that part of the blame for the public's lack of knowledge about the political process "rests on the press itself.

He wrote: "Recently, a group of citizens got together and so-licited detailed responses from the candidates for statewide offices. Many participated. A detailed press release was provided to the newspapers across the state, offering to give them the informa-tion for free and even offering to give the papers credit for collect-ing the information. 

Currently, Tourism is the third largest indus-try, right behind Agriculture and Manufacturing, in the state And ... it's growing! Some interesting figures com-led by the Nebraska piled by the Department of Economic Development indicate that Wayne County itself enjoys a healthy tourism climate. Consider, for example, that total taxable lodging sales in Wayne County are cur-rently around \$800,000 annually. By the way, this amount would yield about \$16,000 in lodging tax revenue each year, if the typical two-percent county tax was enacted. The State one-percent Lodging Tax is collected by all motels, bed and breakfasts, campgrounds, hotels and similar facilities throughout the state, and funds the Nebraska Tourism Division. When a county begins to collect the county lodging tax allowed for by Nebraska State law, that money returns to the county to be spent on tourism within that county.



The U.S. Travel Data Center estimates that the lodging sector accounts for 12.6 percent of Nebraska's total travel industry, The total travel industry includes both private and public transportation, food service, entertainment and recreation, and general retail:

Assuming this proportion also holds true for Wayne County, the estimated total annual travel tourism expenditures in the



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Producers knowledge promotes industry

With about 97 percent of U.S. cattle ranches and farms familyowned, at's no wonder that most beef producers think of their business as not just a job, but as a way of life

Many beef producers in Wayne County and across the county are finding that the best way to promote their lifestyle and industry is simply visiting with others about what they know.

Cattlemen and women every where are speaking to urban and trural school groups, writing letters to the editor at their local papers and visiting with others about what they do for a living: One of the ways some beef producers extend this grassroots industry support is with the help of a beet checkoff-funded Spokesperson - Development - program.

Founded in 1991, Spokesperson Development trains and equips beef producers and industry partners to be positive ambassadors for the cattle industry. In its seven-year history, the program has trained more than 2,000 spokespeople who have delivered more than 3.3 million pos itive impressions about beef.

To be part of the Spokesperson Development program, participants

attend a two-day training program and agree to conduct at least 12 activities promoting the beef industry in the year following their training. In turn, the program offers presentation and media techniques and keeps spokespeople armed with the most up to-date information. "Since only two percent of the

population raises food for the rest of us, it's no wonder that there's a lack of knowledge about the beef industry-especially among the urban population," says Lawrence Yates Executive Director, Nebraska Beef "When you can put a face Council. on the industry and show consumers that beef producers are their friends and neighbors, it builds trust not only in the person but also-the product.

"In Nebraska, we're continuing to build that traist through the next generation," Says Yates, On Feb. 28 the Nebraska Beef Council trained 20 sophomore and junior FFA members using the Spokesperson Development program

"This training kicked off a contest that will reward the students for conducting activities that promote the beef industry. The students will be divided into seven teams and judged on the number of people they reach with a year's worth of activities

The top three teams will be awarded prizes at the state FFA convention, and each member of the top-scoring team will be awarded a \$100 FFA Leadership Scholarship that can be used toward FFA state and inational program attendance, explains Yates

These efforts to improve attitudes foward cattle producers are paying off. As part of an ongoing research project funded by the beef industry, Peter D. Hart Research Associates in 1997 found that two-thirds (65 percent) of adults felt favorably toward cattle ranchers and farmer-seven points higher than in 1994

The most often cited reason people admire cattlemen and women is their dedication to their job. Among other reasons cited are the good care they give their animals and the fact that they provide food for the United States and the world.

"Building confidence in the people that provide our food supply is important," says Yates. "Thanks to Wayne County beef producers, we can continue to do that

Woolen garments should be cleaned before being stored for the summer. While many oils may not be visible, body oils are present in clothing. If clothes are stored away dirty and oily, many stains can become permanent.

Food stains attract insects and other substances such as perfumes and deodorants can cause fiber deterioration over time.

Some garments may have to go to the dry cleaners while some sweaters may be washed by hand. Ask the dry cleaners just to clean the garments and not press them. Money can be saved by pressing garments when they're unpacked in the fall

This is also a good time to determine whether the item will be worn in another season. If not, consider donating clean clothing

Proper storage of wood apparel can be protected by placing paradichlorobenzene crystals in a container in a closet where the articles are stored. Vapors from

and brown. A cotton bag is a better alternative. Store apparel in a cool, dry, well-ventilated area. A hot closed-off room, a damp basement or a garage isn't the proper environment.


Garments may be placed in chests, drawers or trunks. Be sure these areas are thoroughly cleaned and free from lint before placing garments in them.

Commercial cedar chips, sprays and oils may not be very effective. They lack sufficient concentration of the volatile oils and lose what they do have through evaporation. A well designed cedar chest must have at least three-fourths inch thickness of heartwood and must close tightly to keep the oil from evaporating to be effective against the larva. The oil of cedar kills the moth larvae, not the Herbal potpourri often found

on the market do not repel larvae. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has proven that many herbs are ineffective. These include allspice, baking soda, cam-phor, cayenne pepper, eucalyptus leaves and lavender flowers.

It is good idea check those stored items once or twice during the summer and early fall. An ounce of prevention will pay off in terms of maintaining the condition of clothing between season. Proper storage will also help to extend the life of your clothes.
