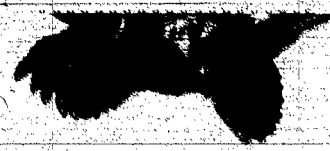

## Fire destroys barn

# Voters follow state trend

Wayne County Clerk Debra Finn said 35 percent of Wayne's registered voters turned out for Tuesday's Primary Election in the 13 precincts.

There were 2,060 people in the county who exercised their right to vote and when the dust had settled on the local scene, one incumbent was defeated and one incumbent was re-elected in races that had multiple candidates.

Wayne County Sheriff LeRoy Janssen retained his post in a closely contested race with Wes Greve.

Janssen received 829 votes for 54.8 percent of the total while Greve netted 685 votes for 44.8 percent.

In District 3, County Commissioner incumbent Dennis Dangberg was defeated by Myron Miller.

Miller had 250 voters in his favor for 40.5 percent of the vote while

Dangberg had 209 votes for 33.8 percent. Jerry Pospisil tallied 158 votes for 25.6 percent of the total.

On the state scene, Wayne County was comparable with the rest of the state in its pick for Governor of the State on the Republican side.

Lincoln Mayor Mike Johannig had 583 votes for 38.2 percent with runner-up John Breslow receiving 495 votes for 32.4 percent. Jon Christensen finished with 412 votes or 27 percent while Barry Richards and Lavern Bartels finished fourth and fifth in the voting, respectively.

In the Lieutenant Governor's race Wayne County did not follow the state trend as they voted for Elliot Rustad with 454 votes or 33.4 percent.

Dave Maurstad was the state's overall choice but in Wayne County he received 268 votes for 19.7 percent.

John DeCamp, Kevin Fry and Matt Butler rounded out the field in order.

The State Auditor race was won in Wayne County as well as throughout the state by Kate Witek with 795 votes for 60.2 percent while Steve Wacker netted 523 votes in Wayne County for 39.6 percent.

On the Democratic ticket, Wayne County voted in favor of Bill Hoppner which reflected the rest of the State. Hoppner netted 304 votes for 77.1 percent of the total while James D. McFarland was second with 77 votes for 19.5 percent.

The other local races that had multiple candidates included Kelvin Wurdeman edging Delmar Holdorf in the County Commissioners District 1 race, 230-207.

The County Surveyor's race was won by Terry Schulz with a 196-130 decision over John Steffen.

John O'Neill and Tom Henderson were the nominees for City Council Ward II in Wakefield while Sandy Wolfe and Alfredo Ramirez were selected for Wakefield's Board of Education.

## Surveys intended to catch problems

Wayne residents will soon be receiving a survey in the mail which the Wayne Waste Water department hopes will help prevent a tragedy from occurring.

"The City of Wayne needs your help. We are doing our best to eliminate cross-connections and prevent backflows from occurring in our water system," said Harold Reynolds, Water and Waste Water Superintendent for the city of Wayne.

Nebraska state regulations require a cross-connection survey to be completed once every five years. The water department hopes to get the surveys to customers by the end of May and would like to get them back within two weeks. City officials are hoping for a 100 percent response to the surveys.

"A cross-connection is any way in which contaminated or untreated water or any other substance could be drawn or siphoned (backflow) back into the public

water supply if a sudden loss of pressure should occur," Reynolds said.

Some basic examples of cross-contamination are a hose filling spray tank with the hose below water level, a hose sprayer that uses pressure to such chemicals on lawns and water softeners with the hose plumbed in floor drains or wastewater pipes.

Severe illnesses and death have occurred due to these cross-connections and backflows into public water supplies. Most of these illnesses and deaths occur in the household where the cross-connection occurs due to a higher concentration of the toxic substance being in the immediate area.

"If a person is spraying a chemical on his or her lawn with a hose sprayer and a construction crew hits a water main, causing a momentary pressure loss. The chemical is sucked back into the house before the crew gets the water to the main shut off. After the main is shut off, the pressure returns to normal and the chemical may go to the kitchen sink where a child decides to get a drink. Illness or death could occur

because of this," Reynolds said.

According to Reynolds, 99 percent of all cross-connections could

be eliminated with the installation of hose bib vacuum breakers and by placing an air gap on water softener discharge hoses.

A hose bib vacuum breaker is a small device designed to prevent backflow from getting into drinking water supplies. It is available for approximately \$10 at most hardware stores.

On outdoor faucets, the vacuum breaker installed must be a frost-free type.

"Anyone receiving a survey who does not understand the questions, or anyone who is elderly or disabled and not capable of checking for cross-connections should contact the water department and ask for assistance," Reynolds said.

There is no charge for the inspection.

Reynolds added that most necessary adjustments can be done by home owners at a minimal cost.

Anyone with questions about the survey or cross-connections should contact the city's water department at 375-5250.

## Entertainment hours to be shortened soon

After three readings, the Wayne City Council voted in favor of an ordinance which will amend the city code regarding hours of public entertainment.

The ordinance will become effective as soon as it has been published and will allow for public entertainment from 8 a.m. to 1 a.m.

Following a public hearing, the council approved a resolution which allows for a zoning Conditional Use/Exception permit for apartments on the second

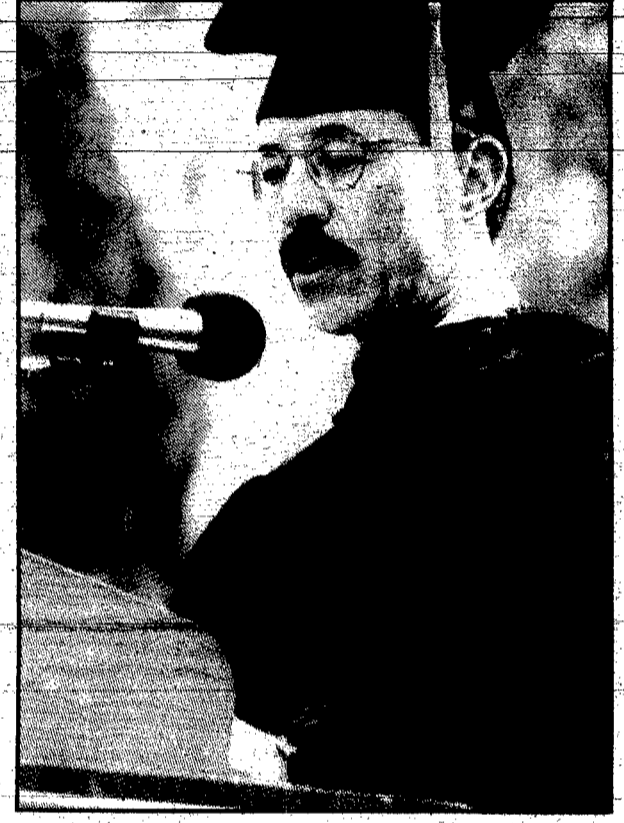
floor of Kid's Closet/Shaefer Maytag at 215 Main Street.

## District receives gift for History Day competition

Wayne Community Board of Education members learned that a gift of \$3,000 from the Nebraska Community Foundation is being sent to Wayne Community Schools for those involved in the History Day Competition to help with costs for the Washington D.C. trip planned.

Earlier this spring four eighth graders qualified to attend the trip.

A three percent pay increase for classified staff was an important issue discussed at the meeting. Further action on this issue will be taken at the June 6 meeting.

The E.S.U. #1-1998-99 service contract for \$179,796.97 was approved. Nursing will not be provided for the 98-99 school year as reimbursement is not in the 1998-99 contract so the E.S.U. decided to discontinue the service. However, a nurse is employed by the district.

The lease purchase agreement with Ameritas for funds to pay for new boiler and needed repairs in the K-4 building was presented and discussed. These replacements and repairs were approved during the April 27 meeting. The lease purchase agreement was tabled until the June 8 meeting.

Recent staff training included two days of inservice with APL Association Staff Development and Training. Discussion of teaching quality behavior was one topic covered during the training session.

Marlene Uhing reported on an external visit included in the ongoing evaluation process the school goes through to keep accreditation with the National Creditation Association (NCA).

A report was given by David Lutt on the Distance Learning Grant. Involved in the grant are four service units and 37 school districts. The grant will cover items such as computers, cameras, microphones and miscellaneous equipment. These items are needed in order for the district to establish a distance learning lab. The district is eligible for \$40,000 to \$60,000 through the grant for setting up the lab with between \$7,000 to \$16,000 expected from the district for line charges and equipment upkeep.

Marion Arneson and Sue Gilmore reported on the meeting last week with Rambo and community members. Plans and cost projections seemed to be what people want to see. The renovation committee will meet to continue the process.

The board voted to allow Ravi Raman from India to be an exchange student at Wayne High for the 1998-99 school year.

Upcoming school events include the second class play on May 18-19, Seventh and Eighth grade play on May 21, the end of the year luncheon at the high school on May 29 with early dismissal that day for students, and the chamber coffee honoring Dr. Jensen on May 22.

The next scheduled school board meeting is June 8 at the high school building.

### City receives NDEQ grant

The City of Wayne has been awarded a grant in the amount of \$5,900 from the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality's Waste Reduction and Recycling Incentive Grants Program.

In all, the state received 70 eligible applications requesting more than \$4.1 million for integrated solid waste management facilities and projects. Nearly \$2.3 million was awarded for 60 projects throughout Nebraska.

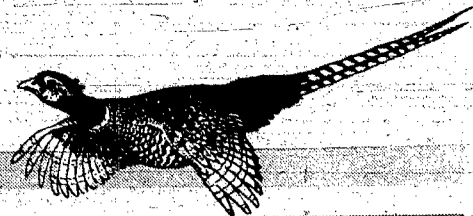
The grant program provides funds annually for integrated waste management activities in Nebraska. The funds awarded to Wayne will be used in the recycling program for baling cardboard, paper, cans and aluminum.

Each of the grant funded projects will have a beneficial impact on integrated solid waste management in Nebraska. The City of Wayne is to be commended for its participation in the program.

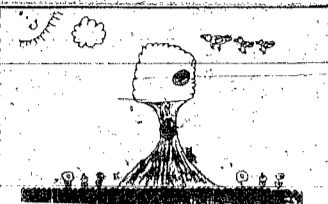

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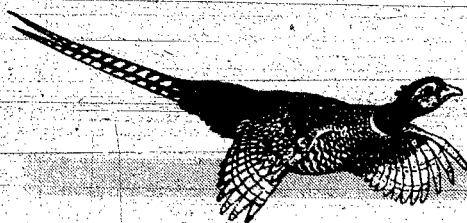

### HOME IMPROVEMENT SCAMS How to Avoid Being a Victim

American homeowners will spend over \$100 billion on home renovation and improvement projects this year. Over \$1 billion of that will be lost to scams and fraud.

Spring is the time when many homeowners are planning home improvement projects. It is also the time when we hear about increasing numbers of home repair scams.

Who wouldn't like to save some money on a home improvement bill? But be wary of these time-honored scams designed to make you think you are getting a bargain. You may find out you will be paying more than you planned.

#### "WE'LL GIVE IT TO YOU CHEAP IF YOU TAKE IT OFF OUR HANDS"

This could be the pitch to entice you to buy a partial load of blacktop or concrete for your driveway. You have been meaning to repair it anyway, and this seems like a way to save some money. Later you find the price was much higher than you could have gotten through a reputable paving contractor, and—a few weeks later the new concrete begins to break up, or you find dandelions growing through the new blacktop.

#### "THIS MIRACULOUS NEW PRODUCT WILL FIX YOUR LEAKY ROOF"

"No need to re-shingle," you are told by the itinerant contractor. "This new 'roof paint' will do the trick." The "trick" is on you, as the first rain will wash that substance right off of the roof, and the leaks continue.

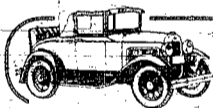
#### "NEW SIDING AT A DISCOUNT"

An ad in the local paper or a telemarketing caller offers to side your home at a big discount. All you have to do is allow it to be shown as a "model home" for the company. It sounds like a great opportunity, so you accept. But—the cost of the siding is so inflated you end up paying more than if you had comparison shopped.

Consumers will save time, money and aggravation by following some basic good sense rules:

- Use a local, well established contractor. Ask for references and check with customers to find out if they were satisfied.
- Get competitive bids on all work and be wary of any bid that seems too good to be true. DON'T accept high-pressure offers or offers that force you to make a quick decision.
- Beware the contractor who comes to your door with a business card containing only a phone number and no address—or the one who is staying temporarily in a local motel.

When this column is published, the primary election will be over.

It's hardly worth being a columnist if you only analyze what has already happened. So, I will go out on that perennial journalistic limb and say that, as of May 5, it was my prediction that Bill Hoppner would emerge victorious in the Democratic primary. It was also my view (as of May 5) that Democratic hopeful Jim McFarland would do better than anticipated in Omaha.

On the Republican side, it was slightly tougher. John Breslow, according to the view from here, effectively announced that he didn't expect to win. When he started running ads attacking Lincoln Mayor Mike Johanns, it meant that Breslow's personal polls showed what some media polls were reflecting—that Breslow was running behind Johanns and Rep. Jon Christensen, in that order. (It was telling that Breslow attacked Johanns, not Christensen.)

So, the forecast as of May 5 was that Johanns would harvest the GOP nomination: it was a tough call, because it presumed that Johanns would do well in central and western Nebraska (particularly in the Platte River Valley); and Christensen has campaigned as though he were running for the 3rd District congressional seat and getting advice from Billy Sunday.

My thought in the final days of the campaign was that Christensen needed to say something specific. Proclaiming that you're against crime and taxes and drugs and in favor of traditional values is a necessary jumping off point. When this was written, Christensen was still on the pier, but he hadn't set sail with any ideas. Johanns had his record as Mayor of Lincoln and with it the ability to tell local officials he understands what it is to deal with the twin beasts—state and federal mandates. Breslow had his promise of a 25 percent property

tax rebate (and an accompanying promise not to seek a second term if he couldn't get it done).

As one addicted to watching the Republic's political doings, I'd give a good deal to know whether Breslow and Christensen suffered

net loss or gain as a result of their comments about gays.

Sincere thanks to Joe Murray of Firth for his letter concerning a recent column about Ernie Chambers, the Legislature and my thesis that too many citizens know too little about legislative and governmental process.

Murray said some nice things about our columns and went on to say that part of the blame for the public's lack of knowledge about the political process "rests on the press itself."

He wrote: "Recently, a group of citizens got together and solicited detailed responses from the candidates for statewide offices.

Many participated. A detailed press release was provided to the newspapers across the state, offering to give them the information for free and even offering to give the papers credit for collecting the information. Only one catch. The papers were asked to provide an address to an internet site. Not a single newspaper has chosen to print the information. It is the most detailed collection of candidate views.

I'm not familiar with the Murray project but, as we promised in this space several months ago, when we hear from you, we won't keep it a secret.

By the way, the internet site to which Murray referred (and which I have not yet visited) is <http://www.lincolnconnection.org/nepolitics>.

The best news in Murray's letter involved young people.

"On a related issue, the gov-

ernment classes of Chase County have challenged the government classes of Dundy County to a get-out-the-vote race. The county with the highest voter turnout earns the class \$500 from a group of concerned citizens. If they can get voter turnout above 90 percent they earn \$1,000.

Hats off to the contributors and, most especially, hats off to the participating young people.

No doubt some thanks is owed from this corner to Gov. Ben Nelson for calling the Legislature into special session. ## Tourism important to Wayne County

National Tourism Week, celebrated last week, reminds all of us how important the Tourism Industry is to Nebraska. Currently, Tourism is the third largest industry, right behind Agriculture and Manufacturing, in the state. And...it's growing!

Some interesting figures compiled by the Nebraska Department of Economic Development indicate that Wayne County itself enjoys a healthy tourism climate. Consider, for example, that total taxable lodging sales in Wayne County are currently around \$800,000 annually.

By the way, this amount would yield about \$16,000 in lodging tax revenue each year, if the typical two-percent county tax was enacted. The State one-percent Lodging Tax is collected by all motels, bed and breakfasts, campgrounds, hotels and similar facilities throughout the state, and funds the Nebraska Tourism Division. When a county begins to collect the county lodging tax allowed for by Nebraska State law, that money returns to the county to be spent on tourism within that county.

The U.S. Travel Data Center estimates that the lodging sector accounts for 12.6 percent of Nebraska's total travel industry. The total travel industry includes both private and public transportation, food service, entertainment and recreation, and general retail.

Assuming this proportion also holds true for Wayne County, the estimated total annual travel and tourism expenditures in the

county becomes over \$6.3 million! The Chamber Tourism Council continues to develop a listing of

area events and attractions within a 30-mile radius of Wayne. We'd like to make these available to

motels, gas stations and restaurants so visitors can take advantage of everything there is to see and do in Northeast Nebraska.

From Belgrade, Yugoslavia to Wayne, Nebraska has been a dramatic change in the life of 19-year-old Tijana Tripkovic's life.

Tijana is currently living with Larry and Kathleen Grone and their family southwest of Wayne through an exchange program called Program of Academic Exchange.

"My home town has approximately three million people, so coming to this part of Nebraska has definitely been a change," Tijana said.

Tijana's parents are both teachers in Belgrade. Her father has earned his PhD and teaches history. In addition, he is doing research for a book. Her mother teaches history at a high school. The family also owns a candy store.

The government basically controls the businesses in my country. They buy the candy from different countries and then sell it to us," Tijana said.

year of Latin is also a requirement. Serbian is the official language of the country. Tijana also speaks Russian as well as English. Certain classes are held on different days throughout the school year, similar to the schedule on

the college level in the United States.

School is mandatory through elementary school. After that, students must take an exam to determine which high school they will attend. The schools are divided according to students' academic abilities.

At Laurel-Concord Tijana is taking Government, Art, Contemporary Literature, Writing

II, Calculus, Music and Computer Application. She lists Art, Government and Calculus as her favorites.

When asked about food here, Tijana said she enjoys Italian food and fried eggs. She also has eaten school lunches while here, something that is done in Yugoslavia.

"At home, all the students go out for lunch to a bakery or somewhere near the school," she said.

Tijana said there is a great deal of American influence in her country, including American movies and music, as well as McDonald's restaurants.

"We have adjusted to having Tijana in our household very well. She is very easy to please and fits

in well," said Kathleen Grone, Tijana's new "Mom."

While her in the United States, Tijana has had the opportunity to visit the zoo in Omaha, the "Nutcracker" ballet, and the Mall of America. She has also been to Lincoln, Sioux City and Norfolk and has done a considerable amount of shopping.

"Money is much harder to get in my country and people do not shop like they do here in America," she said.

She and the Grone's oldest daughter Timoni have bonded and said they have often been mistaken for sisters.

"We spend time together at the movies or hanging out with friends. We will definitely be friends for a lifetime. I'm sure there will be lots of tears when she has to leave," Timoni said.

Tijana will graduate on Sunday from Laurel-Concord High School and will return to her home on Tuesday, May 19.

While she says she has enjoyed her stay in rural Nebraska, she said her time here has helped her to grow up and change. She also appreciates her parents more.

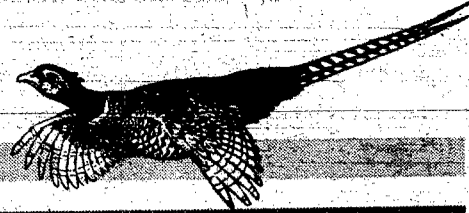

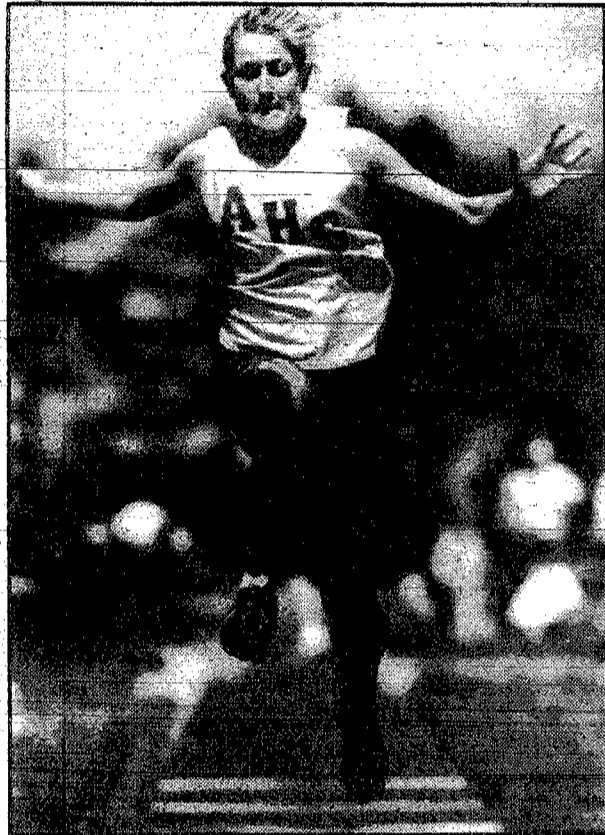
Jess Miller finished third in the shot put with a 32-0 toss and she

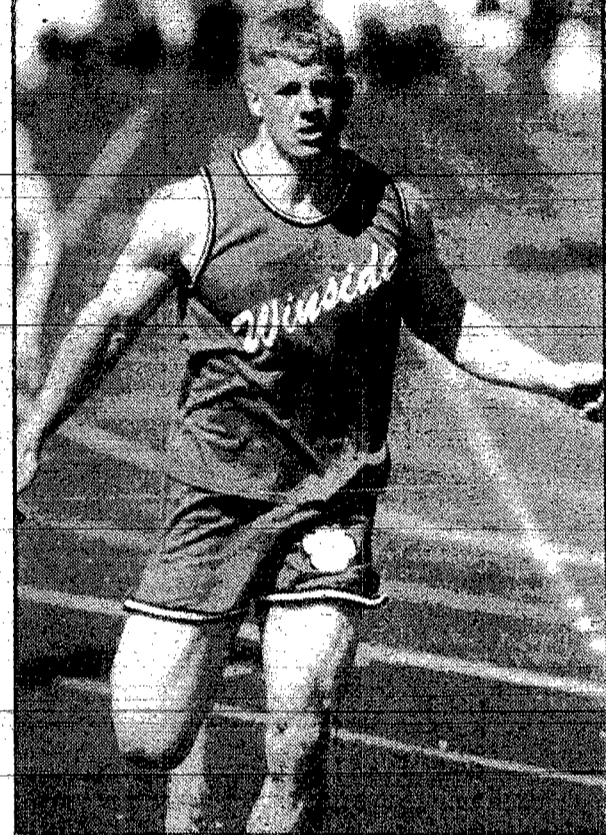

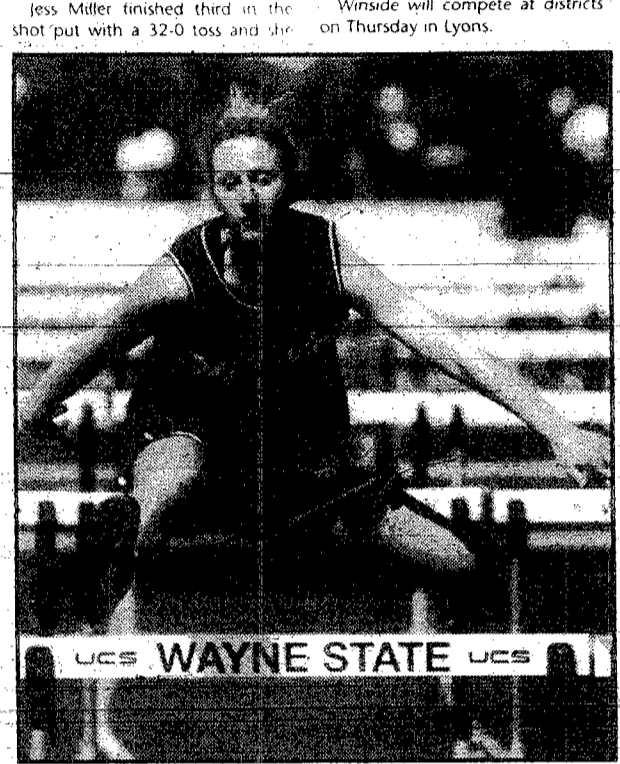

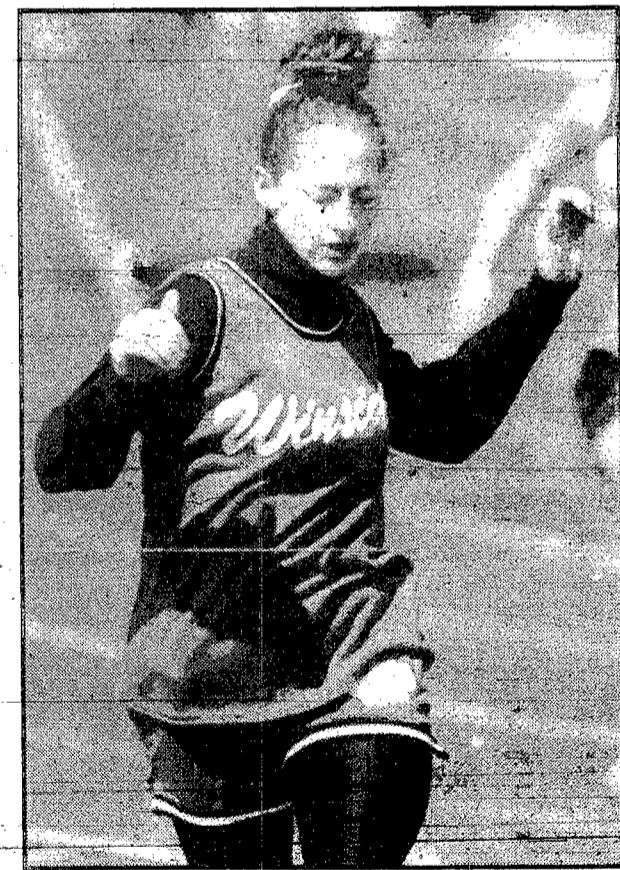
Allen's Stacey Martinson soars in the long jump during the action at the Winside Invitational last week.

We'll try to see if there are reasonable connections with those writers living before us and the Midlands writers such as Neihardt, Sandoz and others," Kloefkorn said.

"We'll go back to the beginnings, to the Greeks. We'll put past and present together in a meaningful way. There are a lot of things we can read and talk about. We'll make an effort to find likeness," Kloefkorn said.

The course will give English students opportunities to explore connections between classical and modern works and English teachers will be able to develop new perspectives and materials for their literature classes.

"Teachers will be able to put a project together. If they are working with the Greeks, or if they want to put together a project on what joins the tragic love stories of Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet with Cather's O'Pioneers, they will end up with some sources and something they can use in class," Kloefkorn said.

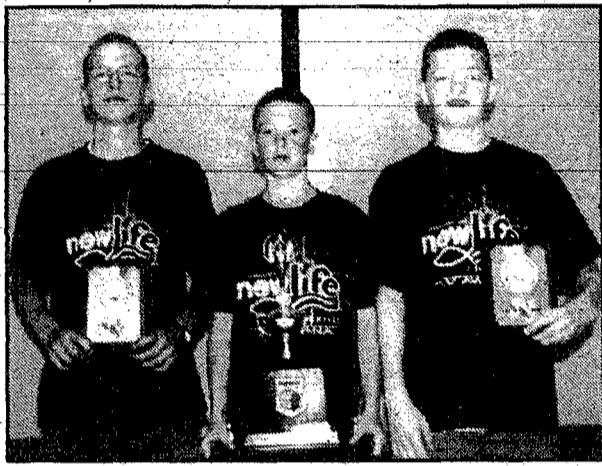

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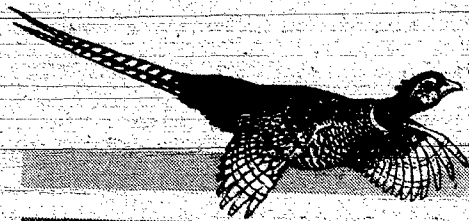
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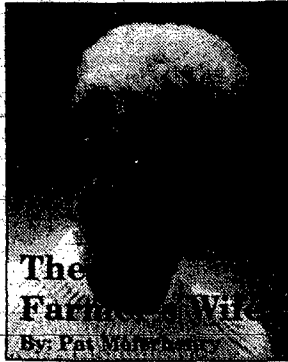
## Count blessings along life's journey

## Producers knowledge promotes industry

With about 97 percent of U.S. cattle ranches and farms family-owned, it's no wonder that most beef producers think of their business as not just a job, but as a way of life.

Many beef producers in Wayne County and across the county are finding that the best way to promote their lifestyle and industry is simply visiting with others about what they know.

Cattlemen and women everywhere are speaking to urban and rural school groups, writing letters to the editor at their local papers and visiting with others about what they do for a living. One of the ways some beef producers extend this grassroots industry support is with the help of a beef checkoff-funded Spokesperson Development program.

Founded in 1991, Spokesperson Development trains and equips beef producers and industry partners to be positive ambassadors for the cattle industry. In its seven-year history, the program has trained more than 2,000 spokespeople who have delivered more than 3.3 million positive impressions about beef.

To be part of the Spokesperson Development program, participants

attend a two-day training program and agree to conduct at least 12 activities promoting the beef industry in the year following their training. In turn, the program offers presentation and media techniques and keeps spokespeople armed with the most up-to-date information.

"Since only two percent of the population raises food for the rest of us, it's no wonder that there's a lack of knowledge about the beef industry - especially among the urban population," says Lawrence Yates, Executive Director, Nebraska Beef Council. "When you can put a face on the industry and show consumers that beef producers are their friends and neighbors, it builds trust not only in the person but also the product."

"In Nebraska, we're continuing to build that trust through the next generation," says Yates. On Feb. 28, the Nebraska Beef Council trained 20 sophomore and junior FFA members using the Spokesperson Development program.

"This training kicked off a contest that will reward the students for conducting activities that promote the beef industry. The students will

be divided into seven teams and judged on the number of people they reach with a year's worth of activities.

The top three teams will be awarded prizes at the state FFA convention, and each member of the top-scoring team will be awarded a \$100 FFA Leadership Scholarship that can be used toward FFA state and national program attendance," explains Yates.

These efforts to improve attitudes toward cattle producers are paying off. As part of an ongoing research project funded by the beef industry, Peter D. Hart Research Associates in 1997 found that two-thirds (65 percent) of adults felt favorably toward cattle ranchers and farmer-seven points higher than in 1994.

The most often cited reason people admire cattlemen and women is their dedication to their job. Among other reasons cited are the good care they give their animals and the fact that they provide food for the United States and the world.

"Building confidence in the people that provide our food supply is important," says Yates. "Thanks to Wayne County beef producers, we can continue to do that."

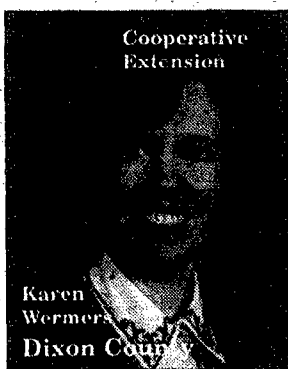
## Garments need care before storage

Woolen garments should be cleaned before being stored for the summer. While many oils may not be visible, body oils are present in clothing. If clothes are stored away dirty and oily, many stains can become permanent.

Food stains attract insects and other substances such as perfumes and deodorants can cause fiber deterioration over time.

Some garments may have to go to the dry cleaners while some sweaters may be washed by hand. Ask the dry cleaners just to clean the garments and not press them. Money can be saved by pressing garments when they're unpacked in the fall.

This is also a good time to determine whether the item will be worn in another season. If not, consider donating clean clothing to charitable organizations. Some second-hand stores don't accept winter clothing this time of year, so they could be stored in a separate place until later.

Proper storage of wool apparel can be protected by placing paradichlorobenzene crystals in a container in a closet where the articles are stored. Vapors from the evaporating chemical kills the whitish worm larva that damages clothes.

Plastic bags are a poor choice for storing woolen articles. Clothes can't breathe in plastic and it gets

sticky and brown. A cotton bag is a better alternative. Store apparel in a cool, dry, well-ventilated area. A hot closed-off room, a damp basement or a garage isn't the proper environment.

Garments may be placed in chests, drawers or trunks. Be sure these areas are thoroughly cleaned and free from lint before placing garments in them.

Commercial cedar chips, sprays and oils may not be very effective. They lack sufficient concentration of the volatile oils and lose what they do have through evaporation. A well designed cedar chest must have at least three-fourths inch thickness of heartwood and must close tightly to keep the oil

from evaporating to be effective against the larva. The oil of cedar kills the moth larvae, not the smell.

Herbal potpourri often found on the market do not repel larvae. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has proven that many herbs are ineffective. These include allspice, baking soda, camphor, cayenne pepper, eucalyptus leaves and lavender flowers.

It is good idea check those stored items once or twice during the summer and early fall. An ounce of prevention will pay off in terms of maintaining the condition of clothing between seasons. Proper storage will also help to extend the life of your clothes.
