Seniors from five area high schools participated in commencement exercises over the weekend.

Clear skies and warm temperatures greeted the graduates and those in attendance at Wayne High's graduation Saturday.

The ceremonies took place in the Willow Bowl on the Wayne State College Campus.

David Ensz gave the salutatorian address and thanked those who had helped the class of 1998 through the years.

Matt Meyer was chosen as the 1998 Valedictorian and during his speech he thanked God, his parents, teachers and friends for

helping him get to this point in his life.

This year's commencement speaker was Dan Johnson, who was a teacher in the Wayne School system for 25 years.

Johnson focused his speech on the word "predict" and told his audience that persistence, reading, enthusiasm, dreaming, integrity, common sense and time are vital parts of success.

The class of 1998 was the 98th to graduate from Laurel-Concord High School. This year's class contained 44 members.

In Wayne, the Boy Scouts will be putting up small flags at Greenwood Cemetery on Friday, May 22 at 6 p.m.

Volunteers are needed to put up flag poles on Sunday evening at 6 p.m. and flags on Monday morning at 6 a.m.

On Memorial Day, the program will begin at 10 a.m. at the cemetery, weather permitting. In case of inclement weather, the services will be held at the city auditorium.

Music for the services will be provided by the Wayne High School Band. This year's speaker will be Leo Ahmann.

Persons wishing to get to Greenwood Cemetery should take Logan Street to Eighth Street and then go west to Sherman Street. From that point, go north to Fairacres Road and go west as far as possible and come into the cemetery from the north.

at the Wayne Vet's Club.

Volunteers will also be needed on Monday evening at 6 p.m. to take down the flags and poles.

WSC joins athletic conference

Wayne State College Athletic Director Pete Chapman announced at a press conference that the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (NSIC) has accepted Wayne State College's application to become a member of their conference. The NSIC presidents voted earlier today to add Wayne State and two other schools to the conference which will now have 10 members. The new schools will begin competing on the conference schedule during the 1999-2000 seasons.

"Obviously, we are very pleased to be joining this expanding conference," Chapman said. We have had a long standing, very positive relationship with the Northern Sun schools. They have been very helpful to us over the years with scheduling, especially in football and men's and women's basketball. "Hopefully, we can return the favor to the conference by bringing competitive teams with good students from Wayne State

College," Chapman commented. He said the Wildcat athletics program has a combined overall grade point average of above a 3.0 (on a 4.0 scale) for each of the last five consecutive semesters.

Chapman noted the move into the conference marks the end of a ten year run as an independent. WSC became a member of the NCAA Division II, and was left without a conference affiliation in 1988, when the Central States Intercollegiate Conference dissolved.

"This decision to join the Northern Sun Conference will change the way we do business as an athletic department," Chapman said. "It will obviously help with scheduling in all 15 sports we field, and it will help give more exposure to all of our teams." Chapman noted the student athletics will also benefit by being able to compete for conference championships and individual honors.

"This will allow our teams' coaches and players to compete through the conference avenues for regional and national competition," he said. WSC fans will also benefit from the alliance with the NSIC. Chapman noted conference play provides built-in rivalries and an atmosphere to the competition.

Wayne State has said it will join the Northern Sun Conference pending approval by the Nebraska State College System Board of Trustees. Other schools accepted by the NSIC presidents are: the University of Minnesota-Crookston and Concordia College in St. Paul, Minn. Both are NAIA schools who will be applying for NCAA Division II membership in June.

The Conference's seven current members are: Northern State University, Bemidji State University, Moorhead State University, Southwest State University, University of Minnesota-Duluth, Winona State University, and the University of Minnesota-Morris.

Council considers bond request

In a special meeting, the Wayne City Council took steps to move forward on a request from Pacific Coast Feather Company/Restful Knights Inc. for industrial development bond financing.

Resolution 98-58 allows the council to declare its intentions to authorize the sale of \$2,750,000 tax-exempt industrial development revenue bonds for a Restful Knights, Inc. project.

The council also set the date

for a public hearing pertaining to the issuance of these bonds. The hearing will be on Tuesday, June 9 at or about 7:35 p.m.

The only other agenda item at Monday's special meeting was to consider the recommendation for the city's group major medical health insurance.

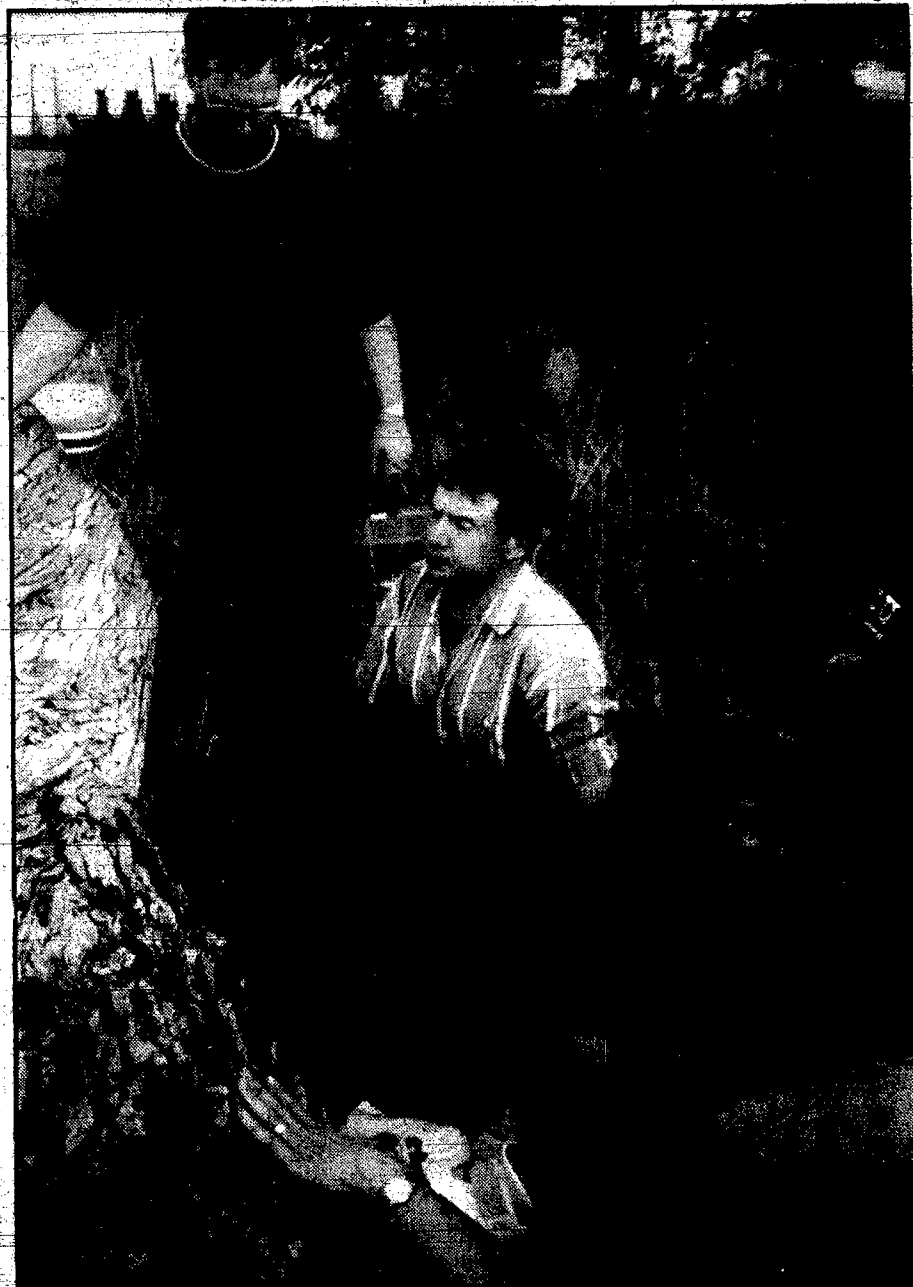
Council members discussed increases in rates and changes in coverage. In addition, the need for an agent of record to handle claims questions was discussed.

Several city employees were at the meeting and stated that they and their departments did not see

the need for the service and would rather keep additional benefits in the insurance package.

Gary Boehle and Steve Muir of First National Agency, which serves as the current agent of record, were at the meeting and said that in the six months they have served in this capacity, their office has had approximately five contacts per month.

The council voted to continue with Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Nebraska but will discuss the specific details of proposed premium reductions at a future meeting.

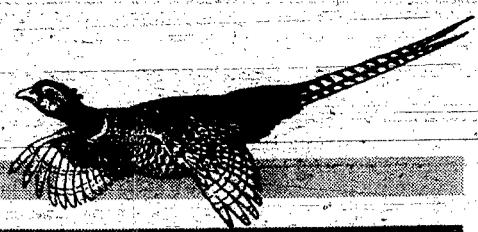


Mock Tornado Drill

Reflections on the election

Here's a joke that's been going around the Capitol:

A hot tip just came in on State Auditor John Breslow's "waste-fraud-and-abuse" hotline. It seems some guy just blew \$3 million on a run for governor!

Last week's Republican primary proved something about Nebraska.

It takes more than money to win elections - or John Breslow would have had the Republican nomination.

It takes more than looking good on TV - or Jon Christensen would have had it.

The nomination of Mike Johanns demonstrated that a successful campaign takes time, organization and hard work. Thirty-two months. More than 100,000 miles on the family car. A campaign organization in each of 93 counties.

But Ray assured me that Johanns had worked hard to build a grassroots organization. It would be enough to carry him.

Frankly, I thought Ray was being idealistic and overly optimistic. But as the months passed and Johanns was still in it - and getting good reviews in some quarters, I thought "Maybe Ray is right."

Some of those in the media are depicting Johanns' triumph as a victory of substance over style, of persistence over flash and cash.

It is true that Johanns spent the least of the three candidates. And he certainly isn't flashy.

I asked him on election night what magic brought him such a wide margin of victory. He waved his arms toward the room full of

volunteers and supporters and said "It's hard work. It's these people and their hard work."

I asked him what his strategy would be for the fall campaign.

"More hard work," he said. I relayed the comments on to Omaha, where another reporter was standing by to take my feeds for the World-Herald's Page 1 story.

"He really is boring," the reporter said.

Boring probably is too harsh a word. It's just that Johanns, who served on the Lancaster County Board before becoming mayor, is deeply involved and knowledgeable about the workings of government. He's a profoundly attractive candidate to the folks who work in and around the Capitol because he knows the system and he speaks their language.

But that can seem pretty dry to those of us who aren't that fascinated by the nuances of government policy.

The lobbyists and pundits interviewed Tuesday night were ecstatic about the prospect of Johanns facing off against Democratic nominee Bill Hopperner - a veteran of the Exon and Kerrey administrations, with roughly an equal amount of government service under his belt.

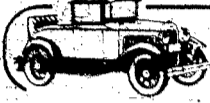
At least, they said, we're going to have a substantive and detailed discussion of the issues. A detailed discussion of tax cuts, economic development, family policies and human services. This is going to raise the level of politics in Nebraska, they said.

Oh boy. Two policy wonks getting down and dirty. Let the excitement begin!

Breslow had made it clear he was willing to turn it into a multi-million-dollar campaign. Other potential candidates were bowing out of the race. It was just too much cash.

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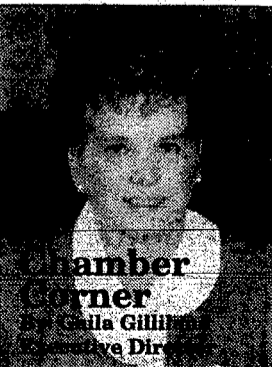

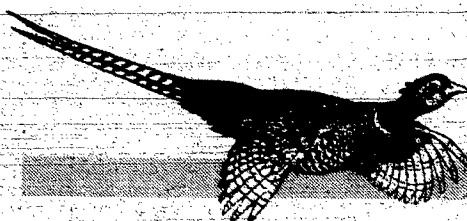

The Wayne golf team captured championship honors at the Class B-2 District Golf Tournament, Monday afternoon at the Columbus Elks Country Club.

The Blue Devils needed 21 holes to claim the gold as they tied with Columbus Scotus for the district title and the ensuing playoff went three holes before a champion was determined.

Wayne and Scotus tied a 324 with Columbus Lakeview also qualifying for state with a third place score of 333.

David City, 344; Schuyler, 344; Ord, 356; Wahoo, 362; Pierce, 366; O'Neill, 370; Wisner-Pilger-Boemer, 372; Elkhorn Mt. Michael, 387; Madison, 396 rounded out the field of teams in order.

"A tough golf course on a very tough day to play," Wayne coach Terry Munson said. "While there was no win, 90 degrees and high humidity left players drained of energy and battling dehydration."

Munson said it was a roller coaster day for the Blue Devils. Joel Munson was in the final group with all other team scores that were in contention already posted," he added. "We knew Joel had to shoot

a 37 on the back nine to tie Scotus. Only three scores in the field were sub-40 on the back with only one 37 being posted."

Munson, however, was playing extremely good golf on the longer back nine. In fact, the sophomore was one-under par after the first seven holes before suffering a double bogey on 17. He parred 18 to force the tie with Scotus.

"It was a real tribute to the team to go from the emotional drain of waiting for that final score to regrouping for the team playoff," Munson said.

The playoff consisted of the four scoring golfers off each team and then it was divided into two, four-somes with each team's one and two golfers playing together and then the three and four golfers.

The first hole in the team playoff saw Scotus go birdie-birdie while Wayne went par-par.

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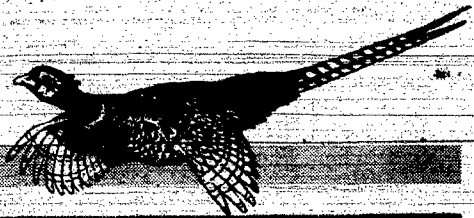
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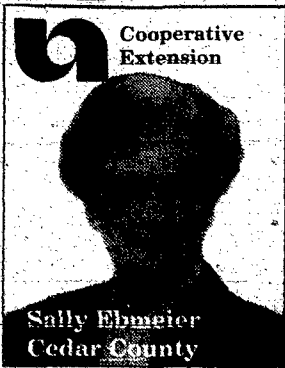


Medical records available to many

Access to medical records currently is available to various individuals and organizations besides one's physician. In order to obtain medical services, many consumers must sign a "blanket waiver" or "general consent form." Once this type of waiver is signed, health care providers can release medical information to insurance agencies, government agencies and employer, to name a few.

Currently, no federal laws protect the confidentiality of medical records. There are several risks of misuse of medical information that may prove to be harmful. These risks include discrimination, loss of employment, loss of insurance, increased costs for health insurance and credit accessibility.

Presently, the proposed Medical Records Confidentiality Act would create uniform federal



rules for the disclosure of health information. This bill was introduced in the Senate on Oct. 24, 1995 by Senators Robert Bennet and Patrick Leahy. The Medical Records Confidentiality Act would

specify who may have access to medical records and under what circumstances they may view them.

Since this bill has not been passed yet, consumers need to be aware of actions that can be taken to protect the privacy of their medical records.

1. When filling out an insurance application, carefully read the statement that authorizes the release of medical records. If the statement is too broad, make modifications and initialize any changes made.

2. Disclose only the information that is relevant to your health at doctor visits. If you want a specific health condition to be confidential between you and your physician, take a written request to your doctor that cancels your consent to release medical information to the insurance company or to your

employer for that particular visit.

3. Inspect medical records for accuracy.

4. Contact the medical records department of the health care provider and ask about procedures for obtaining a copy of the records. It is also important to remember that medical records should only contain facts about you as a patient. They should not contain any personal criticism or offhand comments.

5. Inquire if the doctor has a policy of using cordless phones, cellular phones and fax machines when discussing or sending medical information. These methods of communication can be overheard or seen by other people.

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According to a recent report in *Modern Medicine*, folic acid deficiencies may trigger up to 40% of the heart attacks and strokes that are suffered by men.

Judith Hall, M.D., points out that high blood levels of *homocysteine* (a naturally occurring compound) are associated with both heart attack and stroke. Homocysteine blood levels can be reduced by eating foods that contain folic acid (e.g., apples, oranges, spinach, Brussels sprouts). According to Dr. Hall, about 30% of people have high homocysteine levels and need extra folic acid - about 400 mcg. per day. Some multiple vitamin preparation contain 400 mcg of this vitamin.

A study recently reported in *Journal of the American Medical Association* showed that women also are at risk. In this study of over 5,000 men and women, it was found that low blood folic acid levels were associated with risk of fatal heart disease.

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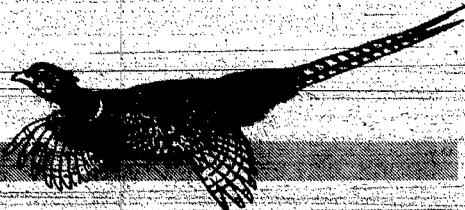

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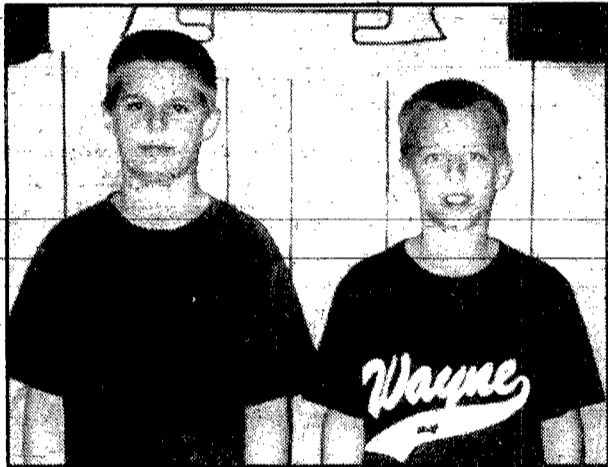

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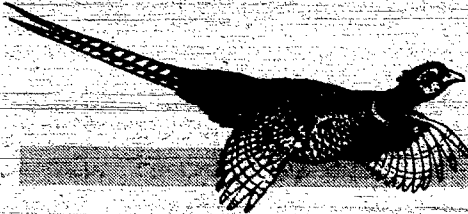
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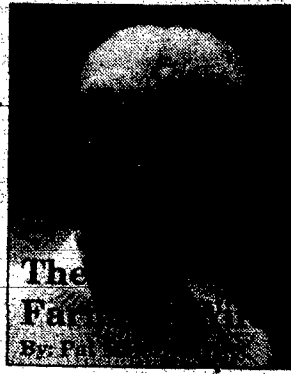
Weather reflects moods

A beautiful, cloudless, windless morning here; a perfect day for the grand opening of the new SAC Museum just 10 minutes north of us. In fact, we just heard the first "fly-over" of the day.

Quite a contrast to yesterday. Weeks ago, I planned a day-long excursion to Nebraska City to help deal with the anger of turning sixty. BURNS MORTGAGE

Wakefield's first facility which eventually became the Health Care Center was originally incorporated as the Wakefield Community Hospital on May 21, 1947. The first patient was admitted to the hospital at the Ash Street site on Sept. 24, 1950.

Ownership of the hospital building was transferred to the City of Wakefield on June 21, 1973 in order to issue bonds to build the Nursing home wing.

The first resident was admitted to the nursing home addition on Jan. 31, 1975 and that is when the name was changed to Wakefield Health Care Center.

The West Wing of the facility was completed and ready for its first occupant four years later on Jan. 15, 1979. The hospital closed on June 16, 1989 and remodeling of that portion of the building into a medical clinic and elderly apartments began on Feb. 10, 1995.

The last revenue bonds were paid off in March of this year, according to Administrator Terry Hoffman, as well as the debt for the office addition and the rental housing.

Deadline near for renewal of chemigation permits

Farmers planning to chemigate during the 1998 growing season must renew chemigation permits by June 1 to meet state deadline requirements, according to Rick Wozniak, water resources manager for the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District.

Chemigation is the application of any chemical, fertilizer or pesticide through an irrigation system. To legally chemigate in Nebraska, an operator must be certified to apply chemicals and obtain a chemigation permit from the local natural resources district.

"Farmers holding chemigation permits, even if they are uncertain whether they will chemigate later this year, should consider renewing

the permits by June 1," Wozniak said. He is encouraging area producers to reapply by the state-required deadline to avoid the increased cost and possible delays of an inspection.

Chemigation renewal permits cost \$10 and must be submitted to the Lower Elkhorn NRD office at 601 East Benjamin Avenue in Norfolk.

An irrigation system that has not been renewed prior to the June 1 deadline cannot apply chemicals through the system until a new permit is obtained. New chemigation permits cost \$30 and the application cannot use the system until it passes a mandatory inspection.

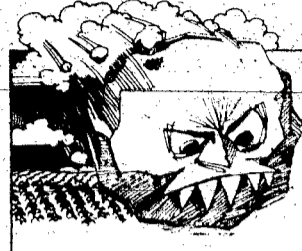

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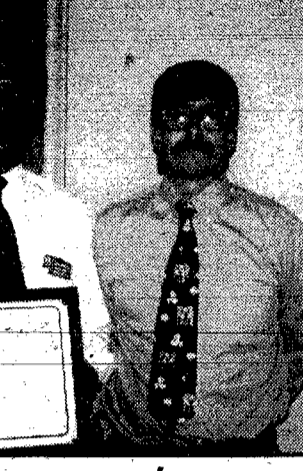

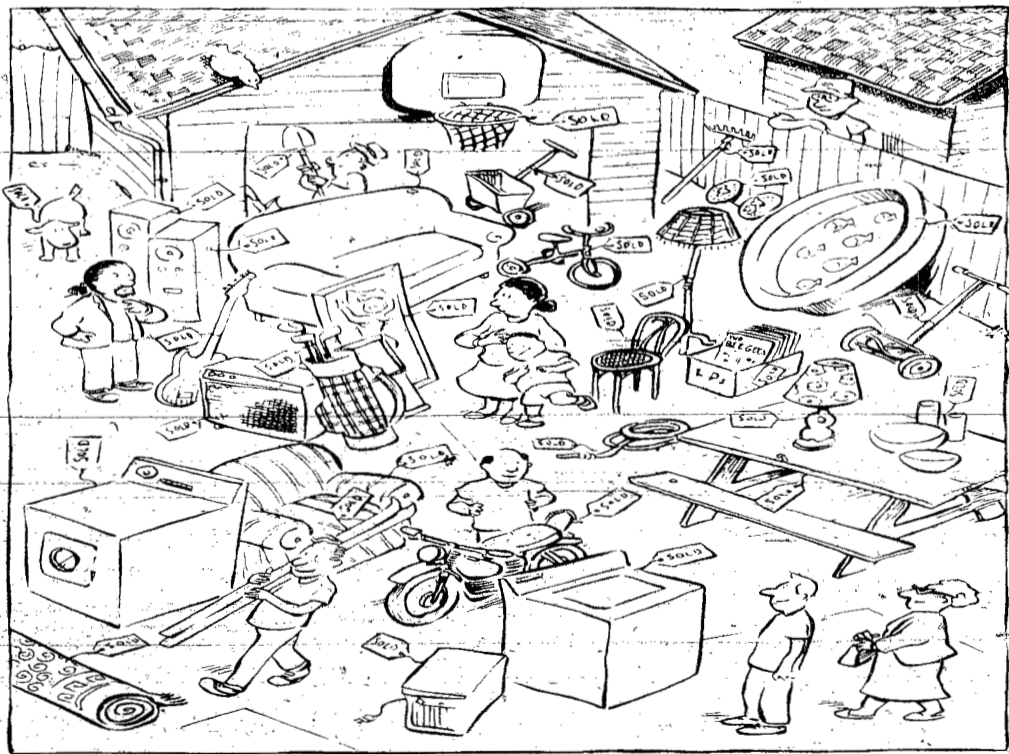

Warrant #604189 in the amount of \$1205.00, drawn on County Road Fund, was cancelled on motion by Danberg, seconded by Nissen. Roll call vote: all ayes, no nays.

General Assistance Application No. 98-1 was deleted on motion by Nissen, seconded by Danberg. Roll call vote: all ayes, no nays.

Scott Blumentritt, NE Department of Roads requested a lower speed limit on a state highway, detour beginning at the north corner of Highway 15, then two miles west, then one mile south to the KTOH baffle, also described as the edge on the line between Sections 14 and 12, 23rd and 11, and 10 and 11 1/2 miles N. 26 N., R. 3 E. Blumentritt and the Board of Roads had determined that the usual maximum speed limit of 50 miles per hour would not be a reasonable or safe for the detour under the conditions that will exist. These conditions include slopes, sight distance, road crown, and the large number of residences along the road, and the volume of traffic. Based on their engineering and traffic investigation Blumentritt requested that the County Board set a speed limit of 35 miles per hour for the detour. ORDINANCE 98-4 AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO PUBLIC ENTERTAINMENT TO ESTABLISH HOURS, TYPES, AND SUPERVISION OF PUBLIC ENTERTAINMENT TO REPEAL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES AND SECTIONS; AND TO PROVIDE AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska: Section 1. That Chapter 10, Article 10, Section 10-1001 is added to Municipal Code of Wayne, Nebraska, as follows:

10-1001 PUBLIC ENTERTAINMENT: HOURS It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to manage, sponsor, or participate in any public entertainment later than the hour of 11:00 o'clock A.M. or before the hour of 8:00 o'clock A.M. Public entertainment shall include music concerts, dances, rock festivals, masquerade or ball play, comedy, entertainment, circus, or carnival given or conducted for a fee, contribution, or collection for purposes of admission as charged; provided, the term public entertainment shall not be construed to include any such activity to which admission is limited strictly to persons expressly invited by the person, business, organization, or society giving or holding such public entertainment, and which is not given, or conducted designedly for profit or gain to such person, business, organization, or society giving or conducting the same, and provided further that the provisions herein shall not apply to any public entertainment conducted under the supervision and direction of a department or division of the City of Wayne or any college or school district within the City.

Section 2. That Chapter 10, Article 10, Section 10-1002 is added to the Municipal Code of Wayne, Nebraska, as follows: 10-1002 PUBLIC ENTERTAINMENT: SUPERVISION: The City Policy shall be permitted to enter any public entertainment event for the purpose of inspection at any time.

Section 3. That any other ordinance or section passed and approved prior to the passage approval and publication or posting of this ordinance and in conflict with the provisions, is herewith repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage, approval, and publication of posting, as required by law.

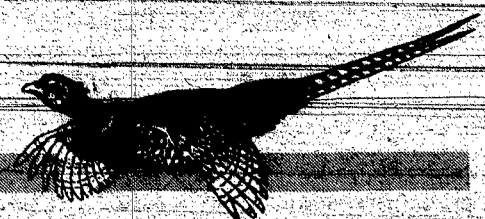
