On Friday, the "crime scene" was taped off in front of legends in downtown Wayne. Fowl play is suspected. The investigation as to what really happened to the chicken continues.

Leo Ahmann, known to all as "The Chicken," dressed in a finely feathered costume strutted his stuff around Wayne and onto the Jim Henery TV Show last year.

"The entire Chicken Show

Committee extends warmest thanks to Leo for his involvement in the Show. Our chicken was dead," Karen said.

Incredibly, a new individual stepped forward to offer service in this role. For protective reasons, this person shall remain anonymous. As law enforcement personnel were examining the crime scene, this new chicken cautiously approached. Again, the Committee offers congratulations and appreciation for taking on this awesome responsibility.

Last January the Wayne Chicken Show Committee was approached by Jay Leno's Tonight Show to organize and hold a Hard-Boiled Egg Eating Contest. Less than two weeks later, with assistance from Wayne State College and various community individuals, the contest was a half-time hit at a men's basketball game.

Dewald, of Sloan, Iowa, was finally presented with his very belated T-shirt; he promises to be back to compete in the Hard-Boiled Egg Eating Contest at the Chicken Show on July 11.

Groundbreaking date set for Meadowview Estates

The Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation has announced the ground-breaking for Meadowview Estates will be held Tuesday, June 23 at 11 a.m.

Meadowview Estates is a 16-unit affordable family rental-housing unit, located in the new Gary Donner Addition to Wayne, just east of Pac 'N' Save.

The housing unit will consist of eight, two-bedroom and eight, three-bedroom residences to be made available to low-income families, with rents adjusted to the family incomes. The project is scheduled to be completed by

Jan. 25, 1999. Roads and other infrastructure to the Gary Donner Addition will be completed this summer, opening the entire subdivision for future development.

Meadowview Estates will be owned by the Meadowview Estates, L.P., a Nebraska limited partnership, and operated by the Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation, its general partner.

The project has been made possible by a combination of federal funding sources, including USDA Rural Development and HOME Investment Partnership

funds, as well as low-income housing-tax credits and private loans.

In addition to affordable housing, Meadowview Estates will offer its tenants links to various social services, individual case management such as credit counseling, plus workshops on life and home ownership skills such as budget building, home maintenance and how to prepare for buying a first house.

Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation is a private Nebraska nonprofit organization, working to improve the community of Wayne and its surrounding area through affordable housing development.

Wayne East open for business

A large number of products and services are available to those using one of Wayne's newest businesses, Wayne East, located on East Highway 35 and Centennial Road.

The business, owned by Herb and Kathy Albers of Wisner, opened on May 28.

Verdel Lutt serves as manager of the convenience portion of the business and Connie Dangberg manages the Food Court.

Wayne East offers customers food, gas and convenience store items.

"We are open 24 hours a day and offer customers three kinds of

gas as well as diesel. Customers can pay for gas purchases at the pumps with credit or debit cards or inside with cash or credit cards," Lutt said.

The Food Court features a Taco Depot, Herbies Subs, a display case featuring broasted chicken daily as well as many other hot food items including several breakfast choices.

Food such as pizza, hamburgers and cheeseburgers, hot dogs, breakfast pizza and breakfast burritos are prepared daily.

The Food Court welcomes call-in orders as well as carry-outs.

The store boasts a 16-flavor soda fountain as well as a soft serve ice cream machine.

Seating for up to 40 people is also available in the store.

The facility is equipped with showers for truckers to use and parking is available for trucks.

An automatic teller machine is located at Wayne East, as are a fax machine and pay phones, both inside the building and out.

Wayne East also has available milk, lunch meat and a number of other food items as well as a full line of pop and beer.

JUNE BRIDES AND NEW PARENTS BEWARE OF SOCIAL SECURITY FRAUD

If you have recently announced your engagement or marriage in your local newspaper or if you are the proud parent of a new baby, you may be receiving a very "official" looking offer in the mail. This offer may be to notify Social Security of your new married name, or to obtain a Social Security number for your newborn baby -- for a fee. Another advertisement may offer to obtain your personal earnings and benefit estimate statements for you from the Social Security Administration -- again for a fee.

Offers of these types are often presented to look as if they came directly from an official governmental agency. They may have a return address such as "Federal Service Record Agency" or some other name with "Federal" in the title. The envelope may be marked "Official Notification", or something similar, to make you think it is an important, official mailing from the Federal government.

Consumers should be aware that all of these services offered for a fee are available AT NO COST from the U.S. Government. In addition to paying for a service that is available free of charge, you may be providing unscrupulous people with highly personal and confidential information that could be used to obtain phony identifications or tap into your credit file.

According to the Social Security Administration, many county clerks will provide you with a change of name form for Social Security when you apply for a marriage license, and hospitals will submit the application for a Social Security number for your new baby if you request it. Of course, forms are also available from your local Social Security Administration office.

Legitimate marketers use public information regarding marriages, births and death records to market everything from insurance policies to lawn services. However, scam artists also use this information.

Got a notice from Lancaster County Assessor Norm Agena the other day.

The value on my home's been increased, again.

My first reaction?

Norm, how could you do this to me?

OK, I know that's an emotional overreaction.

Friends and relatives that have been house hunting in recent years tell me real estate prices in Lincoln have been climbing at an almost unbelievable rate.

And, I did have my house reappraised just last year, and Agena's value isn't much different from what my appraiser told me it was worth.

I know from reading the World-Herald that Agena's done a pretty good job of keeping house values fair and close to market value unlike some other urban county that shall remain nameless.

And I know that a higher valuation doesn't necessarily mean I'll pay more taxes. In fact, since the percentage increase is far less than the estimated decrease in school and city taxes for next year, I'm told I should expect to pay less property taxes next year.

That'd be great, but I'm just cynical enough that I won't believe it until I see it. This promise of property tax relief has been a long time coming and, like many Nebraskans, I can't quite believe my taxes will actually decrease until I see a lower amount on my bill.

Meanwhile, that higher amount on my assessment notice has me feeling uneasy. Unlike most urban homeowners who pay their property taxes as part of their monthly mortgage, I write a check to a County Treasurer twice a year. I bank at Sterling, NE, partly because I like being a person and not an account number. My banker seems to think I'm capable of setting aside some money each month to pay my property taxes. Still, those two property tax checks are usually the largest I write each year. And they've

grown every year.

Several years back, when I got a statement from the county informing of significant increase on my house, I remember confidently telling my parents that it didn't mean I'd pay more taxes. The values on the big expensive houses in

Lincoln had gone up even more, I said, and this means those homeowners would be paying a bigger share of the taxes. Peeps like me would be paying less, I told them.

They just smiled.

Now, after several years of covering the legislature's property tax relief efforts in great detail, I know far more about how the tax system works and why even the best-intentioned plans seem to go awry.

My World-Herald colleague, Henry Cordes, and I did a story about a month ago laying out the taxing trends of the past 30 years, ever since Nebraska adopted the

sales and income tax.

Some of the findings were quite interesting.

For example, it showed that when adjusted for inflation, per capita property tax amounts have not increased over the past 30 years. Sale and income taxes have gone up, now bearing the biggest proportion of government expenditure.

But if you look at the total state and local tax bite, sales, income and property taxes, they've hovered around 11 percent of personal income in Nebraska the whole period.

Supporters of that business-backed petition drive to enact a constitutional limit on tax collections say that's not good enough. They say that as Nebraska's economy has grown, the share taken by government should decrease.

Nick Niemann, the Omaha lawyer who helped draft the petition, put it this way: "Just because

you get a raise, why should the government get 11 percent of it?"

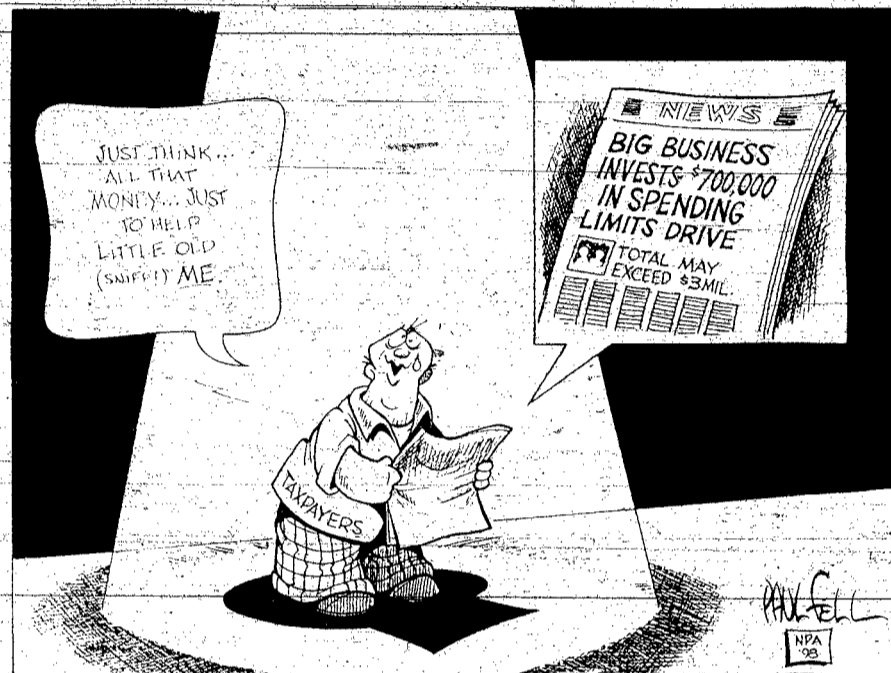
The Legislature has not been ignoring the tax problem, although its focus clearly has been different than that of the petition backers.

In a matter of days, Nebraska's sales tax rate is going to drop temporarily by 10 percent, from 5 cents per dollar to 4 1/2 cents per dollar. The state cut the income tax last year and made the cut permanent this year.

And this winter, property taxpayers will begin getting statements that should show the fruition of three years' property tax relief effort. Maybe those bills will be smaller and maybe the trend line on government spending will start turning downward.

But timing is everything, they say.

Voters will be asked to decide on the petition before they know for sure.

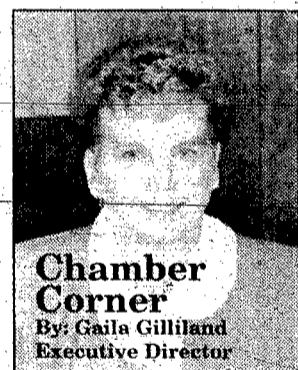


Better workforce ideas found on Web

Today I want to talk a little bit about how we can build better workers. You might like to check out the current issue of Nation's Business for the article on page 18 titled "Building Better Workers." Another source to consult is the Summit Report from the Governor's Summit on Workforce Development.

In the face of low unemployment nationwide, we learned last week there are still people looking for employment opportunities. We need to keep in mind, however, that the labor force needs to be well-trained and offer skills required by the potential employer. I recently contacted major employers in the area for specific job skills needed for positions in their companies. This information will be provided to educators for them to use.

What can we in Wayne do to develop the local workforce? One suggestion from the Governor's Summit Report says that employers could provide "lifelong learning

opportunities. It seems people feel they don't have a valuable job unless they are challenged or trained on an on-going basis. This suggestion could be played out by offering more in-depth training for new employees and increasing in-house training opportunities. Both education and business need to

reinforce the concept of employees being life-long learners. This is now easier than ever before with internet access.

Another suggestion would tie employee compensation directly to the success of the business. Or, the employer could learn more about Generation X, identify what generational gaps exist, and attempt to shorten those gaps in the work place. Staying in close touch with schools and letting them know your firm's needs, hiring students when possible, and offering internships can pay off big when it's time to hire.

According to "Building Better Workers," Glen West, Chamber Executive for the Greater Austin (Texas) Chamber of Commerce says that "...communities that want to improve the effectiveness of their schools must keep one thing in mind: Education and business leaders must persevere young people for the jobs that are available in that community."

The article continues by describing a daily environment in a

fifth-grade class at Pinellas County, Fla., where about 100 students burst into the scene at a miniature business district called Enterprise Village. Before entering Enterprise Village, students have studied what it's like to be part of the workforce.

Students get to work both as consumers and as employees in about 20 fictitious businesses. This way, they learn as they work! Opening a bank account, or applying for a car loan, or handling customers, or making change are just part of what these fifth-graders learn through working!

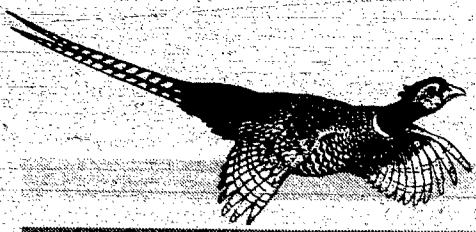

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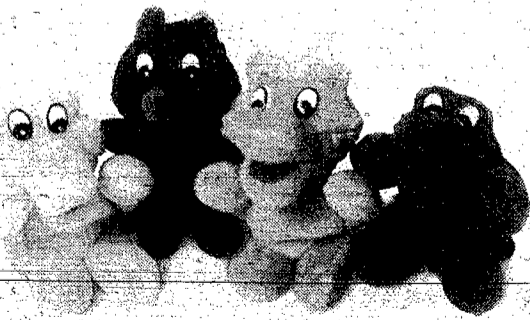

First Nicotine Inhaler in US Launcher

A new product to help smokers kick the habit has become available in the US according to Pharmacist Letter. Nicotrol Inhaler is being introduced in Texas and will be available nationwide by the end of this year. The inhaler delivers a low dose of nicotine through a cartridge that is inserted into a mouthpiece. Air inhaled through the mouthpiece is saturated with nicotine. Nicotine is absorbed through the lining of the mouth and the upper esophagus rather than through the lungs. Each inhaler cartridge delivers about one-third the nicotine in a typical cigarette. Instructions suggest use of the cartridges for 12 weeks, then gradually tapering use of the device over an additional 6-12 weeks, if needed.

Other products to aid smoking cessation include nicotine gum, patches, and nose spray. Zyban (bupropion) is the only non-nicotine product approved for smoking cessation.

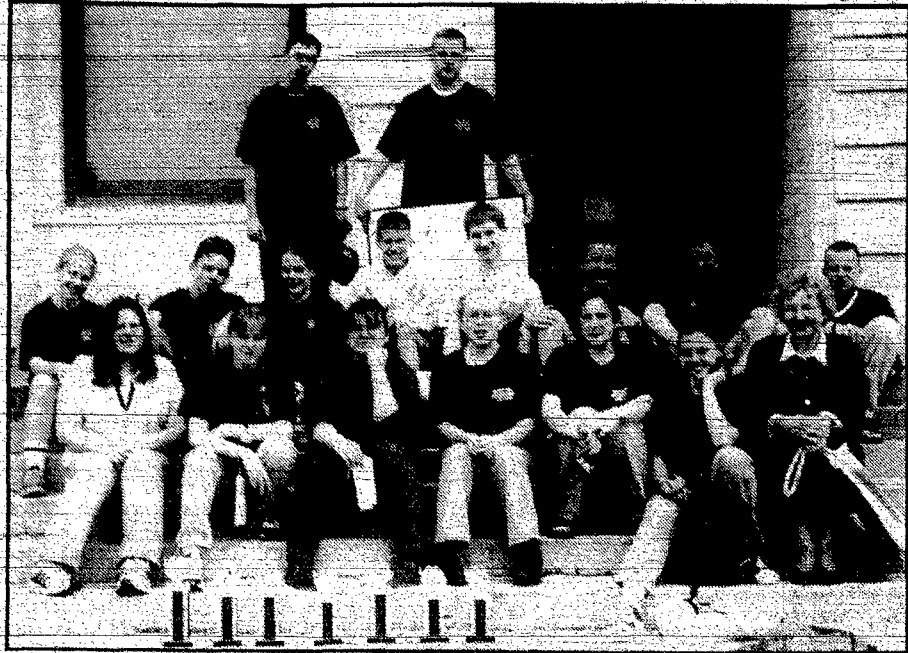

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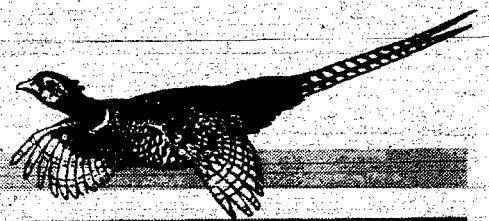
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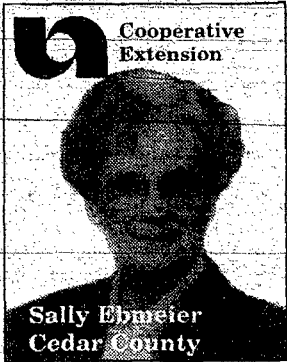

- Hospital emergency room visits increase healthcare costs. Many insurance companies will not reimburse for visits to the Emergency Room unless a "true" emergency condition exists. A visit to the hospital emergency room is usually more expensive than a visit to your physician's office due to 24 hours staffing requirements and technology costs.
- Inefficient utilization of the hospital emergency room increases insurance premiums for everyone. Hospital emergency room visits made by other people in your insurance group will be reflected in the cost of your insurance.

- asthma, congestive heart failure, etc.)
 - there is uncontrolled bleeding.
 - there are significant lacerations, which should be sutured within one hour before excessive swelling occurs.
 - a person sustains injury as a result of a significant traumatic event. In some instances, the injuries may not seem serious, however, the patient should be observed over a period of time to ensure that less obvious, but potentially more serious injuries, are not involved.
 - a person experiences chest

pain. Seek medical attention immediately! Many new treatments are available and extremely effective in the treatment of myocardial infarction, however, they must be administered to the patient as soon as possible after the onset of pain.

New federal regulations prohibit hospital emergency departments from performing services such as blood pressure checks and oxygen saturation levels on a "drop in" basis. The hospital is required to perform a complete physical assessment for anyone seeking medical treatment. For routine health checks such as blood pressures, it would probably be more convenient to stop by your family physician's office as they are not bound by the same federal regulations.

How do you know when to utilize the hospital emergency room? Every situation is unique and ultimately the decision must be made by the individual. There are ways, however, to gain input from trained medical professionals who can help you make the decision.

Here are some tips:

- Call the "on call" physician at home. The nurses at the hospital can give you the needed information. The physician can help you make some decisions over the phone. He/She may even be able

to give you some treatment ideas you can try at home before coming to the hospital emergency room.

"In some instances, the nurses at the hospital may be able to help you. Protocols have been established for certain situations based on the signs and symptoms you provide over the phone."

"Anytime you are uncomfortable with the suggestions made by the physician or the nurse, or when the treatment suggestions haven't worked, you should always feel you have the option of going to the hospital emergency room."

Hospital emergency rooms are available 24 hours a day and are there to meet the needs of people in an emergency situation. 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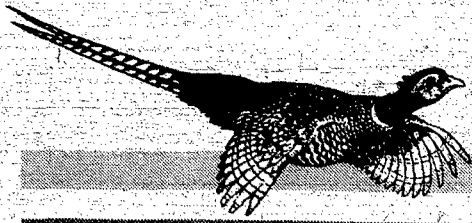
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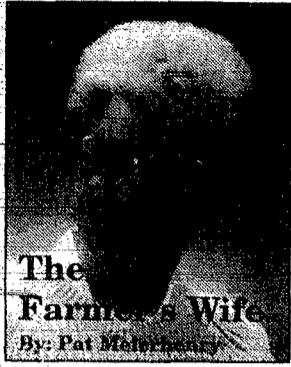
Week's activities require tissues

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Free irrigation well nitrate testing now available

The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District has again hired IFA teachers to collect irrigation water samples this summer. However, if landowners would like to collect the samples themselves, the NRD will pay for the cost of the analysis.

Water Resources manager, Rick Wozniak, said "We want to encourage landowners to participate in this new program because of the benefits they will receive by knowing the amount of nitrate in their water. Nitrates in irrigation water can be used to lower fertilizer cost."

Landowners interested in collecting their own samples from their irrigation wells should contact their local country Extension Office, their local Natural Resources Conservation Service or the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District and pick up 5 oz. bottle and postage paid mailer form one of these agencies.

The Lower Elkhorn NRD will pay for the cost of shipping and analysis of the sample.

Guidelines for the FREE irrigation well nitrate testing program include:

- Sample is to be taken only from irrigation well.
- The well should pump 4 to 6 hours before taking the sample.
- Try to sample when not chemigating.
- If chemigating, take the sample upstream of the chemigation injection site.
- Send the full 5 oz. bottle of water in to be tested, not just a partial bottle.
- Please fasten all lids securely to prevent leakage during shipping.
- The sample needs to be received by the lab as soon as possible after collection, preferably within 24 hours. Try to collect the sample so that you can mail it early in the week (on a Monday, Tuesday, or Wednesday), so that it does not sit in the Post Office over the weekend.
- If it is not possible to send the sample to the lab immediately after collection, refrigerate until it is sent.

The Lower Elkhorn NRD will provide you with the results of your sample and an explanation of those results.

This program will be available for three years: 1998, 1999, and 2000. For information contact Skip Kahler at the Lower Elkhorn NRD.

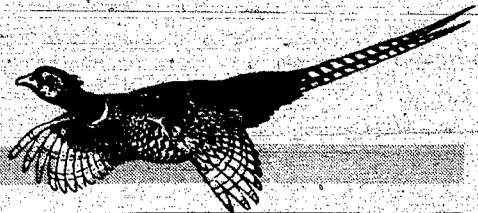
