

Nearly ready for traffic

The much awaited opening of the west portion of Highway 35 is scheduled to happen Saturday, Aug. 22. Crews continue to work on driveways, intersections and sidewalks on the west half of the project. Sherman Street is now open for north-south traffic and will continue to be the only cross-street open for some time. Friday, Aug. 21 is the tentative date for traffic from Main Street to the east end of project to be switched to the south. "This will create a narrow roadway, with construction occurring only three feet from traffic. There will be lots of time when traffic will be reduced to one lane by flagging. Motorists need to be aware of this and use caution when traveling in this area," said Scott Brummond with the Nebraska Department of Roads. Early next week crews will start removing the existing roadway on the north side of the street from Nebraska Street to the east end of the project. Storm sewer work will also be taking place at this time. Rad Dobson of Dobson Brothers Construction, the general contractor for the project, said that even with a number of rain delays, "there is a good chance we will finish the paving work this fall." Motorists are urged to use caution when driving in the construction areas, use alternate routes when possible and listen to radio station KTCH for daily updates.

Student rotations are part of the UNMC Rural Health Education Network (RHEN), an innovative program developed to help address the shortage of health professionals in rural Nebraska.

The students represent the colleges of medicine, pharmacy, nursing, and the School of Allied Health Professionals.

The purpose of RHEN is to change how and where primary care students at UNMC are educated. RHEN was developed to setting with the idea that if students receive their training in a rural area, the chances are much greater that they will return to a rural area once they complete their training.

(a) first violation - warning, letter to parents.
(b) second violation - 'In School' suspension, letter to parents.
(c) third violation - 'In School' or 'Out of School' suspension (three days), letter to parents and loss of parking privileges at



BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY

In an effort to maintain a safe environment for children during the upcoming school year. Nebraska Attorney General Don Stenberg today issued a series of recommendations on school safety

SAFETY TO AND FROM SCHOOL

- Know the routes your children take and have them walk with other children. Be aware of how much time it takes to go to and from school Do not allow them to take shortcuts that may be dangerous
- Tell your children to stay away from strangers and strange vehicles instruct your children to walk on sidewalks. If there are no sidewalks suggest walking in single file on the side of the road. Cross streets at
- Direct your children to never accept rides from anyone other than persons you have designated beforehand
- Inform school officials and day care providers who is authorized to pick Advise your children's principal to notify you immediately if one of your
- At the earliest age possible, have your children memorize their full name, phone number and address. Teach them how to use the phone to call home, call 911, and how to make a collect call home
- Take note of the clothes your children are wearing to school each day so that you could describe what your children are wearing, if necessary REPORT SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

instruct your children to immediately inform school authorities of any criminal or suspicious activity they may witness. Informing your local police department or school about suspicious incidents may prove helpful in dealing with these situations, and may help resolve a potential problem you or your children see any suspicious activity. DIAL 911 immediately

KNOW YOUR CHILDREN'S FRIENDS Know the names of your children's friends, where they live and how to reach them. Remember, your children make new friends each school year. Being familiar with your children's friends will help you know where to look for them in the event they fail to come home from school on time. Children should also be taught to keep parents informed about their whereabouts

SAFETY AT HOME It is important to have a plan in place for your children to follow if they get home from school and no adult is there. You should have a list of emergency phone numbers available for your child. These should be numbers of people they know and can call either for advice, or during emergencies. You should also have a well-defined list of what your children can and cannot do if they are home alone







Some Medicines Increase Risk of Falls

The risk of falling is one of the hazards associated with

String Nearly one third of older persons living in their own homes one fall each year. According to the AMA Family Medical Guide. deaths from falls, or from complications directly related to falls. account for more than half of all accidental deaths in the elderly. Causes of falls include the loss of muscular strength, loss of balance, slowing of reflexes, poor vision, and certain medicines. In a recent five-year study of nursing home residents, the drugs most often responsible for falls were sedative hypnotics (sleep médicines) and medicines prescribed for psychotic conditions.

Prevention of falls involves the use of support devices (e.g., canes and guard rails), regular exercise to increase muscle strength, wear ing well-fitting shoes, and using non-slip mats inside and alongside bathtubs and shower areas.

Irrigation Tour in Madison County

Madison -- To demonstrate recent advances and research recommendations for irrigation systems, five businesses and agencies are cooperating to host an Irrigation Tour in Madison County. It will be held on Thursday, August-20, at 5:30°p.m.

Featured stops are the IBP lagoon and irrigation pumping system with computer controls near Madison, the 12 pivots that use that water, and a nitrogen rate study near Battle Creek. Other topics include irrigation scheduling, rainfall shutoff switches, and sprinkler modifications that keep wheel tracks dry. Farmers will also be discussing their experiences at each stop.

The starting point is the IBP lagoon and pump house, which is 4.2 mi. south of Hwy. 32 or 2 mi. north of the Platte Co. line on Hwy 81, then 1/2 mile west. A bus will be available to carry guests to the other stops. A grilled sandwich supper is planned at a local park. The program will be completed by 8:45 pm.

Irrigation is important in the success of farming in this area," said Dick DeLoughery, Water Quality Education Coordinator. "This tour is an excellent opportunity for producers to see the IBP system and hear from cooperating farmers. They will also learn more about nitrogen and irrigation management during the tour."


