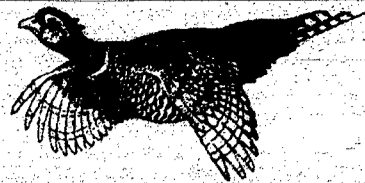

## Project nears finish

Meadowview Estates, the unique rental housing project that is going up just east of Pac 'N' Save in Wayne is nearing completion.

Linda Anderson of the Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation, the managing agency for the project, said the group is ready to begin screening applicants for eligibility for residency in the newly constructed units.

Anderson said the units could be ready for occupancy as early as Jan. 30, 1999.

Meadowview Estates has 16

residences, divided equally between two- and three-bedroom units. The three-bedroom units are two-story with 1-1/2 baths. All units come with furnished appliances and are decorated with carpeting, mini-blinds and oak trim and cupboards.

Anderson anticipates that the units should be ready to show by mid-January.

Meadowview Estates is being reserved for families whose incomes are at or below 60 percent of the median income for Wayne

County. Those who qualify will pay rents not to exceed 30 percent of their actual monthly income.

Ground was broken for the project on June 23, 1998.

The project was made possible by the participation of the city of Wayne, First Title and Escrow of Wayne, Nebraska Investment Finance Authority, Pac 'N' Save, The Preston Company and State National Bank and Trust of Wayne.

Funding for the project came from the USDA Rural Development Loan (\$748,350), Low Income Housing Tax Credit (\$391,570) and the Department of Economic Development (\$150,000).

## Student featured on 'Price is Right'

"Come on down, Barbara Hoffman," were words the Wayne State College senior said she doesn't even remember hearing because of her excitement at being a contestant and later a winner on 'The Price is Right' television show.

Hosted by Bob Barker, the show aired on CBS on Dec. 16. Hoffman, a resident assistant in Morey Hall watched herself on television in the lounge with the rest of her floor at 10 a.m.

Hoffman spent her fall break, Oct. 17-19, in California with the intent to be on the game show. She and her friends accomplished their mission. She won over \$21,000 in prizes and the big show case.

Although she missed on a chance to win a new Ford Escort car by one number, she did win travelware, a silkscreen painting, a travel trailer, camper and a big screen TV. She said her dad took Dec. 16 off from work to watch her on the new big screen television set she won on the game show.

"If you want to do it, go try," Hoffman said of what she learned from the experience.

Hoffman is a special education major at WSC. She is the daughter of Lindell and Kay Hoffman of Grand Island. Her activities at WSC include varsity softball, intramurals, CEC - Student Council for Exceptional Children, Cardinal Key, and Alpha Lambda Delta.

Accompanying Hoffman were Toni and Paul Huggenberger of Emerson and Laura Lans of Omaha. The Huggenbergers are sister and brother. Their parents are James and Patricia Huggenberger.

Toni Huggenberger is a senior at WSC with an elementary education major and has been involved at Wayne State College in Campus Crusade for Christ, basketball, intramurals, Wayne Student Education Association of Nebraska and served as a tutor.

"We had a gut feeling one of us was going to be up there," Huggenberger said.

Hoffman said the reason why they decided to be on the show originated last summer when they worked together and watched 'The Price is Right' show. Both Wayne State students had birthdays in October which made the trip a type of birthday celebration.

"One of our friends is a flight attendant and could get us plane tickets when we found out the show was taping over fall break. We had to send a month in advance for the tickets to get on the show," Hoffman said.

First she said the show sent her a letter which said they would not be able to get tickets. Hoffman

said after receiving this letter, she called the information number for the show and asked about the letter. She said she was told they could pick up tickets if they came to California.

Arriving in California, Hoffman said they went right to the studio to get the tickets at 6:30 a.m. Capacity for taping the show in the studio is 325 people and over 500 tickets are given out. Hoffman said she was number 218.

"As we were waiting, we were being interviewed by people from the show," Hoffman said. "They asked you where you are from and why you are here. How you respond to that determines whether you make the show."

"I had it all planned what I was going to say when they interviewed me, but I started shaking and talked nervously when the time came," Hoffman said. "When I was on stage with Bob Barker, I can't remember what exactly I said other than my name and going to college at Wayne State."

"We stayed in a line one-half mile long outside under an awning for the entire day. During that time we got to know the groups ahead of us and behind us," Huggenberger said.

There were two girls from Canada with 'Canada Loves Bob' t-shirts that we got to know. We said if they won, we would run up on stage with them and if we won, they would run up with us at the end of the show. When we won, they ran up with us and were jumping up and down at the end of the show," Hoffman said.

"We were hyper at the show. They do things before the show to get the crowd going and excited. I know we are going to be embarrassed when we see ourselves on television. Every time they rolled the dice on the show we would scream. Our voices were so hoarse by the end of the show," Huggenberger said.

Hoffman said she her voice felt hoarse by the time she was called on stage.

"You don't know you are going to be called up. When your name is called it is very exciting," Hoffman said.

"When Barb's name was called, she was up and pushed through the crowd to run down to the stage. I turned to congratulate her and she was already gone and halfway down to the stage," Huggenberger said.

After all they went through to get on the show, Hoffman said she felt like she was doing well to remember her name once she got on stage because she was so excited. To price things was a real challenge and Hoffman said she

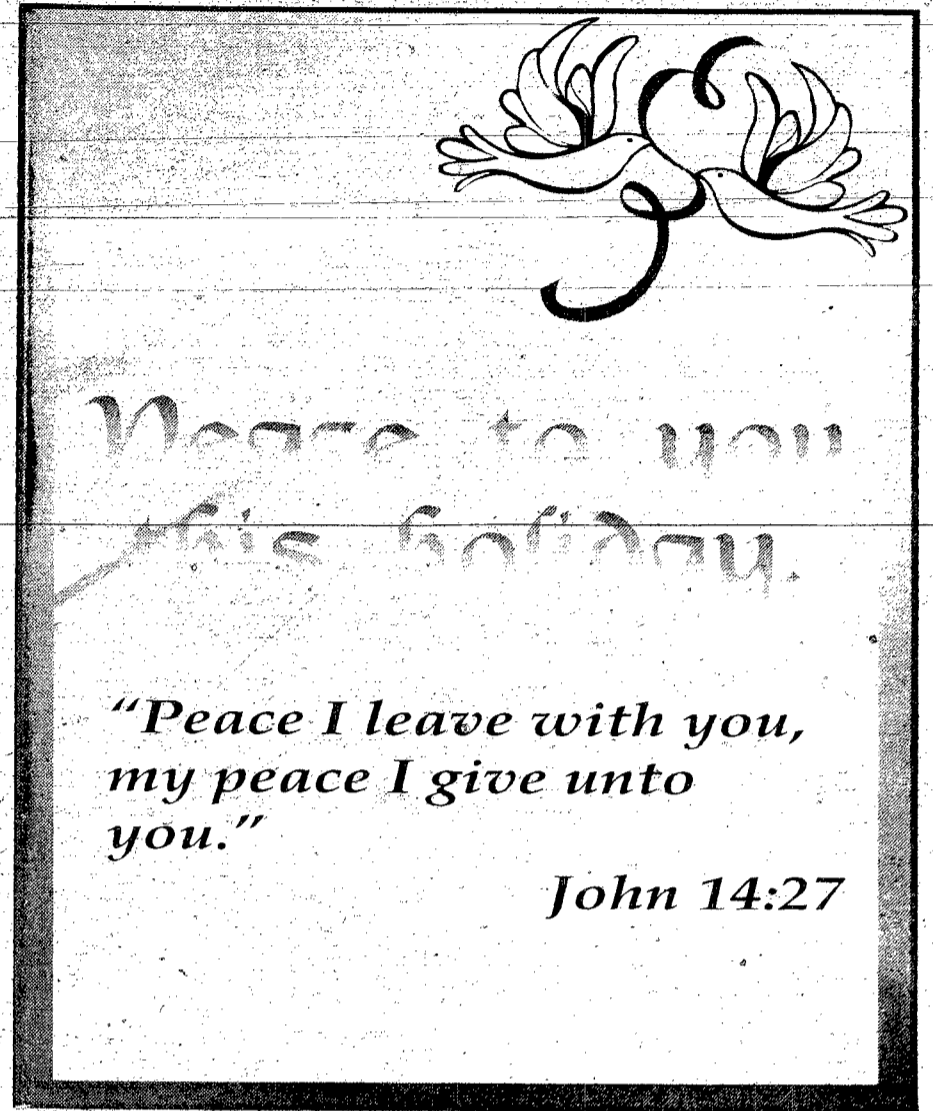

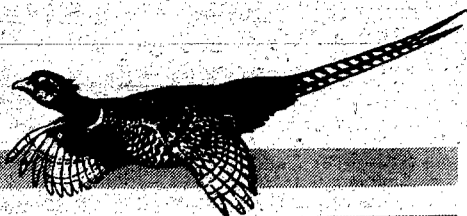

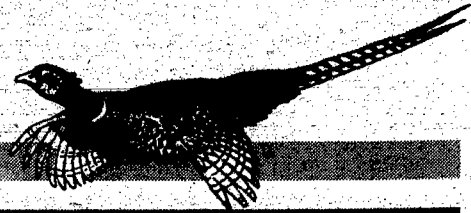

## How execs form impressions

I want to also extend a big thanks to all the supporting businesses, KTCH Radio, and the Wayne Herald/Morning Shopper. A program like this would not happen without each of you working together for the community.

Development Counselors International wanted to know what the most effective techniques are that attract new industry to a community.

To find out, they surveyed a random sample of 1,000 companies with 250 employees and annual revenues of \$100 million or more. Over the next few weeks this column will share some of the findings as reported in the fall 1997 issue of "Commentary" magazine.

The survey asked corporate executives to select the "three leading sources of information" influencing their perception of an area's business climate. Dialogue with industry peers was the number one source at 68 percent.

The following were the others in the top seven sources ranked according to the percent of respondents selecting each. Dialogue with industry peers ranked at 68 percent, articles in newspapers and magazines ranked at 60 percent, business travel ranked at 52 percent, national surveys ranked at 34 percent, meeting with Economic Development groups and word of mouth tied at 24 percent, and personal travel came in at 21 percent.

Print advertising received only a four percent response, direct mail a one percent response, and other marketing vehicles such as radio and TV advertising received less

than a one percent response.

This data brings two key points to mind. First is the fundamental importance of keeping existing industry happy. Not only does the retention and potential for expansion of existing local businesses represent a community's greatest potential to maintain and build its economic base, but existing industry also represents a community's most critical ally in attracting new industry.

A community's existing industry is simply its most credible source of

information on the community's suitability for new industry.

Second, if business travel and personal travel were combined into a single category, it would have been the category most frequently cited as influencing corporate executive perceptions of a locale as a place to conduct business.

This means that communities are under inspection all the time, and that the community needs to be visitor-friendly, attractive and functional, always enhancing its tourism and quality of life attributes.

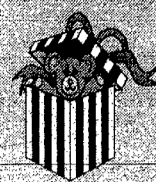

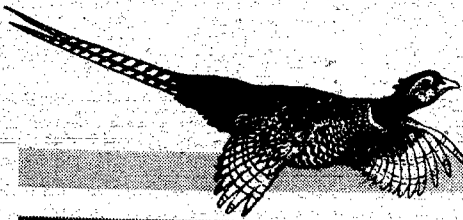

# Wayne grapplers win Blue Devil invite

The Wayne wrestling team saw a total of 11 grapplers earn medals at the annual Wayne Invite last Saturday and the Blue Devils cruised to the team championship with 193 points.

Winside placed runner-up with 139 and Waverly was third with 104 while Wisner-Pilger netted 100 and North Bend, 96.5.

Norfolk Catholic tallied 77.5 points for sixth place and Randolph netted 67 for seventh followed in order by Sioux City East JV's, 63.5; Schuyler, 60.5; Laurel-Concord, 21; Madison, 20 and Wayne JV's, 14.

Seven Wayne wrestlers won their respective weight classes but none had to work harder than Danny Roeber at 135 pounds.

Roeber had to wrestle in a bunny-bracket just to enter the eight-man

bracket and he won by pin. He then won a 13-2 decision before winning by pin in the semifinals. Roeber defeated North Bend's Adam Hines, 6-2 in the championship match.

Dan Nelson (119), Jay Endicott (125), Josh Murtaugh (152), Darin Jensen (160), Tim Zach (171) and Casey Junck (215) also placed first with Jesse Rethwisch (189), placing runner-up.

Chris Junck placed third at 130. Junck lost his first match 7-5 to Paul Kollars of Randolph but Junck came back to pin Kollars in just 37 seconds in the match for third place.

One of the premiere matchups in the early season came at 125 pounds as Wayne's Jay Endicott outlasted Norfolk Catholic's Adam Matteo, 3-1 in overtime.

Josh Murtaugh remained unbeaten on the season with a pin of Winside's Ryan Krueger in the finals.

The final medal for Wayne in var-

sity action came at 103 pounds where Casey Campbell placed fourth.

Robbie Sturm placed fourth at 171 pounds, wrestling for the Wayne JV's.

The fastest pin award went to Jeremy Buss of Randolph with a 14-second stick while Murtaugh earned his second straight MVP Award for outstanding wrestler-as-voted-on-by-the-coaches.

"The kids wrestled great," Wayne coach John Murtaugh said. "It was obvious that we improved a lot as a wrestling team this week. Our guys

wrestled tough every round and I am proud of them."

Murtaugh said it was great having seven individual champions in the 10th anniversary of the Wayne Invite. He called Danny Roeber's performance, amazing, for coming through a bunny-bracket to win the tournament.

Wayne had seven wrestlers compete on the JV's team. Ryan Teach went 1-2 with a 7-4 decision at 119 while Josh Pieper went 0-1 at 130.

Jon Pickinpaugh went 0-1 at 152 and Adam Jorgensen was 1-2 with a 10-3 decision at 160. Ryan Haase went 2-2 at 189 with two wins by pin and an 8-6 overtime loss.

Gabe Hammer won by an 8-2 margin at 140 and Josh Murtaugh won a 12-2 decision at 152 while

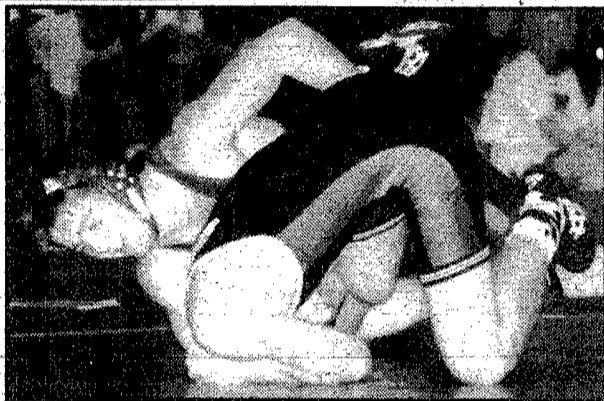
Tim Zach won a 13-3 decision at 171. Steve Kaufman fell by pin at 145.

"I was very pleased with how the kids wrestled," coach John Murtaugh said. "We were intense

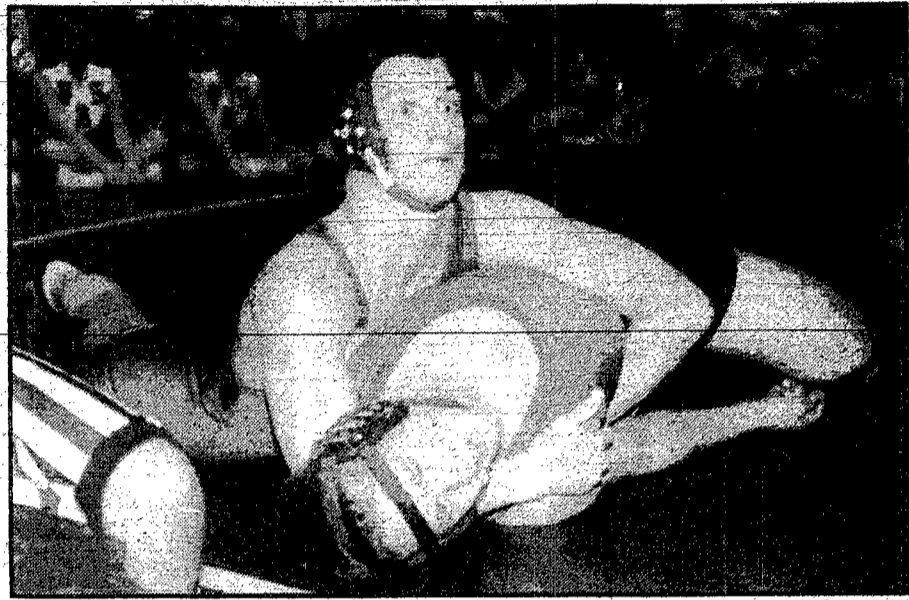
and physical throughout the meet. Lucas Munter set the tone for the night with a pin at 112 pounds. Danny Roeber also picked up a big win."

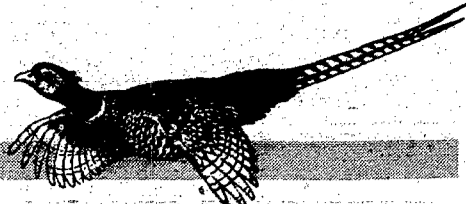

Wayne State's men's basketball team used a 17-3 scoring run over the final seven minutes of the first half to propel them to a 75-47 win over St. Francis of Illinois, last Saturday afternoon in Rice Auditorium.

The 9-2 Wildcats moved up three spots in the national rankings to 15th after the win.

More good news for 'Cats fans came when Morningside and South Dakota—both victims of WSC, defeated fourth-ranked South Dakota State over the weekend.

SDSU was ranked first in the

Region with WSC, second. The 'Cats will likely move into the top spot in the Region.

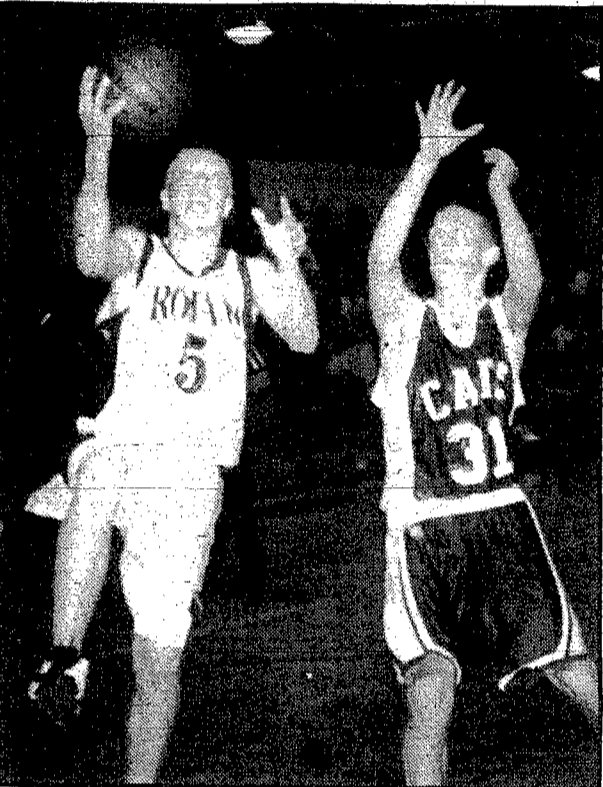
"We showed good poise down the stretch," Schroeder said. "We played 12 girls and everyone contributed."

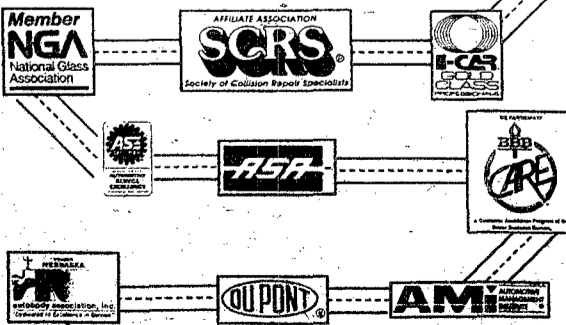

Sjuts were near double figures with eight each.

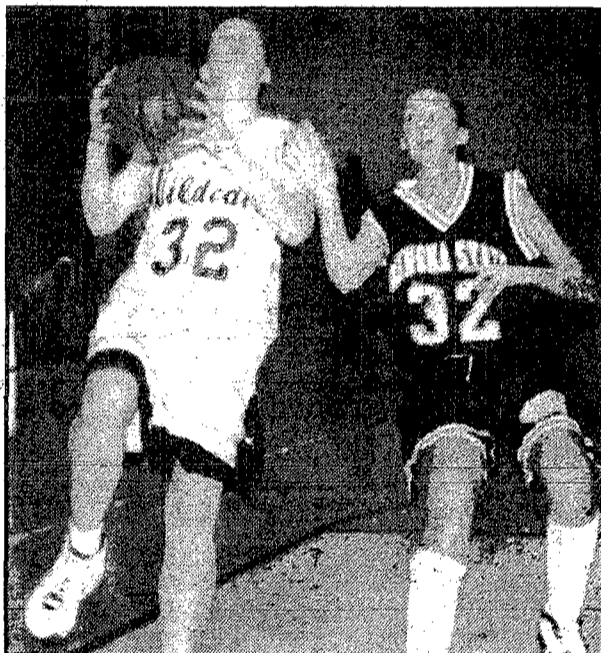
Murphy hit a short jumper off an assist by Schenk to put WSC up 54-53 with 6:20 remaining. The 'Cats never trailed again.

**New Medicines Tested for Influenza**

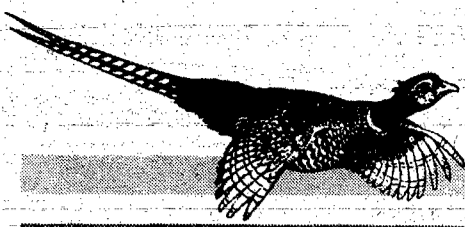
According to information presented recently at the Inter-Science Conference on Antimicrobial Agents and Chemotherapy at least two medicines have shown promise against *oral influenza*, known commonly as the flu. One medicine is being tested as an oral tablet and the other is being tested as a nose spray. Both medicines prevent the flu virus from infecting human cells through a direct effect on a specific viral enzyme.

In one trial involving 629 adults, on the medicines (referred to as *GS-104* -- a label assigned for research purposes) reduced the length of time flu symptoms were present by 30 percent. Severity of symptoms were reduced by 40 percent. The medicine was taken for five days, beginning 36 hours after the onset of flu symptoms. In a larger study of 1,559 adults this same medicine was effective in preventing the flu in a high percentage of individuals tested.

## Home study courses are offered

Several home study courses are offered for agricultural producers and consultants, available through University of Nebraska-Lincoln Cooperative Extension.

Current economic conditions have pushed many producers to look for ways to reduce costs and improve efficiency. These goals are built-in to each course and offer a great deal of flexibility as individuals can work at home at their own pace.

Over 4,000 producers have participated in the Beef Basics courses. Last year's participants

estimated they would save over \$16 per cow using the information from the courses. Beef Basics offers four courses: Beef Cow Basics; Reproduction; Genetics and Selection; Managing the Growing Calf and Beef as a Business. The cost is \$55 per course selected.

Small flock sheep producers may be interested in the Sheep Basics course. The program was developed by University of Wyoming Cooperative Extension and is being offered to Nebraska producers as well. The cost is \$40.

Crop producers may be interested in a new offering from UNL titled Soils Home Study Course. This course is designed to benefit producers by providing information on how soil fertility affects crop production, how to save money on nutrient applications and selecting the best fertilizer for your needs. The course has been approved for 10 continuing education units for certified crop advisors. The cost of the course is \$60.

Improving water quality and irrigation efficiency are part of the Irrigation Management Home

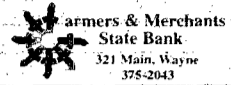
Study Course. There are 13 chapters in this course ranging from soil water and flow calculations to energy costs for irrigation pumping. This course has been approved for 13 continuing education credits for certified crop advisors. The cost is \$60.

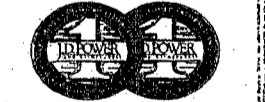

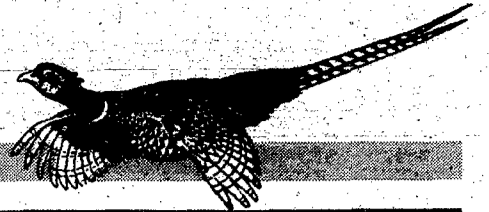

## ORDINANCE NO. 98-21 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 6, ARTICLE 4, BY ADDING SECTION 6-440 REGARDING MISDEMEANORS - POSSESSION OF TOBACCO, TO REPEAL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES, AND TO PROVIDE AN EFFECTIVE DATE

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska

Section 1. A new Section 6-440 is added to the Wayne Municipal Code to read as follows:  
**§6-440 MISDEMEANORS - POSSESSION OF TOBACCO** It shall be unlawful for any person under 18 years of age to possess tobacco products. Tobacco product(s) is defined as any substance or product containing tobacco leaf, including but not limited to: cigars, cigarettes, pipe-tobacco and all forms of smokeless tobacco as defined by N.R.S. 69-1902(1996).

This Section shall not prohibit any persons from handling or disposing of tobacco products in the course of their employment in grocery stores, convenience stores, restaurants, hotels, or similar businesses, or persons who are authorized under state law to serve, sell or dispense tobacco products in the course of their employment. Whoever shall be guilty of this Section shall be fined not less than fifty dollars (\$50) and no more than one hundred dollars (\$100). (Ref. N.R.S. 28-1418)

Section 2. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby amended and repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after January 1, 1999, only following its passage, approval and publication or posting as required by law.
