Student featured on 'Price is Right'

Come on down, Barbara Hoffman, were words the Wayne State College senior said doesn't even remember hearing because of her excitement at being a contestant and later a winner on. The Price is Right television

Hosted by Bob Barker, the show aired on CBS on Dec. 16. Hoffman, a resident assistant in Morey Hall watched herself on television in the lounge with the rest of her floor at 10 a.m.

Hoffman spent her fall break Oct. 17-19, in Galifornia with the intent to be on the game show. She and her friends accomplished their mission. She won over \$21,000 in prizes and the big show case.

Although she missed on a chance to win a new Ford Escort car by one number, she did win flatware, a silkscreen painting, a travel trailer camper and a big screen TV. She said her dad took Dec. 16 off from work to watch her on the new big screen television set she won on the game

"If you want to do it, go try," Hoffman said of what she learned from the experience.

Hoffman is a special education major at WSC. She is the daughter of Lindell and Kay Hoffman Grand Island, Her activities at WSC include varsity softball, intramurals, Student: Council for Exceptional Children, Cardinal Key and Alpha Lambda Delta.

Accompanying Hoffman were Toni and Paul Huggenberger of Emerson and Laura Lans of Omaha, The Huggenbergers are sister and brother. Their parents lames and Patricia

Huggenberger, Toni-Huggenberger is a senior at WSC with an elementary edu-cation major and has been involved at Wayne State College in Campus Crusade for Christ, basketball, intramurals, Wayne Student Education Association of Nebraska and served as a tutor.

"We had a gut feeling one of us was going to be up there, Huggenberger said.

Haffman said the reason why they decided to be on the show originated last symmer when they worked together and watched The Price is Right show, Both Wayne State students had birth-days in October which made the

trip a type of birthday celebration.
*One of our friends is a flight attendant and could get us plane tickets when we found out the show was taping over fall break. We had to send a month in advance for the tickets to get on the

show," Hoffman said. First she said the show sent her a letter which said they would not be able to get tickets. Hollman

said after receiving this letter, she called the information number for the show and asked about the letter. She said she was told they. could pick up tickets if they came to California.

Arriving in California, Hoffman said they went right to the studio to get the tickets at 6:30 a.m. Capacity for taping the show in the studio is 325 people and over 500 tickets are given out. Hoffman said she was number 218.

"As we were waiting; we were being interviewed by people from the show; Hoffman said, "They asked you where you are from and why you are here. How you'respond to that determines whether you make the show.

"I had it all planned what I was

going to say when they interviewed me, but l'started shaking and talked nervously when the time came," Hoffman said. "When was on stage with Bob Barker, I can't remember what exactly I said other than my name and go-

ing to college at Wayne State."
"We stayed in a line one-half mile long outside under an awning for the entire day. During that time we got to know the groups ahead of us and behind us,"

Huggenberger said. There were two girls from Canada with 'Canada Loves: Bob' t-shirts that we got to know. We said if they won, we would run up on stage with them and if we won, they would run up with us at the end of the show. When we won, they ran up with us and were jumping up and down at the end of the show," Höffman said.

"We were hyper at the show They do things before the show to get the crowd going and excited. know we are going to be embarrassed when we see ourselves on television. Every time they rolled the dice on the show we would scream. Our voices were so hoarse by the end of the show," Huggenberger said.

Hoffman said she her voice felt hoarse by the time she was called on stage. You don't know you are going

to be called up. When your name is called it is very exciting," Hoffman said.

"When Barb's name was called, she was up and pushed through the crowd to run down to the stage. I turned to congratulate her and she was already gone and halfway down to the stage, Huggenberger said.

After all they went through to get on the show, Hoffman said she felt like she was doing well to remember her name once she gor on stage because she was so ex-cited. City will take Christmas trees


The City of Wayne would like encourage people wishing to dispose of their Christmas tree this year for no charge to take them to the City's Wood Recycling Site.

To find out, they surveyed a ran-dom sample of 1,000 companies with 250 employees and annual revenues of \$100 million or more. Over the next few weeks this column will share some of the findings as reported in the Fall 1997 issue of Commentary" magazine

The survey asked corporate executives to select the "three leading sources of information" influencing their perception of an area's business climate. Dialogue with industry peers was the number one source at

The following were the others in. the top seven sources ranked according to the percent of respondents selecting each. Dialogue with industry peers ranked at 68 percent; articles in newspapers and magazines ranked at 60 percent; business travel ranked at 52 percent; national surveys ranked at 34 percent; with Economic Development groups and word of mouth tied at 24 percent; and per-

sonal travel came in at 21 percent. Print advertising received only a four percent response, direct mail a one percent response, and other marketing vehicles such as radio and TV advertising received less

This data brings two key points to mind. First is the fundamental importance of keeping existing industry happy. Not only does the retention and potential for expansion of existing local businesses represent a community's greatest potential to maintain and build its economic base, but existing industry also represents a community's most critic ally in attracting new

A community's existing industry is simply its most credible source of sultability for new industry.

Second, if business travel and personal travel were combined into a single category, it would have been the category most frequently cited a influencing corporate executive perceptions of a locale as a place to conduct business.

This means that communities are under inspection all the time, and that the community needs to be visitor-friendly, attractive and functional, always enhancing its tourism and quality of life attributes.






