## Special meeting held

The Wayne City Council held a special meeting on Tuesday and later held a joint meeting with the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

At the council's Aug. 10 regular meeting, five of the eight council members were absent and a regular meeting could not take place.

At the special meeting Resolution 99-41 was approved, establishing new electrical rates and effective dates.

Beginning with the bill that customers receive on Nov. 1, the new rates will take effect. The rates now include a summer rate for the period between mid-May and mid-September and the winter rates for the remaining eight months of the year.

Generally, the customers will see lower bills during the winter months and slightly higher bills during the

summer months.

The change is designed to more closely match the city's actual cost of energy during those time periods. It is expected to generate an addition two percent in revenue.

The council debated and approved a request by Dave Zach to waive the non-domestic well permit fee for a replacement well on Zach's property south of Logan Creek.

Zach will be required to pay the engineering assessment fee and legal and inspection fees for the well.

The council also accepted the early retirement request from Gary Jeffrey. Jeffrey will retire Sept. 30 after more than 18 years of service to the community.

Resolution 99-42 was passed, approving an interlocal agreement for Dispatch/ 911 Services with Wakefield. This is a one year agreement which may be extended for an additional year.

The city of Wakefield is planning

to have Dixon County provide their dispatch services beginning in the middle of 2000.

Following the special council meeting, the council members met with members of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

The two groups had met together approximately one year ago to discuss issues common to both governmental entities.

Among the items discussed by the two groups were county dispatch and the relationship between the county and the city in regard to dispatch and transportation of prisoners.

The commissioners indicated a willingness to work together with the city and Wayne Industries in the area of economic development.

Also discussed was the issue of county zoning.

The Wayne City Council will again meet in regular session on Tuesday, Aug. 31.

## Main Street Festival planned

Main Street Wayne is having a fall festival built around the Wayne State College Band Day parade and football game on Saturday, Sept. 11.

The festival's theme is "WAKE UP with Wayne!!" then join us after the Game!!

Donna Trampel, director of the Main Street project, said, "The Promotion Committee of Main Street felt it was important to have a fall festival and they felt it was natural to build the festival around the Wayne State College Band Day parade and football game."

"The advantages seemed many. Not only do we have an opportunity to get people to town, but it gives us an opportunity to work with the college to help enhance the parade and to work with farmers, churches and other segments of the community to display their wares and to show off their organizations with a float in the parade. We are hopeful that this

can grow and become a tradition for Wayne," Ms. Trampel added.

The festival is designed to capitalize on the additional visitors to town for Band Day and to create entertainment and fun for these visitors as well as for people from the the Wayne area. Activities have been designed for people of all ages. The fun starts at 7 a.m.

A pancake feed will kick off the festival and will be held at the Women's Club Room in the City Auditorium. In addition there will be a Farmers' Market on West Second Street; a Flea Market in the alleys of Main Street next to the Diamond Center and old Daylight Donut building. Artisans will be housed in the former Daylight Donut building and crafters are scheduled to be under the awnings of Main Street businesses between Second and Third Streets.

At 9 a.m. there will be a music and exhibition by the "Leather & Lace" Square Dancers Club in the

Magic Wok parking lot. Throughout the morning there will be various youth demonstrations, games and contests. A skate board demonstration will take place in the parking lot next to the State National Bank Park on Second and Main Streets.

At 10 a.m. the Band Day Parade will take place. This will be followed at noon by the Band Day Pre-Game show and the Wayne State College football game at Cunningham Field and Memorial Stadium.

For young people who do not care to go to the game, there will be free children's movies at 1 and 3 p.m. at Twin Theater.

Following the football game, activities will move to Victor Park (South Main Street) where there will be live music, a pet show, skate board exhibitions and demonstrations and kiddie / youth games.

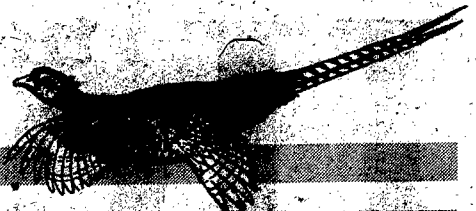

### BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY

In an effort to maintain a safe environment for children during the upcoming school year, here are a few safety tips to consider:

#### SAFETY TO AND FROM SCHOOL

- Know the routes your children take and have them travel with other children. Be aware of how much time it takes to go to and from school. Do not allow them to take shortcuts that may be dangerous.
- Tell your children to stay away from strange vehicles.
- Instruct your children to walk on sidewalks. If there are no sidewalks, suggest walking in single file on the side of the road. Cross streets at intersections only.
- Direct your children to never accept rides from anyone other than persons you have designated beforehand.
- Inform school officials and day care providers as to who is authorized to pick up your children.
- Advise your children's principal to notify you immediately if one of your children is absent.
- At the earliest age possible, have your children memorize their full name, phone number and address. Teach them how to use the phone to call home, call 911, and how to make a collect call home.
- Take note of the clothes your children are wearing to school each day so that you could describe what they are wearing, if necessary.

#### REPORT SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Instruct your children to immediately inform school authorities of any criminal or suspicious activity they may witness. Informing your local police department or school about suspicious incidents may prove helpful in dealing with these situations, and may help resolve a potential problem. If you or your children see any suspicious activity, dial 911 immediately.

#### KNOW YOUR CHILDREN'S FRIENDS

Know the names of your children's friends, where they live and how to reach them. Your children make new friends each school year. Being familiar with your children's friends will help you know where to look for them in the event they fail to come home from school on time. Children should also be taught to keep parents informed about their whereabouts.

#### SAFETY AT HOME

It is important to have a plan in place for your children to follow if they get home from school and no adult is there. You should have a list of emergency phone numbers available for your child. These should be numbers of people the children know and can call either for advice, or during an emergency. You should also have a well-defined list of what your children can and cannot do if they are home alone.

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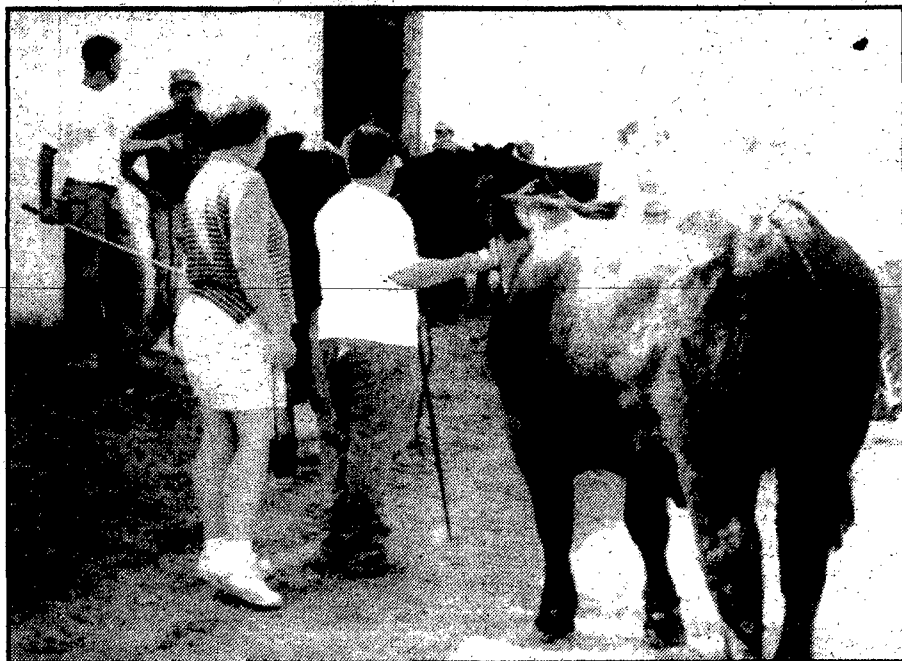

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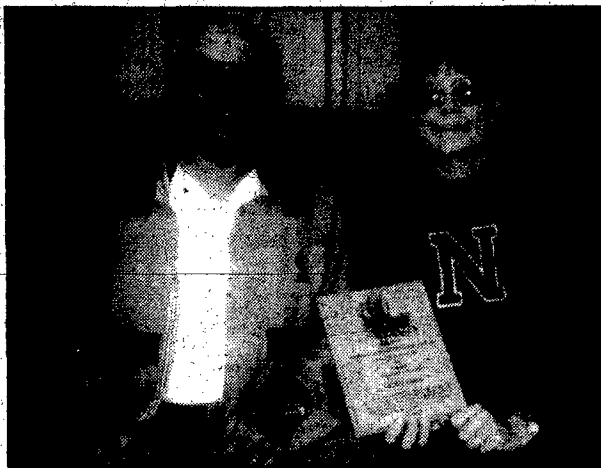

# 'Look to the east' for tax changes

Turn your eyes to the east, taxpayers. Not to Lincoln. Look at Omaha. The Omaha City Council is being asked to show the restraint that state government has urged upon all local governments that have authority to collect property taxes.

Here is the issue: When your property becomes more valuable, the government increases its valuation. In reality, it is nothing more than an acknowledgment of increasing property value.

What too many taxpayers do not understand is that an increase in valuation does not, does not, does not have to mean an automatic increase in property taxes.

Those local government entities can reduce, reduce, reduce the size of the tax levy on the property. Easy example: if a tax is 10 percent on a dollar, the government gets 10 cents. If you earn \$2, the government can avoid increasing your taxes simply by reducing the tax rate to 5 percent. Government would still get the dime. Get it?

Local government, relying on your property tax dollars, can do the same thing. Lower the rate of tax on the value. Local government can also simply agree to limit spending to a level that would not take advantage of windfall increases from property taxes -- that is, the increased amount that would automatically be collected if valuations increase, and tax levies remain the same.

Now, look at Omaha. A group called Nebraska Conservatives for Freedom has reminded the Omaha City Council of a pledge to avoid taking advantage of increased revenues

from higher residential property valuations.

The Legislature has done a variety of things to discourage a long-standing tendency by local governments to spend whatever comes in.

For one thing, it doesn't seem fair. For another thing, when local governments hit the property tax till as hard as possible, it is a misguided tradition in Nebraska to blame the state Legislature. (This has to do with the pitifully inadequate understanding of government rampant in our society; but, that's another column).

Omaha's mayor has proposed a tax rate that would represent a 6.5 percent drop from last year. However, his budget also represents a 4.3 percent increase over this year's expenditures.

One city council member has said that a budget increase of not more than 3 percent would be required to avoid taking a windfall from the higher property valuations.

So, look to Omaha. If the Omaha City Council avoids tapping the windfall, it could be a good precedent. Specifically, it would be good for those of you who want to go to local government budget hearings and use it as an example for your elected representatives.

Texas governor and would-be president George W. Bush didn't make an appearance at a recent GOP confab in Omaha. Maybe he figures he has a lock on the Republican nomination. And his campaign war chest would indicate that he isn't in immediate need of additional campaign donations.

Some traditional Nebraska conservatives might be troubled if they read a Bush interview in the premiere issue of talk magazine.

Since traditional Nebraska conservatives aren't likely to read such a publication, I'll share a bit of it with them, along with a little background.

Syndicated columnist George Will, he of the occasional bowtie and consistent conservative view, talked about the interview on a recent network TV program.

He expressed concern, as he put it, about Bush's use "of what we parents call the 'f' word."

Will's observation got more attention than the interview itself.

So, for those of you who were wondering exactly what it was GB said, here are some excerpts, with appropriate editing, from the interview.

The subject was how the rich react to Bush telling them that social responsibility comes with wealth; that getting rich is not, itself, a noble thing.

Bush: "I don't care. I really don't care. Does anyone ever say, 'F--- you'? I don't care if they do. People do have a responsibility to give back, affluent people especially. And that's what I tell them."

Later, Bush is asked about a nasty rumor aimed at him.

Bush: "People are spreading this garbage. They think it's a high school election, where if you beat up your opponents enough you can win. They've lost their f---ing minds."

Sometimes a public official assumes that a reporter, usually one of more than passing acquaintance, understands that the occasional profanity will probably be regarded as "off the record."

The article gave no indication that Bush reflected any concern in that regard.

George Will did; and he suspects that some others might, too.

## Creating demand with ethanol

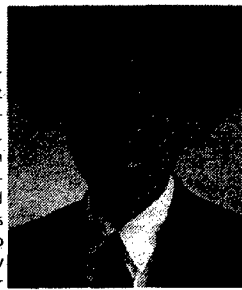

Dear Nebraska Neighbors:

To say Nebraska's agriculture economy faces great challenges would be something of an understatement. While severe weather in parts of the state and relentless heat have jeopardized crops and livestock, farmers and ranchers continue to struggle through terribly low prices for many of their products. A host of factors, from mother nature to a shortage of markets both at home and abroad for our products, have combined to create a very difficult situation that reaches far beyond the individual producer.

The time to act on these challenges is now. I am working aggressively on several short-term solutions both here at home and in Washington, D.C. to help our farmers and ranchers through these trying times, and to allow our ag economy to benefit from several long-term developments including statewide economic growth efforts, new and stronger foreign markets, and a coordinated value-added initiative for our ag products.

One of these long-term efforts, the expanded production and promotion of ethanol, is perhaps one of the brightest spots on the horizon for our ag economy. Ethanol processing plants in Nebraska consumed approximately 180 million bushels of Nebraska corn in 1997 and about 200 million bushels in 1998. With a seventh ethanol plant coming on-line this year, nearly one of every six bushels of corn grown in Nebraska could be processed for



ethanol in 1999. The key point being, as ethanol production increases so does market demand and, ultimately, grain prices.

The ethanol industry has been growing

steadily over the past several years, and just recently, we have begun to see the tremendous possibilities that exist in this area. In February, I mentioned in this column that I had traveled to Las Vegas to address a national conference on ethanol policy. Since that time, promising developments have taken place.

On July 27th, a U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) panel issued a report critical of the MTBE, a gasoline additive designed to reduce pollution. The panel's report indicated that while MTBE has provided substantial reduction in toxic emissions from automobiles, MTBE has also been found to cause contamination in drinking water in areas where MTBE treated gasoline is sold.

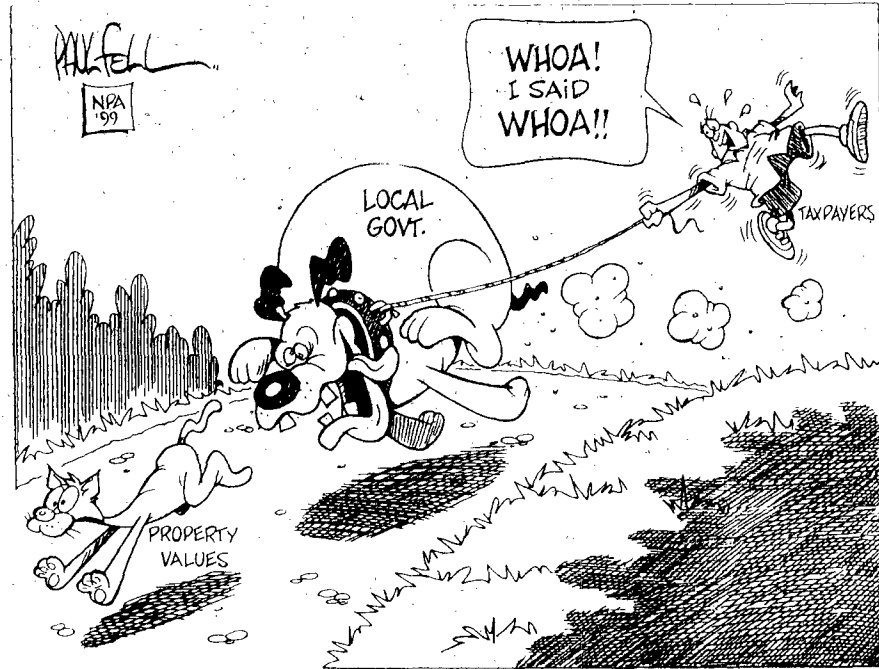
Since 1990, MTBE treated gasoline has been required in all or parts of 16 states due to air quality concerns in those states. The EPA panel's report suggests that the pollution reductions achieved with MTBE be maintained by requiring petroleum refiners to use other additives to lower toxic emissions. I believe the obvious alternative is ethanol, especially Nebraska-produced ethanol.

Earlier this year, California Gov. Gray Davis signed an executive order phasing out the use of MTBE over the next several years. He did not, however, specify an alternative to be used as a replacement. In late June, a delegation of Nebraska officials traveled to California to discuss ethanol as a possible replacement for MTBE with California officials.

The reception in California was very positive, and California officials were very pleased by the potential benefits ethanol could provide in their efforts to meet the state's stringent air quality standards. This delegation will continue to work with and provide information to California officials over the next several months as key fuel additive decisions are made.

Here at home, I have reaffirmed the state policy of using ethanol blended fuels in state vehicles. While this may only be a small gesture in the grand scheme of total ethanol production and use, this long-standing policy emphasizes our commitment to ethanol and hopefully provides an example to other organizations and individuals across the state.

As we assess our energy needs into the future, states and countries around the world are beginning to recognize the valuable alternative to fossil fuels that ethanol represents. This renewable resource helps to reduce pollution by motor vehicles, adds value to Nebraska grains, and provides jobs at six, and hopefully soon seven, ethanol plants across Nebraska. It's a win, win, win situation for agriculture, job creation in several Nebraska communities, the environment and ultimately, our "Nebraska United."

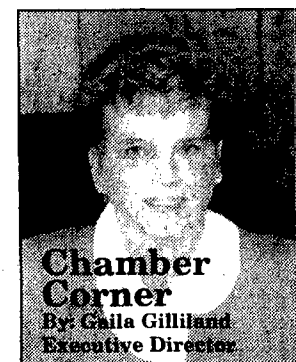

Trust is the key to one's validation

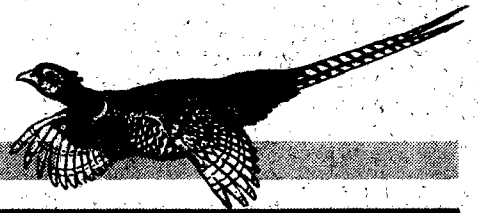

These guys will play 27 holes for the right to claim that title. As far as picking favorites that's always hard to do.

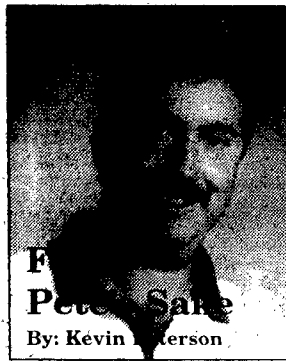

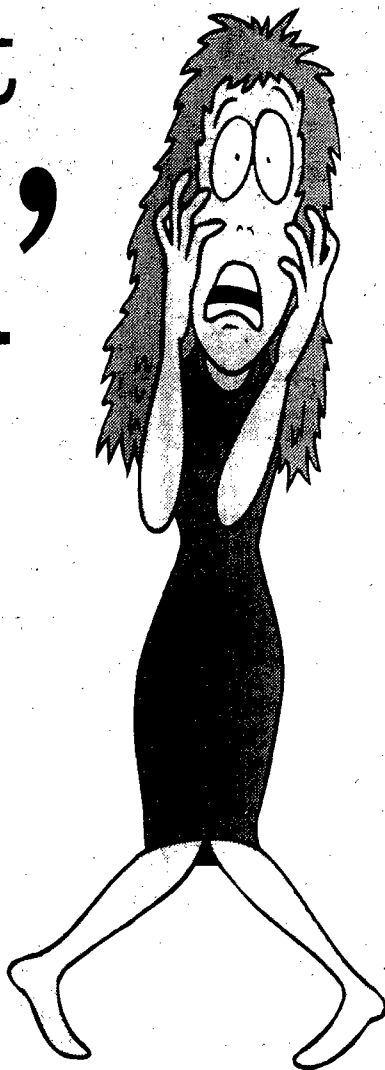

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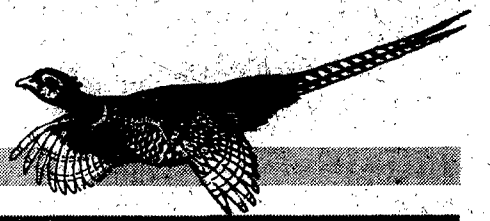

## The Principal's Office

Students in grade 9-12 should review the following guidelines concerning the hot lunch program at Wayne High School:

They are as follows:

1. All deposits for lunch money must be made before school each day (8 a.m.). No deposits will be made after 8:10 a.m.
2. All lunch must be eaten in the lunchroom area. No food may be taken out of the lunchroom. (includes lunch brought from home.)
3. No outside food or drinks brought into school during the hours of 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.
4. No books in the lunch room area.
5. Lunch hour: 11:27 a.m. to 12:44 p.m.
6. Student meal price: \$1.35.

Parents and student should be aware of the latest policies regarding school lunch programs and competition with that program from outside sources.

The Competitive Foods Policy reads as follows:

"Foods sold in competition with National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs are subject to all federal regulations. Such foods shall not be sold on school premises during the period for breakfast and/or lunch and lasting until one-half hour after the serving of breakfast and/or lunch. State and Federal reimbursements may be withheld from schools found in violation of this policy."

This policy does prohibit foods such as pizza, hamburgers, etc. from being brought to school during meal service times. (11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. at Wayne High School).

In effect this policy prohibits any food or drinks brought to school from outside sources during the hours of 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. each school day or use of pop machines at school during these hours.

Students may bring a sack lunch from home.

# Prepare for disasters

The Federal Emergency Management Agency Director, James Witt states that the U.S. loses 600 lives, \$2.8 billion, and thousands of homes, jobs, and businesses to natural disasters every year. Believing that the losses are

to repair the damage. Federal agencies have spent billions to relieve disaster victims every year. Some of the victims were repeatedly faced with the same types of disaster (Witt, 1999).

The new model, according to Witt, is to curb waste by helping communities to take steps to avoid the social and economic devastation of floods or storms. Witt's concern was the policy of using public money to rebuild homes and structures situated in flood plains or areas susceptible to repeat disasters.

An example was the flood insurance program which continued to pay out \$200 million a year in repetitive loss claims. As a result of this rethinking of how FEMA responds and its role in proactive solutions, Project Impact grew. Project Impact operates in 118 communities and involves making housing more disaster resistant.

**Making housing more disaster resistant:**

Making housing more disaster resistant involves, in addition to considering the area and type of likely disasters, houses designed to withstand nature's forces.

\*Extra beams and struts tie the roof to the structure

\*The house is bolted to its foundation

\*Storm shutters and high-impact glass resist damaging winds

\*Extra thick wallboard is used

\*Carbon monoxide detectors are installed

\*Sprinklers and other safety systems are included

\*Other strengthening designs and materials are used

**Suggestions for protecting yourself include-**

\*Floods: If you live in a flood plain and are unable or unwilling to move, elevate your house above the 100-year flood stage so water will flow under it, not into it.

\*High Winds: Build a "safe room." In new construction, build an interior room with concrete walls, a metal heavy door, and no windows. Anchor your house to the foundation, bolt bookcases, water heaters and other heavy objects to the wall. Use hurricane clips for reinforcing structure.

\*Fires: Cut back shrubbery from your home, and use fire-retardant plant species like olive or holly. Use fire resistant building materials.

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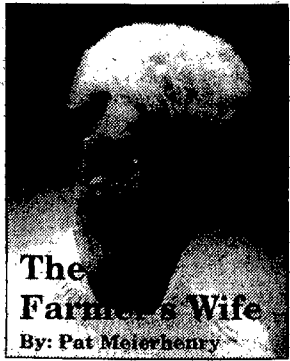
## Summer endings seem premature

## Emergency loans available

Farm Service Agency (FSA) Wayne County Office announced that family farmers in Dakota and Thurston counties who suffered physical or production losses due to severe storms and flooding that occurred from July 2, 1999, and continuing, may be eligible for FSA Emergency (EM) loans.

On July 22, 1999, President Clinton declared a major disaster in the State of Iowa and designated four counties eligible for EM physical and production loss loans due to severe storms and flooding that occurred from July 2, 1999, and continuing. Dakota and Thurston counties also became eligible because they are contiguous to one or more the designated counties. The current interest rate for the EM loans is 3.75 percent.

Family farmers interested in finding out if they are eligible should contact Mark Moser, Wayne County Farm Loan Manager in Wayne, Craig Rowland, Dakota County Executive Director in South Sioux City, or Everett Moore, Thurston County Executive Director in Walthill for information. They can be reached Monday through Friday between 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The Wayne County Office telephone number is (402) 375-2453, extension 2; The Dakota County office phone number is (402) 494-1950, extension 2, and the Thurston County Office phone number is

(402) 846-5322, extension #2.

Emergency loan applications are available and must be submitted through the local FSA county office from any applicant who qualifies for a physical or production loss (at least a 30 percent reduction from normal) in a single enterprise from this disaster in Dakota or Thurston counties.

To qualify for an EM loan, an applicant must be an established family farm operator; provide evidence of having suffered a qualifying physical or production loss; be unable to obtain suitable credit from a source other than FSA. The

low interest loans may cover up to 80 percent of their actual production losses, or \$500,000 whichever is less. The applicants must show ability to repay the loan and must be adequately secured. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to make payments on current real state and chattel debts.

The deadline for submitting an application is March 22, 2000. Applications for all FSA programs will be given equal consideration without regard to race, color, sex, creed, marital status, or national origin.

## Agricultural marketing class offered

Agricultural producers who wish to sharpen their marketing skills can enroll in "Agricultural Marketing" taught by Dr. Jim Kendrick through the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Non-credit enrollees will receive the lectures on VHS video tape each week or can view the course live via Internet broadcast.

Producers can also interact with Dr. Kendrick via the Internet each day that the class is in session and through a computer discussion group, the Agricultural Marketing listserv. This is probably the last time

that Dr. Kendrick will teach the course, so this is a "last chance" to take advantage of this opportunity.

Some of the topics covered in this class include: how to reduce price risk through the use of agricultural futures and options; when and when not to use storage; how to use production marketing contracts with agricultural firms to your advantage; concepts of using basic determination in pricing your crops and livestock.

Dr. Kendrick leads participants from the basics through the complex and uses real world examples

based on what's happening in the market now.

The video tapes provide a convenient format that can be kept for future reference.

The cost of the course is \$349.99 for non-credit enrollees. If several producers are interested in the course, they may share the cost of enrollment. College credit is also available for interested producers or for high school seniors.

Family members of high school seniors enrolled for credit may participate for free.

The course begins Aug. 23, 1999 with the first tape arriving Aug. 30 and will continue through Dec. 13, 1999.

Producers who do not have a computer are welcome to call the Wayne County Extension office to make arrangements to use a computer to participate in this class.

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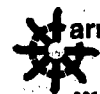





**St. John's Wort May "Interact" with Sun**

A few prescription medicines have been shown to increase one's sensitivity to sun exposure. The result can be a sudden and painful sunburn after only a brief period of time in the sun. Now there is evidence that the popular herbal remedy St. John's Wort also may "interact" with radiation from the sun - but in a different manner. A report in the prestigious medical journal *The Lancet* describes the experiences of a 35 year old woman who used 500 mg of St. John's Wort each day for four weeks. She began to feel a stinging-type pain on her face and on the back of her hands following sun exposure.

The physician who examined her could find no evidence of sunburn. She complained of pain after light touching. Exposure to cold temperature caused acute pain in areas that had been sun-exposed. Use of the herb was stopped, and symptoms disappeared over a two-month period.

The author of the report noted that St. John's Wort contains compounds that can damage certain cells upon exposure to sunlight. Myelin in nerve cells can be damaged, resulting in pain.
