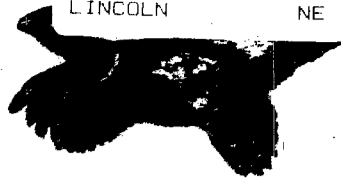

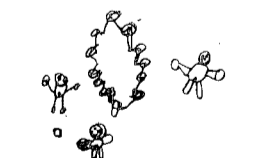
Holiday closings

Rec Center update given

In the last meeting of 1999, the Wayne City Council authorized the sale of two parcels of land, voted against amending the city code and listened to an update on the proposed Community Recreation / Activity Center for the city of Wayne.

Ordinance 99-16 directed the sale of the former Haase Trailer Court property to Four Square, L.P. for \$52,500. Ordinance 99-17 directed the sale of the former May Longe Property to Region IV Office of Developmental Disabilities for \$16,300.

However, because three council persons were absent, the three readings could not be waived on the ordinances.

Ordinance 99-18 which would have restricted parking on the south side of East 10th Street between Logan and Nebraska Streets from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday-Friday and restrict parking on a portion of the west side of Pearl Street between Second and Third Streets did not pass even though four council persons voted in favor of it. Five affirmative votes were needed for the measure to pass.

Several members of the Community Recreation / Activity Center committee were on hand to give an update and request an extension on the deadline for con-

cept plans and costs estimates.

Pat Garvin told the council that the group had had a lot of discussion on possible sites for the center and because of time constraints, the group felt that at this time the area just south of Hank Overin Field was the best choice for the center.

"This isn't to say we have given up on other sites, such as near the high school, but we do have to move on if we are to get the issue before the voters in the May primary election," Garvin said.

Members of the group indicated that having the facility near the baseball field would allow for the sharing of facilities and would also allow for possible future expansion.

Public Works Superintendent Vern Schulz told the group he felt they would regret having the center near the grain elevator located just south of the proposed site.

"In the fall when corn starts coming in, the chaff there is very thick. Also, on a normal year the dryers are running and it is very loud. I don't know how you would deal with it," Schulz said.

The council also passed Resolution 99-70 which accepted the bid from Swaney Equipment of \$59,984 for a John Deere backhoe to be used in a number areas in the city.

In other action, Mayor Sheryl Lindau appointed Ralph Barclay to the Civil Service Commission.

Car makes its way to Australia

Last week Stan Johnson of rural Wayne received a phone call from Wayne County Clerk Debra Finn.

The call concerned a letter Mrs. Finn had received from Jim and Laurie Casey of Kings Point, New South Wales, Australia.

The Caseys are seeking information on a 1938 Buick Century sedan that was once owned by Johnson.

Johnson purchased the car from a car club in Norfolk in 1974. At that time he did some minor repairs and restoration to the car and took the car to a number of parades.

After being asked a number of times, he finally sold the car in 1977 to Charles Wilson, who is originally from Allen.

Wilson was teaching in Oshkosh, Wisc. at the time and took the car to Wisconsin. Shortly after that he married and sold the car.

Johnson said that at that point he lost track of the car and hadn't given it much thought until the letter came from the Caseys.

The Australian couple purchased the car in Illinois in October of 1998 and had it shipped to their home.

The Caseys had traced the car to Nebraska through two slips of paper

that they found in the trunk. One was a motor vehicle inspection certificate that was required of all cars during the 1970's and had the word "Nebraska" on it. The other was a piece of a newspaper article that also contained the word "Nebraska."

The couple then contacted the Nebraska Department of Motor Vehicles and the car was traced to its last Nebraska owner, Stan Johnson.

"The 1938 Buick Century was a luxury car. I would estimate that it

Radio station sold

Norman Waitt Jr., chairman of Waitt Media, announced that the company is expanding its radio presence in northeast Nebraska.

Waitt Media has signed an agreement, effective Jan. 1, 2000 to purchase KTCH-AM & FM in Wayne and has signed an agreement to be the licensed manager of KNEN-FM in Norfolk.

All three stations are currently owned and operated by Gene Koehn.

"The addition of these stations strengthens our presence in the Midwest," said Waitt. "Under the leadership of Gene Koehn these stations have become market leaders and Waitt Media is committed to continuing their upward growth."

"We have always made quality programming a priority at our stations and I am confident that Waitt

will continue that commitment," Koehn said. "Waitt will inherit a group of hard working people who have helped make these stations valuable properties," Koehn said. "They should be happy to become part of Waitt Media."

The closings of these transactions are subject to the approval of the Federal Communications Commission.

Waitt Media owns radio and television stations and outdoor signs in seven states. Including these announced transactions, Waitt Media provides programming for 39 radio stations and owns five television stations in the United States.

Waitt Media also owns approximately 500 outdoor sign locations throughout the Midwest and Southeast.

Housing program helps first-time home buyers

Troy, Stephanie and Tahlia Reynolds are the new owners of a beautiful one-story ranch style home in Wayne.

The Reynolds purchased this home through the assistance of the HOME Purchase/Rehab/Resell program (HPRR) of the Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation (WCHDC).

The Reynolds have lived in Wayne for six years. Eight months ago they started house-hunting, only to find the market in Wayne more expensive than they could afford.

Through friends who had bought a house with down payment assistance, they discovered the WCHDC. After filling out an application for the program and being determined eligible, they began looking for a house, no longer ruling out those homes that needed repair.

Troy and Stephanie soon found a home they liked. It was inspected

and determined to meet the guidelines of the HPRR program, requiring a minimum of \$2,500 in improvements.

WCHDC purchased the home in July and rehabilitation of the home began. The Reynolds put many hours of their own labor into the home. They ripped carpet up, scraped the vinyl floors, repainted every room and blew insulation in the attic with the help of family and friends.

Members of the Wayne State College football team helped take out the cabinets and countertop in the kitchen. The egress window in the basement bedroom will be installed with talent from the Wayne State College Industrial Technical Education program.

Local contractors were hired to fix the roof, rewire the house and

install new carpeting. The Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation sold the home to the Reynolds on Oct. 12, 1999, after months of repair.

"We are glad we got to help with the rehab of the home and are happy with the HPRR program," Troy said.

The HOME Purchase / Rehab / Resell program is one of two down payment assistance programs offered by WCHDE to assist home buyers who meet income eligibility requirements and wish to buy their first home.

Property chosen by HPRR applicants must be priced such that necessary improvements can be funded and the final sale price remain under the maximums set forth by this program and for the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

According to Stephanie Reynolds, "If you are looking to buy a home that may need some work, HPRR is a good program to help you."

Persons interested in down payment assistance programs should contact Linda Anderson at 375-5266. Anderson will go through the guidelines and an application process that will determine eligibility for the program.

CAUTION ON THE ROAD NEEDED THIS TIME OF YEAR

Dear Nebraska Neighbors:

Although we have enjoyed an unseasonably mild fall and a delayed onset of winter weather, the inevitable signs of the season have finally appeared. As we approach another Nebraska winter, it is important to be prepared for whatever Mother Nature has in store.

Nebraska's highway snow removal units are ready to tackle winter weather with ready equipment and the latest technology and road treatments available. This includes the use of liquid chemical processes for frost, ice and snow control on roadways. We are now using salt brine, an ethanol-byproduct called Ice Ban, and magnesium chloride. According to the Nebraska Department of Roads, these liquids are safer than gravel, eliminate windshield chipping, yield quicker results and are expected to cut the state's snow removal cost in half.

While the latest technology is being applied to Nebraska's roads, there are still limitations and safety precautions that we should all keep in mind as we drive any road in Nebraska's harsh winter weather. I would like to share a few helpful winter safety reminders in hopes we can all do our part to make Nebraska's roads safer for everyone.

Approach winter driving with the right frame of mind. Always drive at a speed that matches the prevailing visibility, traffic and road conditions. Turn your headlights on for added safety.

Icy roads make it difficult to steer and to stop. Slow down gradually when you approach curves and intersections. Beware of icy spots especially on bridges and in sheltered areas.

It is also best to avoid travel if at all possible during severe winter weather conditions. If you must travel, make sure your vehicle is in good mechanical condition, equipped with proper tires for winter driving and has a full tank of fuel. Take a winter storm car kit, use major roads, and make sure someone knows approximately where you are or ought to be. While enroute, tune to local commercial radio stations for updated weather and road condition reports.

Suggested items for a winter storm car kit include: blankets or sleeping bags, matches and candles, one gallon can with cover, facial tissue, paper towels, high calorie non-perishable food, extra clothing, red flag, first-aid kit, knife, shovel, sack of sand, flashlight, signal light, windshield brush and scraper, booster cables, tow chains, and cellular phone.

If you become stuck in a winter storm or stalled in a blizzard, do not panic. Work slowly to avoid overexertion, and as much as possible, stay in your vehicle. It provides the best protection from the weather, and you are more likely to be discovered by highway maintenance crews or law enforcement officers if you remain in your vehicle.


To bring attention to yourself while stranded, use flares or flashlights to signal for help, and turn on the dome light in your car to make you visible. In addition, tie a colored cloth to the radio antenna to aid daytime vehicle visibility.

We work hard to build and maintain our 10,000 miles of highways, and our State Patrol officers enforce important speed laws to protect you and your families. We also hope you'll check our information sources before you decide to go on ice or snow.

Road condition reports, available at 1-800 rest areas via DTNs (Data Transmission Networks), are now accessible on the Department of Roads website, along with links to weather information sites. If you have a personal computer, check out <http://www.dor.state.ne.us>. Also, the Nebraska State Patrol has a toll-free emergency highway help line at 1-800-525-5555. In addition, the State Patrol provides current statewide travel condition updates during inclement weather. These updates can be obtained by calling toll-free number 1-800-906-9069 within Nebraska, from November through April. When you are out of Nebraska, dial 402-471-4533.

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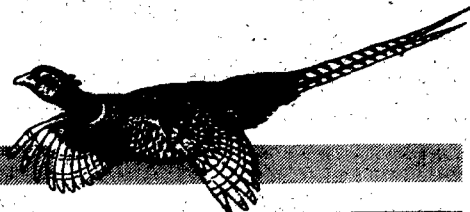

'Cats knock off second unbeaten NCC team with 79-70 win over UNO

WSC men win seventh straight

Greg McDermott's Wayne State men's basketball team ran their win streak to seven over the weekend while improving to 7-2 on the season.

In the process the Wildcats knocked off a second previously unbeaten North Central Conference team as WSC came from behind to defeat UNO, 79-70 last Friday night.

The Mavericks came in to Wayne with an 8-0 record and midway through the second half UNO had an 11-point lead at 60-49.

That's when "Mac's" defense rose to the occasion and delivered in a big way with a 30-10 scoring run the remainder of the way.

WSC led the visitors by seven points with less than five minutes in the first half before UNO went on a run of its own, out-scoring the 'Cats 14-2 to lead 41-36 at the half.

The Mavericks connect on 18-of-23 shot attempts in the opening half for a 78 percent success mark.

Early in the second half the Mavs hit four-of-its-first-five shots to grab a 12-point lead but down the stretch it was their lack of shooting well because of WSC's torrid defense that spelled the difference.

UNO missed eight-of-nine shots during the stretch when the 'Cats were warming up from long range.

WSC hit 10 consecutive free throws over the final minutes to secure the victory.

"It's not that we made any adjustments when UNO got up by double digits," McDermott said. "All we did differently was execute our defense like we're supposed to and it worked."

"Mac" said anytime you can hold an explosive UNO offense to just six points over the final nine minutes your defense has done quite a job.

"Playing defense with out fouling was the difference in the game," McDermott added. "When they fouled us we were going to the foul line but we weren't in foul trouble and when we did foul, they were forced to in-bounds the ball because we weren't over the limit."

Jon Dolliver scored a season-high 20 points and grabbed eight rebounds while Brad Joens poured in 16 points including four, three-

pointers. Rory Williams connected for 15 points and Kevin Lingenfelter came off the bench to score nine.

The 'Cats won the battle of the boards, 29-20 with Dolliver leading the way while Eric Henderson had six caroms.

Henderson dished out a team-high four assists and Dolliver led the team with three steals.

SATURDAY IN WAYNE, WSC wasted little time in thrashing an over-matched Grand View team, 106-57.

WSC had five players in double figures led by Kevin Lingenfelter with 19 points (a career high) in just 17 minutes of playing time.

WSC doubled the score on Grand View at the half at 48-24 and out-scored the visitors, 58-33 in the second half.

All 11 Wildcat players that suited up, scored as Jon Dolliver followed Friday's 20-point performance with 17 points and Nathan Mulder tallied 16. Brad Joens and Matt VanVoorst each tossed in 11 points.

Brad Manley was close to double digits with nine points with Eric Henderson scored eight.

The 'Cats set or tied nine season highs during the rout including points scored (106), field goals (40), three-point field goals (13), rebounds (55), assists (26) and steals (15).

"Given the timing of this game with Christmas Break and coming off a big game with UNO I was pleased with the way our kids took control and played intense on both ends of the floor the entire game," McDermott said. "With only one day to prepare for them, the guys showed great focus."

The battle of the boards was won in a big way by WSC, 55-32 as Jason Herlitzke led the way with 10 caroms while Matt VanVoorst had eight rebounds and Eric Henderson, seven.

Rory Williams dished out a career-high eight assists with Dolliver and Manley each garnering three steals.

WSC will turn its attention to conference play as they travel to play Winona State on Sunday, Jan. 2 before playing at Concordia-St. Paul on Monday, Jan. 3.

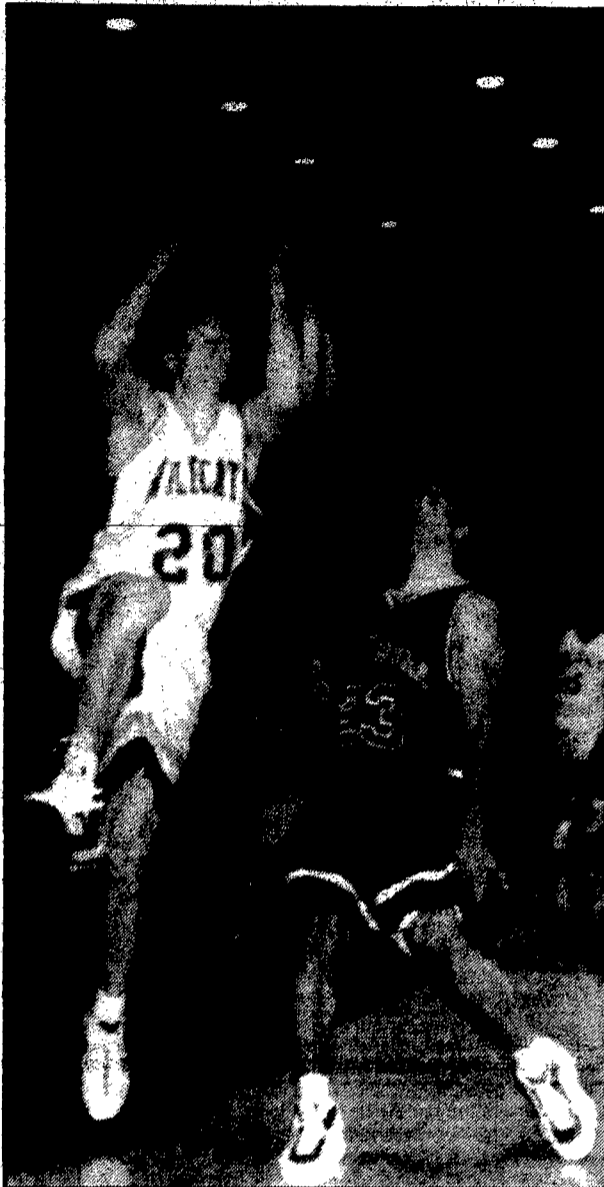

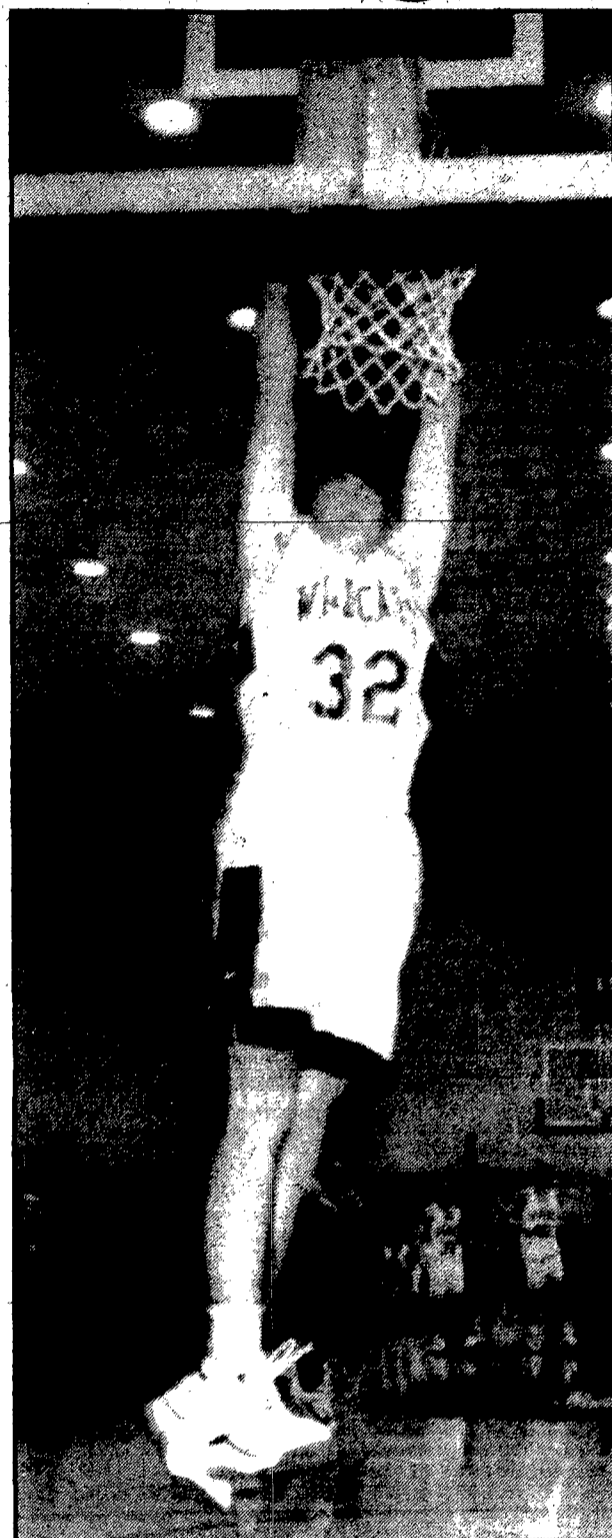
"We were a last minute replacement for a team that dropped out," coach James Gagner said. "I thought our girls played hard and played well together for not having practiced together."

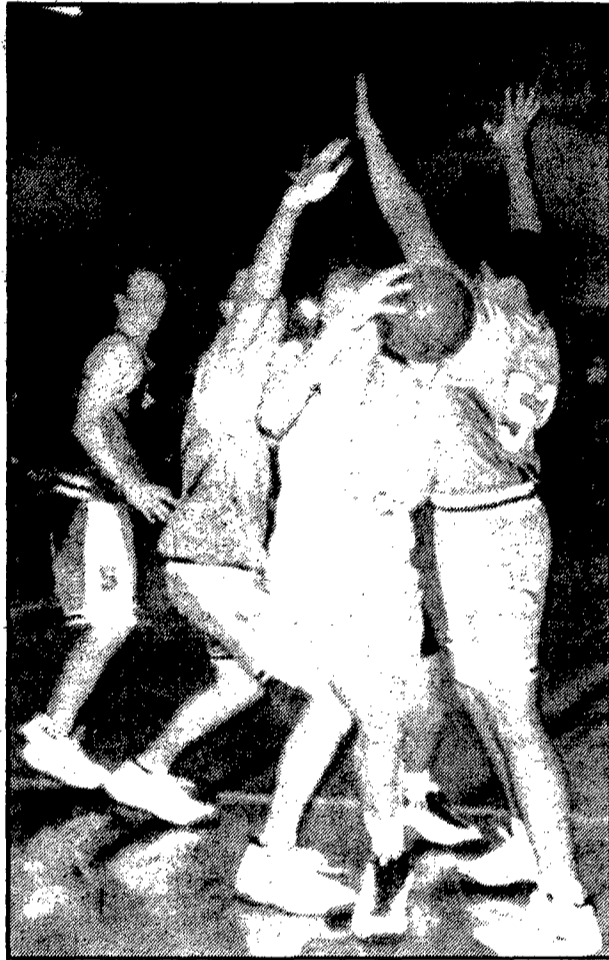

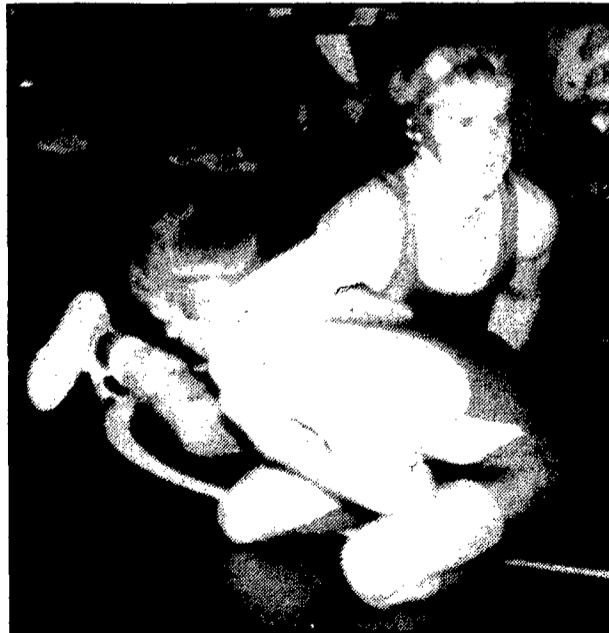

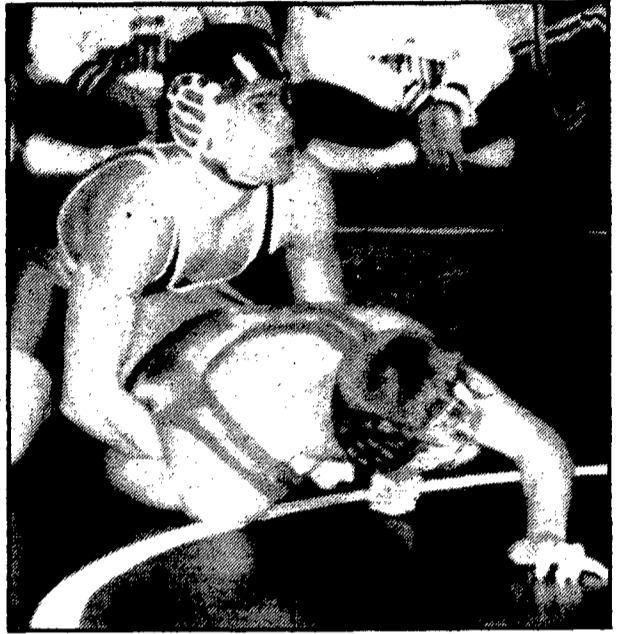

Understanding terms used in education

Do you sometimes come away from a parent-teacher conference or other meeting at the school feeling as if you had just left a foreign country? The language sounds like English, but somehow you've missed some of its meaning. Though not meant to be confusing, today's educational terminology is certainly not what it was when we were in school. Nearly every aspect of education today has a new designation or new definition. Here are some terms you should know:

To begin with, "standard-based education" refers to a level of academic learning and mastery as determined by the state. A student's ability to meet these academic standards is frequently a prerequisite for graduation.

"Cooperative learning" involves students working together in small groups, with each student being responsible for one part of the group's work, thus contributing to the success of all.

"Multiple intelligences" refers to the eight separate intelligences defined by Howard Gardner of Harvard University. These are linguistic, logical-mathematical, spatial, musical, bodily kinesthetic, interpersonal, intrapersonal and naturalistic. Knowing that all students possess these, separate intelligences in varying degrees, teachers employ a variety of techniques to help students discover and develop their talents and strengths.

"Distance learning centers" or "virtual classrooms" are really sophisticated electronic labs where classes are taught via television or the Internet.

"Inclusion" refers to the plan mandated by law that includes special education students in regular classroom settings. The acronym "IEP" stands for "Individualized Education Program" which must be in place for every child receiving special education services.

"Phonics" is a reading method which teaches children to identify and spell words based on the way certain letters and letter combinations sound. "Whole language" refers to a teaching method in which vocabulary words and writing are stressed across the curriculum, with core subjects linked by content. "ESL" stands for English as a Second Language.

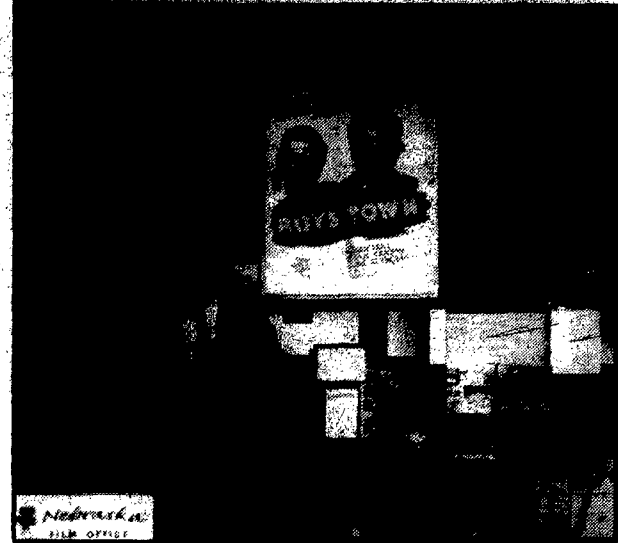
"Team-teaching" or "collaborative teaching" involves grouping teachers, who combine their skills to enhance learning for students. A "para-educator" is a specially trained classroom aide, who may or may not be a certified teacher.

An innovative concept known as the "school-to-work" program helps prepare students for our competitive workplace. Students spend half of their day in academic pursuits and the other half at work, receiving credit for both. The success of school-to-work programs is dependent upon strong, extensive "partnerships" with local businesses and industry leaders who provide the work experience and training.

"Vocational programs" have also undergone a metamorphosis since the introduction of technology. Known as "vo-tech" or "vocational-technological" programs, they encompass a broad range of technological learning opportunities, ranging from traditional vocational skills to computer repair.

AS quickly as technology is advancing, new terms will be created. It is important that we learn what this new terminology means, if we are to gain a clear understanding of our children's educational opportunities.

- Parenting Tips:
- If you don't understand a term used by a teacher or principal, ask what it means.
 - If your child sometimes seems to be speaking a new "language," ask about what he or she is learning.
 - Ask your child's teacher if any of the techniques or methods described in this article are in use at your child's school.
 - Suggest that definitions or explanations of new terminology be featured in the school newsletter.

Livestock judging helps prepare for the future

Jonathan Anderson of St. Paul had never judged livestock before. Yet he ended up as the top junior division contender in the livestock breeding division of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's Meat Animal Evaluation Contest.

Anderson said the Dec. 3 contest was educational and fun and something to incorporate into his animal science major.

MAEC gives students an opportunity to compete with their peers to evaluate market and breeding cattle, hogs and sheep, said Keith Gilster, NU livestock evaluation specialist and MAEC judge.

Students judge animals in various scenarios visually and with data, which better prepares them for the industry UNL contests such as MAEC date to 1916.

This year there were 108 students in the junior division and nine in the senior division. They were recognized at a Dec. 10 campus luncheon.

Top individual junior contestants include Scott Maas of Scribner, overall, Chris Junker of Fairbury, market; Jonathan Anderson of St. Paul, breeding; Sonya Plugge of Bartlett, cattle; Benny Mote of Tula,

Texas, hogs and John Magnuson of Carroll, sheep.

Gilster said MAEC is a real end-of-the-semester learning experience.

"The real crucial thing is to bring young people together to look at livestock and records," he said.

The MAEC contest is conducted by the Block and Bridle Club students with help from animal science faculty in NU's Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

MAEC chairs were Brent Pohlmann of Plymouth and Sara Rasmussen of Arlington. Faculty advisers were Jim Cooney, Jess Miner and Mervyn Nielsen, all from the UNL Department of Animal Science.

Inventory shows change in erosion rates, land use

Latest figures from the U.S. Department of Agriculture show that over the last 15 years (1982-97) the average soil erosion in Nebraska has dropped 40 percent, but there is still a need for conservation practices.

Steve Chick, State Conservationist for the Natural Resources Conservation Service, says, "The National Resources Inventory data shows the average erosion from rainfall has dropped from an average of 4.5 tons of soil per acre to 2.7 tons. Generally soil erosion below five tons per acre is considered tolerable." Wind erosion rates have remained the same at 1.5 tons per year, which is an acceptable rate.

"As an average, that is good. Nebraska farmers and ranchers deserve a lot of credit for the conservation work they are doing. These figures show that around three million acres of cropland are eroding at five tons per acre or more. So there is work yet to be done," he said. The inventory shows Nebraska has 19.4 million acres of cropland.

The National Resources Inventory is a statistically based survey designed to assess conditions and trends for soil, water and related resources on private land in the U.S. which makes up 75 percent of the Nation's total land area. The inventory captures data on land cover and use, soil erosion, prime farmland, wetlands, habitat diversity and selected conservation practices. The inventory is conducted every five years.

Other results of the inventory show that:

Nationally, from 1992 to 1997, nearly 16 million acres of agricultural and forestland were developed. The U.S. now loses three million acres per year of forest and agricultural land, which is double what was lost each year from 1983 to 1992. In Nebraska, between 1982-1992, about 5,050 acres of rural land went into development each year. During the last five years that trend has increased to around 13,340 acres per year.

"Nebraska, in 1997, ranks third in the amount of irrigated acres, behind only Texas and California,

respectability Texas and California have been reducing their irrigated acres over the last several years. If these trends continue, NRCIS projects that, in the next five years, Nebraska could have the most irrigated acres in the country."

"Wetland losses nationally between 1992-97 averaged around 54,000 acres per year on agricultural land. But wetland preservation efforts, like the Wetlands Reserve Program are helping because there was a 30,000-acre per year return of wetlands to agricultural lands."

"There is still a 24,000-acre per year net loss. This is significantly better when compared to other statistics that estimate between 1954-74 there were 398,000 acres per year of wetlands lost on agricultural land," said Chick. "We are seeing the start of a lot of interest in wetlands by Nebraska landowners," he added. Specific Nebraska figures on wetland changes are not yet available.

"The amount of rangeland and pastureland in Nebraska continue to decrease slowly. Since 1982, the amount of rangeland acres

decreased from 23.4 million acres to 22.9 million acres. Pastureland acres in the same time period decreased from 2.1 million to 1.9 million. Land use changes from pastureland and rangeland to development or cultivation caused the decreases.

On Dec. 7, 1999, Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman, speaking at USDA's National Conservation Summit at Iowa State University, said, "All Americans concerned about clean air and water, and preserving our quality of life, should come together to address these conservation challenges. Stewardship of the land falls to all of us as Americans." Glickman also said he would recommend that the President convene a national conference on conservation next year.

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Livestock inspection requests due Jan. 1st

NORFOLK - The Livestock Waste Management Act (Nebraska Law) requires livestock producers to request an inspection from the Department of Environment Quality (DEQ) by January 1, 2000, or face possible late fees. The exceptions to this state law requirement are:

1. Livestock operations with less than 300 Animal Units;
2. Calving operations that hold cattle for less than 90 days per year;
3. Livestock operations that previously have been permitted or exempted by DEQ and have not been changed since then.

Inspection fees are assessed per site to be inspected. The Livestock Waste Management Act of 1998 set inspection fees at \$50 per site for operations with 5,000 animal units or less and \$500 per site for livestock operations with more than 5,000 animal units. An animal unit is a measurement used to calculate the total livestock capacity of an operation. For example, 300 animal units equals 300 feeder cattle, 214 dairy cows, 750 head of hogs, or 250 cow-calf pairs.

To comply with the law and meet the January 1, 2000 deadline, producers must include the inspection fee when they send in the inspection request form. Forms sent in without the fee enclosed will be returned to the producer and will not be considered to have met the deadline.

Producers may obtain, "Request for Inspection of Livestock Operation" forms with instructions, from their local Extension, NRD, or NRCS office, or by contacting the Department of Environment Quality, Agriculture Section, at (402) 471-4239. The forms and instructions also may be downloaded from the DEQ internet site at www.deq.state.ne.us under "Priority Issues," or by clicking on the Site Map, Livestock Waste Control Program.

**New Medicine May
 Fight Alcoholism**
 A medicine not yet available
 commercially may help heavy
 drinkers avoid alcohol.
 According to a study recently
 reported in *Archives of General
 Psychiatry*, nalmefene may be
 effective in combination with
 behavioral therapy. Seventy per-
 sons with alcohol dependence
 and who were abstaining from
 alcohol were given the medicine
 during a 12-week trial. Other
 abstaining alcoholics were given
 a placebo. Thirty-seven percent
 of the individuals who took the
 medicine returned to heavy
 drinking, as compared to 59% of
 those who received the placebo.
 The likelihood of returning to
 heavy drinking was about *twice*
 as high in persons not getting
 nalmefene.
 Nalmefene appears to work by
 blocking opiate receptors in the
 brain. *Disulfiram* (Antabuse), a
 medicine now frequently used in
 treatment of alcoholism, simply
 has the potential to make the
 user extremely sick if alcohol is
 ingested.
