Rec Center update given

In the last meeting of 1999, the Wayne City Council authorized the sale of two parcels of land, voted against amending the city code and listened to an update on the proposed Community Recreation / Activity Center for the city of Wayne

Ordinance 99-16 directed the sale of the former Haase Trailer Court property to Four Square, L.P. for \$52,500. Ordinance 99-17 directed the sale of the former May Longe Property to Region IV Office Developmental Disabilities for \$16,300.

However, because three council persons were absent, the three readings could not be waived on the ordinances. Ordinance 99-18 which would

have restricted parking on the south side of East 10th Street between Logan and Nebraska Streets from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday-Friday and restrict parking on a portion of the west side of Pearl Street between Second and Third Streets did not pass even though four council persons voted in favor of it. Five affirmative votes were needed for the measure to pass.

Several members of the Community Recreation / Activity Center committee were on hand to give an update and request an extension on the deadline for concept plans and costs estimates Pat Garvin told the council that

the group had had a lot of discussion on possible sites for the center and because of time constraints, the group felt that at this time the area just south of Hank Overin Field was the best choice for the center.

"This isn't to say we have given up on other sites, such as near the high school, but we do have to move on if we are to get the issue before the voters in the May prima ry election," Garvin said.

Members of the group indicated that having the facility near the baseball field would allow for the sharing of facilities and would also allow for possible future expansion. Public Works Superintendent Vern

Schulz told the group he felt they would regret having the center near the grain elevator located just south of the proposed site. "In the fall when corn starts corn

ing in, the chaff there is very thick. Also, on a normal year the dryers are running and it is very loud. I don't know how you would deal with it," Schulz said

The council also passed Resolution 99-70 which accepted the bid from Swaney Equipment of \$59,984 for a John Deere backhoe to be used in a number areas in the city.

Car makes its way to Australia

Last week Stan Johnson of rural Wayne received a phone call from Wayne County Clerk Debra Finn

The call concerned a letter Mrs. Finn had received from Jim and Laurie Casey of Kings Point, New South Wales, Australia.

The Caseys are seeking informa-tion on a 1938 Buick Century sedan that was once owned by Johnson.

Johnson purchased the car from a car club in Norfolk in 1974. At that time he did some minor repairs and restoration to the car and took the car to a number of parades.

After being asked a number of times, he finally sold the car in 1977 to Charles Wilson, who is originally from Allen.

Wilson was teaching in Oshkosh Wisc. at the time and took the car to Wisconsin. Shortly after that he married and sold the car.

Johnson said that at that point he lost track of the car and hadn't given it much thought until the letter came from the Caseys.

The Australian couple purchased the car in Illinois in October of 1998 and had it shipped to their home.

The Caseys had traced the car to Nebraska through two slips of paper

that they found in the trunk. One was a motor vehicle inspection certificate that was required of all cars during the 1970's and had the word "Nebraska" on it. The other was a piece of a newspaper article that also contained the word "Nebraska."

The couple then contacted the Nebraska Department of Motor Vehicles and the car was traced to its last Nebraska owner, Stan Johnson

Housing program helps first-time home buyers

Stephanie and Tahlia Troy, Reynolds are the new owners of a beautiful one-story ranch style home in Wayne

The Reynolds purchased this home through the assistance of the HOME Purchase/ Rehab / Resell program (HPRR) of the Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation (WCHDC).

The Reynolds have lived in Wayne for six years. Eight months ago they started house-hunting, only to find the market in Wayne more expensive than they could afford.

Through friends who had bought a house with down payment assistance, they discovered the WCHDC. After filling out an application for the program and being determined eligible, they began looking for a house, no longer ruling out those homes that needed repair.

Troy and Stephanie soon found a home they liked. It was inspected and determined to meet the guidelines of the HPRR program, requiring a minimum of \$2.500 in improvements.

WCHDC purchased the home in July and rehabilitation of the home began. The Reynolds put many hours of their own labor into the home. They ripped carpet up, scraped the vinyl floors, repainted every room and blew insulation in the attic with the help of family and friends.

Members of the Wayne State College football team helped take out the cabinets and countertop in the kitchen. The egress window in the basement bedroom will be installed with talent from the Wavne State College Industrial Technical Education program.

Local contractors were hired to fix the roof, rewire the house and

Social Security ready for new millennium

Because so many people depend on Social Security, we feel a special responsibility to be ready for the new millennium and the Y2K computer problem.

Our benefit payments systems are Y2K ready and have been for a full year ahead of the new millennium. We will be able to do all of our tasks on Jan. 1, 2000, which include pay-ing monthly benefit to 50 million people; tracking the earings of 145 million workers; and processing six million new benefit applications next year.

The Social Security Administration (SSA) has no reason to suspect a disruption to the delivery of benefit payments in January 2000 However, we have developed contingency plans to handle an unexpected or unforeseen disruption that may be beyond our control.

Social Security's payment delivery schedule, with appropriate contin-gency plans, is as follows:

ce Jan. 1, 2000, is a holiday, Supplemental Security Income (SSI)

yments will be delivered Dec. 30, 1999. Therefore, there should not by any Y2K problems with the January SSI payments.

*Social Security payments for January will be made on Monday,

Jan. 3, 2000. *The post office will receive checks a day earlier than normally scheduled to ensure timely delivery on Jan. 3.

In the case of direct deposit, SSA expects benefit payment delivery to financial institutions to be conducted ina "business as usual" manner However, if problems occur with direct deposit payments, SSA will work with the Treasury Department and the Federal Reserve to resolve problems at a troubled financiài institution and make payments avarlable

*SSA offices will provide emergency payments to beneficiaries in cases of dire need as called for by

existing procedures So, if you are a Social Security beneficiary, be assured that you will receive your payment on time. Just relax and enjoy the new millenni







CAUTION ON THE **ROAD NEEDED THIS** TIME OF YEAR

Dear Nebraska Neighbors

Although we have enjoyed an unseasonably mild tall and a delayed onset of winter weather, the inevitable signs of the season have finally appeared. As we approach another Nebraska winter, it is important to be prepared for whatever Mother Nature has in store.

Show removal + is ready to tackle winter weather with reached equipment and the latest technology and road treat-

ments available. This includes the use of liquid chemical processes for frost, ice and snow control on roadways. We are now using salt brine, an ethanol-hyproduct called Ice Ban, and magnesium chloride. According to the Nebraska Department of Roads, these liquids are sater than gravel, eliminate windshield chipping, yield quicker results and are expected to cut the state's snow removal cost in half.

While the latest technology is being applied to Nebraska's roads, there are still limitations and satety precautions that we should all keep in mind as we drive any road in Nebraska's harsh winter weather. I would like to share a few helpful winter safety reminders in hopes we can all do our part to make Nebraska's roads safer for everyone

Approach winter driving with the right frame of mind. Always drive at a speed that matches the prevailing visibility, traffic and road conditions. Turn your headlights on for added safety

Icy roads make it difficult to steer and to stop. Slow down gradually when you approach curves and intersections. Beware of icy spots especially on bridges and in sheltered areas

It is also-best to avoid travel if at all possible during severe winter weather conditions. If you must travel, make sure your vehicle is in good mechanical condition, equipped with proper tires for writer driving and has a full tank of fuel. Take a winter storm car kit, use major roads, and make sure someone knows approximately where you are or ought to be. While enroute, tune to local commercial radio stations for updated weather and road condition reports

No government without politics

There is no government without politics. That's why, you probably have

noticed, there is tax policy and there is tax politics. There is policymaking and there is

the politics of policymaking. Look for the politics of policymak-

ng to be very interesting in the 2000 Legislature.

Some examples: Good old initiative 300. So far, I'm not sure what it has proven itself good for, but certainly it must have accomplished something. Big corporations are not buying land and cattle all over the place. That's prob ably the big thing.

However, agribusiness is into the "captive supply" mode when it comes to livestock. Likewise, the suits can contract for commodities.

It seems that there are some, in the smaller end of the ag business, who are finding that Initiative 300 is causing some problems for them. The constitutional ban on corporate farming is, according to some, making it difficult for them to form cap-Ital and do business efficiently - or at all. It has to do with limited partnerships

The thing is, one cannot simply up on the floor of the stand Legislature and start criticizing Initiative 300. It was, after all, an ini tiative, put on the ballot and approved by the people. When the people speak, elected types have to be careful about contradicting what it is the people have said. They even have to be careful about suggesting that what the people said might not be exactly what they intended to

It's like telling someone who is particularly proud of a tailor-made

suit that the stripes clash with the basic fabric. One must be particular-ly politic in trying to make policy around such a situation.

So, when and if the Legislature gets around to this touchy subject, watch and read carefully. Lawmakers who want to make changes in Initiative 300 will feel like doctors trying to do microsurgery on an aneurysm that is wired to several pounds of plastic explosives.

For another example, look at the Department of Health and Human Services and the deficit that's been run in the Medicaid program. Whaddya' gonna' do? Cut Medicaid benefits? Yeah, right.

Of course, the money that will be eaten up by ever-increasing social services costs cannot be used for property tax relief. Whaddya' gonna' do? Tell people that the Medicaid that is mandated, and serving a sizable constituency, means that the on-going polemics about property tax relief have to stop? Yeah, right.

There is one possible solution to the second of these problems, however.

How about if the governor and the Legislature do a study (there has to be another study, anyway; there always has to be another study) and find all the people in Nebraska who want property tax relief, but also are eligible for Medicaid. Maybe there

but state government officials could buy time by looking for them, anyway. That would get them through the coming session, limited by constitution to just 60 working days. Then they'll have all summer to think of something. In the meantime, they can yell that the whole mess is all Washington's fault (Washington is a personal pronoun in election years) and even pass a resolution demanding that Washington come up with a solution

Pretty soon it will be 2001, the election year will be over and policymakers will have time to come up with more policy politics.

It's not a solution. But, it probably would (or will) work.



Rural Health Panel comes to WSC

On Dec. 7, five local health professionals came to Wayne State College to discuss rural health issues with students and faculty

"The goal of this activity was to spark an interest in rural healthcare among students and provide information about these fields to interested parties," said Tami Dobson, president of the WSC Health Science Club

Dobson is a medical student at WSC. She is originally from Primrose and will be attending the University of Nebraska Medical Center in the fall of 2000

The students involved in the Health Sciences Club have committed themselves to rural healthcare by participating in the Rural Health Opportunities Program (RHOP) and Mid-American Rural Health Opportunities (MARHOP) programs

RHOP is a cooperative program between WSC and The University of Nebraska Medical Center that recruits and trains students in medicine, dentistry, pharmacy and dental hygiene. MARHOP is a similar cooperative program between WSC and Creighton University Health Sciences Center that recruits and trains students in occupational therapy, pharmacy and physical thera-

The purpose of these two pro grams is to educate students, primarily from rural Nebraska, who will and practice in rural return Nebraska communities

The panel, which was sponsored by the Health Sciences Club and the Math-Sciences Division, included Dr. Mark McCorkindale, physician, Dr Robert Burrows, dentist, Tracy Jacobsen, occupational therapist; WSC alumina Kari Hamer, pharmacist, and Amy Albreich, student physical therapist and former Chadron State RHOP student

All of the panelists discussed their experiences as rural health professionals and gave advice about choosing a health profession and getting through medical school They informed the students that medical school can be overwhelm ing, but encouraged them to perse vere, be organized, stay involved and set priorities

Students were also encouraged to take business and communication classes where opportunities exist McCorkindale advised the students not to be afraid to ask for help when they need it. He suggested that they should take advantage of tutors, faculty and other students

"Effective communication is vital in the medical profession today, Albreich added

The panelists also advised students to do research before accepting any job.

They warned the students not to jump at the job with the highest pay, as those are often the jobs with high employee turnover rates

Dr. McCorkindale practices at Wayne's Providence Medical Center After attending the University of Nebraska Medical Center in Omaha, he wanted to return to a rural com munity where he would have the opportunity to get to know all of his patients. He chose family practice because of the variety of duties and patients that he sees

"Doctors in rural family practice have to do everything, McCorkindale said. He added that Wayne is well located because he is able to send patients to specialists in Sioux City, Lincoln or Omaha when necessary

Burrows works at the Wessel & Burrows Dental Clinic in Wavne He, too, said that rural dentists must be versatile and capable of treating their patients' many different needs. He is also able to send some cases to specialists nearby

"In a rural setting, it can be difficult to balance your personal and professional lives. Often, your occupation becomes your identity," Burrows said


Jacobsen is an occupational thera pist at Heartland Physical Therapy Inc. in Norfolk. She is originally from Texas and practiced in Dallas before moving to Nebraska. She said that practices in larger cities are very specialized and therapists often only see the same kind of patients Being a rural physical therapist allows her to see patients with different injuries.

Hamer, a former WSC student, works at Providence Medical Center and Medicap Pharmacy, both in Wayne After attending school in Omaha, she chose to come back to a small town to receive hands on training and a variety of responsibilities

Albreich is working at Providence Medical Center She is from Pierce and, like the students in the Health Sciences Club, was a RHOP student at Chadron State College Albreich also likes the variety of patients and works at sports events, different clinics, home health, and area schooks

On behalf of the attending students, Dobson expressed her gratitude to the panelists who took time off of work to join the students and ariswer their questions

"With so many years that these students are investing in their education, it is wonderful to hear individuals talk about the end goal and what our students are working so hard to achieve. It is a good opportunity to remind students why they are going into health care and what lies ahead of them," Dobson said

Wayne freshman gals compete in hoops

Greg McDermott's Wayne State men's basketball team ran their win streak to seven over the weekend while improving to 7-2 on the season.

In the process the Wildcats knocked off a second previously unbeaten North Central Conference team as WSC came from behind to defeat UNO, 79-70 last Friday night. The Mavericks Came in to Wayne

with an 8-0 record and midway through the second half UNO had an 1,1-point lead at 60-49. That's when "Mac's" defense rose

to the occasion and delivered in a big way with a 30-10 scoring run the remainder of the way.

WSC led the visitors by seven points with less than five minutes in the first half before UNO went on a run of its own, out-scoring the 'Cats 14-2 to lead 41-36 at the half.

The Mavericks connect on 18-of-23 shot attempts in the opening half for a 78 percent success mark. Early in the second half the Mavs hit four-of-its-first-five shots to grab a 12-point lead but down the stretch it was their lack of shooting well because of WSC's torrid defense that spelled the difference.

UNO missed, eight-of-nine shots during the stretch when the 'Cats were warming up from long range. WSC hit 10 consecutive free throws over the final minutes to secure the victory.

"It's not that we made any adjustments when UNO got up by double digits," McDermott said. "All we did differently was execute our defense like we're supposed too and it worked."

. "Mac" said anytime you can hold an explosive UNO offense to just six points over the final nine minutes your defense has done quite a job.

"Playing defense with out fouling was the difference in the game," McDermott added. "When they fouled us we were going to the foul line but we weren't in foul trouble and when we did foul, they were forced to in-bounds the ball because we weren't over the limit." Jon Dolliver scored a season-high 20 points and grabbed eight rebounds while Brad Joens poured in 16 points including four, three-

pointers. Rory Williams connected for 15 points and Kevin Lingenfelter came off the bench to score nine.

The 'Cats won the battle of the boards, 29-20 with Dolliver leading the way while Eric Henderson had six caroms.

Henderson dished out a teamhigh four assists and Dolliver led the team with three steals.





Understanding terms used in education

Do you sometimes come away from a parent-teacher conference or other meeting at the school feeling as if you had just left a foreign countrv? The language sounds like English, but somehow you've missed some of its meaning. Though not meant to be confusing, today's educational terminology is certainly not what it was when we were in school. Nearly every aspect of education today has a new designation or new definition. Here are some terms you should know:

To begin with, "standard-based education" refers to a level of academic learning and mastery as determined by the state. A student's ability to meet these academic standards is frequently a prerequisite for graduation.

"Cooperative learning" involves students working together in small groups, with each student being responsible for one part of the group's work, thus contributing to the success of all.

"Multiple intelligences" refers to the eight separate intelligences defined by Howard Gardner of Harvard University. These are linguistic, logical-mathematical, spatial, musical, bodily kinesthetic, interpersonal, intrapersonal and naturalistic. Knowing that all students possess these separate intelligences in varying degrees, teachers employ a variety of techniques to help students discover and develop their talents and strengths.

"Distance learning centers" or "virtual classrooms" are really sophisticated electronic labs where classes are taught via television or the Internet

"Inclusion" refers to the plan mandated by law that includes special education students in regular classroom settings. The acronym "IEP" stands for "Individualized Education Program" which must be in place for every child receiving special education services.

"Phonics" is a reading method which teaches children to identify and spell words based on the way certain letters and letter combinations sound. "Whole language" refers to a teaching method in which vocabulary words and writing are stressed across the curriculum, with core subjects linked by content. "ESL" stands for English as a Second Language

"Team-teaching" or "collaborative teaching" involves grouping teachers, who combine their skills to enhance learning for students. A "paraeducator" is a specially trained classroom aide, who may or may not be a certified teacher.

-An innovative concept known as the "school to work" program helps prepare students for our competitive workplace. Students spend half of their day in academic pursuits and the other half at work, receiving credit for both. The success of school-to-work programs is dependent upon strong, extensive "partnerships' with local businesses and industry lead-

ers who provide the work experience and training. "Vocational programs" have also undergone a metamorphosis since the introduction of technology. Known as "vo-tech" or "vocational-technological" programs, they encompass a broad-range of technological learning opportunities, ranging from traditional vocational skills to computer repair


AS quickly as technology is advancing, new terms will be created. It is important that we learn what this new terminology means, if we are to gain a clear understanding of our children's educational opportunities. Parenting Tips:

• If you don't understand a term used by a teacher or principal, ask what it means

 If your child sometimes seems to be speaking a new "language," ask about what he or she is learning.

• Ask you child's teacher if any of the techniques or methods described in this article are in use at your child's school

 Suggest that definitions or explanations of new terminology be fea tured in the school newsletter





Inventory shows change in erosion rates, land use

Latest figures from the U.S. Department of Agriculture show that over the last 15 years (1982-97) the average soil erosion in Nebraska has dropped 40 percent, but there is still a need for conservation practices.

Steve Chick, State Conservationist for the Natural Resources Conservation Service, says, "The National Resources Inventory data shows the average erosion from rainfall has dropped from an average of 4.5 tons of soil per acre to 2.7 tons. Generally soil erosion below five tons per acre is consid-ered tolerable." Wind erosion rates have remained the same at 1.5 tons per year, which is an acceptable rate

"As an average, that is good. Nebraska farmers and ranchers deserve a fot of credit for the conservation work they are doing. These figures show that around three million acres of cropland are eroding at five tons per acre or more. So there is work yet to be done," he said. The inventory shows Nebraska has 19.4 million acres of cropland

The National Resources Inventory is a statistically based survey designed to assess conditions and trends for soil, water and related resources on private land in the U.S. which makes up 75 percent of the Nation's total land area. The inventory captures data on land cover and use, soil erosion, prime farmland, wetlands, habitat diversity and selected conservation practices. The inventory is, conducted every five years

Other results of the inventory show that

Nationally, from 1992 to 1997, nearly 16 million acres of agricultur al and forestland were developed. The U.S. now loses three million acres per year of forest and agricultural land, which is double what was lost each year from 1983 to 1992. In Nebraska, between 1982-1992, about 5,050 acres of rural land went into development each year. During the last five years that trend has increased to around 13,340 acres per year

"Nebraska in 1997 ranks-third in the amount of irrigated acres, behind only Texas and California,

"The real crucial thing is to bring young people together to look at livestock and records," he said.


The MAEC contest is conducted by the Block and Bridle Club students with help from animal science faculty in NU's institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.



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

umal unit is a measurement used to calculate the total livestock capacity of an operation. For example, 300 animal units equals 300 feeder cattle, 214 dairy cows, 750 head of hogs, or 250 cow-calf pairs. To comply with the law and meet the January 1, 2000 deadline, producers must include the inspection fee when they send in the inspection request form. Forms sent in without the fee enclosed will be returned to the producer and will not be considered to have met the deadline

Producers may obtain, "Request for Inspection of Livestock Operation" forms with instructions, from their local Extension, NRD, or NRCS office, or by contacting the Department of Environment Quality, Agriculture Section, at (402) 471-4239. A medicine not yet available commercially may help heavy drinkers avoid alcohol According to a study recently reported in Archives of General Psychiatry, nalmefene may be effective in combination with behavioral therapy. Seventy persons with alcohol dependence and who were abstaining from alcohol were given the medicine during a 12-week trial. Other abstaining alcoholics were given a placebo. Thirty-seven percent of the individuals who took the medicine returned to heavy drinking, as compared to 59% of those who received the placebo The likelihood of returning to heavy drinking was about twice as high in persons not getting nalmefene Nalmefene appears to work by blocking opiate receptors in the brain. Disulfiram (Antabuse), a medicine now frequently used in treatment of alcoholism, simply has the potential to make the user extremely sick if alcohol is ingested.
