### Historical society

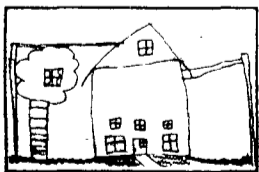

## Burkett named head coach

Rico Burkett was named the head men's basketball coach at Wayne State College, WSC interim athletic director Mike Barry announced recently.

Burkett replaces Greg McDermott, who accepted the head coaching job at North Dakota State University.

Burkett, who becomes the 22nd head men's basketball coach in

school history, recently completed his fourth year as an assistant coach with the Wildcats. He joined the Wildcat coaching staff prior to the 1994-95 season.

Burkett then spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Stetson University in DeLand, Fla. before returning to Wayne State.

Burkett takes over a program which he has helped turn into one of the nation's best. This past season, Wayne State posted a 26-6 overall record, which is the most wins in school history, and claimed a share of the NSIC championship.

The Wildcats, which finished the season ranked 19th in the NABC/Division II Bulletin Top 25 poll, then won the NSIC Tournament and made it all the way to the regional championship game in Denver, Colo.

## Council approves several ordinances

Several resolutions and ordinances are now in the books following Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Resolution 2000-20 established an Ad Hoc advisory committee pertaining to the building of a new fire hall facility. The eight-member committee will serve for a 24-month period.

Resolutions were also passed

regarding the painting of the East Water Tower and accepting an engineer for the Water/Wastewater Study.

Water Tower Paint & Repair of Clear Lake, Iowa was chosen to paint to lower Kirkham Michael submitted a bid of \$30,400 and was selected to undertake the water/wastewater study.

Council accepted a bid from Omaha Truck Center Company for the purchase of a truck chassis for

the Electric Distribution Department.

Two ordinances were passed in regard to natural gas franchises.

The first will allow for the collection of a flat fee being charged to gas customers rather than a percentage of revenues.

The fee will be \$1.50 per month for residential customers, \$3 per month for commercial customers and \$50 per month for industrial customers.

Council also granted Peoples

Natural Gas a non-exclusive franchise with the city for a period of 15 years. The city recently ended a similar contract which had been in place for 25 years.

First round approval was also given to an ordinance which would amend the city code which prohibits employment of relatives of public officials and public employees. The ordinance would allow for the hiring

## Board works on lowering budget

The Wayne Board of Education met Monday night with the Middle School budget a top priority. Buster Beckenhauer of Beckenhauer Construction of Norfolk, and Gary Bowen of Bahr, Vermeer, Haecker of Omaha have been working on helping identify areas where dollars can be cut or reduced. At this point, the

project is 2.4 percent or about \$155,000 over budget.

Several items that the board, Beckenhauer, and Bahr discussed that could be cut were masonry cold weather protection, material change for flashing, going to symmetrically placed fire sprinkler system and

changing location of it, and metal

halide lights for gym instead of fluorescent lights. Other possible cuts

are being investigated by Beckenhauer and Bahr and they will give the board a report at the next meeting. After that point, paperwork can be done and construction

can proceed.

Other issues addressed involved the resignation of Emily Mooney, Special Education instructor, who is relocating to Lincoln with her husband. Also, two new teacher con-

## McDermott accepts position at North Dakota State University

Greg McDermott, the head men's basketball coach at Wayne State College the past six seasons, accepted the head men's basketball coaching job at North Dakota State University, announced at a press conference in Fargo, N.D. last Friday.

McDermott, who also was the interim athletic director and the head men's golf coach, turned the Wildcats into one of the most successful programs in the North Central Region.

In six seasons, McDermott accumulated a 116-53 overall record. He is second on the school's all-time victory list, while his .686 winning percentage is the second-highest percentage among those who coached the Wildcats at least three seasons.

"Coach McDermott has been a tremendous role model for student-athletes as well as a fine coach," Dr. Sheila Stearns, President of Wayne State College said. "Greg and his family will be missed by our whole community. We wish them all the best and thank them for all they

have done for our community."

After a 26-28 record in his first two seasons, McDermott guided the Wildcats to an unprecedented four straight 20-win seasons. The past two years, the Wildcats advanced to the NCAA Division II North Central Regional Tournament.

This past season, WSC posted a

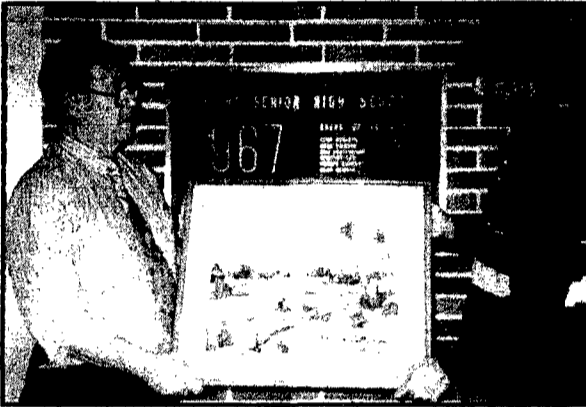

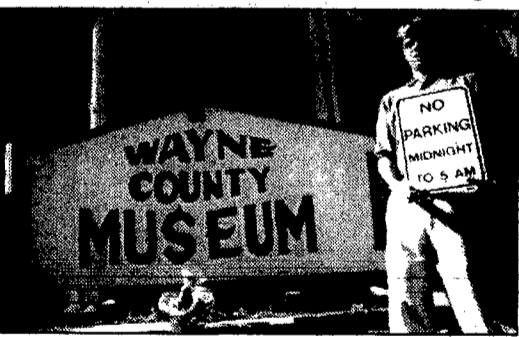

here, the Wildcats were eliminated by eventual national champion Metropolitan State College of Denver by a score of 84-72.

As an assistant coach with the Wildcats, Burkett worked closely with the guards. During that time he helped coach Tyler Johnson, Wayne State's second all-time leading scorer and career assist leader.

Last season, Johnson was chosen to the NABC Division II All-America First Team.

"Coach Rico Burkett has been a vital part of our basketball success at Wayne State in recent years," said Dr. Sheila Stearns, president of Wayne State College. "We are pleased that he has accepted this position as head coach, and we are confident of a continued bright

future for Wayne State men's basketball."

"I would like to thank Dr. Stearns and the Wayne State administration for giving me this opportunity," Burkett said. "I would also like to thank some other people who have had an impact in my life, such as Greg McDermott, (North Dakota head coach) Rich Glas, (former Stetson head coach) Randy Brown (Iowa Central head coach) and Dennis Pilcher."

According to Burkett, he is excited to take over as the Wildcats' new head coach.

"I am excited about the upcoming season," Burkett said. "We have a tremendous group of players coming back, as well as a talented incoming freshman class. I look forward to continuing the success we have enjoyed

the past few seasons."

A native of Des Moines, Iowa, Burkett was a standout point guard at the University of North Dakota during the 1989-90 and 1990-91 seasons. As a senior, he was named the North Central Conference Defensive Player of the Year.

As a junior, he set a Fighting Sioux single-season record with 232 assists. In his two-year playing career, Burkett dished out 401 assists, which at the time was the UND career record. He currently is third on the Fighting Sioux all-time chart.

Burkett was a key figure in the resurgence of the North Dakota program. The Fighting Sioux went 57-11, won two North Central Conference titles and twice

advanced to the NCAA Division II Elite Eight during Burkett's career. In 1989-90, the Fighting Sioux posted a 28-7 record and finished third at the Elite Eight. It was UND's first 20-win season in eight years.

Before attending North Dakota, Burkett, a graduate of Des Moines North High School, played two seasons at Iowa Central Community College, where he helped the Tritons to a regional title and a berth in the junior college national tournament in 1988-89.

Burkett began his coaching career as an assistant coach with the nationally prominent North Dakota women's basketball team.

A 1993 UND graduate, he earned his bachelor's degree in physical education/secondary education.

The council gave its approval to a request from library employees in regard to changes in the rental policy for the meeting room at the Library/Senior Center. The library staff will now be in charge of the rental and fees charged for its use will be lowered.

Vern Schulz, Public Works Superintendent, provided an update on the drainage study being done in the area west of Oak Drive

and south to Grainland Road.

Schulz told the council that the city will work with the Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation and share the cost of the study.

The council also listened to an update on the status of the proposed skate park.

George Holm told the council that the group has raised \$22,000 toward the development of a skate park. He also cited several reasons why the city needs the park and explained the benefits the city could gain from the park.

Council members told Holm that they supported the idea of a park but were not in a position to grant money for the park at this time. They did, however, extend the use of the facility near the swimming pool for skate use until a permanent facility is developed.

In other action, the council set a public hearing date of Tuesday, April 25 at 7:35 p.m. for the purpose of discussing the acquisition of land located just west of Great Dane. The land purchase would allow for the extension of 10th Street.

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Problems related to an enlarged prostate, called BPH or benign prostatic hyperplasia, most often occur in men after age 45. However, symptoms typically do not appear until age 60 or later. Up to 40 percent of men age 70 years and older have symptoms that include an urge to urinate and difficulty emptying the bladder completely. If BPH is allowed to continue without treatment, bladder infection and possibly kidney damage can occur. Prescription medicines used to treat BPH symptoms include *finasteride* (Proscar) and *tamsulosin* (Hytrin).

According to a recent report in *The Journal of the American Medical Association*, an extract from the saw palmetto plant may provide a safe and effective alternative to treating BPH. Dr. Timothy Wilt and colleagues reviewed 18 carefully controlled, scientific trials involving the use of saw palmetto in 2,939 men with BPH. Side effects from the herb were mild as compared with prescription medicines. They concluded that saw palmetto was effective in improving BPH symptoms and the flow of urine.

a shot.

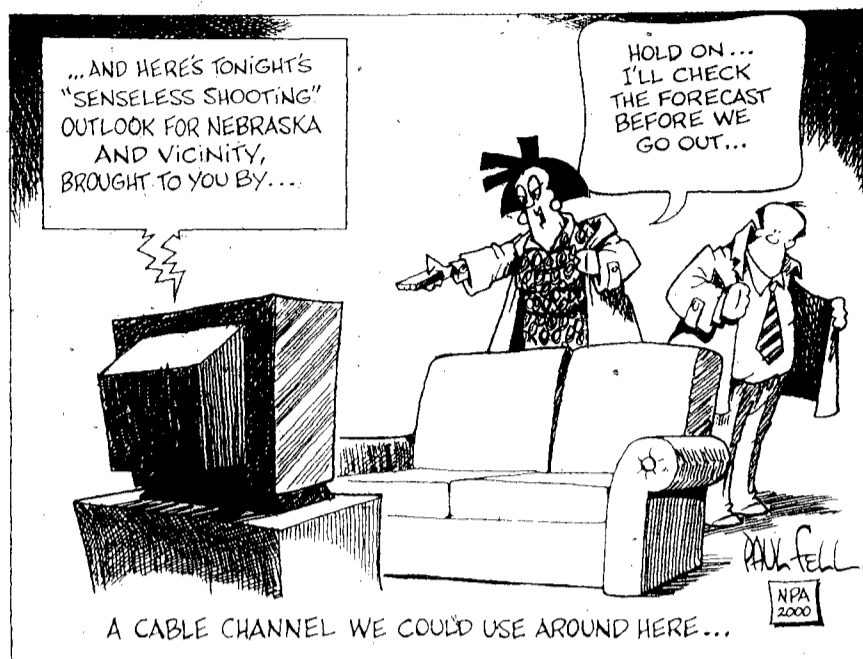

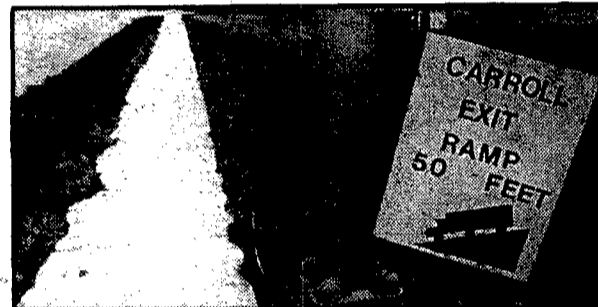
### Department recognized for prevention efforts

The Fire Prevention Committee of the Wayne Volunteer Fire Department was recently honored by the Nebraska State Forest Service for its activities in Fire Prevention/Education throughout the community.

As a result of their efforts, the number of fires was reduced and lower fire losses were incurred. This

was accomplished by implementing and committing to an ongoing (12-month) educational fire prevention program throughout the city and rural fire protection district.

It is through dedication and efforts such as this that the loss of life and property damage due to fire is greatly diminished.

### Session winding down

The end is drawing near on the 96th Legislative Session. The first session of the 21st century will be completed probably on Wednesday, April 12. The last few days will be packed with hastened debate on a number of bills, final readings and possible override motions on potential vetoes from Governor Johanns.

We spent last Monday debating attempts to override the governor's line-item vetoes of the budget adjustment package.

The funding restored by the Legislature included the following:

- \$2 million in FY 2000-01 to the state Department of Health and Human Services Finance and Support to increase mental health provider rates. The veto was overridden by a 43-2 vote.

- \$750,000 in FY 1999-2000 to HHS Finance and Support for reimbursement of mental health services at the Region VI Hospital. The veto was overridden by a 41-2 vote.

Advanced from the first round on a 32-0 vote Wednesday was my priority bill, LB1101, which extends access to the Senior Companion volunteer program to rural areas of the state. I am looking forward to its passage during the last few days of this 60-day legislative session.

The Senior Companion Program seeks to reduce the burden of unnecessary costs on taxpayers in a fiscally responsible manner.

The annual cost of service for one Senior Companion Volunteer serving 20 hours a week and working with five Senior Clients is \$3,850. If this program keeps those five people out of a nursing facility — the taxpayers of Nebraska save \$186,150. Almost the entire appropriation for this program will be returned if only five people remain in their homes.

If this program keeps 100 seniors living in their own homes and out of a facility that costs \$38,000 a year — we save \$3,723,000. If we double that to 200 people — we save \$7,446,000. This program has the potential to serve 250-260 of Nebraska's seniors. The cost efficiency and savings of this program speak for themselves.

It is predicted by 2020 the senior population of this country will double. By 2050 it will have quadrupled. We are facing BIG problems in the future of long term health care in this state and our country. We will have some big decisions to make in this area in the very near future. This program does not solve all of our

long-term health care problems. It does, however, offer another cost effective solution to this ongoing problem.

LB936, The Rural Economic Opportunities Act, passed final reading on Thursday. The Act will allow Nebraska businesses to qualify for incentives by adding employment equal to at least one-half of one percent of the county labor force. By paying annual wages for that employment that would average at least 125 percent of the average annual wage paid by all employers in the county and by investing a minimum of \$100,000 times one-half of one percent of the county labor force.

These qualifying projects under the Act would receive an annual income tax credit equal to five percent of the total compensation paid for new employment (available seven years) and an income tax credit equal to 10 percent of the new investment made. These credits are available to all counties in the state. Qualified businesses range from research and development to manufacturing.

I believe that the Rural Economic Opportunities Act encourages increased employment and higher paying jobs in the rural areas of this state — something that is essential during this time when the rural economy has been impacted by our current economic crisis.

I want to thank everyone from District #18 who either has called or e-mailed my office in support or opposition of the issues before our Legislature.

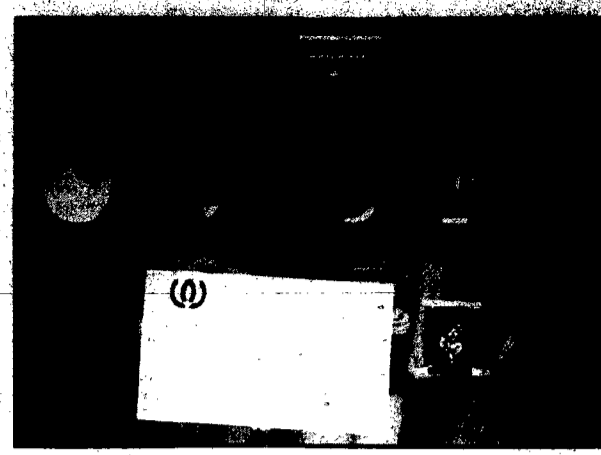

## Communication with family is vital when finances are tight

It's not uncommon for money to be a problem area for families. Sometimes lack of income to meet basic needs causes the trouble. More often, though, the inability of family members to talk about money issues is the root of financial problems.

None of us finds it easy to communicate when we're stressed. Sometimes it's best to let issues rest for awhile before trying to talk about them. Other times, lack of communication can interfere with daily living. After all, the family is a team, and communication is needed for the farm and family to function well.

Communicate with your children. What do you discuss? How do you know when kids are old enough to understand, or that they could actually benefit from knowing about family stressors? Children who lack information but sense problems often blame themselves or try to take on adult roles to "fix" problems in the family.

It's best to talk with children (in language they can understand) about the issues that will affect them directly. Explain to your children how these changes influence

them and what will be different. For example, maybe there will be less money for 4-H or extracurricular activities. Help them understand that there are issues, but that the family is managing.

If your family is going through a particularly stressful time, tell your

er person about his/her financial mistakes (such as overspending, or making a large purchase without you?)

6. Are you able to talk about potential money problems before they happen?

7. Use the "Talk About Money" Worksheets to give you more insight into your values and attitudes about money. Use it to find out what you know about your family's income and spending patterns.

Ask for it at your local extension office. The worksheet is part of the NebFact titled, "Communication About Money," NF91-7.

### Calcium May Reduce Stroke Risk In Women

According to the 14-year study, women with higher dietary or supplemental calcium intake had a lower stroke rate. Daily intake over 600 mg. did not appear to reduce stroke risk further. Current recommendations are 1000 mg. for premenopausal and postmenopausal women on estrogen, and 1,500 mg. for postmenopausal women not taking estrogen. Apparently this is also enough calcium to lower stroke risk.

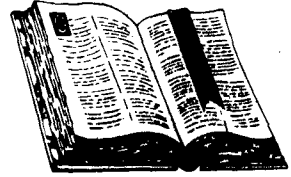

Nurse, I'm proud to say, have always had one foot in the sciences and the other in the humanities. But I believe many hospitals are striving to get back to their roots.

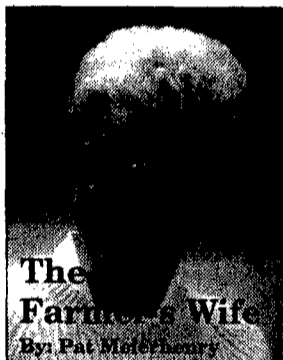
On Friday evening, the vice president of St. Elizabeth's challenged us and gave us each a copy of something called the "Paradox Of Our Time." I'm sharing it with you this
