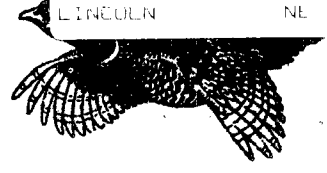

Department of Roads Snow Plow Rodeo held in Wayne

The annual Nebraska Department of Roads Snow Plow Rodeo was held at Wayne State College recently. Thirty-nine District 3 teams participated with 74 people involved. District 3 takes in a large surrounding area but the five major towns include Wayne, Norfolk, South Sioux, Columbus, and Neligh.

The event is held to test driving skills and winter operation and is usually held in Neligh each year. An obstacle course was set up in one of the WSC parking lots where participants tested their driving skills. Wayne was chosen this year as it is a more central location.

The top three teams out of 37 were Ken Neuhalfen and Clayton Hartman, Laurel, in first place with a time of 3 minutes, 49 seconds; Shawn Pohlman and Leonard Nadrichal, Clarkson, in second place with a time of 4 minutes, 10 seconds; and Larry Theisen and Jeff Martensen, Humphrey, in third place with a time of 4 minutes, 17 seconds.

There are eight Department of Roads districts in the state of Nebraska. The top three will go on to Kearney on Aug. 24 to compete. The top two will then go to Estes Park, Colo. in September to compete in the national event.

Drawings were held during the rodeo. Several local businesses donated food and gifts for the drawings. Winside man injured

Allen Schrant of rural Winside, was severely burned while working with a propane hot water heater on May 31. Since that time he has been hospitalized at St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Lincoln.

Schant suffered burns over 80 percent of his body and 46 percent of the burns will require skin grafting.

At the present time, he is being medicated to keep calm and a frozen covering has been placed over the burns while his body begins repairing itself.

He has undergone three surgeries so far with more expected in the future.

His wife Lavon said she expects him to be hospitalized at least six more weeks.

He would appreciate cards, letters and cassette tapes. The tapes are played to him to aid with the healing process.

Department hires new police officer

The Wayne Police Department has selected Phil Shear as the new lieutenant for the department.

Wayne Police Chief Lance Webster said Lt. Shear, who started May 22, was hired to replace Bob McLean, who retired last October.

Spent the last five years as the Chief of Police in Friend, a town of approximately 1,200 people in southeastern Nebraska.

Before that he worked as an officer for the Bakersfield, Calif. police department for 10 years and served three years in the U.S. Army as a military police. He was involved as a D.A.R.E. instructor and has emphasis on community policing techniques.

His wife Julia is originally from Lincoln, which is one reason the couple moved to Nebraska.

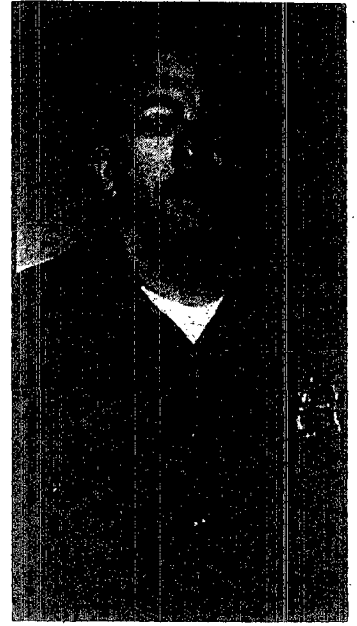
Chief Webster said the combination of experience in the large department, coupled with the time spent in a small community, made Lt. Shear the ideal person to fill the position.

Webster said he was looking for a person with a very wide area of experience, both in day-to-day police operations and management.

"Chief Webster has ideas about the direction he wants this department to take which coincide with my goals. I took the position because I can influence the direction of the department and implement programs that are going to increase cooperation with the community," Lt. Shear said.

Water survey forms should be returned

Two years ago the City of Wayne sent out a Water Cross-Connection Survey to determine if there were any potential cross-connections at any of the service connections.

Approximately 800 service connection locations did not respond to the first mailing and city officials are again asking customers to complete the surveys and mail the form back to the City of Wayne.

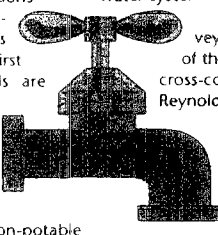
"A cross-connection is a connection that has the potential to allow non-potable water to backflow or siphon into the City of Wayne's drinking water system," said Harold Reynolds, Water/Waste Water Superintendent.

The city is requesting this information for two important reasons. The first is to promote a good cross-connection control program and the other is to delay disinfecting of the water system.

"Having these survey forms on file is one of the requirements of the cross-connection program," Reynolds said.

He is encouraging all those who received surveys to fill them out and return them to the City of Wayne, Box 8, 306 Pearl Street as soon as possible.

Great Dane to open new plant

Great Dane Limited Partnership, Chicago, Illinois and Savannah, Ga., announces the construction of the company's new trailer manufacturing facility in Quinte West, Ontario, Canada.

"After an extensive, year-long search for a site we are extremely pleased to announce that the City of Quinte West has been chosen as the location for our first Canadian Manufacturing plant. While we looked closely at many different sites, we believe that the Quinte West location best meets our strategic and corporate needs." 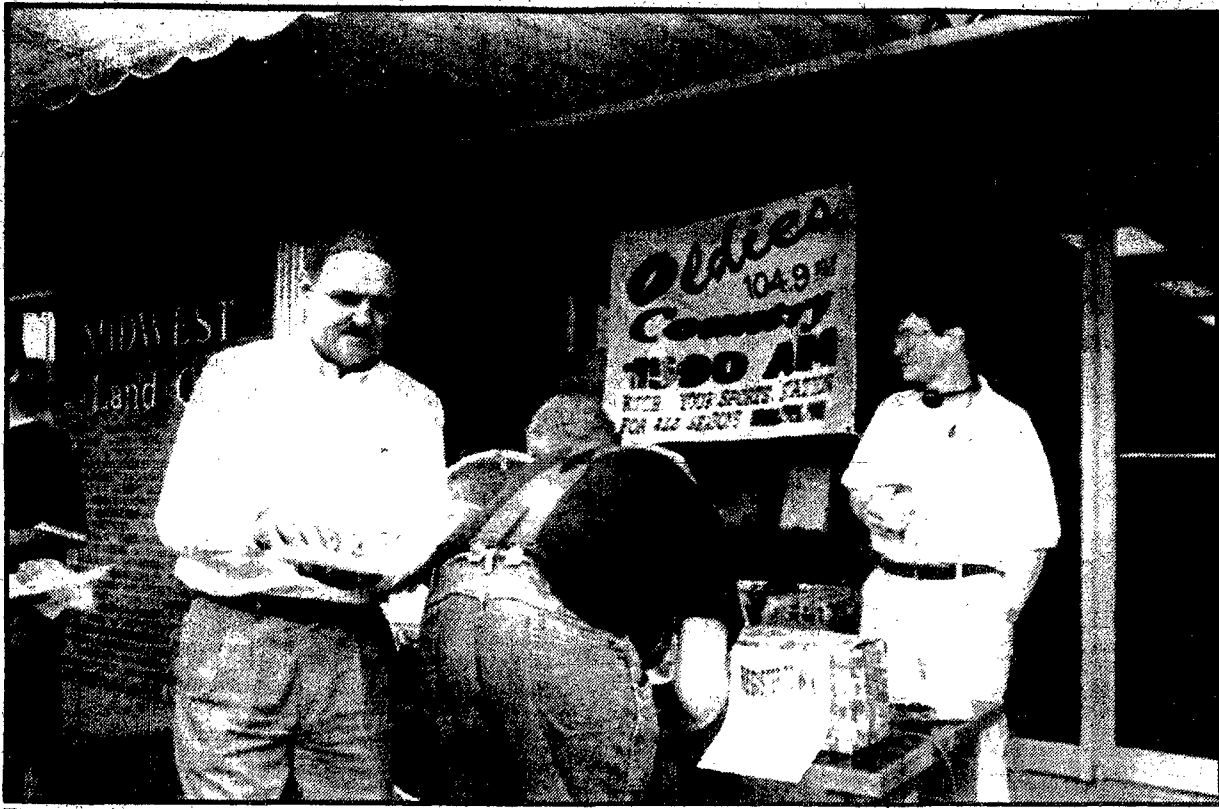
New officers elected

Protect your skin

Cancer rates up in Nebraska

A sharp increase in the rate of skin cancer-especially melanomas-makes it more important than ever to cover and protect your skin this summer, according to Dr. Richard Raymond, Chief Medical Officer for the Nebraska Health and Human Services (HHS) System.

"One million people in this country will get some kind of skin cancer this year. Don't be one of them," said Dr. Raymond. "Wearing protective clothing and using sun screen are the best ways to prevent the disease."

The incidence of melanomas has risen in Nebraska from 8.5 per 100,000 people in 1990 to 14.2 per 100,000 in 1997. Melanomas of the skin accounted for 1,067 diagnoses and over 200 deaths between 1993 and 1997, according to the 1997 annual report of the HHS System's Nebraska Cancer Registry.

"Just a few serious sunburns can increase your risk of getting skin cancer," said Kathy Ward, administrator in the HHS Chronic Disease Prevention and Control Division. "And over time, exposure to ultraviolet rays can make your skin wrinkled and leathery."

Ultraviolet rays from the sun can damage exposed, unprotected skin in as little as 15 minutes, but it can take up to 12 hours for the skin to show the full effect of sun exposure.

Although skin melanomas are the most serious type of skin cancer, they are also preventable and treatable. "You can find melanomas early and greatly reduce the risk of death by paying attention to changes in existing skin growths or noticing if new growths appear," Ward said.

SHOPPING ON THE INTERNET TIPS TO HELP YOU SHOP SAFELY ONLINE

More and more consumers will avoid the congestion of the Holiday crowds by shopping online this season. Internet shopping, like traditional shopping, is not without risks. By following these precautions, you can shop safely online.

CHECK OUT THE BUSINESS

Anyone can establish a business on the Internet. Look for businesses you have dealt with satisfactorily in the past when shopping by mail or in person. Before you decide to make a purchase online, check with the Consumer Division of the Nebraska Attorney General's Office or the Better Business Bureau to see if there have been complaints filed against the business. Be sure to ask if the business is based in the United States. You might not have the same legal protections with a foreign based business as with a United States business.

PROTECT YOUR PRIVACY

A password, credit card number, and shipping information should be the only pieces of information a business should require to take your order online. Don't shop from a business that wants more information than you are comfortable providing.

WEIGH YOUR PAYMENT OPTIONS

Paying for online purchases with a credit card may offer more protections than other payment options. Some credit card companies offer extended warranties or other advantages for credit card purchases. Also, if you are dissatisfied with a purchase and decide to return it, you can dispute the charges with your credit card company.

ORDER ON A SECURE SERVER

Choose only web businesses that protect your financial information when you order online. Look for symbols of an unbroken key or locked padlock at the bottom of the browser window to confirm that you are on a secure server. These symbols mean that the information you are sending is "encrypted" - turned into a secret code - for online transmission.

ASK QUESTIONS ABOUT DELIVERY AND SHIPPING

Ask the business when you can expect delivery. A Federal Trade Commission rule requires sellers to ship items as promised, and no more than 30-days after the order date. If the order cannot be shipped within the 30-day time frame, the business must notify you and give you a chance to cancel your order for a full refund. Shipping and handling charges may be added to the price of your purchase. Ask if you have a choice of delivery methods, and the cost of each.

KEEP A RECORD

Print out and file away any records related to your online transaction. This information may be valuable in case of a problem with the order.

Rain still in short supply

For those who have read about it and those who lived through it, the recent comparison of today's drought with that which led to the Dust Bowl had to come as a bit of particular unpleasantness.

From conversations and interviews with lots of folks who did survive those days, and its accompanying Great Depression, we have come to realize at least one thing. You can't really understand it unless you did live through it. The photographs of devastated land and the stories of skies filled with topsoil, and whatever else, seeping into houses, are impressive. But those who were there have assured me, and I believe them, that "You had to be there."

Despite weather, the use of all manner of agricultural science these days helps to prevent a great many of the situations that contributed to the Dust Bowl. Modern tillage, land-seaping, irrigation, crop rotation and lots of other things have changed farming.

But there's nothing you can buy at the co-op that will make it rain.

In the late 1970s, during the administration of Gov. Jim Exon, a drought gripped Nebraska. Exon talked to farmers (and everyone else he could find) when he was traveling around the state. We were in Schuyler, I think, when he got into a palaver with the overalls and seed-corn hat crowd.

One youngish fellow offered that the situation was tough, but that, what the heck, a guy could "double

up" next year, and work things through.

That's when several much, much older men let loose with some laughter that was not intended to be unkind - but it did reflect a decidedly skeptical note. Sort of like: "Hah!"

"Listen here, it don't have to rain next year, nor the year after that, nor the year after that, either!" one of the elder statesmen said.

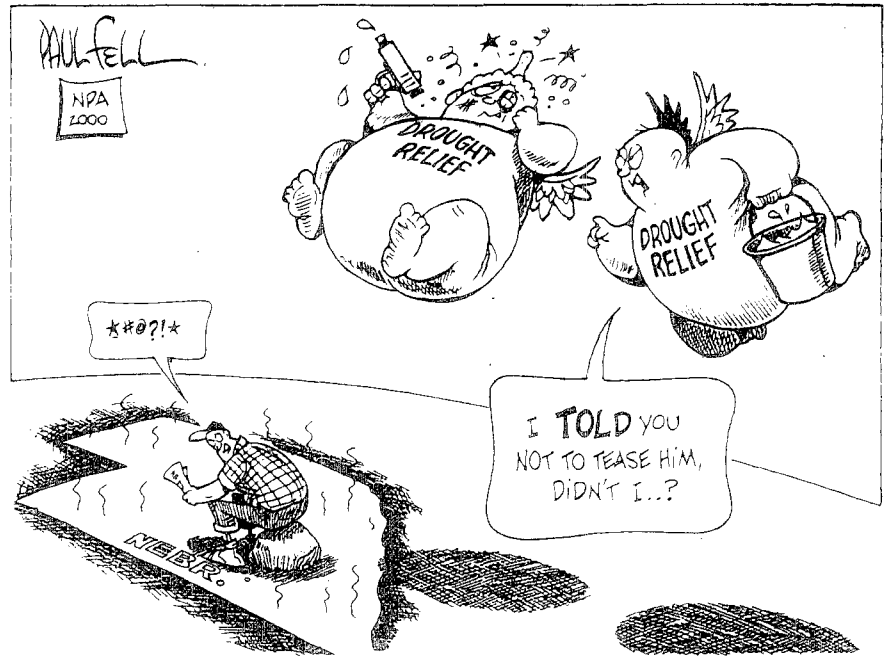
Another gentleman offered that

there is nothing in law or the Bible that even remotely guarantees rain, or even enough water for irrigation.

From that day to this one the advances in agricultural science, the "greening of the planet," the enhanced ability of mankind to feed itself, have been amazing. For that matter, the advances in all manner of science has been astounding.

But when one lives in a place like Nebraska (a place where, as

Garrison Keillor notes, people still grow things), it is easy to compare the accomplishments of man's science with the reality of nature. And the reality is, despite all of our technology, our creative genius and striving to overcome nature, we remain confronted with a simple fact: Eventually, if the heavens don't open up, there will be hell to pay. And there's not much that a computerized center pivot can do about it.

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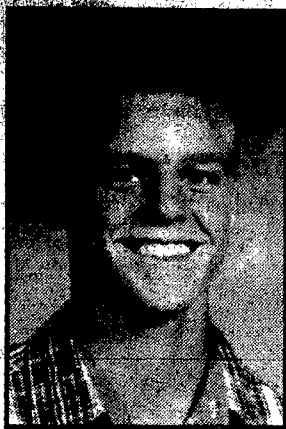

The Golden Years

Actor Charlton Heston, who starred in 'The Ten Commandments,' 'Ben Hur' and many other legendary films, at age seventy-four, has finally admitted that he always wanted to be Cary Grant. Even though Heston has played three prophets, three presidents, two geniuses, kings, cardinal, and tycoons, it was Cary Grant who always had the parts Heston wanted. Cary Grant always seemed to have the roles where he wore nice clothes, lived in beautiful apartments, and was constantly surrounded by extraordinary women. Heston admits he often did get the beautiful girl in his film career, but then he died in the end. But Heston has no regrets. He says his career has always been interesting because of all the tragic heroes he has played.

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Progesterone is the female hormone responsible for changes in the lining of the uterus during the second half of a woman's menstrual cycle. Usually both progesterone and estrogen levels drop at the time of menstruation. When this happens the replacement of these hormones may be considered by women and their physicians.

It has been over a year now since the US Food and Drug Administration approved a new oral progesterone to use with estrogen in treating endometrial hyperplasia (rapid cell growth in the lining of the endometrium) in women who have not had a hysterectomy. This hormonal medicine, which has become popular among physicians, also is approved for treating amenorrhea.

The medicine, a synthetic form of natural progesterone, is called *Progestrium*. It is prepared from yams. The company that makes *Progestrium* indicates that their product is identical to the progesterone made naturally by women. Women who should not take the new medicine include those with liver disease, allergy to peanuts, pregnancy, or known of suspected breast cancer.

Older Women May Benefit from Using "The Pill"

Many physicians prescribe hormone replacement therapy (HRT) for their female patients at menopause. HRT has been shown to reduce the risk of osteoporosis, manage menopausal symptoms such as hot flashes and vaginal dryness, and possibly even reduce the risk of heart disease. A study of 80 postmenopausal women reported in the medical journal *Obstetrics and Gynecology* suggests that oral contraceptive pills may be even more helpful than HRT.

Older women in Thailand who received either the pill or HRT for one year experienced significant bone strengthening at various locations, including the lower spine and hip.

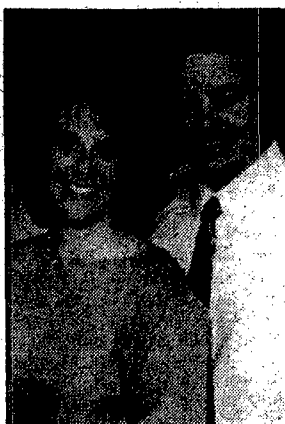

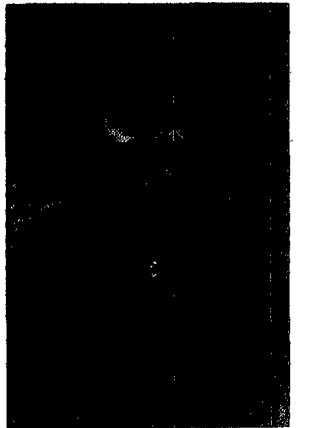

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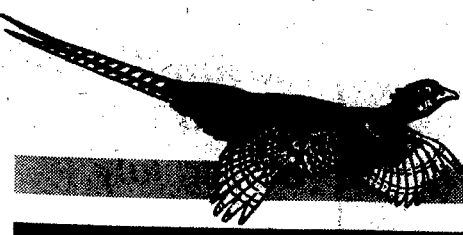

Grill safety tips given by extension office

When cooking juicy steaks and burgers this season over a charcoal grill, think safety. Every year nationwide about 30 people die and 100 are injured from charcoal grill accidents and fumes.

Charcoal produces carbon monoxide and carbon dioxide when it burns, so it should never be burned in the home, tent, vehicle, or camper, even with ventilation. Briquettes continue to emit carbon monoxide, a colorless and odorless gas, until they are completely used. Don't store a grill indoors with freshly used coals.

Especially during dry conditions, be careful that sparks from the grill don't ignite nearby homes, buildings or lawns. Appropriate disposal is a must.

Follow these other safe charcoal tips:

1. Always grill in well-ventilated areas. Avoid grilling on windy days.
2. Make sure the grill is level on a firm non-flammable surface. Never place the grill or hibachi on a wooden deck or picnic table.
3. Never apply charcoal lighter fluid after briquettes have been lit. The fluid may ignite and the flame follow the steam into the fluid container and explode. Also, the heat from the lit briquettes may cause the lighter fluid to vaporize and explode. Never use any accelerators other than lighter fluid.
4. Keep all children and pets away from the grill while in operation and until the grill is cooled off. Never allow children to play with butane

starters, starting fluid or electric starters.

5. Keep a fire extinguisher (10 ABC) accessible.

6. Use proper utensils that allow the chef to be a safe distance from the grill.

7. Avoid wearing loose clothing while cooking.

8. Dispose of hot coals in a heavy, non-flammable container. Place a few at a time in the container, then carefully pour water over the coals until they are cool, then repeat the process until all the coals are quenched.

For gas and electric grills: -- Each season, inspect hoses, fittings, regulators, igniter and burners on gas grills/stoves.



Don't replace gas bottles on any type of grill when it is hot -- Inspect electric starters before placing in use (cords, elements, plugs and switches).

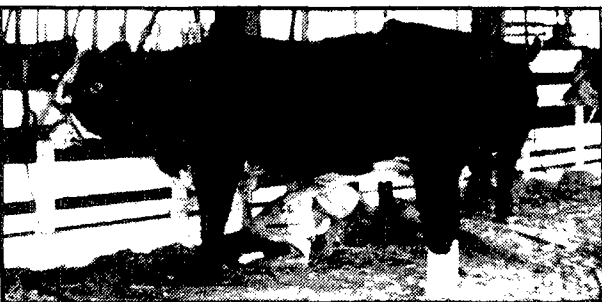
