City Council meets

Av Clara Osten Of the Herald

Council members approved the hiring of a project manager for the Community Activity Center project during Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council

Both Mayor Sheryl Lindau and City Administrator Lowell Johnson spoke in favor of having someone to help oversee the project.

Johnson said that his experience with a contract manager in Wakefield saved more than \$120,000 on the renovation of the former hospital

The person hired would work to assist in site selection, selection of an architect, completion of final design, bidding and construction. This would allow the city to act as the general contractor on the project

On the same topic, Mayor Lindau

appointed Brandon Garvin and April Thede as youth representatives to the Community Activity Center Committee.

The council took no action on a proposal from Glover Painting & Decorating in regard to the wood siding at the Library/Senior Center

The cedar siding on the building is no longer sealed and is weathering, causing discoloring and splintering and splitting of the wood grain.

The company has recommended coating the wood with two coats of heavy pigmented primer- sealer to hide the color differences and seal

the wood to stop the splintering Council members Verdel Lutt and Will Wiseman voiced opposition to the cost of this project (\$10,000) which is expected to last four to six

Staff contracts are approved

Of the Herald

The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education met in regular session Monday night. The board approved the new certified staff contract of Lee Brogie for the position of Middle School Science teacher.

Brad Weber, Wayne High School band instructor, was present to discuss the band uniforms replacement schedule. He told the board that to purchase all of the band uniforms at one time is too costly so 10-20 uniforms are replaced every two to four years. This is done by the board transferring money to the music boosters each year to use towards this project. He noted that 1998 was the last time that many uniforms were replaced although there are a few uniforms replaced yearly.

Dr. Joe Reinert, Wayne Community Schools superintendent, gave an update on construction at the high school. The high school is nearly fin-

ished. The concrete work is done and all be a total Ethernet system instead the crew is waiting for the glass to come in so it can be put into the windows. Hopefully, the project will be finished by Aug. 3.

Work at the middle school has slowed a bit with problems with existing footings. Parallel footings will need to support the new three story addition. The crew will replace old windows as soon as the new windows come in. The demolition crew should be done and gone in about a week. They are finishing removing the stairwells.

Technology cable replacement at the new middle school, the elementary school, and the high school was discussed. Amy Woerdemann, technology director at Wayne schools was present to explain the situation to the board. She noted new wiring will be put in that will speed up the computers. She told them of a grant she wrote which has been received for the project. The new system will

of the mixed Token Ring system and Ethernet system that the schools are on now.

According to Woerdemann Ethernet is cheaper in the long run. Contractors will be arriving soon to finish this project by the time school starts this fall. In addition to the rewiring projects, all computers in the schools should be on Windows '98 by the end of the summer

Reinert informed the board that the preliminary budget for 2000-01 will be presented at the August school board meeting. He noted that the finalization of District 57 is needed before the budget can be finished. He mentioned that the District 57 school house has been sold. A sale of the school house contents is set for July 30.

He was preceded in death by his wife long and his wife Geneva, a grandon Gregory Lee Rethwisch, two brothers and two sisters



Bonus system a gimmick

There is all manner of discussion around the country, in a variety of quarters, about the possibility of using bonus systems to enhance the pay of teachers

Generally speaking, this idea is so bad that it's a miracle Congress didn't think of it first. And then, enact

Supporters of the bonus idea see it as a something that would allow rewards for the best teachers. No matter how "best" is defined you can be certain it will leave room for enough of the subjective to be troublesome. Real-ly troublesome

In short, a bonus system would almost certainly open the door for favoritism, anti-union politics, prounion politics, personal vendettas, lawsuits and all manner of screwy goings on Far too much would be left to the subjective judgments of mere mortals-and that is a recipe for

Upon what basic criteria would bonuses be awarded? The grades and test scores achieved by students. Think about it. What if you are in the army of teachers whose lot it is to deal with classrooms full of numbskulls? Perhaps worse, what if your charges include a substantial number of miscreants whose goal in is to exemplify thiuggery through violence?

Do we award points for effort, for those all-important little victories that can make big differences in a child's life, far down the road? Who's to measure such accomplish ments?

Besides, all this bonus business has the markings of yet another

"hidden ball" play by some in edu-

Why do we think that, for more money, teachers can somehow overcome the cultural reality that confronts them when they are confronted with our children? Teachers facing ill-mannered, ill-prepared, disrespectful, insufficiently motivat ed, two legged boogers aren't being asked to overcome their weakness as teachers. They are being asked to overcome your weakness as a parent, and our weak riess as a society

What's the bottom line here? We seem to want teachers to find

a way to make our children learn more and, in some cases, behave better. In some cases, teachers can accomplish such noble goals. But those who mold lives have more than a little in common with those who mold sculpture. The raw materials with which they start will have much to do with the final product.

And a teacher generally does not have the option of calling the manufacturer (that would be a parent) and saying. "This stuff you sent me just isn't good enough for what we're trying to accomplish. It's not ready for the task. I can't work with

This is not to suggest for a moment that there are not rotten teachers who should be axed, or that there are not great teachers whose world consists of criticism which is endless and gratitude which is underwhelming.

It is to suggest that this bonus business would more likely become a gimmick than a Godsend

REDUCING UNWANTED MAIL The Direct Marketing Association Can Help

Consumers can greatly reduce the amount of junk mail they receive in their mailboxes by taking advantage of a free service offered by the Direct Marketing Association.

Registering with the Direct Marketing Association Mail Preference Service will remove your name from Direct Marketing Association members' mailing lists. This service can substantially reduce the amount of national advertising mail you are now receiving. Telephone Preference Service of the Direct Marketing Association will

remove your name from members' telemarketing lists as well The Consumer Protection Division of the Attorney General's Office can provide nost cards addressed to the Direct Marketing Association to assist in getting your name removed from mailing and telemarketing

Registering with the Mail Preference Service and Telephone Preference Service will not eliminate all unwanted mail and telemarketing calls, but it can reduce the number of contacts Businesses who are not members of the Direct Marketing Association may continue to contact you through the mail and telephone. Local and home based businesses may not be DMA mamhare

Any time you complete a warranty card, purchase a magazine subscription, order from a catalogue or complete a market research survey you run the risk of having your name added to another list of names that may be offered for sale to other businesses

If you do not want your name and other personal information to be sold by the companies you do business with, request that your name be removed from customer lists that may be rented or sold to other marketers. Information about how to opt out of marketing lists is often provided on companies' materials and order forms.

Those marketers who are operating contest scams or other scams are not likely to belong to the Direct Marketing Association. This means that even after you register with the Mail Preference Service or the Telephone Preference Service, you may continue to receive scam attempts through the mail and over the telephone.

You may tell telemarketers who call you to put you on their "Do Not Call" lists. Keep a list by your phone with the company name, name of the person you talked to, and date of the call. If a tele marketer from the same business calls you again, make a note of the date and report it to the Federal Trade Commission, Consumer Response Center, & Pennsylvania Ave. NW, Room 240, Washington, DC 20580. The phone number is 202-326-2222.

Adults can help youth deal with competition pressure

The thrill of victory, the agony of defeat. That familiar phrase from the sports world is one that could be repeated again and again in a child's life. And 4-H'ers feel both the thrill and the agony associated with the competitive parts of 4-H

Adults can help youth deal with the pressure from competition

Emphasize aspects of 4-H other than competition. If adults go into a 4-H event with the atti-tude that "we're going to win," the 4-H'er feels that Emphasize, instead, the fun they are going to have, the chances they will have to do interesting things, activities such as day camp and the chance to spend time together on

2. Help the 4-H'er set realistic goals. Emphasize that the whole idea of 4-H is to accomplish something you set your sights on. But avoid goals such as "get grand champion," or "be the Outstanding 4-H'er." Instèad encourage goals such as "make three new garments," or "teach younger 4-H'ers how to make muffins." Guide them to set goals that really do match their own resources of time, money and energy. See awards as the frostng on the cake, not the core of the 4-H experience.

3 Take a look at expectations. Go to each event expecting low placings. When adults gear kids up for high placings, 4-H'ers may have difficulty dealing with the disappointment of lower placings. They may feel like a failure if they didn't meet those expectations

But when an adult targets expec tations for a lower placing, then the child is thrilled and feels proud when they place higher If they do place lower, they don't feel they let the adult down

This is not the same as setting your sights too low. Encourage the child to do their very best. But this offers the 4-H'er the opportunity to see himself/herself as successful regardless of placings

4 Watch your own reactions. Children often mirror adult reactions If the adult is upset over the ribbon placing,t he 4-H'er will react



Crankbait basics are given for better fishing

ever. Some look like a minnow while others resemble a frog. Then there are those that just don't look like anything that I've ever seen

For those of you that aren't familiar with crankbaits, they're any type of lure that needs to be cranked or tolled to give them movement. Rapala's, Shad Raps, Berkley's Storm's Thundersticks. Pradco's Wally Divers and Bombers are a few of the more common crankbaits on the market.

They twitch and wiggle from side to side as they move through the water giving off vibrations that attract the fish. Many also have BB's or lead shot inside their bodies which rattles and also helps to attract the fish.

They can be used in so many ways, they are a very versatile bait that can be used almost year around.

You can cast them from a boat or from shore, they can be trolled behind a boat, or they can be drifted down stream and then retrieved back against the current

How do you go about finding a crankbait that will attract and catch the species of fish you're after?

The first thing you need to do is to find out what the prey fish are feeding on. If the fish in the lake are



feeding on creek chubs or shiners, want to use a bait that resem bles those species. Check with a local bait shop, as most of them know what type of prey fish inhabit the area waters

'Of the Outdoors'

If they're feeding on crawdads, then look for a crankbalt that looks like a crawdad.

The type of fish you're going after can also make a difference when it comes to choosing a crankbait

If you're after Smallmouth Bass, you'll want to use a smaller bait that the fish can get into his mouth. Largemouth Bass fishermen use larger baits, the alphabet style bait. Larger and fatter than baits used for other species because a Largemouth mouth bass will go after anything that he thinks he might be able to swallow. Ducklings, baby birds, snakes, frogs and mice are just a few of the things that largemouths will try to inhale

Walleyes on the other hand are more apt to take a thinner minnow shaped bait. Something that resembles a shad or minnow.

Panfish can also be caught or crankbaits, but they'll need to be much smaller for these tiny mouth fish to inhale

Pike, Tiger Musky and Musky will all take the larger crankbaits but really aren't too particular about what size or shape and if they are in the mood, will attack anything they feel like attacking, because they are the big guy in the pond.

Crankbaits will all dive when cranked or trolled. There are a coupled of things that will affect the depth a lure will dive

Number one is the size of the bill on the front of the bait. A shorter billed bait will run shallow and a larger billed bait will run deeper Most boxes that the crankbaits come in now indicate the depth, so

The second thing that will affect the depth the lure will run is your line diameter. Larger line have more resistance and won't let your bait

The last thing that will affect the depth is the speed at which the bait is being retrieved or the speed it is being trolled. The faster the bait is

Crankbaits account for more of

the larger fish than any other bait. The reason for this is because you cover a lot more water with a crankbait, showing your lure to more fish. Since crankbaits are a quick presentation balt, you'll catch the more aggressive fish.

Crankbaits are something that the angler should have in his tackle box.

Because they can help you to catch almost all species of fish.

The more time you spend using crankbaits, the more ways you'll learn that they are an effective piece of your fishing arsenal

Next week we'll look at choosing the right color crankbait for the body of water you're fishing.

Thirty-five young women from across the United States and Japan are learning about Nebraska's unique geological history by visiting 17 sites in 15 days on a bus tour. Nebraska Rocks! is a Girl Scout Wider Opportunity sponsored by Homestead Girl Scout Council and the Association for Women

The expedition began at the University of Nebraska on July 11, and takes participants through some of Nebraska's most important geological sites: Ashfall Fossil Beds, Hudson-Meng Bison Kill Site, the Sandhills, Agate Fossil Beds, and Missouri, River rafting are some of the stops on these budding geoscientists' schedules.

Nationally and internationally

Cadette and Senior Girl Scouts aged 14-18 to drill into peat bogs; dig up fossils; search rocks for evidence of ancient soils, lakes, and rivers; decipher landscapes; examine grains of sand with microscopes and use satellites in geological investiga-

One of the highlights of the tour is exploring Ashfall Fossil Beds with Dr. Michael Voorhies, the paleontorogy called taphonomy to Girl Scouts at the site. Taphonomy is the "crime lab" aspect of paleontology in which scientists study a limited array of fossil bones to determine how animals lived and died millions of years ago. Voorhies is one of the founding scientists of taphonomy

Girl Scouts participating in Nebraska Rocks! will also work with microscopic evidence of a catastrophic asteroid collision that happened 70 million years ago. Holmes will also teach these young women how geography can signat largescale geologic processes, like the glaciers that once covered Nebraska

Girl Scout Wider Opportunities are designed to give older Girl Scots an opportunity to visit important locations across the United States and around the world while developing volunteer and leadership
