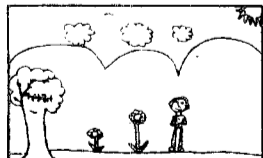

## City Council meets

Council members approved the hiring of a project manager for the Community Activity Center project during Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Both Mayor Sheryl Lindau and City Administrator Lowell Johnson spoke in favor of having someone to help oversee the project.

Johnson said that his experience with a contract manager in Wakefield saved more than \$120,000 on the renovation of the former hospital.

The person hired would work to assist in site selection, selection of an architect, completion of final design, bidding and construction. This would allow the city to act as the general contractor on the project.

On the same topic, Mayor Lindau

appointed Brandon Garvin and April Thede as youth representatives to the Community Activity Center Committee.

The council took no action on a proposal from Clover Painting & Decorating in regard to the wood siding at the Library/Senior Center.

The cedar siding on the building is no longer sealed and is weathering, causing discoloring and splintering and splitting of the wood grain.

The company has recommended coating the wood with two coats of heavy pigmented primer-sealer to hide the color differences and seal the wood to stop the splintering.

Council members Verdel Lutt and Will Wiseman voiced opposition to the cost of this project (\$10,000) which is expected to last four to six

The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education met in regular session Monday night. The board approved the new certified staff contract of Lee Brogie for the position of Middle School Science teacher.

Brad Weber, Wayne High School band instructor, was present to discuss the band uniforms replacement schedule. He told the board that to purchase all of the band uniforms at one time is too costly so 10-20 uniforms are replaced every two to four years. This is done by the board transferring money to the music boosters each year to use towards this project. He noted that 1998 was the last time that many uniforms were replaced although there are a few uniforms replaced yearly.

Dr. Joe Reinert, Wayne Community Schools superintendent, gave an update on construction at the high school. The high school is nearly finished.

The concrete work is done and the crew is waiting for the glass to come in so it can be put into the windows. Hopefully, the project will be finished by Aug. 3.

## Police receive funding for new equipment

The Wayne Police Department has received grant funding assistance for two different projects.

The department will obtain three in-car video camera systems, according to Fred Zwonechek, Administrator for the Nebraska Office of Highway Safety.

"This highway safety grant funding in the amount of \$5,994 will aid the Wayne Police Department in purchasing three camera systems," he said.

In addition, Safety Training Option Program (STOP) funds collected in the county will be used to complete the purchase.

The State of Nebraska has qualified for additional highway safety alcohol incentive funds for the past six years. The Nebraska Office of Highway Safety has used this funding primarily to aid local area law enforcement in obtaining in-car cameras and alcohol testing equipment used to assist in apprehension and conviction of drinking drivers.

"The continued availability of these funds, along with the commitment and dedication of local law enforcement agencies to aggressively enforce alcohol driving violations, has kept Nebraska's alcohol-crash rate well below the national average," Zwonechek said.

In addition, grant money has been received to obtain two mobile radar units.

"The Wayne Police Department is receiving the funding assistance because they have identified a need and desire in reducing traffic crashes, injuries and fatalities at hazardous locations within the community," Zwonechek said.

The mobile radar speed detection equipment provides the agency with a state-of-the-art system that will enhance speed control efforts in

## Staff contracts are approved

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Work at the middle school has slowed a bit with problems with existing footings. A sale of the school house contents is set for July 30.

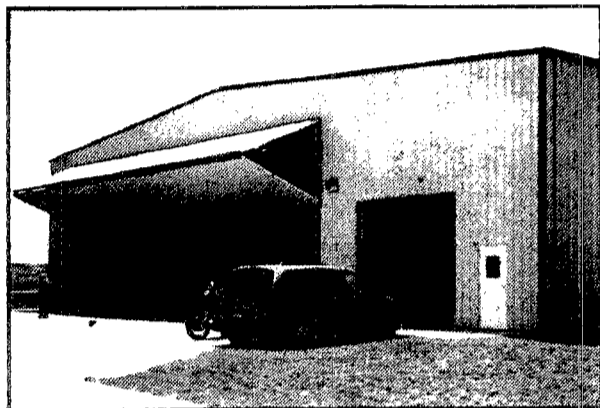

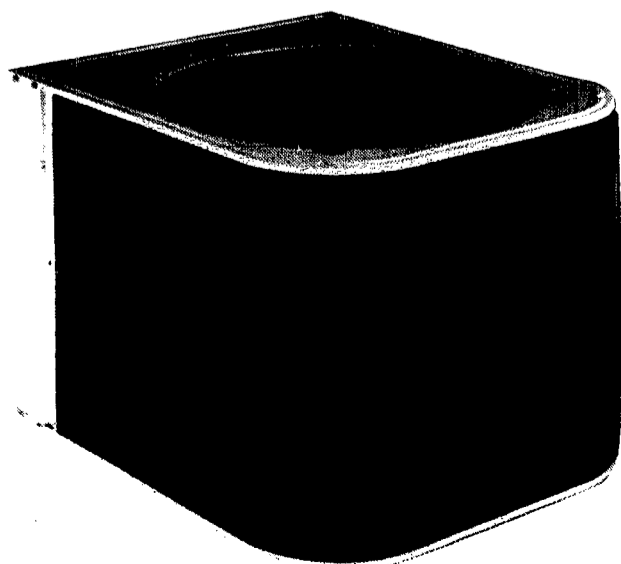

Bonus system a gimmick

There is all manner of discussion around the country, in a variety of quarters, about the possibility of using bonus systems to enhance the pay of teachers.

Generally speaking, this idea is so bad that it's a miracle Congress didn't think of it first. And then, enact it.

Supporters of the bonus idea see it as a something that would allow rewards for the best teachers. No matter how "best" is defined you can be certain it will leave room for enough of the subjective to be troublesome. Really troublesome.

In short, a bonus system would almost certainly open the door for favoritism, anti-union politics, pro-union politics, personal vendettas, lawsuits and all manner of screwy goings on. Far too much would be left to the subjective judgments of mere mortals and that is a recipe for trouble.

Upon what basic criteria would bonuses be awarded? The grades and test scores achieved by students. Think about it. What if you are in the army of teachers whose lot it is to deal with classrooms full of numbskulls? Perhaps worse, what if your charges include a substantial number of miscreants whose goal in life is to exemplify thuggery through violence?

Do we award points for effort, for those all-important little victories that can make big differences in a child's life, far down the road? Who's to measure such accomplishments?

Besides, all this bonus business has the markings of yet another

"hidden ball" play by some in education.

Why do we think that, for more money, teachers can somehow overcome the cultural reality that confronts them when they are confronted with our children? Teachers facing ill-mannered, ill-prepared, disrespectful, insufficiently motivated, two-legged boogers aren't being asked to overcome their weakness as teachers. They are being asked to overcome our weakness as a parent, and our weakness as a society.

What's the bottom line here? We seem to want teachers to find

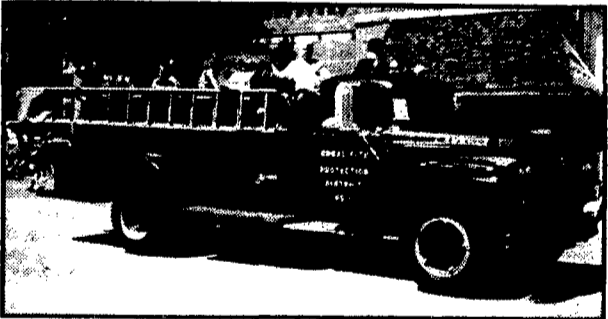
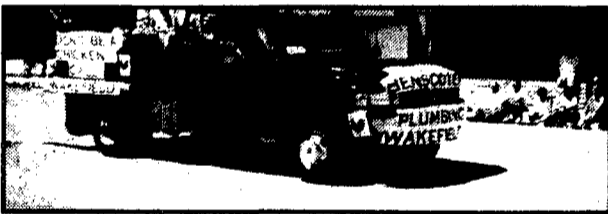
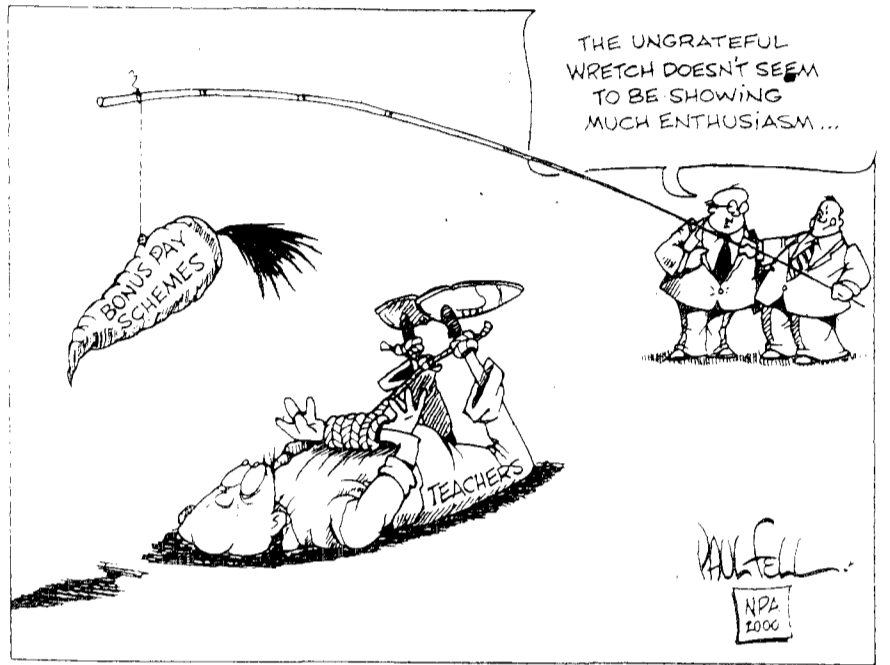
a way to make our children learn more and, in some cases, behave better. In some cases, teachers can accomplish such noble goals. But those who mold lives have more than a little in common with those who mold sculpture. The raw materials with which they start will have much to do with the final product.

And a teacher generally does not have the option of calling the manufacturer (that would be a parent) and saying "This stuff you sent me

just isn't good enough for what we're trying to accomplish. It's not ready for the task. I can't work with it."

This is not to suggest for a moment that there are not rotten teachers who should be axed, or that there are not great teachers whose world consists of criticism which is endless and gratitude which is underwhelming.

It is to suggest that this bonus business would more likely become a gimmick than a Godsend.

Consumers can greatly reduce the amount of junk mail they receive in their mailboxes by taking advantage of a free service offered by the Direct Marketing Association.

Registering with the Direct Marketing Association Mail Preference Service will remove your name from Direct Marketing Association members' mailing lists. This service can substantially reduce the amount of national advertising mail you are now receiving. The Telephone Preference Service of the Direct Marketing Association will remove your name from members' telemarketing lists as well.

The Consumer Protection Division of the Attorney General's Office can provide post cards addressed to the Direct Marketing Association to assist in getting your name removed from mailing and telemarketing lists.

Registering with the Mail Preference Service and Telephone Preference Service will not eliminate all unwanted mail and telemarketing calls, but it can reduce the number of contacts significantly. Businesses who are not members of the Direct Marketing Association may continue to contact you through the mail and telephone. Local and home based businesses may not be DMA members.

Any time you complete a warranty card, purchase a magazine subscription, order from a catalogue or complete a market research survey you run the risk of having your name added to another list of names that may be offered for sale to other businesses.

If you do not want your name and other personal information to be sold by the companies you do business with, request that your name be removed from customer lists that may be rented or sold to other marketers. Information about how to opt out of marketing lists is often provided on companies' materials and order forms.

Those marketers who are operating contest scams or other scams are not likely to belong to the Direct Marketing Association. This means that even after you register with the Mail Preference Service or the Telephone Preference Service, you may continue to receive scam attempts through the mail and over the telephone.

You may tell telemarketers who call you to put you on their "Do Not Call" lists. Keep a list by your phone with the company name, name of the person you talked to, and date of the call. If a telemarketer from the same business calls you again, make a note of the date and report it to the Federal Trade Commission, Consumer Response Center, 6<sup>th</sup> & Pennsylvania Ave. NW, Room 240, Washington, DC 20580. The phone number is 202-326-2222.

If you would like to register your name with the Direct Marketing Association Mail Preference Service or the Telephone Preference Service call or write to the Consumer Division of the Nebraska Attorney General's Office for a pre-addressed post card or contact the Direct Marketing Association at P.O. Box 9008, Farmingdale, NY 11735-9008. A card should be filled out for each member of the household.

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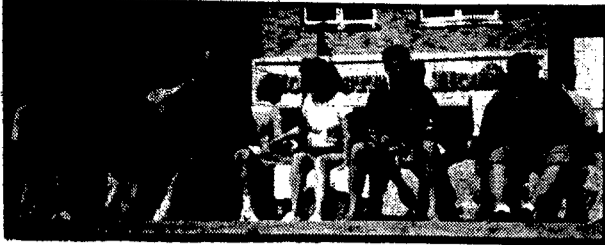

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## Herbs for Health

### Leafy Vegetables May Decrease Macular Degeneration Risk

The macula is the part of the eye that is responsible for fine vision. When the macula is damaged, fine vision is lost or is diminished. In the US and Europe, macular degeneration is the most common cause of severe vision loss in persons aged 55 and older.

Numerous studies have shown that people who consume large quantities of dark, leafy green vegetables (herbs used for food) have less risk for this serious problem. These plants contain nutrients called carotenoids. (Some supplements contain carotenoids from plants.) Two carotenoids, lutein and zeaxanthin, are concentrated in the retinas of humans and other primates.

A report in a 1994 issue of *The Journal of the American Medical Association* describes the evaluation of 876 individuals aged 55 to 80. Of this number, 356 had age-related macular degeneration persons with the highest intake of dark, leafy green vegetables had 43% lower risk for macular degeneration as compared to those with the lowest intake.

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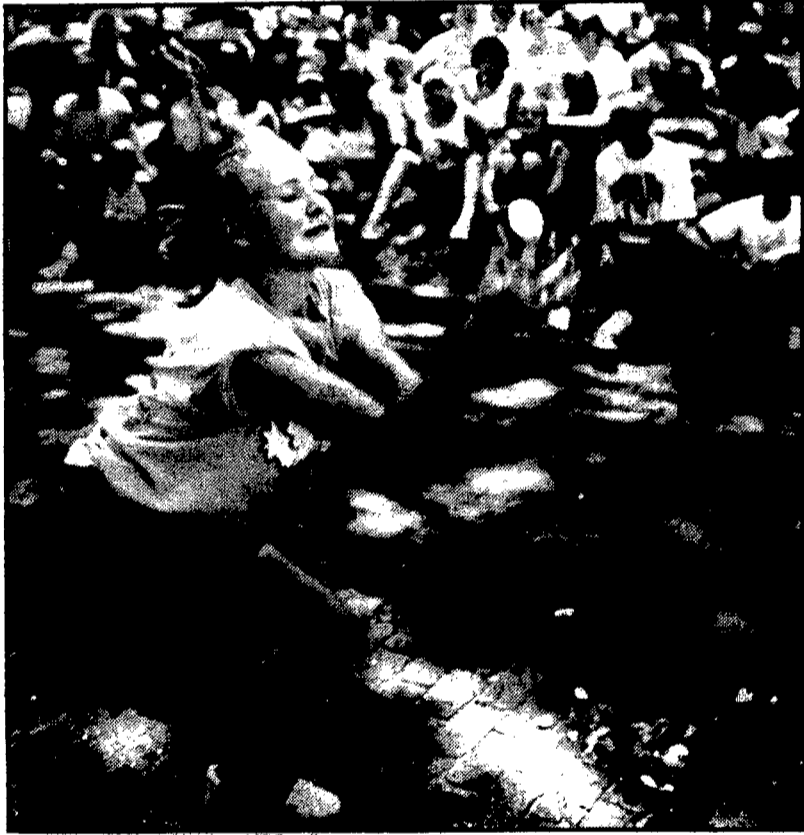
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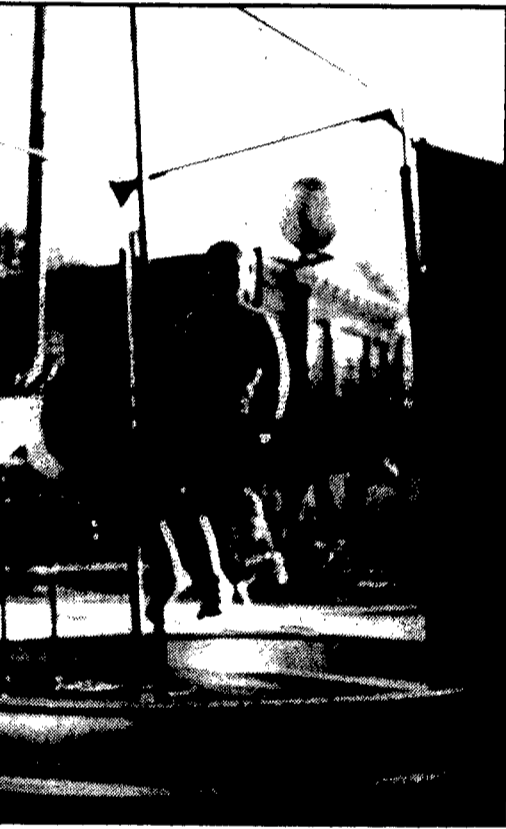
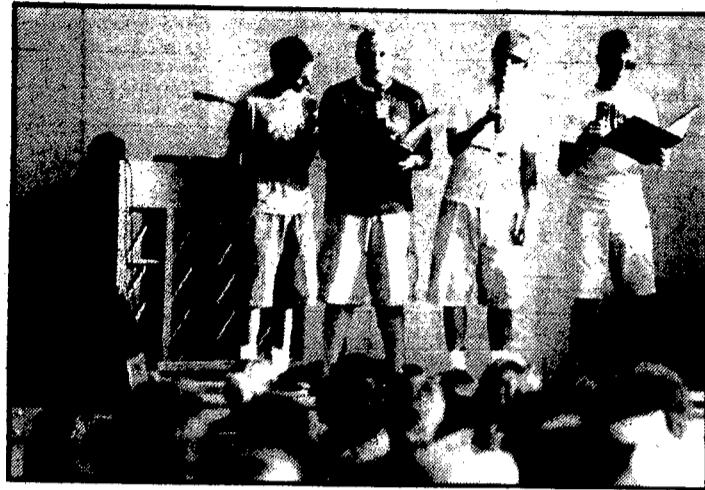

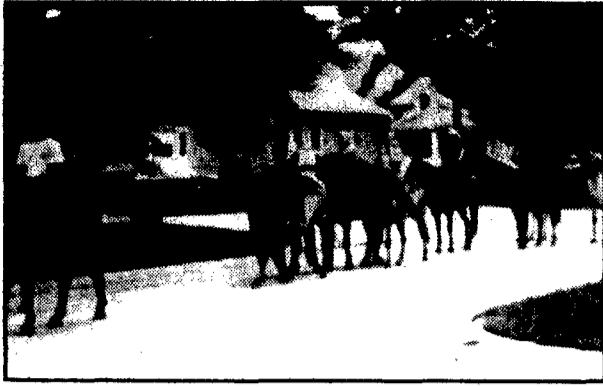

A day-long workshop, "Understanding Native American Spirituality," will be offered at Wayne State College on Thursday, Aug. 3 from 9 a.m. - 4:30 p.m.

The workshop, to be held in Gardner Hall, Room 115, on the WSC campus, is open to the public. It is presented by the Nebraska College Counseling Association, and co-sponsored by NASERVIC, Nebraska Counseling Association and Wayne State College.

Workshop presenter, Wynema Morris, B.S., M.A. will assist practitioners/educators in gaining more knowledge and skills in working with Native American youth in high schools and institutions of higher education. Morris, a member of the Omaha Tribe of Nebraska, earned her degrees from Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff, Ariz. She has taught on the Navajo Reservation, and has worked with the Pueblos in New Mexico as well as with her own tribe, the Omahas, at Macy.

Morris has her own management consulting company which provides tribal services to other tribes throughout Indian country. She is soon to become a radio talk show

host for NABC in Phoenix, Ariz., discussing issues facing American Indian Tribes today.

Sessions to be included in the workshop are "Understanding the Characteristics of Tribal World-Views," "Social Forces Impacting Native American Students," and



"American Indians and Their Relationship with God and Nature." A noon luncheon is included.

Registration for the workshop is \$25 for NCA members and \$30 for non-members if postmarked by July 28. After that date, the fee is \$35 and \$40, respectively. Those attending the workshop may receive 5.5 CEUs.

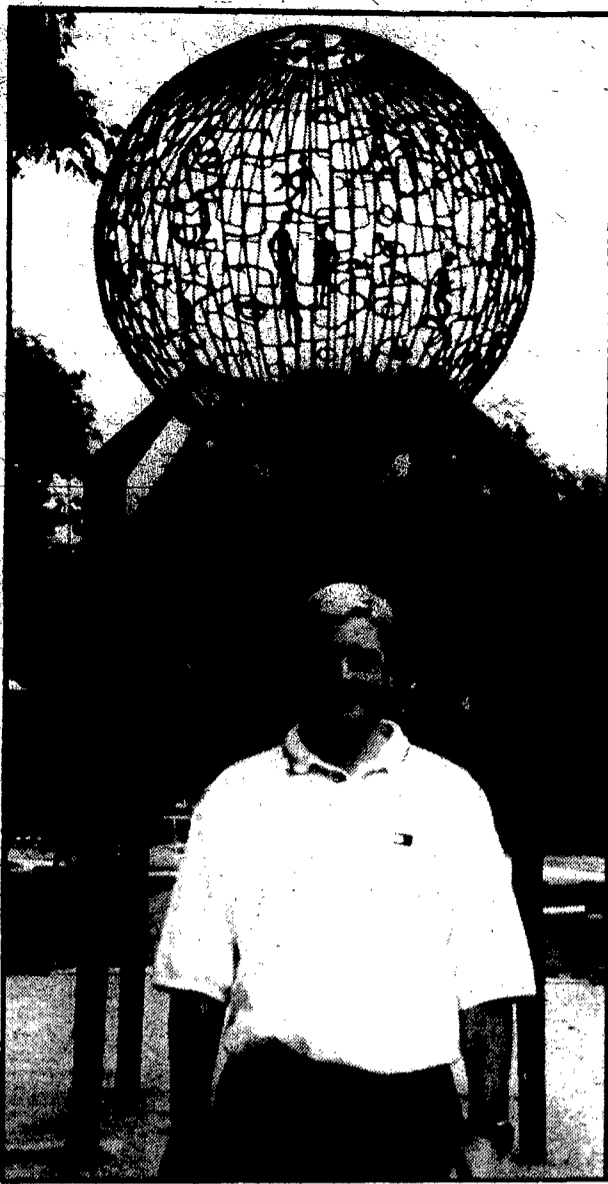

# Madrigal Singers return from Russian tour

The Wayne State Madrigal Singers were honored at an on-campus reception following their recent Russian Madrigal Tour. At the reception hosted by Dr. Sheila M. Stearns, WSC president, the group performed a number of choral selections from the tour.

On the 11-day tour from May 10-21, the group performed six concerts in Moscow and St. Petersburg, according to director David Lawrence. Selections were performed in English, Russian and Italian. "We were very well reviewed wherever we went," said Lawrence. "The audience particularly enjoyed the folk songs the group sang in Russian."

Tour company officials worked closely with the Russian Ministry of Culture to schedule performances. Concerts were held at the Boys Choir School in the city of Dubna, an international scientific nuclear research center during the Cold War. The WSC Madrigal Singers were the first American artists to perform in the Kremlin Patriarch Palace, where they had a joint performance with the Russian instrumental group, "Lad."

Other concerts were held at St. Andrew's Anglican Church in Moscow; St. Petersburg Musical School, where they were joined in concert by Per Artem, an ensemble of ancient music; Capella Hall in St. Petersburg, the winter palace of Peter the Great; and Pavlosk Palace, the summer palace of Peter the Great, where the madrigal singers had a joint performance with the "Kant" choir from Pavlosk.

In addition to the performances, group members had an opportunity to do some sight-seeing. One of the

highlights of the trip was taking the "Nikolaevsky Express," an overnight train from Moscow to St. Petersburg the group toured the city of Dubna, The Kremlin and other sites in Moscow, as well as the Hermitage Museum and Peter and Paul Fortress in St. Petersburg. They also attended a performance of "Swan Lake" ballet at the famous Opera and Ballet Theatre in Moscow.

"It was a tremendous experience," said Lawrence. "With the rich history of international travel that has been developed at Wayne State College, we wanted to go someplace special. We made the decision to go to Russia in March, 1999, and worked with Roberta and George Gordon on the International Fine Arts Association, who helped make all the arrangements."

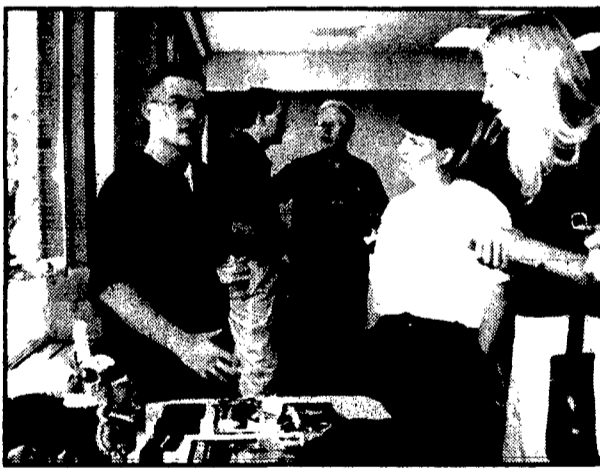
The 14 members of the WSC Madrigal Singers each raised approximately \$700 or about one-third of the per-person cost of the trip. The remainder was raised through Madrigal Christmas Feastes, an annual holiday event sponsored by the group, and several other fund-raising events. This year will be the 29th year for the Madrigal Christmas Feastes at WSC.

"One of the things I've wanted to do is take each WSC ensemble group on an international tour every four years," Lawrence said. "Not only do students have an opportunity to perform in another country, but the trip is wonderful in terms of cultural enrichment. In addition, we made many positive connections on this trip that will be very helpful in future endeavors."

# Adults can help youth deal with competition pressure

The thrill of victory, the agony of defeat. That familiar phrase from the sports world is one that could be repeated again and again in a child's life. And 4-H'ers feel both the thrill and the agony associated with the competitive parts of 4-H.

Adults can help youth deal with the pressure from competition.

**1 Emphasize aspects of 4-H other than competition.** If adults go into a 4-H event with the attitude that "we're going to win," the 4-H'er feels that pressure. Emphasize, instead, the fun they are going to have, the chances they will have to do interesting things, the activities such as day camp and the chance to spend time together on projects.

**2 Help the 4-H'er set realistic goals.** Emphasize that the whole idea of 4-H is to accomplish something you set your sights on. But avoid goals such as "get grand champion," or "be the Outstanding 4-H'er." Instead encourage goals such as "make three new garments," or "teach younger 4-H'ers how to make muffins." Guide them to set goals that really do match their own resources of time, money and energy. See awards as the frosting on the cake, not the core of the 4-H experience.

**3 Take a look at expectations.** Go to each event expecting low placings. When adults gear kids up for high placings, 4-H'ers may have difficulty dealing with the disappointment of lower placings. They may feel like a failure if they didn't meet those expectations.

But when an adult targets expectations for a lower placing, then the child is thrilled and feels proud when they place higher. If they do place lower, they don't feel they let the adult down.

This is not the same as setting your sights too low. Encourage the child to do their very best. But this offers the 4-H'er the opportunity to see himself/herself as successful regardless of placings.

**4 Watch your own reactions.** Children often mirror adult reactions. If the adult is upset over the ribbon placing, the 4-H'er will react



similarly. Watch, first, for the child's reaction. If he/she appears disap-

pointed, say, "I know you were hoping for a purple ribbon. But it's a neat project and I am very proud of you." Chances are, little else is needed and the child will be satisfied.

**5 Encourage them to be a good winner.** Talk with 4-H'ers about good reactions for winners. Arrogance often puts them at odds with their fellow 4-H'ers. Encourage them to win with sincerity. If you have one big winner in your club, encourage other members to feel pride in this person as a member of their club, which will help alleviate jealousy.

**6 Look to the future with anticipation.** Young people can so easily become discouraged and give up, or they are embarrassed by a big win followed by less success. They can become overconfident by much success. Encourage them to look to the future with enthusiasm. A "what can we do next?" attitude is a good way to maintain interest and excitement about possibilities, accomplishments and the future.

# Crankbait basics are given for better fishing

Crankbaits have been around forever. Some look like a minnow while others resemble a frog. Then there are those that just don't look like anything that I've ever seen.

For those of you that aren't familiar with crankbaits, they're any type of lure that needs to be cranked or tolled to give them movement. Rapala's, Shad Raps, Berkley's Frenzy, Storm's Thundersticks, Pradco's Wally Divers and Bombers are a few of the more common crankbaits on the market.

They twitch and wiggle from side to side as they move through the water giving off vibrations that attract the fish. Many also have BB's or lead shot inside their bodies, which rattles and also helps to attract the fish.

They can be used in so many ways, they are a very versatile bait that can be used almost year around.

You can cast them from a boat or from shore, they can be trolled behind a boat, or they can be drifted down stream and then retrieved back against the current.

How do you go about finding a crankbait that will attract and catch the species of fish you're after?

The first thing you need to do is to find out what the prey fish are feeding on. If the fish in the lake are

feeding on creek chubs or shiners, you'll want to use a bait that resembles those species. Check with a local bait shop, as most of them know what type of prey fish inhabit the area waters.

If they're feeding on crawdads, then look for a crankbait that looks like a crawdad.

The type of fish you're going after can also make a difference when it comes to choosing a crankbait.

If you're after Smallmouth Bass, you'll want to use a smaller

crankbait, because of the size of the bait that the fish can get into his mouth. Largemouth Bass fishermen use larger baits, the alphabet style bait. Larger and fatter than baits used for other species because a Largemouth mouth bass will go after anything that he thinks he might be able to swallow. Ducklings, baby birds, snakes, frogs and mice are just a few of the things that largemouths will try to inhale.

Walleyes on the other hand are more apt to take a thinner minnow shaped bait. Something that resembles a shad or minnow.

Panfish can also be caught on crankbaits, but they'll need to be much smaller for these tiny mouth fish to inhale.

Pike, Tiger Musky and Musky will all take the larger crankbaits but really aren't too particular about what size or shape and if they are in the mood, will attack anything they feel like attacking, because they are the big guy in the pond.

Crankbaits will all dive when cranked or trolled. There are a couple of things that will affect the depth a lure will dive.

Number one is the size of the bill on the front of the bait. A shorter billed bait will run shallow and a larger billed bait will run deeper. Most boxes that the crankbaits

come in now indicate the depth, so you won't have to guess.

The second thing that will affect the depth the lure will run is your line diameter. Larger line have more resistance and won't let your bait dive as deep.

The last thing that will affect the depth is the speed at which the bait is being retrieved or the speed it is being trolled. The faster the bait is

running, the deeper it will dive.

Crankbaits account for more of the larger fish than any other bait. The reason for this is because you cover a lot more water with a crankbait, showing your lure to more fish. Since crankbaits are a quick presentation bait, you'll catch the more aggressive fish.

Crankbaits are something that the angler should have in his tackle box.

Because they can help you to catch almost all species of fish.

The more time you spend using crankbaits, the more ways you'll learn that they are an effective piece of your fishing arsenal.

Next week we'll look at choosing the right color crankbait for the body of water you're fishing.

Nebraska Rocks! is a Girl Scout Wider Opportunity sponsored by Homestead Girl Scout Council and the Association for Women Geoscientists.

The expedition began at the University of Nebraska on July 11, and takes participants through some of Nebraska's most important geological sites: Ashfall Fossil Beds, Hudson-Meng Bison Kill Site, the Sandhills, Agate Fossil Beds, and Missouri River rafting are some of the stops on these budding geoscientists' schedules.

Nationally and internationally

renowned scientists will help Cadette and Senior Girl Scouts aged 14-18 to drill into peat bogs, dig up fossils; search rocks for evidence of ancient soils, lakes, and rivers; decipher landscapes; examine grains of sand with microscopes and use satellites in geological investigations.

One of the highlights of the tour is exploring Ashfall Fossil Beds with Dr. Michael Voorhies, the paleontology at the site. Taphonomy is the "crime lab" aspect of paleontology in which scientists study a limited array of fossil bones to determine how animals lived and died millions of years ago. Voorhies is one of the founding scientists of taphonomy.

Girl Scouts participating in Nebraska Rocks! will also work with

Dr. Mary Anne Holmes to find microscopic evidence of a catastrophic asteroid collision that happened 70 million years ago. Holmes will also teach these young women how geography can signal largescale geologic processes, like the glaciers that once covered Nebraska.

Girl Scout Wider Opportunities are designed to give older Girl Scouts an opportunity to visit important locations across the United States and around the world while developing volunteer and leadership skills.

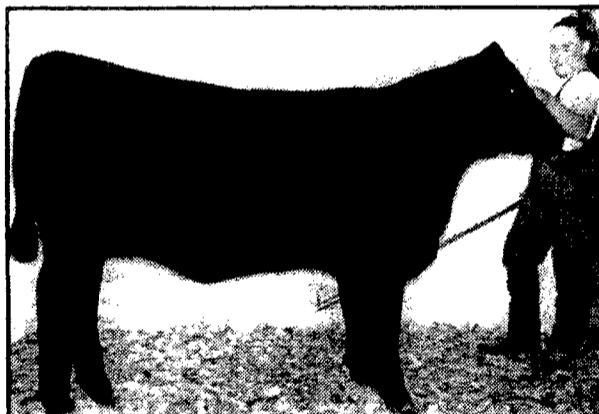
