WAYNE — The Wayne Hospital Auxiliary will not hold a meeting during the month of August.

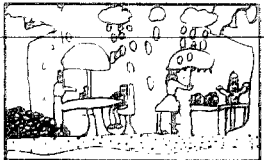
Paper drive

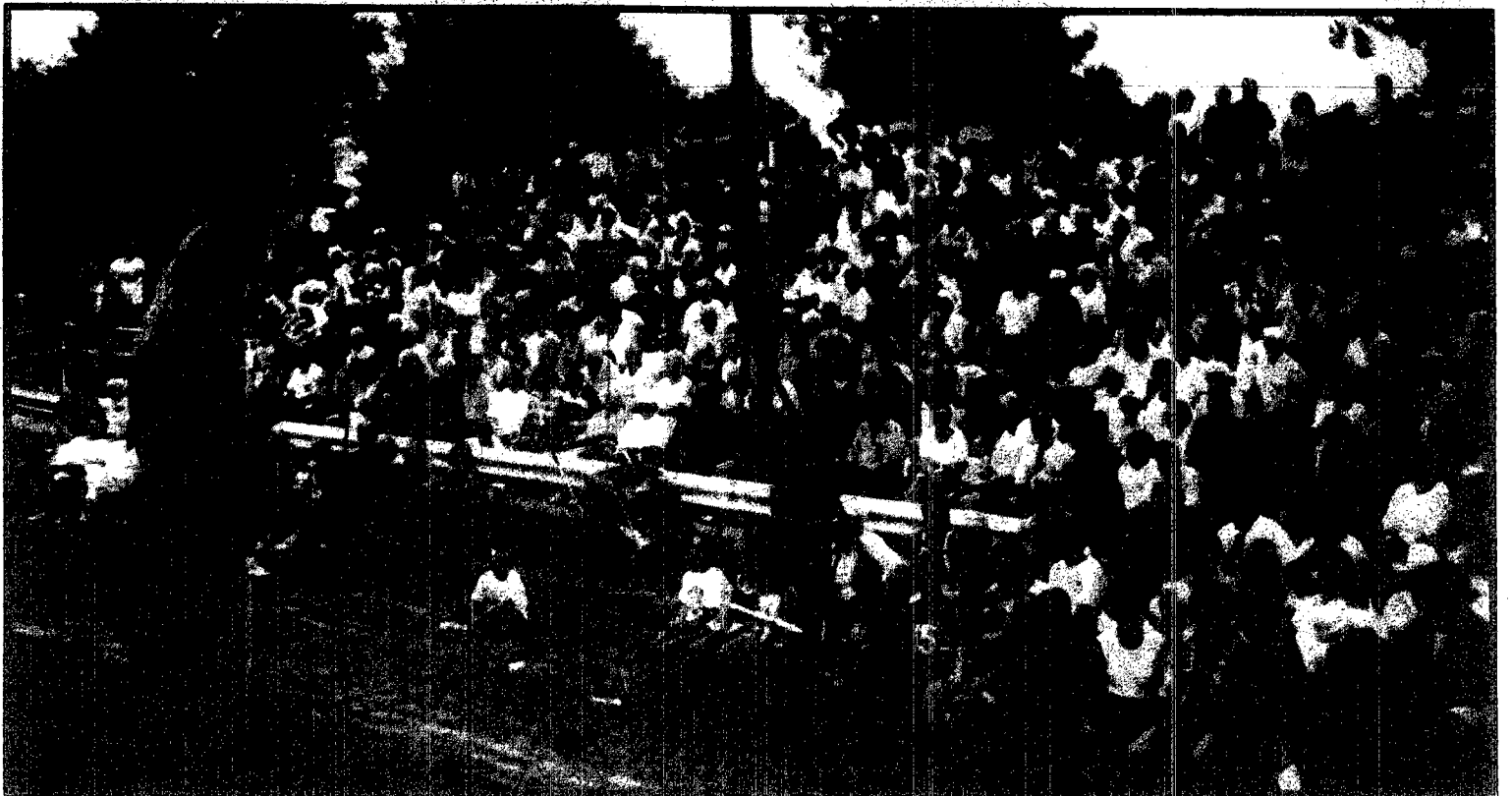

Layoffs are announced at Great Dane Trailers

Approximately 70 of the 520 employees at Great Dane Trailers in Wayne were given two weeks notice on Tuesday of an upcoming layoff.

The layoff affects anyone hired since Aug. 1, 1999.

According to Terry Hanson, Plant Manager, Great Dane hopes the furlough will be short lived, however the industry is in a down cycle now. "Most of our competitors have already implemented cutbacks and on Aug. 15 Freightliner and Navistar, tractor manufacturers, announced the layoff of 4,900 employees," Hanson said.

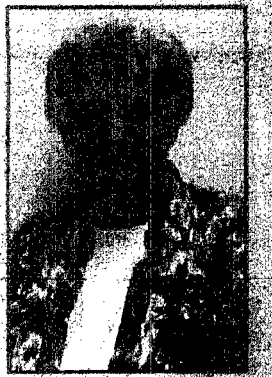
The reasons for the downturn in sales include new government regu-

lations, rising fuel costs, increased interest rates and increased insurance costs.

"Until our customers (the trucking firms) can increase their rates to cover these new operating costs, sales will probably remain at current levels," Hanson said.

Industry wide, total trailer sales for the second quarter were down 45 percent as a result of these factors.

The weekend shift at Great Dane will be discontinued on Aug. 27 and employees with seniority will be assigned other shifts. Employees on furlough will be eligible for recall as soon as sales return to their previous levels.

Purchase of home easier

The Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation, in partnership with the Federal Home Loan Bank of Topeka through its local member bank Farmers & Merchants State Bank, is pleased to announce a modification to its First-time HomeBuyer program which will allow families with higher income levels to qualify for downpayment assistance to purchase a home in Wayne.

The First-time HomeBuyer program, as it existed until now, has

offered downpayment assistance in the amount of 10 percent off the home purchase price to families whose income falls within 80 percent of the Wayne County median income as prorated by family size. For example, the income of a family of three must be under \$30,650.

While this program remains in place, it is being expanded to include a smaller five percent (5%) downpayment assistance for families

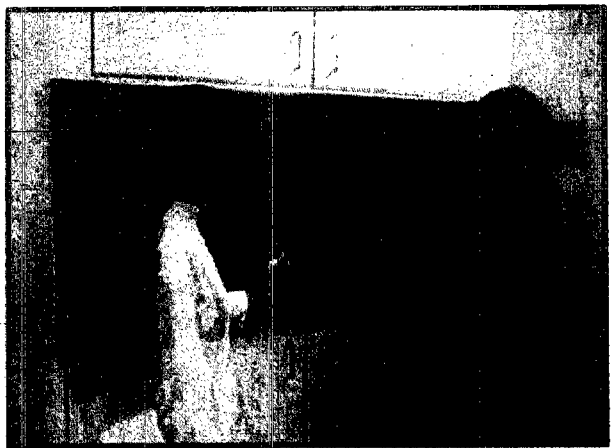
In addition, each new student at the orientation will receive a "Survival Kit" coupon book with various "free" merchandise offers provided by Wayne businesses.

Richard John Gavit, son of Hubert and Grace (Jenkins) Gavit, was born April 3, 1921 at Hammond, Ind. He graduated from Hammond High School and received his bachelor's degree in Forestry from Purdue University. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II in Korea. On Feb. 14, 1943 he married Annie Lois Marshall at Penbroke, Ky. After living in Indiana, Kentucky and Missouri, the family moved to Norfolk in 1958. They lived in Pierce from 1959 until moving to Wayne in 1965. He was employed by The United States Forestry Service and worked as a forester for The University of Nebraska at Lincoln until retiring in 1983. He served on several national forestry boards. He inspired others with his love of the outdoors which is evidenced by his legacy of tree plantings and conservation practices throughout the state.

Capitol News

Subject of taxes raises ire of many

The summer doldrums have been on leave of late for Capitol watchers.

One can usually anticipate that taxes and the Department of Corrections will be good for a scuffle in almost any context in which they raise their heads in state government.

First, the latest fuss having to do with taxes centers on the state's Tax Administrator, Catherine Lang. Ms. Lang is a professionally capable individual who is blessed, given her chosen field of endeavor, with a capacity for charm. She also has a dandy sense of humor, along with a personal reserve that keeps her from laughing out loud in situations that would impolitic, if not impolite.

By all accounts, Lang kept both her sense of humor and her temper in check during a recent meeting in Beatrice where she was privileged to hear a group of assessors complain about her office.

The gist of their criticism, although it's possible some of the critics didn't realize it, was this: Lang has been doing her job and some of the county officials wish to heck she would just stop it, doggone it.

The Legislature has passed laws requiring that counties do certain things when it comes to valuing property for tax purposes. And the Legislature has assigned Lang's office the task of checking to see whether the pertinent laws and guidelines are followed - and of taking action when the counties appear to be other than up to snuff.

Well, there you have it. It's a formula guaranteed to make Lang or anyone else about as popular as ragweed. We suspect there are those among the county officials who would prefer the "good old days," like those, perhaps, of the 70's.

Counties flagrantly undervalued locally owned agricultural property, generally ignored their duty to do otherwise and hollered for the Legislature to send 'em more state aid.

Lang is to many, no doubt, an unpleasant reminder that those days are gone.

Turning to the Department of Corrections situation, it is equally guaranteed to be problematic.

On the one hand, Gov. Mike Johanns seemed to readily acknowledge that inmate access to health care needs to be improved. On the other hand, Johanns dropped his usually sedate public manner to take a whack at the state

Ombudsman's office for its relationship with the Department of Corrections.

Johanns seemed altogether convinced that when it came to dealing with problems in government, such as those at the Corrections Department, the Ombudsman's office was more of a hindrance than a help. Johanns seemed convinced that, at the least, the Ombudsman's approach to looking at the department had been unfair, unprofessional and needlessly unkind.

It's a tough situation for a lot of reasons.

When you are dealing with an institution full of criminals, there is the reality that a few of them might be less than honest in regards to

their needs for medical care. Some of them might even lie. And some of them are going to be sources of constant irritation. Real or perceived abuses of that sort can influence the way staff people do their jobs - raising the possibility that some inmates might suffer unduly. And there is also the issue of the department trying to do what it can with the staff it has, which is probably not enough staff in too many cases.

Enter the Ombudsman's minions. The department seemed convinced that they were more accusatory and prosecutorial than investigative and objective.

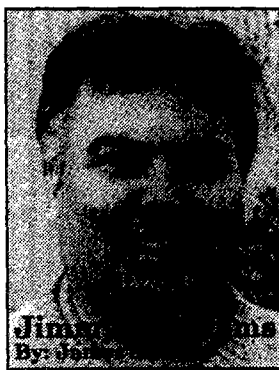
Look for this issue to pop up when the Legislature convenes in January.

I've learned that no matter how hard you try to protect your children, they eventually will end up in jail and their names in the local paper.

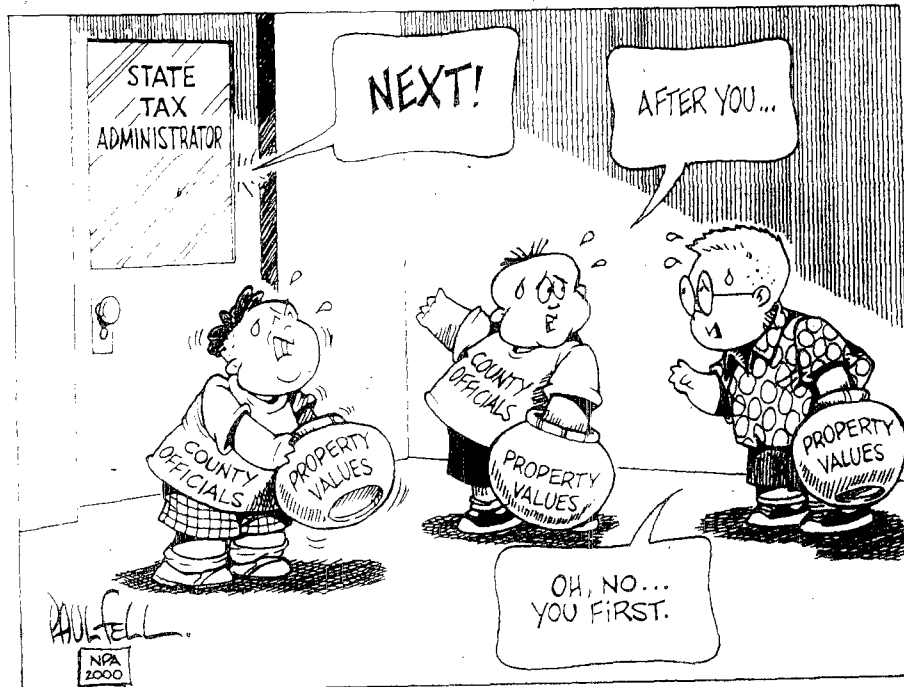
I've learned that overzealous custom agents can change your life in a matter of hours.

includes a six-year agreement to let them service the pop machines at the Wayne schools with no minimum number of cases to be sold. In return, the Wayne Schools will receive funding for four scoreboards from the company. There will be two pop machines in the high school and two in the renovated middle school.

David Lutt, Wayne Elementary School principal, discussed the school assessment plan which he, Dr. Jean Blomenkamp (Wayne Schools board member), Dr. Carolyn Linster (WSC faculty), and Wayne Schools faculty committee have been working on. The plan consists of Wayne Schools standards which makes sure that state standards are met through Wayne Schools classroom assessment to measure those standards and then report how well they're doing.

Dr. Reinert, superintendent for the Wayne School system, updated the board on renovation at the high school and at the middle school.

At the high school, work is almost done. The state fire marshal noted that the new addition was up to code with a 24 volt fire alarm system but it was recommended that the rest of the high school system be

upgraded. Another fire code problem is the metal door between the wood shop and the commons area. The fire marshal recommends a firewall in that location as the wood shop is said to be a fire hazard.

Another meeting is planned with the fire marshal to see what exactly is needed; the board will be informed of the findings at an upcoming meeting.

At the middle school, a six-inch sewer pipe was finally uncovered. Now the crew is installing indoor pipes.

On the new section, all of the block work should be done by next week and then steel work will be done with a crane.

On the existing section, shingles and chimneys were removed and the roof was re-sheeted with plywood. While preparing to install an elevator, a brick floor was found three and one half feet below the basement floor.

All of the stairways and sloping hallways have been removed bringing the building down to bare walls. The crew is ready to install the tops of the windows once they arrive.

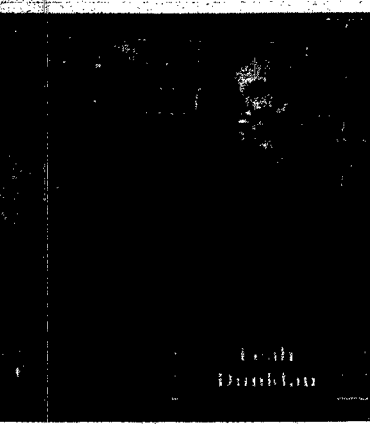
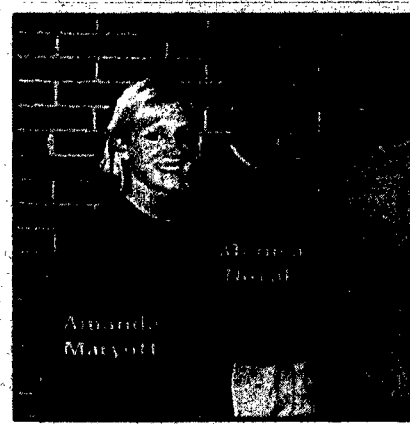
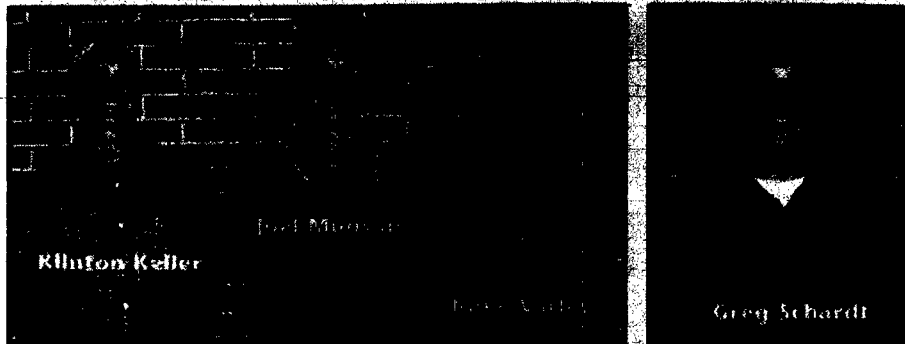
Phyllis Spethman, board president, noted that correspondence was received. The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education received an Outstanding Board Award for

moved to Columbus to minister at the First United Methodist Church in July, nearly 60 Methodist pastors were called to move to different churches across Nebraska.

Browne's husband, J.C., is pastor at Trinity Church in West Point, which is federated Methodist and United Church of Christ.

Browne was born and raised in Mitchell, SD, where she graduated from high school and then went on to Macalester College in St. Paul, Minn. There she pursued a bachelor's degree and later a master's degree at the University of Nebraska-Omaha in social work.

Working with people with chemical dependency and with the homeless, Browne realized that even with the therapy she could give them, they wanted and needed more than she could give. She saw a need for spiritual connection.

While working at the State Hospital and attending college in Clarinda, Iowa, her first husband, Stan Tyler, passed away, leaving her with decisions to make and a family to raise. Wanting the authority to bring about spiritual changes in people's lives, Browne decided to go into the seminary at the Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley, Calif.

It was there she met her present husband, J.C., who also had a family. He was a probation officer and was also making a career change.

Her family consists of three adult children and two adult step children. They are Bill and wife Norene, and Mike and wife Mary Lou who were married by she and her husband. There are two grandchildren, Jack and JoAnna Grace, who Browne notes she had the privilege of baptizing. Her daughter, Kathy, is single. All of her children and their families live in St. Paul, Minn.

Her step daughter, Christina, just graduated in June from seminary school and lives in Chicago. Her step son, George, lives in Rapid City, SD.

Throughout her social work career, Browne worked at the YWCA with displaced homemakers while she lived in Iowa, was chaplain in the chemical dependency department at the Midlands Hospital in Papillion, and was an on-call chaplain at the Veterans Administration in Omaha.

Before coming to Wayne, Browne was pastor at the Methodist churches in both Oxford and Beaver City. Prior to that, she was associate pastor at St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Papillion.

Browne says she's impressed with how many lay people are involved in

the First United Methodist Churches in Wayne and Carroll.

"I know some of the plans include more mission outreach, enhanced sound system, each committee has ideas," Browne said. "The future is open in the first year of the new century."

One important milestone upcoming for the First United Methodist Church in Wayne next year is the 100th anniversary of the laying of the cornerstone of the main section of the church. Committees are forming to celebrate this important event. The 125th year of the founding of the church is planned for 2006.

Browne notes she and her husband bought a house in Wayne as neither the church in West Point or the ones in Wayne or Carroll have parsonages.

Noting how solid the Wayne and Carroll churches are, "There are many committees, music ministry, Christian Education, youth work and others," Browne said. "The members are all are working on projects. There is a lot going on."

Browne notes she is excited to work with the people in the area and be part of the good things planned for the churches in Wayne and Carroll.

meeting slightly higher income limits.

The new income limits are \$40,320 for a one or two-person household and \$46,368 for households with three or members. Therefore, households who may exceed the 80 percent limits and do not qualify for the 10 percent down, may still qualify for five percent down if they are within the expanded limits.

WCHDC takes the form of a decreed, no-interest loan that becomes a grant after living in the home for a designated period of time. In the case of First-time HomeBuyer five percent that compliance period is only five years.

These higher income limits also apply to the Homeowner Rehabilitation Program offered by WCHDC via the Federal Home Loan Bank. Homeowner Rehabilitation is offered to families who already own their home to assist with some of those expensive maintenance, updates like roofing, foundation

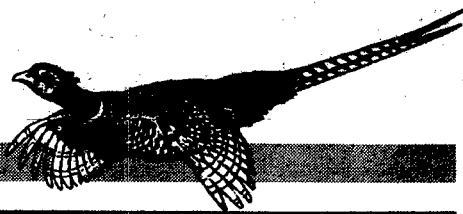
repair, electrical or plumbing systems, adding bedrooms, and much more. Homeowner Rehabilitation will pay for half of a designated rehabilitation project, to a maximum of \$5,000, through deferred, no-interest loan that is forgiven over just five years.

'Cats to play at Kearney on Aug. 31 on gridiron Hoffman takes reins

The 2000 season means several changes for the Wayne State College football team. Of course, the biggest change comes in the form of a new head coach. Scott Hoffman takes over the Wildcat helm after spending four years at Dakota State University. Hoffman inherits a program which has won only seven games in the past three seasons. But the task of turning the Wildcat program around doesn't shake Hoffman.

At Dakota State Hoffman took over a program which went 1-9 in 1999, the season prior to his arrival. Three years later DSU posted a 7-3 record in 1998.

"On paper it looks like we should be able to put a lot of talent on the football field," Hoffman said. "We

should be fairly competitive. But the question in peoples' minds is that with this kind of talent, why haven't they won very many games?"

Hoffman does have a lot of talent with which to work. The squad features 28 returning letterwinners, including 13 starters. Headlining the offense is senior running back Elroy Brown. Last season, Brown set a single-season school record with 1,360 yards rushing with a school record 18 touchdowns.

The Wildcats will abandon their noted four wide receiver formation this season in favor of a more traditional two-back set with a tight end. With two added blockers up front, Brown, an All-Northern Sun Intercollegiate conference Second Team selection a year ago, could very easily post similar numbers in 2000.

Seeing who will trigger the Wildcat offense will be very interesting. Senior Brandon Lavaley is ready to step in to the shoes vacated by career passing leader Jaime Jones. However, Lavaley is receiving strong competition from sophomore Eric Kjar. Kjar transferred to Wayne State last spring from Dakota State, where he tutored under Hoffman. According to Hoffman, Lavaley enters fall camp with a slight edge because of his veteran experience.

Wayne State still has plenty of big play wide receivers. Senior Damon

Ruffin returns after missing most of last season due to injury. Opposite him is junior Tavaris Johnson. Johnson came on late last season to record three 100-yard receiving games in the final four weeks of the campaign. Notably, missing from the receiving corps is NSIC First Team selection Chaka Smith. Smith graduated in May and decided not to use his final year of eligibility.

The offensive line figures to be a strength to the offense. Three starters return in the trenches, anchored by senior left tackle Nick Remm. Also back are junior right guard Casey Bowman and junior left guard Mark Ernst. Junior Heath Kern is another valuable component. A part-time starter in 1999, he played four of the five line positions during spring practices. He figures to see action up and down the line.

Sophomore Nate Hale will handle the placekicking duties. Last year Hale converted 39 of 41 PAT chances, including his first 23.

Defensively, the Wildcats return seven starters. In the secondary, three starters are back, led by All-NSIC Second Team strong safety Antonio Jackson. Last year, Jackson tallied 102 tackles, including 11 for a loss. Junior Ashley Toussaint returns at left cornerback, while senior Yano Jones will start at right cornerback. Jones played in two games last year, but received a medical hardship after suffering a leg injury.

The linebacking corps is also very experienced. Junior Mike Baker is back for his third season as a starter, while sophomore Joe Scheppers is also a returning starter. Nate Herbst, a junior, saw extensive action in 1998, but missed last season due to injury. Also expected to see considerable playing time are sophomore Cornelius Mitchell and redshirt freshman Jared Jansen.

The defensive line will rely on bulk in the middle and speed on the outside. Sophomore Alex Mohanna (6-4, 301) will man the noseguard position. Beside him at tackle will be redshirt freshman Chad Kumm (6-1, 250) or junior transfer John Trujillo (6-5, 290). Senior Curtis Topf moves from outside linebacker to defensive end, as does senior Chris Rizzo. Rizzo was a part time starter in 1998 but was a medical redshirt last year.

The one question mark comes at punter. gone is Second Team All-Freshman performer Brian Johnson. Freshman Alex Greif is the lone punter on the roster, according to Hoffman, several other players have punting experience.

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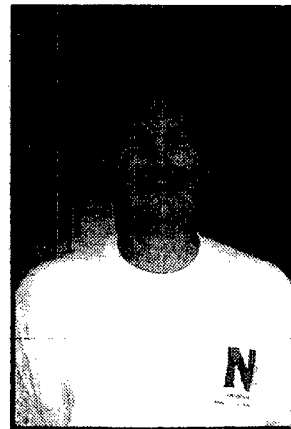

As said before, when it comes to ball striking ability, Shanks ranks at the top or if not at the top, he can see it from there.

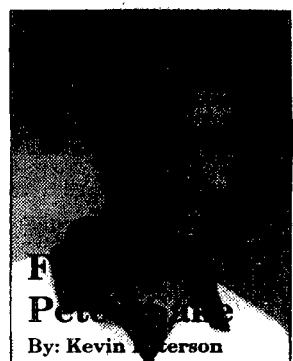

Barner shares in title

Former Wayne State football player and Wayne native Darin Barner was a member of the National

Championship Fort Worth, Texas Rugby Team.

Fort Worth won the Title game in Chicago, defeating Grand Rapids, Michigan on the very last play of the game with a five-yard scoring run

off the base of the scrum.

Fort Worth advanced to the National Championship game after defeating Seattle.

It was the first national title for Fort Worth. With a five-year record of 77-6, Fort Worth has been ranked in the Top 10 in the USA Rugby Poll the last five years but was unable to get into the championship game until this season.

Barner, playing the flanker position, tied a team record with five touchdown scoring runs of 60, 45, 22, 7 and three yards against Dallas in the Division Championship Game.

Barner was the leading penalty holder in the Texas Rugby Union with his terroristic play. He has played over-seas in 10 countries with Fort Worth during the past six years, as well as several International Matches held in Fort Worth.

Barner holds two club offices, Social Chairman and Match Secretary for the Over 35-year old team members.

Barner will be adding an 11th country in September as he plays against Moscow in Russia.

"Rugby is an up and coming

sport," Barner said. "It's sweeping the country pretty good right now. A lot of the colleges are playing it as a club sport. Nebraska won the Big 12 Title in Rugby last Spring."

Barner notes there are two different types of Rugby—social and competitive.

"There are 38 social clubs in Iowa and four in Nebraska," Barner said. "Rugby is the game that originated American football."

Barner added there are four major differences in Rugby from football: When the ball carrier is tackled, he must let go of the ball and roll away, the play is still active.

Anyone from either team can pick up the ball after a player is tackled.

There is no blocking. If you get the ball, it's you against 15 defenders.

The ball can only be passed a backwards. The perfect play is running with five players in a 45 degree angle and run the option several plays and hope for a long run.

Since no pads are allowed in Rugby, Barner feels this has led to his six broken noses, two separated shoulders, three knee surgeries and 200-plus stitches.

Fall waterfowl forecast told

According to recent reports, waterfowl hunters should see plenty of ducks winging south this fall.

The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service's annual index is out and they are predicting that 90 million ducks will be coming south this fall.

This years numbers will include 11.3 million mallards, which is down from last years record high of 13.6 million.

Even though the overall fall flight numbers has decreased from last years 105 million ducks, this fall we'll see excellent waterfowl numbers

Prior to last years record breaking number, the record was 92 million in 1997, making the 2000 flight the third highest numbers on record

Since conditions were dry in early spring, many of the early breeding ducks, mallards and pintails, probably over-flew their nesting areas

In late May and June when the rain finally fell, better habitat became available for breeding ducks which helped to produce more ducks for the fall flight

Production in the Midwest wasn't as good as it has been in the past May of the wetlands in the Dakotas have shrunk due to the dry spring.

Observers indicate that brood numbers are down over last season.

The key to good waterfowl hunting in our area is the weather. If colder weather arrives early in southern Canada and North Dakota the waterfowl will be pushed south.

If our area isn't froze up, the waterfowl will stay in the area, giving hunters an opportunity to take some of the migrating birds.

Local reports indicate that waterfowl production is down from last year. Hunters can expect to see fewer local waterfowl because of the dry spring

Local and national sportsmen's groups are working to improve not only waterfowl habitat, but also

waterfowl numbers.

The Tri-county sportsmen's Association of north-eastern Nebraska and south-eastern South Dakota have introduced 78 Canada geese into the area. They will also be building goose and duck nesting platforms that will be in place by the spring of 2001

Wetlands are nature's most productive ecosystem, unfortunately the United States has lost over half of its original wetlands and continues to lose more than 170,000 wetlands acres each year.

Through the efforts of Ducks Unlimited and other conservation organizations, through government programs like the Wetlands Reserve Program, and through the conservation work of thousands of individuals and corporate landowners, million of acres of habitat have been protected and restored across the U.S.

New Blood Test A Strong Predictor Of Heart Disease

Half of all heart attacks occur in people with normal cholesterol levels. Doctors at Harvard Medical School say that's where a new blood test might make the difference. The hs-CRP test measures levels of protein or high-sensitivity C-reactive protein. Those with the highest hs-CRP levels were 4 1/2 times more likely to end up with heart problems as those with the lowest levels. The standard CRP test isn't the one used to predict heart attack or stroke risk. Make sure you ask for the high-sensitivity CRP test, which measures levels of protein.

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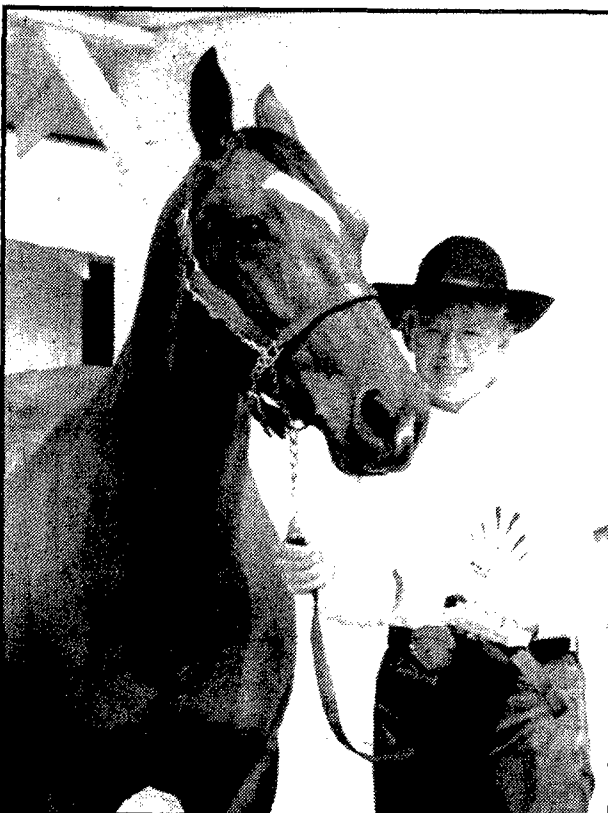

Making eating hassle-free

Simply rethinking how you shop and store groceries could help your family eat healthier.

"Expecting busy family members to stop and peel a carrot is unrealistic," says Janice Baranowski, a research dietitian with the Children's Nutrition Research Center's Behavioral Nutrition section. "Snacks need to be quick, easy-to-find and easy-to-eat."

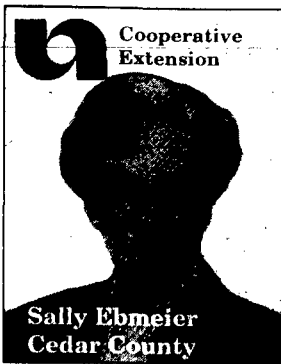
To help improve your family's diet, Baranowski offers these kitchen "makeover" tips:

Think Small: Individual portions are most attractive to the "eat-it-now" crowd. Stock up on "grab-and-go" bottles of low-fat milk and water, boxes of 100 percent fruit juice, easy-to-eat "tubes" of yogurt, low-fat string cheese, and snack bags of mini carrots and a favorite

low-fat dip. Pack pantry shelves with mini boxes of raisins. Re-portion packages of whole-wheat crackers into easy-to-grab snack bags.

Remember Easy Does It: No-fuss "salad in a bag," easy-to-thaw frozen poultry pieces, grated low-fat cheese, and canned and frozen vegetables cut meal prep time. For quick quesadillas, casseroles and soups, cook extra chicken breasts and whole grains, rice and beans. Freeze in easy-to-thaw portions.

Be obvious: Keep easy-to-eat fresh fruit on the kitchen counter and snack-size portions of frozen grapes in front of high-fat freezer snacks. Keep pre-cut fruits, ready-to-eat vegetables and a small bowl of favorite low-fat dip on a "front

whole-grain bread and ready-to-eat cereals, soft or liquid margarine, and low-fat or fat-free milk and dairy products. Add nuts, seeds or fruit to salads. Serve more fish, poultry and leaner cuts of meat and meals that give center stage to vegetables and grains.

Downsize treats: Help your family by buying smaller packages and limiting snack variety.

Advertise: Develop "in-house promotions," such as a chart that allows each family member to track the number of fruit, vegetables, whole grain servings they eat each day. Establish a non-food reward system and mark daily progress with stamps or stickers.

ORDINANCE 2000-17

AN ORDINANCE DIRECTING THE SALE OF PART OF THE NORTHEAST QUARTER OF SECTION SEVEN, TOWNSHIP TWENTY-SIX NORTH, RANGE FOUR, EAST OF THE 6TH P.M., WAYNE COUNTY, NEBRASKA.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and the Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska:

Section 1. The Mayor and City Council are directed to convey by Quitclaim Deed to Stan Johnson the property owned by the City and legally described as Part of the Northeast Quarter of Section Seven, Township Twenty-Six North, Range Four, East of the 6th p.m., Wayne County, Nebraska, more particularly described as follows: Beginning at a point on the East line of the Northeast Quarter and 315.60 feet North of the Southeast corner of said Northeast Quarter, assuming the East line to be North 0 degrees, 00 minutes, East; thence South 88 degrees, 22 minutes East, 75, thence North 0 degrees, 00 minutes East, 60; thence North 88 degrees, 22 minutes East, 75; thence South 0 degrees, 00 minutes West, along said East line 60 feet to the point of beginning; and subject to the provisions of a duly approved and executed purchase agreement for the sum of \$500.00, and other valuable consideration, subject to all easements and restrictions of record and any applicable zoning regulations.
