Council talks about snow

Snow and its removal was the main topic of discussion during the final meeting of the Wayne City Council for the year 2000.

The council passed Resolution 2000-83, which established a policy regarding Seventh Street Snow Removal on a 7-1 vote.

Members debated the areas that would be cleared of snow and the amount of snow necessary before the city would be responsible for its removal.

Councilman Will Wiseman said that the situation along Seventh Street involved the moving of snow from three lanes of traffic and he felt that the resolution should deal with thrown snow rather than fallen snow.

Public Works Superintendent Vern

Schulz said he foresees a problem with the city being responsible for snow removal.

"Owners are taking care of snow like they have in the past. There are few problems along Seventh Street and there are other areas, such as Sherman Street and Dearborn, that have problems with thrown snow, also," Schulz said.

Councilman Verdel Lutt, who voted against the resolution, said that there are so many loop holes in the resolution that it should be thrown out and the city should hold the property owners responsible for removal of the snow. Lutt also questioned whether the city had equipment to use that would not interfere with lawns.

Councilman Doug Sturm said that he felt that Seventh Street was a unique situation because the high-

way had been poorly designed and no matter what action the council took, "we won't have an ideal situation."

Vern Fairchild, who lives along Dearborn Street, said that he felt it was a good idea for the city to remove the snow for property owners on Seventh Street, "as long as they remove everyone else's snow also."

The council also listened to a presentation from Katie Garvey of South Sioux City who spoke about her experiences on a Youth Development Council. The council is considering passing a resolution establishing such a council in Wayne.

Following discussion, it was agreed that Councilman Dennis Linster will work with Wayne Public Library Director Lauren Lofgren to address computer upgrades needed

for the library.

In other action, the council approved a request from Wayne State College to observe Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday with a professional fireworks display. The event will take place on Jan. 15 on college property.

The council passed Ordinance 2000-30, creating Street Improvement District No. 2000-01 which will allow for the 10th Street Extension. The three readings were waived and the ordinance was finally passed.

Also passed was Resolution 2000-84 which will amend the city's per-

sonnel manual to allow for compensation to be paid at 1.5 times the hourly rate for employees working on city-recognized holidays.

Ordinance 2000-31 received first round approval, subject to several amendments. The ordinance deals with keeping sidewalks clean and according to Police Chief Lance Webster, allows for more specific definitions for the issuing of citations.

The council set the dates for their annual retreat. It will be held Jan. 26-27 at a place to be determined.

The next council meeting will be Tuesday, Jan. 9 at 7:30 p.m.

Bereuter gets funding for projects at WSC

The omnibus appropriations bill approved by Congress on Dec. 15 included over \$800,000 that Representative Doug Bereuter requested for projects at Wayne State College.

Bereuter said on Monday that the final appropriations package includes \$691,000 for the Laptop Computer Initiative at Wayne State College and \$138,000 for the Family Business Center at Wayne State.

The Family Business Center at Wayne State College will provide continuing educational opportuni-

ties, such as seminars and workshops, to ensure the growth and continuity of Nebraska family businesses with sales between \$1 million and \$55 million in Northeast and North Central Nebraska.

Wayne State College's Laptop Computer Initiative is intended to provide every student with a laptop computer and with easy access to the campus network in or out of class. At present, there are 470 dorm rooms connected to the campus network. Funding is needed to connect

the remaining 720 rooms. Also, some of the academic buildings need to be rewired and two additional distance learning classrooms are needed.

"Technology-based initiatives are important for the education of Nebraska's young people and this funding is well-deserved," Bereuter said. "And, Wayne State College's Family Business Center can play an important role in helping Nebraska's family owned businesses to succeed from generation to generation."

There are federal and state withholding taxes from District 57 that were carried over into the new budget year. Plans are to have them settled by the end of the year with an audit at the end of the school year.

Enjoying the essence of Christmas all year, club members of the local group, Northeast 56'ers, collect Department 56 pieces and add to their displays which many keep set up all year.

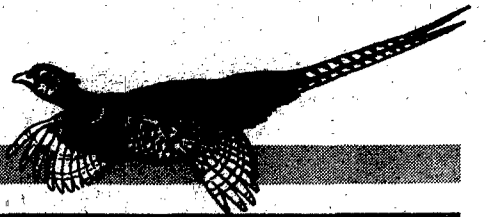

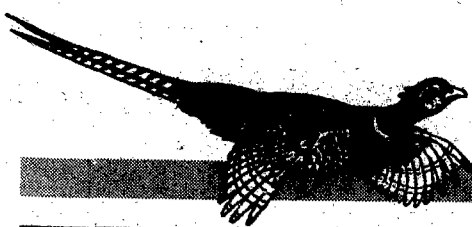

Secretary of State Scott Moore giving his goodbyes to begin work for railroad company

Secretary of State Scott Moore is saying his farewells to lots of folks this Christmas season as he prepares to leave office and go to work for a railroad company.

The railroad's gain is most assuredly Nebraska's loss.

Nebraska has term limits these days to make sure that people don't stay in office "too long." This, apparently, is because voters themselves don't otherwise know when "too long" is and, apparently, don't trust themselves to have the good sense to vote out a rascal. So be it.

The facts are that Scott Moore has embodied a great many of the all-too-rare qualities that make for a good public servant. Chief among them is his capacity for, and enjoyment of, being plain spoken. The fact that he is honest and has something of a keenly developed conscience probably would have worked against him had he gone to Washington - but, life is a series of tradeoffs.

One example of Moore's sense of fairness was reflected in his willingness, in virtually every case, to allowed condemned murderers to appear before the Pardons Board, of which he is a member, to state their case. Moore did the usual baby talk for TV cameras, so that even some of the clunks who badly edit film in the Capital City would have trouble taking him out of context. But he got directly to the point quite often.

"It is my thought that if we are going to kill someone for a crime, it won't hurt anything to let that person have what amounts to a final chance to state their case," Moore

said in one interview.

Of course, the attorney general's office screwed up the Pardons Board proceedings once, and that led to a delay in an execution. That was hardly the fault of the condemned. And besides, Nebraska eventually killed the prisoner involved. Moore certainly knew that the Pardons Board was hardly more than a formality - but since life and death were involved, he thought it was one the state could afford to

indulge.

There were, and are, countless examples of "Scottie" Moore reflecting civility on a scale that greatly exceeds the common (very minimal) standard in politics.

And, his going to work for a big railroad could be a form of public service, too. Railroads do not enjoy a corporate reputation (at least, not in my office) for sensitivity to anything other than profits.

It would be fun to be a fly on the wall the first time Moore gets a call

from some corporate higher-up.

"Hello, Scottie Moore here. What? Oh, yes sir. I did make that statement. You bet I was quoted correctly. What? Say again? Well, because it was the truth! Well, it's just something that used to work pretty well for me in government so, I thought I'd give it a try over here. It's never to late to try something new!"

Good luck, Scottie. The voters might never know it, but they are going to miss you.

Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District

Program upcoming which allows for no-till incentive

The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) is again offering producers the opportunity to enroll land into the LENRD No-till Incentive Program.

The program, which began two years ago, is becoming very popular with area producers. The yield results from this year's crop, due to the dry weather conditions, is boosting the success of the program.

According to UN-L Extension Engineer Paul Jasa, "The no-till system over the last 20 years has been the most profitable. In dry years like this year, it really shines when you compare yield results."

The LENRD no-till program is a five-year contract. Any local operator (no custom planting) may enroll a field or portion of a field up to 160 acres in size that is highly erodible land (HEL) or that portion that is HEL. The program will pay the producer \$10 per acre per year for five years.

The crop rotation will consist of a corn-soybean rotation. The first year of the program must be soybeans planted into corn stubble on at least 50 percent of the acres. No ground disturbing or crop residue disturbing operations between harvest and spring planting are allowed. No pre-plant N₂ or manure injection and no row crop cultivation are allowed. A maximum of 25 percent of the row width can be disturbed in the planting operation.

The producer would also be required to attend two educational sessions, which will be developed by

the LENRD, Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and UN-L Cooperative Extension. The producer will participate in the Farming for MAXimum Efficiency (MAX) program, an economic analysis tool provided by the Conservation Technology Information Center (CTIC).

In addition to participating in educational workshops, the no-till incentive program participants are given a list of all the other participating farmers, their equipment types and telephones. This provides an opportunity to network with other no-tillers to share information and solve problems.

NRCS resource conservationist Dennis Smith said, "Due to the continued low price of commodity crops and higher prices that producers are paying for fuel, machinery and other operating expenses, it is getting harder to keep a farming operation in the black." He continued, "No-till farming salvages moisture in drought years, increases crop yields, saves time soil. It's a winning situation for local producers."

Producers wanting to enroll should contact their local NRCS field office. Applications are now being accepted until Jan. 15, 2001.

Because of the limited funding and the increased demand on the program the LENRD has developed a ranking system to rate the applications. Producers will want to discuss with local field office staff how to best maximize their points for enrollment. Contact the local NRCS office to sign up.

Be cautious when trying to rent

Dear Editor,

In the last 20 years or so that I have been renting my living space, I've encountered many "landlords," or better still, owners of rental property...

I've not had much problem with the larger property owners that are subject to State and Federal regulations-the problem is with private owners who are out to make a quick buck by buying up the houses of elderly people who die or are forced to move to nursing homes.

They tend to use leasing regulations only when it is to their financial benefit and it involves security deposits. The scenario will usually go this way--the landlord-owner will be extremely nice until he obtains your name on the lease and your check is in her bank account.

Any problems with house maintenance will either be ignored or you will be charged with causing the problem. When it is time to move, you will be charged for all repairs by the owner refusing to return your security deposit.

In most states there are states that require owners deposit money in separate interest-bearing bank account instead of mingling it with personal funds. Many states now require landlords to pay semi-annual interest to the tenant on the security deposit amount. If owners fail to comply with a security deposit provision of their state statutes, residents can sue to recover the money due them, and can be awarded punitive damages and reasonable attorney's fees.

For those who are about to rent property from a private party, I have the following recommendations:

1. Before you sign on the dotted line, ask the owner to provide you with references of at least three people that he/she has returned full security deposit-then check on them.

2. If you investigate a property and find leaky faucet's, signs of vermin or bugs, odd smells- even if she promises to repair or even lower the rent- run as fast as you can the other way!

3. If a property has been for rent for more than 30 days- run the other way. Desirable properties are usually rented before they are vacated and do not require outdoor signs.

I'm not saying that renters don't have equal responsibility but in college towns, packing plant towns and all high rent areas there is so much opportunity for fraud and exploitation by private landlords

Many people owe their lives and gratitude to unknown persons...we do. Before this time, I knew it was a good thing to give blood; however, I put it off. I'll do it someday...then I'll feel good about it. We can no longer wait for someday...lives cannot wait for blood.

The response from people in Norfolk and Wayne was overwhelming for us. We thank everyone who gave blood in Andy's name. We'll never know how many other lives were saved by your blood.

We are asking you to give blood now again and then again if you can for the rest of your life. There just isn't any other way we can so directly physically give life to another person, not just once, but many times.

Again, we want to thank you from the bottom of our hearts and ask you to please consider saving other "Andy's."

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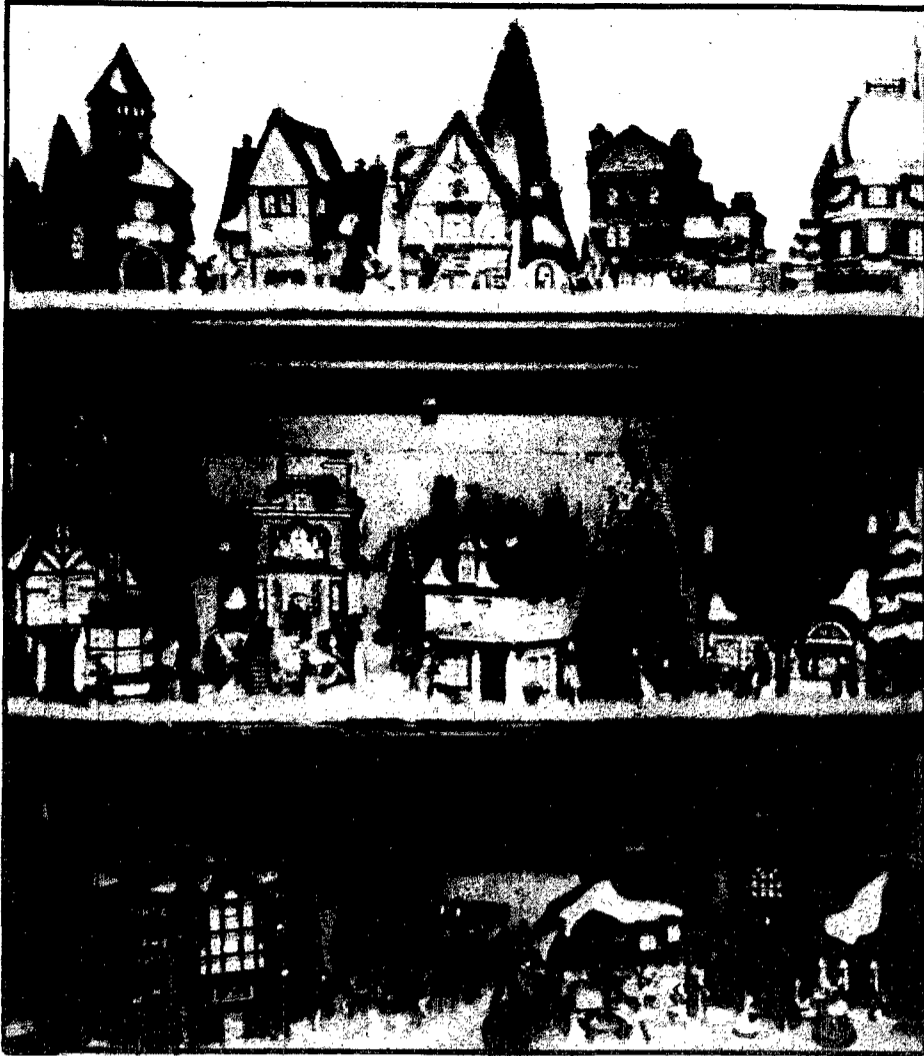
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Shown is a close up of some of the Kilburns' Department 56 Dickens Village Series® collection. Department 56 is one of the fastest growing collectibles in America.

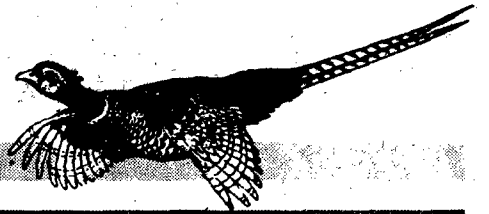

Manley dished out five assists and

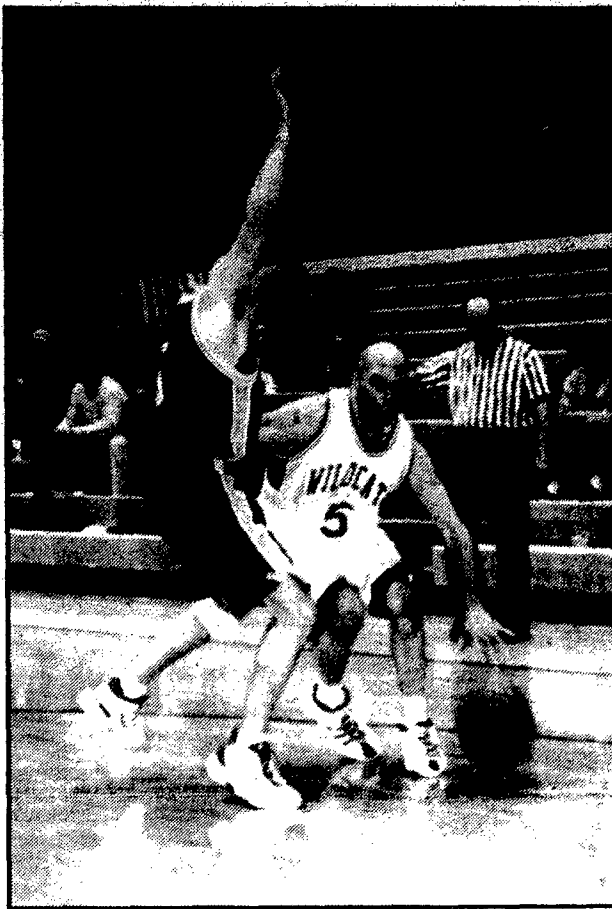
notched three steals with Herlitzke and Joens also netting three steals each.

WSC's contests with Grand View and UNO slated for Saturday and Monday, respectively were postponed due to bad weather. No make-up date had been scheduled at press time.

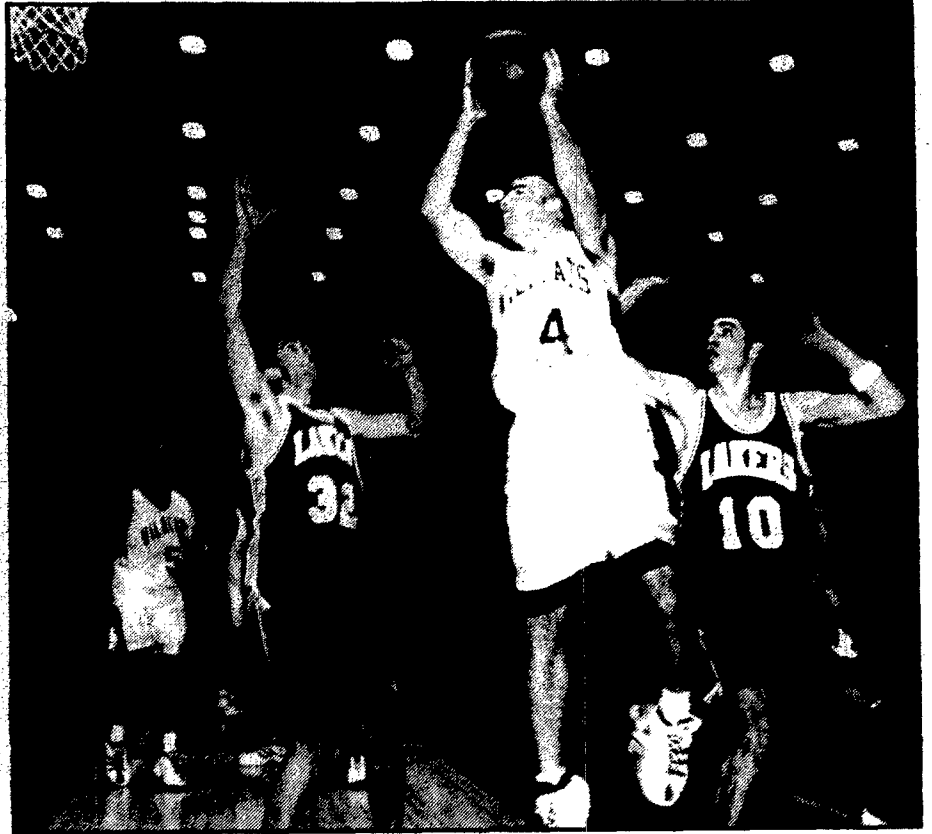

KNOW FRAUD MAILING WILL GIVE TIPS TO RECOGNIZE FRAUD

Telemarketing fraud and sweepstakes fraud are two greedy thieves that continue to prey upon our Nebraska citizens. Operation KNOW FRAUD will provide a new tool to help our citizens recognize and fight fraud.

This new fraud fighting tool, in the form of an oversized colored card, will soon appear in every mail box in Nebraska. The card is designed to be posted near the telephone, and contains information to help citizens make informed decisions regarding mail and telemarketing solicitations, and avoid being victimized by deceptive offers.

The scam artist on the telephone line wants your personal numbers such as your Social Security number, bank account, debit card or credit card number. If you give these numbers to an un reputable caller, he may use this information to withdraw funds from your bank or to place charges on your credit card. He may also entice you to send a sum of money in order to receive a "fabulous" prize.

The KNOW FRAUD card suggests you be ready with a rehearsed response when you are asked for personal information or asked to send money to receive a prize. A simple, "No thank you." will do. Then hang up the phone.

The KNOW FRAUD card suggests some actions that may be taken to report possible scams. In addition to these, a call to the Nebraska Attorney General's Consumer Protection Line will enable you to report your concern to a Consumer representative.

Education and public awareness are the two best defenses against the twin thieves of telemarketing fraud and sweepstakes fraud. This KNOW FRAUD "fraud fighter card" is designed to offer the citizen avenues of defense against these greedy thieves.

The U.S. Postal Inspection Service, Better Business Bureau, AARP and others have joined together in presenting a united front against telemarketing fraud and sweepstakes fraud with the KNOW FRAUD Promotion. Together, we will multiply our impact many times over.

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Older Antidepressants Often as Effective as Newer, Costlier Ones

According to new guidelines from the American College of Physicians - American Society of Internal Medicine, both newer and traditional antidepressant medicines are equally effective for many persons with depression. Older medicines typically are in the class termed tricyclics (e.g., Tofranil, Elavil). The newer agents include selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors, or SSRIs (e.g., Paxil, Zoloft, Prozac).

The major difference cited between tricyclics and SSRIs are side effects. SSRIs are more likely to cause diarrhea, nausea, headache, and sleeping difficulties. Tricyclics are more likely to cause blurred vision, constipation, dizziness, dry mouth, and tremors. Interestingly, according to the new guidelines it is noted that St. John's wort may be effective against mild depression, at least on a short-term basis.

Farm Bureau holds annual convention

Dale Jackson and Verlan Hingst of Allen were County Farm Bureau's voting delegate to the 2000 Nebraska Farm Bureau Convention held recently in Kearney.

Other county Farm Bureau members attending were Courtland Roberts and Lori Jackson.

The Farm Bureau House of Delegates confirmed its support for Freedom to Farm, the 1996 Farm Bill. Delegates opposed any mandatory set-asides, but said they would be willing to consider voluntary set-asides for acreage reduction.

In addressing the problem of high property taxes on agricultural land in Nebraska, the delegates recommended that the state change the current 80 percent of market value used in valuing ag land to a lower percentage. They also supported a new checkoff on all grains to support ethanol production in the state.

Convention speakers included Nebraska Director of Agriculture Merlyn Carlson, recently returned from a trade mission to Southeast Asia with Nebraska Gov. Mike Johanns. Korea, Malaysia, Singapore and Taiwan are rebounding from their recent economic problems and are prime markets for Nebraska ag products, he said.

Malaysia and Singapore are cur-

rently negotiating international trade agreements with other countries and the U.S. should be involved, Carlson said; the liberalizing and privatizing of the Korean economy offers another opportunity. Those countries are especially interested in identity-preserved, traced-back and source-verified foods. In addition, Taiwan is looking at ethanol to address its air quality problems, he said.

Don Parrish, senior environmental policy specialist for the American Farm Bureau, discussed the emerging issue of Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs) and nonpoint source pollution. Proposed federal TMDLs give the Environmental Protection Agency a heavy hand in determining land use in states, he warned. At the same time, Animal Feeding Operation and Concentrated Animal Feeding regulations have the potential to greatly increase federal permitting activity in the states.

The combined regulations could force "little guys" out of business while other environmental regulations are preventing larger animal feeding operations from being established. That situation begs the question, "Where are farmers going

to sell their crops?" If livestock production is forced out of the U.S., those producers will not be buying U.S. crops, he emphasized.

In his 19th annual address, the Nebraska Farm Bureau President Bryce Neidig also expressed concern that animal feeding is being forced out of the state and nation by environmental regulations and public opposition.

Consolidation in the meat processing industry and the recent proposed purchase of IBP by Smithfield Foods exacerbate the issue, he said, and make it more difficult for small- and medium-sized livestock operations to stay in business. Livestock production is crucial to the state's economy and Nebraska must not legislate and regulate itself out of the livestock business, he said.

The U.S. has made progress in international trade, Neidig said, with the passage of Permanent Normal Trade Relations status for China, but the U.S. desperately needs to give the next president fast track trade negotiating authority so that individual can negotiate on a par with leaders of competing nations.

Section 2. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed.
 Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect after the passage, approval, and publication as provided by law.

 (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to refuse to comply with a lawful order to disperse given by a police officer in the performance of the officer's duties and, upon conviction, shall be charged \$25.00 for a first offense and not more than \$100 for each subsequent offense.
 6-441 **MISDEMEANOR: DISORDERLY HOUSE/MAINTAINING.** The term "disorderly house" as used in this section shall be deemed to be any room, house, building, structure or premises where unlawful or illegal acts are being committed. It shall be unlawful for the owner, lessee, or proprietor of any room house building structure or premises to knowingly collect or permit to be collected therein persons who are engaging in any unlawful act, or to knowingly make cause, permit or suffer to be made therein any loud or improper noise to the annoyance or disturbance of any person or neighborhood.

ORDINANCE NO. 2000-26
 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 4, ARTICLE 5, SECTIONS 4-501 AND 4-502 OF THE WAYNE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE CITY OF WAYNE, NEBRASKA, AND TO REPEAL THE ORIGINAL SECTIONS

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and the Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska:
 Section 1. That Chapter 4, Article 5, Sections 4-501 and 4-502 of the Municipal Code of Wayne, Nebraska, shall be amended to read as follows:
 4-501 **NUISANCE: DUTY OF OWNER OR OCCUPANT**
 (a) The owner or occupant of any lot or piece of ground within the municipality shall:
 (1) Drain or fill such lot or piece of ground so as to prevent stagnant water or any other nuisance from accumulating thereon.
 (2) Keep the lot or piece of ground and the adjoining streets and alleys to the center thereof free of any growth of 12 inches or more in height of weeds, grasses or worthless vegetation.
 (3) Prevent the throwing, depositing or accumulation of litter on any lot or piece of ground within the municipality, provided that grass, leaves and worthless vegetation may be used as a ground mulch or in a compost pile.
 (4) Refrain from maintaining a Disorderly House as defined by this code.
 (b) Any owner or occupant who fails to abate a nuisance shall upon conviction be guilty of a misdemeanor and be fined no less than \$100 and no more than \$500. Each day a violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.
 4-502 **NUISANCE: DEFINED**
 The following words, terms and phrases when used in this code shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning.
 Litter means and includes the following:
 (1) Trash, rubbish, refuse, garbage, paper, rags and ashes.
 (2) Wood, plaster, cement block or stone building rubble.
 (3) Grass leaves, and worthless vegetation.
 (4) Offal and dead animals.
 (5) Any machine or vehicle, or parts of a machine or vehicle which have lost their identity, character, utility or serviceability as such through deterioration, dismantling, or the ravages of time, or are inoperative or unable to perform their intended functions or are cast-off, discarded or thrown away or left as waste, wreckage or junk.

Section 2. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed.
 Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect after the passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 6, ARTICLE 4, SECTION 6-431, AND TO ADD SECTIONS 6-431.01 THROUGH 6-431.04 OF THE WAYNE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE CITY OF WAYNE, NEBRASKA; AND TO REPEAL THE ORIGINAL SECTIONS

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and the Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska:
 Section 1. That Chapter 6, Article 4, Sections 6-431 of the Municipal Code of Wayne, Nebraska, shall be amended to read as follows:
 6-431 **ABANDONED, UNLICENSED OR INOPERABLE MOTOR VEHICLES, DEFINED.**
 Abandoned vehicle means any motor vehicle left unattended.
 (1) With no number plates affixed thereto, if so required by law, for more than eight (8) hours on any public property.
 (2) For more than 72 hours, after the parking of such vehicle shall become illegal, if left on a portion of a public property on which parking is legally permitted.
 (3) For more than seven days on private property if left initially without permission of the owner, or after the permission of the owner has been terminated.
 Inoperable motor vehicle means any motor vehicle on which the engine, wheels or tires or other parts have been removed, altered, damaged or otherwise so treated or allowed to deteriorate that the motor vehicle is incapable of being driven under its own motor power. Such presumption may be rebutted only by showing that the motor vehicle is capable of being driven under its own power.
 Unlicensed motor vehicle means any motor vehicle required to be licensed that does not have lawfully affixed thereto an unexpired license plate. Private property means any which is not included in public property as defined in this section.
 Public property means any public right of way, street or highway, alley, park or other state, county, or municipality owned property.

Section 2. That Chapter 6, Article 4, Section 6-431.01 of the Municipal Code of Wayne, Nebraska, shall be added to read as follows:
 6-431.01 **MISDEMEANOR: ABANDONED, UNLICENSED OR INOPERABLE MOTOR VEHICLES PROHIBITED.**
 (a) No person shall park, store, leave or permit the parking, storing or leaving of any abandoned, unlicensed or inoperable motor vehicle upon any private property within the city for a period of time in excess of twenty (20) days or on public property for longer than 48 hours. This section shall not apply to any motor vehicle upon private property which is enclosed within a building or whose owner possesses a valid Hobbyist Permit. This section shall not apply to any motor vehicle held in connection with a business enterprise lawfully licensed by the city and property operated in the appropriate business zone pursuant to law.
 (b) No person shall leave any abandoned vehicle on any street or highway within the city or on public property within the corporate limits provided, abandoned, unlicensed or inoperable motor vehicles may be left at a place operated by the city for impounded vehicles in accordance with the rules and regulations governing such properties.

Section 3. That Chapter 6, Article 4, Section 6-431.02 of the Municipal Code of Wayne, Nebraska, shall be added to read as follows:
 6-431.02 **ABANDONED, UNLICENSED OR INOPERABLE MOTOR VEHICLES, IMPOUNDING**
 The city, by its agents, is hereby authorized to remove or have removed any vehicle left within the city corporate limits which reasonably appears to be in violation of section 6-431 or is lost, stolen or unclaimed. Such vehicle shall be impounded until lawfully claimed or disposed of in accordance with the laws of the state. Provided, however, that any vehicle left at any place other than on public property shall not be removed and impounded as provided for in this section until notice shall have been given that the city shall remove the vehicles from the property after five days from the date of notice. Such notice shall be given by any of the following methods:
 (1) Affixing written notice on such vehicles.
 (2) Sending notice by mail to the owner of such vehicle at his last known address if the owner is reasonably ascertainable.
 (3) By sending notice by mail to third person owning or occupying the property on which such vehicle is located, or
 (4) By notifying the owner of the vehicle or owner or occupant of the property in person.
 Any city police officer or city public safety employee may enter upon private property for purposes of carrying out their duties hereunder or to interfere with them in the lawful performance of their duties under the provisions of this section.
 Section 5. That Chapter 6, Article 4, Section 6-431.04 of the Municipal Code of Wayne, Nebraska, shall be added to read as follows:
 6-431.04 **PENALTY.**
 Any person violating the provisions of 6-431 shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in a sum of not less than \$25 and not to exceed \$100.

- *have a job or live in a household which has at least one member working part-time;
- *have no health insurance that covers eye exams;
- *meet certain income criteria based on household size, and;
- *not have had an eye exam at a doctor's office within the last two years.

People can obtain application forms from VISION USA, 243 N. Lindbergh Blvd., St. Louis, MO 63141. Completed forms must be postmarked by Jan. 22, 2001, according to optometrist Jeff Pape of Norfolk, the VISION USA coordinator for Nebraska.

The application form, along with other information about VISION USA, is also available on the American Optometric Association's Web site (<http://www.aoanet.org>) in the "Meet the AOA" section. Internet access is often available at public libraries.

Applicants can also be screened for eligibility by phone, but only through the month of January, 2001. The number to call then is 1-

800-766-4466. Phone lines will be open weekdays from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. Interested persons are encouraged to apply early in writing because of the heavy demand for the phone lines in January.

"Good vision is important, not only for adults to obtain and maintain a job, but also for children to learn and progress in school. Unfortunately, there are thousands of children unable to get the eye care they need, even though a parent works, because they are not eligible for government support," said Dr. Pape. "Some also have eye health conditions that could cause vision loss if left untreated."

Dr. Pape said that over a quarter of a million low-income children and adults have received free eye care in the first nine years of the VISION USA program. Among the 19,000 examined last year, nine out of every 100 had eye health conditions and nearly three out of four needed a new eyeglass prescription.

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Prepare for cold weather this winter

When the wind chill drops below zero, people should take precautions against hypothermia and frostbite, according to the state's Chief Medical Officer, Dr. Richard Raymond.

"It's important to know the wind chill before going out because most

hypothermia and frostbite cases occur when the temperature drops and the wind increases," Dr. Raymond said.

The wind chill index indicates the severity of the weather in terms of the potential loss of body heat.

Hypothermia develops when an individual is exposed to severe cold without sufficient protection. The condition, which is potentially fatal, occurs when the body's core temperature drops below 95 degrees Fahrenheit. Infants and the elderly are at the greatest risk.

The elderly account for nearly half of all victims of hypothermia. With advancing age, people become less able to adjust to temperature changes.

Observable symptoms in someone developing hypothermia include: poor coordination, slurred speech, irrationality, blueness or puffiness of the skin, dilation of the pupils, decreased respiratory rate, and a weak or irregular pulse.

Factors that increase an individual's susceptibility to hypothermia are: poor physical condition, thin build, inadequate nutrition, insufficient protection from the cold, fatigue, illness and alcohol intoxication.

While alcoholic beverages may make the drinker feel warm, it actually interferes with the body's ability to regulate temperature. Someone showing signs of mental confusion could be mistaken for being intoxicated when he or she is actually exhibiting symptoms of hypothermia.

Dressing warmly, eating enough food, drinking plenty of fluids and staying as active as possible are good ways to maintain body heat and avoid hypothermia.

Frostbite is another hazard experienced in extremely cold weather. The onset of frostbite is usually characterized by a sharp pricking sensation and numbness but body tissue may freeze without awareness of

numbness or pain. Just before freezing, the skin turns a bright red. Frostbite most commonly affects the feet. If frostbite occurs, running warm water over the affected area is the recommended treatment (if re-exposure is not expected).

Proper clothing is essential to protection from frostbite. Multiple layers of clothing are better than just one, because they provide better insulation and can be removed or added as needed. The key is to make certain there are no areas of skin exposed to the frigid air.

Children who want to go out and play in the snow should periodically come indoors to warm up and dry off, according to the Nebraska SAFE KIDS coalition. Dress them with layers of clothing and be sure to cover ears, fingers and toes. Parents should avoid taking infants outdoors when the temperature is below freezing because infants lose body heat quickly.

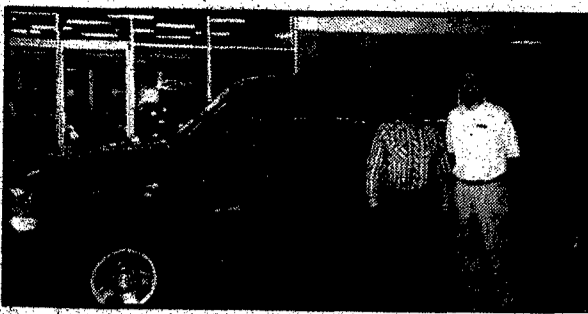

Social Security Administration provides "annual check-up"

Once each year, the Social Security Administration provides a Social Security Statement to individuals covered by Social Security. The statement is a personal record of the earnings on which you have paid Social Security taxes during your working years and a summary of the estimated benefits you and your family may receive as a result of those earnings.

The statement is provided in two ways: in automatic annual mailings to workers and former workers aged 25 and older and at any time to workers aged 25 and older and at anytime to workers of any age who request them.

The Social Security Statement should be stored with your other important papers and can be used in several ways:

*First, the benefit estimates in your statement can play an important role in your financial planning. When combined with your savings, investments and other pensions, your Social Security benefits can help you build a secure future for yourself and your family.

*Second, the statement can help you make sure that your reported earnings and other important information such as your name and date of birth are correct on your record. Mistakes could keep you from getting all the Social Security benefits you have earned. The sooner you identify mistakes, the easier it will be to correct them.

*And finally, the general information on the statement tells you about all the protection you are earning under Social Security. Many people think of Social Security only

as a retirement program. The statement shows how even young workers are building valuable protection in case they become disabled or die before they reach retirement age.

You can expect to receive the annual Social Security Statement about three months before your month of birth. If you don't receive your automatic statement by one month before your month of birth or if you need a statement sooner than you are scheduled to receive it, you can request a statement at any time. You can send your request via the Internet, download a paper version of the request form to mail in, or call a toll-free telephone number (800-772-1213) and ask to have a paper request form mailed to you. The forms are also available at local Social Security offices. Whether you make your request via the Internet or by mail, you will receive your statement by mail. It takes around two to four weeks if you request the statement electronically and about four to six weeks if you send your request by mail. The Social Security Administration's web site is at www.ssa.gov.
