Approval given for skate park location

Of the Herald

Following nearly one-half hour of discussion, the Wayne City Council voted 8-0 to locate the city's skate park at its current location near the Wayne Swimming Pool.

George Holm, representing those who use the park, told council members he had surveyed those using the park and the majority of those indicated they preferred the pool location. One person was in favor of locating the park near the Community Activity Center and one favored the Wayne City Auditorium for an indoor facility.

John Thor of Wisner, representing Arlline Ulrich, spoke to the council concerning a notice received by Ulrich to abate a nuisance on his property. Ther asked for a definition of exactly what needs to be abated and to clarify what needs to be

Following the presentation, the council voted 8-0 to re-issue a notice to Ulrich.

Ordinance 2001-3 was approved following a public hearing. The ordinance changed the zoning of a tract of land just west of Wayne from A-1 and B-1 to A-2. The change will allow Brian Bowers, who owns the 80 acre parcel of land the option of developing residential housing on five-acre parcels.

The council also accepted the bid recommendation for the Electric Distribution Improvement Project. Curt Dieren of DeWild Grant Reckert of Rock Rapids, Iowa, spoke to the council and recommended a bid of


Holdrege for the distribution portion of the project. The bid from Harold Schulz Co. of Raiston for \$53,742 for the sub-station portion of the project was accepted. The work is scheduled to be completed by Dec. 31 of this year.

The council also discussed project funding and project budgets in light of several projects that are projected to cost more than original esti-

Councilman Dennis Linster said that he felt the council needed to "make a legitimate assessment of what is being done. I don't like going over budget on these pro-

Mayor Sheryl Lindau read three proclamations at Tuesday's meeting. The first dealt with the Week of the Young Child, April 1-7; the second with National Library Week, April 1-7 and the third with Support Citizens with Mental Retardation Week and the Knights of Columbus Tootsie Roll Drive, April 5-7.

A public hearing date of April 10, at or about 7:35 p.m. was set to discuss a Community Development Block Grant Application for the Community Activity Center. On the same issue, Mayor Lindau noted that the students at Wayne State College are planning to host the World's Largest Hug on Tuesday, April 17 at Rice Auditorium to raise funds for the Activity Center. She also praised the college students for coming up with the idea and for returning a recent survey which will allow for the application of the

Master Tree Steward classes to be offered

Cooperative Extension will again host the Master Tree Steward Class program in 2001.

This is the 11th year for these classes in northeast Nebraska and will be the last year since a new pro-gram titled "Tree Care Advisor" will be initiated in the state, starting in

2002. The class will meet on Monday nights, April 2, 9 and 16 at the Lifelong Learning Center on the Northeast Community College campus, located at 601 East Benjamin Avenue in Norfolk.

Time of the classes will be from 6 to 8:30 p.m. each night. Two topics

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Cortisone-like steroids have been used for decades to treat lung diseases, including asthma. They have been taken my mouth and, more recently, by inhalation. A Canadian study recently published in The New England Journal of Medicine concludes that asthma sufferers who regularly use steroid inhalers also lower their risk of death due to asthma. Persons with asthma who dies were compared to those who lived. It was found that the survivors averaged using about one-third more inhaled steroids than those who died. Over 17 million persons in the US have asthma, resulting in over five thousand deaths each year.







Capitol News Grand Island deserves 'The Third City' title

The census figures show that Grand Island is no longer The Third City in terms of Nebraska popula-

Well, now is the time for the Legislature to step up to the plate and take decisive action.

Grand Island should be The Third City. It deserves to be thought of by Nebraskans as The Third City. There are lots of reasons for this. Examples:

-Grand Island is not in the Omaha metropolitan area that now extends darn near to Lincoln.

-Calling any town "The Fourth City" would be so dumb that even career politicians could see it is a bad idea. Probably.

Tourists. Imagine some guy in New Jersey, or worse, looking at a map and reading some stupid, touristy brochure based on new census figures. He hollers to his wife: "Well, we don't need to stop in Nebraska this summer. It seems like they only got three cities, and they're all together, pretty much!" If Grand Island advertises itself as The Third City, it still has a chance to pull a few people west. I mean, we don't want them to miss that beautiful archway. Do we?

Grand Island is in agricultural country. It's a third city that represents and is closest to Nebraska's first heritage - agriculture. If Lincoln is government and NU, and Omaha is business, then Grand Island is agriculture

So, here is the solution. The Legislature should approve a resolu-tion proclaiming that Grand Island shall forever be recognized as The Third City of Nebraska. If Lodgepole, Lewellen and Cody overtake her in population, GI will still be TTC.

This proposal would meet most of the criteria for what former Sen. Loran Schmit of Bellwood used to call "the perfect legislation." It does

n't hurt anybody and it doesn't cost anything. Thus, it's simple enough for the Legislature to deal with before the next census comes out, ten years down the road. Probably.

What it would do is reflect a good-faith recognition of that part of Nebraska which is outside the Lincoln-Omaha loop - whether you call it Greater Nebraska, Outstate Nebraska, Upstream Nebraska (my favorite) or The Sticks.

Now, for those who would say that it doesn't make sense for Grand Island to be called The Third City,

we offer this argument: So, what?
In the first place, "sense" is not what it used to be, it probably never

way. Besides, "sense" is only important if words and phrases have meanings that are important and consistent. Such is hardly the case these days


Example: The City of Omaha is giving, "giving" mind you, the good people at Gallup a bundle of land on that Riverfront - the one Omaha has been barking about developing since Harold W. Andersen was in journalism school

In today's world, this action by the city is not called bribery or even socialism. It is called economic development, and it is called an

incentive, and it is what the Legislature has approved of as a general way of seeing to it that the laws of nature are observed - that is, that the rich get richer (and pay less taxes, too!).

Thus, if the state and various local governments can give away every-thing from property to the tax base and call it good business ... well, by golly, we can give Grand Island the title of The Third City - and call it good

Senator Engel gives update on legislative issues

Greetings from the Legislaturel We are in our thirteenth week of the legislative session, and we are debating bills on the floor before the full legislature all day. Currently, we are primarily working on senator

My priority bill, LB 585, was advanced from Select File last week. LB 585 adds a monthly surcharge of fifty cents to wireless phone service to provide enhanced 9-1-1 service for wireless phone users. This is an important public safety issue, and wireless enhanced 9-1-1 will help save lives. Sen. Chris Beutler of Lincoln introduced several amendments to the bill, and after consultation with him, he and I were able to agree on a few changes to the bill that make it a better law

In crafting this bill, I received input from several different perspec tives, including representatives of counties, cities, wireless providers and constituents. I think this bill is a workable solution for all involved. Many people own a cell phone for safety reasons, and this bill will help improve response to 9-1-1 calls from cell phones by eventually providing the phone number and $\rho_{\rm B}$ pointing the location of an incoming call within a city block, which is especially important in rural areas.

Last week we began discussing a measure that would allow cities and counties to merge to provide services, creating a "municipal county." Sen. DiAnna Schimek introduced LB 142 as the result of a constitutional amendment approved by voters in the 1998 general election. The constitutional amendment authorizes legislation relating to the merger of local governments.

Mergers are permitted, but not

required, and are subject to approval by affected voters. The bill and its amendments establish a three-step process for the creation of a municipal county. First, interested local governments must adopt a joint resolution to consider consolidation. Next, a consolida tion plan must be developed, and finally, the plan must be approved by voters in the affected counties

Sen. Nancy Thompson of Papillion introduced an amendment to the bill that will allow counties and cities that do not choose to merge to consolidate governmental services through the merger process. This will save money, for the cities and counties, while still allowing them to maintain their separate governments. I think this is a good idea; especially for our

area, and I plan to support the amendment when it is heard before The amendment would make LB 142 a better bill if it

This Moriday we debated Sen. Chris Beutler's bill that would allow two cents of the state cigarette tax to be used for urban redevelopment projects in Omaha and Lincoln. The Omaha project would develop the riverfront area, and the Lincoln pro ject will improve traffic flow and control flooding in the Antelope Valley area. The inner core of our metropolitan areas has deteriorated, while the suburban areas have flour ished. I am comfortable spending state money on these two urban redevelopment projects, because i think that economic development in Lincoln and Omaha benefits our

However, I do not think that we should be using these digarette tax funds. The Legislature committed this same portion of the digarette tax (two cents per pack) for five years for repair of the Civic Auditorium in Omaha, and the fiveyear period is scheduled to lapse

After completion of Auditorium, that money was supposed to return to the General Fund specifically to be used for improvegovernment buildings across the State. I supported the Civic Auditorium project as a trade off for the commitment to return the funds to building repair. We are about \$295 million behind in improving these buildings. I think we need to honor our prior commitment to improving State buildings with these funds as per our original agreement.

Last week we also debated a bill that would reimburse grocery storeowners for certain costs associated with participating in programs such as food stamps. The bill was introduced by Sen. Ray Janssen of Nickerson and Sen. Doug Cunningham of Wausa in our neigh boring district. Congress has implemented an electronic benefit program in which recipients of the benefits have magnetic swipe cards for food stamps and other programs. The electronic benefit system was implemented to prevent fraud that can occur with paper food stamps, and the system should be fully

implemented by October 2002. There are two methods for pro-

cessing these transactions – using state-provided equipment or allowing grocery store owners to use their own equipment and reimbursing them for the costs. Grocery storeowners incur costs to process any swipe-card transaction.


Crocery stores probably will not receive enough state equipment to support every checkout lane, so it is possible that stores will have to have designated checkout lines for food stamp customers. We voted to bracket the bill, which means we will not consider it again until next year in order to give senators more time to work out the details and answer questions. The bill would have reimbursed retailers who choose to use their own equipment at a rate of nine cents per transac-

A bill that will permit government entities to sell or lease unused fiber optic capacity and use the proceeds to provide advanced telecommunications services was advanced to Select File. Under LB 827, any profits earned under a lease agreement by a public entity would be remitted a newly created Nebraska Internet Enhancement Fund, to provide financial assistance to install and deliver broadband or other advanced telecommunications infrastructures and throughout the State. Public entities can sell the unused ("dark") fiber to private entities at whatever price they can get. This bill boils down to whether public, tax-supported entities should be allowed to compete with private enterprise

We advanced LB 711, which would make enhancements to retirement plans for school employees, judges and State Patrol officers last week. The plan is part of a longterm effort to improve retirement plans for teachers. The enhancements can be fully funded by existing excess assets within the retirement plan, so no new funds are required. One of the bill's proponents, Sen. Floyd Vrtiska, has said that he hopes the bill will help attract and keep teachers in Nebraska.

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Tips are given on shore fishing on the river

the border between Nebraska and South Dakota offers some excellent fishing opportunities, especially for the shore fishermen.

Every day, fish calling the river home have to fight the current in order to survive. It takes a tremendous amount of energy for a fish to fight the current. Fish are just like any other of God's creatures, they'll look for an easy way to do things.

They'll look for areas with little or no current (current breaks), these areas are generally located along the shoreline

These current breaks are created by points, jetties, or rock rip rap that was put into the river to prevent back erosion. The extend out into the river forcing the current into the main channel. The faster water is forced around the obstruction, cre ating a slack water area directly below the point or rock piles.

dam, either on the turbine side or through the gates, baitfish are drawn down stream. Many of these bait fish are injured or dazed coming through the dam. The larger prey fish lie in these slack water areas waiting for an easy meal to be washed by them.

They'll move out of the slack water, grab the baitfish and then move back into the slack water to finish their meal.

Areas similar to the current break below the point on the concrete wall on the turbine or fast water side will hold a lot of fish

On the south side of the river, areas that will hold fish because of the lack of swift current include: the handicap dock, the boat dock and rip rap areas along the shoreline.

On the north side areas that will hold good numbers of fish include: the area where the fast water from the 'turbine side meets the water



coming in from the gates. This area has a back flow and between the back flow is an area with little or no through the dam family ends up in this area. The fish will lie here waiting for lunch to come to them.

good example of a current break is the entire area below the gates when they are closed. This area becomes one huge current break and that's the reason why the fishing is so good there.

Look for areas similar to the area below the gates, slow moving with very little water.

One thing that I've noticed that many shore fishermen do is to try to over power the fish. Since they are fishing from shore and have to deal with snags, they'll use heavy line and sinkers

Many of them will power cast way out into the fast water, using the heavy weight to try and hold in the current. Which really doesn't make sense, because the majority of the fish will be setting along the break between the fast and slower

fast water to pick up a wounded baitfish, but will move back into the next current break that they come

By fishing along the edge of the current or in the slack water, you'll catch more fish. Why do you think that the boat fishermen work close to the shore line, out of the current. it's simple, because that's where the fish arel

The heavier line and weights are also a detriment when fishing from

Fish aren't he sharpest knife in the drawer, but they aren't totally igno-

When you're using a heavy line, which has a lot of memory (coils), your bait corkscrews its way through the water. Nothing in the aquatic world corkscrews its way through the water. Lighter line will allow you to present your bait better, catch more fish, but it will also break easier when snagged

fortable with, one that will allow your bait to look more lifelike in the

The heavier weight, which you won't need if you are fishing slack water, will splash down making enough noise to scare most fish away. You need to remember that sound travels faster in water, so a big weight hitting the water will spook fish for quite a distance.

When the fish picks up the bait and feels the heavy weight he's more apt to spit it out and go looking for something easier to chow down on.


I guess what I'm trying to say is to keep it simple, don't make fishing too complicated.

You need to get your bait into an area where the fish are and make it easy for the fish to locate and take the bait.

Next week, we'll talk about lures that shore fishermen and womer can use to fish the Missouri River.

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
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


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
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Older Antidepressants Often as Effective as Newer, Costlier Ones

According to new guidelines from the American College of Physicians - American Society of Internal Medicine, both newer and traditional antidepressant medicines are equally effective for many persons with depression. Older medicines typically are in the class termed *incyclics* (e.g., *Tofranil, Elavil*) The newer agents include selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors, or *SSRIs* (e.g., *Paxil, Zoloft, Paxil, Zoloft, Pax*

The major difference cited between tricyclics and SSRIs are side effects. SSRIs are more likely to cause diarrhea, nausea, headache, and sleeping difficulties. Tricyclics are more likely to cause blurred vision, constipation, dizziness, dry mouth, and tremors. Interestingly, according to the new guidelines it is noted that St. John's wort may be effective against mild depression, at lease on a short-term basis.

PRAISE FOR PROCEDURES

The Wakefield Community School experienced another bomb scare on March 14 Students were evacuated from the school at about 2.30 p.m. The elementary students were escorted to the Evangelical Covenant Church and the secondary students to St. John's

Lutheran Church. After they arrived there, parents were notified and asked to come pick up their stu-Principal Bill Heimann said that

the Nebraska State Patrol, which was one of several agencies responded to the emergency, complimented the school on how well their evacuation plan went.

The school has been working on safety plans in case of emergencies like last week. Mr. Heimann said, "Of course students' safety is the school's first concern

Following an investigation which included the Wakefield Volunteer Fire and Rescue Squad, Dixon and Wayne County deputies, a dog trained to sniff out devices such as bombs, a SWAT team along with several state patrolmen, it was determined that the threat was another hoax

This is the third time someone left a note somewhere in the school stating there was a bomb

Superintendent Mike Moody is frustrated by this type of behavior His frustration comes from all the lost time by volunteers, like the fire and rescue members, cost to taxpayers in all the officers who respond to make sure that the threat is not real. Supt. Moody estimated the entire cost at \$25,000 as a result of an incident like this.

Since the incident, 40 to 50 students have been interviewed by school officials and deputies as they try to follow up leads as to who may have left the note in a restroom on the northeast side of the secondary building

Principal Heimann said the note was taken to a police lab and that a number of students were also fingerprinted

Heimann said if anyone in the community has concerns about the school's safety procedures or has suggestions on improvement, that school officials are very open to hearing these suggestions "We always have to take these types of incidents seriously," Heimann said And then he emphasized that the first priority is to make sure every-

Tante' Susie led interesting life

It's Friday morning. The fog was pea-soup thick as I drove to a 7:30 a.m. meeting in Weeping Water. Now, it's raining; hopefully, the last pile of snow north of the house will disappear.

I've seen robins all week; yesterday, I spotted crocuses and daffodils. There is also green appearing along road sides and in winter wheat fields

Have we ever been so anxious for spring? Or is my tolerance for winter decreasing with age?

I wanted to tell you some more stories about "Tante" Susie, who died last week at the age of 100 years and eight months. For 25 of those years, she lived next door to Jenda; who continued to visit her when she went to the nursing home. In fact, she served as her

power of attorney, which shows how much Susie trusted her.

When a nephew first drove her to the local nursing home to look at the apartments they have, at age 95, she commented, "Those 'old people' in there go to bed awful

She didn't go to bed until midnight. Which was why she got Jenda. out of bed one night because she had a fire. She had laid a pile of rags in front of her heater in the bathroom and they ignited: She quickly put them in the sink and turned the water on; the flame was so hot, it melted the faucet and she couldn't get the water turned off!

When the plumber came to repair the faucet, she needed to go to the bathroom, lenda wasn't home; but



she knew the back door was open,

so she slipped over there. Instead of going up the landing the stairs to the basement, twisting an ankle in the process.

She crawled back up and hobbled back to her house. When she finally told lenda about the mishap and was taken to the ER for x-rays, she commented, "Jenda, you have a lot of stuff you need to get rid of."

Another incident involved her dentures, which disappeared. She even had the Happy Wheels driver looking for them. They eventually showed up — in her pickle jarl

As you can see, we had a genuine character here. When you live to be a 100, there aren't many people at your funeral. But those of us who were, cherished the memories. Isn't that what funeral are for?
