

Theatre renovation underway


Ground-breaking ceremonies were held last week for the Ramsey Theatre Renovation and Addition project at Wayne State College.







Capitol view Death penalty is debated

The state's new study on the death penalty arrived to the altogether predictable praise and criticism from those who favor or oppose the ultimate punishment.

No matter how you feel about the death penalty, you can feel good about the debate it engenders among the citizenry, from folk on the street to elected leaders. A society that doesn't feel passionately about issues as important as the death penalty might or might not. be a nice place to visit, but it certainly would be no place to live. The view from here remains absolutely unchanged after decades of covering murder trials, sentencing hearings and the ultimate outcome of the death sentence.

The U.S. Supreme Court should mandate standards for courtappointed attorneys who represent defendants in potential death penalty cases. We have offered this view for years. A few months ago, Associate Justice Sandra Day O'Connor said much the same thing. She acknowledged that "it appears" that some innocent folk are being sentenced to death under the current system, and that, perhaps, only attorneys who know an amicus curiae from a per curiam opinion ought to be handling them. Such a system would be good news for conservatives, whether they oppose or support the death penalty. A great many appeals, especially the successful ones, have at their root one degree or another of inept lawyering. Do the job right the first time and money will be

saved, the guilty can be punished sooner and the odds or killing the innocent are somewhat reduced. The O.J. Simpson case certainly proved that the most important color in America today is neither black nor white, red nor yellow. It is green, as in the color of money.

The reality is that our constitutionally required "equal protection" is provided on a sliding, monetary scale. That ain't no opinion; that's a fact. The courts can't change the reality, but they can lessen it by degrees through seeing that the notion of an adequate defense is realized via at least adequate coun-

How do you feel about the death penalty? Years ago, I came up with a little test that can be used to clarify one's personal view of the death penalty. Its validity depends entirely upon being honest with oneself (and knowing oneself well enough to do so), but otherwise, it's approximately failsafe.

Ask yourself: If someone murdered someone you love, would you truly want to see them die for it? Do you believe (if you believe in a higher power) that it is what the Almighty would want? If your answer to both questions is "yes," then you favor the death penalty. A lot of people don't know they favor the death penalty until someone close to them is murdered.





Legion wins four straight before falling in state finals Wakefield Juniors edged in title game

Wakefield's bid for a second straight state junior Legion championship was thwarted by a familiar foe in Palmer-Wolbach-Greeley, Tuesday night in Wakefield, 3-1. Paul Eaton's troops defeated Palmer-Wolbach-Greeley in last season's state junior Legion championship, 8-6 in Plainview.

Two years ago in Wakefield, Eaton's squad posted a 7-0 victory over Palmer-Wolbach-Greeley in the Midget State Championship.

Then, Monday night in Wakefield, the locals pounded Palmer-Wolbach-Greeley, 13-4.

In the championship game however, Palmer-Wolbach-Greeley salvaged at least some revenge for past frustrations against Wakefield. Joe Brown pitched a solid game for Wakefield despite suffering the loss. Brown struck out 10 and didn't walk any while scattering seven hits. PWG scored once in the first inning and twice in the second inning including a run scoring on a double steal play.

Wakefield's lone run came in the bottom of the first inning when Marc Manganaro singled home Clint French who had doubled.

Wakefield however, stranded 11 runners on base including a bases loaded situation in the bottom of the seventh inning with two outs before a fielder's choice ended the game.

Wakefield also had the bases loaded in the fifth inning with just

one out but a leaping grab of a line drive hit by Josh Soderberg by the second baseman resulted in a double play as he stepped on second base following the catch for a force out.

Both teams finished with seven hits as Manganaro had a double and two singles while French doubled and singled. Kyle Beacom doubled and Ty Nixon singled.




Jeremy Hoefs rips a pitch during Wakefield's win over Tecumseh on Tuesday.






Eric Sturm connects with a pitch during Wayne's game with Beatrice.








Rich Kortum looks for a chip-in on hole five. Kortum fired a three-under-par 69 over the first 18 holes.

Students need second MMR shot for school

All students K-12 entering school this fall must show that they have had two doses of vaccine for measles, mumps and rubella, according to the Nebraska Health and Human Services System.

For the last two years, only Kindergartners, seventh graders and transfer students from out of state have been required to show they have had two doses of MMR. The requirement for proof of a second dose is being extended to all students this school year.

With the extension of this requirement, Nebraska rules and regulations regarding immunizations reflect current recommendations from the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

A second dose of vaccine has been shown to be effective in reducing the incidence of measles, said Dr. Richard Raymond, the 'state's Chief Medical Officer.

"Getting a second dose will ensure that susceptible populations will be protected if a rubella outbreak like Nebraska experienced last year should repeat itself," Dr. Raymond said,

Susceptible populations include high school and college students and immigrants.

Public immunization clinics, local health departments and physicians' offices offer immunizations. For information, call your immunization provider, local health department or community action agency, or call the Health and Human Services System at (402) 471-6423. 

Soybeans entering critical stage of development

Soybean producers should have been notified that this week and next week are critical time frames relative to the impact of soil water deficits on final seed yields of soybeans planted in mid-May of this year on silty clay loam soils, according to University of Nebraska soybean researcher Jim Specht.

"Research over the last 25 years has shown that the most water-sensitive stage in soybean reproductive development is the R3 - R4 stage (begin to end pod elongation), Specht said.

"Vegetative growth essentially ceases by the middle of the R3 - R4 stage. What this means is that no more root or stem growth happens and all available resources go into making the soybean seed. The root network is already developed and will not grow to deeper moisture."

soybeans during the 10 to 14-day long R3 -R4 stage with irrigation amounts that return the top four feet back to field capacity (if the top four feet are dry, at two available water inches per foot, you need to apply eight inches over the course of the R3 - R4 stage).

"According to our research, applying water now will yield the most bang for the buck," Specht said. "Treat this soybean R3 - R4 stage with the same importance you would treat your corn tasseling and silking periods."

Assistance package passed

The United States Senate passed a for the nation's farmers after several days of debate:

> The package passed by the Senate represents a smaller aid package than the one approved last year. Senator Nelson supported a larger package, totaling \$7.4 billion, that would have restored the level of assistance to 100 percent of last year.

> Opponents were successful at using parliamentary procedures to block the larger package, forcing the Senate to approve the same version adopted in the House of Representatives.

"The package passed today represents a down payment on the commitment we have with America's farmers," said Senator Nelson. "This \$5:5 billion will be immediate assistance and when we get back, it is my hope that the President will work with us to provide the rest of the assistance our farmers need."

Under the version passed, federal assistance to Nebraska farmers will be reduced from last year's total. AMTA payments to Nebraska farmers will be cut by \$59 million, with corn growers alone losing \$50 million. Also, oilseed producers will see a cut of \$4 million from last year's level.

"The goal here is to get farmers 100 percent of their AMTA payments," said Nelson. "The package passed today is 85 percent and we need to address the other 15 percent when we get back.".

drink 1 to 2 cups After the game drink 3 to 6 cups (or more if hot weather).



address concerns in a letter to the board. Scheduling of games was a concern, with the high school having to play football on Thursday night when WSC has a home game on Saturday. It was also noted that there would not be a conflict with scheduling football games with WSC volleyball home games, as

was last year because of parking concerns. Dr. Sheila Stearns, president of Wayne State College, also spoke on behalf of the track and football facility efforts of each educational institution. There is a need for a track facility in the town of Wayne, whether it is at the public schools or college. The City of Wayne, Wayne Community Schools, and Wayne State College need to offer the best recreational facilities for the youth of this community and need to stand as a "united front". The college track would be state-owned, a positive aspect. It would need to be maintained by the support of donors. As far as looking into long-term contracts between the public schools and college, the contract language would be written as such to make sure each

entity would be protected in the event there would ever be a change in administration. Paul Campbell, softball parent, was present

to answer any questions when the board discussed adding girl's softball as a varsity sport. Brad Hoskins expressed his thoughts of adding girl's softball as a varsity sport. He noted that traveling distance to play games should be a consideration before a decision is made. If there were more local teams to play, then it wouldn't be such a big deal.

Dale Hochstein, WHS track coach, spoke to the board on the topic of track facilities. The current track can be used for preparation and practices but athletes suffer several injuries. Fourteen track athletes competed in the state meet, 11 of which suffered injuries during the year. In grades 7-12, there were 142 students participating in track. If Wayne would have a decent facility, then we would be able to hold conference meets. This past spring, we bussed some athletes out to the Wayne Airport to practice on the runways and transported students to Laurel-Concord and Wisner-Pilger for help prepare for state. Physical education classes from the elementary and middle school buildings also use the track. Rocky Ruhl pointed out there is not a major cost difference between a 6-lane and 8-lane track.

Informational Items or Reports: Discussion of Track and Field Facilities: Lance Laurent, President of A-1 Track and Tennis from Omaha and Bernie Fairchild of Southwest Recreational Industries, Inc. each presented to the board different options available in renovating the current track.

Mr. Laurent (A-1 Track and Tennis) kept the proposal very basic, knowing that the budget

is the major concern for this project. Their proposal included tearing out the asphalt, com-pacting the dirt to a minimum standard density, grading for an 8-lane track and install two runways with a price of \$170,000.00. This track would last approximately 20 years. On top of the asphalt, Plexitrac (strongest latex product) is a high performance track surfacing. Drainage would also need to be addressed. There is a four-drain system, at each corner of the field. The field would need to be graded to establish a positive slope of 1-1.5%. This company has done tracks in Valentine. Neligh. Creighton, Gordon, Plainview, Broken Bow and several other schools. If the school would decide to renovate the track, they would be able to solicit bids during the winter months to lock into lower asphalt prices. In 5 to 7 years, the track would require a maintenance coating at an estimated cost of \$13,500. We could also put on polyurethane track surfacing, which would cost between \$25,000-\$45,000. Board members thanked Mr. Laurent for coming to present and answer their questions.

Mr. Fairchild (Southwest Recreational Industries-SWRI) shared with the board different options that his company could provide. Southwest is owned by American Sports Products Group and is the largest indoor/outdoor company of track surfacing. In the summer, they can have 24-40 crews throughout the United States installing tracks. He also provided a budget estimate on what it would cost. SWRI manufactures their own polyurethane and man-made rubber. In 1994, they acquired AstroTurf, which is used to resurface fields from natural grass to a synthetic component. In their proposal, Mr. Fairchild suggested pulverizing the asphalt and combining it with an aggregate sub-base, install drainage system to connect to existing system. The base of the track oval was estimated at \$206,100. Jumping events base work including pole vault, high jump, long/triple jump was estimated at \$50,300 and throwing events base work including discus cage, id shot put was es

Two other track companies. Midwest Tennis and Track of Denison, Iowa and Fisher Tracks of Boone, lowa, were unable to present because of their schedules. Mr. Ruhl will contact the companies to see if they can present at the next board meeting scheduled for August 13, 2001. Board members did not take any action on the track and field facilities until they are able to hear presentations from the other two companies.

Discussion of Girls Softball as a Varsity Sport: Rocky Ruhl, Athletic Director, has been researching the possibility of adding girl's softball. He contacted Mr. Bill Lewis at the Nebraska School Activities Association (NSAA) to answer his questions. Mr. Lewis expressed his interest and would like to see Wayne wait a year. The fall sports practice begins in two weeks and Mr. Ruhl will still need to put together a schedule. There are grants available to help with the start up costs but are seldom award to schools and are directed toward summer recreation programs. Boone Central (Albion) implemented softball this past school year (2000-01). Mr. Ruhl visited with their superintendent and he said their uniforms cost \$100. Albion is also a member of the Mid-States Conference.

Paul Campbell, Softball Association parent, noted that 13 girls who played this summer have expressed a commitment to play this fall 2001-02, because they are not out for other fall sports. It was a concern of board members how the other fall sports would be impacted. Mr. Campbell stated that of 40+ girls involved


