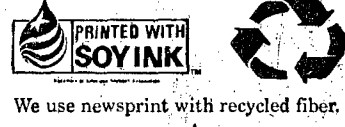

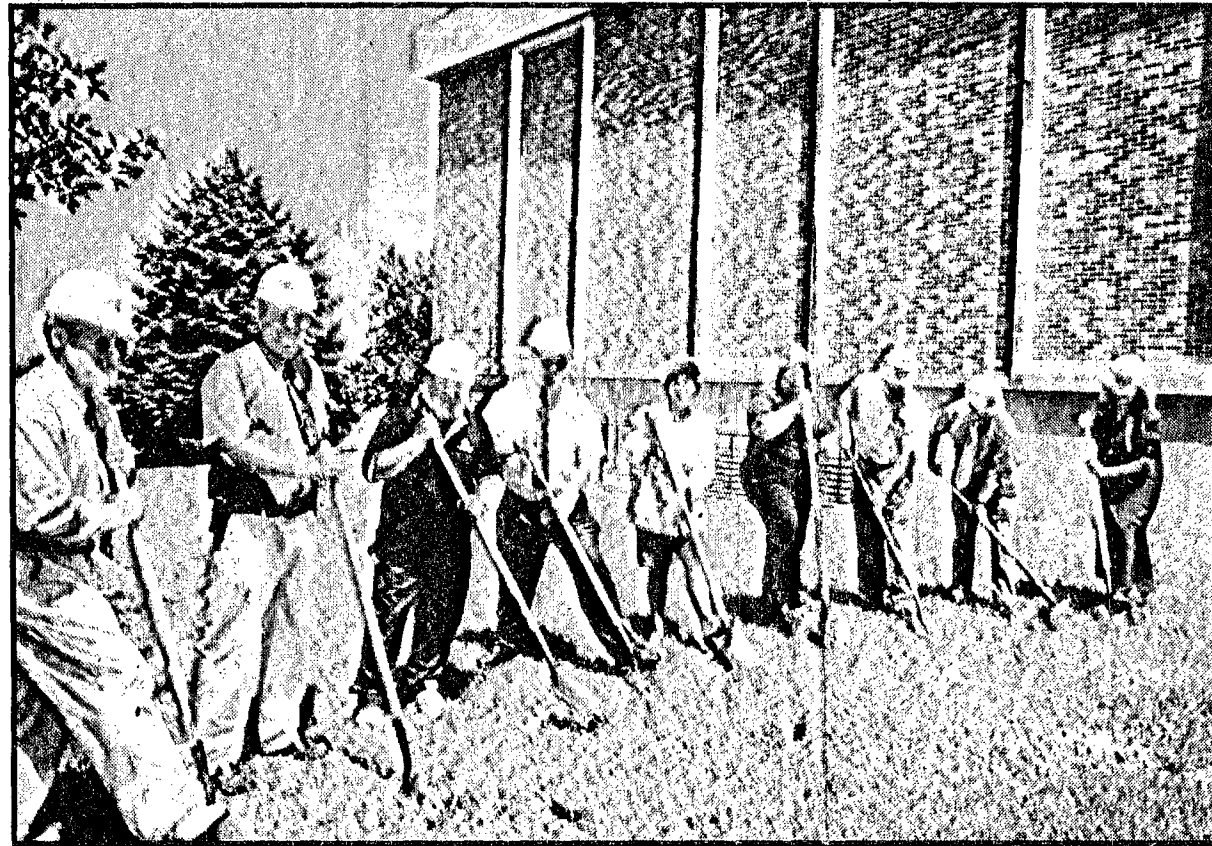

Theatre renovation underway

Ground-breaking ceremonies were held last week for the Ramsey Theatre Renovation and Addition project at Wayne State College.

The \$3 million project includes the complete renovation of Ramsey Theatre. It includes new seating, carpeting, acoustical treatments, lighting, sound system and stage equipment. The project also includes a two-story, 10,800 square-foot addition that will house a scene shop, green room, design studio and loading dock on the upper level. It will also feature a hallway that will serve as a stage crossover area.

On the lower level will be a black box theater, costume shop and an oversized elevator that can be used to move large equipment and musical instruments. It will feature a ground-level entryway and greatly improved handicap accessibility.

The project is being funded in part by a \$547,000 grant from The Lied Foundation Trust. In recognition of that gift, the west portion of the building encompassing the foyer, Ramsey Theatre and the new addition in the Val Peterson Fine Arts Hall will be named The Lied Performing Arts Center.

"We truly appreciate the generosity of The Lied Foundation Trust and Ms. Christina Hixson," said Dr. Sheila Stearns, WSC president. "Without their donation, we would not have been able to complete many of the features of the addition. This will be a wonderful facility that our students, faculty, the community and region will utilize for many years to come."

Construction will begin this month with an expected completion date of fall, 2002. Architect for the project is Alley Poyner Architecture of Omaha. R.L. Fauss Builders of Fremont is the contractor.

Wayne man killed in apartment fire

The Wayne Volunteer Fire Department responded to a structure fire at 113 Blaine Street shortly before 1 a.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 7.

The body of Matthew Cady, 30, was discovered when the firefighters entered Apartment #4. Autopsy reports indicate Cady died as a result of smoke inhalation.

Cady was employed by the Nebraska Department of Roads, in the Wayne office.

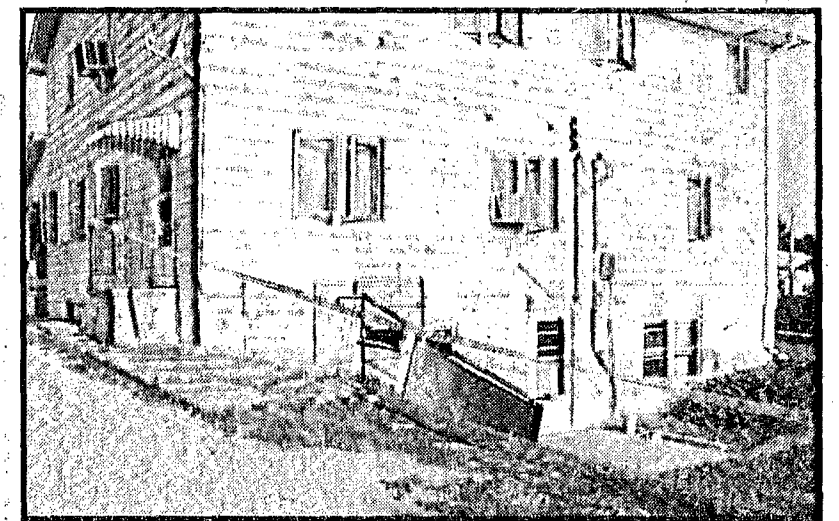
The fire is under investigation by the Nebraska State Fire Marshall's Office and the Wayne Police Department.

Wayne Police Chief Lance Webster said the preliminary results of that

investigation point to an electrical connection as the cause of the fire. Webster said the window air conditioner in the apartment was plugged into an extension cord and it appears the fire started there.

The building contains four other apartments. The fire was contained to Cady's apartment but all apartments suffered smoke damage.

Two of the occupants of the building were not at home at the time of the fire and the other two occupants escaped without injury and are currently staying elsewhere until the investigation is complete and they are allowed to return to the apartment building.

Biker rides over 1 million miles

One million is a large number for just about everything, but one million miles of bike riding is a phenomenal feat.

Freddie Hoffman is currently working on his second million miles of bike riding.

Hoffman's annual trip from his home in New Jersey brought him through Wayne this weekend. It was here that he befriended Don Larsen while watching the Demolition Derby at the Wayne County Fair. The two struck up a conversation which ended with Hoffman at the Larsen home, something almost unheard of in his hometown.

While Hoffman's riding accomplishments are monumental, he was equally impressed with life in northeast Nebraska.

He was especially intrigued by the size and equipment on Larsen's farm.

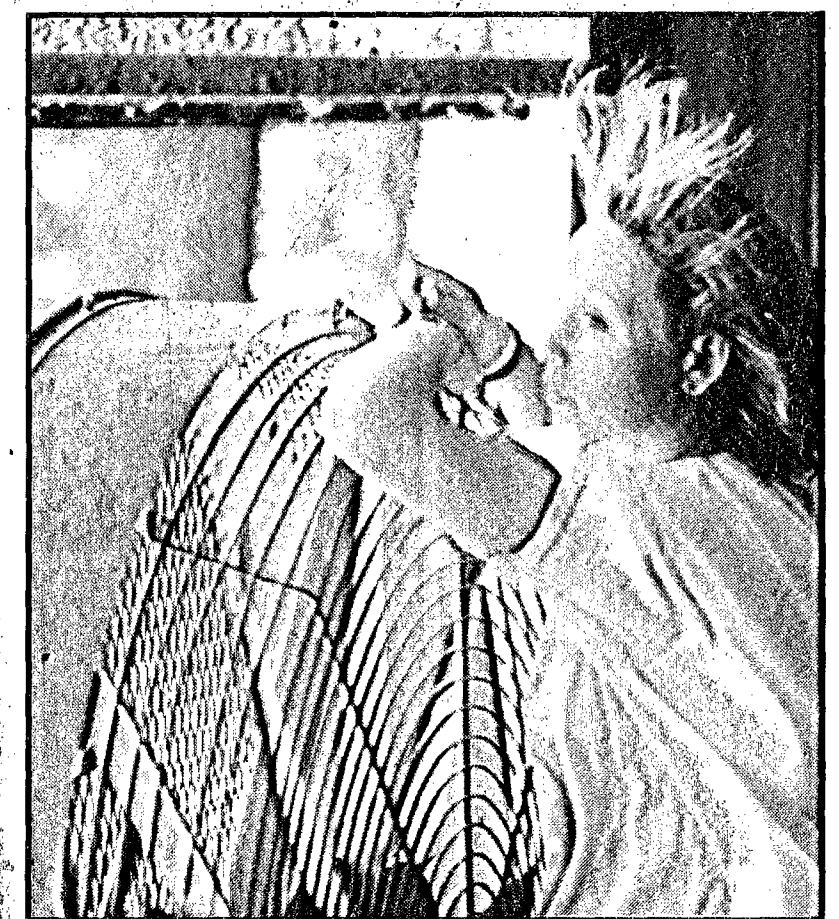
"Mr. Larsen let me climb into the cab of his combine. I'm probably the only person from my home town in New Jersey who has been able to do that," he said.

What makes Hoffman's mileage log even more astounding is that when he was born 43 years ago (he celebrated his birthday while in Wayne), is the fact that he suffered slight brain damage because of oxygen-deprivation.

Hoffman has ridden across the country 22 times, beginning each year in New Jersey and heading west to the Rocky Mountains in Colorado and then heading back to his home where he lives with his 84-year old father.

The rides serve a two-fold purpose — a leisurely ride and an effort to raise money for the Leukemia Society.

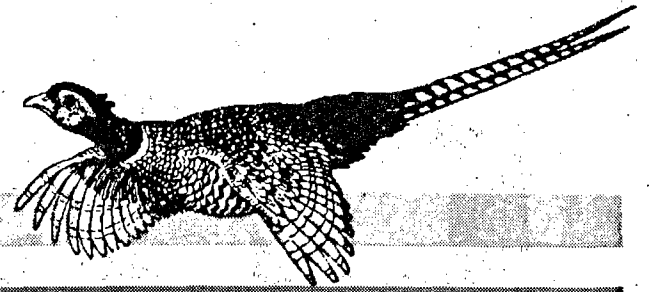


Fan Fair

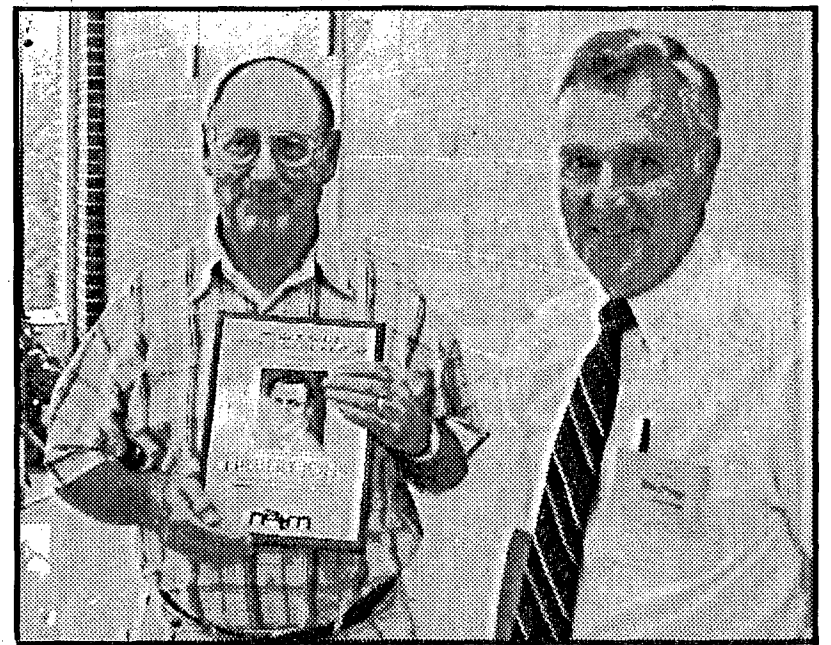

Distinguished service award presented to Johs

The Nebraska Association of Teachers of Mathematics (NATM) awarded Dr. Hilbert Johs the Donald W. Miller Distinguished Service Award during the NATM summer conference at Doane College on July 26.

"Hilbert has had a great impact in high schools throughout northeast Nebraska. He was a pioneer in helping schools introduce computers to their personnel," said WSC colleague Jim Paige in his nomination of Johs.

"Hilbert taught content mathematics courses at WSC and was always a role model for prospective teachers of mathematics."

Johs was instrumental in establishing the annual WSC mathematics contest that has existed for 25 years. The contest involves area

high school students.

Following 30 years of service, Johs retired from his mathematics teaching position at Wayne State College in May 2000. Prior to teaching at WSC, Johs taught for several years at Northern State College in South Dakota. Johs also taught as an elementary teacher at Napoleon, N.D. and a high school math teacher in Kulm, N.D. He also served in the U.S. Army for two years.

Johs earned his bachelor's degree at Ellendale State Teachers College, his master's degree at the University of Illinois and his EdD at the University of Northern Colorado.

Johs has participated in the NATM and the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics (NCTM) including local, regional and national NCTM conferences during his tenure.

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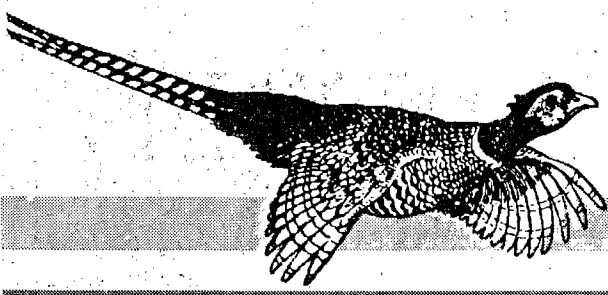

Will we have flags flying in the future, e.g., on Labor Day and Armistice Day? Whose responsibility is it to place the flags on Main Street?

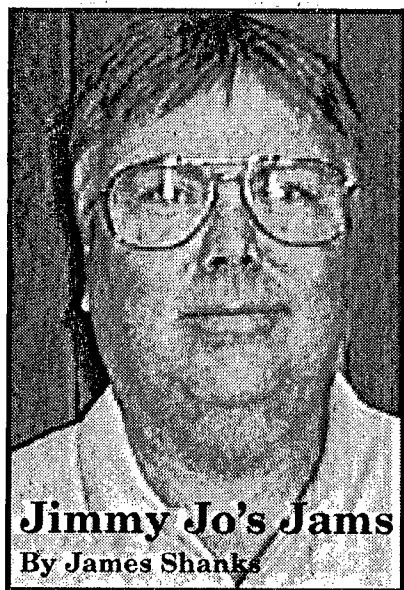

Death penalty is debated

The state's new study on the death penalty arrived to the altogether predictable praise and criticism from those who favor or oppose the ultimate punishment.

No matter how you feel about the death penalty, you can feel good about the debate it engenders among the citizenry, from folk on the street to elected leaders. A society that doesn't feel passionately about issues as important as the death penalty might or might not be a nice place to visit, but it certainly would be no place to live.

The view from here remains absolutely unchanged after decades of covering murder trials, sentencing hearings and the ultimate outcome of the death sentence.

The U.S. Supreme Court should mandate standards for court-appointed attorneys who represent defendants in potential death penalty cases. We have offered this view for years. A few months ago, Associate Justice Sandra Day O'Connor said much the same thing. She acknowledged that "it appears" that some innocent folk are being sentenced to death under the current system, and that, perhaps, only attorneys who know an amicus curiae from a per curiam opinion ought to be handling them.

Such a system would be good news for conservatives, whether they oppose or support the death penalty. A great many appeals, especially the successful ones, have at their root one degree or another of inept lawyering. Do the job right the first time and money will be

saved, the guilty can be punished sooner and the odds of killing the innocent are somewhat reduced.

The O.J. Simpson case certainly proved that the most important color in America today is neither black nor white, red nor yellow. It is green, as in the color of money.

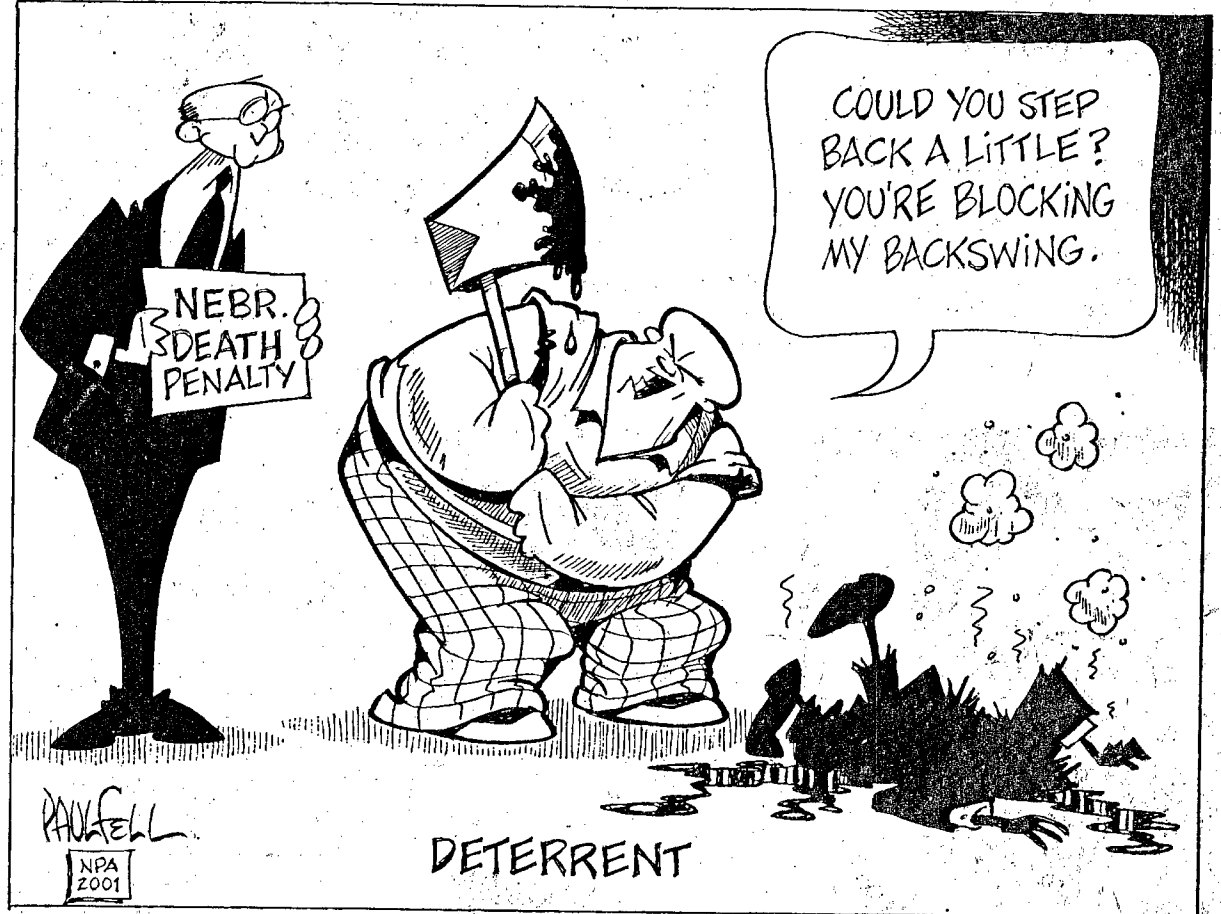
The reality is that our constitutionally required "equal protection" is provided on a sliding, monetary scale. That ain't no opinion; that's a fact. The courts can't change the reality, but they can lessen it by

degrees through seeing that the notion of an adequate defense is realized via at least adequate counsel.

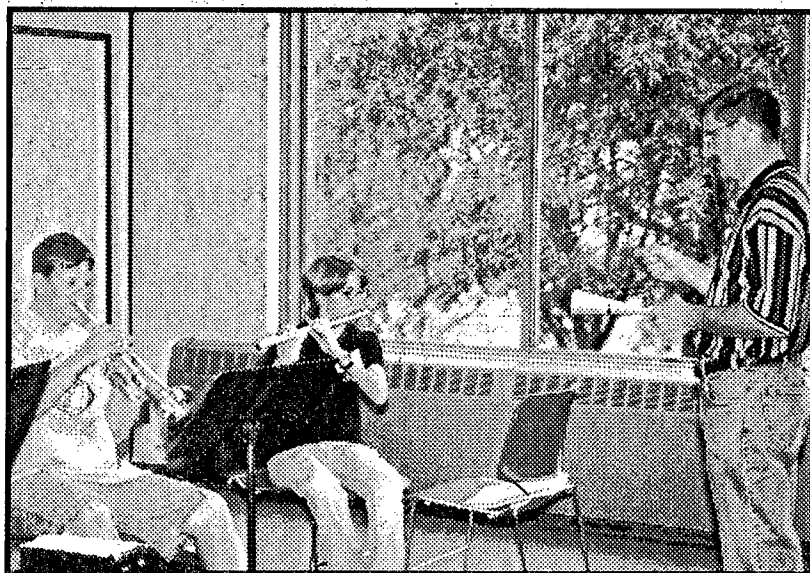
How do you feel about the death penalty? Years ago, I came up with a little test that can be used to clarify one's personal view of the death penalty. Its validity depends entirely upon being honest with oneself (and knowing oneself well enough to do so), but otherwise, it's approximately failsafe.

Ask yourself: If someone murdered someone you love, would you truly want to see them die for it? Do you believe (if you believe in a higher power) that it is what the Almighty would want? If your answer to both questions is "yes," then you favor the death penalty. A lot of people don't know they favor the death penalty until someone close to them is murdered.

Of course, a lot of people don't know they are law and order conservatives until they get mugged, either.

While abroad, team members stay in Rotarians' homes and have the opportunity to meet their professional counterparts. They will also give presentations to Rotary Clubs and other groups about their home country.

The Rotary Foundation provides a round-trip air ticket, and local

Rotarians in the host country provide meals, lodging and group travel in their district. Team members pay for personal and incidental expenses.

People interested in applying should be employed full-time in a recognized business or profession, and must be within the age range of 25 to 40 years of age. Applicants must live or be employed in Rotary District 5650 of Eastern Nebraska-Western Iowa area.

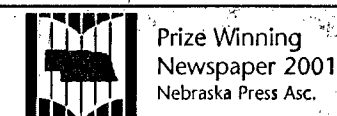

"I have had 26 maternal family members die from cancer, many at a time when it couldn't be treated as well," Freddie said.

Each spring, he single-handedly canvases his home town seeking pledges for his ride. They range from a fraction of a cent to five cents per mile.

"I have raised over \$11 per mile for this trip which will be approximately 6,000 miles. Altogether, I have raised over \$500,000 for cancer research," he said.

For his efforts through the past years of cycling and fund-raising, Hoffman has received a number of volunteer awards, including the "Points of Light" Award. He was the second youngest person ever to receive the award.

Hoffman said that he has ridden through Nebraska a number of times before, but never through Wayne.

"Because of the wind and the topography of this area, it has been beneficial to ride both south and west this year to keep from riding into the southwest winds at all times."

The Nebraska winds have kept Freddie's riding speed at an average of 10 miles per hour. On a good day, without head winds, he can travel 200 miles in one day.

With his bike being his only home for several months each year, it must be equipped with a number of special features.

"I have the frame custom-built and then I do the rest myself. I have spare parts, wrenches and other

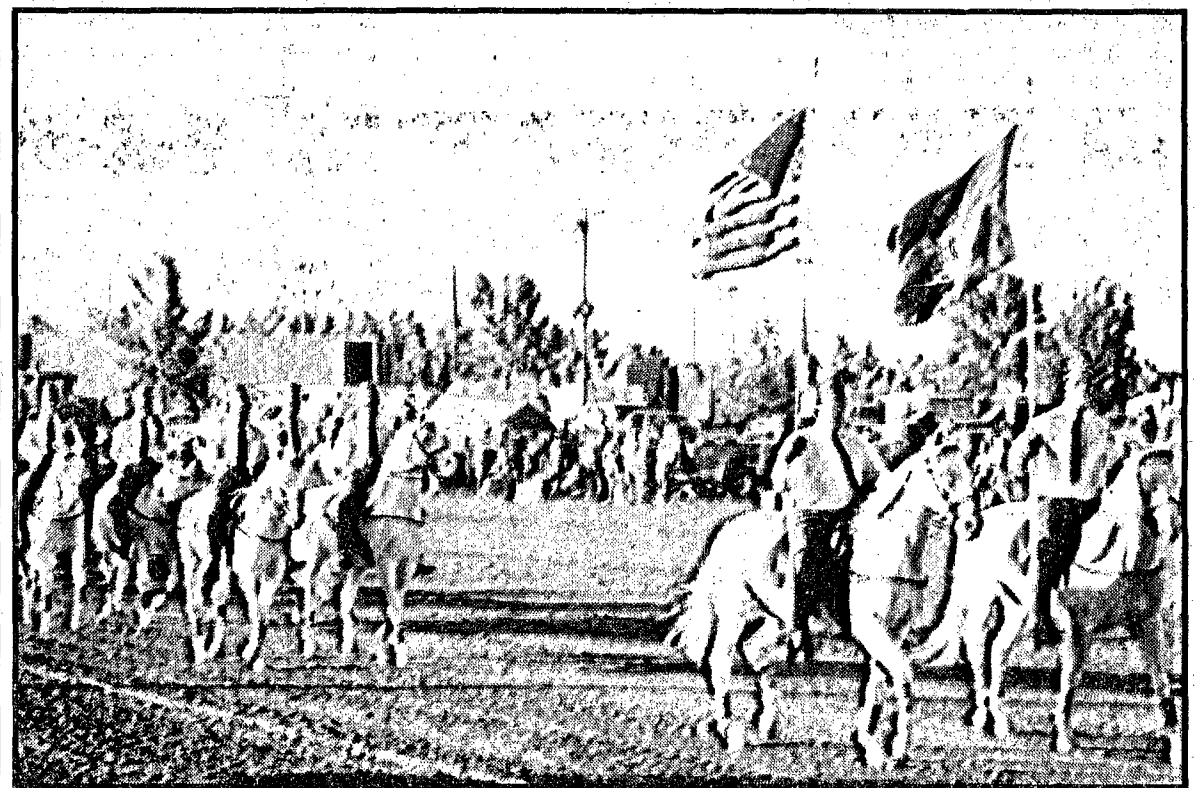
equipment such as a compass, cable-driven odometer, thermometer, radio and electric horn. My bike weighs more than 100 pounds. I have two bottles of extra water for times when I might go 40 or 50 miles without getting to a town. Traveling by yourself means you have to be very self-sufficient."

Freddie's bike is named "Ruth E. IV" after his mother, who died of leukemia in 1986. It also contains the saying "To the Moon and Back, Twice," indicating that the number of miles he has ridden in his lifetime could take him to the moon and back two times.

Freddie is on a special mission which he says he does the old-fashioned way, by himself.

There will also be womens and childrens clothing and a broader range of men's clothing.

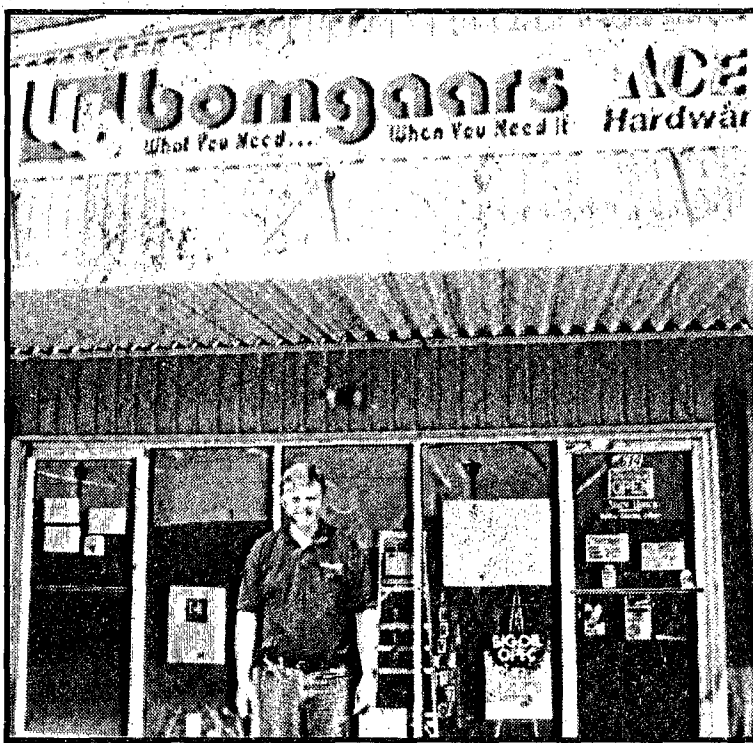
"We will have many more items

Nissen notes that Bomgaars is a very community-minded organization and you will see them support local programs too.

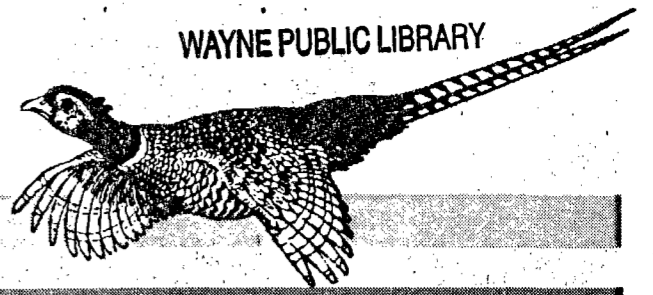

Wakefield posted a 12-0 shutout

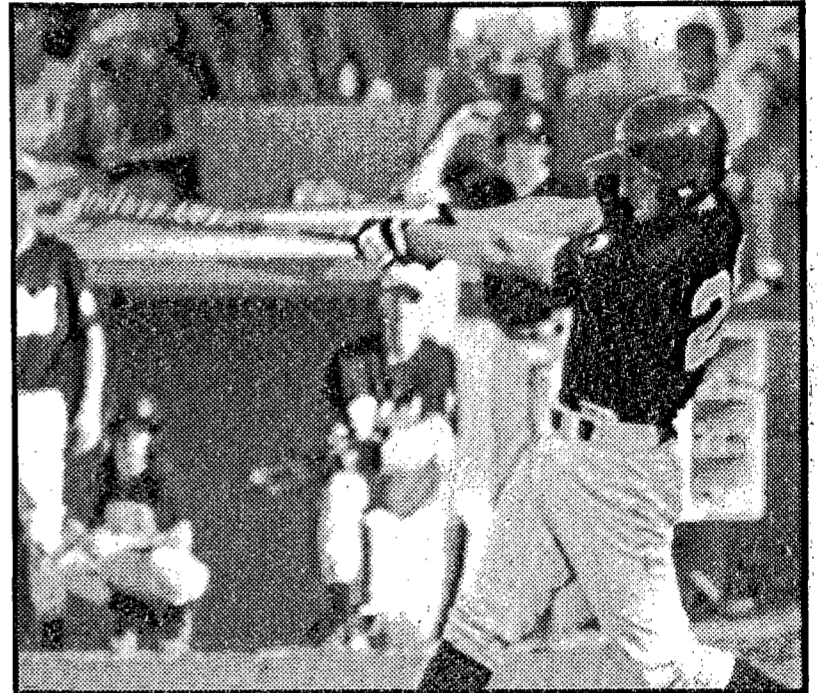
over Rushville on Saturday as Jeremy Hoefs earned the win from the hill.

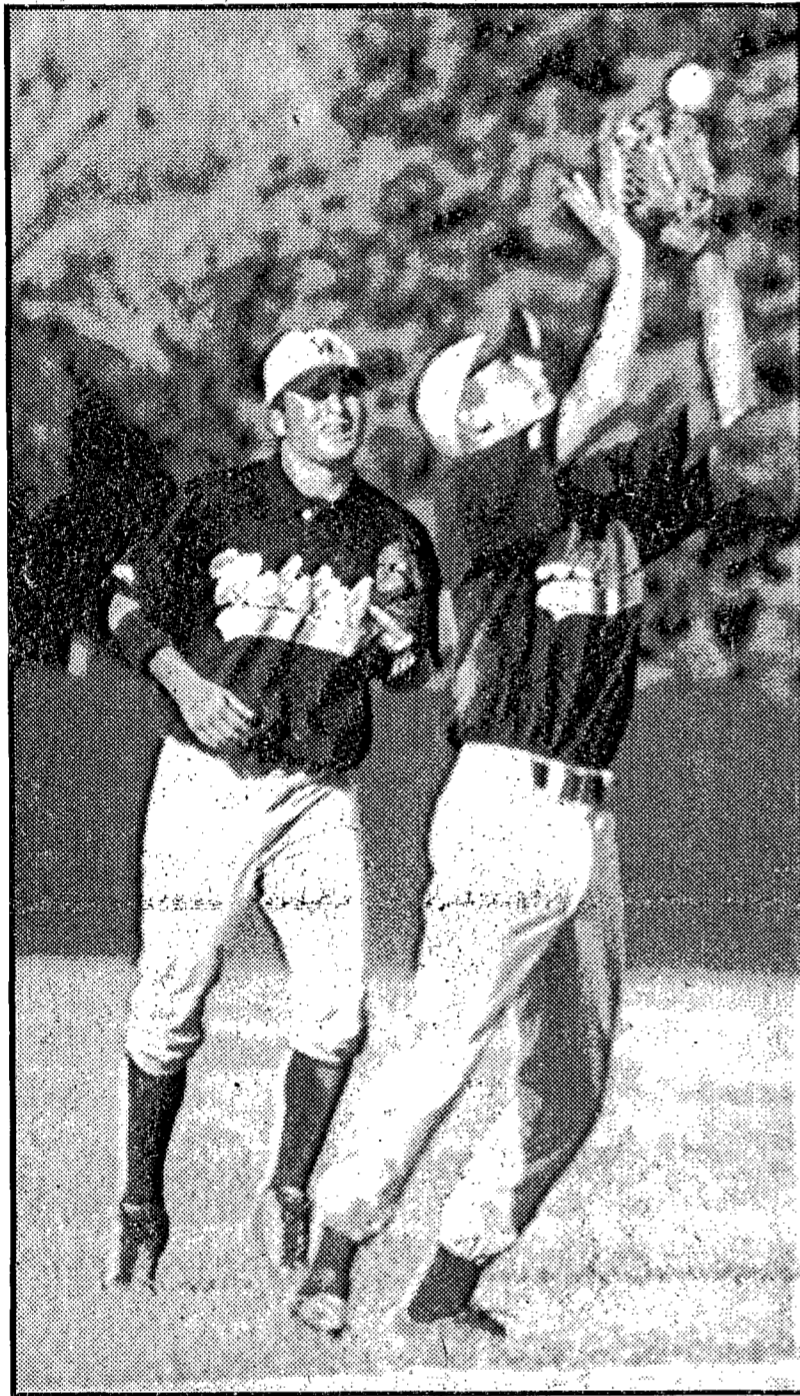
Wakefield bounced Sutton out of the tournament with an 8-2 victory as Todd McQuistan earned the win in relief of Clint French.

ing in one run with a single.

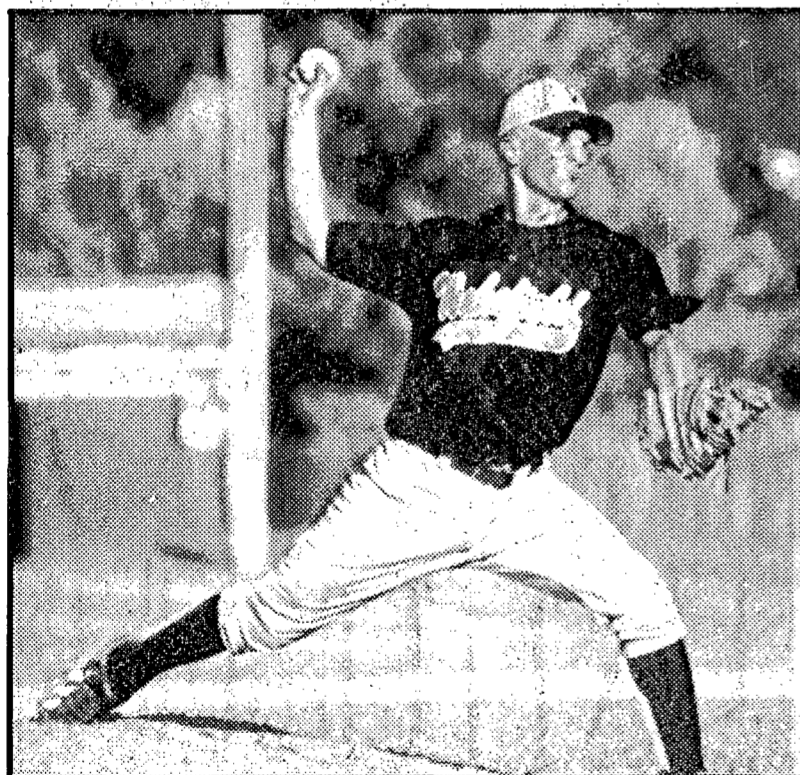
Adam Jorgensen, Shane Baack, Craig Olson, Jayme Bargholz, and Dan Roeber all finished the game with a single apiece.

Wayne saw the same results in the second game of state competition with a disappointing 11-0 loss to Beatrice.

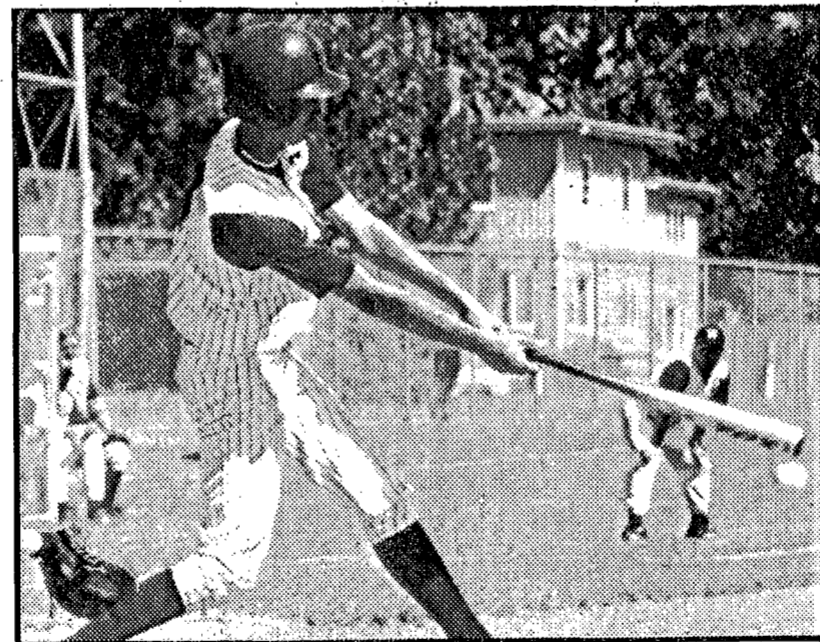
Craig Olson suffered the loss on the mound by going three innings, and scattering four hits.

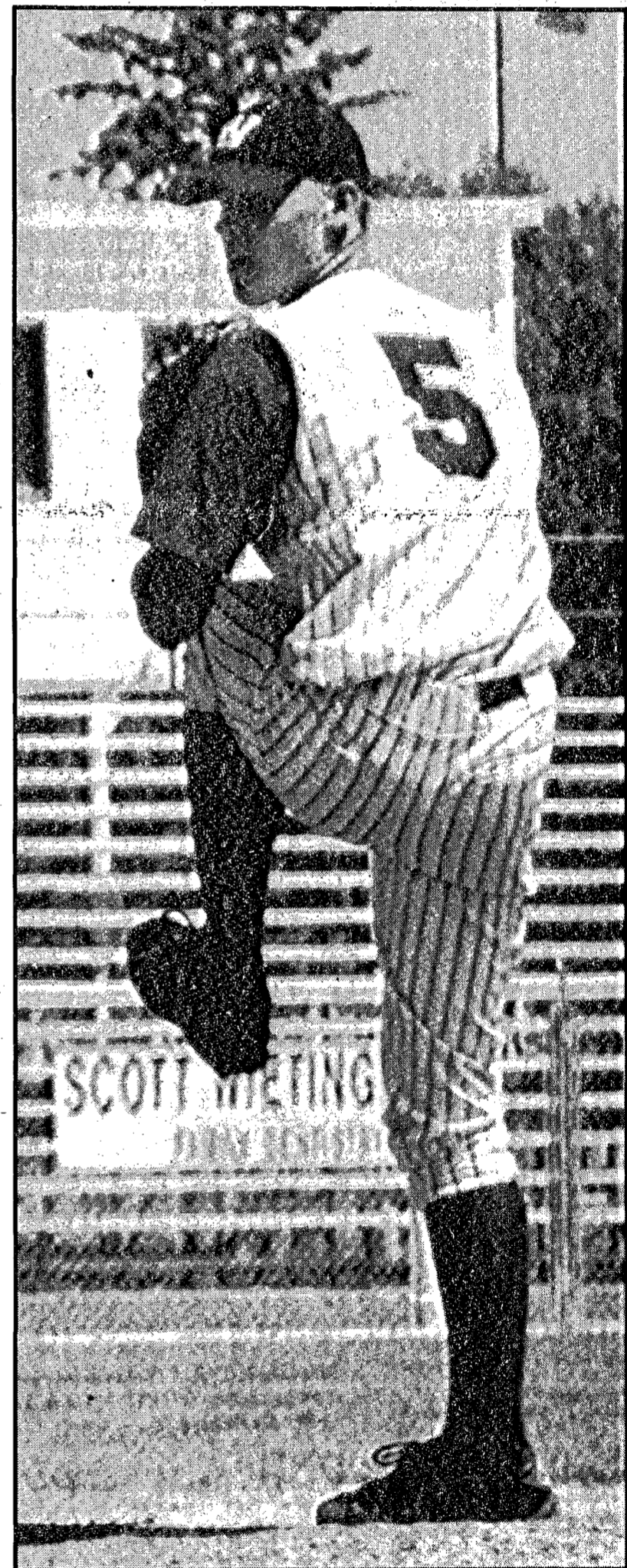

Brad Hochstein looks to deliver a strike against Seward.

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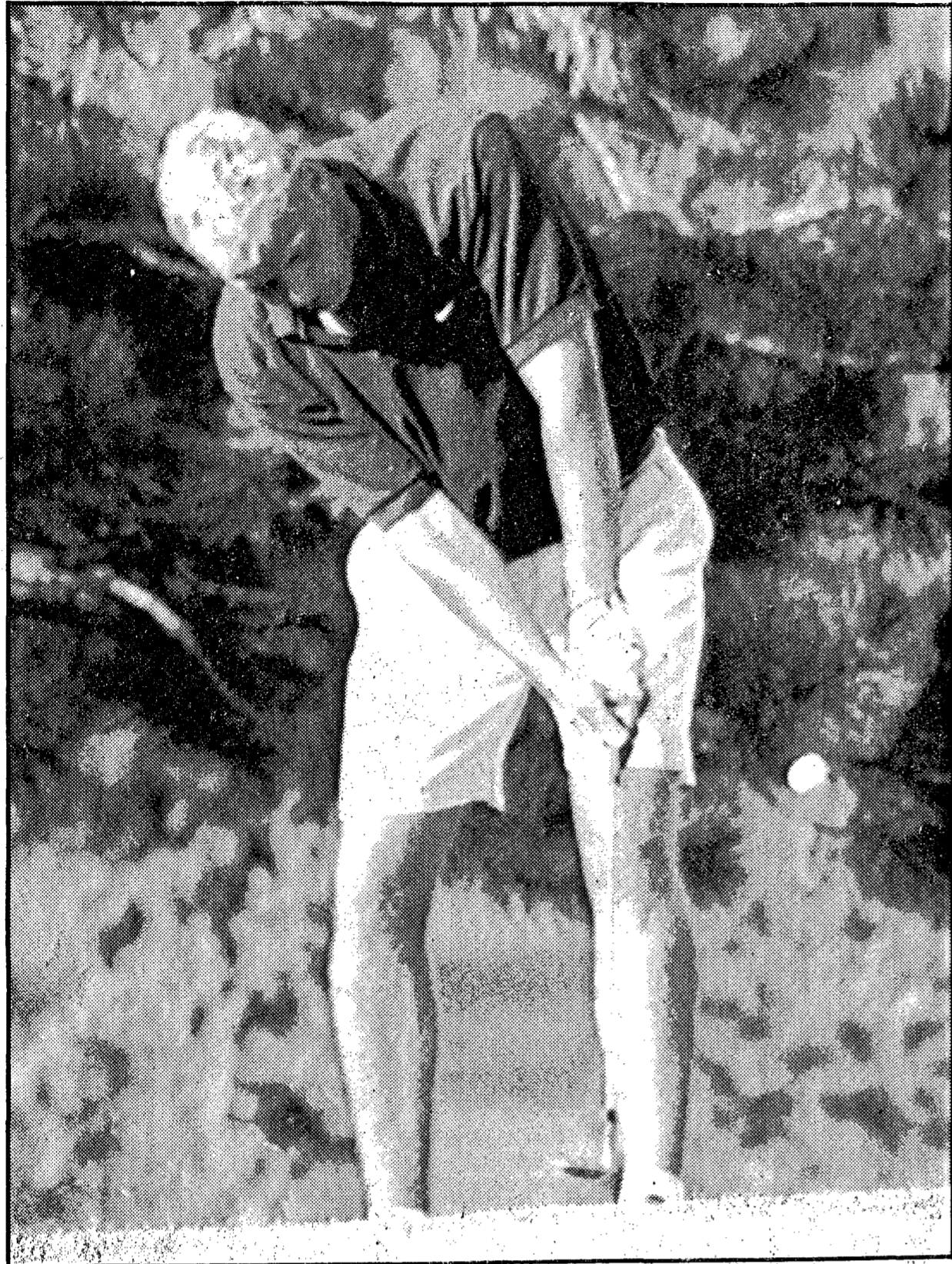

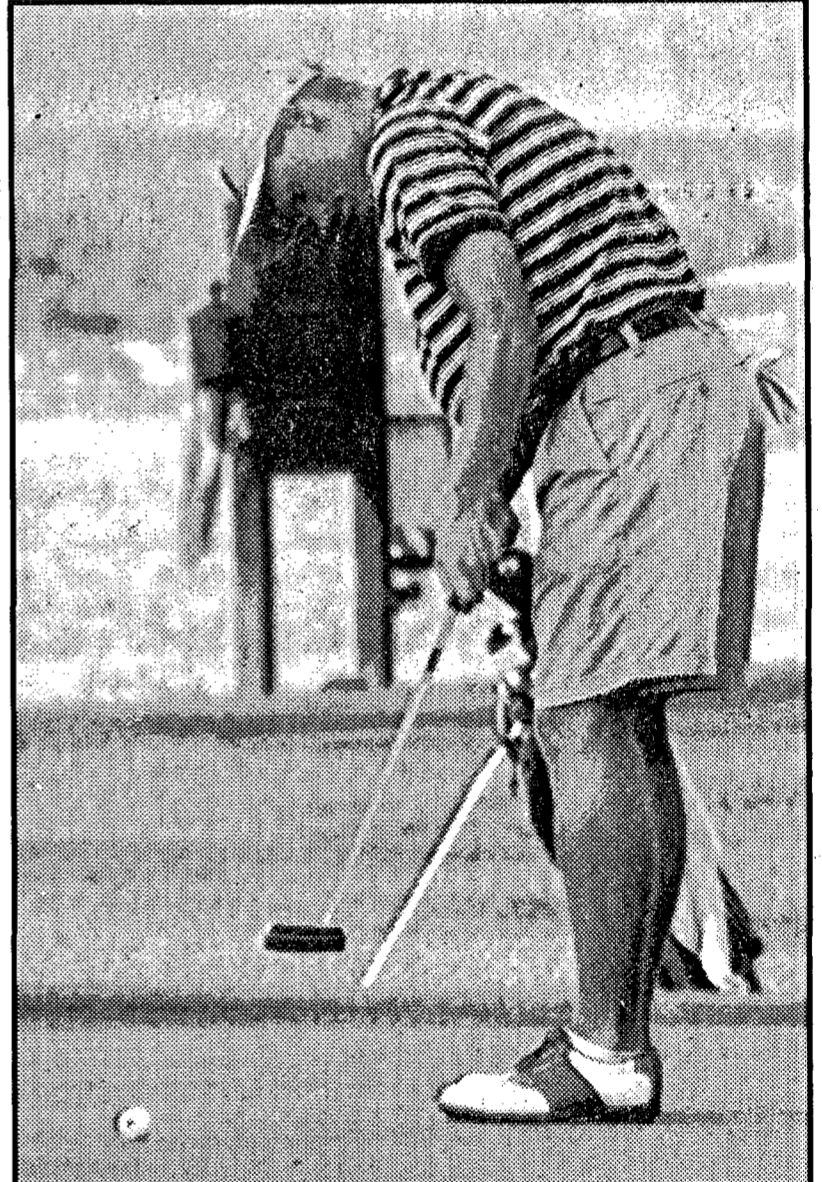

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Cranberry Juice for the Urinary Tract?

A study recently published in *British Medical Journal* seems to confirm what many people believe: drinking cranberry juice may help prevent the return of urinary tract infections (UTIs). This simple preventive measure could reduce the need for antibiotics which may be costly and inconvenient to take.

Young, active, Finnish women who are at risk for repeated UTIs were asked to drink a cranberry juice mixture every day for 6 months. Other women were asked to drink a lactobacillus drink or nothing in particular. On the average the women who drank the cranberry juice mixture were 20% less likely to develop a UTI during the study as compared to the women who did not drink the juice mixture. The study authors concluded that "cranberry juice is a natural food product and readily available. It seems a useful means for self administered prevention of urinary tract infections."

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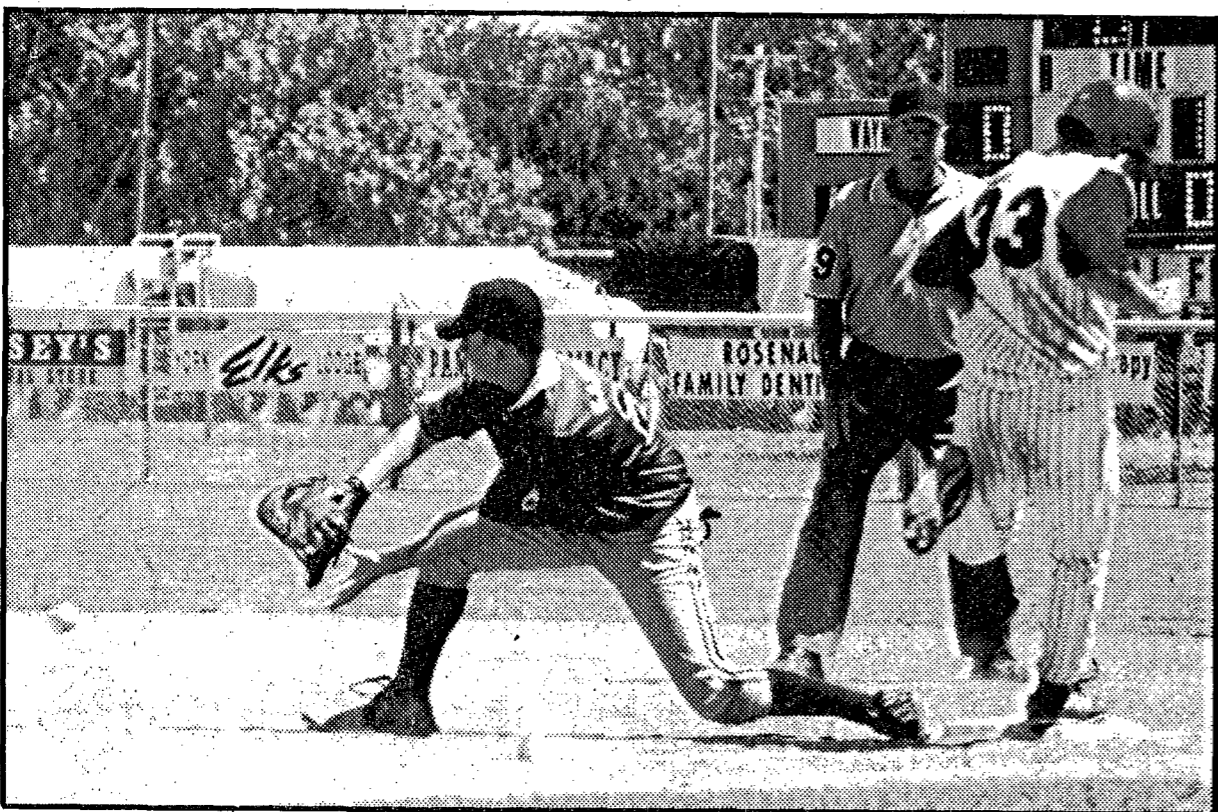
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Students need second MMR shot for school

All students K-12 entering school this fall must show that they have had two doses of vaccine for measles, mumps and rubella, according to the Nebraska Health and Human Services System.

For the last two years, only Kindergartners, seventh graders and transfer students from out of state have been required to show they have had two doses of MMR. The requirement for proof of a second dose is being extended to all students this school year.

With the extension of this requirement, Nebraska rules and regulations regarding immunizations reflect current recommendations from the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

A second dose of vaccine has been shown to be effective in reducing the incidence of measles, said Dr. Richard Raymond, the state's Chief Medical Officer.

"Getting a second dose will ensure that susceptible populations will be protected if a rubella outbreak like Nebraska experienced last year should repeat itself," Dr. Raymond said.

Susceptible populations include high school and college students and immigrants.

Public immunization clinics, local health departments and physicians' offices offer immunizations. For information, call your immunization provider, local health department or community action agency, or call the Health and Human Services System at (402) 471-6423.

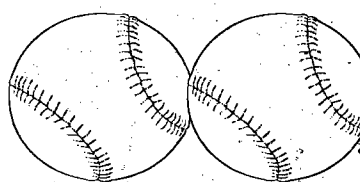


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GOOD NEIGHBOR AWARD

Joan Giese honored with teaching award

Concord native Joan (Erwin) Giese received the prestigious Academy of Marketing Science's 2001 Outstanding Teacher in Marketing Award in May ceremonies in San Diego.

An assistant professor of marketing at Washington State University,

she was chosen for, among other reasons, "demonstrating a dedication to her students through innovative and interesting pedagogical techniques and a high level of enthusiasm in disseminating marketing concepts in the classroom," the AMS noted. That organization, founded in 1971, has more than 1,500 international members and publishes a top academic journal.

"It's nice to know that what you do makes a difference and that it's recognized at that level," Giese said.

The international AMS award is the latest professional recognition for Giese. Previous honors for her teaching include the WSU College of Business and Economics' Outstanding Teaching Award in 1998, Marketing Professor of the Year from the Marketing department in 1997-98, and recognition in Who's Who Among America's Teachers in 2000.

She was nominated for the AMS honor by a graduate student, who applauded Giese's "breadth and depth of knowledge and intellectual motivation that she provided during the semester." Giese "expects students to take an active role in their own learning but facilitates the means to do so by providing adequate background material and an empathy for different learning styles and abilities."

Giese explains that she thinks of teaching as a partnership of sorts between her and each of her students, and she encourages them to take an active role in learning. She frequently teaches at the front of auditoriums packed with as many as 250 WSU juniors and seniors at a time, so facilitating a personalized experience for everyone requires a lot of forethought and planning. In addition, she works with students in one-on-one meetings and constantly checks her Web site where students send her questions, download sample tests, and view online class notes.

Giese also engineers her course

material to bring aspects of the "real world" into the classroom. For example, based on her experiences as a faculty intern with Microsoft a year ago, she created a class project that only gave teams 10-14 days to complete projects where they have to communicate mostly through e-mail and share electronic files—there was deliberately little face-to-face contact. She wanted them to learn that in business, the "quality of information is extremely important, yet deadlines are also very short. Teams are very dependent on each other for getting assignments done, but often, employees are not located in the same place."

Her students got the message. "The project was a great opportunity to try something different, and even more so, it was successful," said one undergraduate marketing major. "Working with people of different business majors was also an eye-opener. Some had the marketing background to take care of the bulk of the information, others had management skills to keep the group running smoothly, still others could do the technical portions of the projects with help from their business information systems major." Giese said she may bump the project to the next level in a future course and ask industry representatives for ways to make the project even more real world, or to provide actual problems for students to tackle.

She is the daughter of Quinter Erwin, of Concord, and daughter-in-law of Mrs. Wilbur (Jeannette) Giese, of Wayne. A 1973 graduate of Laurel-Concord High School, she is married to Shane Giese, a 1973 graduate of Wayne High School. They have two daughters, Lyndee, 16, and Amanda, 14, and have lived in Pullman, Wash., since 1990. She earned her Ph.D. in marketing from WSU in 1995 and has taught in the business college for several years. She became a tenure-track assistant professor of marketing in fall 2000.

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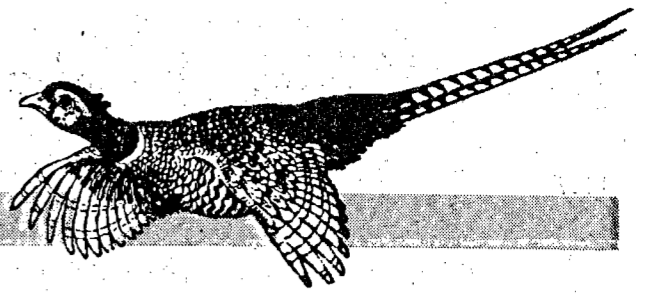

Soybeans entering critical stage of development

Soybean producers should have been notified that this week and next week are critical time frames relative to the impact of soil water deficits on final seed yields of soybeans planted in mid-May of this year on silty clay loam soils, according to University of Nebraska soybean researcher Jim Specht.

"Research over the last 25 years has shown that the most water-sensitive stage in soybean reproductive development is the R3 - R4 stage (begin to end pod elongation), Specht said.

"Vegetative growth essentially ceases by the middle of the R3 - R4 stage. What this means is that no more root or stem growth happens and all available resources go into making the soybean seed. The root network is already developed and will not grow to deeper moisture."

Specht has recommended for the past 15 years that producers with irrigation capabilities irrigate their

soybeans during the 10 to 14-day long R3 - R4 stage with irrigation amounts that return the top four feet back to field capacity (if the top four feet are dry, at two available water inches per foot, you need to apply eight inches over the course of the R3 - R4 stage).

"According to our research, applying water now will yield the most bang for the buck," Specht said. "Treat this soybean R3 - R4 stage with the same importance you would treat your corn tasseling and silking periods."

Nebraska Soybean Board directors are responsible for administering the state's share of the one-half of one percent national check-off on soybeans produced in Nebraska. The funds are invested in research, marketing and promotion projects for soybeans.

Assistance package passed

The United States Senate passed a \$5.5 billion emergency aid package

for the nation's farmers after several days of debate.

The package passed by the Senate represents a smaller aid package than the one approved last year. Senator Nelson supported a larger package, totaling \$7.4 billion, that would have restored the level of assistance to 100 percent of last year.

Opponents were successful at using parliamentary procedures to block the larger package, forcing the Senate to approve the same version adopted in the House of Representatives.

"The package passed today represents a down payment on the commitment we have with America's farmers," said Senator Nelson. "This \$5.5 billion will be immediate assistance and when we get back, it is my hope that the President will work with us to provide the rest of the assistance our farmers need."

Under the version passed, federal assistance to Nebraska farmers will be reduced from last year's total. AMTA payments to Nebraska farmers will be cut by \$59 million, with corn growers alone losing \$50 million. Also, oilseed producers will see a cut of \$4 million from last year's level.

"The goal here is to get farmers 100 percent of their AMTA payments," said Nelson. "The package passed today is 85 percent and we need to address the other 15 percent when we get back."

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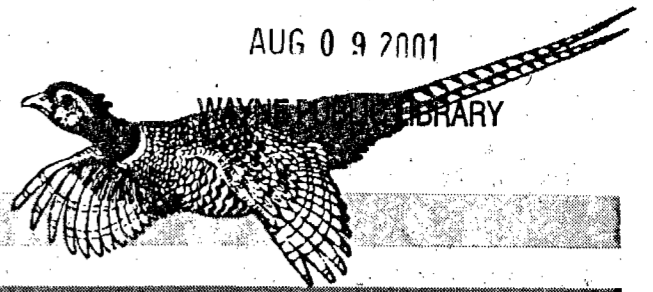

We want them to stay hydrated to stay healthy and prevent heat complications, however, as adults we appeal to their desire to perform well. They will play their best if well hydrated! Here's the "Game Plan":

Two hours before the game or activity drink 2 cups

Fifteen minutes before activity drink 1 to 2 cups

Every 15 minutes during activity drink 1 to 2 cups

After the game drink 3 to 6 cups (or more if hot weather).

What is the best fluid to drink? Cool water is fine for any practice or activity less than two hours.

Then a diluted sports drink or diluted fruit juice is a good choice. A general recommendation is to dilute by adding an equal amount of water to the sports drink or juice.

Here is a sports drink you might want to try.

- Homemade Sports Drink**
1 cup cranberry juice cocktail
1 cup lemonade

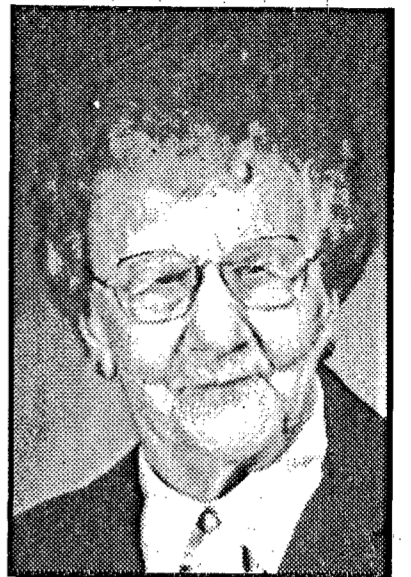

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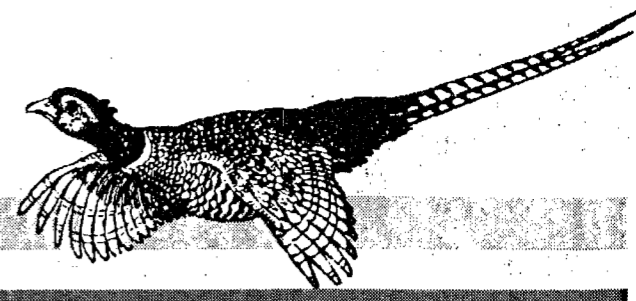

Income guidelines announced

The Nebraska Department of Education's Nutrition Services Office has announced the Income Eligibility Guidelines for free and reduced price meals for persons unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch, Breakfast, Special Milk and Child and Adult Care Food Programs.

Participating schools, child care and adult care centers have a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by an interested party. Local participating agencies of Nebraska child nutrition programs include: Wayne Public School, Wayne; Wakefield Community School, Wakefield; Winside Public School, Winside; St. Mary's School, Wayne; Rainbow World Child Care, Wayne; Allen Consolidated School, Allen; Wakefield Family Resource Center, Wakefield; and Laurel Public School, Laurel.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents, guardians, or adult participants. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school or agency. Additional copies

are available from the school principal or agency administrator. The information provided on the application will be used to determine eligibility and may be verified at any time during the year by school or other program officials.

For the school or agency officials to determine eligibility, the household must provide the following information on the application: names of all household members; social security numbers of an adult household member or a statement that the household member does not have one; total monthly household income by source; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

Children who are members of Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) assistance units or Food Stamp or Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) households are automatically eligible to receive free meals. Participants at adult care centers receiving Food Stamps, FDPIR, SSI or Medicaid are automatically eligible to receive free meals. Households are required to report

increases in household income of more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size or a loss of benefits from Food Stamps, TANF, SSI, or Medicaid or Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR).

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

The same meals will be made available to all enrolled participants regardless of race, color, sex, age, national origin or disability, and there is no discrimination in the course of the meal service. Nonpricing programs provide meals at no separate charge. Pricing programs provide free and reduced price meals to those meeting the approved eligibility criteria. Persons who believe they have been treated unfairly in receiving food services for any of these reasons should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

A chart of household size and income criteria used for determining eligibility is shown. Participants from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.
