Area schools and colleges have begun or will begin classes within the next several days.

At Laurel-Concord Schools in Laurel, classes began today (Aug. 16) Dismissal will be at 2 p.m. with the Tuesday-Thursday kindergartners attending that day. The Monday-Wednesday kindergartners will attend on Friday, Aug. 17.

Normal classes will run from 8:20 a.m. to 3:35 p.m. for first through sixth graders and from 8:20 a.m. to 3:40 p.m. for junior and high school. Classes are dismissed at 2:35 p.m. on Fridays for

the younger students and at 2:37 p.m. for junior and senior high students.

Classes at Allen Consolidated Schools begin Friday, Aug. 17. Classes begin at 8:15 a.m. with a 1:30 p.m. dismissal.

The first full day of classes at Allen will be Monday, Aug. 20 with classes running until 3:35 p.m.

In Winside, classes begin on Monday, Aug. 20 with a full day of classes. Regular classes run from 8:15 a.m. until 3:35 p.m. for elementary students and until 3:43 p.m. for junior and senior high students.

The school is beginning a breakfast program this year and both breakfast

and lunch will be served the first day of school.

In the event of an early dismissal due to heat, an announcement will be made on local radio stations.

Wayne State College begins classes on Monday, Aug. 20 for both day and evening classes.

At Wayne Public Schools, classes also start on Monday, Aug. 20.

Foundation gives grant for school improvements

Wayne Community Board of Education held both a special and a regular meeting Monday night. Richard Metteer, Wayne Middle School principal, informed the board that the Gardner Foundation approved a grant application and gave \$30,565.74 toward a vocational training station for Wayne Middle School.

During the special meeting, a hearing was held on amending the 2000-01 budget. Dr. Joe Reinert, Wayne Schools superintendent, said that because of high energy bills and other unplanned bills, \$76,000 of \$86,000 unused budget authority needs to be accessed. Later during the regular meeting, the board approved accessing these funds.

Also decided during the regular meeting was the hiring of Sharon McQuistan for kitchen staff.

The board approved to raise the price of children's lunch tickets 20 cents for each meal. This decision was made so the school could break even as food costs and salaries have risen. The price of adult lunch tickets was raised last year.

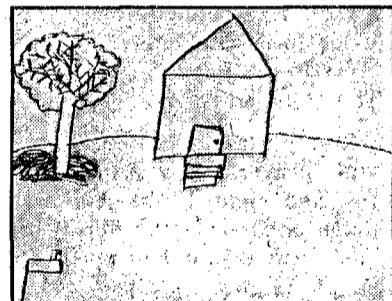

German woman finds Nebraska enjoyable

Julia Niehoff has found a number of similarities between her world in Germany and that of rural Nebraska.

She just completed a three-week stay with the Doug and Mary Temme family as part of the International 4-H Youth Exchange Program.

She is one of three Germans spending time in the United States while two U.S. citizens are in Germany through the same program.

The 25-year old arrived in Nebraska June 23 and spent time with a family in Hershey, Neb. before coming to the Wayne area. During her six-month stay in the United States, she will spend time with a total of seven families, both in Nebraska and Wisconsin.

"In Germany, the 4-H program is for those between the ages of 14 and 30 years of age," Julia said.

Her family consists of her mother, father and two brothers. They live in the village of Bueltum which is south of Hanover in northern Germany.

"My family has a dairy farm and we milk approximately 50 cows. I do not work directly on the farm, but instead



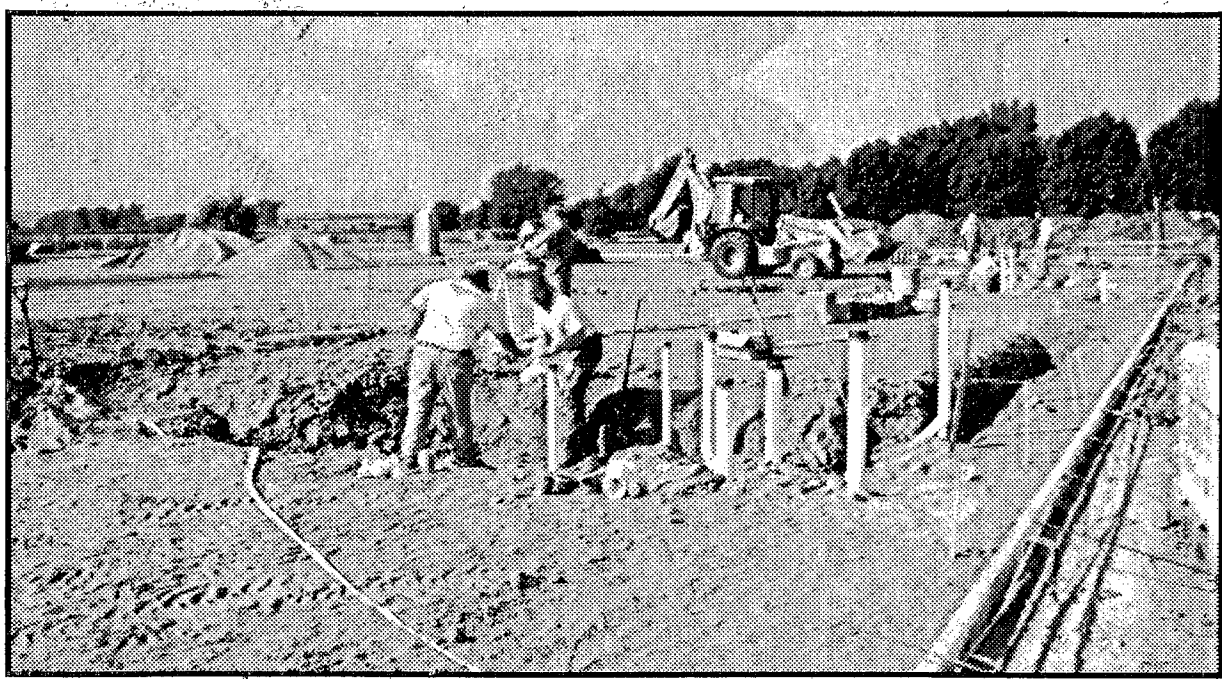
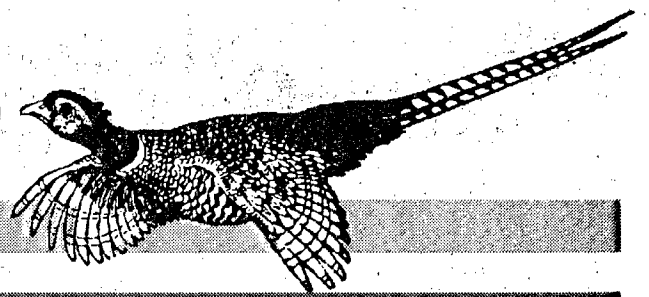

Work has begun on the new fire station in Wayne. Target date for completion of this project is set for around April, 2002. The location is just south of Super 8 Motel.

According to Robert, Woehler, Wayne Fire Chief, the layout of the new building will consist of 10 truck bays to the south, two drive throughs to the north where a wash bay and a test bay will be, a meeting room, kitchen, four bathrooms, firemen's lounge, office, repair room, and decontamination room, chief's room and office with desks for first assistant, secretary/treasurer, president, second assistant, and rescue captain. Presently, there are 38 firemen, two of which are women.

Overall size of the new building will be around 184 square feet by 90 square feet. Work is being done by Craft Construction of Norfolk.

Woehler also notes they will be taking the bell tower from the old fire station to the courtyard of the new station where they plan to

add the names in brick on a wall of all Wayne firemen from the past and present.

Burial was in Greenwood Memorial Park.



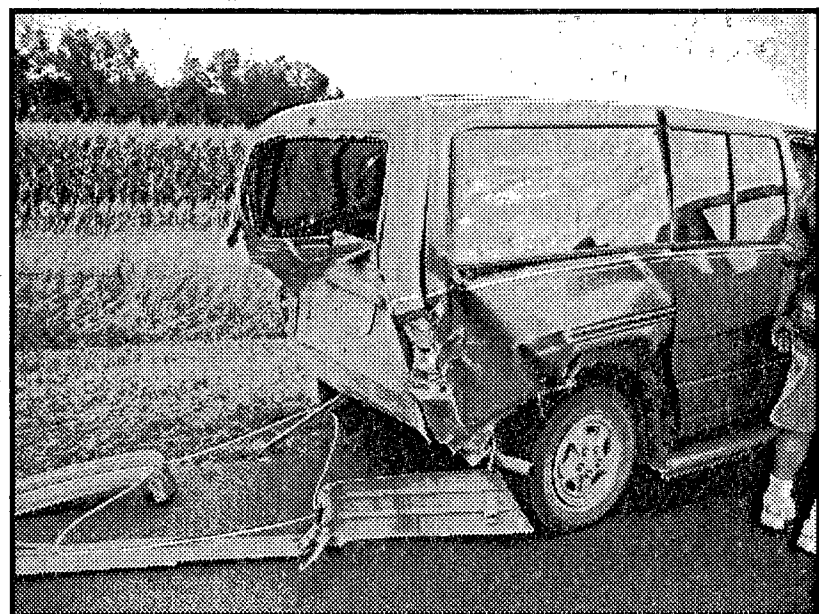
Lynette Lentz

Lentz named WSC registrar

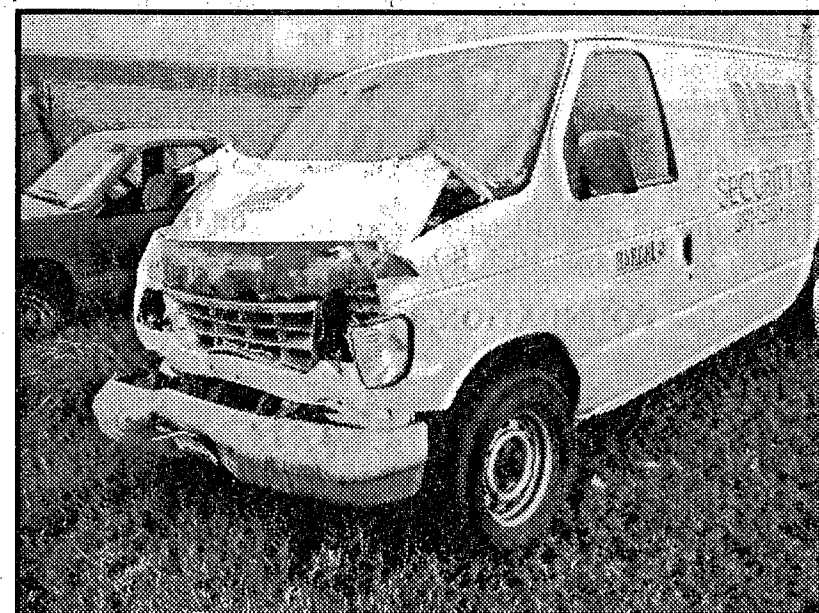

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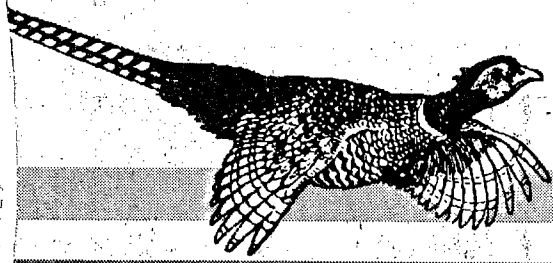
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rules guys wish women would learn

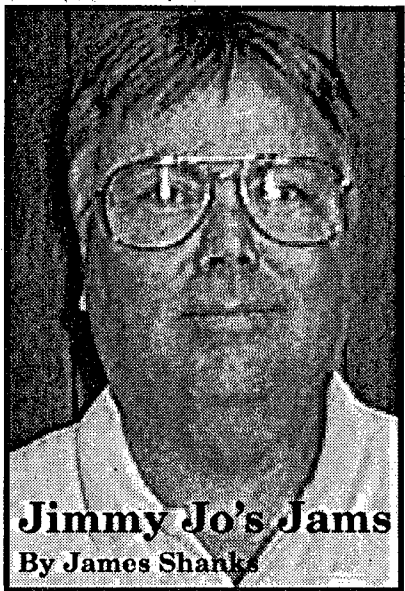
1. If it itches, it will be scratched. We do that.

More on the death penalty

Look for more than the usual, annual debate over the death penalty when the Legislature reconvenes in January.

Yet another issue involving "equal protection" for those facing the ultimate penalty is likely to generate a lot of debate and, possibly, a change in the way death row inmates are sentenced.

When someone is convicted of first-degree murder in a Nebraska district court, the trial judge can do one of two things: Sentence the victim to life in prison or death in the electric chair; or, ask the high court to appoint two more judges to sit with him so that the three-judge panel can decide whether the penalty should be life behind bars or death in the chair.

The latest ruling by the state's highest court held that no death penalty can be imposed by a three-judge panel unless the three judges are unanimous in voting for it.

Figure the odds.

If a district judge decides to handle the sentencing alone, the person convicted of murder has his life-or-death sentence resting in the hands of that one judge. But if there is a panel of three judges, all the defense has to do to avoid the death penalty, is convince one of them that a life sentence would be sufficient.

Even if you are a lousy card player, you can see that you are better off with three cards (so to

speak) than one.

Attorney General Don Stenberg has made an obligatory, and probably fruitless effort, to have the Supreme Court reconsider its decision. His argument, and that of others who don't like the high court's ruling: The judges wrote new law instead of interpreting existing law by deciding that a three-judge panel had to be unanimous. Such a decision, Stenberg

argued, must be left to the Legislature.

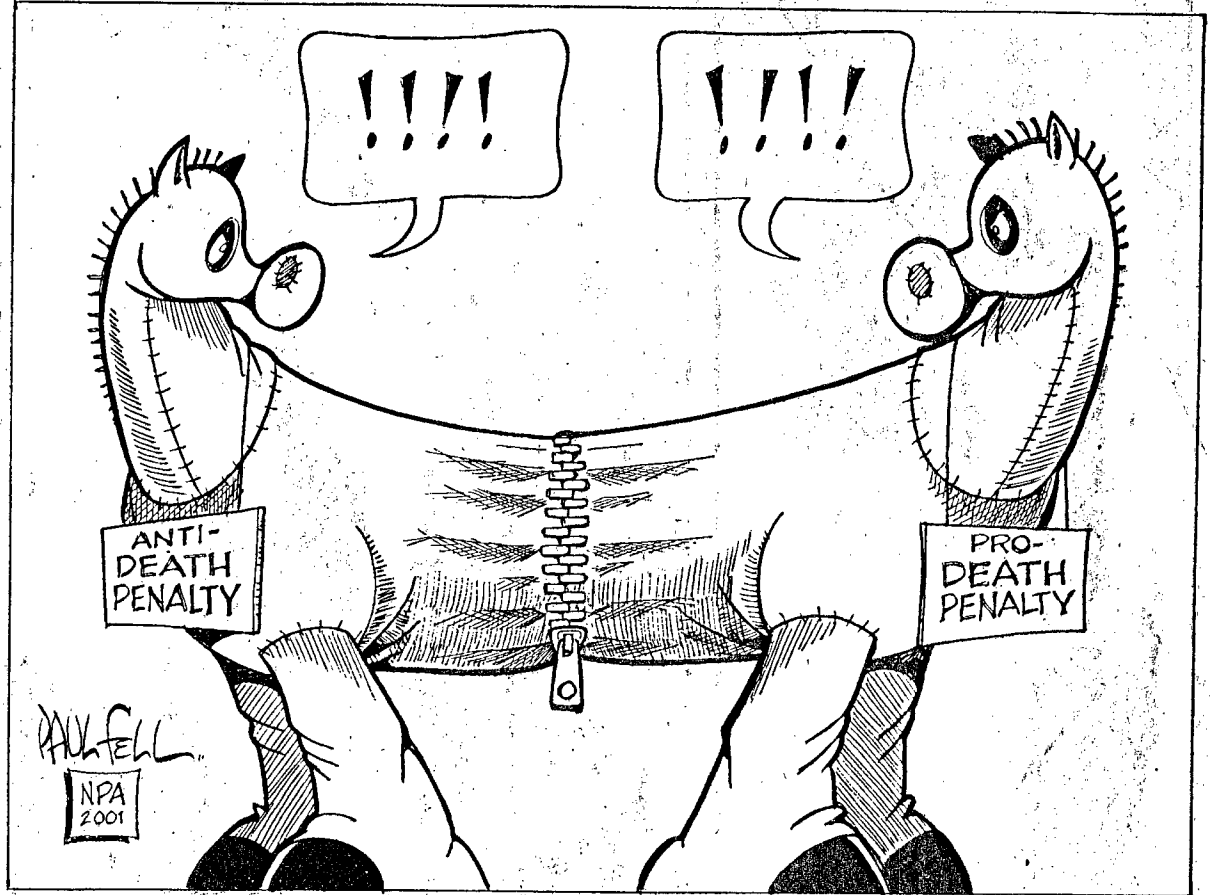
And that takes us to January and the next legislative session.

Chances are overwhelming that lawmakers will be asked to enact a statute that effectively overrules the Supreme Court; a law that says two-out-of-three not only ain't bad, it's enough to impose a death sentence, too.

With a scene thus set, you can

pretty much use your imagination when it comes to the debate to follow.

The decision came in the case of two fellows (Anderson and Hochstein) involved in the murder-for-money of Omaha businessman Ronald Abboud. Interestingly, there are no murder-for-hire cases in Nebraska where the convicted miscreant(s) did not get a death sentence.

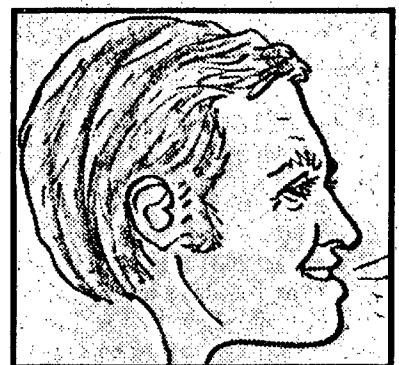


Main Street Focus

Gives tips on selecting P.O.A.

A recent newspaper headline read "With Power of Attorney Comes a Power to Steal..." The article goes on to describe several cases of P.O.A. abuse.

If you as an aging parent, or you are just in the process of making out your will, you should be aware of the 'real' power of a 'power of attorney' and the pain it could cause for you or your family. Here are just a few tips:

1. If you have more than one child, make sure your P.O.A. is divided equally between all children no matter where they may live. (An exception could be medical emergencies). Giving one child more power than another can cause major problems when it comes time to carry out P.O.A. issues. (A non-competent child can be provided for in a will).

2. This may or may not involve P.O.A. but elderly persons should also be aware of possible exploitation by ministers. Churches are finding ever-decreasing memberships and donations, so they are looking toward endowments for funding. Elderly persons are especially vulnerable to their ministers from simple encouragement to

outright exploitation; elderly are signing over enormous amounts of cash, assets and personal property to churches.

To grow old means to have seen and survived a great deal. Old people are tough. In this brutal world, however, they must get tougher. They must recognize themselves as vital, precious resources.

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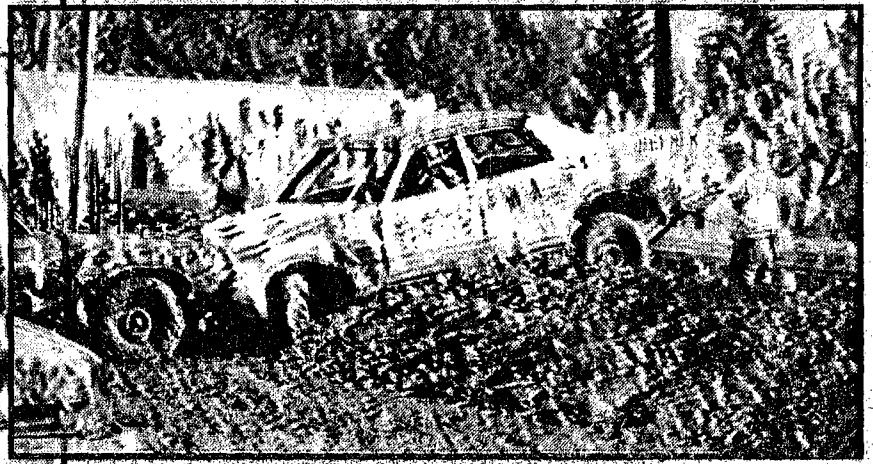
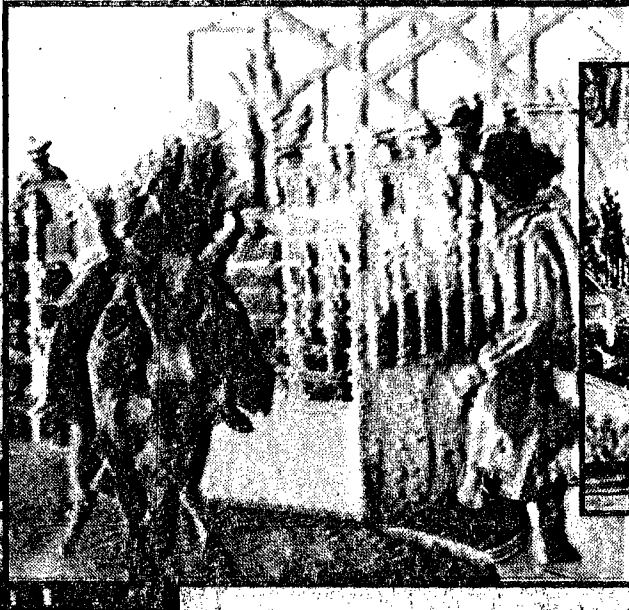
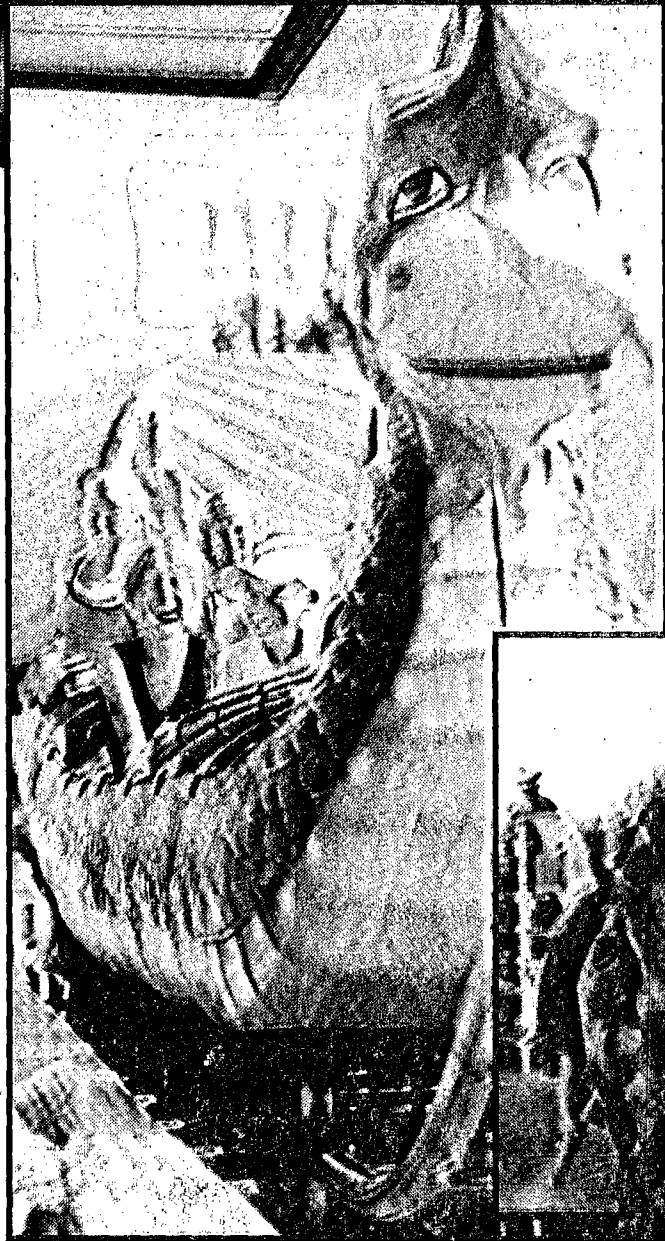

City Council votes to change meeting times

Beginning on Sept. 11, Wayne City Council meetings will begin at 7 p.m. rather than the present time of 7:30.

Council members cited the desire to better serve their constituents with meetings being finished earlier as one of the main reasons for the change.

Ordinance 2001-9 received final approval at Tuesday's meeting. The ordinance will allow for the installation of stop signs at the corners of Eighth and Pearl Streets and Ninth and Pearl Streets. The action comes after a request by a number of property owners in the area at the last council meeting in regard to high speed traffic in the area. The signs will be installed in the near future.

Two ordinances were passed in regard to work to be done on Grainland Road.

Ordinance 2001-10 creates a Water Improvement District for the area between Maple Street and the east edge of the fairground property, along both sides of Grainland Road.

Ordinance 2001-11 creates a Sewer Improvement District for the same area.

Discussion was held on the condition of the shingles on the roof at the Wayne Public Library and what needs to be done to prevent leakage into the building.

City Administrator Lowell Johnson said he has been in contact with the architect of the building and that the city's attorney would be sending a letter to the firm with a list of concerns. It is hoped that something could be done with the problem yet this year.

In other action, the council set a public hearing date of Tuesday, Sept. 11 at 7:35 p.m. to discuss classifying certain roads around the city of Wayne.

Public Works Superintendent Vern Schulz said the classification is necessary for the city and the county to become eligible for state

funding assistance for work to be done on the roads.

Among the roads involved are Grainland Road for which work

has already been scheduled and Country Club Road.

The council's next meeting will be Tuesday, Aug. 28 at 7:30 p.m.

WSC professor dies

Andre Sedriks, Director of the Theatre program at Wayne State College, died Sunday, Aug. 12 in an Omaha hospital.

He was life-flighted there on Saturday suffering heart failure.

Sedriks, 60, was born in Latvia in 1941. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Kansas and his doctorate degree from Southern Illinois University.

He came to Wayne State in 1985 as a professor and member of the fine arts faculty and named Director of the Theater program.

"Andre was a very creative person with a lot of heart," said Wayne State College President Dr. Sheila Stearns.

She cited as an example that when one of the lead characters in a play directed by Sedriks earlier this year, Patrick Reichenbach of Lincoln, was killed in an auto accident south of Wayne, Sedriks established a memorial scholarship in Patrick's name.

In addition, Sedriks presented this year's annual children's play, "The Honorable Urashima Taro," in memory of Patrick. Reichenbach had been cast for a part in the play prior to his death.

Sedriks had been in charge of the Children's play for 17 years where he has worked closely with a number of others, including Janet Roney.

"Andre Sedriks was a much-respected and beloved Professor of Humanities at Wayne State for the last 17 years. This is a tremendous loss to his family of course, but also to his friends and colleagues, to his students and to our theatre program. He will not be forgotten, and he will be missed," Dr. Stearns said.

"He was a really significant cultural leader in the region," Dr. Stearns added.

Sedriks is survived by his wife, Joanne; one daughter, Baiba who currently lives with her mother after spending a year in Japan; and two sons, Alexander of Austin, Texas and Zem and his wife Jill of Lincoln. He is also survived by his mother and a sister, both of Canada.

The family has requested that in lieu of flowers, memorials should be directed to the Patrick Reichenbach Memorial Endowed Scholarship through the Wayne State Foundation.

A private, family service was held in Lincoln this week with a campus memorial to be held at a later date.

work on what would be similar to a farmer's market," Julia said.

She said that her job entails taking care of the grounds around the facility, preparing for the customers who eat in the restaurant portion of the market and other jobs related to the selling of the produce, wine and other goods available.

She stated that she has had apprentice training in Home Economics following her schooling. This training involved gardening and working with fruits and vegetables as well as flowers.

Julia has traveled to the United States before. In 1994 she and her grandparents visited relatives in Wisconsin. Julia served as an interpreter on that trip as she has taken nine years of English during her schooling.

Among her favorite activities while her in Wayne, Julia said the Wayne County Fair was on the top.

"We have shows for dairy cattle, beef or other animals and each year some group, such as the volunteer firemen, have a celebration,

but we do not have all the animals and the carnival together," she said.

Another favorite activity has been to look at the landscape in this part of Nebraska.

"You have corn fields that never end," she said.

A major goal of her trip to the United States is to share with those she visits the lifestyle of her home and to get to know about life in the United States.

When making comparisons, Julia stressed that she could not compare life in larger cities in Germany, but rather with the rural life she is accustomed to.

"Here in Nebraska, people watch more TV than in Germany. At home, we watch the news, which begins at 7 or 8 p.m. and then possibly a movie, but that is all," she said.

The temperatures in Nebraska vary more than those in Julia's village.

"It is warmer here in the summer and colder in the winter," she said.

She stated that agriculture, while similar in many ways, is more intense in Germany. This is due, in part to the fact that the

farms are generally smaller in Germany, but farmers still need to make a living.

Travel is also not as common in Germany as in parts of the United States. Gasoline is often three times more expensive there than in the U.S.

The Temmes said that having Julia as part of their family has not resulted in changes in the routine. They said they became familiar with the Exchange program a number of years ago, as both Mary's brother and sister have visited other countries through the program.

"Anyone interested in hosting a student through this program can do so by contacting the local Extension office for information. It has been a good experience for our family," Mary said.

Julia said that in regard to food, "everything is different. There is lots of different food here and I keep trying new things."

When Julia returns to Germany, she plans to continue working with her family's dairy farm and hopes to someday own her own farm similar to the one she works on at the present time.

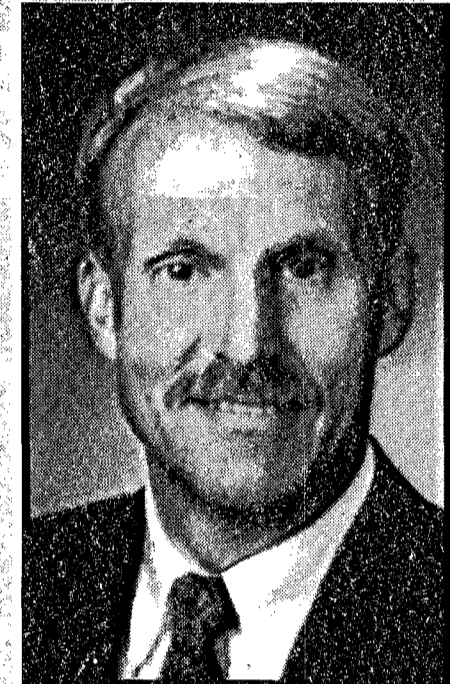

Protect yourself from the sun

Fishing during this time of year can be a hot proposition. There are still fish to be caught, you just have to work harder for them!

Those anglers that fish in the heat of the summer face several problems that anglers who fish during the spring and late fall don't face.

Anglers that fish during this time of year need to worry about over exposure to the sun. The reflection of the sun off the water on your boat magnifies the sun, and can burn you to a crisp in short order. Too much sun leads to severe sunburn and possibly skin cancer.

I know, you've heard it before, so had I and I used a little sun screen, but worried about getting it on my line and lures.

Well, you've got two choices, you can go without sun screen, hoping to catch a few more fish and take the chance of getting skin cancer, end up shortening your life or you can use sun screen, maybe catch a few less fish, prevent skin cancer and be able to fish 10 to 20 years longer!

Over the years, I've spent a lot of time on the water and in the field, thinking that it couldn't happen to me.

Well folks, I'm here to tell you, it can happen to anyone. Less than a month ago, I had a sizable piece of my lower lip and the inside of my mouth removed because of skin cancer.

I've had this spot on my lip that from time to time would crack open and become chapped when I was in the sun for an extended period of time.

While having a physical at the Sioux Falls V.A., I had them check it and it came back as cancer.

It never hurt, and it was just a chapped lip, no big deal. Well, it was a big deal and thankfully the doctor caught it in time and we got it taken care of before it became a bigger problem.

Skin protection is important, anything that is exposed to the sun for an extended period of time can develop skin cancer.

There are sunscreens on the

market now that are scent free, and can be used by both the fishermen and hunter without fear of alarming fish and game.

The higher the SPF, the better! I now use a "No Ad SPF 45" sunscreen on my arms, face and legs. I reapply it several times a day because I sweat heavily when I'm in the sun. Sun screen that is running down my face isn't going to protect me.

There are many sun screens on the market that are supposed to be waterproof. Don't be fooled into thinking that when you're out swimming or on the water that you only need to apply it once and forget it.

Scientific tests indicate that there aren't any sun screens that won't be washed off or its efficiency reduced by water or sweat. If you use a so called water proof sun screen, reapply it several times during the day, especially if you're in and out of the water.

I use "Blistex DCT SPF 20" or "Ultra Protection 25" on my lips and I use it often. It not only prevents chapped sunburned lips, its protection can help prevent cancer!

Too much of anything isn't good, especially exposure to the sun, if you don't use sunscreen.

Enjoy the outdoors, but be sure to take precautions against over exposure to the sun.

Take the time to apply sunscreen and protect yourself from too much sun.

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Herbs for Health

Effects of Pennyroyal Oil
Unpredictable and Dangerous

A report in the medical journal *Pediatrics* describes the poisoning of two infants following ingestion of pennyroyal oil in certain herbal teas. Such teas may be used as home remedies, proving that all things *natural* are not *safe*. One infant died with liver failure, brain swelling, and nerve damage. The other infant developed liver problems and had seizures. The blood of both infants tested positive for *pulegone* and its metabolite, *menthofuran*, both poisonous constituents of pennyroyal oil.

Pennyroyal oil is present in two mint family plants (Labiatae). One species (*Hedeoma pulegioides*) grows in the northern and eastern U.S. and Canada. Another species (*Metha pulegium*) grows in Europe. Oil is extracted from the leaves and flowering tops of these plants and has found use as a home remedy — especially to induce delayed menses. The *Lawrence Review of Natural Products*, an authoritative reference on herbs, notes that pennyroyal's effects are "unpredictable and dangerous." One woman is known to have died after losing kidney and liver function after ingesting about one ounce of the oil.

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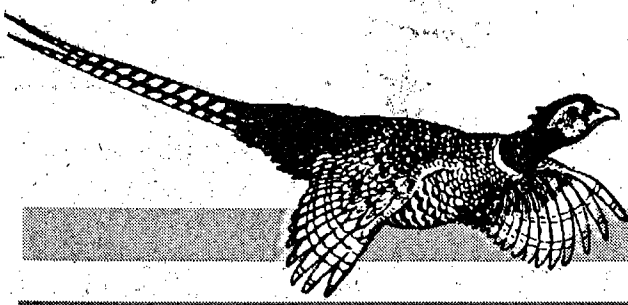


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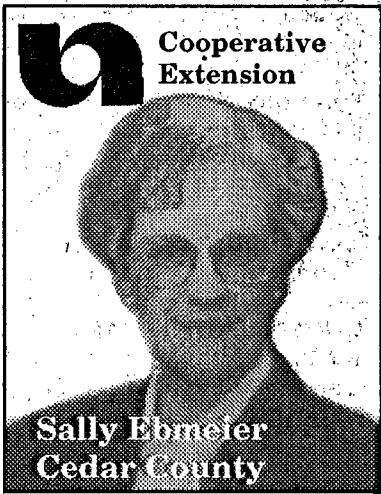

In fact, almost all the energy used by clothes washers and dishwashers is for heating the water. So, what's the best way to reduce this energy? The answer is, to reduce the amount of hot water you use, which will save money, too!

In the laundry room, energy efficiency begins at the pre-wash stage. Pretreating or presoaking stains and heavy soils before washing will help assure that stains will be successfully removed in one wash cycle.

Read and follow directions carefully for all laundry products. Start with the recommended amount of detergent. With hot water, larger loads or heavily soiled clothes, it may be necessary to use slightly more. Check the washing machine instructions to

Wash a full load, but don't overload the washer. Match the water level to the load size, which means that smaller loads should use lower water level setting. Generally, the best water temperature choice for cleaning and energy savings is a warm water wash

and cold water rinse setting. Use a high-speed spin, or set the machine to repeat the spin cycle, to help reduce the drying time for highly absorbent items, such as towels and sweatshirts.

In the dishwasher, heating the water accounts for about 80 percent of the operating cost. Running the dishwasher, heating the water accounts for about 80 percent of the operating cost. Running the dishwasher half full, or overloading so that the dishes don't come clean and need to be rewashed — just waste energy.

If cleaning results are unsatisfactory, a too-short cycle is a waste of hot water and detergent. For maximum cleaning efficiency, water temperature should be at least 130 degrees F (54.4 C) in the dishwasher. Many newer dishwashers have heat boosters to ensure the correct temperature. If your washer does not have a booster, set your water heater at mid-range or 140 F (60 C).

Avoid energy-wasting work. In the case of dish washing, this means that pre-rinsing dishes wastes water is unnecessary. Excess food particles should be scraped off. The dishwasher will do the rest of the work.

If the dishes remain soiled after cleaning, there are several possible culprits. Overloading is a common one. It prevents proper water circulation, which, in turn, prevents proper cleaning. Check the user's manual for the dishwasher manufacturer's recommendations for loading. In general, the heavily soiled side of each item should face the source of the water spray at the center of the tub. Large items should not shield small ones. Cups, bowls and glasses should be positioned with bottoms facing upward.

Match the dishwasher cycle to the type of load and the amount of soil on the dishes. Using a 'light soil' cycle requires the least amount of water.

Always use automatic dishwasher detergent. Any other type will cause oversudsing and possible damage to the appliance. Use the amount recommended on the detergent container and in the dishwasher's user manual. Adjust as recommended for the amount of soil, water hardness and load size.

Finally, don't forget that the dishwasher has a filter. Cleaning this filter when necessary will help keep the dishwasher in top operating condition.

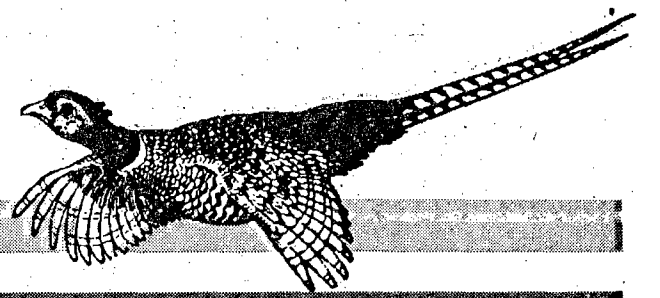

Pastor jumps to raise funds

congregation's sponsorship.

I called, interviewed with Harry Mills; and before I knew it, I was checking heights, weights, teeth, and eyes in four K-12 schools. After 20 years in a hospital, it was quite an experience. And, most of it was enjoyable, even though the screenings got tedious. I loved almost all the students, and I met some wonderful teachers and administrators. As a patron, I got an entirely different view of schools. And, I was much more empathetic as a result. I have to admit, though, that after four years I missed the hospital, bad hours and all, and I went back. But, I've always believed it would be a great schedule for someone who runs a bed and breakfast.

Privacy and confidentiality are the Biggies. There are students on ventilators, some with feeding tubes, and others with tracheotomies. There are 32 separate languages. There is a SCIP team: school community intervention program for students having problems with alcohol or other drugs. Some have had MAT training, which teaches how to subdue students who are violent. There are sleeve guards to wear when working with biters. There are full time officers on duty. Unfortunately, it's the world we live in. My respect for teachers and all school personnel has escalated again. Again, I've been rudely awakened to reality. One of the speakers did take time to tell us to walk around the school and attend a concert or an athletic event, just to remind ourselves that the majority of the students come from supportive environments. They are there to learn, and are taking advantage of opportunities. But I guess this will be a new chapter in my professional life. We'll see.

Hunter education instructor honored

William Wilson, and John Bruna, both of Wayne, and Charles Mahler of Allen, all District III hunter education instructors, were recently recognized by Nebraska Game and Park Commission with 20 year awards. Wilson has taught hunter education classes 29 years, Bruna has taught hunter education classes for 20 years, and Mahler has taught hunter education classes for 22 years. In 1976 a law was enacted that made it mandatory for young hunters ages 12-16 years to pass a certified hunter education course before they could hunt. The backbone of Nebraska's hunter education program is the large group of volunteers who instruct the classes and make the program work. Mike Streeter, Nebraska's Hunter Education Coordinator, says 4,047 volunteers have taught hunter safety classes since 1976. He credits those instructors and their efforts with

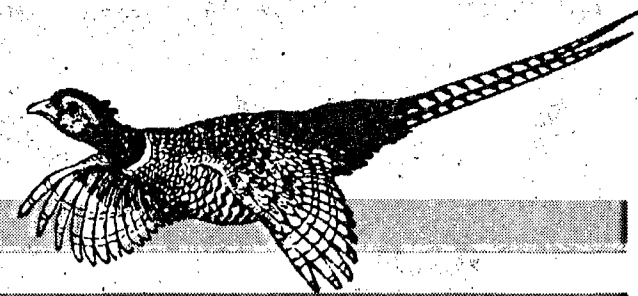
making the program a success. Today there are nearly 1,200 active volunteers across the state. Streeter said that each year volunteer instructors donate some 17,000 hours of their time and a considerable amount of effort in reaching almost 8,000 students to insure that hunting remains safe and a part of the culture of Nebraska. So far in the history of this program more than 207,608 students have successfully completed the hunter education course. "To show the volunteer instructors how much they mean to us and how important they are to the future of hunting and the future of the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, each year we present awards for 5, 10, and now 20 years of service." A total of 75 instructors received the 20-year award, a Schrade Uncle Henry Golden Spike hunting knife with the Game and Parks logo and "Nebraska Hunter Education Program 20 years of service" etched on the blade.

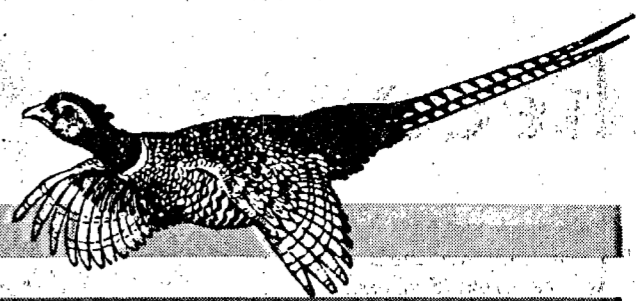
