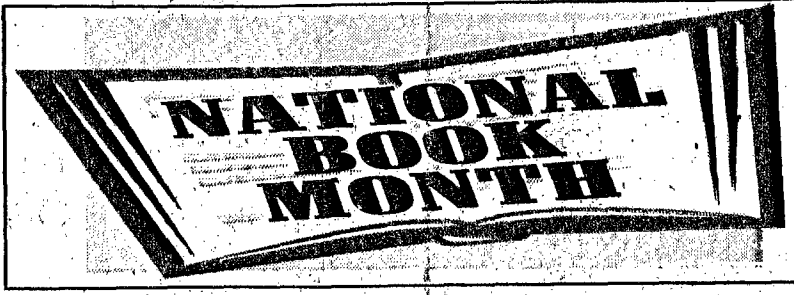

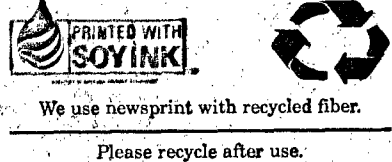

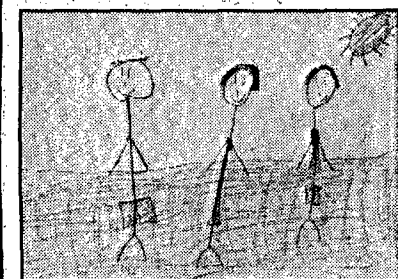

Wayne County voters go to polls

Forty-two percent of the eligible voters in Wayne County turned out for Tuesday's primary election. This percentage was considerably higher than the state-wide average.

A total of 2,365 of the county's 5,587 eligible voters cast ballots in this year's election. Turnout was highest in the Winside and Chapin/Hancock precincts where 63 percent of the voters voted. The lowest percentage of voters voting was in the City of Wayne's First

Ward where 27 percent of those eligible voted.

In the Winside School District, 76 percent of voters voted in favor of overriding the property tax limit. The vote was 341 in favor and 103 against.

In county races, Republican Incumbent County Sheriff LeRoy Janssen defeated challenger Robert McLean by a vote of 1,152 to 579.

Debra K. Allemann was the winner in the Republican race for Clerk of the District Court. She received 604 votes. Other candidates and their vote totals included Shannon M. Johnson (411),

Sheryl Connolly (337), Judith Williams (289), DiAnn Kenny (57) and Dee A. Fallesen (47). Allemann will face Democrat Patrica Wheeler in the November General election.

In the race for County Treasurer, Republican Incumbent Karen McDonald defeated Joni Tietz by a margin of 1,152 to 579.

In the City of Wayne, Incumbent Mayor Sheryl Lindau will face Ken Jorgensen in the November election. Lindau received 688 votes to Jorgensen's 393 votes. Randall S. Pick received 40 votes.

In Wayne City Council Ward 2, Betty Reeg received 175 votes; Melvin Utecht, 72 votes and Kathryn Berry, 54 votes. Reeg and Utecht will face each other in the November general election.

On the state level, Republicans in Wayne County chose Governor Mike Johanns as their choice for governor by a margin of 1,462 to 245 over Robert J. Wicht. On the Democratic ticket, Stormy Dean received 269 votes to Luis R. Calvillo's 82. Johanns and Dean will face each other in November.

WSC awarded biomedical research grant

Wayne State College will be awarded \$350,000 over the next three years thanks to the Biomedical Research Infrastructure Network (BRIN).

The BRIN grant provides funding for Wayne State sophomores and juniors to conduct biomedical research at the University of Nebraska Medical Center, Creighton University or the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Wayne State College has received \$124,000 for 2001-02, and will receive \$107,000 for 2002-03 and \$117,000 for 2003-04. Of the \$124,000, an estimated \$90,000 will be spent on lab equipment and supplies. WSC will receive "cutting-edge" lab equipment pertaining to the areas of functional genomics, proteomics and bioinformatics.

More equipment will be purchased in years two and three of the BRIN project. The BRIN grant may be available for renewal during the 2004-2005 school year for another three years.

While the research may be geared toward biomedics, the new lab equipment will be available to all faculty and students involved in all areas of science. "We're getting students excited about doing research in biomedicine," Percy said. "We're not talking about training medical doctors, who are going to see patients. It's more aimed at drug therapy, gene therapy and limb reattachment."

In her 'spare' time, Mrs. Bennett and her husband,



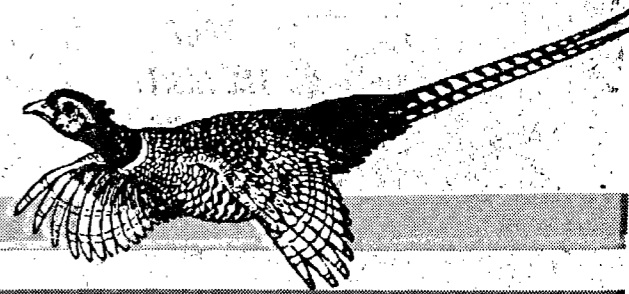
Fauneil Bennett, center, visits with members of the TeamMates group during Tom Osborne's visit to Wayne.

Marcle Ring

Marcle Dale Ring, 84, of Chicago, Ill. died Saturday, May 11, 2002 in Chicago.

Marcle Dale Ring, son of Wallace and Laura Ring, was born Dec. 19, 1917 at Wakefield. He graduated from Wakefield High School in 1934. On Oct. 21, 1941 he enlisted in the Army. He served in the European and Asian War zones during World War II until his discharge on Jan. 20, 1946. On Sept. 1, 1946 he married Minnie Denkinger at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Wayne. The couple lived in the Chicago area most of their married lives. He received a 1st Class radio license in 1946 and worked as an electronics inspection engineer for United Airlines for 10 years. He became the office manager for Burroughs Office Machines when the company installed its first computer. He had his own radio and television repair business.

Survivors include one daughter, Georgeann Ring and one son, Paul and Debbie Ring, all of Chicago, Ill.; three grandchildren and one brother, Merle and Donna Ring of Wayne.

He was preceded in death by his parents and his wife, Minnie on Feb. 19, 1994.

Calvin Grunke

Calvin Louis Grunke, 78, of Ainsworth, died Saturday, May 5, 2002. Services were held Wednesday, May 8 at Hoch Funeral Home in Ainsworth with the Rev. Galen Wray officiating.

Calvin Louis Grunke was born Feb. 6, 1924 in Verdel and grew up in the Wayne area. He graduated from Wayne Prep High School and attended Wayne State Teachers College. During World War II he began construction work, building the Air Force Training Station in Ainsworth. Following World War II he worked as a construction foreman during the reconstruction of the air fields in Okinawa and Guam. After his marriage to Jeanne Fournier in 1954, he was a rancher in the Ainsworth area until his retirement in 1987.

Survivors include three brothers, Clyde Grunke of Ainsworth, Roy Grunke of Norfolk and Jerry Grunke of Sealy, Texas; two sisters, Delpha Hinman and Delores Lindhorst, both of Littleton, Colo.; five nephews and 12 nieces.

He was preceded in death by his parents, wife, Jeanne and three brothers.

Burial was in the Ainsworth Cemetery. Memorials may be made to the Brown County Hospital or to the family in his name.

Evan, are very active with the Wayne County Fair Barbecue. She has helped plan the barbecue for more than 10 years.

One of the testimonials received describes the work Fauneil does in

preparation for each year's barbecue.

"The work begins in late spring when she sends out a large mailing, seeking contributions. In June, she hosts a meeting with the fair barbecue committee and then makes arrangements for contributors to donate money and other items, determines who will cook the 1,500 pounds of meat, solicits volunteers to make beverages, slice buns, set up, serve and clean up."

Dr. Dennis Jensen, Founder and General Manager of Inventive Communications, and former Superintendent of Wayne Community Schools, says of Fauneil, "When it came to children in her care, she not only did her level best to inspire a love of learning in them, but she also had a great love for each child."

She has served on the Education Council of the Wayne Chamber of Commerce, the Wayne Education Association, International Reading Association, Nebraska Educational Technology Association and the Nebraska Educational Media Association.

Mrs. Bennett is a member of Grace Lutheran Church where she is active in several groups and is a member of the Wayne Rotary Club.

"Words that come to mind when speaking of Fauneil are the ultimate professional, child-centered in everything she did and always serving the district. She was always willing to help other staff members. She is very deserving of recognition for her efforts," said Richard Metteer, Middle School Principal.

Keeping her business in Wayne has been a top priority for Kelly Dalglish, owner of "Kelly's Kid Shop," located at 200C Main Street in Wayne (in the basement of Legends). A Wayne native, she likes the small town atmosphere for her store where she carries gently used childrens clothing, baby equipment, toys and more. She also carries a few new items, such as some toys and gift items.

In the line of clothing, she carries newborn to size 16 children's wear, infant blankets and bedding, infant equipment, shoes, "Little Tikes" toys, maternity clothing a few new items plus a lot more. Kelly likes to stick to name brand items, like Graco, Cosco and Evenflo infant equipment, and Old Navy, The

Children's Place, Disney Store, Gap, Carters, and Healthtex clothing.

Starting in March, 2001, Kelly knew she wanted a "kid-oriented" business. "I love children and there wasn't anything like this in Wayne," Kelly said. "I thought it would be a good thing for Wayne."

There is new merchandise added weekly. Kelly buys and sells size 0-16 childrens clothing, maternity clothing, toys and equipment and more.

Merchandise is accepted on Saturdays, and sorted for in-season items that are currently needed.

Common things that are needed are cribs, changing tables, pack n plays, exersaucers, and baby swings. Toys should be clean, not broken or have missing parts.

Equipment must be clean, not ripped and in good condition, Kelly checks guidelines before

accepting equipment, such as if cribs meet government standards for having slats no wider than 2 3/4 inches, and if there are any current recalls. Clothing must be clean, not torn or stained.

Kelly enjoys customers from Wayne, as well as the surrounding towns. Kelly notes they have had customers from all over, some even as far as Tennessee and Florida.

Looking back on Dalglish' background, she graduated from Wayne High School in 1994 and later moved to Sioux City, Iowa where she married Barry Dalglish. They have a 4-year-old son. She works full time at IBP in Dakota Dunes.

Business hours at Kelly's Kid Shop are Mondays, Thursdays, and Fridays, 12:30-5:30, and Saturdays, 11 a.m. - 5 p.m.

People are invited to stop by and take a look. They will see friendly faces and more.

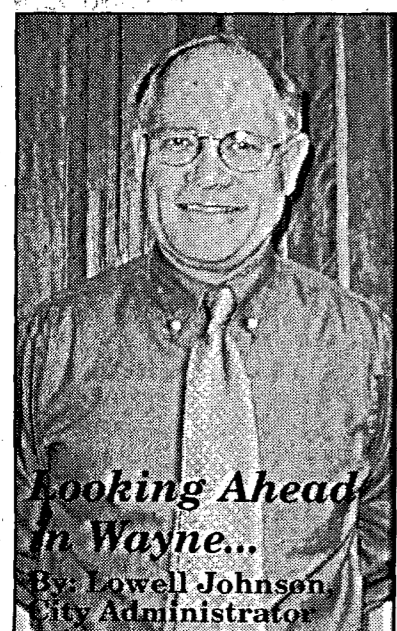

seem boring until you see the outcome. At the May 28 city council meeting, we have scheduled one of those public hearings that are required for council action. The issue at the hearing is a proposal to reclassify sections of streets in Wayne.
The council has established as a future project the paving of the road past the golf course and paving Claycomb Road out to that road to open up a north entrance and exit to Wayne. Wayne also has a \$511,000 allocation of federal gas tax funds back to the city to be used for paving city streets that are collector streets.
Wayne can only use the \$511,000 allocation for Country

All cities in Nebraska are allowed to have up to 20 percent of their streets classified as collectors and eligible for federal funding assistance for paving and storm sewers. Because the Department of Roads has already classified 20 percent of Wayne's existing paved streets as collector and arterial streets, Country Club Road and the Claycomb extension cannot become collector streets unless we give up the same number of blocks of existing classified streets in Wayne.
The city council is proposing to the department of roads that we declassify Sherman Street from Seventh to 12th Streets, 12th Street from Sherman east to Main and 10th Street from Main east to Providence as collector streets and reclassify Country Club Road from Highway 15 east to the bridge and Claycomb from Country Club Road south to 14th Street. Sounds complicated.

The purpose of the public hearing is to inform them of the changes in classification. For those streets being declassified the impact is not noticeable. When those streets are due to be torn out and repaved in the future, the paving will not be reassessed to the property owners because they have been assessed for the initial paving. The \$511,000 allocation will transfer from Wayne to a statewide funding pool if not committed to a project in Wayne by September of 2003.

Tax revenues falling behind

The word came down last week. Revenues from the state tax system still are running below projections. The state's tax take for April fell \$22 million short.

That's more than a little tough, when you remember that the Legislature just made another round of spending reductions, and upped the state sales, income and cigarette tax rates. Those budget and tax policy moves didn't have a chance to take effect before word of the latest shortfall proclaimed that those efforts might not have been enough.

There is nothing for Nebraskans to do now but wait, and wonder whether Gov. Mike Johanns will need to call lawmakers into a special session - after the primary election.

Given the muscle that business flexed the last time out - when corporate income tax policy was on the table - there is no readily apparent reason for people to think that business is likely to be hammered into the "I'll pay some more for the sake of everyone" mode.

There's no need here for a rehash of the state of the treasury. It's a little short. If it gets shorter, the issue of legislative action prior to next January becomes a real one.

But if Nebraska gets a special

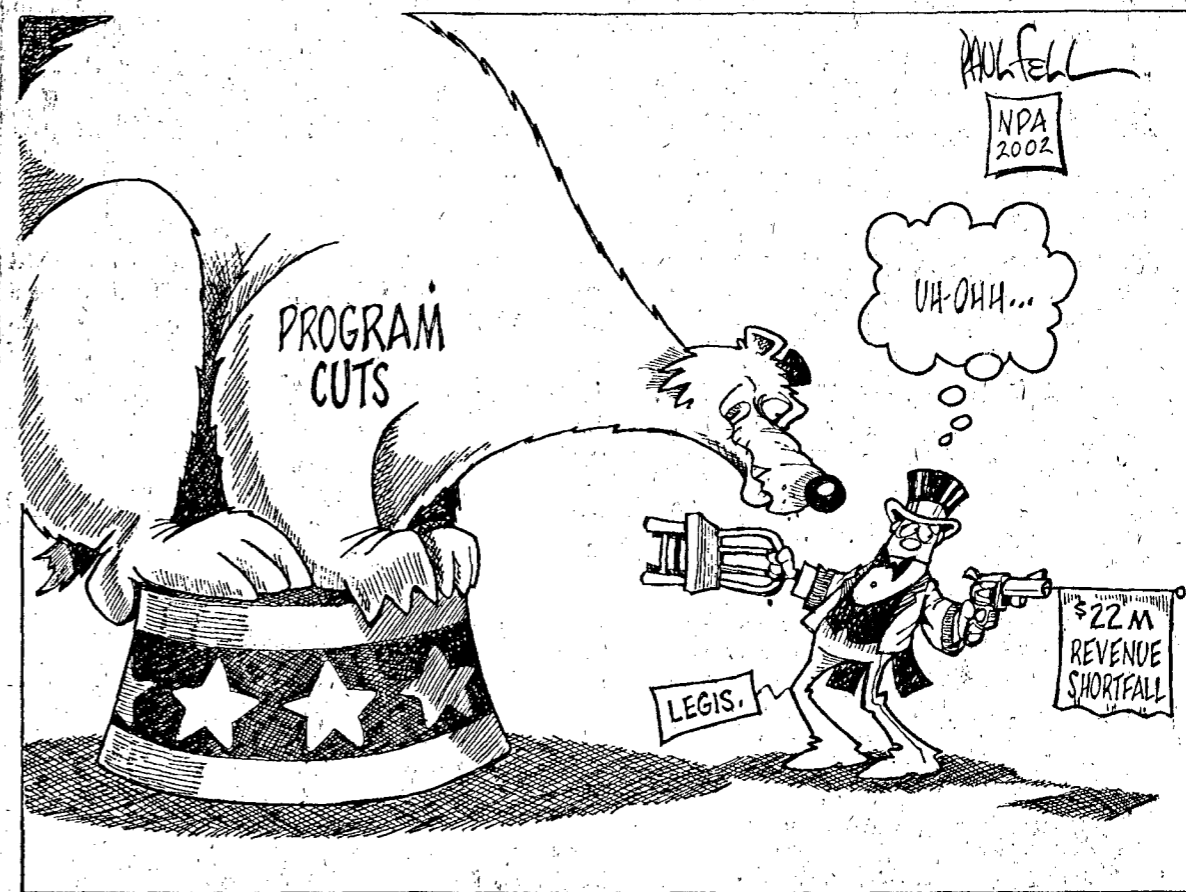
session before January of 2003, stand by for news. The choices will likely be clearer than ever: Increase tax rates again, or begin reducing whole programs.

Just read the feedbacks on vari-

ous online Nebraska news venues. There is some slight support for maintaining current programs, and paying any necessary costs. But there are far more folks chiming in with a different view of what

needs to be done about state spending: Cuts, cuts and more cuts.

Handling state finances isn't going to be easy for awhile. The question is: How tough will it get?

Excellence Award for developing a Nitrogen Rate Slide Chart, and the Epsilon Sigma Phi State Team award for developing research and educational programs associated with managing Conservation Reserve Program lands being brought back into production.

The focus of Dr. Shapiro's research and extension programs is improving nutrient use efficiency in irrigated and rainfed crops. The objective is to provide the agriculture industry research based nutrient management information that is profitable and environmentally sustainable.

Publications include 17 refereed journal articles, 34 abstracts, two book chapters and 35 extension circulars. In the last five years, Dr. Shapiro has been involved in granted funded research and extension projects which total over \$3.7 million from state, federal, private and local sources.

Dr. Bill Kranz will be promoted to Associate Professor of Biological Systems Engineering. Dr. Kranz has been a member of the University of Nebraska faculty since 1985. He has served as Extension Irrigation Specialist for a 16 county area in Northeast Nebraska since joining faculty at the Northeast Research and Extension Center. The focus of Dr. Kranz's research and extension programs is helping producers improve irrigation water management in an effort to reduce agriculture's impact on the environment. His extension programs contributed to the Biological Systems Engineering Department receiving the 2002 UNL Departmental Teaching Award. He has also been the recipient of three Excellence in Team Programming (1991, 1992, and 1996) awards from the UNL Cooperative Extension Division and was the 1995 Ph.D Student of the Year award from the Agricultural and Biosystems Engineering Department at Iowa

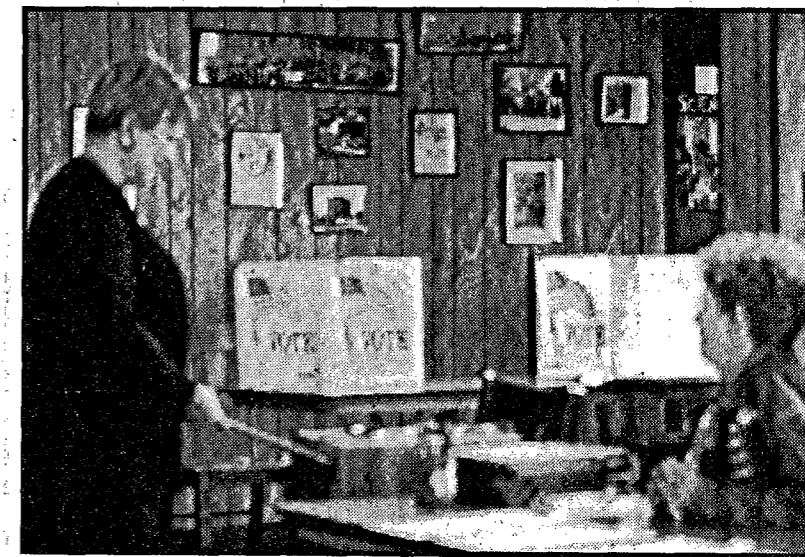
State University and the MidCentral Region of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers.

Dr. Kranz has co-authored 12 refereed journal articles, 21 extension circulars, two Midwest Plan

Service books, nine abstracts, and four video tapes. Dr. Kranz has been co-investigator in grant funded research and extension programs totaling over \$1.8 million from local, state, and national sources.

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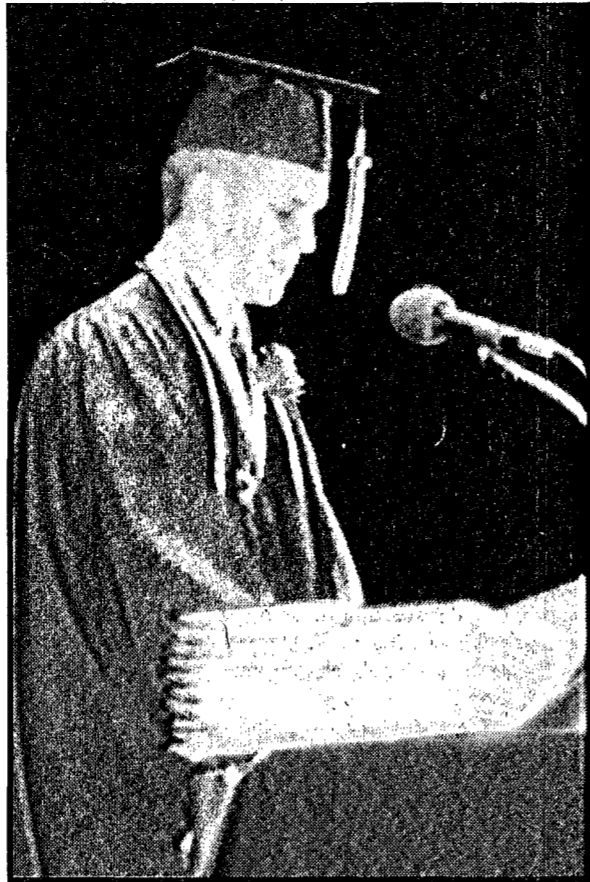
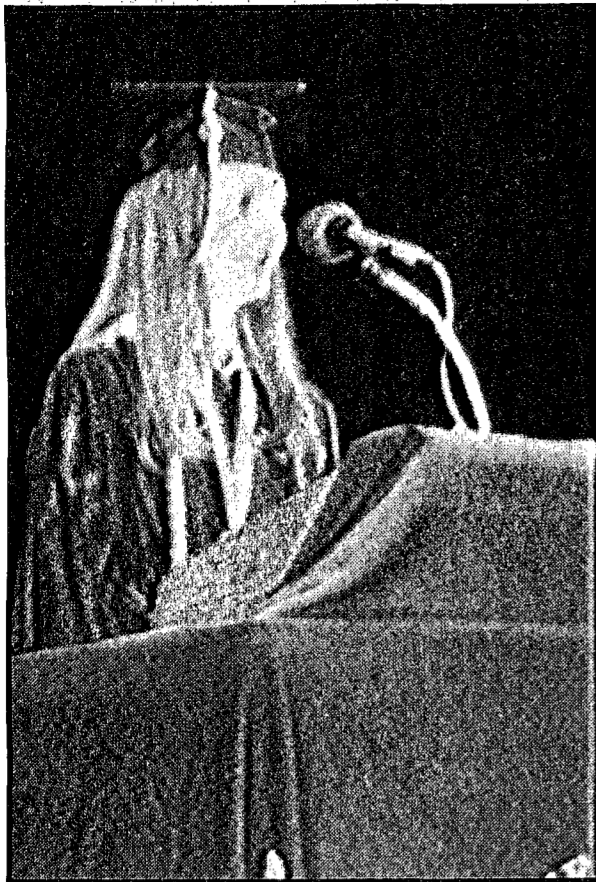
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Flag ceremony

things that will in general make people's lives healthier."

"This grant is aimed at research geared toward making people healthier through biomedical research," said Dr. Shawn Pearcy, WSC associate professor and asso-

ciate in the BRIN grant.

The grant will also provide funding for three Wayne State College students to attend one of three graduate universities for an eight-week summer program. Upon returning to WSC, students will continue their research projects. Students who complete the BRIN program at WSC are guaranteed a position and stipend at BRIN-associated labs at the University of Nebraska Medical Center, Creighton University or the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Chiba Ene, Browns Mills, N.J.; Marko Jovic, Wayne; and Jeremiah Lubke, Plainview, are the first three Wayne State students selected for the summer program, which will begin in June. "This is really designed to let students stay in the state for graduate school," said Dr. Doug Christensen, WSC assistant professor in natural sciences and associate in the BRIN research.

Both Christensen and Pearcy will advise Wayne State's BRIN students.

They will also do their own research and order supplies for research to expand at WSC. While stem cell research is considered biomedicine, there will be no stem cell research at Wayne State College, Pearcy said.

The money for this grant comes from the National Institutes of Health. The grant was written by Jim Turpen from UNMC. Turpen, who is the principal investigator for BRIN research in Nebraska, contacted Pearcy and Christensen. Wayne State was selected because of Pearcy and Christensen's training and education in biomedicine.

Other undergraduate schools participating in the BRIN project include the University of Nebraska - Omaha, University of Nebraska-Kearney, Chadron State College and Nebraska Wesleyan. The training institutions are Creighton University, University of Nebraska Medical Center and University of Nebraska - Lincoln.

Students who receive a degree in biomedicine from a graduate school may work for universities, hospitals, pharmaceutical companies, biomedical companies that do gene research and the USDA, FDA and other government agencies like the Center for Disease Control.

Budget amendment approved

A special meeting of the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education preceded their regular meeting. The purpose of the special meeting was to approve the amendment of the 2001-02 budget. The amendment was needed due to increased spending and receipts in the Activity and Special Building Funds.

The Activity Funds came from fundraising for the Middle School and through clubs and organizations. Special Building funds came from the sale of the modulars and overruns in the Middle School. The amendment was approved.

At the regular meeting, it was approved that Dwaine Spieker, English teacher at the high school, receive a pay-scale credit as he has been selected to attend the National Endowment for the Humanities 2002 Summer Seminar and Institute for school teachers. He will be involved in the seminar "Dostoevsky, Tolstoy, Solovyov: Literature and Religion in Pre-Revolutionary Russia," June 24-July 26, 2002 in Winona, Minn.

Approved were the termination resolutions for the following staff not requesting a hearing: Winter Todd, Monica Sievers, and Colleen Janke. This action was taken

because of a reduction in force (due to cuts in state aid and the upcoming closing of the school in Carroll).

Also approved was the amendment resolution for staff not requesting a hearing, Barbara Gillan and Cheryl Kopperud. Because of the school closing in Carroll and budget reductions, one period for Kopperud and two periods for Gillan are being eliminated.

The board also approved two resignations: Katie Crawford and John Reidel. Crawford has been a custodian in the Middle School and Reidel has been a custodian in the high school.

A new 3 year contract was approved with Nebraska School Bus, Inc. Due to the elimination of a Wednesday route to and from Carroll, and less miles traveled in the two Carroll routes next year, the bussing contract should be reduced by about \$10,000. The superintendent was instructed to review the insurance provided by the bus company.

For prescheduled communication, a number of teachers attended the meeting with concerns on administrative rules and regulations 9001- technology- general and work flow, and how this may affect their access to computers and printers in their rooms in the

future. The superintendent is considering placing computers and printers in labs as he feels it would be more cost effective. More discussion will be held on the subject at the next board meeting.

Also discussed were graduation requirements in Science. A vote will be held at the next meeting on adding three years mandatory in Science instead of 2 years. If passed, this would start with 2003-04 freshmen. Passed recently were Mathematics requirements from 2 years to 3 years starting with 2002-03 freshmen.

In old business, policy 4203 (personnel-all employees-sexual harassment (first reading) and policy 4205 (personnel-all employees-drug and substance use and abuse (first reading) were discussed.

Athletic Director Rocky Ruhl spoke on the new track. While money is coming in, more is needed to meet their goal of \$200,000. He said they are expecting Sam Fischer of Fischer Track Co. to give them a proposal soon.

Future agenda items are second readings on policy 4203 and 4205, information on bussing insurance, and the graduation-science requirement.

The next meeting will be Monday, June 10 at 7 p.m. at the Wayne High School.

Groundbreaking held for energy plant

Groundbreaking was held on Wednesday, May 1 for a renovation and addition to the energy plant on the Wayne State College campus. The \$4 million project, including the purchase price of the plant, is planned for completion in late September, 2002.

Energy Systems Company of Omaha built the plant in 1960 and operated it until February 1, 2002, serving both the Wayne State College campus and Providence Medical Center. At that time, Wayne State took possession and a planned renovation is beginning on the facility.

The project will include a new addition and new siding over the

entire building. Equipment improvements will include a new boiler, a changeover to new electrical centrifugal chillers and new cooling towers. In addition, new chilled water lines will be run from the energy plant to Rice Auditorium, which will improve the delivery of chilled water throughout campus.

According to Dr. Sheila Stearns, Wayne State president, the renovated energy plant has been designed to meet the needs of the campus well into the future. With the increased capacity of the new chillers, the College will be able to add cooling to Rice Auditorium

and to Neihardt Hall (residence hall) in the near future.

The City of Wayne has been instrumental in helping the College with the electrical needs of the plant and will be installing a new transformer that was purchased by the College. The plant has been designed to easily add an additional chiller in the longer term as the need arises. Energy efficiency will also be improved with the new facility.

Architect and engineer for the Project is Leo A. Daly Company of Omaha. Mechanical contractor is Ryan and Associates of Fremont, and general contractor is Otte Construction, Inc. of Wayne.

Council awards bid for auditorium renovation

Otte Construction of Wayne was awarded the bid for the City Auditorium renovation project during Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Otte's bid was \$589,200 and calls for work inside the building to begin Nov. 1 of this year. It is anticipated that by that time the Community Activity Center will be completed and can be used in place of the auditorium. The auditorium renovation should be completed in April of 2003.

Della Pries of the Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation spoke to the council on projects currently being undertaken by her office. Following her presentation, the council voted in favor of the corporation receiving a percentage of the money allocated to it by the city.

A sidewalk cost share program was adopted by the council. It allows for "fix-it" orders from city on a project by project basis, rather than creating a sidewalk district as has been done in the past. Property owners who need to replace all or portions of their sidewalks will be eligible for up to \$2.13 per square foot of replacement sidewalk, pro-

vided that the city's recommendations are followed. Those desiring to install new sidewalk will be eligible for \$1.10 per square foot in city assistance. Limited funds are available for this program.

The city approved a recommendation to extend a water main from Well No. 6 to connect with a city water main on Highway 15. Water from this well will provide water to the front Nine of the Golf Course.

Well No. 6 was rebuilt last year, but following the repair work, it was discovered that the nitrate level in the water being pumped from that well were just over the limit to be used for human consumption. Water from Well No. 7, located on the Golf Course, will be used for city water.

The city will sell a lot to the Habitat for Humanity to construct a home on this year. The lot is located on the corner of South Nebraska Street and Fairgrounds Avenue. The city will retain a 20 foot easement on the property to allow access to underground infrastructure.

Several changes were discussed on the Community Activity Project. The first of these allows for a coat of sealant to be placed on

the brick and block on the outside of the building. Approval was given for this change.

Other changes being considered include the installation of a water softener system in the restrooms and shower areas. The bid that has been received for this change was approximately \$31,000. Council members are looking into a smaller system at a considerably lower cost.

Also discussed was lighting for the parking lot and the gym. Changes will be made in this area if suitable lighting can be found at a comparable price to that which is currently in the plans.

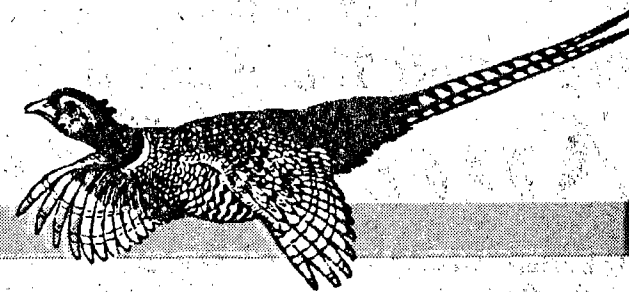
No action was taken on the proposal to install a flag pole in front of the Activity Center. A decision will be made after options are discussed.

No action was taken on Ordinance 2002-9 which would have amended several sections of the city code regarding display and sale of merchandise on sidewalks in the city's central business district. The item will be brought up at a future meeting.

In other action, Mayor Sheryl Lindau appointed Mick Kemp to the City Auditorium Renovation Committee.

Wayne qualifies for State

The Wayne track teams competed at the B-4 District Meet last week in Pierce with the Blue Devil girls squad placing fifth with 50 points while the boys placed sixth with 46 points.

On the girls side, Columbus Scotus won the team title with 111 points with Boone Central placing second with 79 and O'Neill, third with 76 while Pierce scored 62. Lakeview, Ainsworth, West Point, Schuyler and Norfolk Catholic rounded out the field of teams in order.

Allissa Dunklau led the squad with two championships in the long jump (16-7) and 300 hurdles (48.7) while Allison Hansen placed second in the 800 (2:29.9) and ran a leg of the 4x800 relay which placed runner-up (10:32.0) with teammates Ashley Carroll, Andrea Bethune and Kari Hochstein.

Hansen also placed third in the 1600 (5:41.3) while Dunklau added a fifth in the triple jump (33-11).

Kari Hochstein added a pair of fifth place finishes in the 200 (28.1) and 400 (64.6) and Wayne's 4x400 relay team was fifth (4:25.2) with Hochstein, Carroll, Hansen and Dunklau.

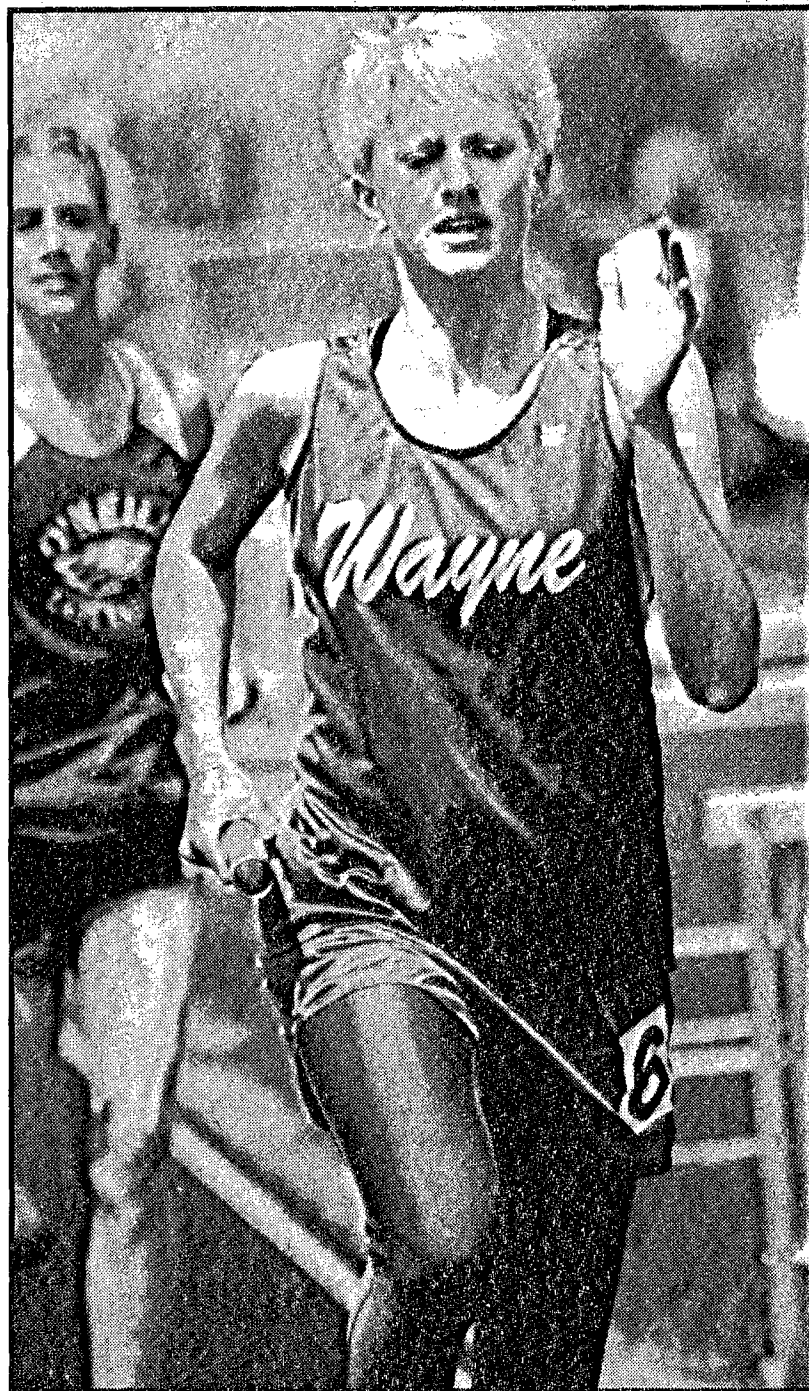
Norfolk Catholic, Ainsworth, Columbus Lakeview, Madison and Schuyler followed Wayne in order.

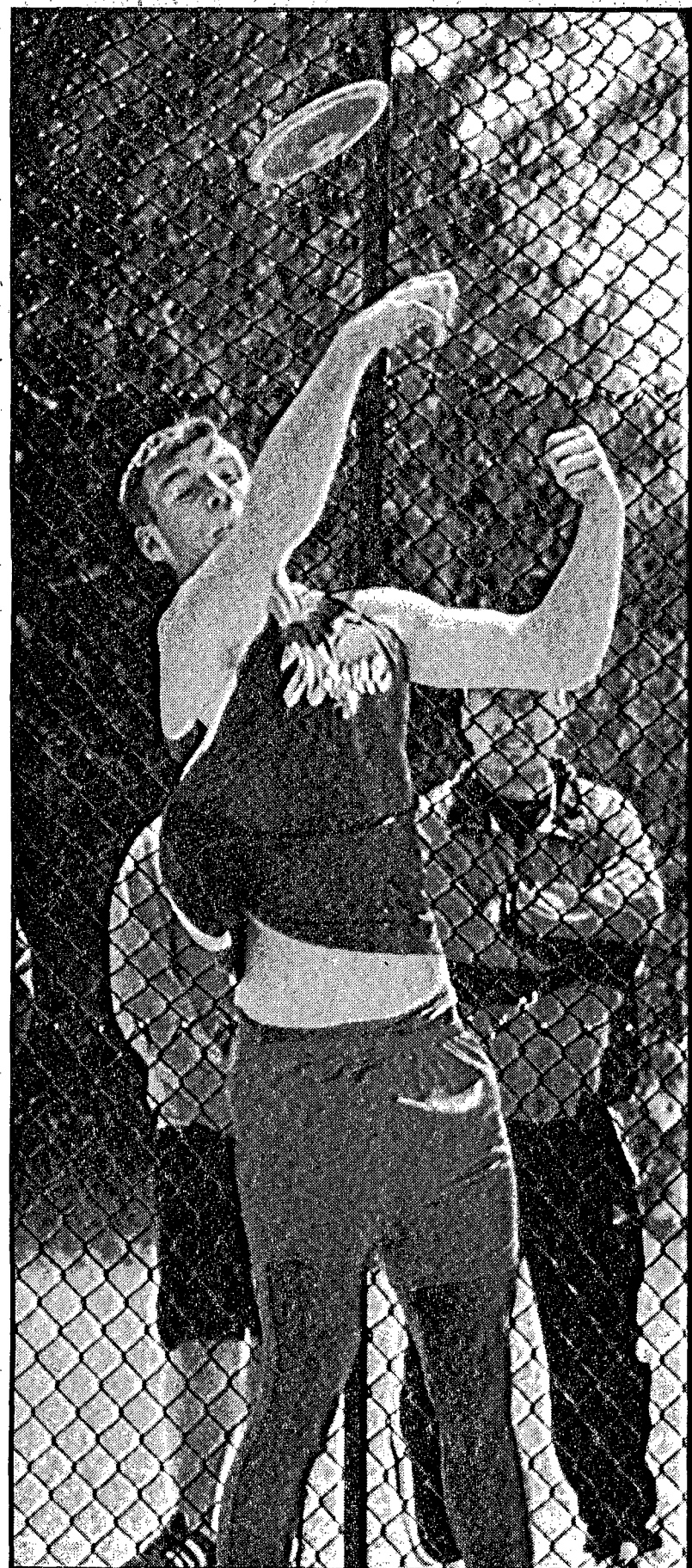

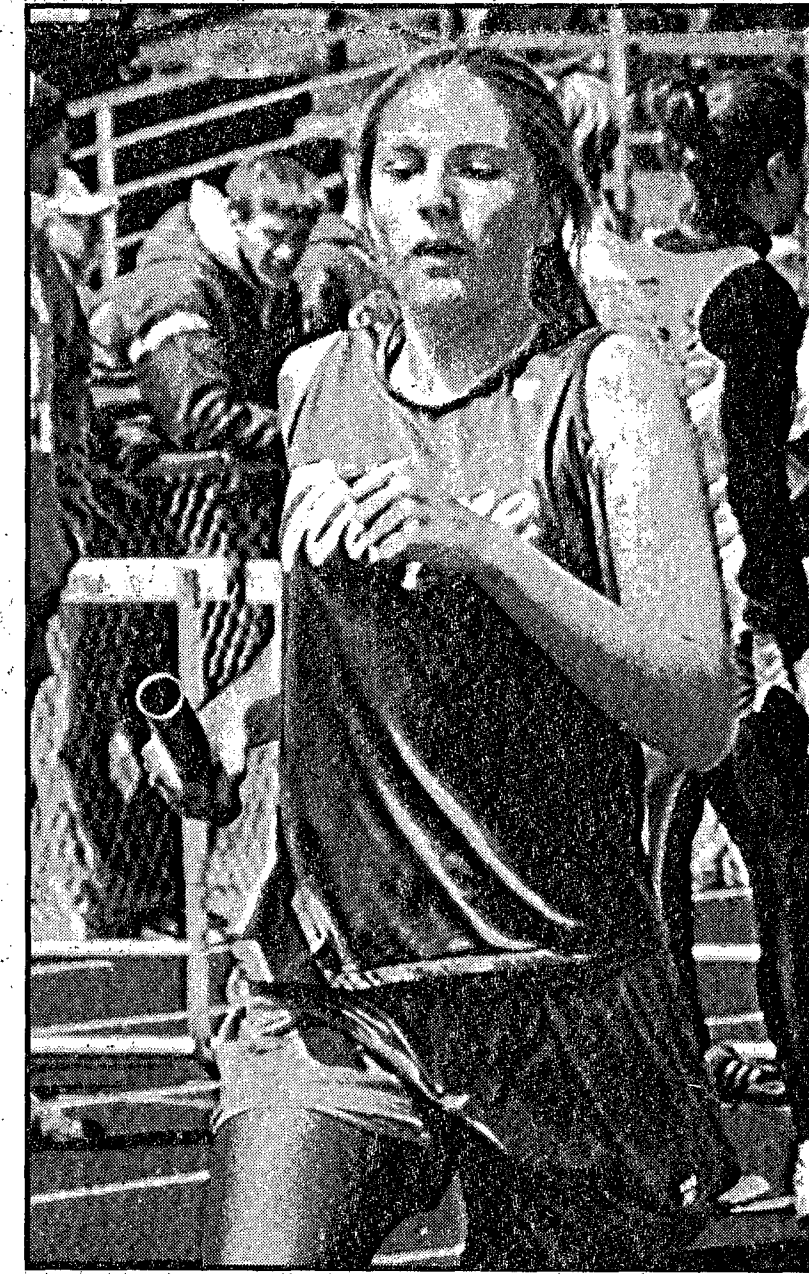

The Wayne State baseball team demolished top seed Bemidji State in the first round of the NSIC Tournament last Friday and John Manganaro's team followed that up with a win over Winona State in the semifinals.

However, WSC was defeated twice by Southwest State—both by one run on Sunday as the Mustangs claimed the conference title.

Wayne State opened tourney play with a 16-2 thrashing of host Bemidji State as Aaron Hyde went the distance in recording his seventh win of the year. He struck out five and scattered seven hits.

WSC pounded out 16 hits led by

Joe Hartman and Donald Whitmire with a double and two singles each.

Tim Richt had three base hits while Scott Hayduk had a pair of doubles. Gary Redden laced a pair of singles with Joey Baldwin, Brian Foy and Eddie Burns notching one base hit each.

WSC turned four double plays in the contest.

In the second round, WSC edged Winona State, 5-4 in 10 innings as Travis McCarter went the distance to earn the win.

Catching cold front fish can be tricky

I'd always heard that cold fronts caused fish to turn off, shut down and head for the bottom. I knew that a weather change caused the fish to shut down, especially in a lake, but I'd never thought much about it. The first time I really thought about it was when I was completing the final part of my open water diver test. We were on Lake Francis Case in South Dakota diving in about

25 feet of water and swimming along a break that dropped into deeper water. The walleye and bass were swimming up onto the break line, cruising and then dropping off the break for a few feet and then coming back onto the break. They swam between I and the other diver for a half hour, acting like we weren't even there. Then it happened, for some unknown reason, the fish started

to act skittish and then quickly disappeared over the edge into the deeper water. They were gone and moved off so quickly that you'd think someone had dropped an anchor or threw something into the water. Both of us wondered what had spooked them, had we moved to quickly or had the bubbles escaping from our Scuba gear bothered them.

It wouldn't be long before we'd figure it out! Twenty minutes after the fish raced off towards the deeper water, the sky lit up and rain began to fall by the bucket loads. That night, the temperatures dropped, it thundered and stormed all night muddying up the water and shutting the fish off in the lake. Somehow the fish knew way ahead of time that the weather was going to change, as they headed deep prior to any indication that a storm was building. What do you do when a cold front comes through, stay home and watch outdoor TV programs, not a bad idea! There are things that you can do or places you can go that will up your percentage of catching fish and then you can

watch outdoor TV when it gets too hot or when the snow starts to blow.

It's well known that cold fronts won't affect fish in a river as much as it will in the lakes! I don't know if it's because of the current flow, but I do know that river fish will bite during cold front periods when lake fish will be bellied to the bottom.

If you can re-locate to a river after a cold front comes through, chances are you'll find some fish that are willing to bite. It really doesn't matter where you're fishing after a cold front goes through, you'll need to change your tactics in order to catch a few fish. First, you'll want to go smaller! If you're using a jig, go to a lighter one. I fish with Larry Myhre, from the Sioux City Journal and during cold fronts he'll go to the smallest jig I've ever seen, 1/32 or 1/64, man these are crappie jigs, but I've seen him take 8 pound plus bass using these munchkin jigs. The key to using these micro jigs is a lighter line, so you're able to cast them and feel a strike. Sure you'll lose a few fish, but if these teeny, tiny jigs catch one or two fish for you during a cold front period, you're ahead of the game. Since I and munchkin jigs don't get along well, I'll switch to a live bait rig, a Lindy or Roach rig. I'll go to 6 pound test, with a lighter walking sinker and set right on top of the fish, teasing him and enticing him to bite. You'll need a little more patience when fishing a cold front period,

because the temperature has dropped drastically and the fish have regressed back to the cold weather period. So think of cold front fish like you would during a cold weather period. The key to catching fish, whether it's during a cold front or any other weather pattern, is consistency. If you have a two or three day cold front period, the fishing will improve just like it will when you have two or three days of warm weather. The first day of a cold front is always the worst as it's a drastic change and once the fish become used to it, they'll get back into the routine and start to feed. If the cold front persists, they'll be in their slow mode so you'll have to make some changes in order to take these cold front fish. By down sizing your bait, fishing slower or by moving back into the river during cold front conditions you'll be able to catch a few fish during the cold front period.

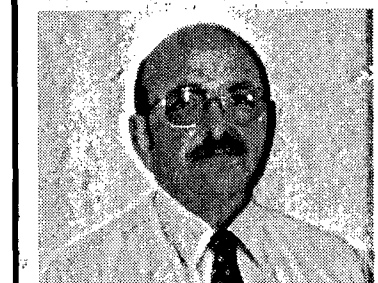

The summer reading program will begin June 3 when books can be read. Theme this year will be "Join the Winners Circle - Read."

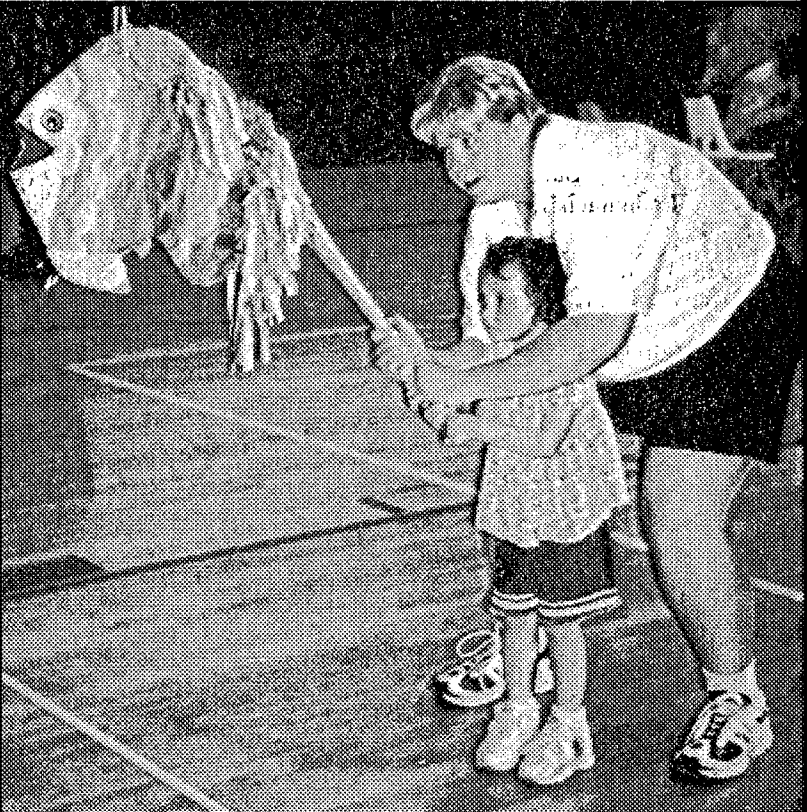
The first Monday night program

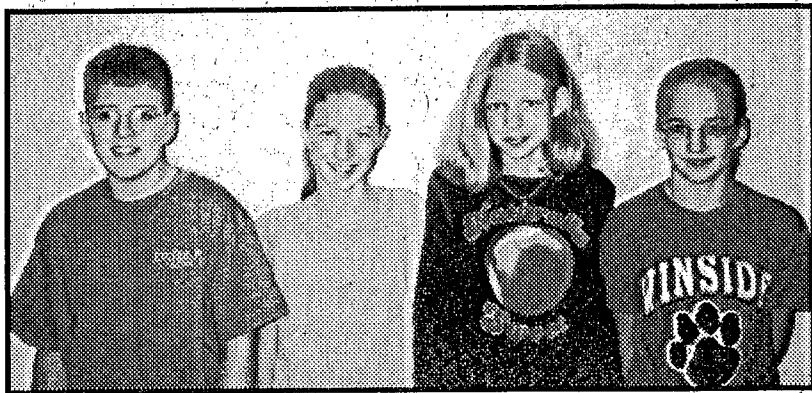

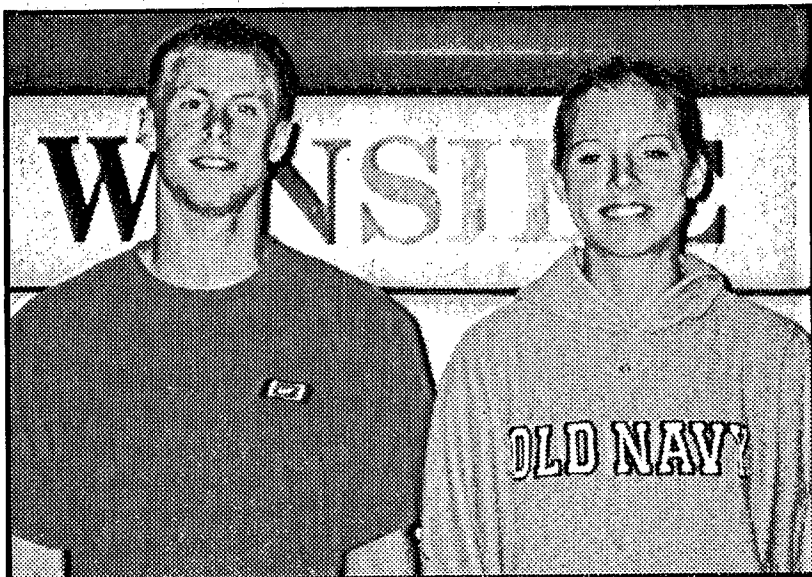

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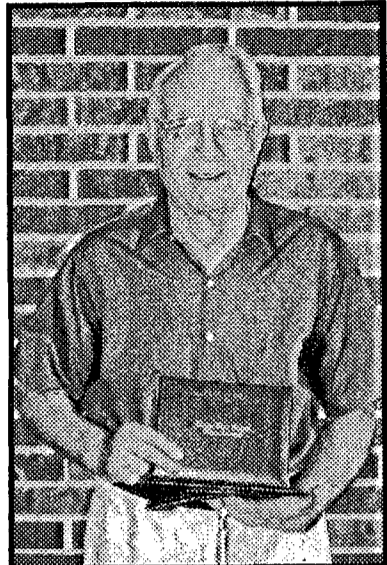
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Achievements are acknowledged at honor coffee

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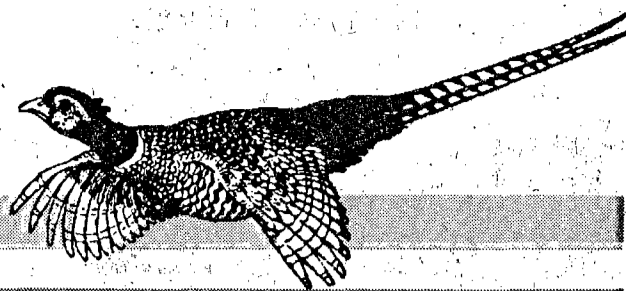

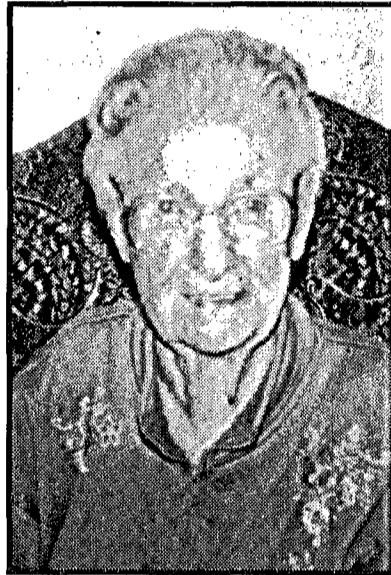

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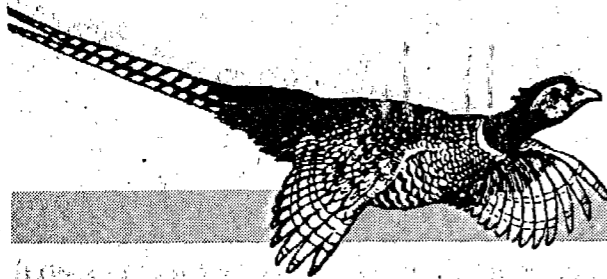

You are eligible if you live in Nebraska, are a pregnant, postpartum or breastfeeding woman, an infant or child under 5 years of age, have a nutritional risk and meet the set income guideline.

Well-child checks are conducted at the clinic. A \$15 donation fee is requested to help with the cost of the clinic. No one will be denied a

physical for being unable to pay. Currently, the age requirement for well-child checks are infant to 21 years of age. Call for an appointment if your child is in need of a physical.

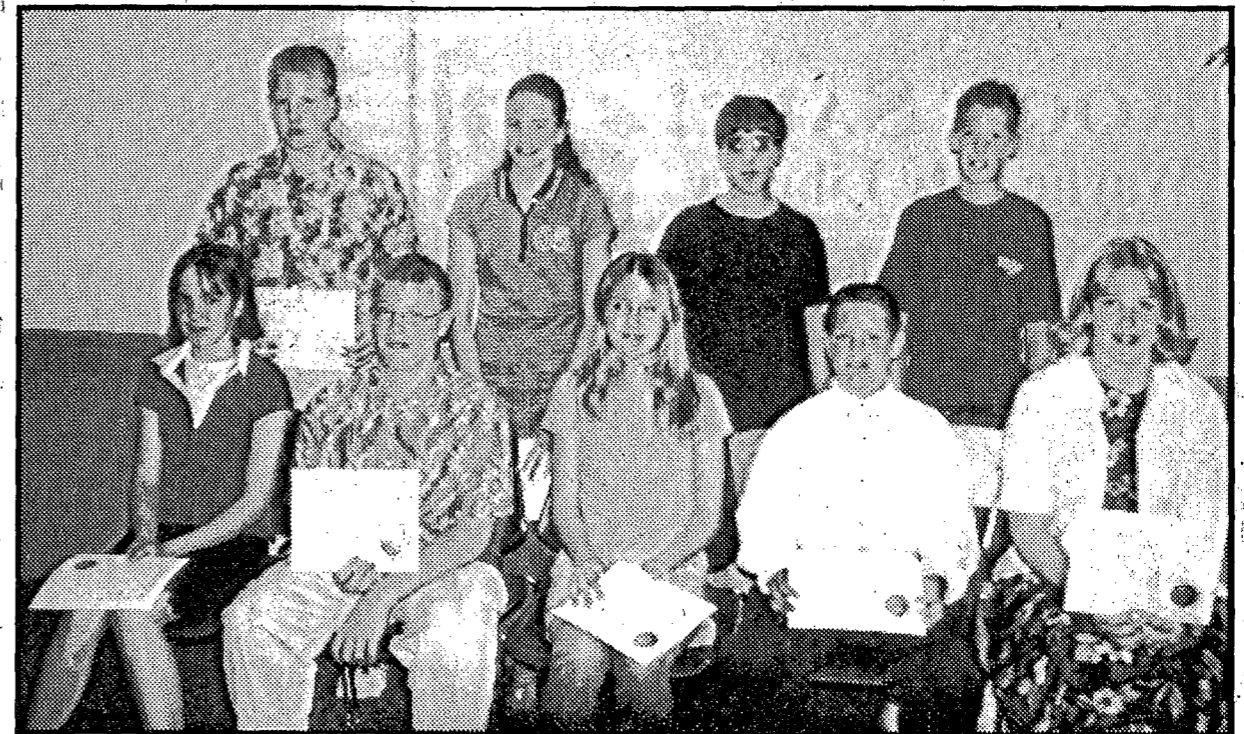

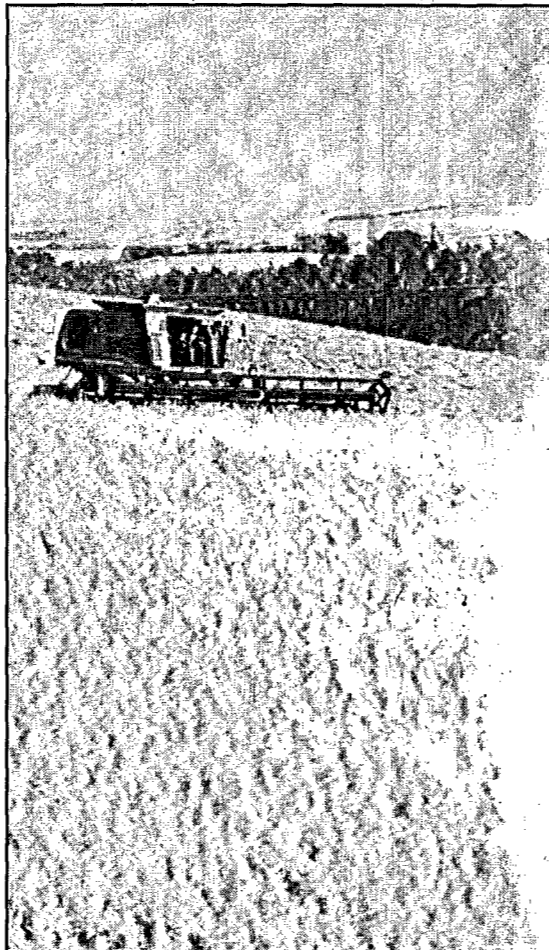


Students to tour with Dana band

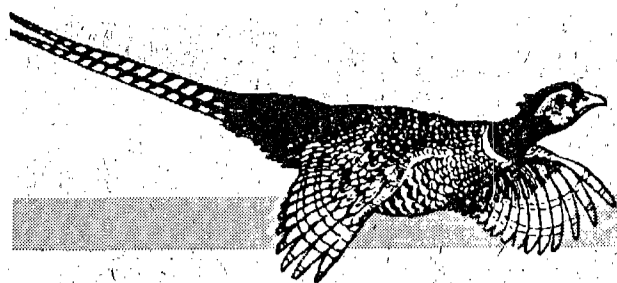

This week, I've had a few of these moments myself. The Big Farmer has had pain in his "good" leg all winter. After xrays, MRIs, and bone scans, they finally decided it was caused by arthritis in the hip.

We didn't like to think of replacement because we knew rehab would be difficult. Still, when two of your four extremities don't help you much, you like to have as much function of the other two as possible.

We learned of a surgeon in Council Bluffs who uses a less

invasive technique, requiring fewer restrictions on weight bearing, and causing less rehab. We went to see him, we were impressed.

He works in Council Bluffs. So, last week, Mike had a hip replace-
