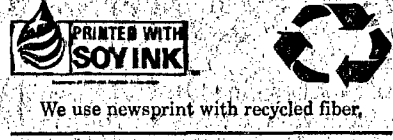

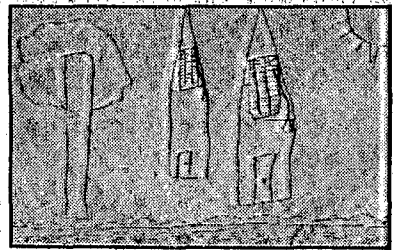

Date approaches for '22 Hen Salute'

With just over a month before the big event, organizers of the 22nd annual Wayne Chicken Show are fluffing their feathers and preparing their nests for the big events.

The 2002 Chicken Show, "22 Hen Salute" will begin with Henoween activities on Friday, July 12 and continue through Saturday, July 13. Friday's activities will take place in downtown Wayne and Saturday's events are slated for the Willow Bowl at Wayne State College.

Friday's activities are being sponsored by Main Street Wayne and include a Talent Show, carnival games, the World's Largest Chicken Dance, the Rubber Chicken Olympics (sponsored by KTCH Radio and KMEG-TV), Frankie Valen performing music and a teen dance.

The Chicken Show Task Force has begun weekly meetings as final preparations are being made.

George Holm, chairman of the Chicken Feed, is currently seeking volunteers to assist with the preparation of the chicken and serving of the meal.

Tickets for the event are now available at each of the four banks in Wayne, Legends, Antiques on Main, K&G Cleaners and at the Chamber office. They are \$5.50 in advance and will be \$6 the day of the show.

The meal, which will be served beginning at noon on Saturday, includes one-half of a chicken, chips, beans, a dinner roll and orange drink. During the meal entertainment will be provided by Travis and the Flamecats.

Those interested in volunteering should contact Holm at K&G Cleaners. The majority of the contests will be

held in the afternoon, following the meal. Among this year's attractions are the Chicken Flying Meet, the Chicken Shoe Chucking Contest, Most Beautiful Beak Contest, National Cluck Off and Egg Drop/Catch Contest.

The Lions Club Mobile Screening Bus will be again be at this year's event. Screens for a number of medical conditions will be available at no charge.

Wayne resident has album released

After performing for 11 years in the music business, Eric (Vito) Cole of Wayne recently had an album released, "Vito Cole — Someone I Used To Know." Cole, who writes his own music and plays acoustic guitar, describes his music as having a country tinge, blue grass to funk, not heavy, nice chillin' music.

In his musical career, Cole used to play in the band "Glass Bottom Isle" and later with the group "V-tones." For the last three years, Cole has been on his own playing gigs mainly in Omaha, Norfolk, Sioux City and Yankton.

Every Wednesday night, Cole hosts a show at Players Lounge in Norfolk. Cole performs his music to comedy routines.

Looking back on his life, Cole was born near Boston, Mass. to Doug and Jennifer Cole; one of three children. He has a twin sister, Ellen who returned to the Boston area and married someone from there, and an older brother, Jason, who is a teacher and coach in Valentine. His dad passed away several years ago, and his mother married Stan Nelsen of Carroll who passed away recently.

Cole dedicated his CD to his father, step-father and his friend, Tony Schultz, who passed away in 1994.

Growing up in a military family (his father was in the Air Force) they moved occasionally. From Boston they moved to Maine until Cole was 4-years-old and then they moved to Wayne.

Cole has a musical background, his father was in a band while in the service, "Tops in Blue," which was an entertainment troop. His dad was a standup comic and he also sang.

Once, Cole and his father entered a talent contest at the Wayne County Fair. Cole laughs, "I sang and got first place and dad had a comedy act and got second place," Cole said. Both his father and sister urged him to pursue a musical career.

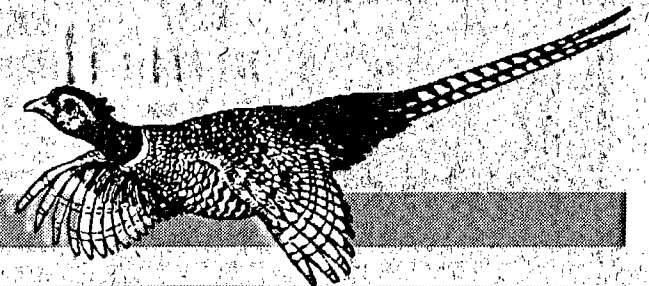
In school, all of the Cole children were active in athletics. Cole thought he could be a jock by being in sports but in his senior year he found his music too. Cole had played trumpet in the band but didn't know he could also sing. After graduating in 1991, Cole joined the band "Glass Bottom Isle." The band often opened for bigger name bands in Omaha. 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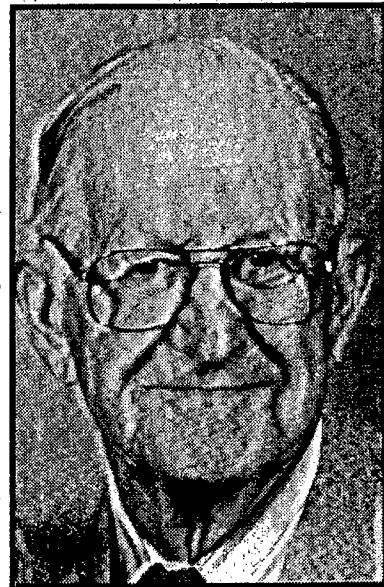

Following his retirement, he served as maintenance man for 13 years at Villa Wayne. An avid dancer, he enjoyed polka cruises to Hawaii, Australia and the Fiji Islands and traveled to Greece, Spain, Germany and Puerto Rico as well as an annual trek to New Ulm, Minn. and various ballrooms throughout the Midwest. His arrest took place last fall after an investigation by members of the Stanton County Sheriff's Office.

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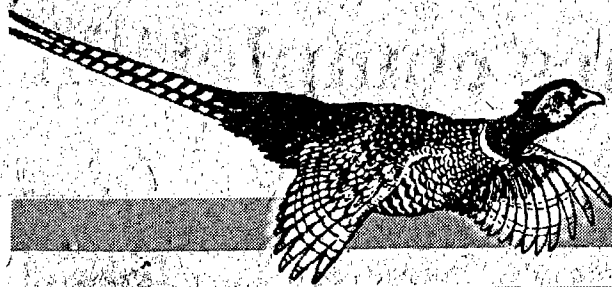

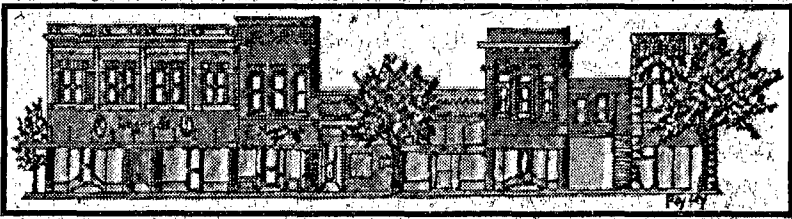

Controversy continues over beer sales

There is no reason to think that the controversy over beer sales in the little border village of Whiteclay in northwest Nebraska will end anytime soon.

Whiteclay is a wide spot in the road, just south of the South Dakota border and the Oglala Sioux's Pine Ridge reservation.

In brief: Four stores sell millions of cans of beer to the Indians every year. The Oglala are plagued with a high rate of alcoholism. Critics say Nebraska shouldn't allow beer sales in Whiteclay. Others say the state, without proof of violations, can't interfere with the licensed sale of a legal product.

Tim Rinne of Nebraskans for Peace cites a public policy issue that he says should prompt the state Liquor Control Commission and the Legislature to rethink the situation.

Rinne noted that all the stores in Whiteclay are "off-sale" venues. There is literally no place in Whiteclay for beer to be consumed legally by those who pop in to pop a top. It is also illegal to consume alcohol on the neighboring reservation. In fact, legal consumption would require reservation patrons to drive to another town and rent a motel room, or visit someone's home, before sipping a brew. This, obviously, isn't happening.

The policy question: Should the state allow beer sales in a place where there is no place for miles and miles - to legally consume it? Is the question particu-

larly legitimate when virtually all the beer-buying patrons live on the reservation where beer consumption also is illegal?

The question seems to be made more legitimate by the fact that law enforcement efforts are comparatively minimal in Whiteclay. It is unincorporated. The State Patrol and county sheriff cannot maintain a perpetual presence.

The arguments on the other side are obvious: There are issues of free choice and the very basics of

our economy. If people don't like a store's goods, they don't have to buy them. Economics will eventually close the store.

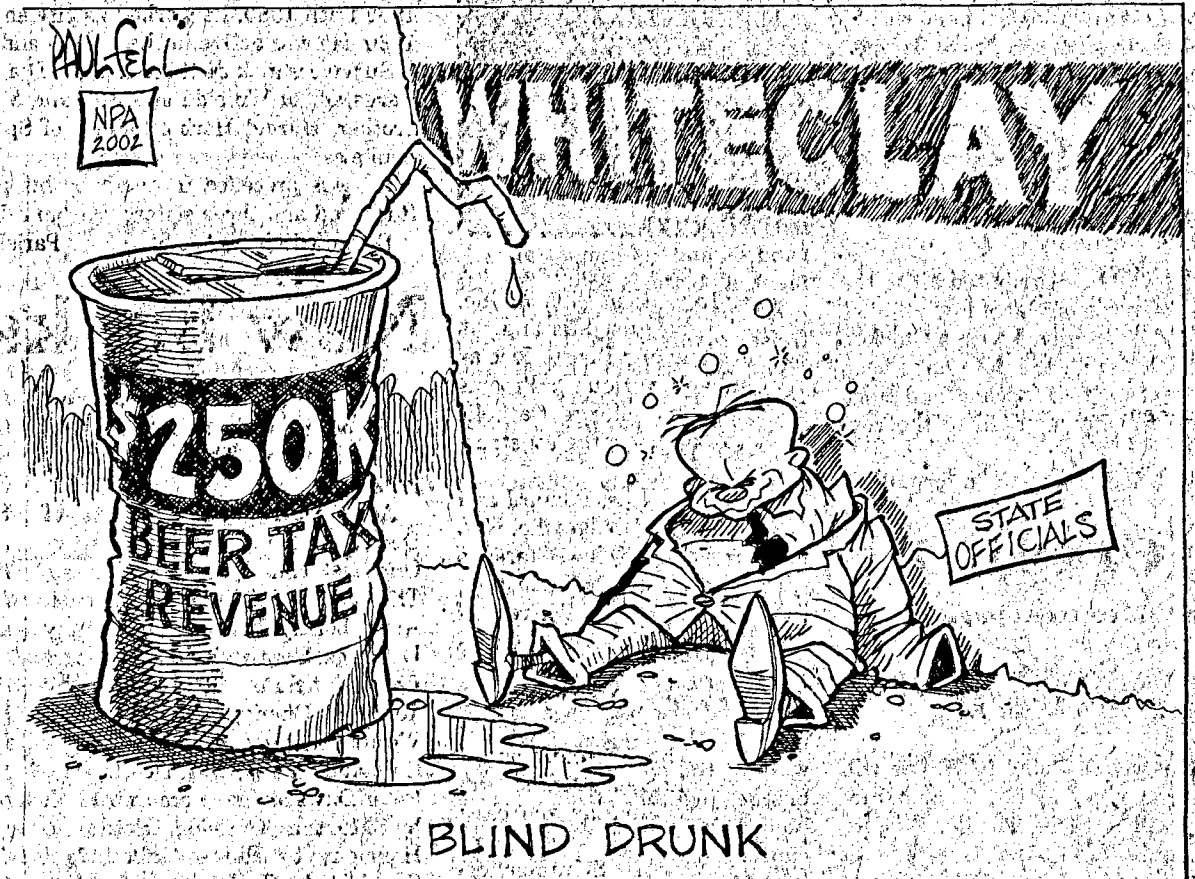
Rinne and others contend that Nebraska is making some \$250,000 a year in tax revenues off the misery of Indians, in circumstances that wouldn't be allowed elsewhere. The state wouldn't authorize alcohol sales in other places where there is literally no place to consume it legally.

Would the state sell beer at a

Nebraska football game, and trust folks not to open it until they got back home?

Would we approve beer sales to minors a day before their 21st birthday, with the proviso that they not consume it until they are 21?

The policy issue is one worthy of consideration by "law and order" types, especially those elected to the executive and legislative branches.

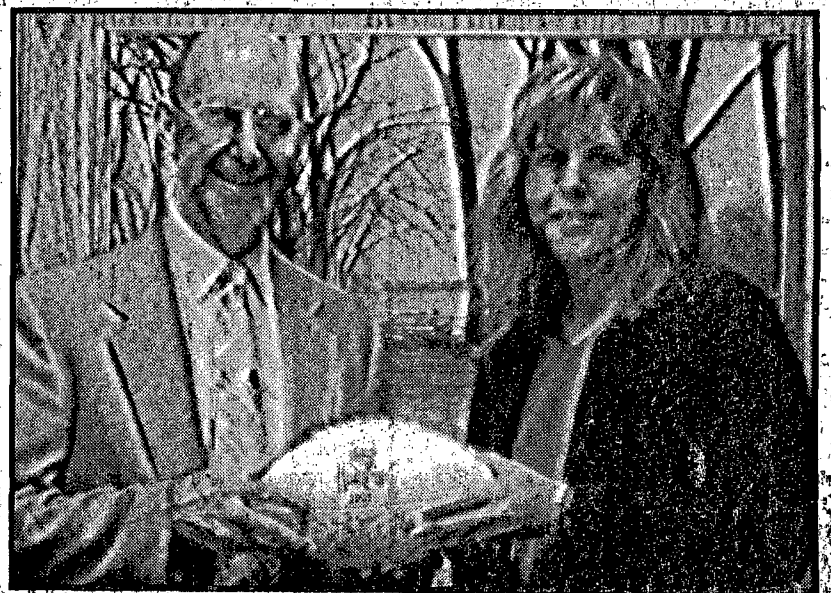

Art project nears completion on Wayne State campus

An art project designed and developed by internationally-known artist Zoran Mojsilov of Minneapolis, Minn. is taking shape on the Wayne State College campus.

The project, which has been officially named "Tunka Oyate," a Lakota word meaning "pathway or connection to earth and man's beginnings," was chosen from several finalists for the 1 percent for Art project mandated by state statute.

The statute requires that one percent of all construction and major renovation projects of state buildings be set aside for art projects. The funds may not be used for other needs. Funding for the 1 percent for Art projects at Wayne State has been pooled from the renovations of Terrace Hall, Studio Arts, Connell Hall, and the Ramsey Theatre renovation and addition

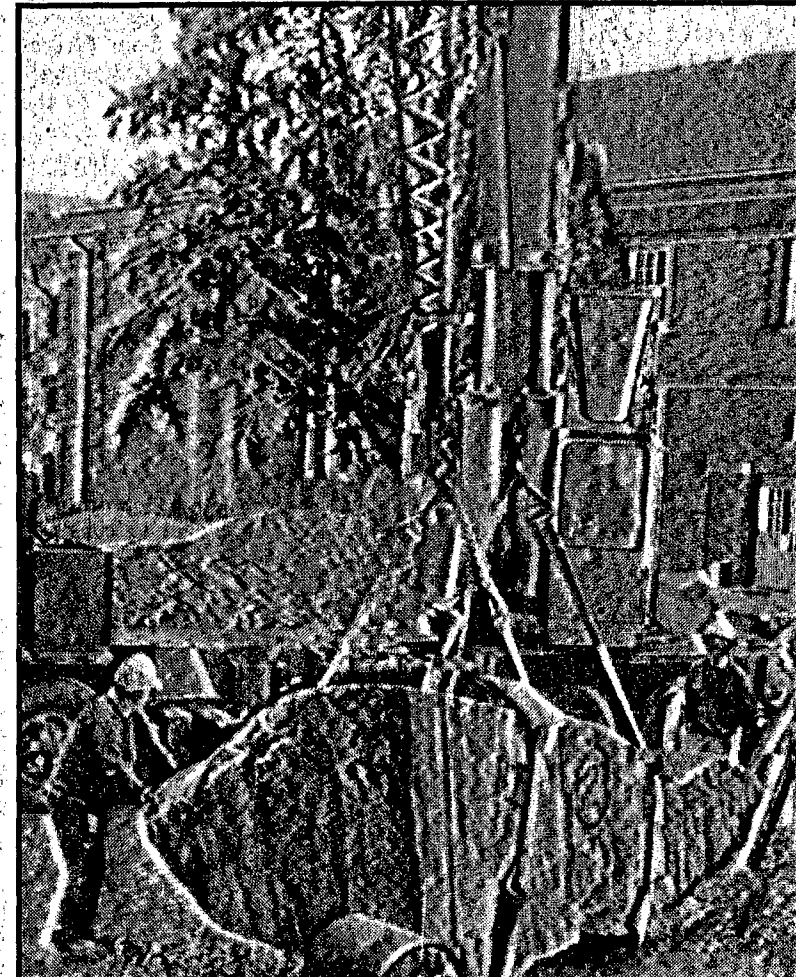
project now underway. Included in the funding is \$6,000 for campus

artwork already purchased and on display in Gardner and Connell halls, as well as \$62,500 for the major campus art project located between Connell Hall, U.S. Conn Library, and the Studio Arts building.

This project, "Tunka Oyate," or "The Rocks" as it will be informally known, includes a granite walkway between Connell Hall and the Studio Arts building. Large boulders from quarries in Minnesota were transported to campus and arranged on either side of the walkway. Landscaping on the north slope of the boulders, symbolizing northeast Nebraska's terrain, will feature hills and valleys. The south slope will represent the prairie, with buffalo grass and other native plantings included. Several flat boulders have been located near the walkway for gathering spots for small groups or classes. The project is scheduled for completion this fall.

A native of Belgrade, Yugoslavia, Mojsilov has had his work exhibited both in the United States and abroad. He is a 1979 graduate of the University of Belgrade.

"We believe that 'The Rocks' will be attractive, interesting and functional," said WSC president Sheila Stearns. "It will evolve into a gathering place for students and classes — almost a 'classroom' in and of itself. We are looking forward to its completion later this summer."

The final game of the tourna-

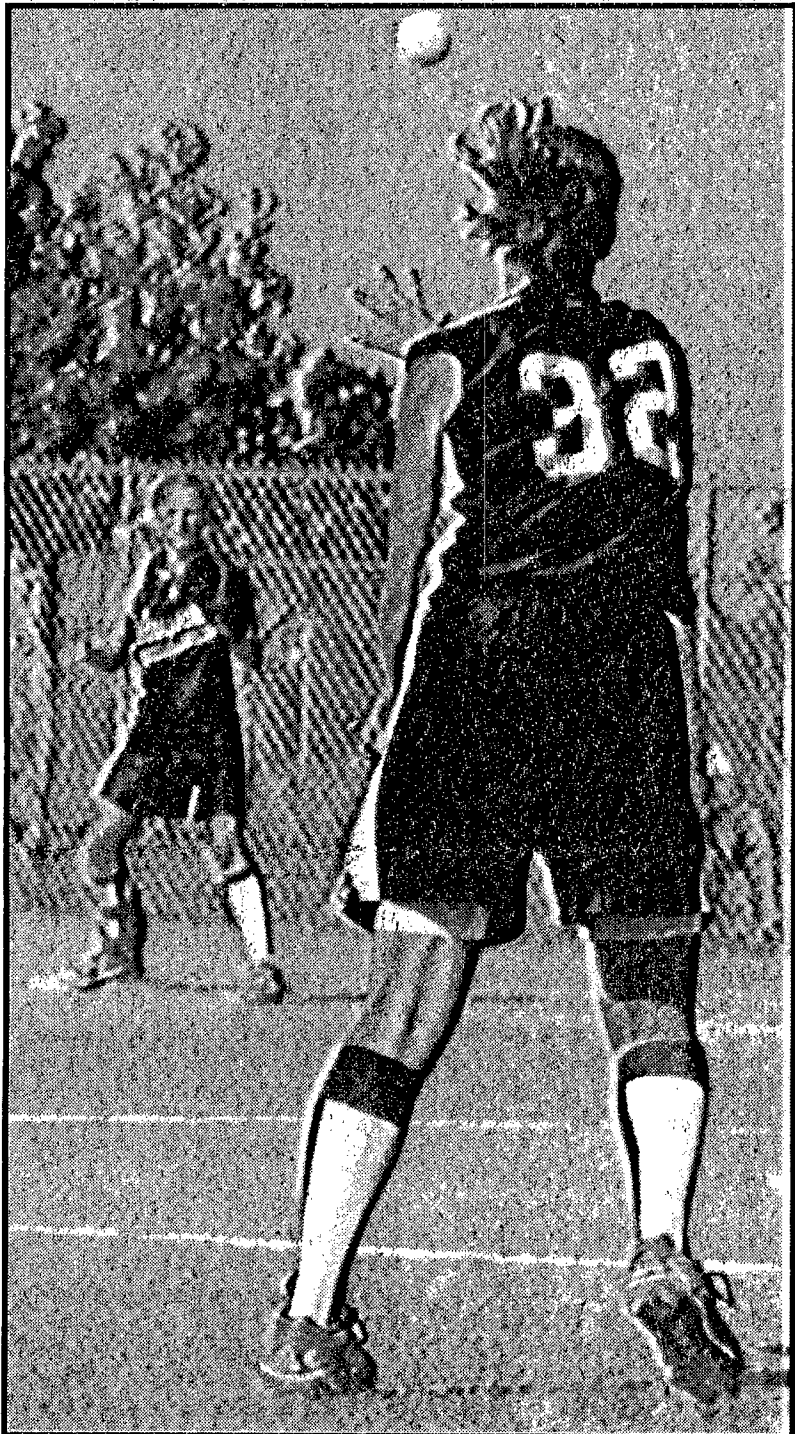

The Wayne 14-and under team improved their record to 5-8. They will play in the West Point tournament this weekend.

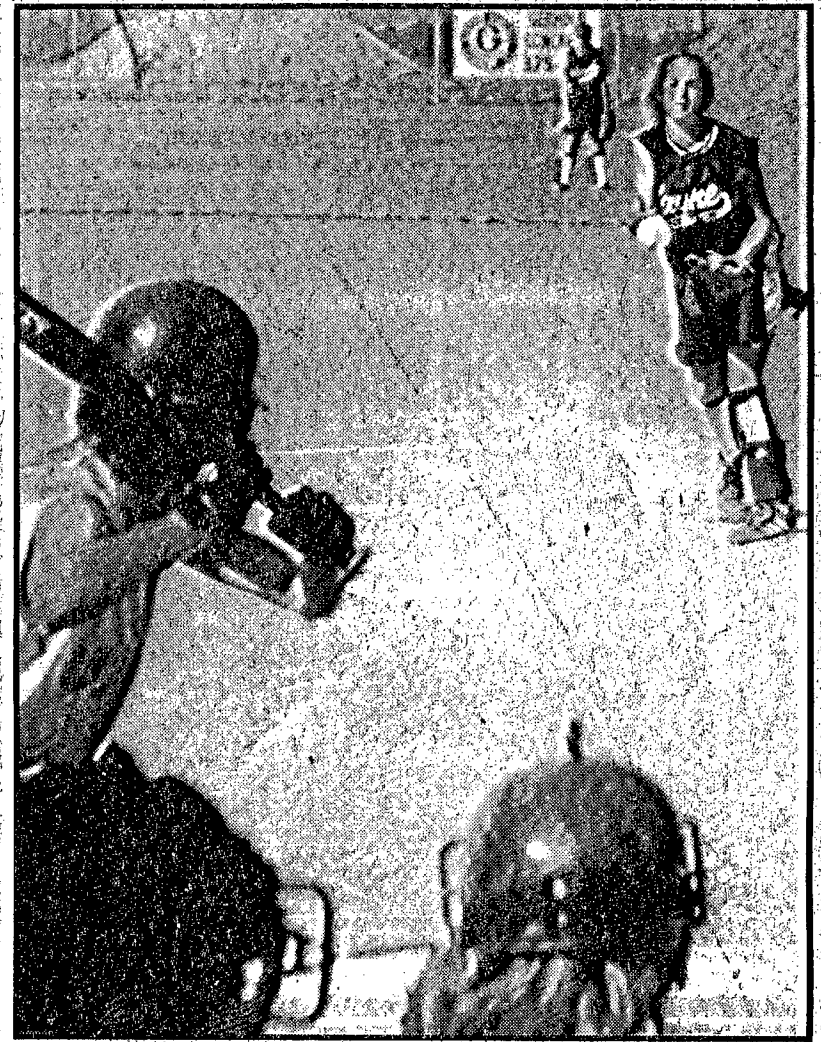
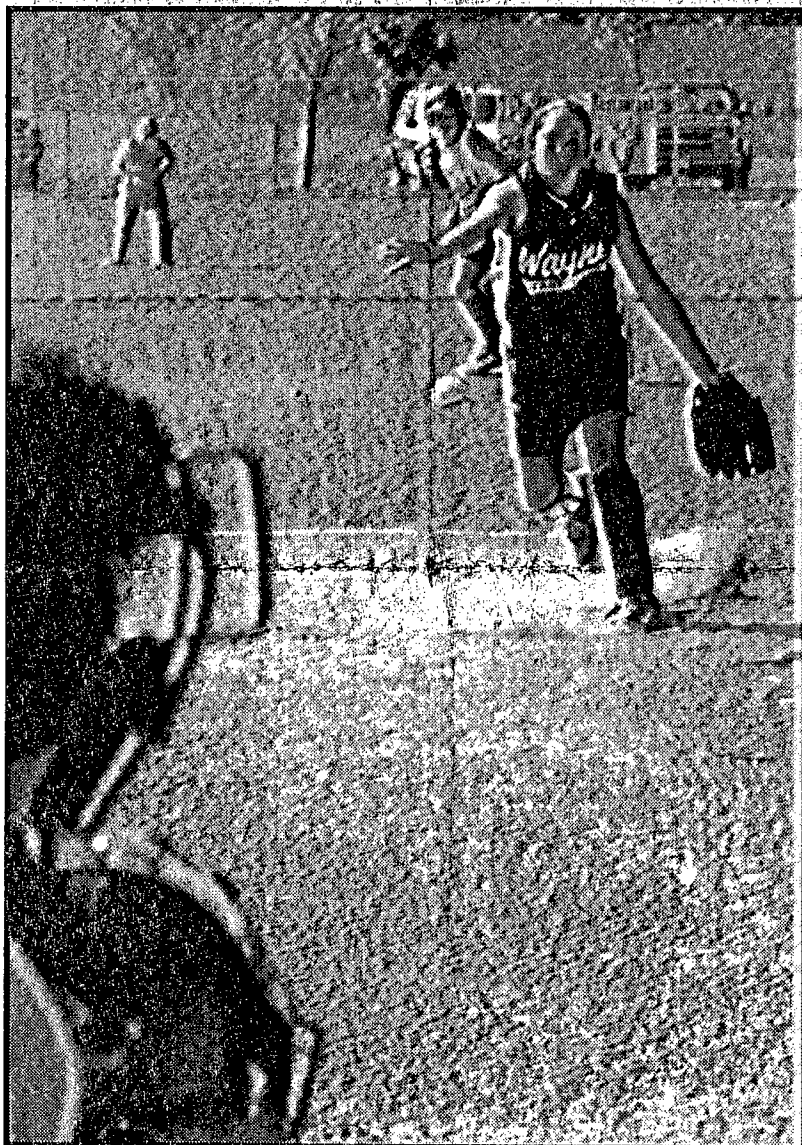
The Wayne 12-and under team continued their tough season recently. Sadey Bessmer doubled in the 13-0 loss against Megan Loberg earned a single for Wayne.

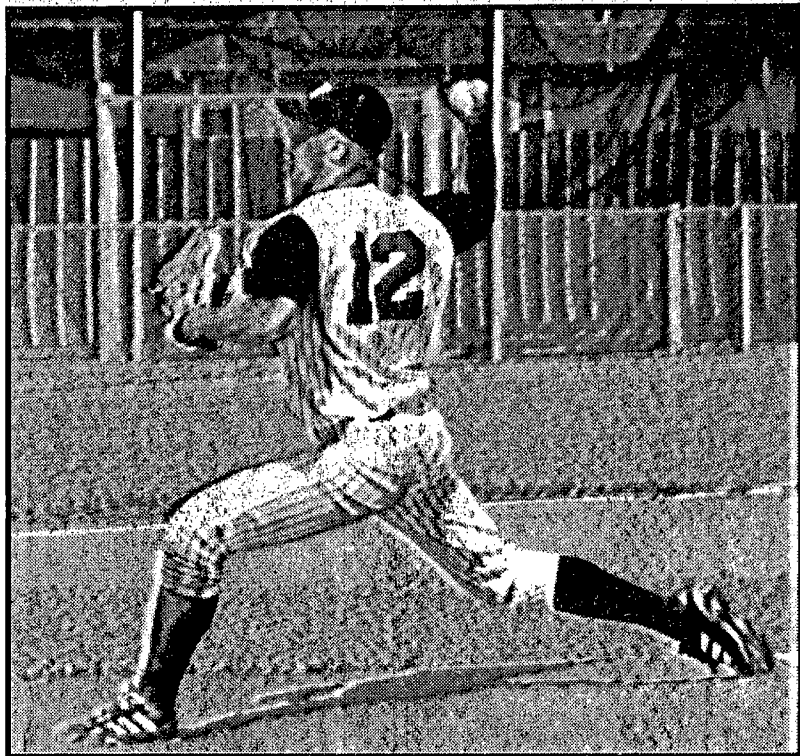

Wayne High School recently recognized athletic achievements of past and present players who have shown outstanding athletic performance.

This year's inductees into the WHS Hall of Fame were Kevin Koenig and Paul Mallette.

Koenig competed in football, wrestling and track at WHS from 1981-85. He lettered in all three sports during his four years of competition.

In football, Koenig was named all-state by the Omaha World Herald and all-area by the Wayne Herald. He also was a participant in the Shrine Bowl. After graduating from WHS, Koenig was a member of the Nebraska Cornhuskers football team.

Koenig was a three-time state medal winner in wrestling. He set the state record for the most consecutive wins with 85. Many of his WHS school records still stand today including his 31-0 perfect record in 1984, 105-4 career record and most pins in a career with 69. When he completed his career, Amateur Wrestling News ranked him in the top six in the nation in his weight class. He has been named to the Norfolk Daily News area all-time best wrestler list.

Koenig was a valuable member to the track team. He scored points in the field events and set school records in the discus and shot put.

After graduating from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln with an agronomy degree, Koenig currently works as a crop consultant in the Wayne area.

Mallette competed in football, basketball and baseball at WHS from 1972-76.

He was the starting quarterback for the Blue Devils during his sophomore, junior and senior seasons. The Norfolk Daily News selected Mallette as their top quarterback in 1975. He was also named all-conference during his junior and senior seasons.

In baseball Mallette hit over .400 and pitched five no hitters during three years of participation. One of the no hitters came during the 1975 district tournament. During his three years of baseball, Mallette was chosen as Most Valuable Player by his teammates.

Mallette stole three bases and scored two runs as he helped the Blue Devils score a 2-1 victory over Omaha Ryan in the State Baseball tournament in 1976.

After WHS, Mallette went on to play baseball for Fort Hays State University. He was selected as an all-area player during his junior and senior seasons. He also played semi-pro baseball.

Following his days on the baseball field, Mallette started to coach little league baseball. Through his guidance, his teams finished sixth in 1995 and fourth in 1996 in the Little League World Series.

Mallette also coached a little league football team in Fort

Collins, Colo. During three years, Mallette posted a 34-3 record.

Mallette received his Ph.D from UN-L in 1988. He currently teaches business management at Colorado State University in Fort Collins, Colo.

Current WHS athletes were recognized with awards and honors of their athletic achievement.

Each year WHS recognizes a male and female athlete of the year. The 2001-02 honors went to Brad and Karissa Hochstein.

Special awards were also given to athletes for their achievements in athletics and in the classroom.

Tanner Niemann and Alissa Dunklau received the Law Enforcement award. The award is given to varsity athletes in grades 10-12 who show athletic accomplishment, good attitude, dedication and academic credentials. A law enforcement committee selects the recipients.

The Terry Johnson award goes to a ninth or tenth grade female basketball player who demonstrates talent, coachability and hard work. Karissa Hochstein was the recipient of this year's award.

Brad Hansen and April Theide were chosen as the recipients of this year's Scholar-Athlete award because of their demonstration of excellence in the classroom and in athletics.

Hansen and Theide were also the chosen recipients for the Moller Memorial Award. The award is given to senior athletes who exemplify the qualities of sportsmanship, citizenship, scholarship and adherence to training rules.

The Sportsmanship Award is given to athletes who demonstrate sportmanlike behavior in competition and practice. Criteria includes the showing of respect to officials, coaches, opponents and teammates. Candidates are chosen from each high school class by the coaching staff. The student athletes then vote from the nominated list. Recipients for this year were Ryan Schmeits and Mary Boehle.

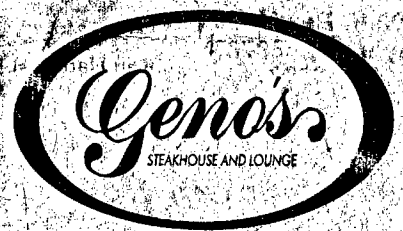

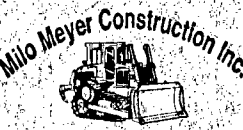

List is released

Pamela Topf of Wayne is among more than 390 students named to the President's Academic Honor List for Spring 2002 at Dakota State University.

To qualify for the honor list, a student must maintain at least a 3.5 grade point average.

Nevertheless, coffee does seem to have a proven pick-me-up effect on memory.

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Farm Bill, a boost to waterfowl and all wildlife

What weighs 13.5 pounds, took years to work to develop and required months of lengthy debate.

It's the U.S. Farm Bill and it looks as if it will be a big boost to waterfowl and all of our wildlife.

One of the outcomes of this legislation is the establishment of a new program known as the GRP.

The GRP or Grassland Reserve Program will do a lot to enhance the habitat of grassland nesting birds. The GRP, like the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and the Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP) are voluntary incentive programs that help farmers to install wildlife friendly practices on the land. These practices all help to improve water

but will have significant impact on the Prairie Pothole regions of North and South Dakota, parts of Montana, Iowa and Minnesota.

According to Dr. Alan Wentz, Group Manager of Conservation Programs for Ducks Unlimited, "this area represents the most significant breeding waterfowl habitat in the world and this region has lost much of its native grasslands, resulting in damage to nesting ducks."

"Grasslands that remain in this area will be eligible for GRP and are absolutely critical to the future of waterfowl populations on this continent," continued Dr. Wentz.

According to Jeff Nelson, who directs the Ducks Unlimited Great Plains Regional Office in Bismarck, N.D., the prairies once formed one of the largest grassland tracts in the world. "What once stretched endlessly across the Great Plains in a sea of grass

is now one of the most vulnerable ecosystems in the world."

The GRP is based on a very successful and rapidly growing conservation tools known as voluntary conservation agreements, which are binding contracts where a landowner agrees to conserve marginal farmland for various periods of time in exchange for government payments.

With this program, great strides can be made with this program to restore and protect grasslands, at least for the short term, if history is an accurate guide, under CRP alone, more than 33 million acres of U.S. farmland has been enrolled in these ten or fifteen year conservation agreements.

How important is large tracts of grassland to duck reproduction?

According to Scott Stephens, a D.U. research biologist with the Great Plains Regional Office,

"We've collected information on over 4,000 duck nests and other grassland nesting birds for the past two years, there is strong evidence that indicates that nesting success is higher in areas where over 70% of a four square mile site is comprised of grasslands. Although breeding ducks, will take advantage of other grassland cover such as CRP, several species of shorebirds only nest in native pastures and further loss will only compound the decline of certain shorebird populations."

Studies by DU, The Nature Conservancy and the National Cattlemen's Beef Association describes the impact of lost grassland to wildlife. "Birds that require native grasslands for breeding habitat are the most declining group of birds in North America." The report also points out that since the 1700's, the U.S. has lost a larger portion of grass-

lands than the former Soviet Union, China and South America.

The new Grassland Reserve Program will enroll up to two million acres of grasslands in 10, 15, 20 and 40 year contracts, as well as perpetual easements at a cost of \$254 million. \$1.517 billion has been allocated for the Conservation Reserve Program, which will bring the total enrollment up from 36.2 million acres to 39.2 million acres. The Wetlands Reserve program will get \$1.5 billion, raising the program's total acreage to 2.275 million acres.

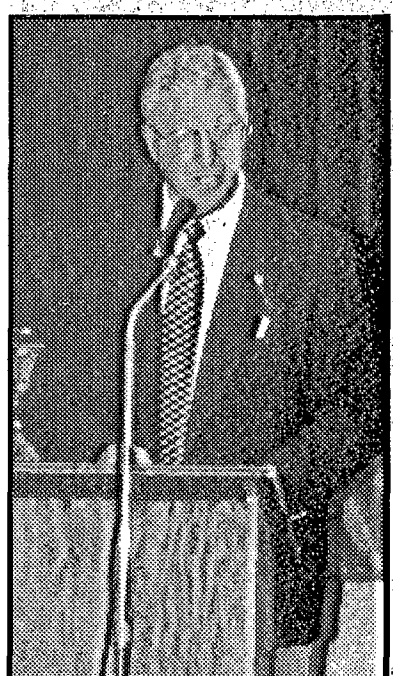

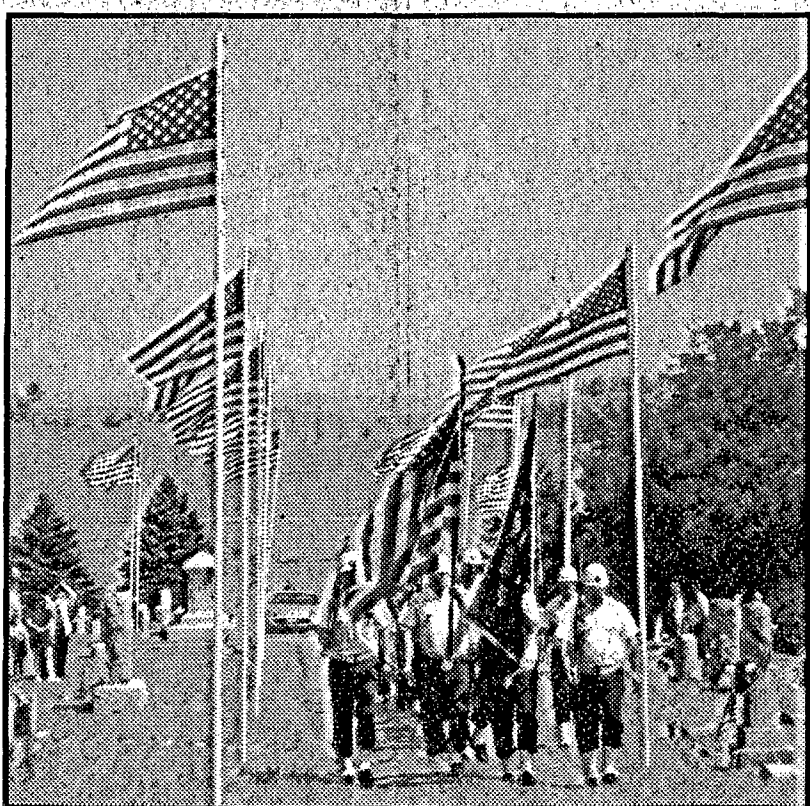

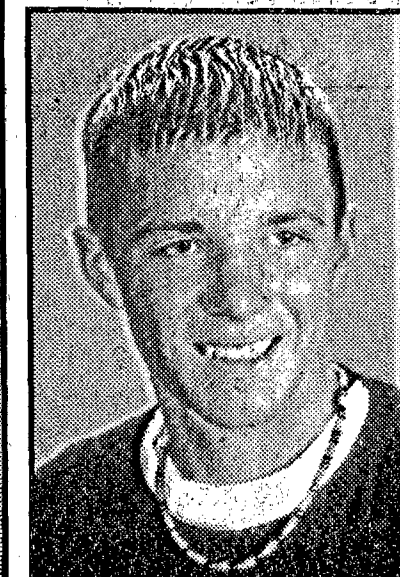

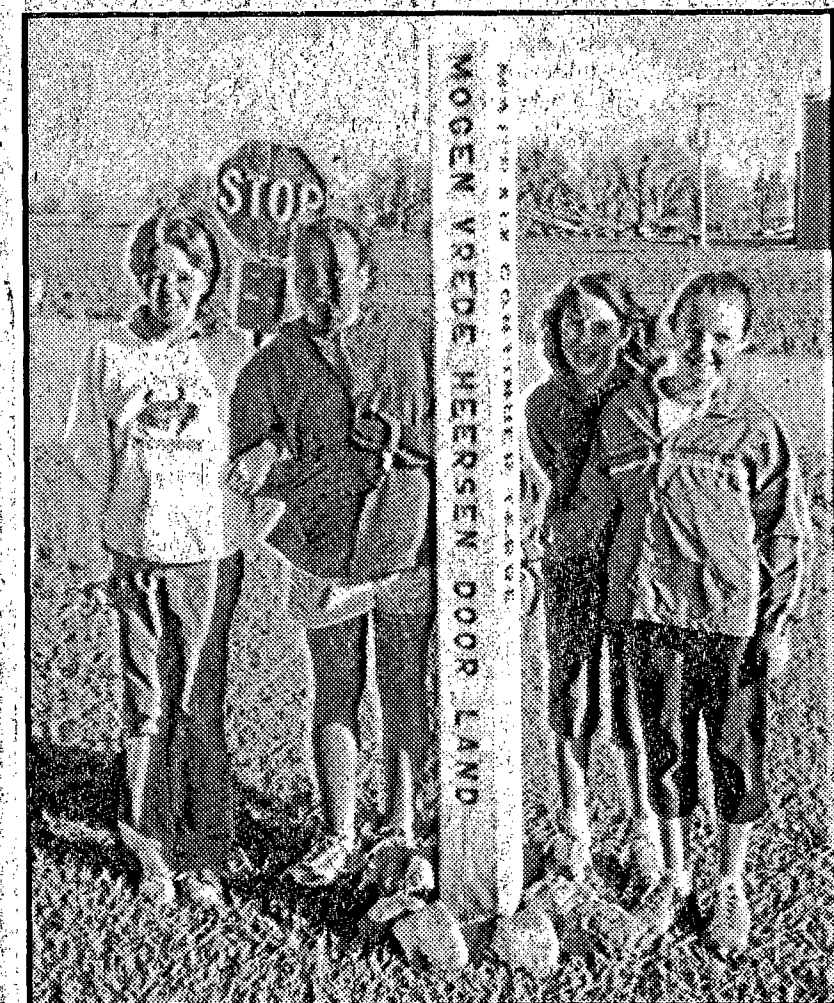

 *Regulates and improves overall body functions.

Tips for exercising success...
 *Don't overdo it. Do low to moderate-level walking, especially at first. You can slowly increase the duration and intensity of your walking as you become more fit.
 *Keep up your record of your walking. Reward yourself at special milestones. Nothing motivates like success!
 *Surround yourself with supportive people. Decide what kind of support you need. Do you want them to remind you to exercise? Ask about your progress?
 *Participate with you regularly or occasionally? Allow you time to exercise by yourself? Be understanding when you get up early to exercise?
 *Use music to keep you entertained.
 *Set aside a regular time for walking. If you don't plan ahead, it is a lot easier to skip. Holding your walking time "sacred" helps you adhere to your plan.

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Use of Medicine for Depression More Common Today

According to a report in *The Journal of the American Medical Association*, only 7 out of 1,000 persons in the US were treated on an outpatient basis with medicines for depression in 1987. Ten years later, in 1997, 23 out of 1,000 persons were treated on an outpatient basis for depression - a threefold increase. Any stigma associated with having depression and/or receiving treatment for depression seems to be declining.

Various treatments are available in depression care. Among the most common are medicines and psychotherapy. According to the report, in 37% of individuals treated for depression received medicines in 1987. By 1997 this number doubled to 75%. The availability of newer medicines (called *selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors*) with fewer side effects and less complicated dosage regimens is one reason cited by the report authors for this increase in medicine use in depression.

Governor proclaims 'Month'

As crops begin to grow this spring, some of Nebraska's pesky weeds are starting to grow too.

That's why Governor Mike Johanns signed a proclamation recognizing the potential of noxious weeds have for reducing crop yield. June will be recognized as "Noxious Weed Awareness Month."

"Noxious weed control is essential to Nebraska's number one industry — agriculture," said Merlyn Carlson, Nebraska Director of Agriculture. "It protects agriculture and our natural resources from profit-robbing pest weeds."

Spring marks the start of the growing season for noxious weeds which compete with pasture and crops, reducing yields considerably. Some noxious weeds can be poisonous or injurious to humans, livestock and wildlife. By law, it is the duty of each person who owns or controls land to effectively control noxious weeds on their property.

The Nebraska Department of Agriculture (NDA) encourages the public to report noxious weed infestations to their county weed control authority. The county weed superintendent identifies each noxious weed and assists with control recommendations. If infestations go uncontrolled, legal action is set in motion by the county weed control authority.

Seven weeds are designated noxious in Nebraska including musk thistle, Canada thistle, plumeless thistle, spotted knapweed, diffuse knapweed, leafy spurge and purple loosestrife.

Local 4-h club, car dealer participate in program

Pop's Partners 4-H Club in Wakefield and Arnie's Ford Mercury in Wayne are participating in a car dealer program which supports E-10 Unleaded with Ethanol. 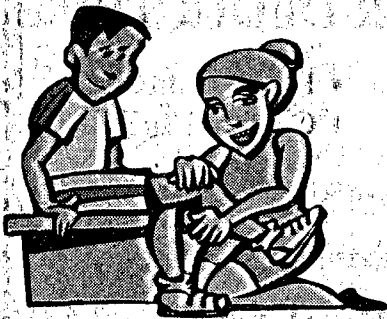

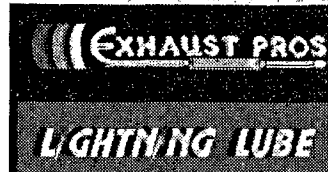

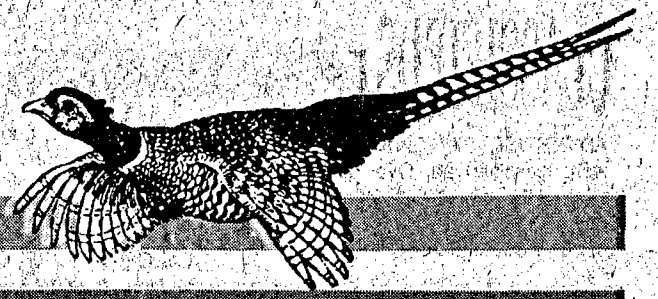
