

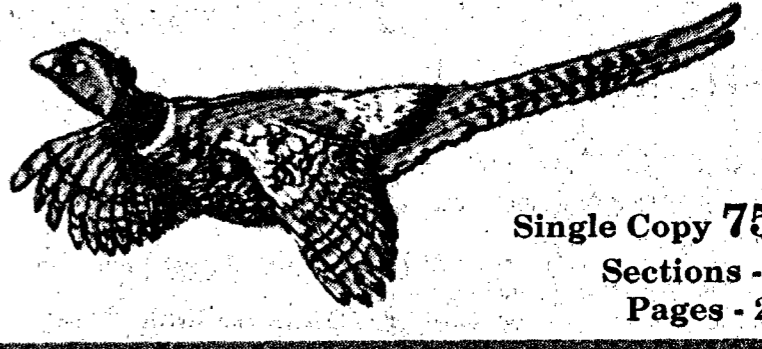

Wayne track project has begun

Work is underway on updating the running track at Wayne High School. The aging surface, built in the early 1970's, has not been used by Wayne student-athletes in meets for the past several years due to cracks and deterioration.

Brower Construction of Sioux City began tearing up the old surface last week. Assistant Superintendent Jim Case says the old surface was chewed up with a special machine, then re-used

to help make the base for the new track. He said, "The old surface makes for an excellent base. You can't find anything better than that."

Case also said that the old track, which was 440 yards, sloped out. The new track, which will be 400 meters, will be sloped in. "The runners will notice quicker times because they will be running on a banked curve instead of slanting out like the old track. It's like a race car running on a banked track."

With the conversion from 440 yards to 400 meters, which is seven feet and

eight inches shorter, the new track will be 29 feet wide compared to 30 feet before.

Case says the asphalt surface, which is being poured this week, will be put down in two parts. The first will be two inches thick with a second surface of another one and a half inches put on top for a total of three and a half inches of asphalt. Then, a sports surface will be put on top of the asphalt to complete the new running track.

With every project, the unexpected happens. Case said his crew came across a surprise along the northwest

corner of the track. He says when his crew was taking out the old track, they discovered an eight by ten foot storm sewer. The big machine that chews up the surface almost fell into the pit, which would have caused a delay in the project. He says the storm sewer was connected to the drainage ditch that is adjacent to the running track.

Wayne Activities Director Rocky Ruhl said that there are other changes planned for the new track. "The jump pits that were inside the track for the

WSC strives to ease students into college life

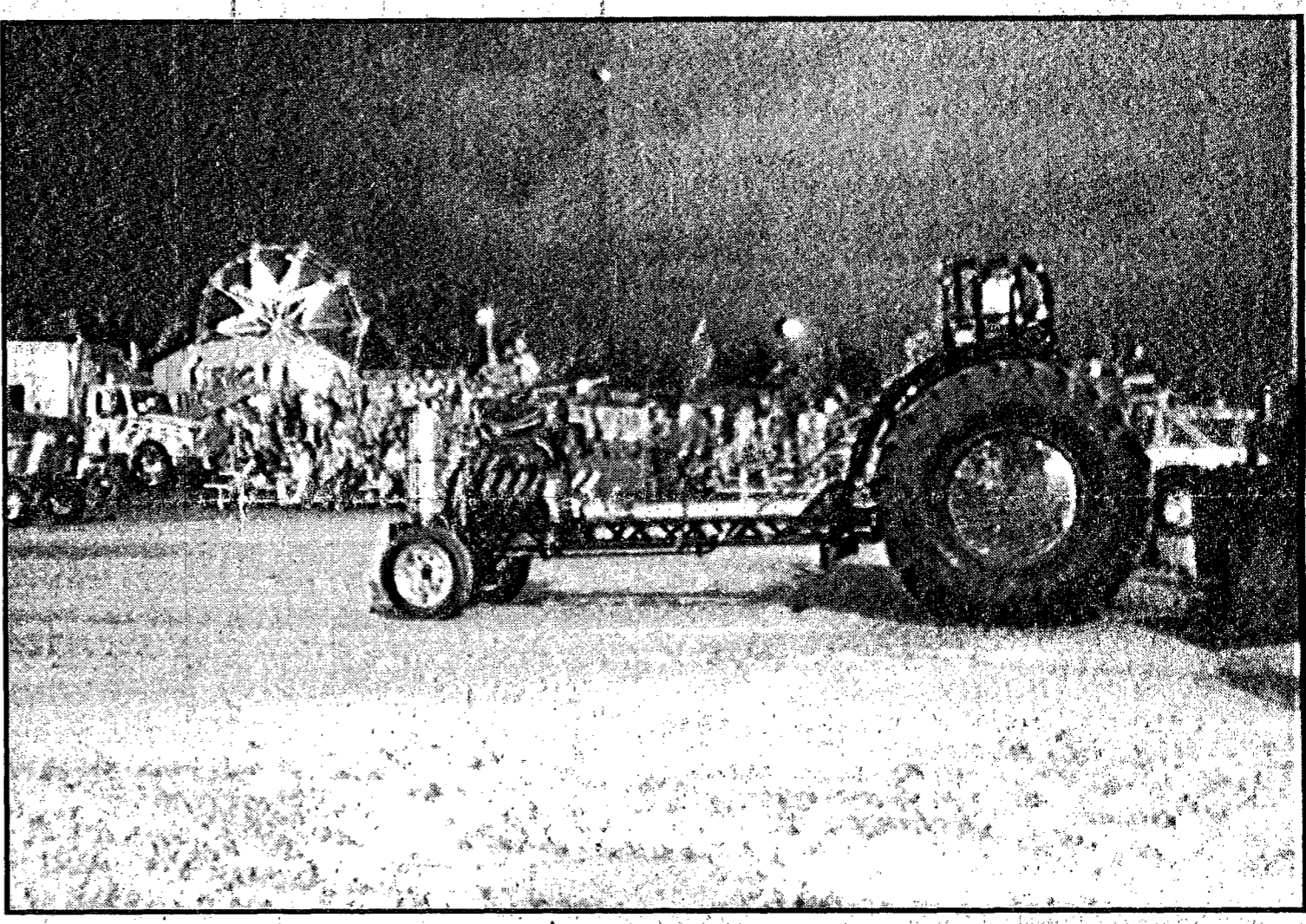
Wayne State College students will take part in orientation activities at Wayne State College, on Friday, Aug. 23 through Sunday, Aug. 25.

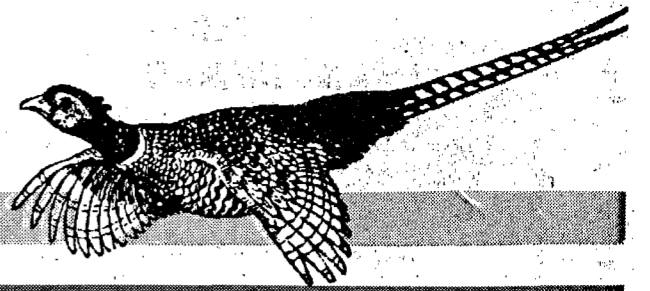

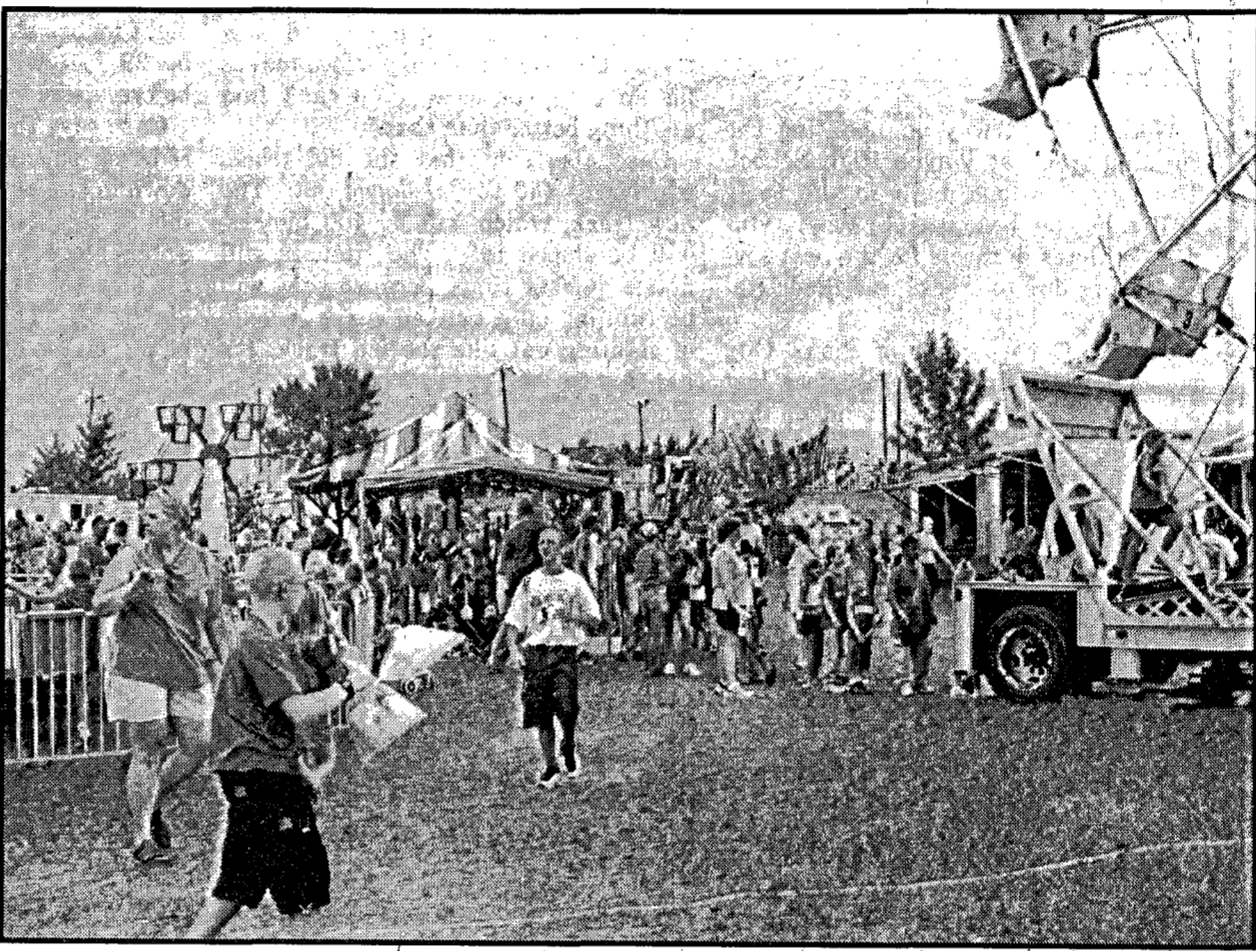

and computer network services. The evening concludes with an outdoor freshman dance in Heritage Plaza located in front of Conn Library.

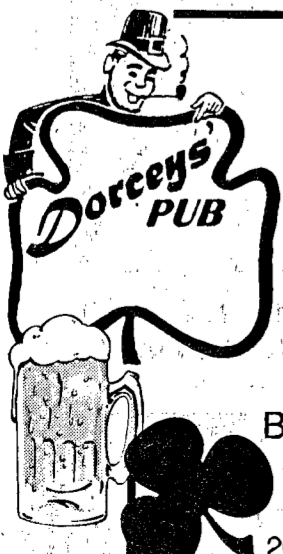

Ernie Chambers hit on some painful truth last week when he was ranting at other members of the Legislature.

You won't be surprised to know that the topic was racism.

The senior member of the Unicameral and Nebraska's only black lawmaker, Chambers' legend centers on his fiery attacks against perceived racism.

His critics, to be measured in legions, contend Chambers sees racism in the sunrise and finds unfairness in the alphabet. They argue that he is himself a racist. Anyone acquainted with the Omaha lawmaker for any length of time can easily envision him responding to such allegations - gently or in anger - with something like: "The facts will speak for themselves."

That's what the facts did, in my mind, when the Omaha solon opened fire on his colleagues about allegedly bowing to Gov. Mike Johanns on budget policy matters in the current special session.

Chambers used words, sometimes like razors and sometimes like ball bats, to scourge his fellows. He called them cowards and said they were incompetent, unfit for their jobs.

And then the subject switched briefly to competence and race. And that's when the truth of his argument became obvious. And painful. Chambers referred to a top official in the Johanns administration, at the Department of Health and Human Services, who failed to secure millions of dollars in available federal aid. The governor had defended the fellow, effectively arguing that there were extenuating circumstances. Such a defense was baloney, Chambers said.

And that's when he reminded everyone of what struck me as what is still an altogether real and unfortunate truth. If the bureau-

crat who screwed up were black, he would have been labeled an incompetent; someone who got his job only because of "affirmative action," the proof of a stereotypical black person who can't be trusted with responsibility. White people "can show incompetency and it's overlooked," Chambers said.

So far as race is concerned, he was entirely correct. White men can be incompetent and still be criticized. Their incompetence just isn't attributed to race. Usually, it's attributed to party affiliation - but not race. Otherwise, he was entirely correct.

Another thought: If the Legislature had exactly its current level of competence, but were made up of blacks, the public would argue that "you never should have let them out of slavery," Chambers said.

It's true.

What I kept thinking about, as Chambers argued his view, was that bureaucrat who screwed up. If he had been black, the fact is that there would have been all manner of vicious comment (in private) centering on race. Chambers reminded everyone of well-worn stereotypes: Black people can't handle responsibility; they can't be trusted; they don't belong in truly important jobs. Let a black person err and he or she is "a token," a ignoramus unleashed by the devil of affirmative action.

Then, my mind wandered from that bureaucratic snafu in the Johanns' administration. I thought about Enron. And Tyco. And all those other industrial giants that had management teams and directors whose incompetence made George Armstrong Custer look like a tactical and strategic genius.

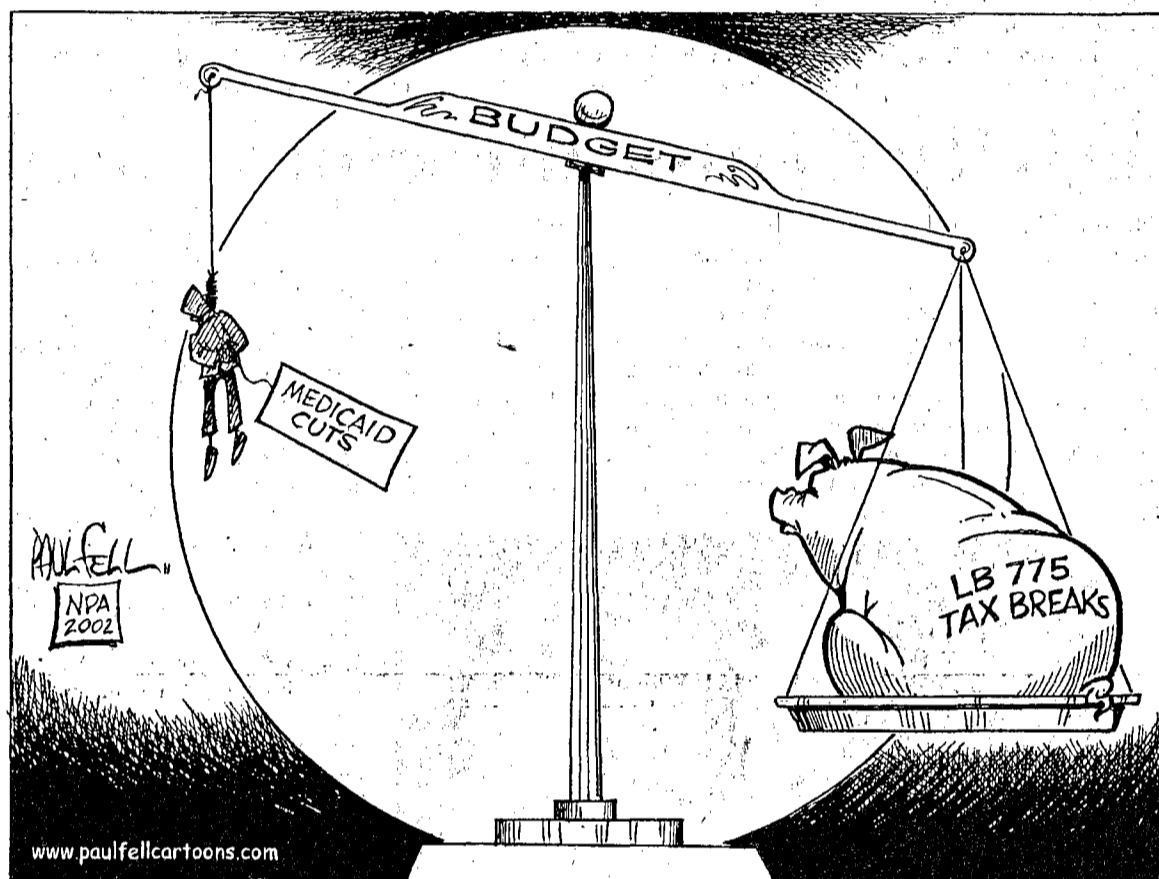
That collection of boobs and conscienceless, incompetent thieves is as white as any Ku Kluxer's dreams. There haven't been any snide remarks akin to: "That's what happens when you put a bunch of Caucasians in charge!"

Were there a lot of black folk in the nation's top security jobs when we failed to find and stop the 9/11 terrorists?

Has affirmative action put some people in jobs that they can't handle? Absolutely. And we don't seem to have trouble seeing it - right or wrong.

But Chambers' point was, in this instance, altogether valid and on point. Race becomes a central issue in our collective mind when some miscreant or incompetent is a person of color.

Jim Crow is dead, and unlamented. But his ghost is still around and about.

long, triple and high jump will now be moved to an area west of the track building. The starting chutes for the sprint races along the northwest and northeast corners of the track will also be cut down since the track is a little smaller than the old one."

Ruhl also said that there will be new areas for the shot put and discus. The shot put will be moved to the southeast corner of the track while the discus will be moved west of the track on the new football practice field area.

He says the cost of the project is an estimated \$200,000. Total fundraising to this point is at \$176,000, which includes pledges earmarked for the project.

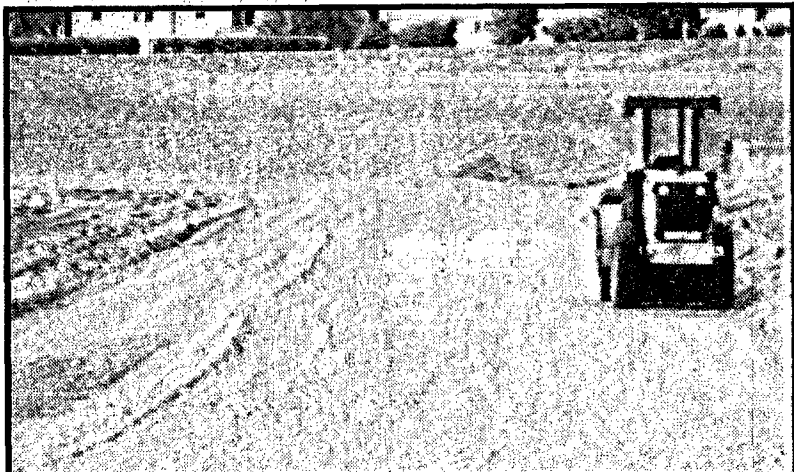

Activity Center director named

The Wayne City Council met in regular session Tuesday evening at City Hall.

The council passed an ordinance that restricts parking on Walnut Street east of the Wayne State College campus. No parking will be

allowed between midnight and 5 pm from 10th and Walnut north to 12th and Walnut. City Administrator Lowell Johnson says the restricted parking will take effect when the new signs are put in place. Since most parking bans in Wayne are from midnight to 5 am, the new signs will be made larger to signify the mid-

night to 5 pm parking ban.

The council approved the appointment of Justin Thede as the new Community Activity Center Director. Thede was chosen from a pool of 17 applicants and will make \$13.70 an hour in the part-time position, working 34 hours per week. He will begin his duties on Oct. 1.

The council heard design plans from Water Superintendent Harold Reynolds on the extension of well #6 to the golf course. The well, which is located one-half mile west of the golf course, will have a new line run from the well to the highway, then hook into the golf course line. The cost of the project is an estimated \$68,000 and work could begin as soon as October. Well #6 will then become a backup to the golf course well for the front nine.

Several proposals for landscaping at the Community Activity Center were made by Joel Hansen. The council voted on having five feet of rock, then grass in front of the building. The rock in front of the building would help keep water stains off made by the sprinkler system. The estimated cost of the landscaping project is around \$3,100.

The council then received an update on the punchlist of things that need to be done properly on the new fire hall. Dale Bowder of JEO, the architect for the project, says he found about two dozen things on a punchlist of 10-11 pages of things that did not meet satisfaction. He said "there are a lot of little things that need to be done." The council later agreed to withhold the final payment of nearly \$120,000 to Crafts, Inc. of Norfolk until the work is done correctly.

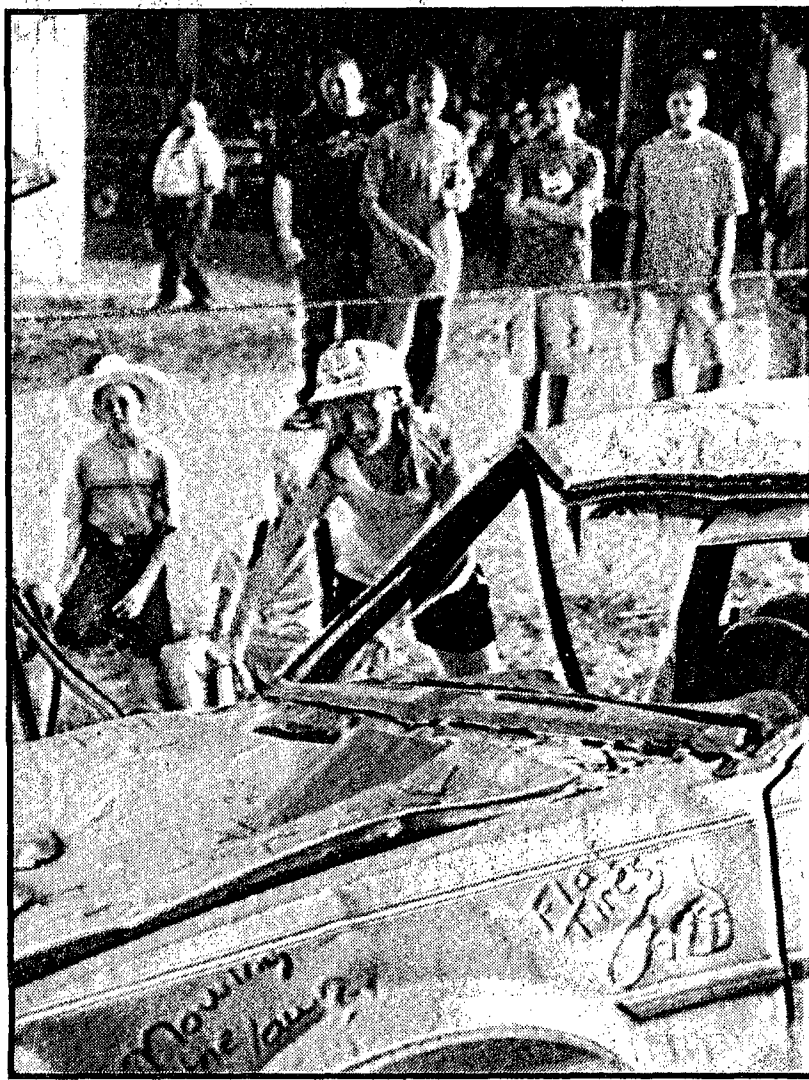
Before the regular meeting, the council held a two-hour budget work session. City Administrator Lowell Johnson says things are going well with the upcoming 2002-2003 budget. He added there are two key issues facing the council in comparing the new budget compared to last year's.

The first he says is the city will be receiving nearly \$45,000 less from the state this year than last due to the state budget shortfall. The second issue will be the addition of the Community Activity Center to the general fund budget.

Johnson says the activity center opening will add another \$120,000 to the budget, which is the basic operational costs like heating, insurance, and staffing. He says there is an unknown factor involved, that being how many memberships will be sold and at what cost to help with expenses of the facility. He says the council is taking a conservative approach in adding the facility to the budget.

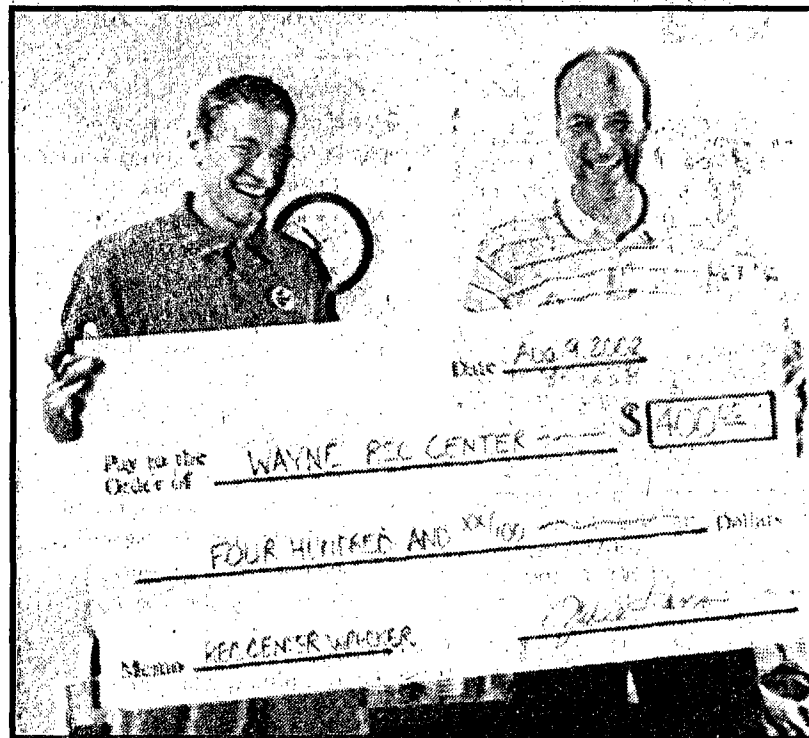
With the addition of the activity center and less state money, Johnson says other projects in the city will suffer. He says any new equipment purchases and some street and park projects will be put on hold to see how the budget numbers work out.

Johnson also said that the new Fire Hall will hold an open house on Oct. 5 to show the facility to the public.

Before leaving to come here, we mentioned traveling to the United States and everyone assumed we were coming to Florida to visit Disney World," Eithne said.

In spite of their troubles getting here, both Geoff and Eithne agreed they had a good trip and saw a lot on this trip.

Some of the places they visited included Mt. Rushmore, Grand Teton, Jackson Hole, Wyo., Badlands, and the Corn Palace. Eithne noted the Crazy Horse Monument (which is nearly done) and is located in the Black Hills, is an expensive place to visit.

While in Yellowstone, they went camping. The family is used to camping as they do so in France which is near them (Paris is only a four-hour drive from their home). A sight they remember from their drive near the Black Hills was seeing a lot of bikers near Sturgis, S.D., which they thought was really different.

Another thing that was different was seeing so many big trucks and R.V.s, or caravans as they call them.

Geoff noted how vast the land is here; how you can travel for miles with it looking pretty much the same. At home, the family lives near Cardiff, the capital of Wales — about 180 miles west of London, which is an area of diverse terrain. The family lives within 10-15 minutes from the Bristol Channel, 15-20 minutes from a forest and a half an hour from mountains (for good skiing they go up to Scotland or to the French Alps). It only snows maybe once a year where they live. "We like it when it snows," Eithne said. "Everything stops; we're not geared up for it."

As for agriculture, there are

farms near them where various crops are raised (no corn) and cattle and sheep.

Geoff remarked they have motorways (interstates) like here but they don't have to travel so far to visit the different countries in Europe. Eithne said there are many school trips taken to the various countries.

Because of the close proximity to their neighboring countries, children are taught a number of languages in school. Though English is the main language spoken, learning Welsh (a Celtic language) is also mandatory in the lower grades; as well as French and German in high school classes. For students desiring to learn more languages through informal opportunities, there's Japanese Clubs and Italian Clubs.

Classes in Wales are divided into three areas; infant school, junior school and high school. Lee will be going into high school and Stephen is in junior school. There's only six weeks off for summer vacation and school will start again in September.

On a sad note, Geoff said that music and art used to be on the school curriculum in Wales but because of a lack of funding, not much of it is offered now.

Though the children don't get much time off from school, Eithne, an occupational therapist, gets 13 weeks off per year from her job. Geoff gets five weeks off plus regular holidays. Geoff is an area manager at an adult learning disability facility.

While in the states, an annoying thing they noticed when watching T.V. was there are so many more commercials here than at home. Lee said, "At the end of a show, before they even give the credits, they have to get advertisements in." Geoff noted they have channels

with some advertising but there are two channels with none that people help fund by buying a T.V. license.

Also annoying was our heat and bugs. It rains a lot in Wales and there aren't so many flies, etc. as here.

Another difference is our currency. One dollar and 50 cents here equals one pound sterling there. They use more coins than bills and they commented how surprised they were we use one dollar bills which is more burdensome, they think, than coins.

While we have more fast food places than they do, they have more restaurants and feel they pay less at theirs than here.

Foods, supermarkets, movies and clothing is similar between the two countries. While they found Levi jeans cheaper here, other clothing seems to be more expensive. There are no Wal-marts or Targets in Wales but they have similar stores which are not nearly as big as supermarkets here. One food they hadn't had until coming here were S'mores but Stephen had heard of them on "The Simpsons" show.

Geoff and Eithne had been to the U.S. once before; about 12 years ago they went to Boston, Maine, and the Niagara Falls area. "One thing we make sure we do when coming to the states is to buy good health insurance as they are on a national health program in Wales.

Thinking of the U.S., Eithne said the houses are different here than in Wales. They have more victorian-looking homes that are made of brick with two or three stories built together but no basements.

"When we think of America, we think of a big, exciting place," Geoff said. But what the family found that is really different here is how friendly everyone is.

New staff contracts approved

The regular meeting of the Wayne Community Schools board of education was held Monday night. A number of new staff contracts were approved. They are: Anna Chenoweth as a long-term substitute/math-science teacher, and Linda Scrivner as a custodian in the Middle School.

Also, with an increased number of special education students more help is needed so Rebecca Ondersteall has been hired as a para professional in the special education department.

The sale of the Carroll Elementary building has been delayed. Discussion on this will be held at the September meeting. Ken Bethune of Carroll is interested in purchasing the building.

The board approved the service agreement of R.W. Rice Company maintenance service agreement. The agreement is for the high school and elementary boilers/ air conditioner.

Teachers negotiated agreement has been delayed until Dr. Joe Reinert, superintendent, has a chance to study it further.

The board approved a one year agreement with Mutual of Omaha as the insurance company for the school.

Lori Carollo, Kristy Hinnerichs, and Cap Peterson spoke to the board about AEDs (automated external defibrillator). With CPR

and AEDs, chances of saving someone in cardiac arrest are very good.

They noted having one on hand at the school would be a good idea and they have one for sale. The Red Cross could help with training and with CPR.

Since buying a defibrillator and receiving staff training is not figured into the budget, a grant has been applied for. The school will find out if they are chosen to receive the grant around the first of October. Agreeing with the importance of this, the board noted more discussion is needed on this at future meetings.

A couple of concerned parents were on hand to let everyone know about a meeting this Thursday night (Aug. 15) at the auditorium at 8 p.m. A drug raid was conducted in town last week raising concern on the amount and availability of drugs in Wayne. Among other drugs, methamphetamines (a very addictive drug) were found in the bust.

At the meeting, law enforcement, probation and medical/counseling personnel are scheduled to share information about drugs to help awareness and education on drugs and how to stop them in this community.

The board approved a tuition waiver for Yun-Pei Hsiung (or David as he likes to be called), 17, rotary foreign exchange program student staying with the Dan Rose family in Wayne. David will be a

junior at Wayne High School this academic year.

David Lutt, elementary principal, gave a report on enrollment. He noted student numbers were good with 310 students signed up to start school and 28 new Kindergarten children coming in.

John McClarnen, principal at the middle school, stated enrollment is at 257. And, Dr. Don Zeiss, high school principal, noted enrollment there is down with the number around 305 instead of about 319 last year.

Because of state aid lost last year, the board approved exclusion to the levy limit of \$73,693.42. This approval provides the budget authority to replace the funds lost last legislative session.

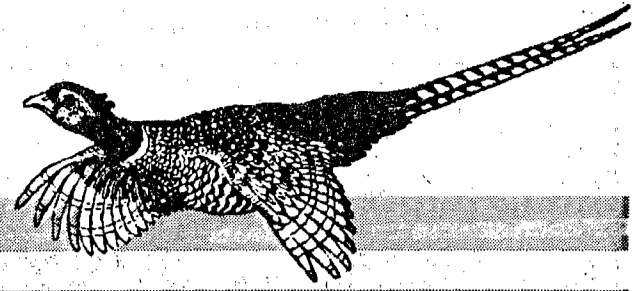
The first reading took place on a number of board policies. The policies covered pupil accounting, pupil promotion and retention, married students and pregnant students, vehicles, noon hour driving, student dress, discipline, exclusion and suspension, expulsion, student rights, and procedures for due process. The policies will be discussed at upcoming meetings.

Winning the High School Boys Division was Ric Volk, firing an 80. Eric Sturm placed second with 82 and Ryan Hix was third at 94.

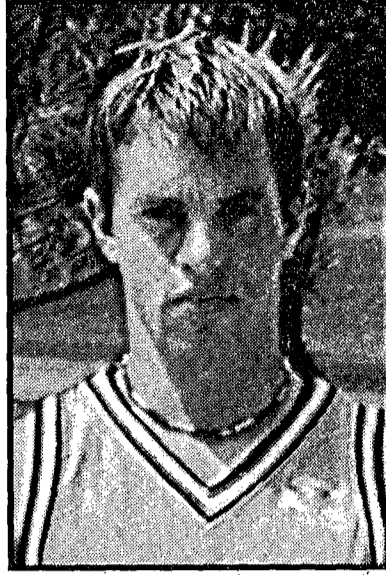
John Brady won the 15-year-old Boys title with a 99. Derek Carroll was second at 112 and Kyle Straight shot a 116 to take third place.

Andy Diediker edged Drew Workman in a playoff to win the 10-11 year-old boys title after both players shot a 67. Dustin Stegeman was third at 72.



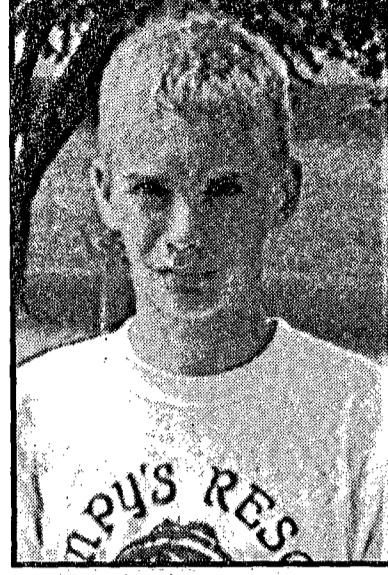

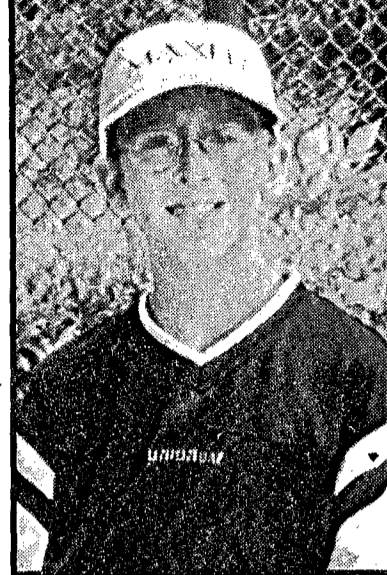

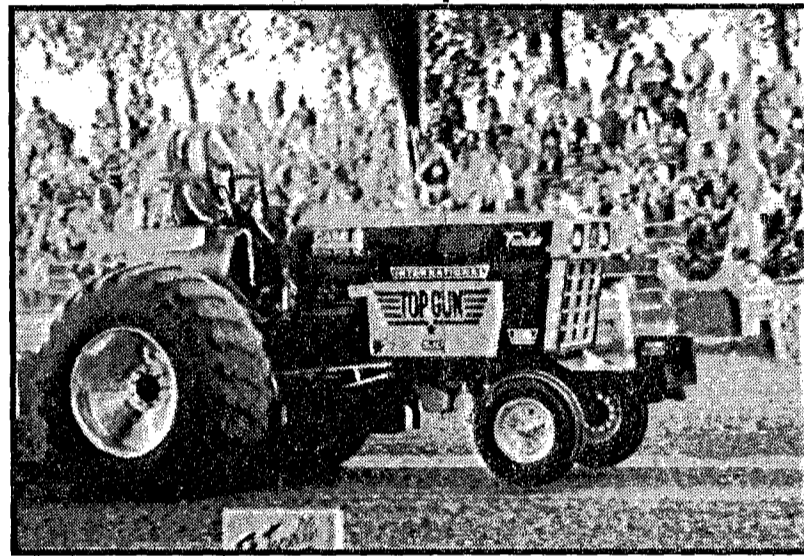
Rusty Hamer and Robbie Sturm each had two singles to

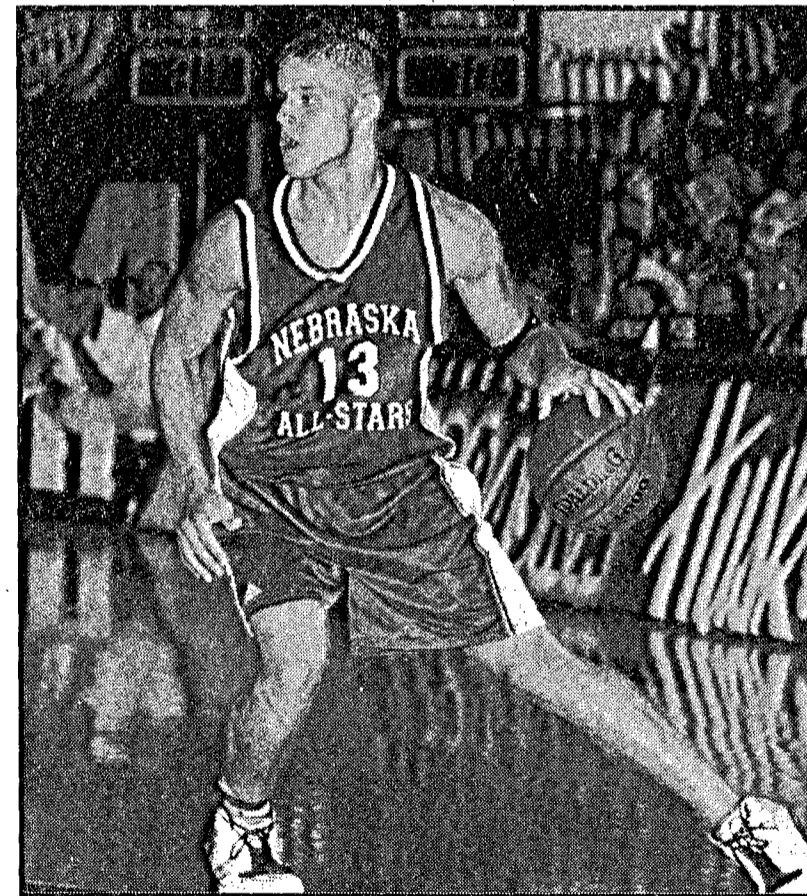
Joe Brown was the losing pitcher despite pitching all nine innings. He allowed two runs, just one was earned, on eight hits.

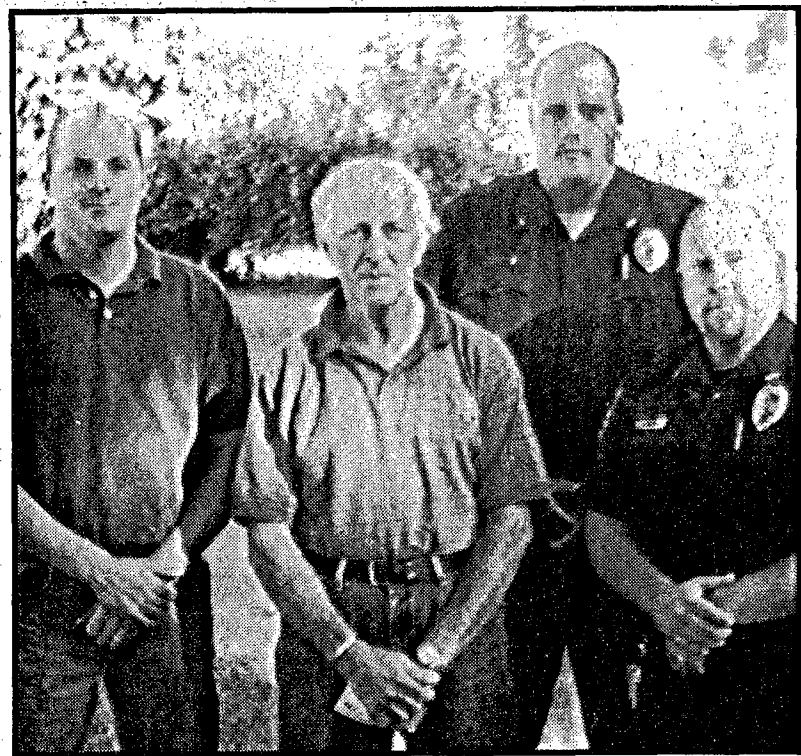

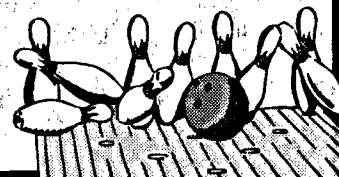

Hunter safety class planned

On the evenings of Aug. 20, 22, 27, 29 and the morning of Aug. 24, a hunter safety education class will be held in the elementary science room of the Winside Public School. The classes will meet from 7 to 9 p.m.

On Saturday morning, Aug. 24, the class will meet from 8:30 to 11:30. Students should not bring firearms to the classes. Ron Leapey, a Nebraska certified hunter education instructor, and Darin Greunke will be teaching the class.

Successful completion of this class is required of persons ages 12 through 15 and persons born on or after Jan. 1, 1977 to legally hunt in the State of Nebraska. The class is sponsored by the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission and Leapey will teach the class as a certified volunteer teacher for the Game and Parks Commission.

While the class is designed for youngsters, adults are welcome to take the class. Adults may need this class if they plan to hunt in other states. Any youngster who will be 11 years or older within this calendar year is welcome to

take the class.

There is no charge for the class and the materials will be provided by the Game and Parks Commission. The Winside School is providing a classroom and equipment. Students will be handling firearms as part of the class but are not required to shoot a firearm. Students must pass a test at the end of the class to receive their certificate.

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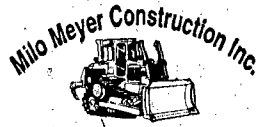
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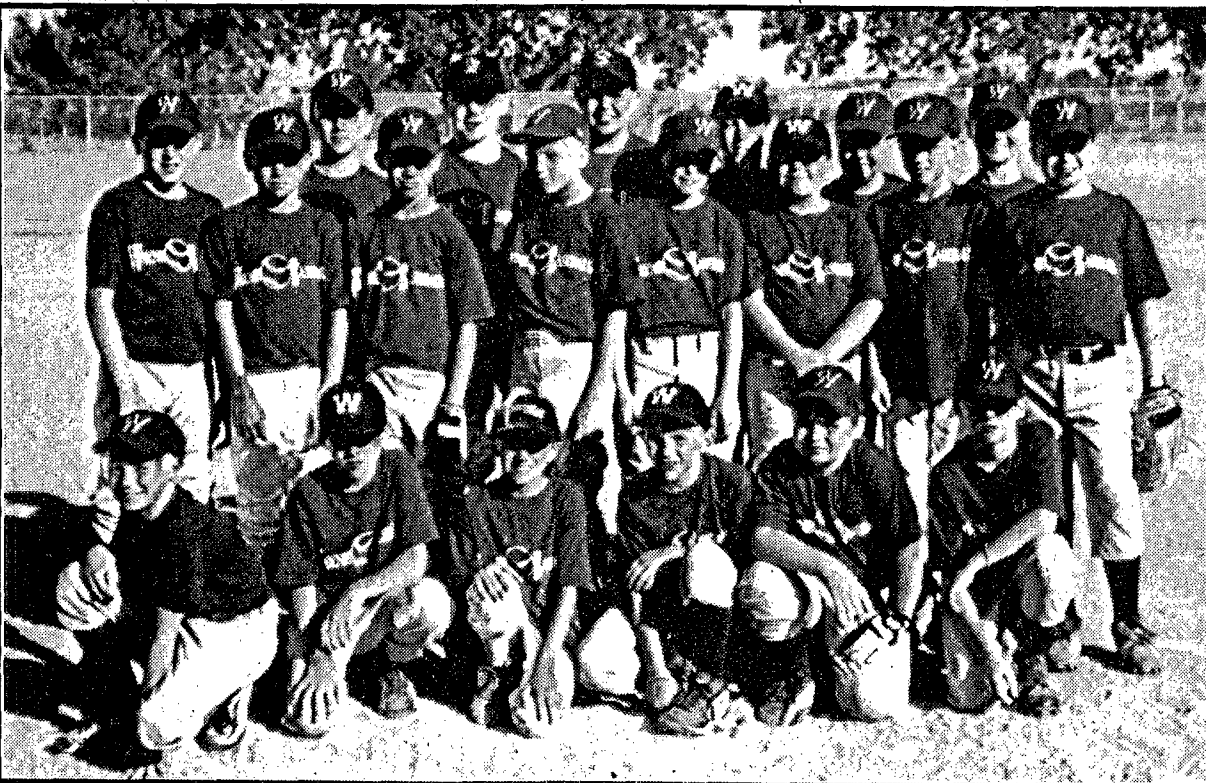

Update given on Chronic Wasting Disease which can cause fatalities in deer and elk

Chronic Wasting Disease or CWD is getting more and more press coverage all the time!

Exactly where the disease came from, how it's transmitted and where it will go from here is a question that is on many people's minds.

The disease, which affects the brain, is a fatal disease affecting Mule Deer, Whitetail Deer and Rocky Mountain Elk.

Although CWD is a contagious fatal disease among deer and elk, research suggests that humans, cattle, and other domestic animals are resistant to natural transmission. Since so little is known about CWD and how it is transmitted, the possibility of human infection remains a concern. To date, there have been no verified cases of humans contracting CWD.

It was first detected in the wild in 1981, but it's highly unlikely that this was the first actual case.

Symptoms suggestive of animals suffering from CWD are: weight loss, lack of energy, blank facial expressions, excessive salivation, lowered heads, animals effected with the disease are highly excitable and appear very nervous.

In the 1970's, CWD was diagnosed in a captive deer herd in wildlife research facilities in Colorado and Wyoming.

In 1981 the first case of the disease was found in free-ranging wild elk in Colorado.

In 1986 the first case of the disease was diagnosed in free-ranging big game animals in Wyoming.

In June of 1999 elk from a captive herd in Montana were found

to have CWD.

In late 2000, Nebraska identified the first case of CWD in the wild in the state through a monitoring program.

Samples from deer harvested by hunters in 2001 in South Dakota and Wisconsin resulted in positive CWD diagnosis.

In March of 2001 a deer taken in New Mexico was diagnosed as the states first CWD affected animal.

In early 2001, the first case of CWD in the wild was found in Saskatchewan.

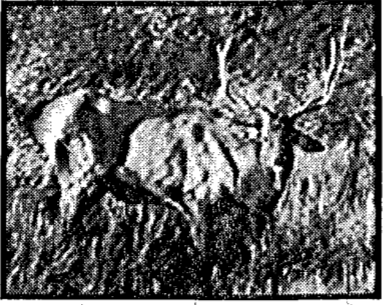

To date, the disease has been found in both captive and wild deer and elk in Kansas, Montana, the western part of Nebraska, Oklahoma, southwestern South Dakota, Wisconsin and southeast-

ern Wyoming, and the Canadian provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta.

With the growing media attention to CWD, many hunters are



asking themselves if they should continue to hunt in areas that CWD has been identified and if they should eat elk and deer harvested from these areas.

The truth is, in areas where the disease occurs; only an extremely small number of the animals are infected.

In Wyoming and Colorado, where the disease has been around for over thirty years, an average of less than six percent of the deer are infected. Infection rates in Colorado vary from 1 to 13 percent and the disease is less prevalent in elk. Less than 1 percent of elk found in areas where the disease occurs in northeastern Colorado are infected.

Hunters can take common sense precautions when hunting in areas that CWD cases have been confirmed. Avoid shooting sick or unhealthy animals, wear rubber gloves while field dressing your game, minimize contact with the brain or spinal cord and avoid eating the organs of the animal. Hunters should continue to

hunt, using common sense in areas where CWD exists and report any deer or elk that appear to be sick or suffering from CWD.

Several conservation groups have joined together to form the CWD Alliance and to organize national symposiums on CWD. The most recent symposium was held in Denver, Colorado on Aug. 6-7 and was attended by Alliance members, researchers and members of the media.

Members of the Alliance include: The Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, The Boone & Crockett Club, The Mule Deer Foundation and The Pope & Young Club.

Wildlife experts from the U.S. and Canada are working long hours to find out how the disease is transmitted and what can be done to prevent and control the disease.

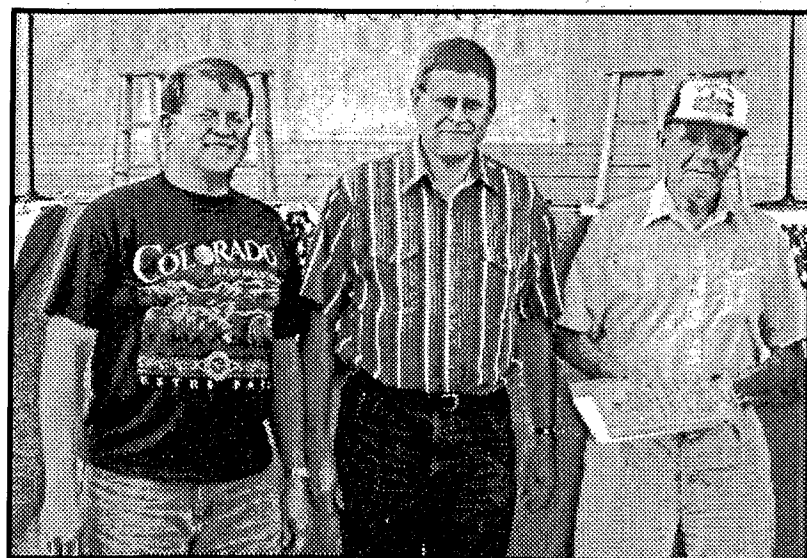

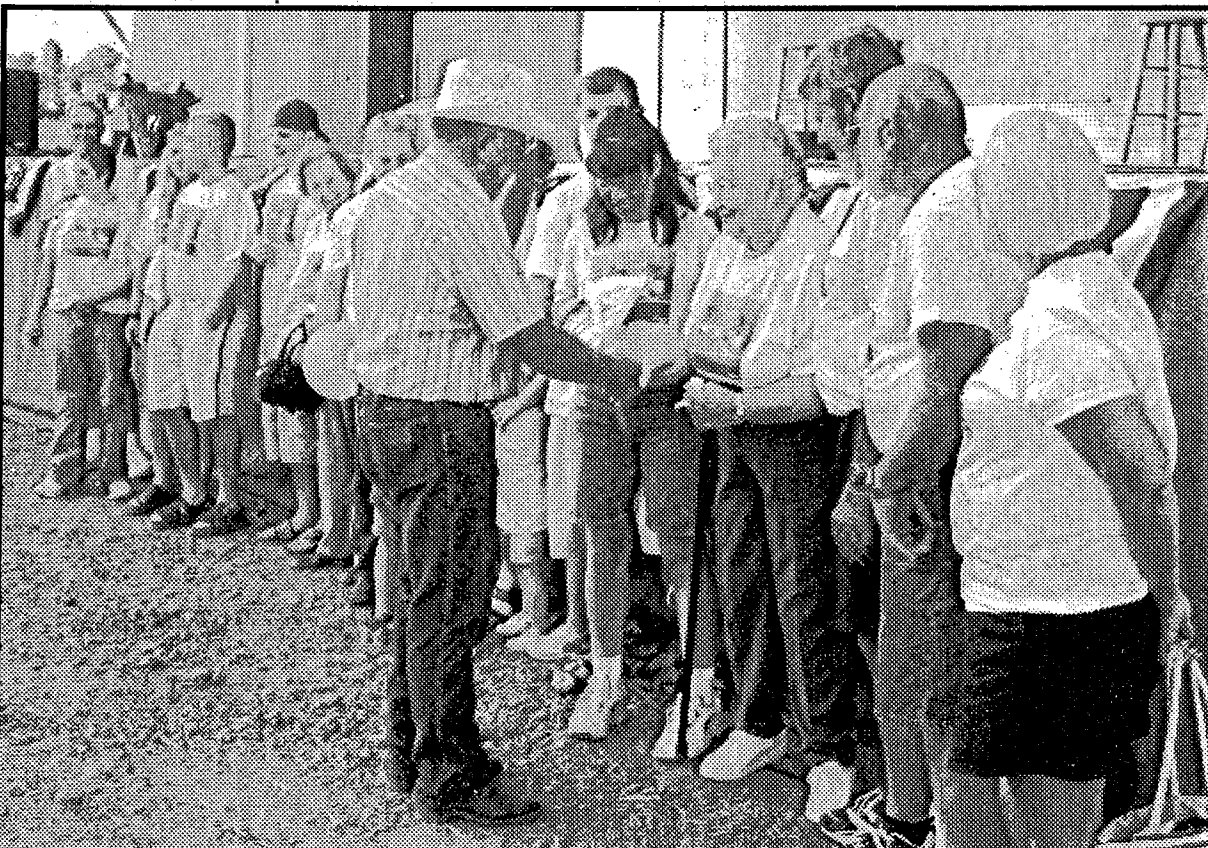

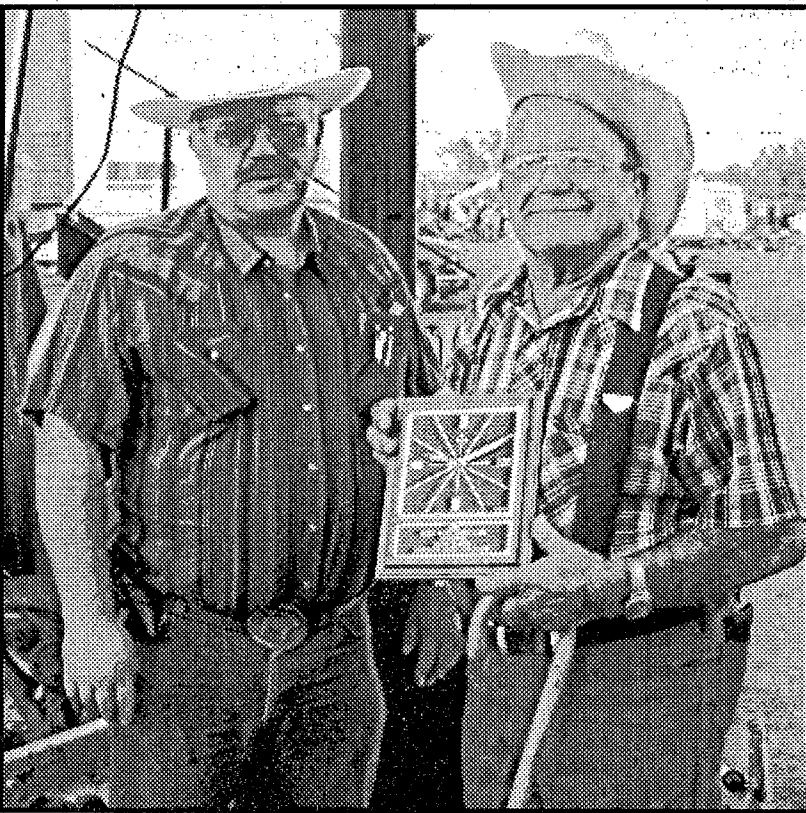

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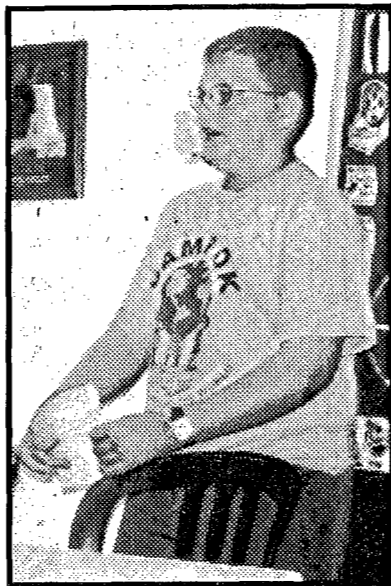
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Supporting the youth

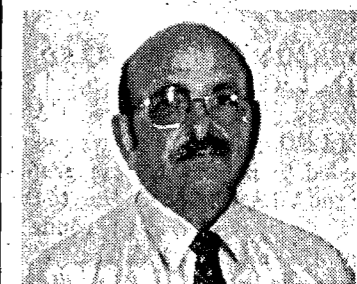

Changes and/or additions to the Wayne High School Student Handbook 2002-03

Wayne High School Lunch policy Concerning Accu-Scan tickets and Credit

1. An accu-scan card will be issued to each student at no charge at the beginning of the school year or when a student is enrolled in the Wayne Community School system. If the student chooses, we will keep their card over the summer in the high school. We do keep cards at the Middle and Elementary schools.
2. There will be no exchanging of cards among students.
3. Reminders are printed out and given to the student when two days' worth of meals are left in a student account.
4. When a negative balance is reached, the student is asked to go to the end of the line in the high school. It seems to be an effective incentive to remember lunch money. Students with a negative balance are also not allowed to buy ala carte items.
5. Tickets will be scanned by an adult familiar with the students. No adult should scan their own card. Cards will be scanned at the point of service.
6. Lunch money will be taken in the mornings during a time designated by each building. If a student cannot bring lunch money during that time, they will be allowed to leave their money in the office for the following day.
7. A student losing or damaging their card will be charged a \$3 replacement fee against their account. A student receiving the benefit of a free or reduced meal cost must be allowed three replacement cards at no charge. After three documented replacements, the student will have to pay a \$3 replacement fee or go to the end of the line so the ticket scanner can look up and manually punch in their ticket. Calcium Supplements May Not Strengthen Nails

Calcium supplements help fight osteoporosis, and many physicians recommend calcium to be taken by women throughout adult life. Nails contain some calcium - about 1/800 as much as bones - and some persons assume that taking calcium supplements will cause the nails to become stronger or less brittle. However calcium supplements do not appear to benefit nail quality.

According to a report in *New England Journal of Medicine*, researchers in New Zealand asked 683 women if their nails had become stronger or more brittle during the past year. Some of the women had been taking calcium supplements, and some had been taking a look-alike placebo. About 60% of the women in each group said that there had been no change; 29% indicated that there had been an improvement, regardless of whether or not they were taking the calcium supplement.

Researchers across the country and around the world have found that strong families have a wide variety of qualities which contribute to the family members' sense of personal worth and feelings of satisfaction with each other.

One of the important qualities of strong families is the ability to

Extension staff, volunteer leaders, adults and parents provide youth with a sense of belonging and feelings of appreciation.

For other families, 4-H may be the common link that involves all family members. Parents can show their children appreciation and affection in 4-H by attending 4-H club meetings and events, helping children learn new skills, celebrating successes, dealing with failures and modeling caring behavior. 4-H can also help families establish family traditions that will be remembered long past the color of a ribbon. 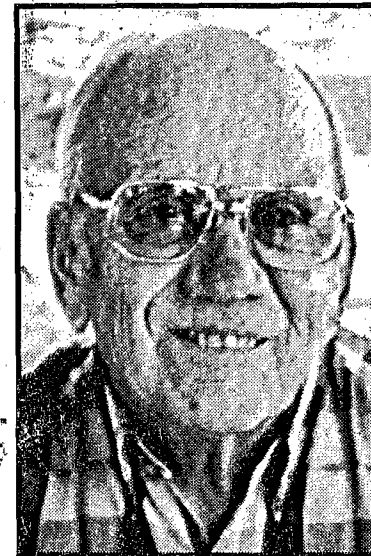

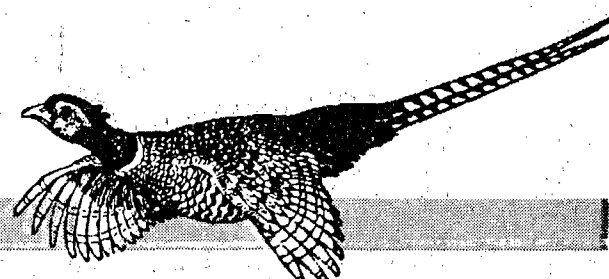

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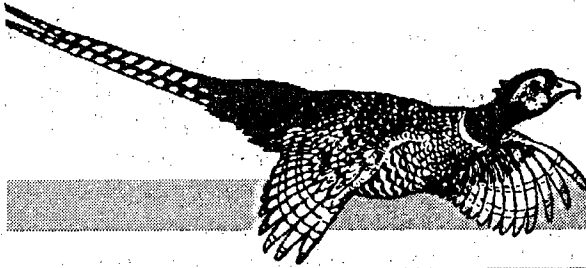

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ENFORCING ORDINANCES

In recent weeks the Dixon County Sheriff's department has stepped up enforcement of the City of Wakefield's ordinances dealing with loitering, curfew, and tobacco use by minors.

For the public's information, the following is the wording of the City of Ordinances dealing with these issues.

Curfew: It shall be unlawful for any minor under the age of 16 to ride in or operate any vehicle in or upon any street, alley, or other public place, or to loiter, wander, stroll, loaf, or play in or upon any

of the public places between the hours of 10 p.m. of any day and 6 a.m. of the following day unless accompanied by a parent, guardian or other adult person having the care, custody, or control of said minor, or the minor is engaged in lawful employment or is on an emergency errand; provided, when an activity of the kind normally attended by minors under 16 years terminates after, or less than on hour prior to 10 p.m., the curfew shall commence one hour after the termination of such activity.

Loitering and vagrants: It shall be unlawful for any person to loiter on the streets, in the park, on the sidewalk, or on any other public ways and property at unreasonable hours, and those persons who are unable to give a good and satisfactory reason why they should be there, including all vagrants and persons found without means of support or some legitimate business, shall be deemed to be guilty of loitering.

Tobacco; use by minors: It shall be unlawful for any person under the age of 18 years to smoke cigarettes or cigars, or to use tobacco in any form whatever. Any minor charged with the violation of this section may be free from prosecution when he shall have furnished evidence for the conviction of the person or persons selling or giving him the cigars or tobacco.

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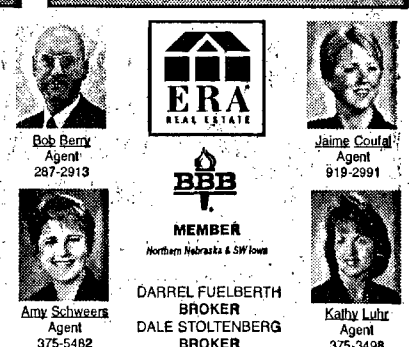
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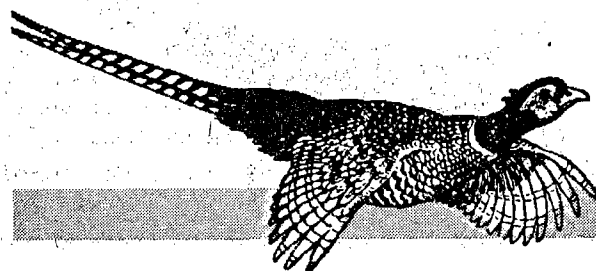


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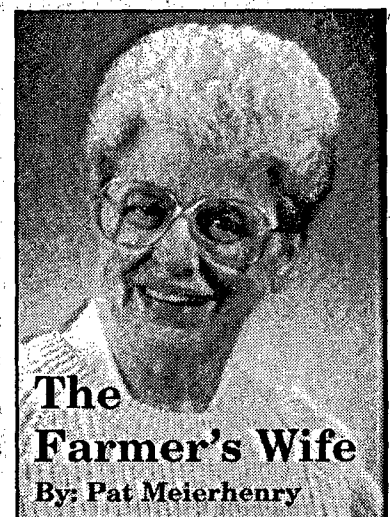
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Thankful for rain and time to relax

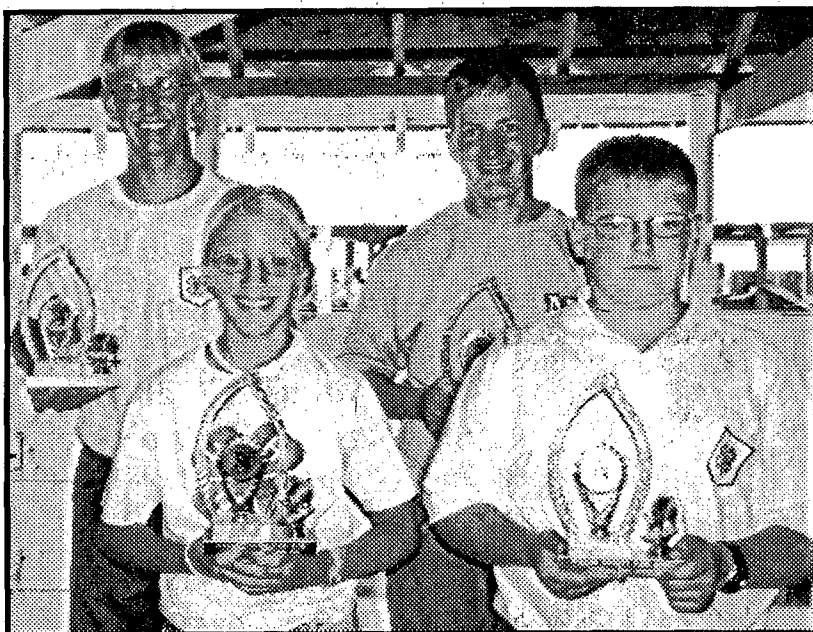

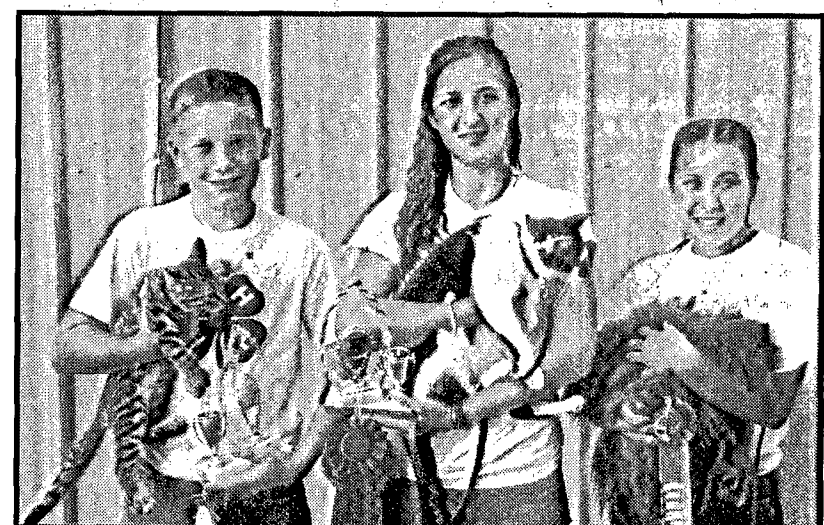

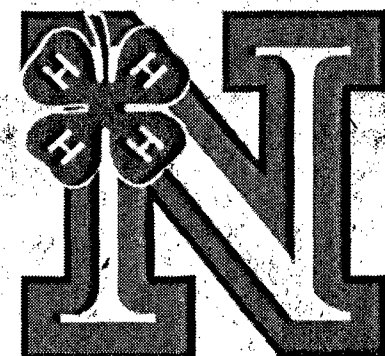

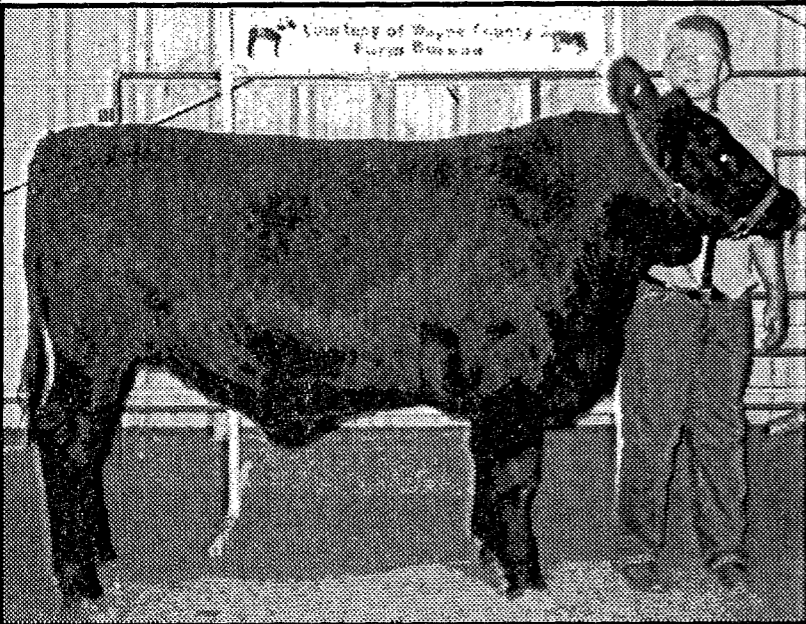

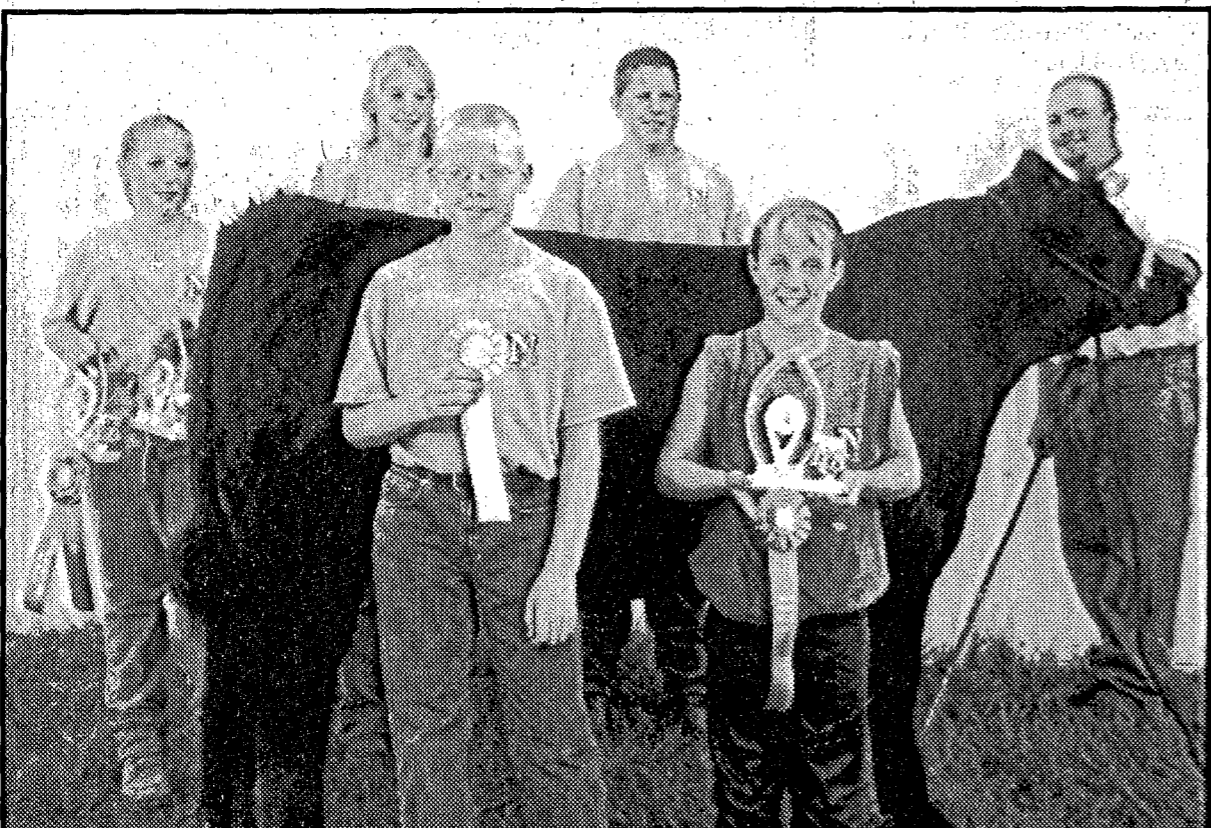

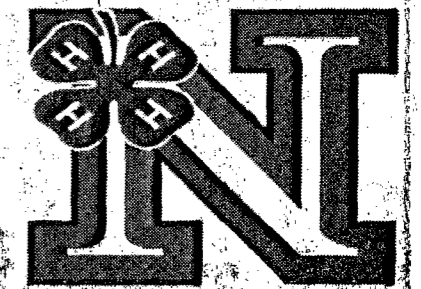
