Shuttle service to begin in Wayne


A new mode of transportation is gearing up to hit the streets of Wayne this fall. Through the auspices of Wayne State College, the Wayne Main Street Program, and the City of Wayne, a 23-passenger airport-style shuttle will ply the main arteries of this northeast Nebraska college town, making round trips twice every hour.

The idea was a response to town hall meetings sponsored three years ago by the Wayne Main Street Program in a search for ways to make the community more responsive to community and student needs at Wayne State College. 1. 1. 1. 1. 1.

Wayne's program utilizes an affordable, refurbished airport-style shuttle, capable of being more maneuverable through the WSC campus and able to keep up with highway traffic through the course of its trip. And best of all, rides are free to anyone, campus and community members alike, waiting at a designated shuttle stop. Scheduled stops are tentatively set for two locations on campus, the Super 8 parking lot (serving McDonald's, Pizza Hut, Bomgaars and the Sport's Club Motel), the Quality Food Center parking lot

JOHN BACHMANN, MANAGING PARTNER, EDWARD JONES VIEWS ON CURRENT MARKET CONDITIONS

The recent stock market's upswings and downturns can be nerveracking for even the most seasoned investor. But ours is a cyclical business, heavily influenced by business cycles and investor sentiment. Many of us have been through similar markets and we know this temporary down-turn is part of a normal cycle. What follows are my personal views. And while I believe strongly in what I've written, remember no one has a patent on right answers.

1. The market periodically goes though a cleansing process. When markets reach unusually high levels, as the "new economy" securities did, some event invariably triggers a sudden slide. In 1987, it was program trading. This time, the trigger was a loss of confidence in financial reporting.

2. The current market will probably end with a day or two of free fall That will be a very scary time. Historically, there has been a pattern to these cycles. The market slides steadily, but then we see a few periodic rallies which suggest we have reached the bottom. Before it truly bottoms, however, it drops sharply for several days in a row. One day, it opens significantly lower on huge volume, which scares the last shares out of weak hands. Absent some subsequent political event which is unforeseen, that represents the bottom.

There will be a flight to quality. It has already begun, as evidenced by the flow of investable dollars into fixed income. Here again, one must be careful. Fixed-income investments should be diversified by maturity date or investors will suffer when interest rates rise. Individuals should also continue to buy good stocks.



Investors buy shares, not the market. Some great companies 4. have already reached their lows, so waiting doesn't guarantee a better price. Since almost no one buys at the low (it is statistically impossible), investors should focus on selection of companies rather than timing.

Bargains will abound. Good investments drop along with poor 5. ones, Companies that have traditionally had strong prospects now sell at favorable prices. If the shares go lower, investors can average down by buying more.

Lazy investors will buy crummy companies just because they are 6. cheap, expecting them to rebound with the rest of the market. Just remember, dropping a tennis ball on the sidewalk produces a different reaction than dropping an egg. Not everything bounces back.

Markets reflect both economics and psychology. In the current 7. situation, the economy is recovering from recession, but psychology is focused on the quality of financial reporting. History tells us that at market highs, when psychology is wonderful, there are few bargains. However, when markets fall and psychology is poor, bargains abound.

Serious long-term buyers love markets like these. Not only can 8. they buy at prices they never expected to see, they can switch from companies or industries judged to be less promising, into new investments that are priced attractively.

The strength of our overall economy is remarkable. We have 9. lived though September 11 and a brief recession, but the economy has begun moving up again. Once corporations get their accounting issues settled, many of the attractive prices we see on individual stocks today will be just a memory.

More than anything else, discipline and patience determine investment success. We cannot predict the future. Absent the ability to predict the future, we must prepare for it.

I've heard quite a few people talk about not caring for wild game because it tastes so wild!


What does wild taste like. Do they mean it doesn't taste like beef or pork? Deer, Antelope, Ducks and Geese, taste like Deer Antelope, Ducks and Geese. They aren't suppose to taste like farm raised critters. Most of the wild animals aren't raised on corn, oats and grains.

They might eat some grain from time to time and of course Deer that live in our area eat a lot of grain and corn, so they do taste a bit different than a Mule Deer that is raised on sage brush, but all animals taste differently.

If you want your wild game to be good tasting on the table, you'll

> This is especially true with Antelope. The quicker you get the animal open, skinned and cooled.



The better it will taste when it gets to the supper table.

Antelope are runners and running heats them up and if they are being pursued, they heat up even more and the meat can get very strong if they aren't cooled down quickly. Since Antelope season opens earlier than other seasons, it can be down right hot when you hunt Antelope.

With Antelope, you need to open up the critter right after you shoot



Capital View **Candidates need to debate**

It's time for Nebraska's candidates for public office to start debating one another, rather than responding to predictable questions from media types.

The recent gubernatorial debate proved the need for a new format. One that allows candidates to question one another and respond to one another.

The first gubernatorial debate of the season was an insult to candidates Mike Johanns, Stormy Dean and Paul Rosberg. And it was an insult to voters.

This isn't to say that the reporters and news executives who sat on the questioning panel did a lousy job. The problem is that the whole thing represented a lousy format. It's useless.

What we now call "debate" is nothing but a joint news conference, at best. Candidates give rehearsed, predictable answers to rehearsed, predictable questions. You can learn as much from their campaign brochures and TV ads.

Let Republican Gov. Johanns ask direct questions of Stormy Dean. And let Democrat Dean answer them - and have a chance to counter with some demands for answers to his own favorite questions on the issues. Mr. Rosberg, who comes across as a desperately sincere but under-informed proletarian, could take his best shot at both "major party" candidates; and he would have a better venue for expressing his own ideas via a more open exchange of ideas.

Imagine a prize fight. Would it be worth seeing if the combatants sat in their corners while reporters asked questions:

"Uh, I'd stick him with the jab and when he shifts to his left, I'd nail him with the right hook."

"Well, he's been harping on that right hook thing and it won't work. I'd duck under it, put a shot in his liver and floor him with the ol' one-

Then, at a post-fight news conference (just like today's debates), both fighters could claim victory. What good is that? Who learns anything? Let the debaters really debate. The questions would be more pointed, and the responses and followup questions might actually draw blood - or, in this case, information.

The current format represents nothing more than an exercise in each candidate trying to avoid making a mistake. It's like a football game in which both teams go into a prevent defense as soon as the contest begins. The whole idea is not to make a mistake.

Worse, the current format gives a candidate a chance to make a "surprise" announcement on some issue - while giving his opponent

no opportunity to respond to it and ask questions on the spot.

The "big story" out of the first debate: Stormy Dean made it even more clear that he stands front and center for expanded gambling. Johanns opposes it. No one mentioned that the sky is often blue or that water is usually wet - but that's only because the question didn't come up.

The public is cheated a bit in these deals, too. The news media treats every such event as "news," even when there is nothing new or relevant to report. The American system of mainline journalism generally doesn't allow for a reporter to write: "The three candidates for governor today took turns restating the slogans and positions that they adopted weeks and months ago."

Debates should reflect exchanges among candidates. Reporters get their opportunity to ask questions during interviews and news conferences. Let the debate reflect the talent and intelligence of the candidates in a genuine competition - one that reflects the best of the marketplace of ideas,

All the rhetoric and practiced modesty (that is actually intended to be self-aggrandizing) that spews from joint appearances is also available to voters in campaign literature - and in those news stories that fill up special sections days before the election.

it. If you're near by a water source or have wash out water with you (which is a good idea), rinse out the body cavity, remove the skin and put the meat on ice.

Many hunters, including myself like to show their trophy animals to friends and family and when its ly. skinned quartered and on ice in a cooler, it's hard to do!

If you want to show off your game, especially those that are taken during warmer weather, do it with a photograph and then get the game cooled off right after you've taken your pictures.

The same is true for grouse, waterfowl, turkey and upland game. The quicker you can clean them out and cool them down, the better they're going to taste.

With birds, you'll need to leave some feathers, the head or some

the bird. You'll still need to remove the entrails and fill the body cavity with ice or put the bird in an ice filled cooler.

With larger game such as Deer and Elk, open up the body cavity and clean out the entrails. This will help to cool the animal down quick-

If temperatures aren't too warm, you can hang the larger animals in a shaded area for several days, leaving the hide on as this will prevent dust, dirt and insects from getting on the meat.

If it's a warm year like last November was, it's a good idea to skin the animal out and get them cut up as soon as possible. If you have access to a walk in cooler, you can let the animal hang in it and cool slowly.

You should prepare your wild game differently than you'd pre-

game has less fat, you don't want to over cook it as over cooked dry wild game just doesn't taste good,

On wild game, it's a good idea to remove as much of the fat as possi ble. as the fat generally is stronge tasting than fat on pork or beef. Wild game can be cooked, baked fried or made into jerky, salami sticks or sausage.

You can mix it with pork, mari nate it, or smoke it and if it ha been taken care of properly in the field, it will come out excellent. There are hundreds of wild game cookbooks and recipes available These cookbooks contain recipes fo everything from fish to caribou and everything in between, so don't give up on wild game just because you didn't care for it the first time you ate it!

Give it another try and you could be surprised how good wild game can taste.

The key to good tasting wild game is simple. Clean and cool the game as quickly as possible and don't over cook it.



Both men are being held in the Thurston County Jail where they await the formal filing of charges in Wayne County Court.




Picture perfect peaches

Disheartening loss, missed opportunities, a game we should have won.

Those are just some of the ways Wayne State Head Football Coach Scott Hoffman described last Thursday's 24-21 double overtime loss to Morningside in the season opener for both clubs.

The 2,055 fans in attendance at Cunningham Field saw both team struggle early offensively, battling to a scoreless first quarter.

However, things were different in the second quarter as the Wildcats posted two late scores to take a 14-0 halftime lead,

Josh Hopwood caught a pass from quarterback Brett Edwards and rambled 85 yards for the game's first score, giving Wayne State a 7-0 lead with 2:44 left in the half. Wayne State then recovered a Morningside fumble on the ensuing kickoff and drove 20 yards for another score when Brett Edwards hit paydirt from two yards out with just :40 left in the half.

In the second half though, Morningside would take advantage of Wildcats turnovers and penalties and score twice in the fourth quarter to send the game into overtime at 14-14.

The Mustangs took the ball first in overtime and scored, taking a 21-14 lead.

But the Wildcats countered when senior quarterback Justin Burhoop scored on a five-yard run. Nate Hale added the PAT kick and the game was tied again at 21-21.

In the second overtime, the Wildcats got the ball first, but Nate Hale missed a 21-yard field goal giving the Mustangs the ball and a chance to win the game. On their possession, Cory Wirth hit a

28-yard field goal to give the Mustangs the double overtime victory.

Coach Scott Hoffman said afterward it was a game the Wildcats should have won. "This is a disheartening loss. Not to overlook or take anything away from Morningside, we just did not respond to adversity. This is a game we should have won."

Hoffman credited the Mustangs for making adjustments in the second half. "They made some good adjustments at halftime and they got some momentum in the second half. It was a game of missed opportunities for us. We had too many blown assignments.

Hoffman added that his team did not take advantage of opportunities when made available. "In the fourth quarter, after a Robert Sellers interception, we take the ball to the Morningside 12 yard line, then had two penalties and two sacks and we end up punting, getting no points. We can't afford to do that. They made the plays and we didn't."

Equally frustrating for Wildcat fans is that Wayne State dominated a number of statistical categories, outyarding the Mustangs 374-333 and owning a 15 minute advantage in time of possession.

Offensively, Brett Edwards was 11 of 19 passing for 186 yards and one touchdown before leaving the game with a collarbone injury. Justin Burhoop was 7 of 15 with one interception for 54 yards.

On the ground, fullback Brian Gohr was the team's leading rusher, eight carries for 39 yards. Brett Edwards had 13 attempts for 37 yards.

Receiving, Josh Hopwood had four catches for 107 yards and a touchdown. Eric Kjar had four

receptions for 50 yards.

Defensively, linebackers Adam Long and Bump Christensen had 11 tackles apiece for the Wildcats. Kyle Lingenfelter and Jon Carlson recorded nine stops each. Carlson and Robert Sellers each had an interception.

Wayne State, 0-1, plays at Nebraska-Kearney Saturday night with game time set for 6 pm. The Lopers are coming off a 35-17 win at Nebraska-Omaha last Thursday evening.

Coach Hoffman says his team will have to grow up in a hurry. "We can not afford to make the mental mistakes that we had last week. We need to take care of business on our side of the ball and do things right. If we go out to Kearney and play good, hard football without many mistakes, I can accept that, regardless what the score is."





WSC volleyball goes 4-2 in Hawaii---Vanis ties school mark for career wins

The Wayne State College volleyball team went 4-2 last weekend to open season at the Hawaiian Classic in Hilo, Hawaii.

The four wins by the Wildcats allowed head coach Sharon Vanis, who is in her tenth season at Wayne State, to tie the school record for most career wins. Vanis is now 165-163 at WSC and share's the school mark for wins with Berniece Fulton(1971-81).

The Wildcats opened the tournament with a four-set loss to eventual tournament champion North Dakota, 30-24, 21-30, 30-27 and 30-24.

Senior middle hitter Rayna Nelsen had 13 kills to lead the Wildcats. Laurie Schroeder and Chelse Schultz each added 8 kills while freshman Julie Jacobsen of Winside had a team-high 13 digs to go with 7 kills for the Wildcats. Senior setter Kasey Meyer from Wisner-Pilger had 38 set assists. Wayne State then beat Evergreen State in three games,

30-18, 30-23 and 30-19.

Linderman and Nelsen paced the Wildcats with 10 kills each. Jacobsen added nine kills and seven digs. Meyer had 40 set assists and seven digs. The Wildcats hit a tournament-best .356 in the match.

The Wildcats next win was over Hawaii-Hilo, needing five games for the win, 26-30, 30-22, 21-30, 30-27 and 15-13.

Three players had double-doubles for the Wildcats, Nelsen had 18 kills and 10 digs, Linderman added 14 kills and 14 digs while Jacobsen chipped in with 13 kills and 12 digs. Laurel-Concord senior Laurie Schroeder had 16 kills and Kasey Meyer had 61 set assists and four service aces.

Wayne State's next match was its most disappointing on the trip, losing in three games to NSIC rival Northern State, 25-30, 17-30 and 21-30.

The Wildcats hit a dismal .059 in the match. Nelsen had 13 kills in a losing effort. Meyer had 29 set assists and Linderman led the team in digs with eight. Wayne State then bounced back

with a three-game win over


Junior college transfer Kristin Evergreen State, 31-29, 30-21 and 30-16.

Local teacher to be honored guest of **Japanese government**

This October Randy Kindschuh of Wisner will depart for Tokyo, Japan as a participant in the Fulbright Memorial Fund (FMF) Teacher Program.

Kindschuh was selected from a national pool of over 2,100 applicants by a panel of educators to earn this honor. This program allows distinguished primary and secondary school teachers in the U.S. to travel to Japan for three weeks in an effort to promote greater intercultural understanding between the two nations.

The 200 educators will begin their visit in Tokyo, where they will receive a practical orientation on Japanese life and culture and meet with Japanese government officials and educators. While in high school she was a library aide and a member of band, W-Club and the golf and basketball teams. Harder was a volunteer with the junior golf recreation program.

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



The first week enrollment figures at the Wakefield Community School shows 15 more students than one year ago. This year the figures show 481

K-12 students compared to 466 in August, 2001.

That number is also up from the year-end total of 471, according to Guidance Counselor Sondra Remer. She added that enrollment number fluctuate some throughout the school year.

There are 247 students in the secondary (7-12) and 234 in the elementary (K-6) grades. There are 34 more elementary age boys than girls. The boys also out-number the girls at the secondary level, but only by 13.

The sunny location is important because sunlight strengthens the purple color, which appears after a three-week juvenile phase Although it can tolerate drought and poor soils, Purple Majesty responds strongly to early fertilizer applications and light watering. conducted in cooperation with IANR'S Agricultural Research Division and INTSORMIL, a U.S. Agency for International Development international research project.

Checking the status

earns All-America Selections Gold Medal Thanks to a serendipitous discovery in a University of Nebraska-Lincoln breeding program, a showy version of a plant

usually used for forage or grain is likely to appear in home gardens nationwide as a 2003 All-America Selections Gold Medal award winner.

The newcomer is Purple Majesty, an unusually attractive hybrid of pearl millet, or Pennisetum glaucum, which is commonly called cattail or bullrush millet, said David Andrews, NU Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources emeritus professor of plant breeding. Andrews developed this hybrid together with John Rajewski, research manager in the agronomy and horticulture department.

stripe, down the center of the leaves. Its long, narrow seedhead has attractive bristles good for floral arrangements. At maturity, this annual plant is 4 to 5 feet tall and 2 to 3 feet in diameter. It's suited to climates from southern Canada to the southern United States.

Purple Majesty features showy

purple leaves with a red midrib,

Purple Majesty will be featured as an AAS All-American Selection and Gold Medal winner for 2003. The ornamental millet topped the floral class in AAS trials at 33 locations across North America, and earned the organization's prestigious Gold Medal for its exceptional garden performance. The Gold Medal award is reserved for plant breeding breakthroughs, according to AAS. It's awarded rarely, typically only once or twice a decade. AAS is a non-profit organization that has conducted independent plant trials since 1932.

Ball Horticultural Products Co., a plant wholesaler, began making NU's Purple Majesty available to garden centers this summer under a university licensing agreement. NU will receive royalties on sales.

Andrews typically breeds agricultural, not horticultural, plants. "My goal at NU was to breed

and release sorghum and pearl millets for grain in the U.S.," he said.

However, an unusually colored plant got Andrews' attention as he was evaluating potential breeding stock from India. The purplish plant was no help in developing grain-producing pearl millet varieties, but its unusual appearance earned it a spot in a genetics nursery for university students.

"Over time, we discovered some odd characteristics and kept them in a genetics nursery so that stu-

ORDINANCE NO. 2002-13 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 22, ARTICLE IV, BY ADDING SECTION 22-13 FIREWORKS; DISCHARGE OF THE WAYNE MUNICIPAL CODE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska: Section 1. That Chapter 22. Article IV. of the Wayne Municipal Code be amended by adding Section 22-13 to read as follows:

Sec. 22-13 Fireworks; Discharge §22-13 FIREWORKS; DIS-CHARGE, It shall be unlawful for any person to discharge, fire, launch, or throw any fireworks or any object, which is lighted to explode or which explodes upon contact with another object.

A. From or onto any motor vehi-B. Onto any street, highway or

sidewalk: C. During any pyrotechnics dis-play authorized by special permit under the ordinances of the Municipality and when the special permit authorized the display to be held at the Wayne City Park, no lawfully permitted fireworks shall be exploded in the said City Park during the time of said pyrotechnics display except by personnel authorized by said special permit;

D. At or near any persons; E. Into of upon any building; F. Into or at any group of persons;

G. At or upon the premises of another person. H. The discharge of exploding of fireworks within the Municipality

shall be permitted only on the fo lowing dates and during the following hours:

June 25th thru July 3rd - 8:00 A.M. tó 11:00 P.M. July 4th - 8:00 A.M. to Midnight

The discharge and exploding of fireworks within the Municipality on any dates or times other than set out in this Section shall be uniawful.

The Mayor, in the event of extreme drought conditions, shall have the authority to make an emergency declaration banning the discharge of fireworks within the City of Wayne. Said emergency declaration shall have the force of law and violations of the same shall be punishable as set forth in Section 1-9

Section 2. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed. Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage, approval, and publication as provided by law. PASSED AND APPROVED this 27th day of


The Allen Eagles are looking to build upon a 3-6 finish in 2001, including two losses in the final minute.


Winside will field a boys cross country team for the first time in the short history of the sport at the school while two girls will be running for individual honors.
