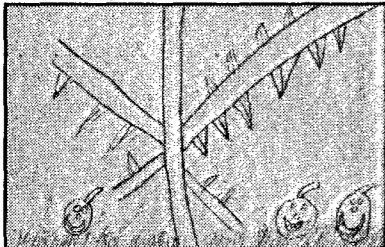

Van denied motion for new trial

Former Wayne floral shop owner Roger Van was denied a new trial Wednesday morning in Wayne County District Court.

Judge Robert Ensz ruled on two motions for a new trial that were filed by Van's attorney, James McGough of Norfolk.

The second amended motion filed Tuesday evening was the latest development in this highly publicized case, citing alleged jury misconduct as the reason for wanting a new trial.

According to a court affidavit, in deliberations, a juror disclosed to fellow jurors that sodomy was against the law in the state of Nebraska.

The first amended motion that was filed on Aug. 26 alleged irregularities in the proceedings of the court by which Van was prevented a fair trial, misconduct by prosecuting attorney Chris Connolly and that Jonathan Cooper,

the victim in the case, had not been truthful in his testimony during the trial.

Another reason, according to McGough, for filing a motion for a new trial was the development of a new witness for the defense.

Sixty-year-old William Brockman, now of Laguna Beach, Calif., was involved with Cooper in a relationship that lasted two years. Brockman stated in an affidavit that Cooper had "financial motivations" and was a good liar.

During Wednesday morning's hear-

ing on the motion for a new trial, McGough told the courtroom that the new information obtained "changes how the case would have been presented."

McGough also stated that the charges against his client, Roger Van, should have been dismissed because the things that happened in Wayne last December were consensual. He added that he also had a problem with the way the charges were filed. "You can't tell what evidence matches up with what charge."

Police have a busy weekend

The Wayne Police Department responded to 80 calls for service from Thursday through Monday.

Three thefts were also reported, including the theft of CD's and a gold necklace from a parked car in the 500 Block of East Fifth, the theft of golf clubs, a golf bag and golf shoes from an enclosed trailer in the 100 Block of South Pearl and the theft of a radiator from a 1983 Chevrolet pickup truck in the 100 Block of South Pearl Street.

Shuttle service to begin in Wayne

A new mode of transportation is gearing up to hit the streets of Wayne this fall. Through the auspices of Wayne State College, the Wayne Main Street Program, and the City of Wayne, a 23-passenger airport-style shuttle will ply the main arteries of this northeast Nebraska college town, making round trips twice every hour.

The idea was a response to town hall meetings sponsored three years ago by the Wayne Main Street Program in a search for ways to make the community more responsive to community and student needs at Wayne State College.

Wayne's program utilizes an affordable, refurbished airport-style shuttle, capable of being more maneuverable through the WSC campus and able to keep up with highway traffic through the course of its trip. And best of all, rides are free to anyone, campus and community members alike, waiting at a designated shuttle stop.

Scheduled stops are tentatively set for two locations on campus, the Super 8 parking lot (serving McDonald's, Pizza Hut, Bomgaars and the Sport's Club Motel), the Quality Food Center parking lot

Christiansen Construction to celebrate anniversary

Christiansen Construction of Pender has completed a wide variety of construction projects throughout the past 60 years, including schools, hospitals, churches, banks, sewage and water treatment plants, swimming pools, housing projects, dams, paving and sidewalk projects and numerous types of commercial buildings and residential projects. Harold "Pete" Christiansen started his construction company in 1942 with a Model A pickup, some hand tools and a cement mixer. Most of the projects at that time consisted of brick and block work and general repair in the Pender area, such as the rendering plant, the potato cellar at the Caton Ranch north of town and numerous concrete jobs for feedlots. Later he formed a partnership with John Hesse and Merle Vanderwerf. In 1953 the partnership was dissolved and Harold's

In 1955 a second son, Densil, joined the company and in 1961 another brother, Norman, joined the growing business. Harold died in 1968 but the business continued until 1982 when Kenneth retired. Densil and Norman continued their ownership until 1986 when Densil's three sons, Timothy, Michael and Gregory, became the new owners. Densil continued to be active in the business until his sudden death in December of 2001. Norman retired from the business in 2000. Michael moved to Cherokee, Iowa in 1996 and has his own construction business. Currently, Tim and Greg are third generation owners, are there are approximately 30 persons employed by the company. The company is presently working on projects in Norfolk, Niobrara, Winnebago, Memphis, Tekamah, Dakota City, Crofton and Wayne.

Homebuyers workshop planned

The 200 educators will begin their visit in Tokyo, where they will receive a practical orientation on Japanese life and culture and meet with Japanese government officials and educators. They then will travel in groups of 20 to prefectures (states) outside of Tokyo where they will have direct contact with Japanese teachers and students during visits to primary and secondary schools as well as a teacher college. The group will also visit cultural sites and local industries in addition to a homestay with a Japanese family. The program is sponsored by the Government of Japan and was launched to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the U.S. government Fulbright Program, which has enabled more than 6,000 Japanese citizens to study in the U.S. on Fulbright fellowships for graduate education and research. A total of 600 teachers from all 50 states and the District of Columbia are set to visit Japan in June, October, and November of 2002 with 200 in each group. To date, the FMF Teacher Program

Cool rules for school and weekend

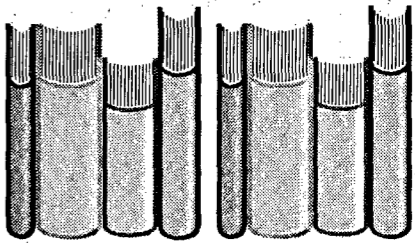

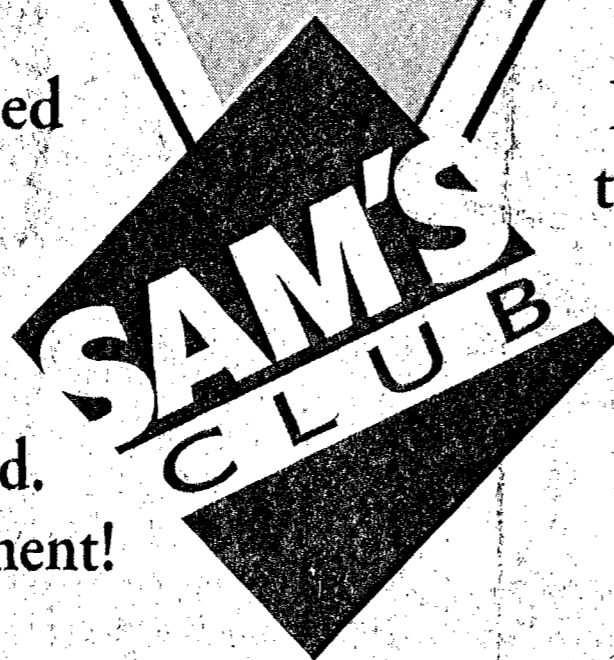

Kari Lee Harder, Wayne, has received a Milton G. Waldbaum Scholarship to attend Wayne State College this fall.

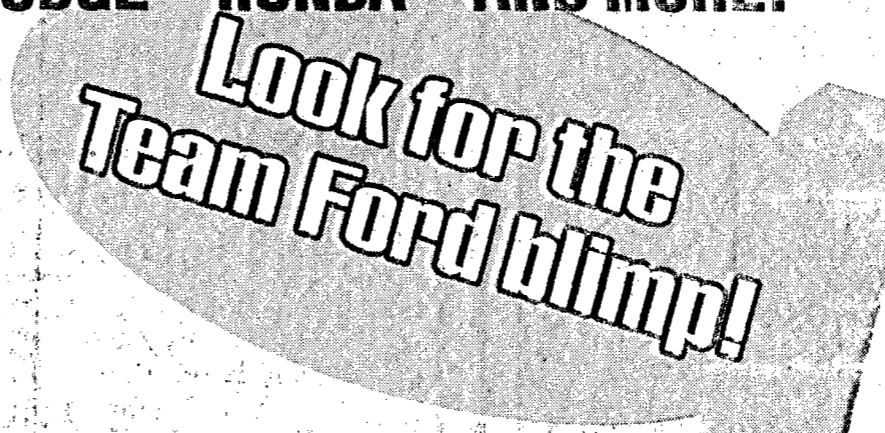

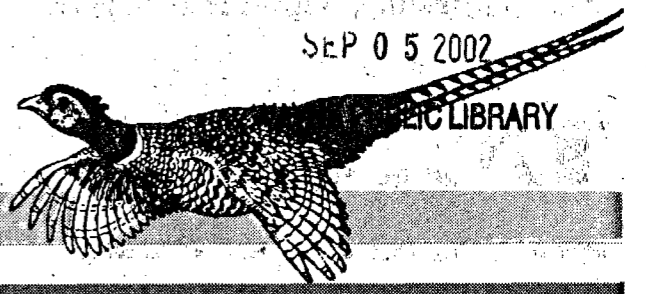

Focus on your strengths

Congressman Tom Osborne was in Columbus last week for an E-commerce and Business workshop. He presented a message that is very applicable for a lot of things in our communities and our families.

His message was "Focus on Your Strengths". We have a lot of strengths in Nebraska. Most of our strengths, Nebraskans take for granted. We underestimate the value of living in a relatively safe community, of having a supply of water, of having high quality people in the community, and of productive land. These are just some of the strengths of Nebraska that can be utilized more fully as we move forward.

He did have some suggestions that we could utilize as we build for the future. Some of the ways these strengths can be utilized in a community setting include:

* Think regionally. This means communities, counties and even states will need to work together. They will probably also need to organize together.

* Access to a full-time economic developer. In order to capture many of the strengths, someone working for us full time will be important. It may have to happen on a regional basis.

* Develop Entrepreneurs. Congressman Osborne sees entrepreneurship as a way to capture skills of the youth of Nebraska. It is also a way to work with these young people to stay in Nebraska or come back to Nebraska after they have gone to college.

* Instill community pride. This can be done by having community projects, celebrations, etc. It is a way to bring people together. It is extremely important in turning negative attitudes into being able to work with strengths.

* Involve youth in an organized way. Look at connections that can be made between the community and schools. How can classes and youth organizations be a ben-



efit to the community in a way that helps the youth develop pride, connection, and appreciation of Nebraska.

* Organize seniors. Are we fully utilizing all of the talent that is in this group?

* Consider the value that tourism can add to the economic base. We generally undervalue the potential.

* Recognize that our standard of living is not directly tied to dollars. We can have a much higher standard of living in Nebraska for less dollars than most other parts of the nation.

How can we take these themes to improve our communities?

Do these themes ring a bell as we think about other aspects of our lives? Can we utilize some of them in developing characteris-

tics of appreciation, commitment, communication, coping ability, spiritual well-being and time together that are important for strong families?

Congressmen Osborne challenged us to eliminate the negative and focus on the strengths. This is a very important challenge for each of us and all of us together. It is a message that changed a losing football team into a winning football team.

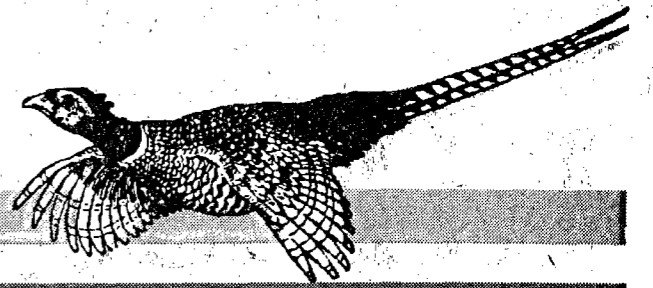

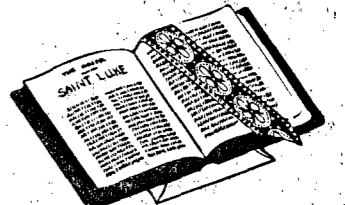

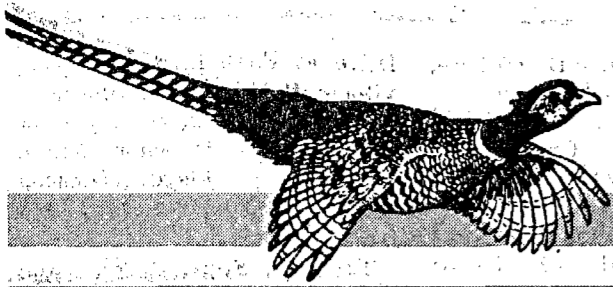

FIND SKULL

Tyler Peters, Rick Hammer, Shaun Hammer and Jon Prätzer found a bison skull on Aug. 24 when they were out "playing" on their four-wheelers.

They discovered a small portion sticking out of the mud in the Logan Creek dredge about a half mile south of the golf course.

ENROLLMENT UP

The first week enrollment figures at the Wakefield Community School shows 15 more students than one year ago.

This year the figures show 481 K-12 students compared to 466 in August, 2001.

That number is also up from the year-end total of 471, according to Guidance Counselor Sondra Remer. She added that enrollment number fluctuate some throughout the school year.

There are 247 students in the secondary (7-12) and 234 in the elementary (K-6) grades. There are 34 more elementary age boys than girls. The boys also outnumber the girls at the secondary level, but only by 13.

The elementary averages 33.4 students per grade and the secondary averages 41.1 per grade. The largest class is the seventh

grade, with 49; the first and third grade classes each have a total of 27 students. There are 46 seniors and 24 kindergarten students.

The most lopsided relationship of boys to girls is the fourth grade. This group of students had the same distinction a year ago where there were 21 boys and 10 girls. This fall the class gained another boy and lost a girl, so there are 13 more boys than girls.

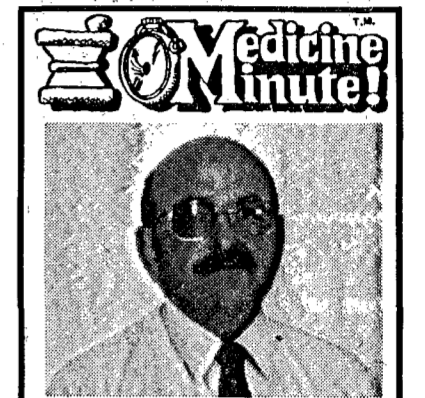

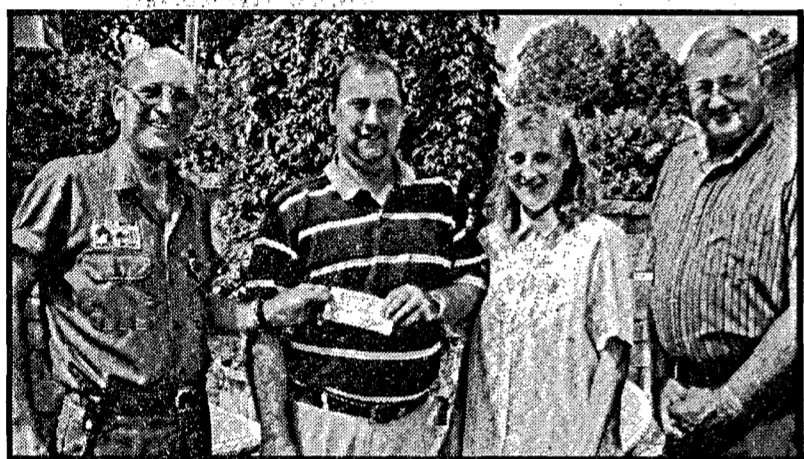

Calcium Supplements May Not Strengthen Nails

Calcium supplements help fight osteoporosis, and many physicians recommend calcium to be taken by women throughout adult life. Nails contain some calcium - about 1/800 as much as bones - and some persons assume that taking calcium supplements will cause the nails to become stronger or less brittle. However calcium supplements do not appear to benefit nail quality.

According to a report in *New England Journal of Medicine*, researchers in New Zealand asked 683 women if their nails had become stronger or more brittle during the past year. Some of the women had been taking calcium supplements, and some had been taking a look-alike placebo. About 60% of the women in each group said that there had been no change; 29% indicated that there had been an improvement, regardless of whether or not they were taking the calcium supplement.



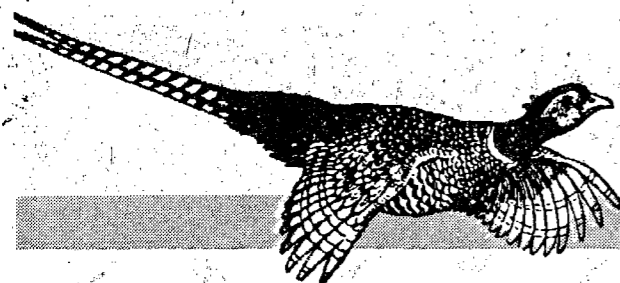

NU-developed decorative pearl millet earns All-America Selections Gold Medal

Thanks to a serendipitous discovery in a University of Nebraska-Lincoln breeding program, a showy version of a plant usually used for forage or grain is likely to appear in home gardens nationwide as a 2003 All-America Selections Gold Medal award winner.

The newcomer is Purple Majesty, an unusually attractive hybrid of pearl millet, or Pennisetum glaucum, which is commonly called cattail or bull-rush millet, said David Andrews, NU Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources emeritus professor of plant breeding. Andrews developed this hybrid together with John Rajewski, research manager in the agronomy and horticulture department.

Purple Majesty features showy purple leaves with a red midrib, or stripe, down the center of the leaves. Its long, narrow seedhead has attractive bristles good for floral arrangements. At maturity, this annual plant is 4 to 5 feet tall and 2 to 3 feet in diameter. It's suited to climates from southern Canada to the southern United States.

Purple Majesty will be featured as an AAS All-American Selection and Gold Medal winner for 2003. The ornamental millet topped the floral class in AAS trials at 33 locations across North America, and earned the organization's prestigious Gold Medal for its exceptional garden performance.

The Gold Medal award is reserved for plant breeding breakthroughs, according to AAS. It's awarded rarely, typically only once or twice a decade. AAS is a non-profit organization that has conducted independent plant trials since 1932.

Ball Horticultural Products Co., a plant wholesaler, began making NU's Purple Majesty available to garden centers this summer under a university licensing agreement. NU will receive royalties on sales.

Andrews typically breeds agricultural, not horticultural, plants. "My goal at NU was to breed and release sorghum and pearl millets for grain in the U.S.," he said.

However, an unusually colored plant got Andrews' attention as he was evaluating potential breeding stock from India. The purplish plant was no help in developing grain-producing pearl millet varieties, but its unusual appearance earned it a spot in a genetics nursery for university students.

"Over time, we discovered some odd characteristics and kept them in a genetics nursery so that stu-

dents could study them," he said.

It remained in the teaching nursery since the mid-1980s, but researchers didn't realize its ornamental value.

On a chance visit in 1996, the unusual purple millet caught eye of Harlan Hamernik, owner of Bluebird Nursery at Clarkson, Neb.

He drove by the nursery field, saw this purple millet and suggested I enter it in the All-America Selections contest in 1998," Andrews said. He heeded the advice from the highly regarded plantsman.

Andrews and Rajewski looked at several purple pearl millet selections and made the Purple Majesty hybrid from the most desirable parents before entering it in AAS competition.

Andrews is pleased with Purple Majesty's showing.

"AAS has the reputation of only promoting plants that are highly marketable," Andrews said. "AAS winner status almost guarantees success."

Homeowners using Purple Majesty in their landscapes should choose a well-drained, sunny site. The plant is tropical in origin and likes warmth.

The sunny location is important because sunlight strengthens the purple color, which appears after a three-week juvenile phase. Although it can tolerate drought and poor soils, Purple Majesty responds strongly to early fertilizer applications and light watering.

Andrews' millet research was conducted in cooperation with IANR's Agricultural Research Division and INTSORMIL, a U.S. Agency for International Development international research project.

The session, with course number TRAN 0104-01/02F, will meet from 1-4 p.m. in the Lifelong Learning

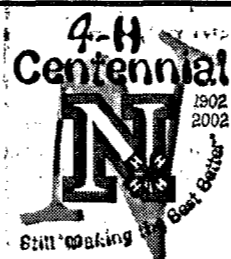
Center, Suite C. Cost of the session is \$45 and includes materials and refreshments.

The class will fulfill the training required under OSHA regulations (Paragraph 1910.178(1)). It will provide state-of-the-art, comprehensive, classroom training for

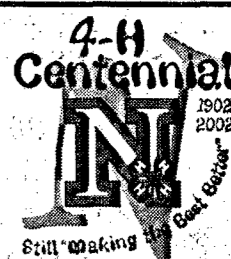

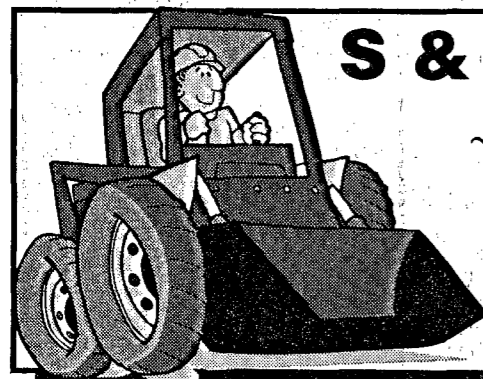

ORDINANCE NO. 2002-13 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 22, ARTICLE IV, BY ADDING SECTION 22-13 FIREWORKS; DISCHARGE OF THE WAYNE MUNICIPAL CODE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska: Section 1. That Chapter 22, Article IV, of the Wayne Municipal Code be amended by adding Section 22-13 to read as follows:

Sec. 22-13 Fireworks; Discharge
§22-13 FIREWORKS; DISCHARGE. It shall be unlawful for any person to discharge, fire, launch, or throw any fireworks or any object, which is lighted to explode or which explodes upon contact with another object.

A. From or onto any motor vehicle;
B. Onto any street, highway or sidewalk;
C. During any pyrotechnics display authorized by special permit under the ordinances of the Municipality and when the special permit authorized the display to be held at the Wayne City Park, no lawfully permitted fireworks shall be exploded in the said City Park during the time of said pyrotechnics display except by personnel authorized by said special permit;
D. At or near any persons;
E. Into or upon any building;
F. Into or at any group of persons; or
G. At or upon the premises of another person.

H. The discharge of exploding fireworks within the Municipality shall be permitted only on the following dates and during the following hours:
June 25th thru July 3rd - 8:00 A.M. to 11:00 P.M.
July 4th - 8:00 A.M. to Midnight

The discharge and exploding of fireworks within the Municipality on any dates or times other than set out in this Section shall be unlawful.

The Mayor, in the event of extreme drought conditions, shall have the authority to make an emergency declaration banning the discharge of fireworks within the City of Wayne. Said emergency declaration shall have the force of law and violations of the same shall be punishable as set forth in Section 1-9.

Section 2. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage, approval, and publication as provided by law.

The goal for Laurel-Concord this year is to win the district title and host a first round playoff game. The Bears open the 2002 season at home against Winnebago.

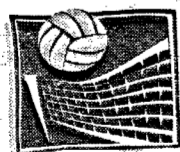
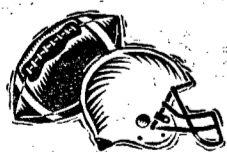

Wakefield football coach Justin Smith is optimistic about his Trojan football team this year.

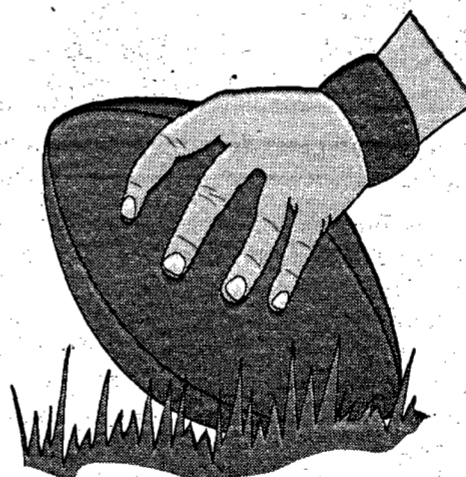
The club went just 2-7 last year, but returns a number of two-year starters that have gained valuable playing experience.

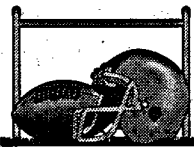
"We have good overall team speed," said Coach Erbst. "We do not have a lot of size, but this is our second year of eight-man, so the players and coaches should know what to expect on the field."

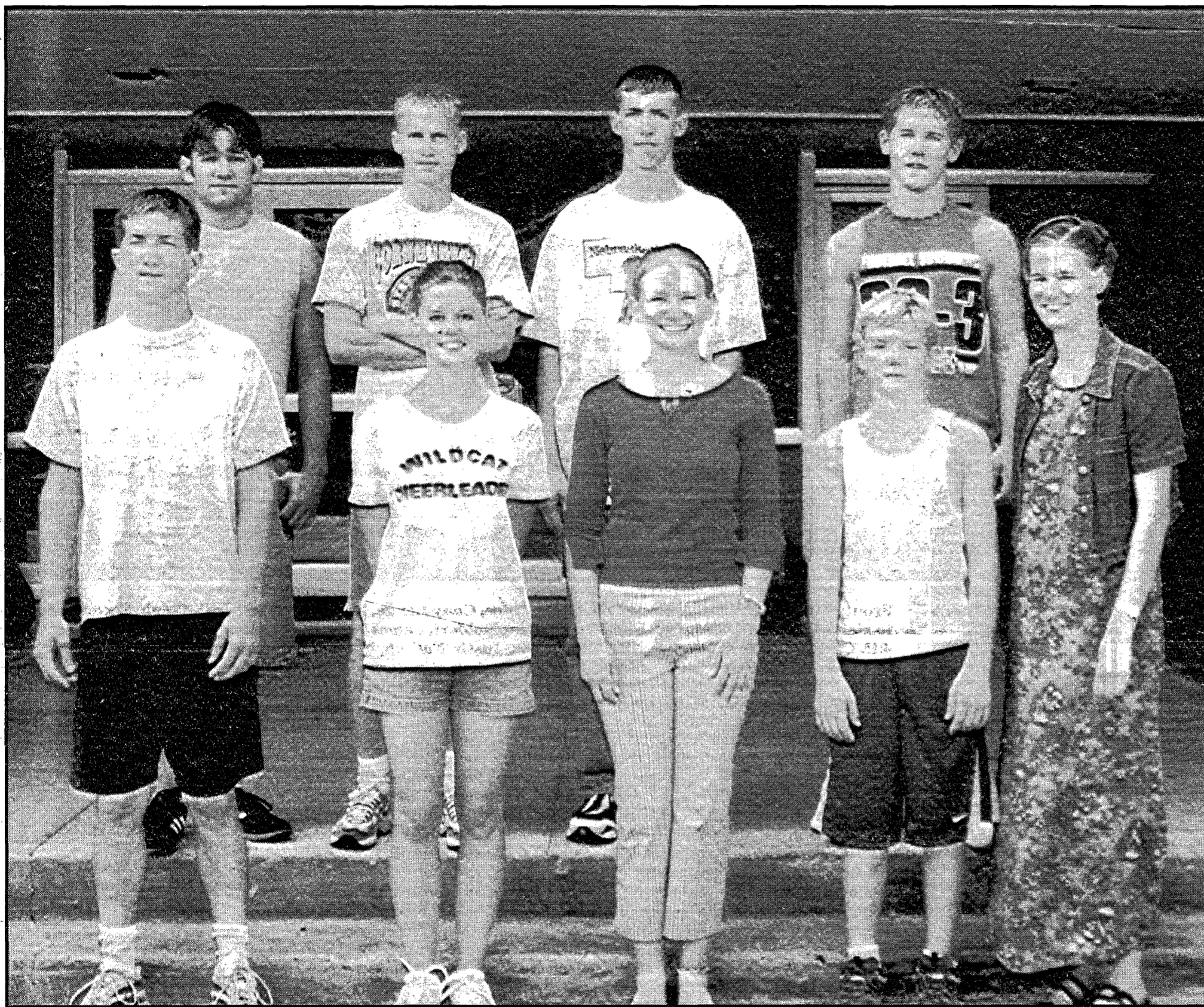

Winside will field a boys cross country team for the first time in the short history of the sport at the school while two girls will be running for individual honors.

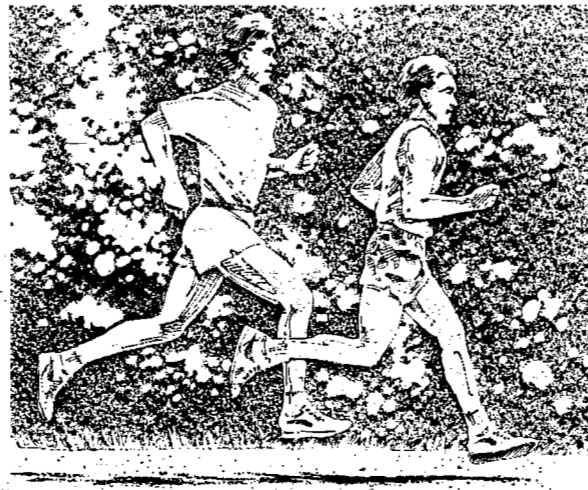

tive mental attitude in both boys and girls. This will be a year of building with a new coach and only four returning members from previous years."

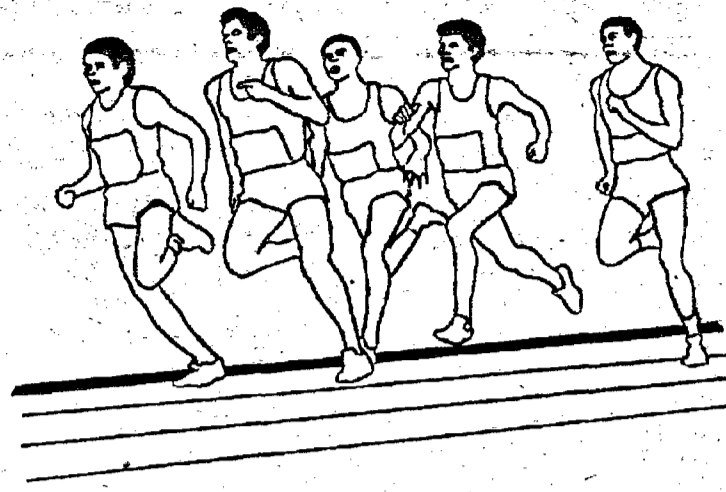
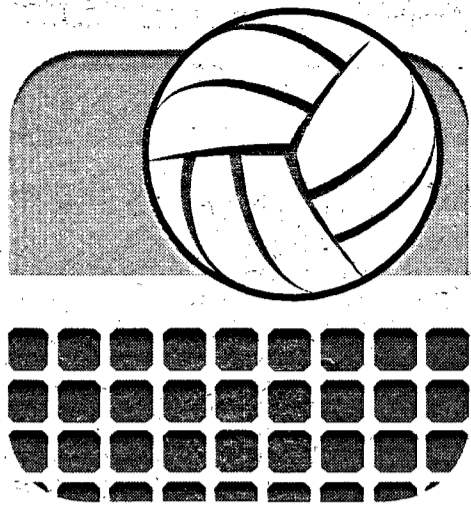
