





in a store, there are dangers. Internet Auctions accounted for 87 percent of the Internet fraud reported by the National Consumers League. Other common complaints involve general merchandise sales, internet access services, sales of computer equipment and software, work-at-home offers, advance-fee loans magazine sales. travel offers and pyramid schemes.

There are several steps that you can take to protect yourself from internet fraud, including the fol-

1. Use a secure browser. This software scrambles the purchase information you send over the Internet, ensuring a secure transaction.

2. Safeguard personal information. Many companies post privacy policies on their websites. Check the policy before giving any information.

3. Shop with know companies. Anyone can set up shot on the Internet. Ask unfamiliar companies to send you a catalog or brochure. Also, check refund and return policies before placing an

4. Keep your password private. Avoid using a phone number, birth date or part of your Social Security number for a password.

5. Pay by credit or charge card. Paying by credit card will protect your transactions under the Fair Credit Billing Act. This law gives you the right to dispute charges under certain circumstances and temporarily withhold payment.

6. Keep copies of transaction records. Keep printed records of all transactions including purchase order and confirmation numbers.


I would like to thank everyone who made this semester's "Poetry Slam" held at Riley's on May 1, such a huge success.

Dealing with the budget monster

Sen. Kermit Brashear said it succinctly. The "Roaring 90's" are gone, the

Omaha lawmaker told his colleagues, and the state isn't likely to see their likes again. Brashear's admonition is partic-

ularly appropriate as state senators are confronted by budget problems which have confounded them for a couple of years. There are two bullets available

for putting down the budget monster. One is powered by higher and some new taxes, the other by what many regard as draconian budget reductions aimed at education and a few other areas.

The size and scope of the budget mess has left lawmakers without any political cover worthy of the name. They can't argue, with straight faces, that the tax increases would be temporary. In the same light (provided by a dim economy) they cannot suggest that the cuts will be restored when times are better.

Gov. Mike Johanns has said more and deeper budget reductions ought to be pursued. Whether he will demand them via his veto, and by going extraordinarily public in criticizing the budget, remains to



Legislature making progress on budget

The Legislature made some progress on the state budget last week. The main budget bill, LB 407, was given first-round approval April 30 on a vote of 29-

The bill is a key part of the Appropriations Committee's plan to deal with a \$756 million shortfall between existing spending levels and projected tax revenue over the next two fiscal years. The committee's plan leaves a \$355 million gap that would have to be filled with tax increases or further spending cuts.

I voted to advance LB 407. As a member of the Appropriations Committee, I believe the committee's plan responsibly deals with the state's budget shortfall and protects vital state services.

The Appropriations Committee met the better part of four months in preliminary hearings, agency hearings and deliberations, and we could not come up with any more than \$401 million of cut's without disrupting essential ser-

I've always said that raising taxes would be the last resort, and that is where we are at the present time. Broadening the sales tax base as in adjoining states is the fairest option. K-12 schools and higher education are the only areas we can go to fill the gap unless revenues are increased.

One notable budget change dealt with funding for the state's advocacy agencies. Senators voted to restore funding for the Mexican

American Commission and the Commission on Indian Affairs. However, they rejected an attempt to revive funding for the Commission on the Status of Women.

I never did advocate getting rid of these agencies, but I did not support funding them with state tax dollars. They are advocacy agencies, and I believe that they should be self funded as is Arc of Nebraska, which is a very strong advocate for the developmentally disabled.

On the revenue side, the Revenue Committee on April 30 advanced LB 285, which would extend last year's increases in income, sales and cigarette tax rates. It is estimated that the bill would generate \$245 million over the two-year period.

Two potential roadblocks are: first, senators who voted against the bill say a big fight over taxes might still loom. Some senators are extremely reluctant to fill the entire \$355 million gap with tax increases and would like to see further spending cuts.

Second, the Legislature could be headed for a budget showdown with Governor Mike Johanns. The governor is opposed to tax increases other than a hike in the cigarette tax. If the governor vetoes tax increases, senators would need 30 votes to override him.

On another matter, it appears that LB 265, which would allow citizens to carry concealed handguns, may not be considered again this session.

Second-round debate on the bill

ended April 28 after it became apparent that supporters did not have the 33 votes to halt a filibuster. The bill will not come back on the legislative agenda unless' the bill's sponsor can demonstrate that he has the votes to break the

Volunteer fireman Pete Kaiser discussed other community projects currently being worked on such as improving the village park and adding new toys. Also setting



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








Barner added that the game was dedicated to quarterback Tonya Schwanke, a Wayne native, who is serving in the military overseas near Iraq.


The 4 x 800 and 4 x 400 meter relay teams each placed fourth to round out the scoring for Winside.

More Options for an Irritable Bowel

Irritable bowel syndrome (IBS) occurs when the gastrointestinal (GI) tract becomes sensitized to stress, diet, drugs, or hormones. This sensitivity may cause the GI tract to contract abnormally, leading to abdominal pain, constipation, or diarrhea. The spastic colon type of IBS is usually triggered by eating and produces alternating diarrhea and constipation. Bloating, gas, nausea, headaches, and fatigue also may be present. The second is a painless type that can cause extreme and immediate urgency upon awakening that is so strong that control over bowel movement

frequently may be lost.

Psyllium (Metamucil) seems to benefit some IBS sufferers. Medicines for diarrhea such as loperamide (Imodium) may be helpful. Tegaserod (Zelnorm; Zelmac) helps normalize GI contractions. It was recently approved for use in women with constipation predominant IBS. However, tegaserod does not work in all women and is not approved for men. Alosetron (Lotronex) is a relatively new drug for women with diarrhea predominant IBS. It was pulled from the market because it sometimes caused severe constipation. It has been re-evaluated and has been released for use on a limited basis.


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













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Fink wins two golds at Mid States track meet-Hochstein takes 200 at Norfolk Classic







Down payment assistance is available to homebuyers

The Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation (WCHDC) works with eligible homebuyers to identify older homes that need improvement to bring them in line with current housing standards.

WCHDC will purchase the property, perform the necessary improvements in cooperation with the family's wishes and resell the residence to the famiy with 20 percent down payment assistance to help make the first mortgage financing possible.

The HOME Purchase/Rehab/ Resell (HPRR) program is open to any household whose adjusted gross income projected for the upcoming year does not exceed 80 percnet of the median household income for Wayne County as pro-

rated by family size. Household size with income limits in parenthesis are as follows: one - (\$27,500); two - (\$31,400); three - (\$35,350); four- (\$39,300); five - (\$42,400); six - (\$45,550); seven - (\$48,700); and eight -(\$51,850).

Applicants are required to secure their own home loan for the remaining balance of the sale price. The selected home must require a minimum of \$2,500 improvements to qualify for the program and the property must be priced so that the necessary improvements can be funded and the final sale price remains under the maximums set forth for this program and/or HUD.


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


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
Research has shown that specific odors, when connected to past events, can affect behavior. For example, a burning smell or the smell of hospital disinfectants can cause feelings of anxiety in some persons. That is the concept behind a relatively new approach to healthcare called aromatherapy. Most often specific aromas are used to produce a calming effect. Aromatherapists use essential oils of different herbs to produce

the desired outcome.

Three recent studies indicate that the scent from the oils of lemon bulm and lavender when inhaled or applied to the skin, significantly benefited elderly persons with existing behavior problems such as dementia and agitation. The oils were either steamed into the room air or were applied as a hand lotion. In each study no side effects were noted and all participants were able to complete the designated treatment. The significance of these studies is that an improvement in agitation eventually could lead to decreased need for prescription-calming drugs, in some cases.

When kids start school, they have new opportunities to make food choices both during and after class. Iron deficiency anemia can be a problem for some kids. Iron is an oxygen-carrying component of blood, Kids need iron because of rapidly expanding blood volume during growth.

For girls, the beginning of men struction in late childhood adds an extra demand for iron due to the regular loss of iron in menstrual blood. Meats, fish, poultry and enriched breads and cereals are the best sources of dietary iron. Vitamins A and C come from many different fruits and vegetables. They are important for healthy skin, growth and fighting infections. The B vitamins such as thiamin, niacin and riboflavin help in growth-enhancing actions and come from foods including grain products, meat and meat substitutes and dairy products.

Use caution when using chemicals

Time is fast approaching when there will be many chemicals ' applied to the bluegrass for weed

One of the more popular weed control chemicals used in a readyto-use form with fertilizers is dicamba. Recent research has confirmed that when the dicamba herbicide leaches into the soil and is taken up by the tree or shrub through the roots, it will harm the tree or shrub. Many years of such exposure will eventually kill the

hold grasshoppers, delaying their . Under normal conditions, the face of the grass and decompose before leaching down to tree roots. In years of heavy rainfall or when you over-water, the herbicide will leach down to the tree roots and has the potential to kill the tree.

This is an innocent situation that occurs every year because homeowners want to control the dandelions and other broadleaf weeds in their grass. Unfortunately, we may also be killing our trees.

Switch to some other chemical to lawn. Use of post-emergent chemicals in the fall would be a good alternative.

Another situation that can cause damage occurs when homeowners use a soil sterilent in the alleys to control weed growth and this is usually next to the back yard where trees are located. The tree can be far away from the alley and still be damaged by such herbicides. Tree roots grow out and away from the tree by as much as 100 feet.

Some trees are very sensitive to some of the soil sterilents and can be damaged easily. Be careful when using any type of herbicide around trees as the tree is most likely sensitive to the herbicide just like the weed you are attempting to control.

Grasshopper populations fluctuate in cycles. High or very high populations may be present for two to four years followed by low to moderate populations for several years.
