




Sharon Olson and Kathryn Ley were honored during this year's commencement ceremonies by Board of Education President Bill Dickey and presented plaques in appreciation for the years they have given to the Wayne Community School District.

Mrs. Olson began her teaching career the fall after she graduated from Stanton High School and taught in rural schools in Stanton County for six years while working on her degree at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

After graduation, she began teaching in the Norfolk Public Schools at Monroe and Washington Elementary Schools. She remained there for nine and one-half years.

"I have taught the past 29 years in the Wayne-Carroll Schools - 28 years in Carroll and the past year as a fourth grade teacher at Wayne Elementary, bringing the total number

Bloodbank to screen for West Nile virus

The Siouxland Community Blood Bank in Sioux City and other blood centers across the United States will start the screening of blood donations for West Nile virus on July 1 using a new genetic test. This is the first time that a test for the virus has been available for blood donations.

West Nile virus is transmitted to humans mainly through the bites of infected mosquitoes. In rare cases, the germ also can be spread through blood transfusions, organ transplants, breast milk, and in utero. More than 20 cases of transfusion-acquired West Nile virus were reported in the United States last year. With funding from the federal government, companies raced to find a rapid and accurate test to screen donated blood.

Genetic tests for the virus have been developed by Roche Diagnostic, and Gen-Probe, Last month, both companies received Food and Drug Administration approval to screen newly donated blood. The tests are considered 'investigational' and are not fully licensed by the FDA.

"We anticipate that there will probably be cases of West Nile this year in the Midwest, and we want to provide the safest blood products possible for our community," said Jan Twait, CEO of the blood bank. "The blood bank has already begun taking steps to identify donors with West Nile symptoms." In the blood donor screening process, new questions relating to symptoms of the West Nile infection are now being included.

The magic of Frank Morrison

The Nebraska Press Association It was a beautiful day in McCook as former Gov. Frank Morrison sat before an audience at the Buffalo Commons Storytelling Festival.

Morrison, now 98, served three terms (two years each, back then) in the Statehouse. A fervent Democrat by choice and a stemwinding speaker by golly, Morrison wowed the crowd. They had come to hear him, along with some far less qualified types, tell political stories.

Naturally, lots of the stories were about Morrison.

The session had a little magic about it. It seemed that Frank Brenner Morrison still had it in him to steal the show - even though it was his show to begin with.

In a scene reflecting the stuff legends are made of, the folks who had come to hear some old stories about Morrison actually witnessed the birth of a new one. And it was a dandy.

Morrison, who was sitting to my right, began talking about a fellow who years and years ago had given him a black hat. The guy said Morrison (whose trademarks include white Stetsons) was pretty much a bad guy, undeserving of the white hat which is symbolic of good

Well, Morrison said, he had waited many and many a year for an occasion just such as this, so he could throw away that black hat. So, he said he was gonna' do it. Right then. And with that, he whipped his Stetson off his head and sailed it like a Frisbee toward the audience - an audience which was already aware of what Morrison announced in a genuinely surprised voice: "Oh, m'gosh! That's a white one!" It was, too.

The applause only seemed to subside when the hometown admirers had to stop hand-banging long enough to wipe tears of laughter from their cheeks.

The storytelling ran overtime, a situation not uncommon whenever Morrison has had access to an audience over the past 70 or so

When the laughter subsided, Morrison eloquently paid tribute to those who teach, saying it was the most important of all professions. He lectured, with the love of an elder, on the importance of an informed citizenry that could

watch, understand and participate in its government. He also told the crowd, almost off-handedly, that he was being treated for cancer of the esophagus, and that he felt up to the fight.

He wasn't bluffing, either.

A bit earlier, someone noted Morrison and his beloved wife, Maxine, recently moved into a new home in McCook. The previous owner lived to be 105. Someone suggested to Morrison that perhaps some of that longevity would rub off on him.


"Hmmm?" Morrison said, as he obviously contemplated the 105 years. "Might be. But, you know, I'd like to maybe see if I can do a little better than that."

It shouldn't surprise anyone if he does.

In conclusion, a story Morrison told on himself:

In his first bid for public office (for some local board) Morrison was nominated by the Democrats and the Republicans. He figured he had it sewed up, obviously. Ready? He was beaten by a writein candidate!

Perhaps that beginning contributed to his dauntless determination throughout a life of public service.





School board receives WEB update on playground renovation

Representing WEB (Wayne Elementary Boosters), Laura Gamble and Jodi Pulfer were present at the meeting of the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education Monday night. They gave the board an update on the revamping planned for the elementary school playground. They noted parents felt some of the equipment was getting old and unsafe and that prompted them to begin the project.

Gamble said they have received \$10,000 and are in the process of working with three grants; one with Gardner Foundation, one with Aquila, and one with Pamida. Making this a community project. other businesses, individuals, and organizations are signing on to

Also present to address the board was Darla Munson. 

Higher U.S. wholesale natural gas prices expected to affect Aquila customer bills

Significantly higher U.S. wholesale natural gas prices are expected to cause Aquila's gas customers in Nebraska to experience higher bills, a company official said recently.

"Based on current market conditions, we expect our natural gas customers to experience higher prices this year and through the winter heating season," said Steve Pella, operating vice president for Aquila in Nebraska. "As a result, we are encouraging our customers to take steps for home and business weatherization and conservation to help control their costs,"

U.S. market prices for natural gas currently are about \$6 per Mcf (one thousand cubic feet) compared to approximately \$3.50 a year ago. Aquila provides gas to its customers at the same price it is able to purchase its gas supplies.

An example of the effect of high gas prices on Aquila customers is the adjustment being made in July to the company's StreamLINE® level-payment plan. The plan allows participating customers to have the same payment each month, based on their past gas usage and the projected gas price. Aquila has about 44,660 customers on StreamLINE in Nebraska and approximately 480 in Wayne.

With the sharp rise in wholesale gas costs, the average StreamLINE customer in Nebraska will experience an increase from the current monthly payment of about \$34.68 to a monthly payment of approximate.

"By making this adjustment in July we are helping our customers avoid very large account balances that would have to be reconciled on an annual basis," Pella said. Pella stated that the key factors currently influencing U.S. gas prices include:

*U.S. gas storage levels are about 40 percent below the same time last year, and about 30 percent below the five-year average.

*U.S. natural gas production is currently at about the same level as last year. The combination of low gas storage levels with no increase in gas production means that less gas supply is available to meet consumer demand.

To help mitigate the effect of higher gas prices this winter, Aquila is using a portfolio approach in purchasing gas for the heating season when consumer demand is highest. In Nebraska, Aquila is purchasing a mixture of gas supplies in fixed-price contracts; gas placed in storage; options contracts, and gas purchased at market prices.

On average, gas commodity costs comprise 60 percent of the customer's bill. Transportation of gas from the wellhead where it is produced comprises about 20 percent of the bill. Another 20 percent of the customer's bill is for the distribution of gas into local communities, and includes such services as meter reading and system maintenance. Transportation and distribution costs are regulated by federal and state agencies.

To help offset the effects of higher natural gas prices on customer bills, Pella recommended customers consider the following energy conservation measures:

*During the winter, adjust the thermostat during the day and night. Set the thermostat at 68 degrees during the day, and lower it a few degrees at night.

*Lower the water heater temperature a few degrees.

*Use cold water whenever possible. Many laundry detergents are effective in cold water.

Check furnace filters monthly and clean or replace as needed, in *Don't block heating vents with furniture or clutter.

*Caulk and seal around windows and doors.

*Add insulation in the home's

*Add insulation in the home's attic.

*Install a setback thermostat that will automatically lower temperature settings at night and at

other designated times.

SCC Foundation Scholarships are awarded annually to high school graduates who are enrolling at one of the three college campuses. The first term tuition is \$500 for a full-time student.

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



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Farm Bureau holds picnic

He noted that Farm Bureau is currently celebrating agriculture and that young farmers and ranchers are important to the Farm Bureau.



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
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






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Research has shown that specific odors, when connected to past events, can affect behavior. For example, a burning smell or the smell of hospital disinfectants can cause feelings of anxiety in some persons. That is the concept behind a relatively new approach to healthcare called aromatherapy. Most often specific aromas are used to produce a calming effect. Aromatherapists use essential oils of different herbs to produce the desired outcome.

Three recent studies indicate that the scent from the oils of lemon balm and lavender when inhaled or applied to the skin, significantly benefited elderly persons with existing behavior problems such as dementia and agitation. The oils were either steamed into the room air or were applied as a hand lotion. In each study no side effects were noted and all participants were able to complete the designated treatment. The significance of these studies is that an improvement in agitation eventually could lead to decreased need for prescription-calming drugs, in



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Testing for radon? Your family will breathe a lot easier

We recently hosted a Radon or other retail outlets. meeting with participation from the State Health Department. Their test information from Northeast Nebraska confirmed that radon is a concern for most families in this area.

In fact, some of the more recent results had some counties in Northeast Nebraska with some of the highest in the state. In Dixon County 85 percent of homes tested were over the 4 picocuries per liter of air (pCi/L) rating considered safe. Wayne County had 81 percent of the homes tested were considered high. Cedar County had 79 percent of the homes tested that rated high. Radon is impossible to see, smell or taste.

Radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer in the U.S.only cigarette smoking causes more lung cancer deaths. In fact, the Environmental Protection Agency and the Surgeon General have strongly recommended that all residences (except those above the second floor in multi-level buildings) be tested for radon. The Nebraska State Health Department is also recommending that all homes and schools be test-

Radon detection kits are available free of charge from the Dixon County Extension Office, call 402-584-2234, and from the Department of Health and Human Services by calling 800-334-9491. You can also purchase a kit at your local hardware store

Your family's risk of developing lung cancer from radon depends



on the average annual level of radon in your home and the amount of time you spend there. The longer your exposure to radon, the greater the risk. The risk is much greater for smokers. Current estimates are that 14,000 deaths occur annually in the United States due to radon exposure. This is second only to smoking. It seeps into your home from the surrounding soil.

Luckily, radon is easy and inexpensive to detect. And homes with high levels can be fixed.

But it's up to you to find out

Livestock Market. Prices were Caution urged when pruning trees damaged by storms

The wind storms from last week caused severe damage to many trees in parks, windbreaks and landscape trees across coun-

ties in eastern Nebraska. The key to taking care of those damaged trees is to have patience. The tree needs to be cared for by removing the damaged branches in a timely and proper method. One of the best methods to use for removal is to cut the damaged branch off at the point of attachment at the next largest branch. This is commonly called "drop crouch" pruning. The damaged branches should be removed as soon as possible, but there is no immediate need to remove the damaged portion of the tree, however, it should be done during this summer period to prevent infestation of rotting disease and some time to start the healing process before win-

An evaluation of the tree needs to be done to determine if the tree has too much damage and perhaps needs to be removed entirely. There are some general guidelines to determine removal and it is generally based on an individual situation. If a significant portion of the tree crown has been damaged and the main stem torn out, it may be best to start over. "It is hard to make general recommendations for all trees in this kind of storm situation, it is best to have the tree looked at and individual decisions be made based upon the specific situation", indicated Del Hemsath, extension educator for Dakota, Dixon and Thurston counties.

The tree needs to be evaluated for other possible damage such as cracked or twisted branches which can cause problems later in the life of the tree. Hemsath. said that the older trees in the parks and communities took the greatest amount of damage from






County extension offices have new WebPages

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 78. ARTICLE III, SECTION 78-12 STOP SIGN LOCATIONS; EAST OF MAIN STREET, SOUTH OF SEVENTH STREET OF THE

WAYNE MUNICIPAL CODE.
