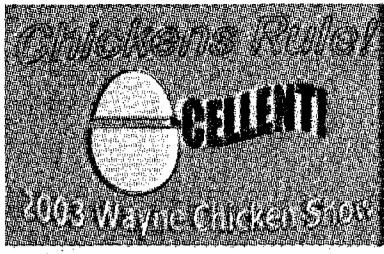


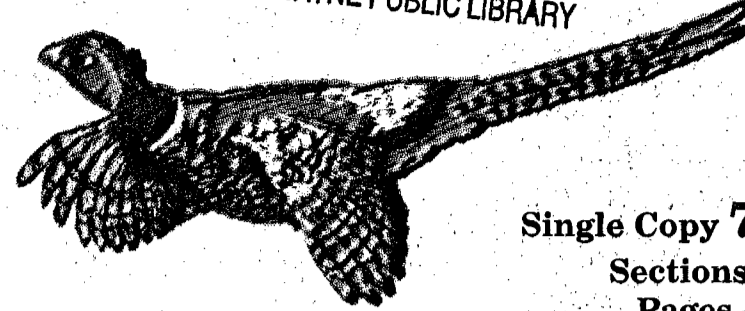

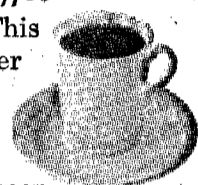


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Chamber Coffee

Presentation planned to honor military personnel

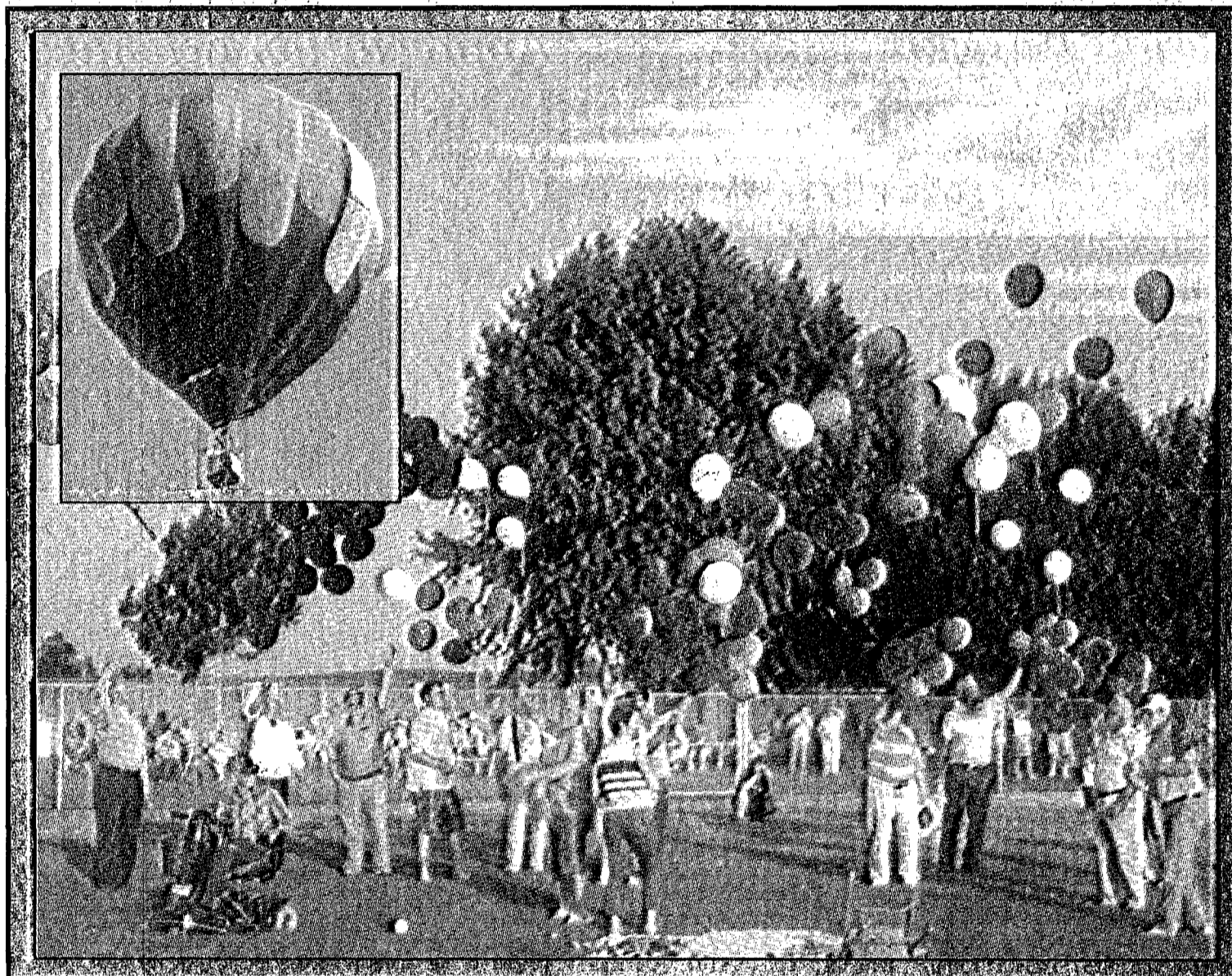

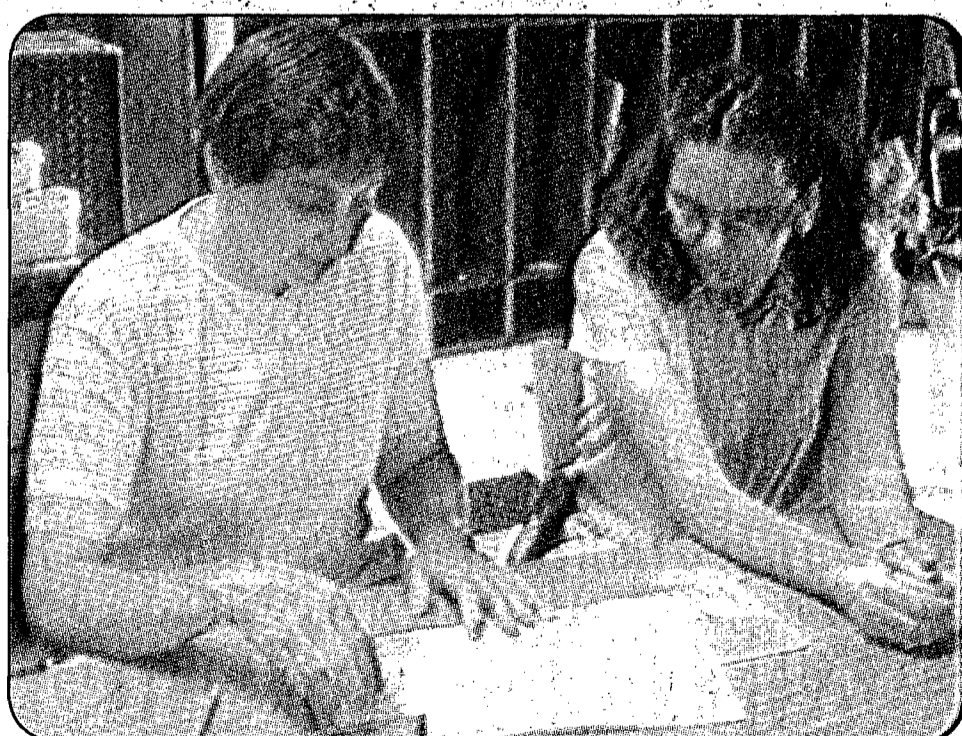

She has a teaching degree and is working on her Masters degree in Education Administration. She taught elementary music and band for several years in Cheyenne, Wyo.

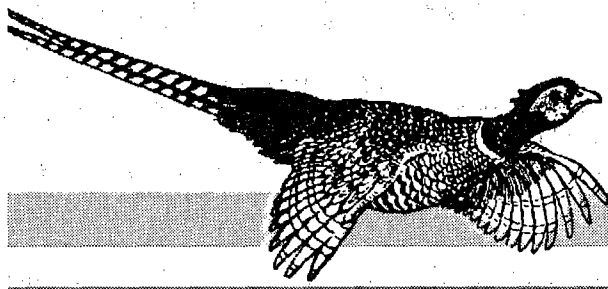

Mary Temme, left, former Director of Rainbow World, goes over paperwork with Kim Wilson, who became director on July 7.

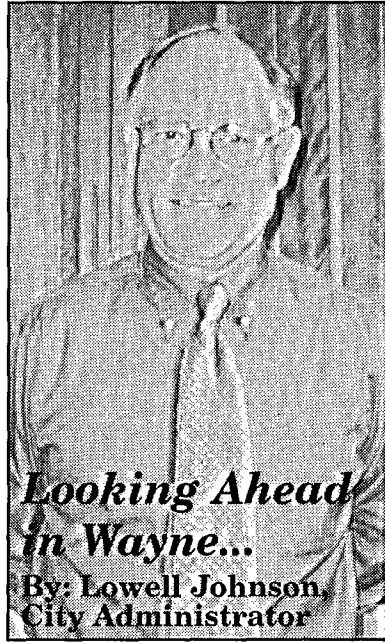

Tornado sirens

After recent storms we have had questions about why the police department did not sound the tornado warning sirens.

We have a protocol adopted some time ago by the city council for the police department that directs the dispatchers to sound the siren in the case of eminent danger of tornado.

What does that mean? Our protocol calls for sirens when:

- 1) a tornado has been sighted by trained fire department or law enforcement spotters;
- 2) a call to Wayne dispatch is received from the National Weather Service that radar shows a tornado in the immediate area;
- 3) a tornado is spotted by a member of the general public within five miles of Wayne.

Last Saturday night, a general tornado warning was issued to the news media for Wayne and Wayne County by the National Weather Service. It is appropriate to take

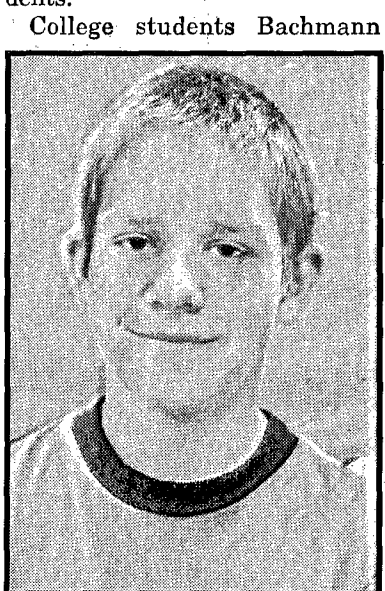
Training future scientists possible through grant

Dr. Barbara Hayford, Wayne State College assistant professor of life science, and Jamie Bachmann, a WSC student from Fremont, will be presenting at an international symposium in Minneapolis, Aug. 11-15, after spending July in Mongolia for an international research effort.

Hayford and Bachmann are part of a \$350,000 grant project to survey and inventory the aquatic macroinvertebrates of the Selenge River drainage basin in Mongolia through a project spanning from 2002-2005.

The National Science Foundation (NSF) Biotic Surveys and Inventories Program funds the project, a joint effort between the Academy of Natural Sciences in Philadelphia and the Mongolian Academy of Science. WSC is the only primarily undergraduate college of three awarded institutions.

Funding allows for training students at WSC in the identification and ecology of aquatic insects and to take students to Mongolia to train in the collection of aquatic insects while fostering relationships with Mongolian students.

cover because of the general threat. That does not trigger sounding our sirens unless a tornado is spotted.

A major purpose for siren warnings is for people outside who are not listening to news media. It is important for all to check local radio and television media in periods of storm activity. Don't call the Wayne police or the media for information during storm activity because those lines need to be open for emergency communications and the media delivers information faster than anyone. Under current policy, when sirens blow - something is truly eminent.

Dealing with school funding

All roads lead to the courthouse when it comes to the state's major public policy issues.

The Omaha school board filed a potentially important lawsuit last week, challenging Nebraska's system of aid to public schools.

Well, why not?

Whether it's the death penalty or transferring water between river basins, or laws governing property taxes, sooner or later the judicial branch is asked to clarify aspects of complex and controversial public policy.

There is no guarantee that a decision by a court, or several courts, will actually make things clearer on any given issue. Judges at every level are as human as others in high office, and equally capable of making a mess.

Sometimes, though, the judiciary is asked to step in when it appears that the legislative and executive branches will never get things smoothed out in one area or another. The funding of public schools is ever a classic example of such an instance, in Nebraska and elsewhere in the country.

The lawsuit filed by the Omaha Public Schools covers 56 pages in appropriate legalese, but the gist of it is easily understood.

The board contends that Omaha schools simply don't get the money needed to do the job required of them by the state. The lawsuit cites everything from kids with learning disabilities to those who don't speak English and those with other disadvantages. There are requirements for testing pupils to determine whether their progress

is adequate in key areas. In short, the OPS board said in its litigation, higher levels of government are long on giving orders and short on giving out money.

The suggestion that any public schools are under funded will send legions of taxpayers up the nearest walls. That's understandable.

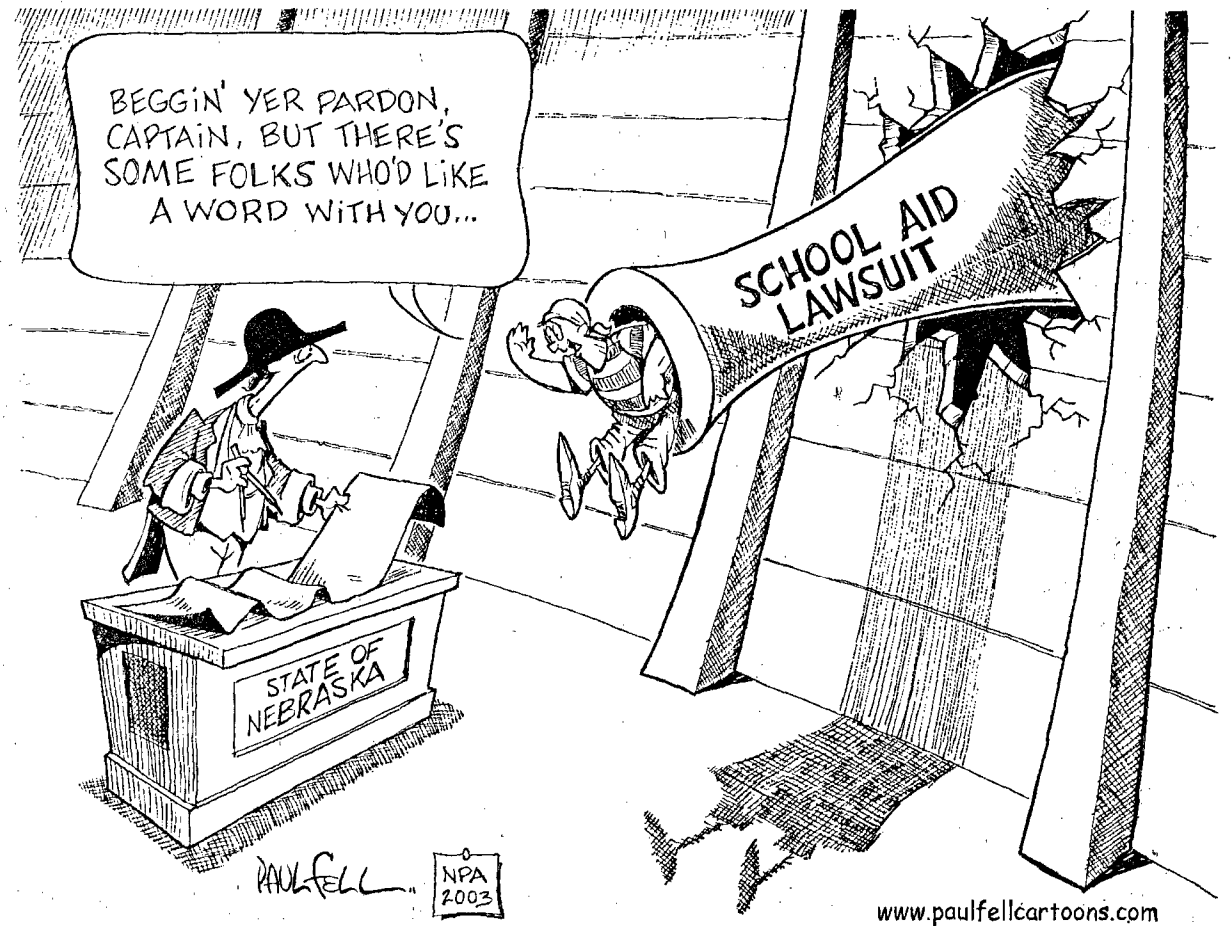
Still, if you have one of those hearts in which hope springs eternal, you could easily be gladdened

by the OPS lawsuit.

Perhaps the courts will eventually declare the current funding mechanisms unconstitutional. The Legislature would have to write new ones. Or, the courts might say the Legislature must provide enormous increases in funding so as to make possible the carrying out of educational goals it has written into law. The latter would surely lead to systemic revisions, because the state couldn't possibly generate that much money.

Finally, such a lawsuit is akin to a vote of no confidence in the Legislature and the governor. (I know - lots of people would extend the same vote to the OPS board).

The lawsuit says that it isn't possible to live up to the demands of state government in education because those demands are unreasonable and underfunded. It thus implies that those in the Capitol have passed laws, and then passed the buck. But not the dollars.

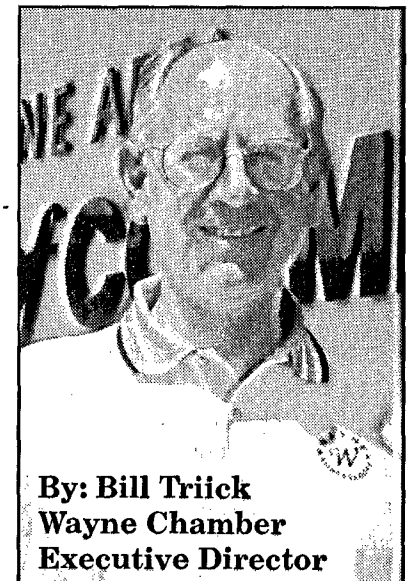

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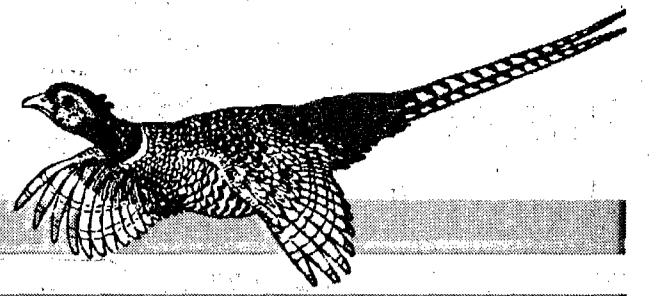

Wayne Seniors extend win streak to ten games

With the post-season just one week away, the Wayne Senior American Legion baseball team appears to be peaking at the right time of the season.

The Seniors won three more games in the past week to improve to 22-6 overall.

Wayne handled Pender in a make-up game played Tuesday evening at Overin Field 8-2.

Brad Hochstein tossed his second no-hitter of the season in the win. He struck out nine and walked just one batter. Pender took advantage of three Wayne errors to score their two runs.

Hochstein was also the star at the plate, going 4 for 4 with a home run, two singles and a double. Mike Sturm added a two-run homer along with a single, Matt Roeber tripled with Adam Hoffman and Andy Baker each adding singles to close out the hitting for Wayne.

The Seniors needed a 12-run fifth inning outburst Monday evening to win at Tekamah 16-7.

Wayne trailed 7-4 entering the top of the fifth inning, then exploded with the 12-run inning on six hits to pick up the win.

"We looked a little rusty after not having a game since last

Wednesday, but our leaders really stepped up for us," said head coach Chad Metzler.

Eric Sturm had four hits, including a double, to lead the team in hitting. Hochstein contributed three singles, Hoffman belted a triple and single, Aaron Jorgensen had a double and single, Chris Nissen added two singles and Adam McGuire doubled to round out a 14-hit attack. Hoffman and Eric Sturm each drove in three runs with Nissen and Jorgensen scoring three runs apiece.

McGuire was the winning pitcher in relief of starter Hoffman. McGuire (9-1) worked the final two innings, allowing just one hit with three strikeouts. Hoffman worked the first three innings, giving up seven hits and seven runs. He walked five and struck out five batters.

In Ralph Bishop League play last Wednesday, Wayne blanked Wakefield at Eaton Field by a 7-0 score.

McGuire (8-1) was nearly flawless on the hill, tossing a complete-game three hitter with eight strikeouts. He threw only 65 pitches in the game.

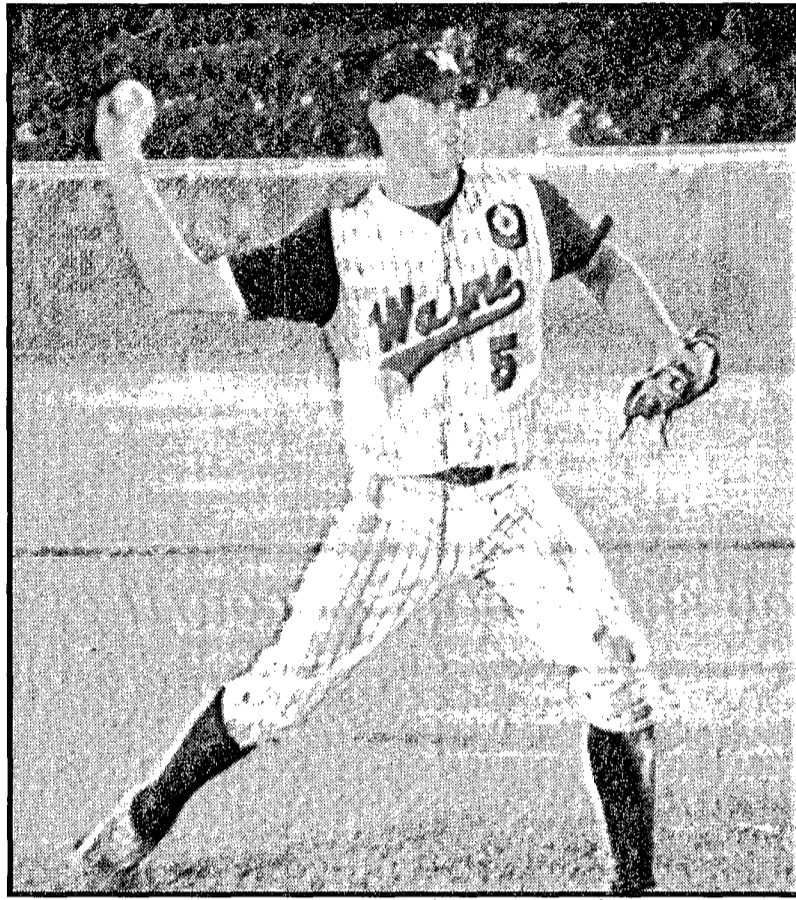
Wayne scored three runs in the

first inning, highlighted by Mike Sturm's two-run homer and Hoffman's lead-off triple, then added four more runs in the third to put the game away early.

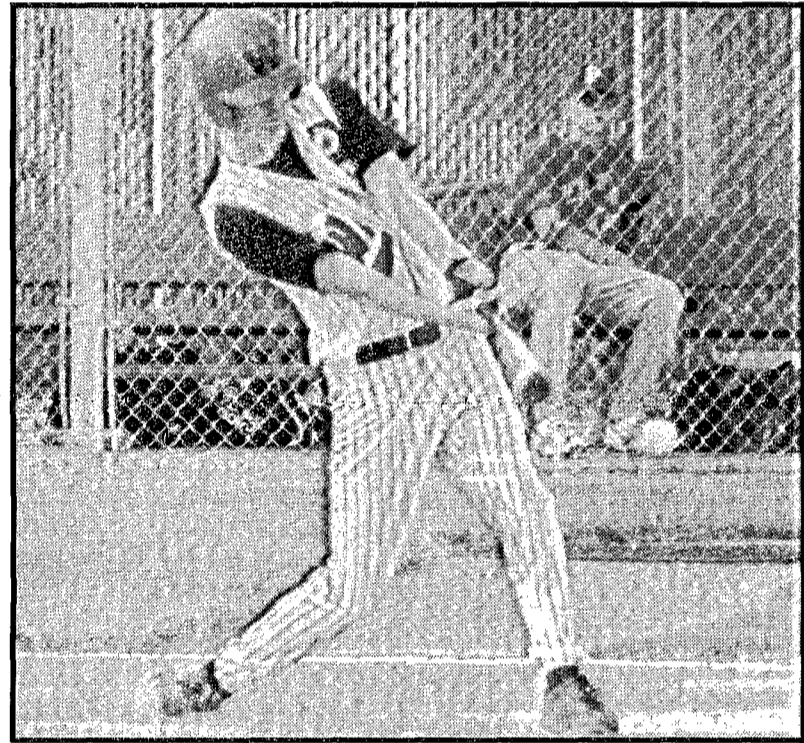
Hoffman's three hits led Wayne at the plate. Mike Sturm and Hochstein chipped in with two hits each. Eric Sturm and McGuire

had a double each with Jon Ehrhardt and Nissen adding singles.

Wayne is 22-6 on the season and will play in the Ralph Bishop League Tournament Saturday and Monday in Wakefield, then host the Class B Area 3 Tournament starting Thursday, July 17.

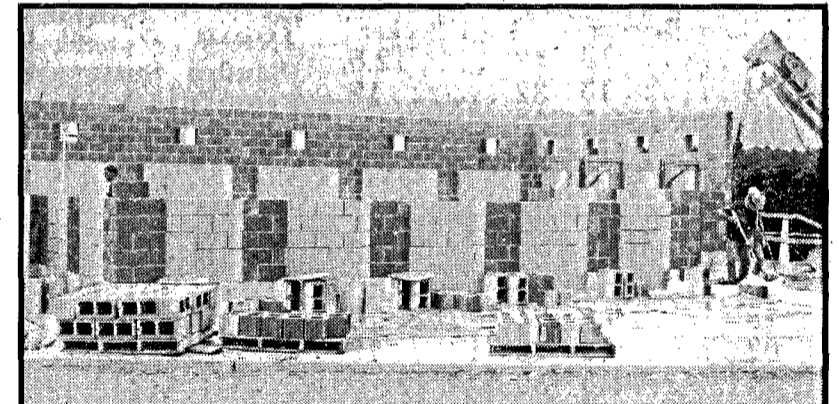
Wakefield blanked the Wayne Juniors last Wednesday at Eaton Field 8-0 in five innings.

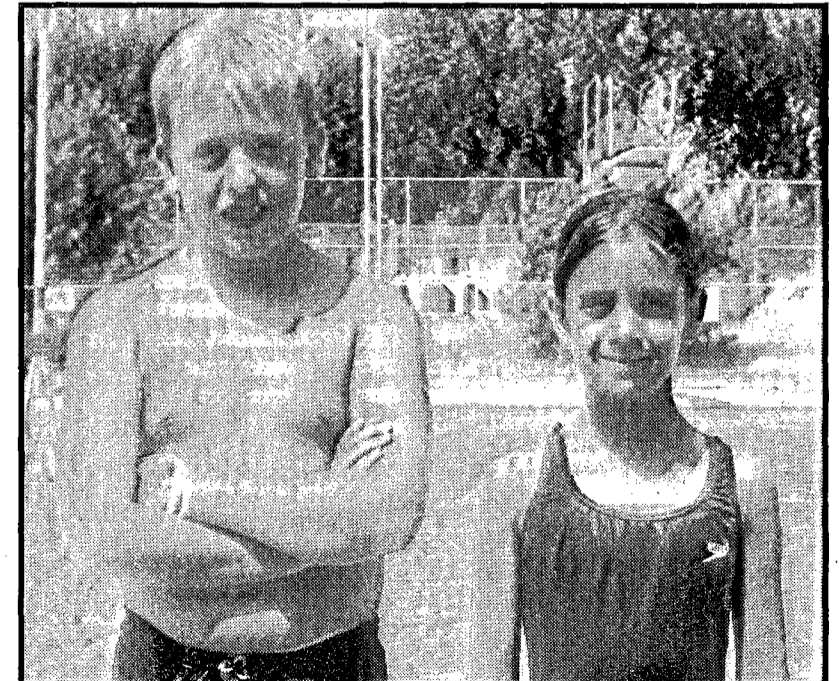
Wayne was scheduled to play the Blackstone Ravens on the Fourth of July, but the game was cancelled and Wayne earned a 7-0 forfeit win.

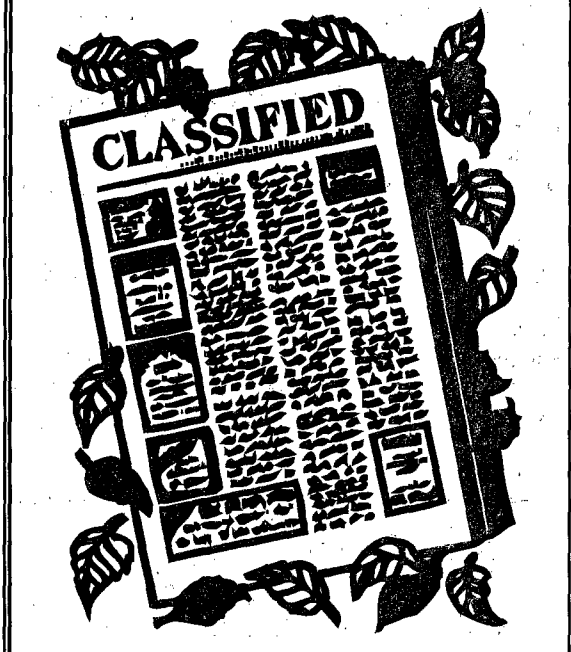


FHL Bank recently awarded 24 of its financial institution members, like Farmers & Merchants State Bank, more than \$3.4 million in AHP grants.

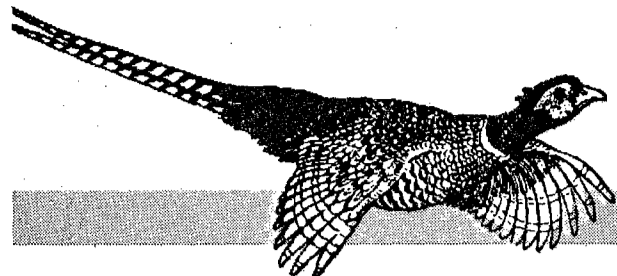
