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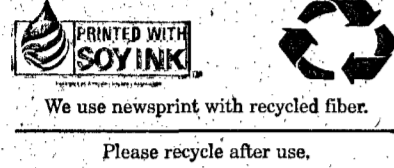

Time again to get back to the books

To the dismay of most young people, it is once again time to head back to the classrooms.

Schools in the area will begin in the near future, with the exception of Allen Consolidated Schools.

Due to construction of a new school building, classes in Allen are scheduled to begin on Monday, Sept. 8. Adjustments have been made in the daily schedule to make up for the time missed.

In Wakefield, school begins Monday, Aug. 18 and will run from 8:15 a.m. to 3:40 p.m. On Aug. 18, the students will

gather for a flag raising ceremony. The only new staff member at Wakefield is Bill Trenhaile, who will be a half-time instrumental music teacher.

In Winside, classes begin Wednesday, Aug. 20 with a 2 p.m. dismissal. Classes will be in session for a full day (8:15 a.m. to 3:43 p.m.) on Aug. 21.

New staff members include Michelle Evans, History; Nancy Wiechman, Physical Science/ Math and Jason Novotny, Industrial Technology and Wood Shop.

Lynn Pierce, Elementary Principal and Guidance Counselor at Winside,

will also assume the duties of Athletic Director.

At Laurel-Concord Schools, classes begin on Wednesday, Aug. 20. On both Wednesday and Thursday, classes will be dismissed at 2 p.m. On Friday, classes will be dismissed at the traditional time of 2:37 p.m.

Paul Timm will be the new Vocational Ag Teacher at Laurel-Concord.

At Wayne Community Schools, classes begin Wednesday, Aug. 20 and will include a full-day.

Elementary School classes for all grades begin at 8:15 a.m. Students in

K-2 are dismissed at 3:15 and those in 3-4 are dismissed at 3:20 p.m.

At the Elementary School, Jennifer Thomas will be teaching third grade. She has previously taught at Wayne Middle School and Carroll Elementary School. Also, Sandy Spethman has moved from third grade to fourth grade.

Wayne Middle School classes begin at 8:15 a.m. each day and are dismissed at 3:30 p.m.

Several changes in teaching staff will be noted at the Middle School.

Check forgery suspects are sentenced

Two area women charged in a string of check forgeries last December in Wayne County were sentenced Wednesday morning in Wayne County District Court.

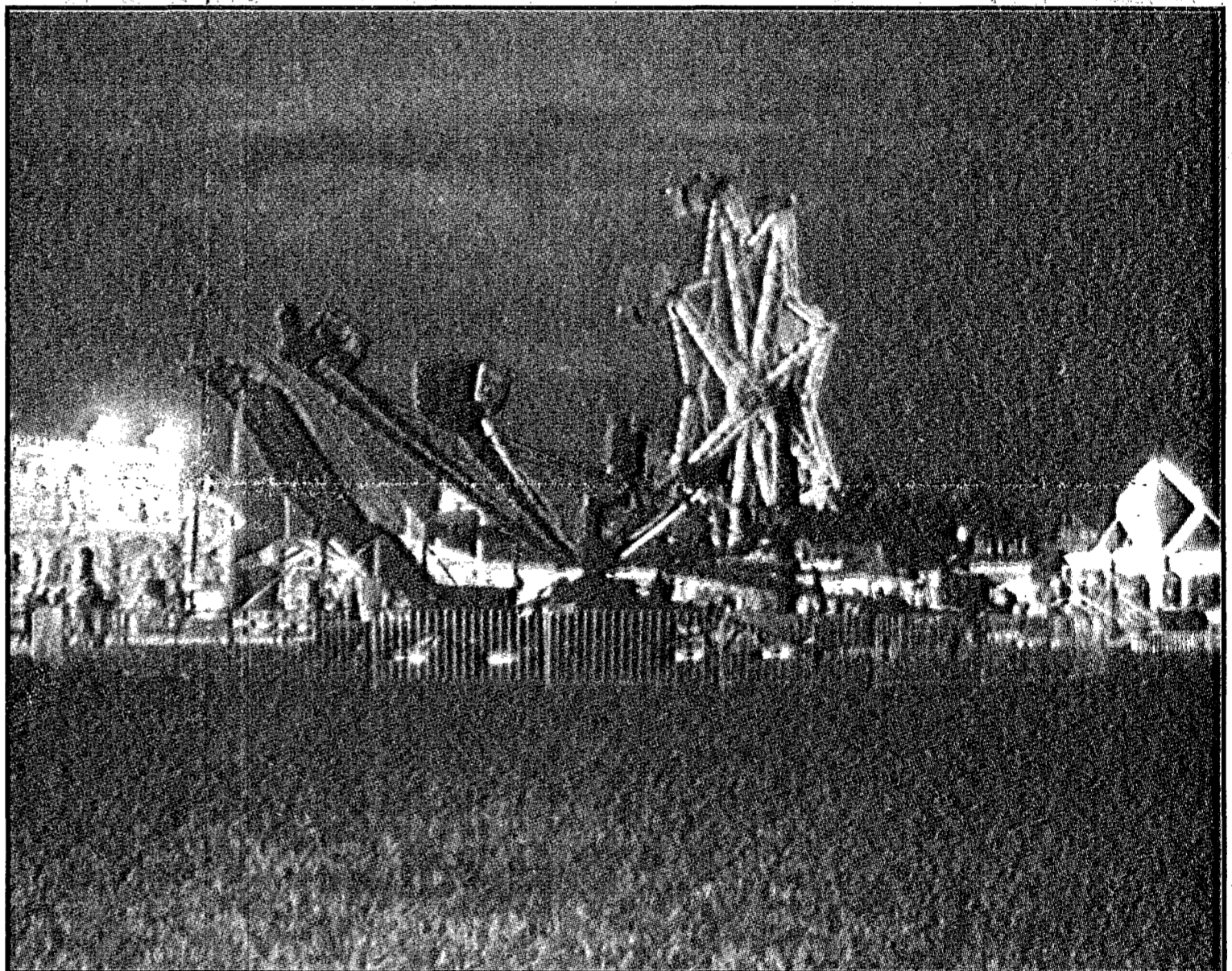
33-year-old Dawn Hawkins of Wakefield was sentenced by Wayne County District Court Judge Robert Ensz to one to two years in prison on two felony counts of forgery and another year in prison on six misdemeanor counts of forgery.

Hawkins was originally charged with 24 counts of forgery in the case, but struck a plea bargain with attorneys in early June. The recommended sentence for Hawkins was one year in prison and make restitution costs of around \$2,200, but Ensz ordered Hawkins to serve a longer sentence since she had no ability to make restitution and that she was on probation at the time of the current offense.

35-year-old Tammy Osbahr of Laurel received a sentence of 36 months probation from Judge Ensz for her role in the same case.

Osbahr faced two felony counts and six misdemeanor counts of aiding and abetting after also reaching a plea bargain with attorneys in early June. She was originally charged with one count of forgery and 25 counts of aiding and

Ponies help those with disabilities

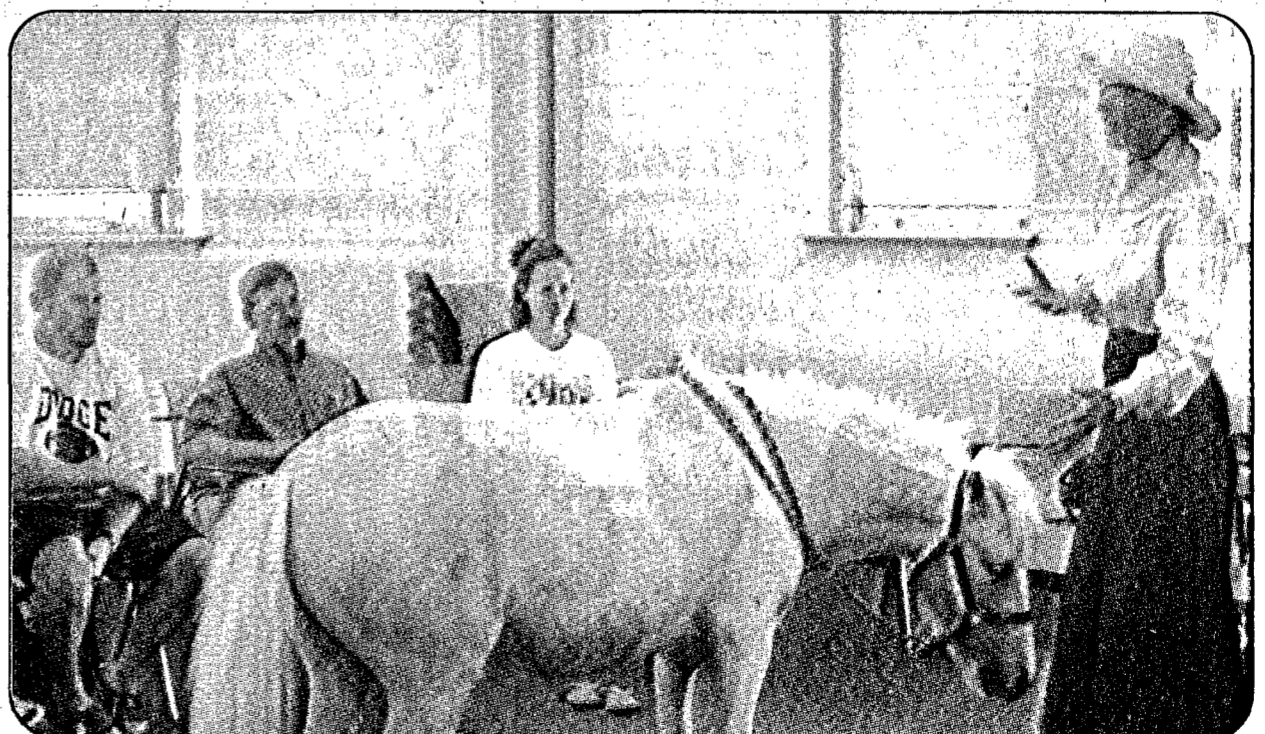

When a pony came to a special education classroom under the direction of Dr. Fay Jackson on the Wayne State College campus, Brian Hapner of Ainsworth, a gold-medal special olympics athlete, demonstrated rope tricks for an audience last week including several volunteers from Rainbow Riders in Wayne.

Three organizations helping individuals with disabilities were spotlighted during Jackson's Survey of Exceptionalities class. They included Reins & Lines, Rainbow Riders and Personal Ponies.

Reins and Lines was established in 1976 and offers a program that specializes in driving and riding horses and involving humans with the horse's tactility to enhance the joy and usefulness of both in rehabilitation and special needs therapy and training including those with special needs and their horses, driving clinics at beginning, continuing education, and rehabilitation levels and other specialty clinics. Rainbow Riders is a program providing therapeutic horseback riding to mentally, physically, and emotionally challenged children and adults

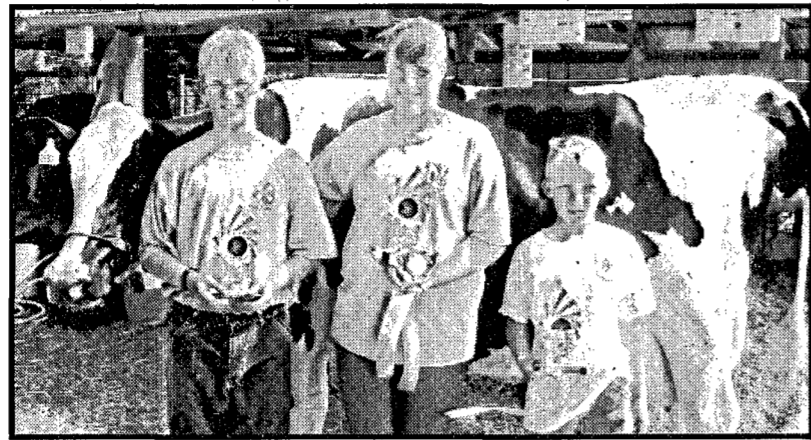

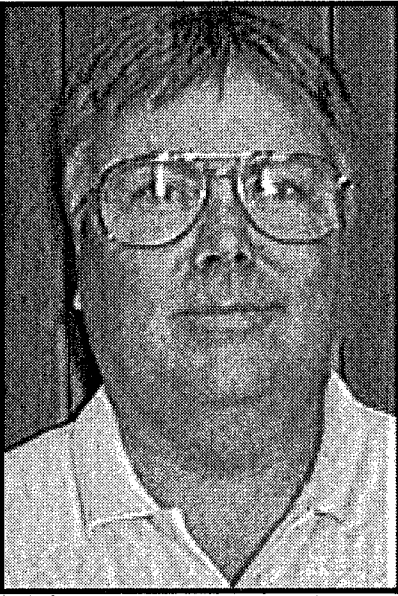
Editorials

Listening to stories

I have always loved listening to my father tell stories. The other day while I was talking to my mom, she reminded me of her favorite story she liked him to tell.

During the waning years of the depression in a small Alabama community, My father

used to stop by Mr. Miller's roadside stand for farm-fresh produce as the season made it available. See Dad was a traveling salesman for Cosby-Hodges Foods. Food and money were still extremely scarce and bartering was used extensively. Dad would sell their goods and do some trading for other stores, but that is another story.



One day Mr. Miller was bagging some early potatoes for him. He noticed a small boy, delicate of bone and feature, ragged but clean, hungrily apprising a basket of freshly picked green peas. He paid for his potatoes but was also drawn to the display of fresh green peas. He was a pushover for creamed peas and new potatoes. Pondering the peas, he couldn't help over hearing the conversation between Mr. Miller and the ragged boy next to me.

"Hello Barry, how are you today?"
 "Hi, Mr. Miller. Fine, thank ya. Jus' admirin' them peas ... sure look good."
 "They are good, Barry. How's your Ma?"
 "Fine. Gittin' stronger alla' time."
 "Good. Anything I can help you with?"
 "No, Sir. Jus' admirin' them peas."
 "Would you like to take some home?"
 "No, Sir. Got nuthin' to pay for 'em with."
 "Well, what have you to trade me for some of those peas?"
 "All I got's my prize marble here."
 "Is that right? Let me see it."
 "Here 'tis. She's a dandy."
 "I can see that. Hmmmmmm, only thing is this one is blue and I sort of go for red. Do you have a red one like this at home?"
 "Not zackley ... but almost."
 "Tell you what. Take this sack of peas home with you and next trip this way let me look at that red marble."
 "Sure will. Thanks Mr. Miller."

Mrs. Miller, who had been standing nearby, came over to help him. With a smile she said, "There are two other boys like him in our community, all three are in very poor circumstances. Jim just loves to bargain with them for peas, apples, tomatoes, or whatever. When they come back with their red marbles, and they always do, he decides he doesn't like red after all and he sends them home with a bag of produce for a green marble or an orange one, perhaps."

He left the stand smiling to himself, impressed with this man. A short time later I moved to Colorado but I never forgot the story of this man, the boys, and their bartering. Several years went by, each more rapid than the previous one. Just recently I had occasion to visit some old friends in that Idaho community and while I was there learned that Mr. Miller had died. They were having his viewing that evening and knowing my friends wanted to go, I agreed to accompany them.

Upon arrival at the mortuary he fell into line to meet the relatives of the deceased and to offer whatever words of comfort we could. Ahead of us in line were three young men. One was in an army uniform and the other two wore nice haircuts, dark suits and white shirts... all very professional looking. They approached Mrs. Miller, standing composed and smiling by her husband's casket. Each of the young men hugged her, kissed her on the cheek, spoke briefly with her and moved on to the casket. Her misty light blue eyes followed them as, one by one, each young man stopped briefly and placed his own warm hand over the cold pale hand in the casket.

Each left the mortuary awkwardly, wiping his eyes. His turn came to meet Mrs. Miller. He told her who I was and mentioned the story she had told me about the marbles. With her eyes glistening, she took my hand and led me to the casket.

"Those three young men, who just left were the boys I told you about."

They just told me how they appreciated the things Jim "traded" them.

Now, at last, when Jim could not change his mind about color or size ... they came to pay their debt."

"We've never had a great deal of the wealth of this world," she confided, "but right now, Jim would consider himself the richest man in Idaho."

With loving gentleness she lifted the lifeless fingers of her deceased husband. Resting underneath were three exquisitely shined red marbles.

Moral: We will not be remembered by our words, but by our kind deeds.

Life is not measured by the breaths we take, but by the moments that take our breath.

Today ... I wish you a day of ordinary miracles ...

..... A fresh pot of coffee you didn't make yourself An unexpected phone call from an old friend Green traffic lights on your way to work The fastest line at the grocery store A good sing-along song on the radio Your keys right where you left them

They say it takes a minute to find a special person, An hour to appreciate them, A day to love them, But an entire life to forget them.

State needs to take look at finances

Will Rogers gave good advice that applied to societies as well as to individuals.

One of his common sense observations should be considered by a great many states, including Nebraska.

If you find yourself in a hole, Rogers said, the first thing you need to do is stop digging.

Well, there you have it.

This column has suggested for several years that Nebraska ought to take a serious-minded look at the reality of its finances and demographics. It has been obvious for at least that long that the Cornhusker state must make major decisions about taxes and the services they provide.

Last week, Speaker of the Legislature Curt Bromm bespoke the reality succinctly.

"It needs to be a turning point," Bromm said. "What we're being asked to do in providing services is not sustainable."

That is as low-key an understatement as any lawmaker is likely to offer in this decade, and perhaps beyond.

If Nebraska were a private enterprise, its accountant would likely tell the board of directors: "Well, folks, it's this way. Either you cut waaaaaay back on spending, or you start bringing in waaaaaay more money. Or, you can just plan now for bankruptcy."

For the moment, at least, that seems to be the reality of fiscal things hereabouts.

The Legislature was recently provided with a study that shows changing demographics don't bode well for the future of tax receipts in the long run.

And you already know that they've been lousy in the recent short run. Think seriously, fellow

Nebraskans, about seminal changes in public education. Think about school district consolidation and county consolidation. Think about enhanced use of instruction beamed to far-flung classrooms via satellite. Think about how many colleges and universities Nebraska is (or is not) going to need.

Think, also, about a rising need for handling crime and criminals; and the even faster rise in what will be the need of baby boomers for social services. Think about high-paying jobs that are leaving the country, and lower-paid workers in the form of immigrants.

You can also think about changes in tax breaks provided for

businesses, big and small. But at this writing, you probably don't need to think about it very much. The status will remain quo unless there are earth-shaking changes in the Legislature's mindset. (The former is also an understatement; and rather a polite one, too.)

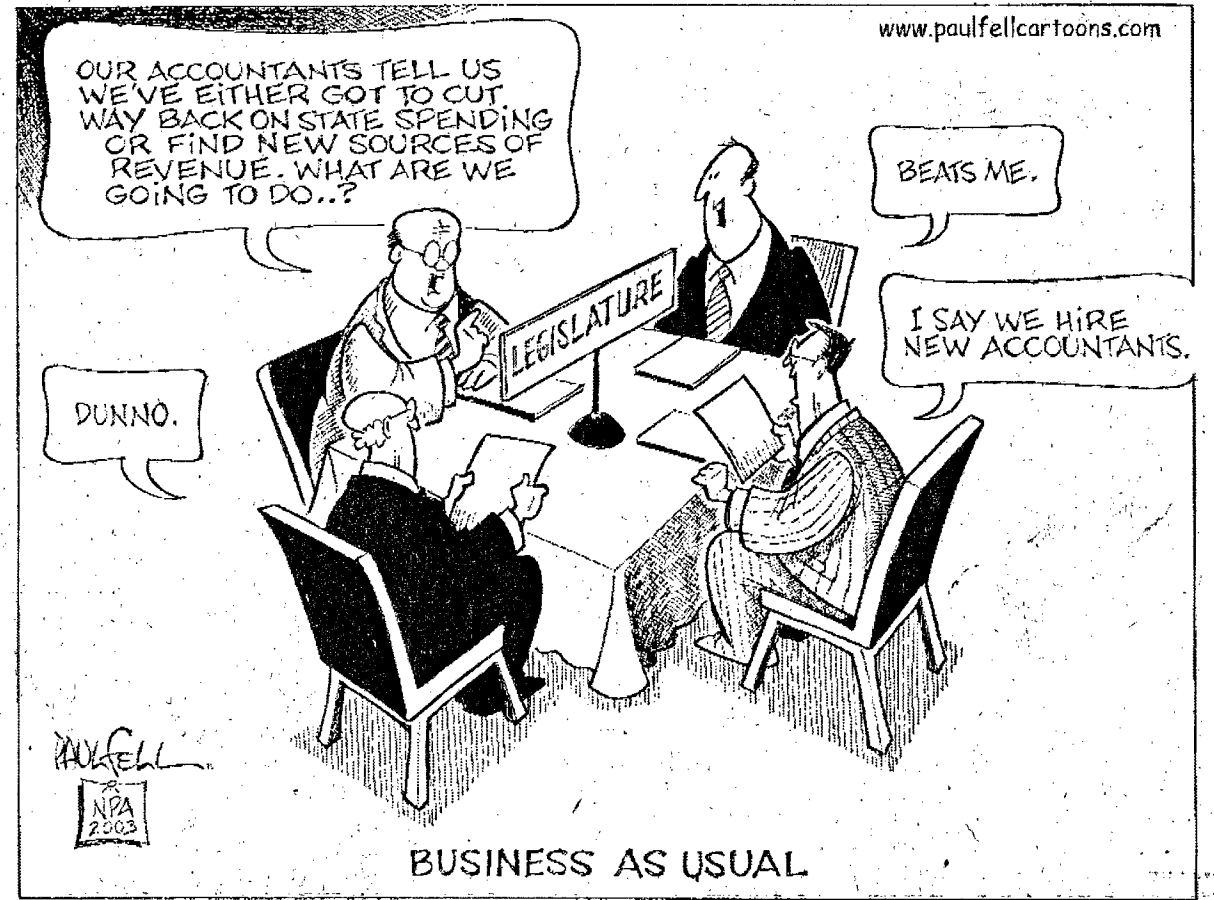
The first person in public office to say: "What we need is economic development! And more agricultural exports!" should be given five minutes to elaborate with absolute specifics. Thereafter, that person should be condemned to life in the Legislature, on a diet of lutefish and bottled water (taken straight from the Missouri River.)

In the months ahead,

Legislative committees will be looking at a host of policy issues involving everything mentioned above, and more.

If you have an interest in taxes - property, income, sales or other - it would behoove you to pay attention to the reporting that comes out of the Legislature's findings. It would behoove you even more to contact your state senator and let him or her know what you think; and demand to know what they think.

We know that salvation of the state lies in watchfulness of the citizen. Salvation of the citizen might lie there, too.

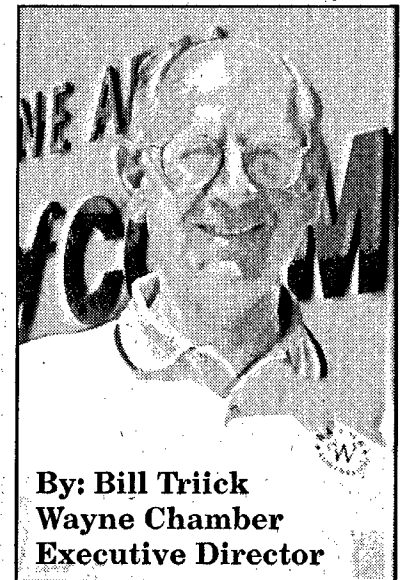
Ballots have been distributed to our investors for the purpose of electing three new board members who will take office for three-year terms in January.

of all ages in Northeast Nebraska since 1992. Hapner's horse Brownie was given to him by PERSONAL PONIES, a national organization dedicated to the belief that the life of a child with disabilities can be immeasurably enriched by having a tiny pony to love and care for. Thus they provide Miniature Shetland Ponies to families of disabled children, completely without charge, for the lifetime use of the child. Hapner has cared for the horse since it was small and helped

to train the horse to ride. While in Wayne, he demonstrated saddling and barrel riding the horse for the Wayne State group. He even allowed Fay and others in attendance to ride his horse. Dr. Jackson and Irene Graves of Long Pine from the Reins and Lines organization demonstrated for Jackson's special education class the talents of one of the ponies who is involved in therapy through the Reins and Lines organization by bringing the pony into the Brandenburg Education Building on the elevator. Even though Peace ALur had

never ridden in an elevator before, Graves said this shows the temperament of a horse that works with people on an interactive level through therapy. She noted that only one in 3,000 ponies is as people-oriented at Peace ALur and have his abilities to work with people. She said that after visiting a nursing home with the United Kingdom Shetland, a man who had not been out of his room for several weeks, came out to visit the horse. Jackson is an associate professor with teaching interests in special education, assessments and learning strategies.

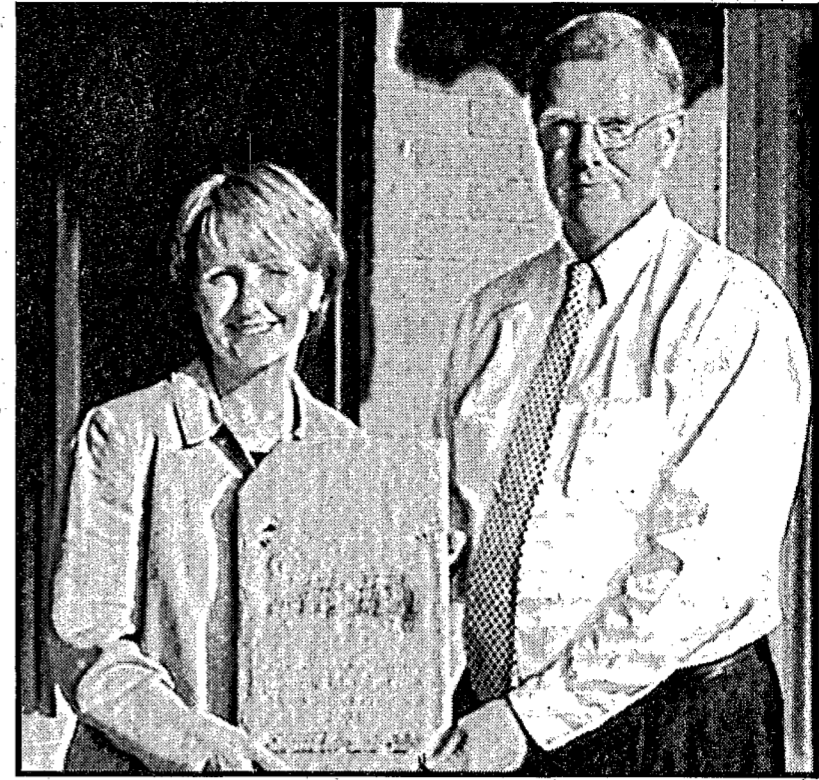

Wayne Municipal Airport to receive \$90,000 for improvements

Senator Chuck Hagel of Nebraska has announced that the Wayne Airport Authority will receive \$90,000 from the U. S. Department of Transportation (DOT). The funding will be used to improve the airport's main access road.

"Providing air service to small communities is vital to their survival, and to the economic well-being of the entire state. This funding helps ensure that the Wayne Municipal Airport can continue to provide safe and efficient service in the future," Hagel said.

The funding is provided by the Airport Improvement Program (AIP), under the Department of Transportation. AIP funds up to 90 percent of the costs of improvements for eligible airports.

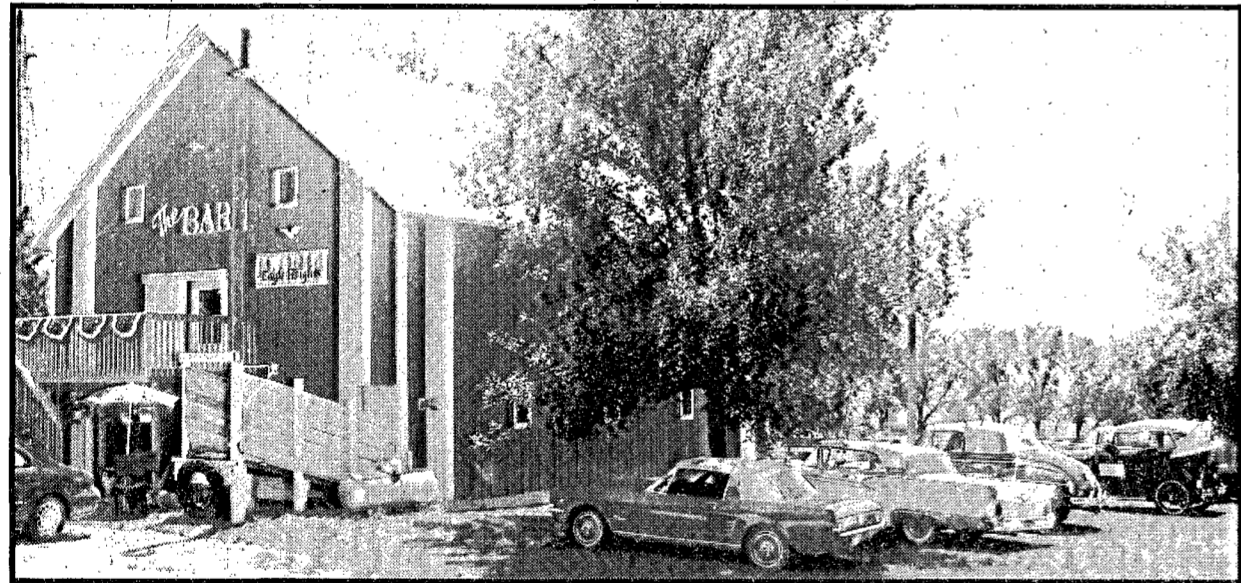

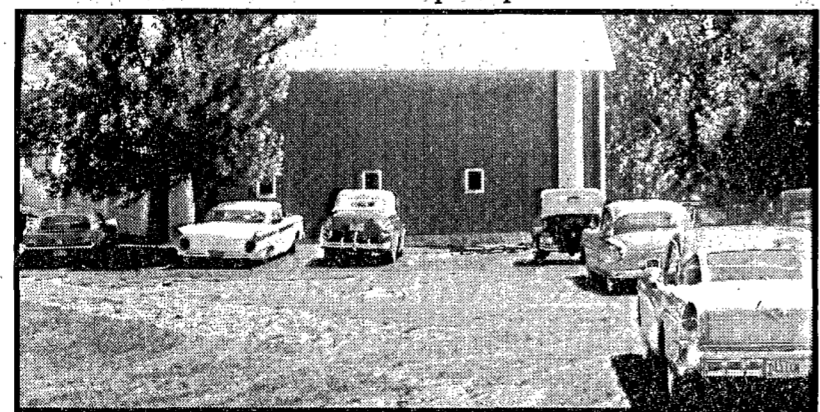

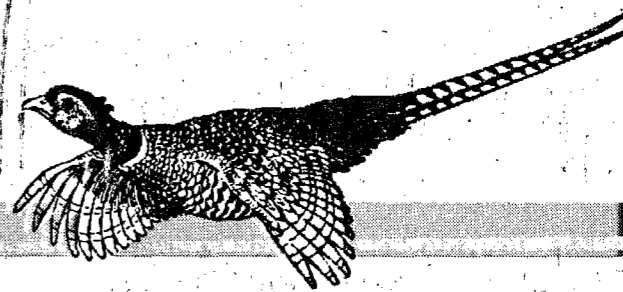

44-7 record best-ever winning percentage for Wakefield team Wakefield Juniors hold off Crofton for state title

Fueled by the big inning throughout the tournament, the Wakefield Juniors used a seven-run third inning to help fend off Crofton 12-9 in Tuesday evening's championship game of the Class C State American Legion Junior Baseball Tournament in Creighton.

Even with the big inning, Wakefield had to hold off a late Crofton rally, watching a 10-3 lead evaporate to a 10-8 lead entering the seventh inning.

But Wakefield plated two runs in the top of the seventh for added insurance and got a game-ending double play grounder to shortstop Tanner Soderberg to secure another state championship for the area's most storied baseball program.

"You have to give Crofton a lot of credit," stated coach Paul Eaton after the game. "They kept battling and played awfully well." Eaton added that the big inning and clutch defense "saved us" in the championship game.

"I'm really happy for the kids. They have worked hard for this and they deserve it," said Eaton. Crofton held a 2-0 lead until Wakefield erupted for seven runs in the third inning, sending 13 batters to the plate. The big hit in the inning was a two-run double by Kyle Gardner.

Wakefield used a three-run sixth inning to take what looked like a commanding 10-3 lead, but Crofton responded with four runs to cut the margin to 10-8.

In the top of the seventh, Taylor Peters delivered a bases-loaded single to make the score 11-8, then Kyle Gardner's sacrifice fly brought in another run to give Wakefield a 12-8 lead. Crofton would score one run in the bottom of the seventh, but a ground ball to shortstop Tanner Soderberg allowed him to complete a double play to first and end the game.

Wakefield's 14-hit attack was paced by Aaron Klein, who had a double and three singles. Gardner and Max Greve each con-

tributed a double and single. Tanner Soderberg and Yancey Sherer chipped in with two singles each with Peters and Jim Bierbower each producing one single.

Max Greve was the winning pitcher, tossing a complete game to earn the win.

It was the fourth state title for the Wakefield Junior program to go with two runner-up finishes. Overall, it is the 14th state title for Wakefield baseball and the ninth state crown since 1990.

The 44-7 record by this year's team is the best winning percentage of any team in Wakefield baseball history. The 44 wins is the second highest in team history, trailing only the 1996 Senior team that won the state title with a 47-19 record.

Wakefield opened the tournament with a 10-0 win over Creighton in five innings on Friday.

Taylor Peters and Aaron Klein combined on a no-hitter for Wakefield. Peters worked four innings with Klein pitching the fifth.

An eight-run third inning for Wakefield, keyed by several Creighton errors and walks, broke open a close game early.

Wakefield had nine hits in the game, led by Max Greve's three singles. He also scored three times. Peters added two singles, Tanner Soderberg had two hits and scored two runs with Eric Husen and Matt Henderson each adding a single.

After a slow start, Wakefield scored nine runs in the final three innings to topple Dwight in Saturday's winner bracket semifinal game 9-1. Wakefield scored two runs in the fifth, five in the sixth and two more in the seventh.

Greve pitched a complete game to earn the win, allowing just one run on four hits with four strikeouts and three walks.

Kyle Gardner's three hits (double and two singles) led Wakefield at the plate. Husen chipped in with a two-run homer and a double, Klein produced a double and single with Yancey Sherer and Jim Bierbower each accounting for a single.

In Sunday's winner bracket final

against Crofton, Wakefield overcame an early 2-0 deficit and scored plenty of runs late in the game to record an 8-3 win.

After scoring two runs in the fourth to tie the game at 2-2, Wakefield plated three runs in the fifth and sixth innings to take command of the game.

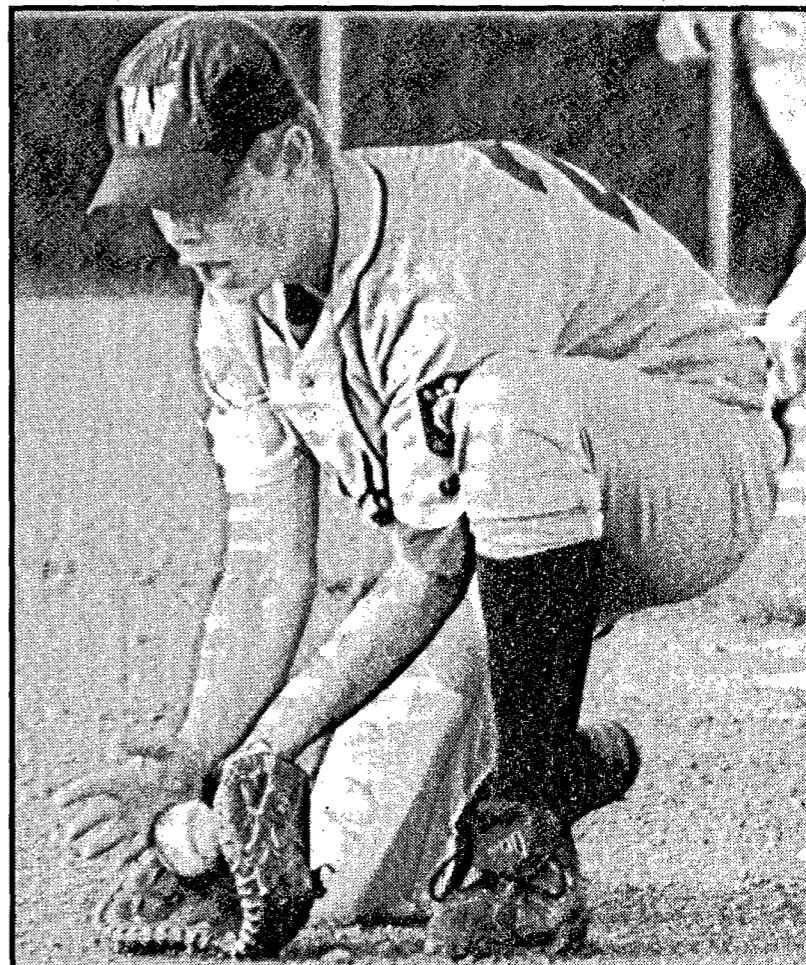
Gardner was the winning pitcher, tossing a complete game with nine strikeouts. He allowed seven hits and three runs.

Offensively, Klein's double and single led a balanced, nine-hit attack. Gardner and Sherer each had two singles; Soderberg had a double with Luke Henderson and Greve adding a single apiece.

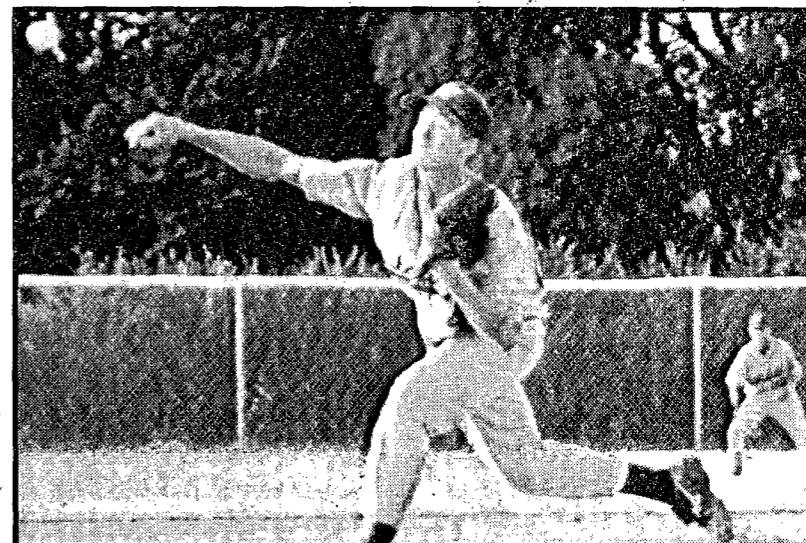
A five-run, fifth inning helped Wakefield take care of Fullerton Monday evening by a 10-2 score.

Peters pitched five innings of scoreless relief, replacing starter Aaron Klein in the third inning, to pick up the win.

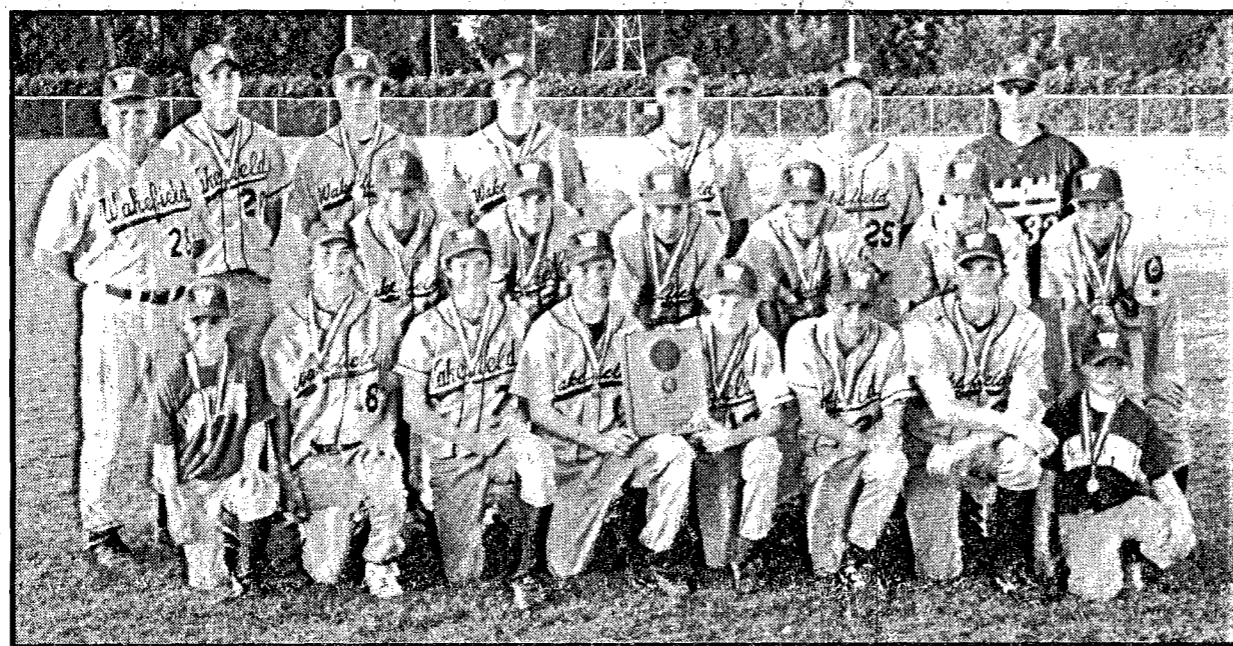

Wakefield Seniors win two games at state

Two familiar foes handed the Wakefield Seniors losses at the Class C State American Legion Baseball Tournament this week in Pender.

Palmer-Wolbach-Greeley used two outstanding defensive plays from centerfielder Tyler Walkowiak to preserve a 4-3 win over Wakefield in the winner's bracket final Sunday evening.

Pender, who lost to the defending state champions from Wakefield in four previous meetings this season, used a two-out, two-run homer from Jeff Stansberry in the bottom of the seventh inning to eliminate Wakefield 5-3 Monday evening at David Nitzsche Memorial Field.

Veteran Wakefield coach Paul Eaton said his club lost to two pretty good teams.

"Both teams made some nice plays and we just didn't get hits when we needed them the most."

Eaton added he is pleased with the team's 37-10 season record.

"I think it's a good accomplishment. Being in a tough area, our goal was to make it back to state and we did. We lost to the last two teams remaining at state."

Wakefield opened the tournament Friday afternoon with a 3-0 win against Overton.

Joe Brown, who tossed over 20 scoreless innings at last year's state tournament, opened this year's event with a no-hitter. Brown, who struck four and hit one batter, received excellent defensive help in posting the no-hit gem.

Offensively, Wakefield scored two runs in the first inning to grab the early edge and added an insurance run in the seventh. Josh Soderberg's suicide squeeze bunt scored Marc Manganaro with the first run of the game, then Scott Blohm followed with a run-scoring double to bring in Soderberg. Manganaro's solo home run over the left field fence in the seventh inning produced the game's final run.

Wakefield had six hits in the game, led by Soderberg's double

and two singles. Manganaro followed with a home run and single with Blohm adding a double.

Saturday, Jeff Banholzer's arm and bat carried Wakefield to a 7-3 win over Prague.

Banholzer pitched five strong innings to earn the win on the mound and he had four hits at the plate, including a two-run homer in the seventh inning and a run-scoring single in the third.

Following Banholzer's four hits, Manganaro added a triple with Soderberg, Blohm and Aaron Lueth each producing a single.

Sunday's game with Wakefield and Palmer-Wolbach-Greeley was similar to previous battles between the two teams at state, featuring great defensive play and pitching.

P-W-G grabbed an early 3-0 lead entering the bottom of the third, but an Aaron Lueth RBI single cut the lead down to 3-1. Wakefield evened the game in the fourth by plating two runs. The big hit in the inning was a Kyle Beacom RBI single that scored Manganaro, who reached on a double.

But P-W-G regained the lead in the fifth by scoring one run, then

used clutch defensive plays down the stretch to hold off Wakefield for the win.

Wakefield had twice as many hits in the game compared to P-W-G, 6-3. Manganaro had a double with Soderberg, Luke Hoffman, Blohm, Beacom and Lueth each adding singles. Soderberg was the losing pitcher.

A fired-up Pender team awaited Wakefield in an elimination game Monday evening.

The hosts scored three runs in the bottom of the first to take an early 3-0 lead, but Wakefield fought back with three runs in the third to tie the game at 3-3. Beacom's run-scoring double was the only hit of the inning. The other two runs scored on wild pitches.

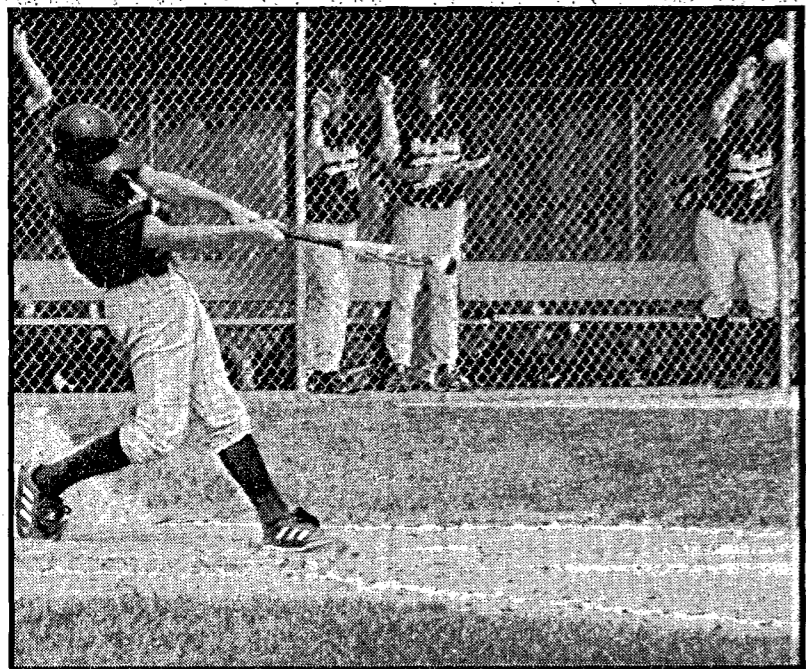
The game remained tied until Stansberry's heroics in the bottom of the seventh inning, giving Pender the dramatic victory.

Wakefield had only two hits in the game, Beacom's double and a single by Soderberg.

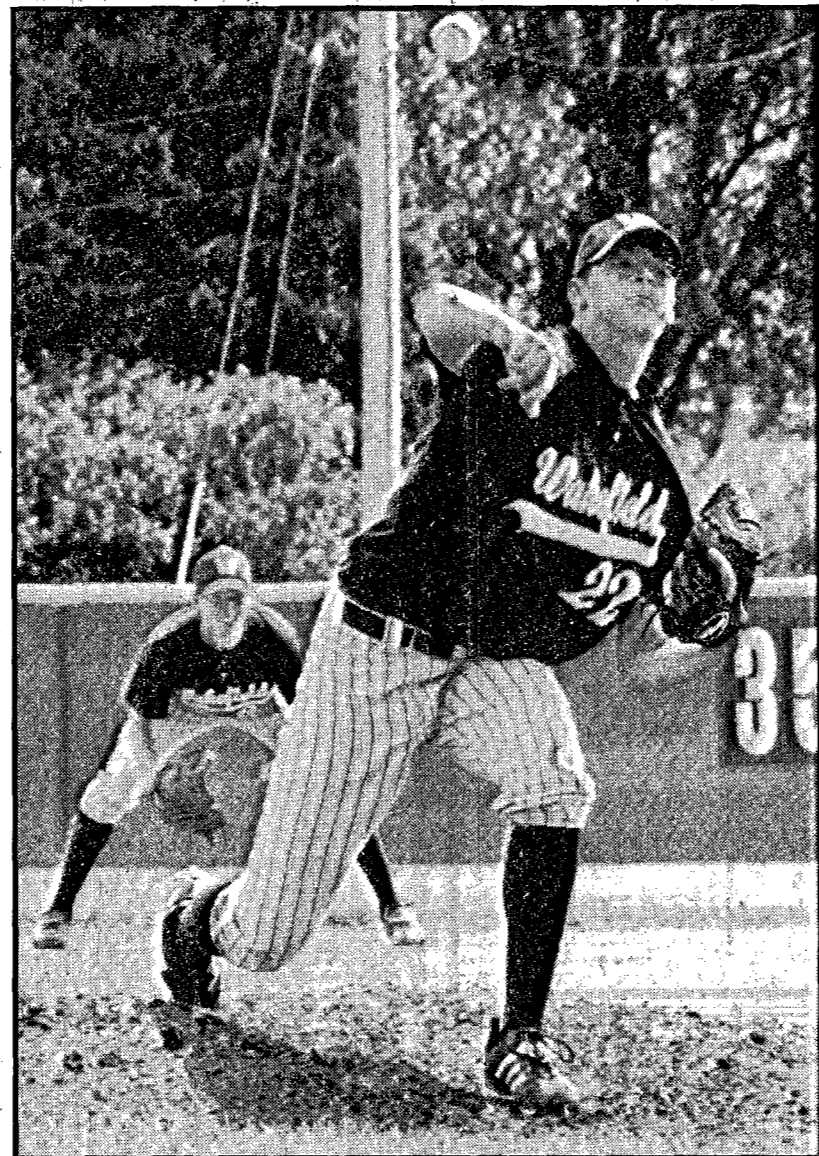

Wakefield ended the state tournament with a 2-2 record and an overall mark of 37-10.

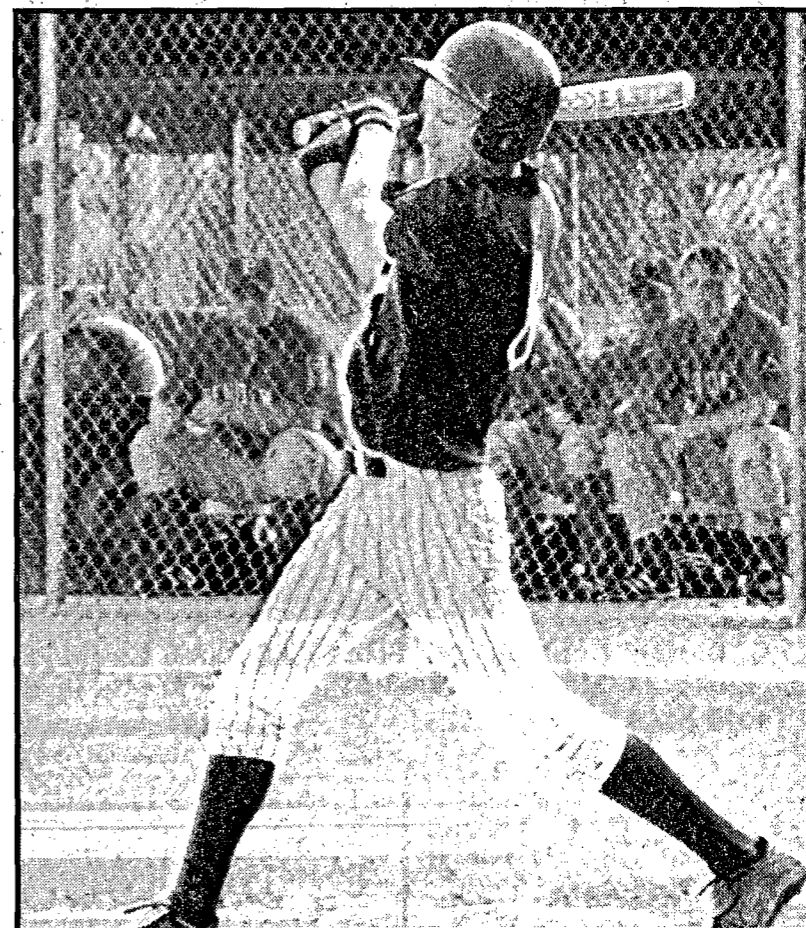

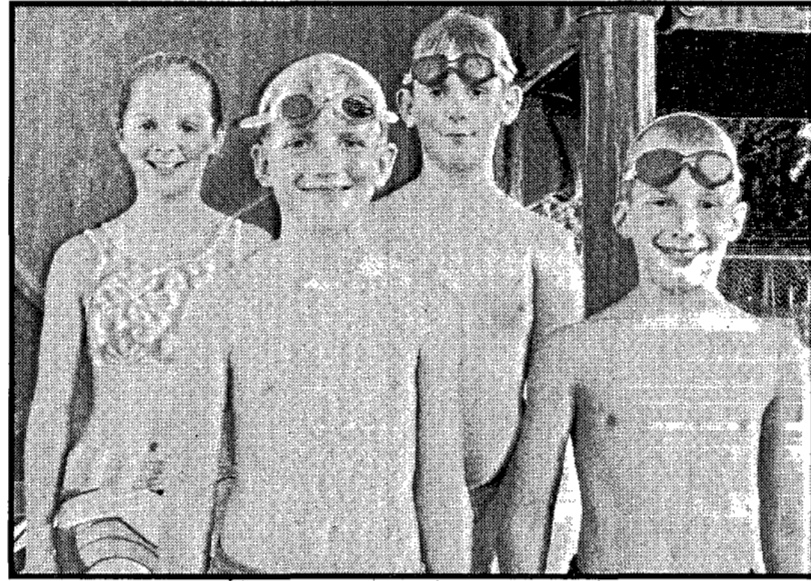

Hoffman and McGuire were the only two players to play in all 36 games this season.

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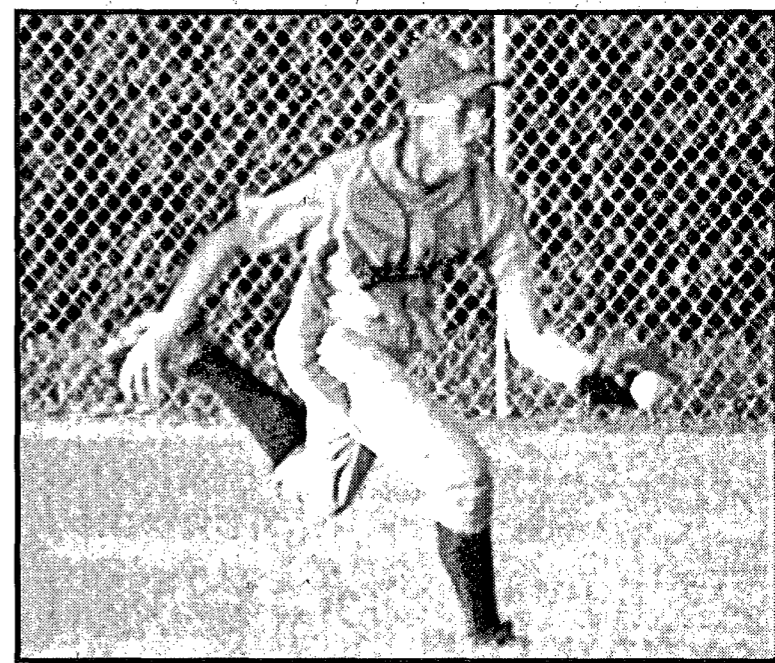
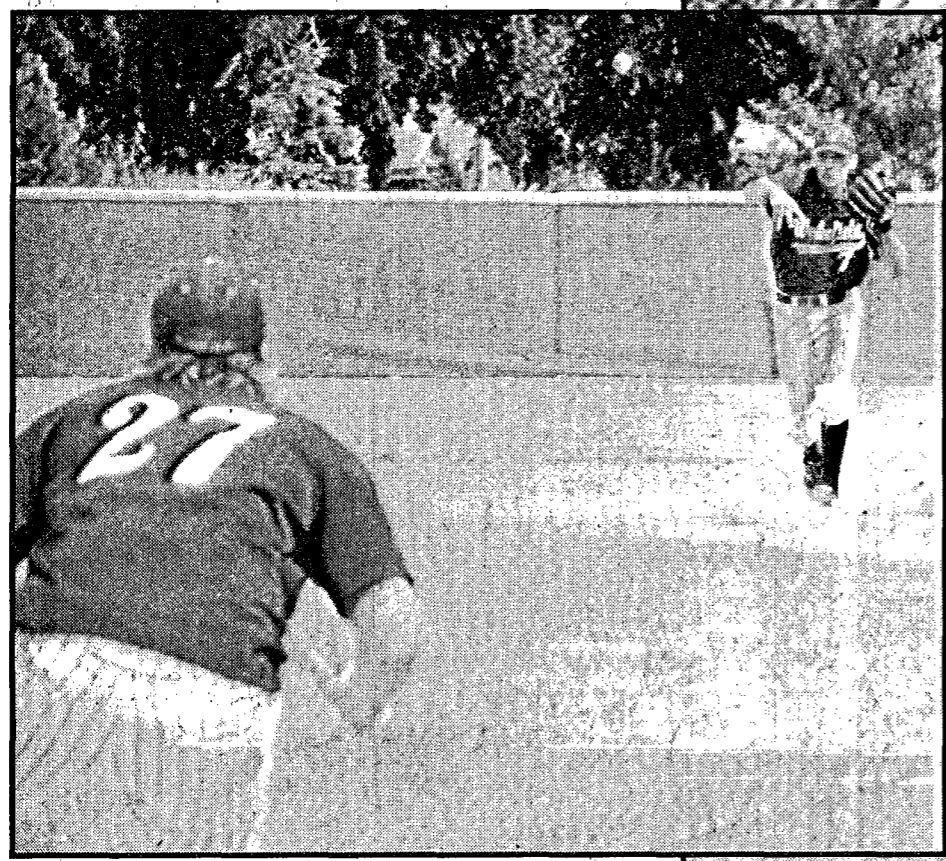
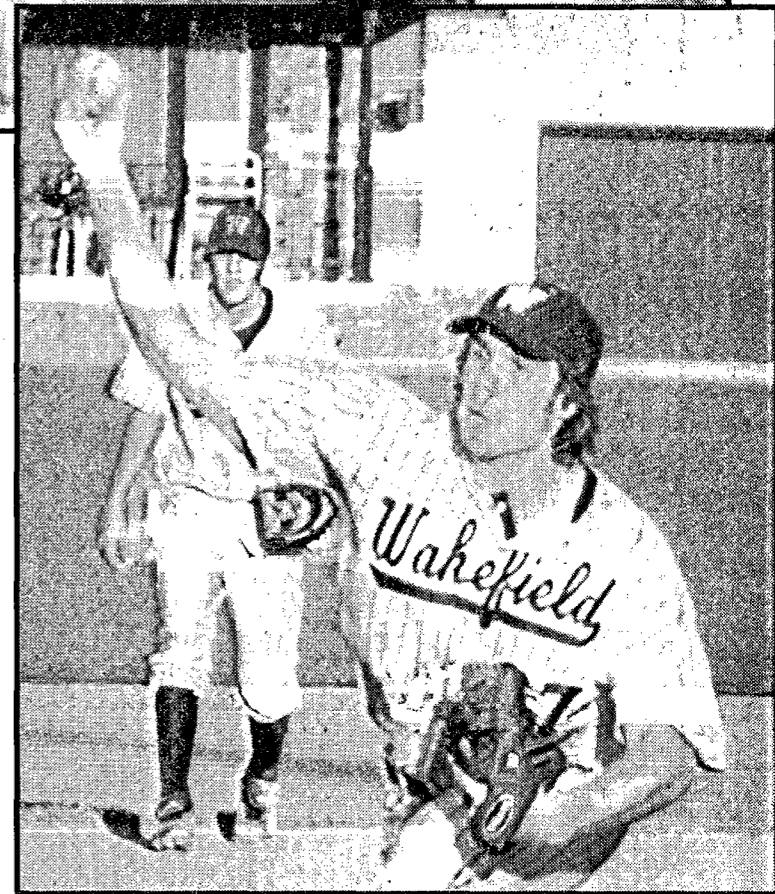
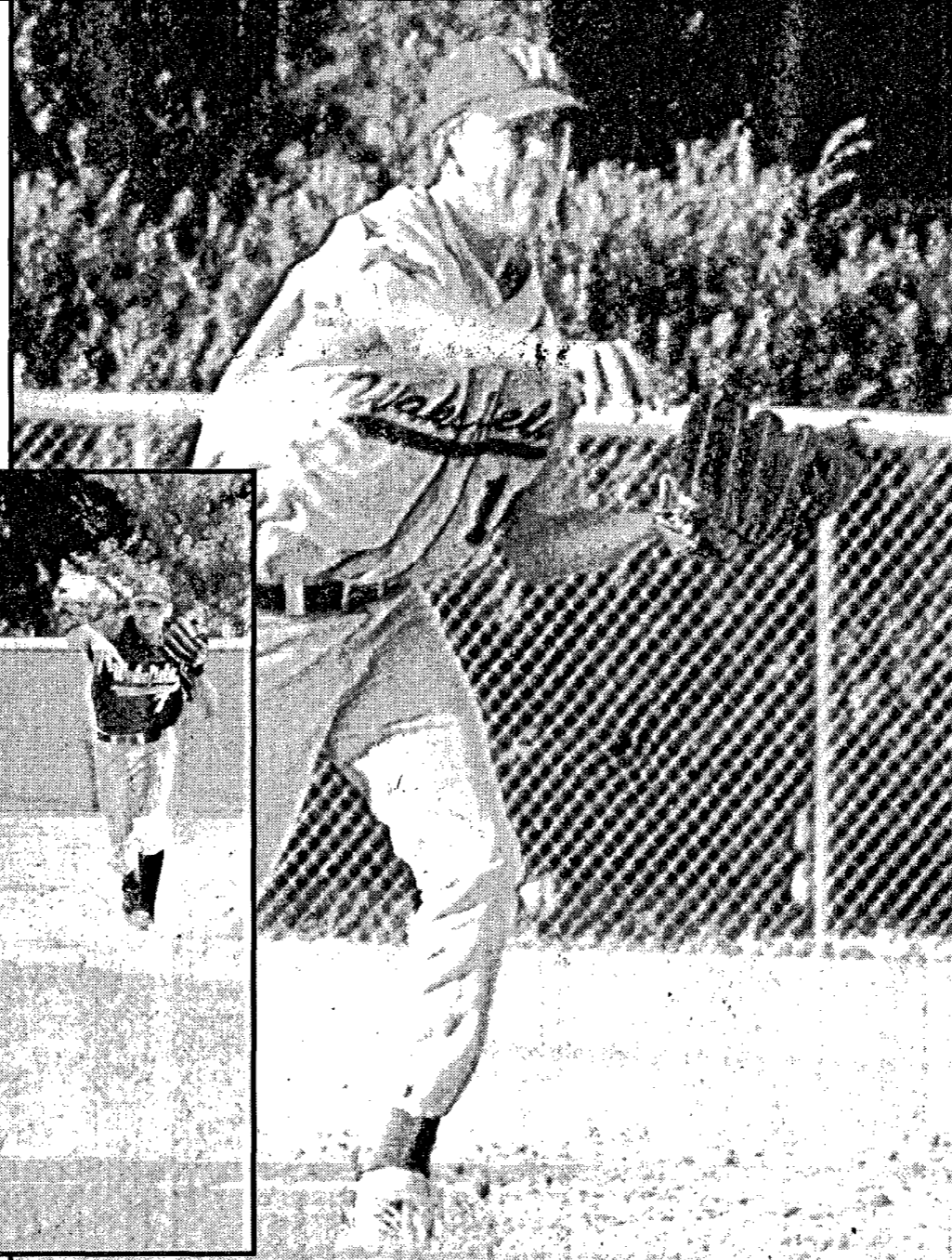
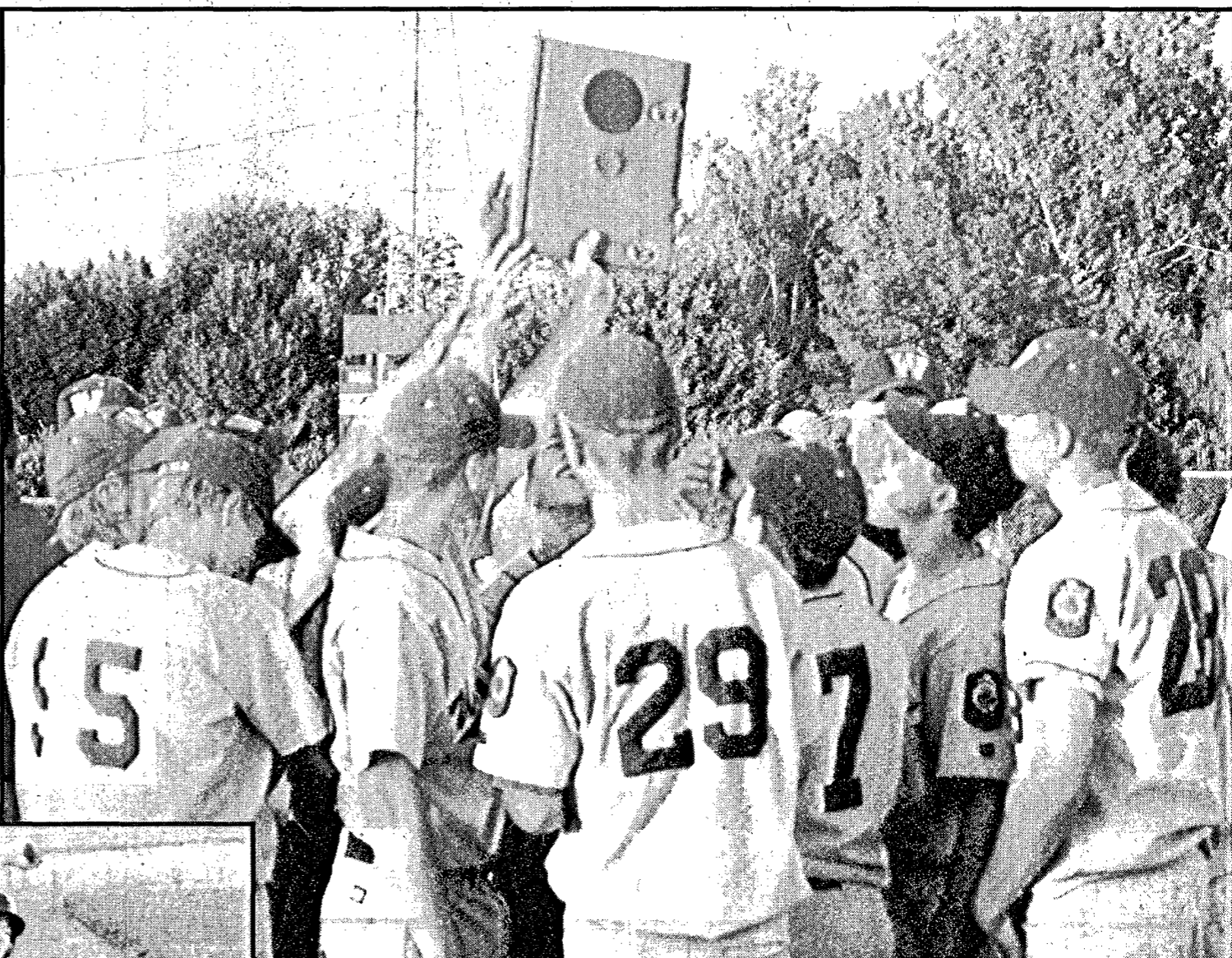
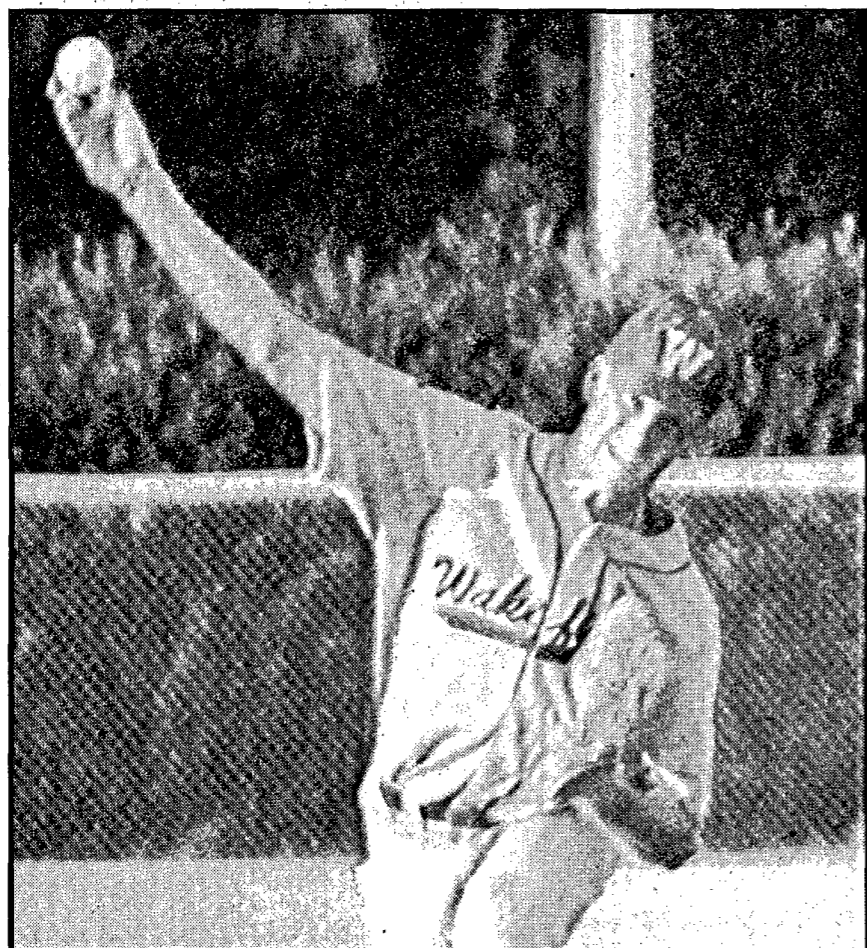
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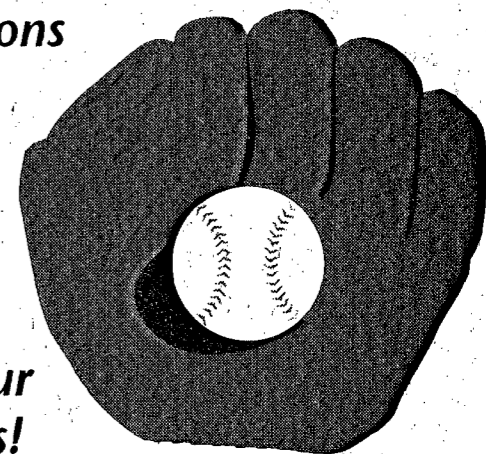
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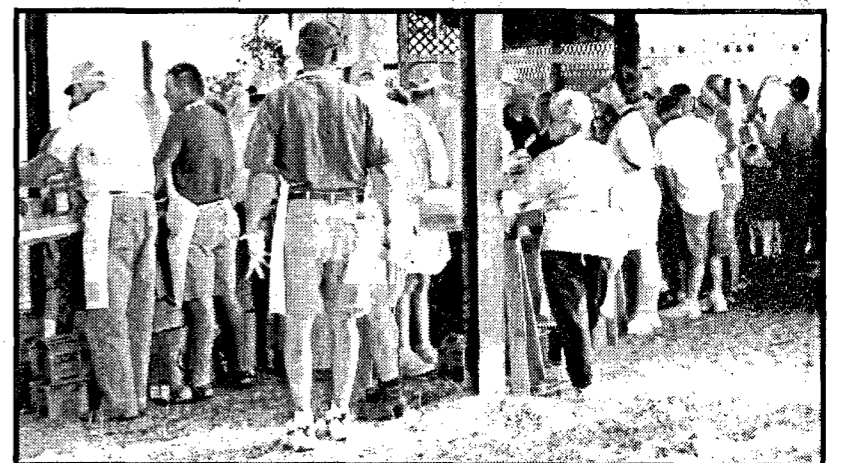
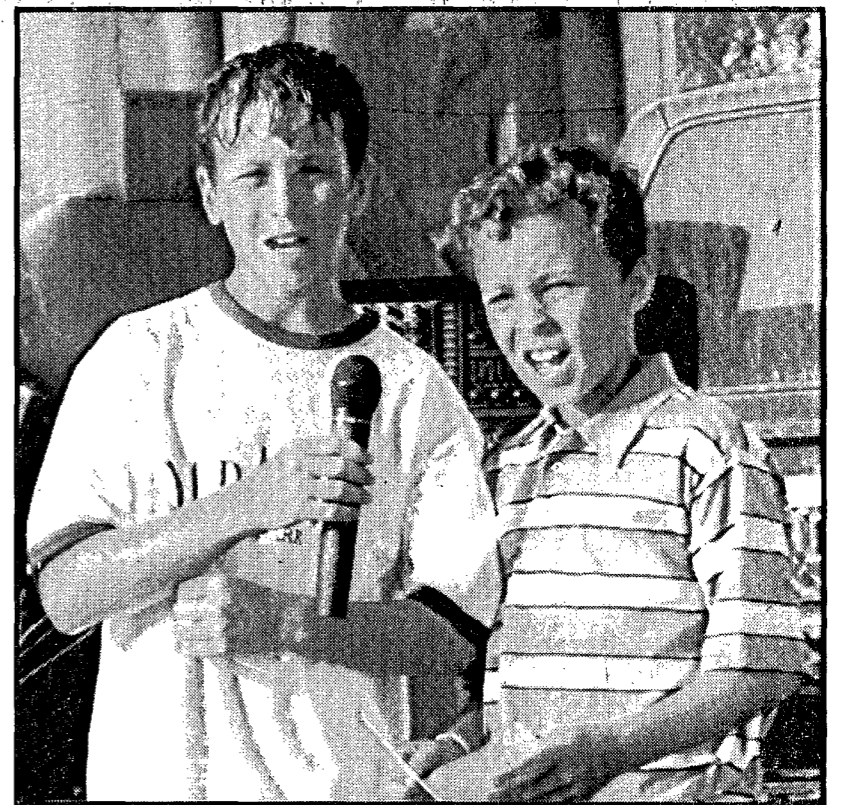
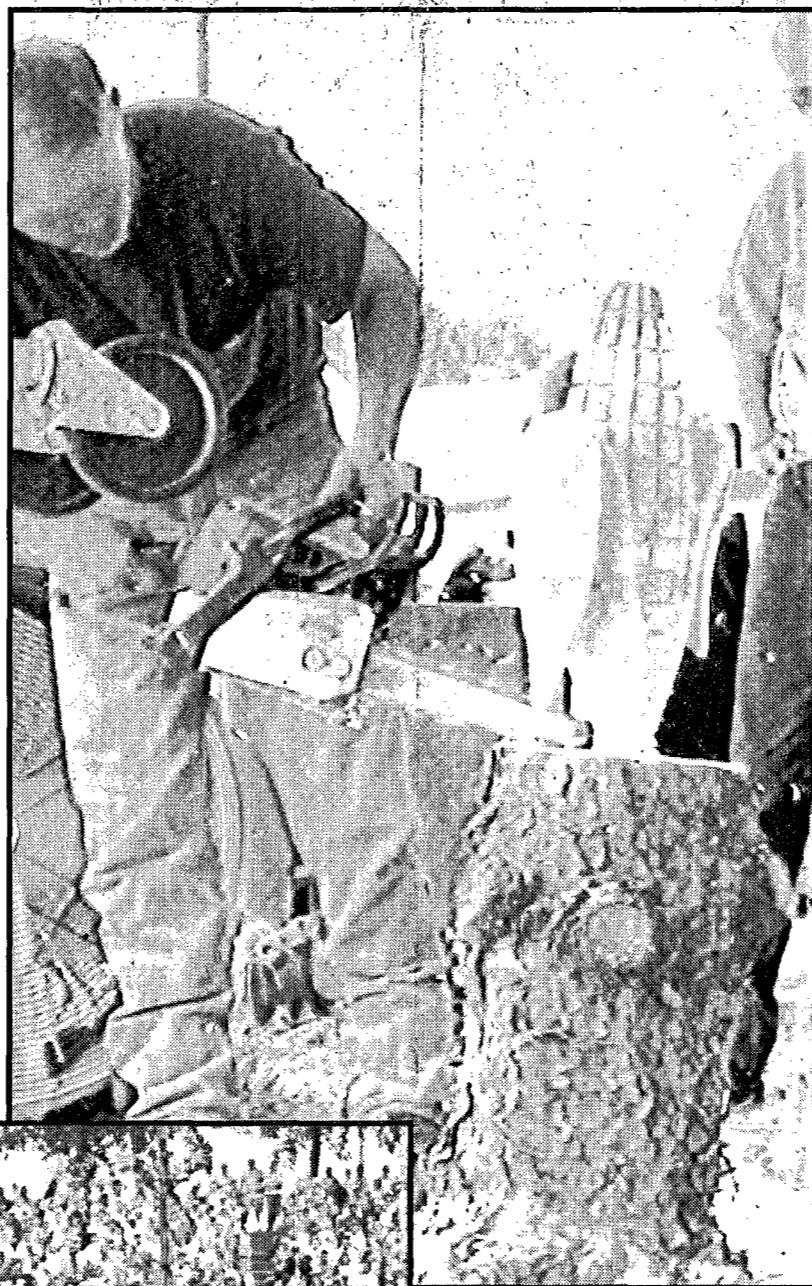
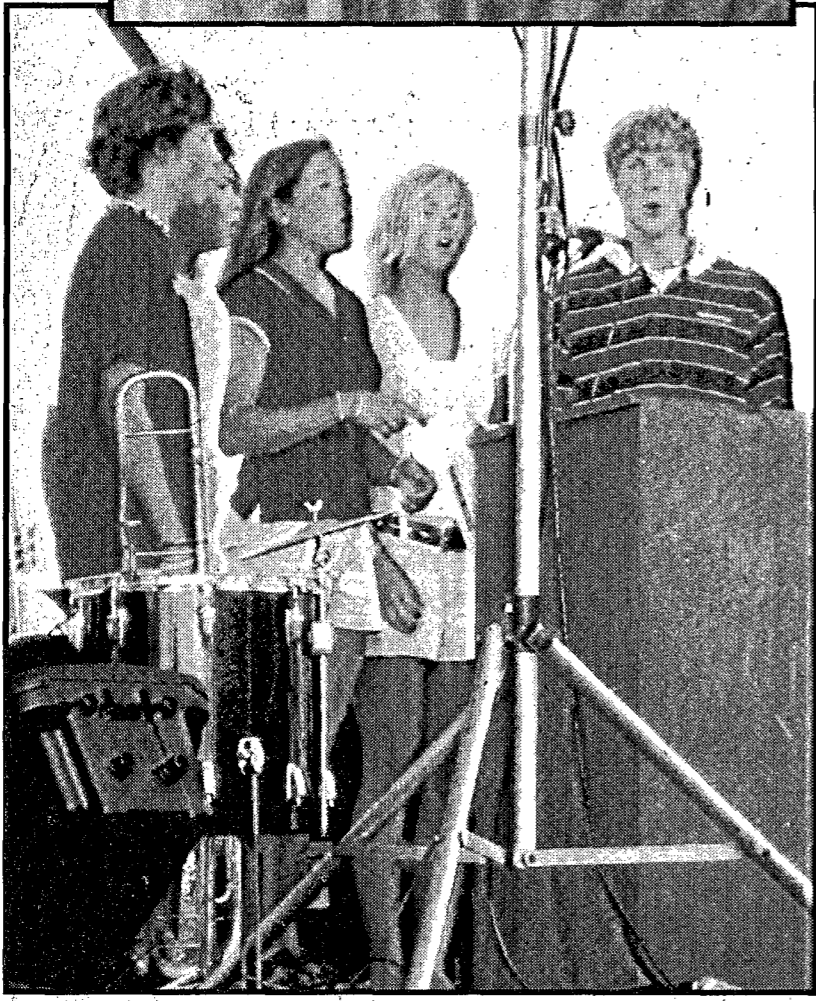
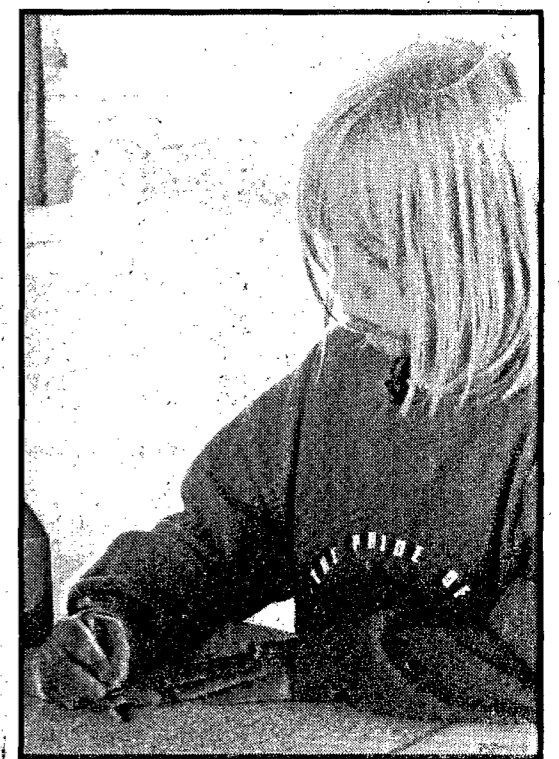
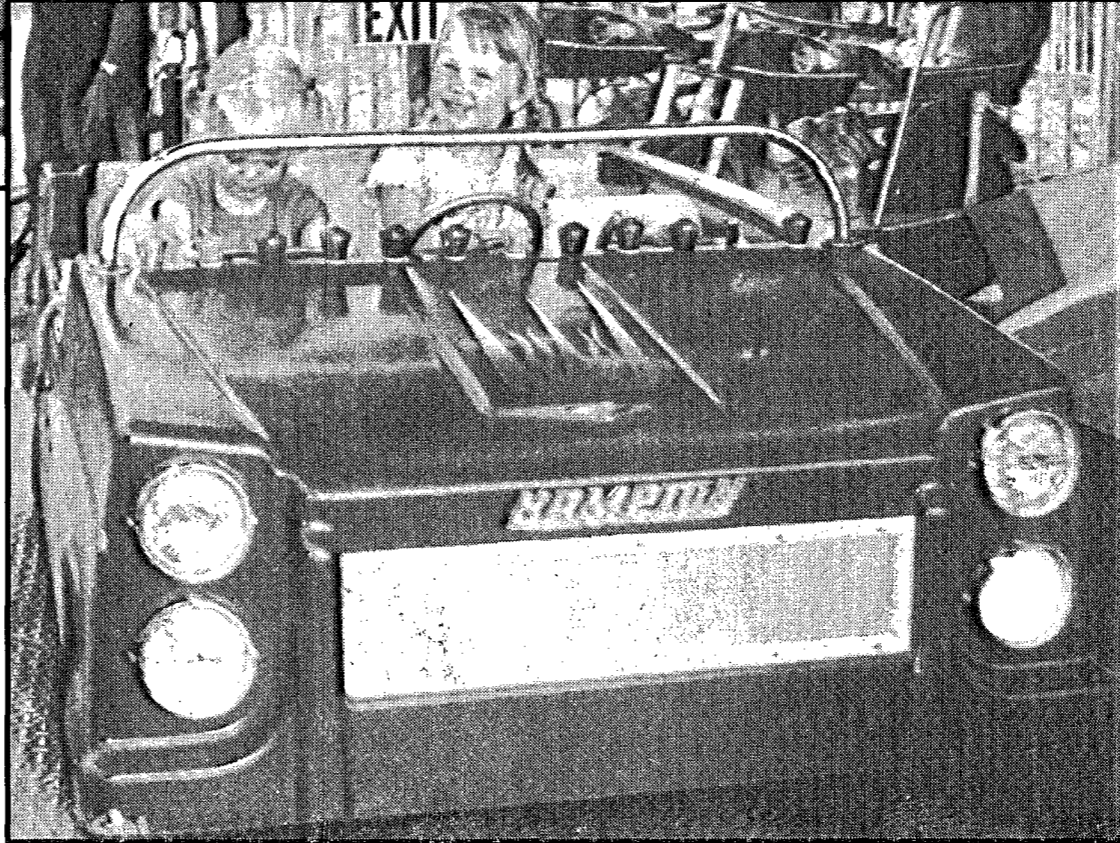
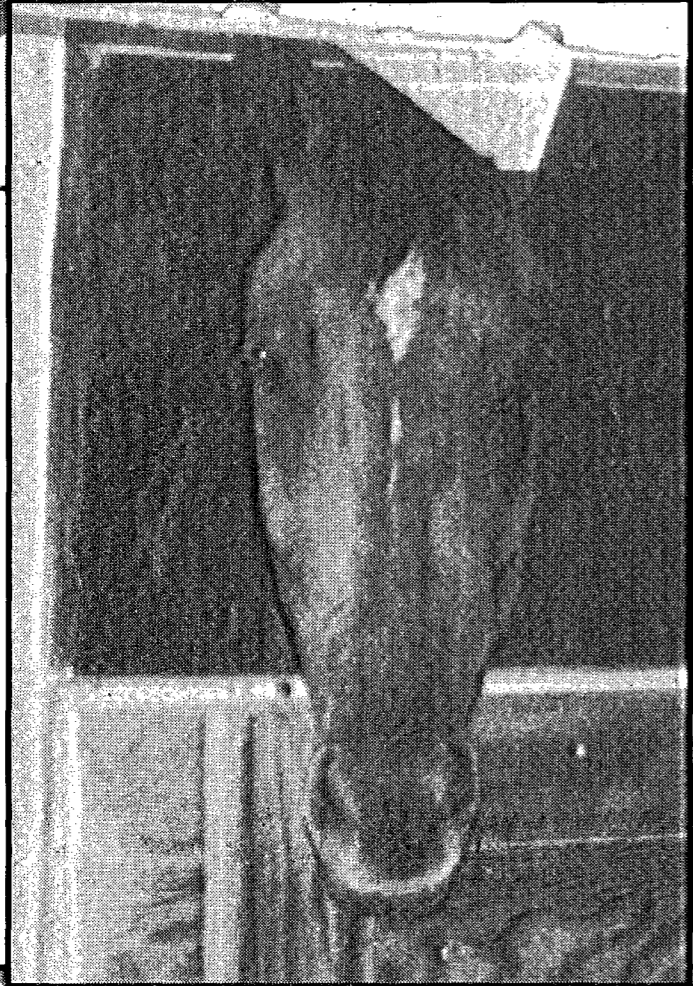
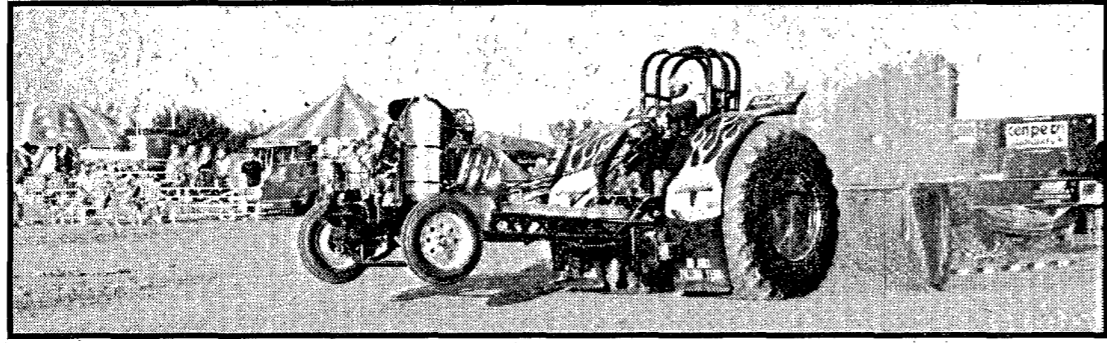
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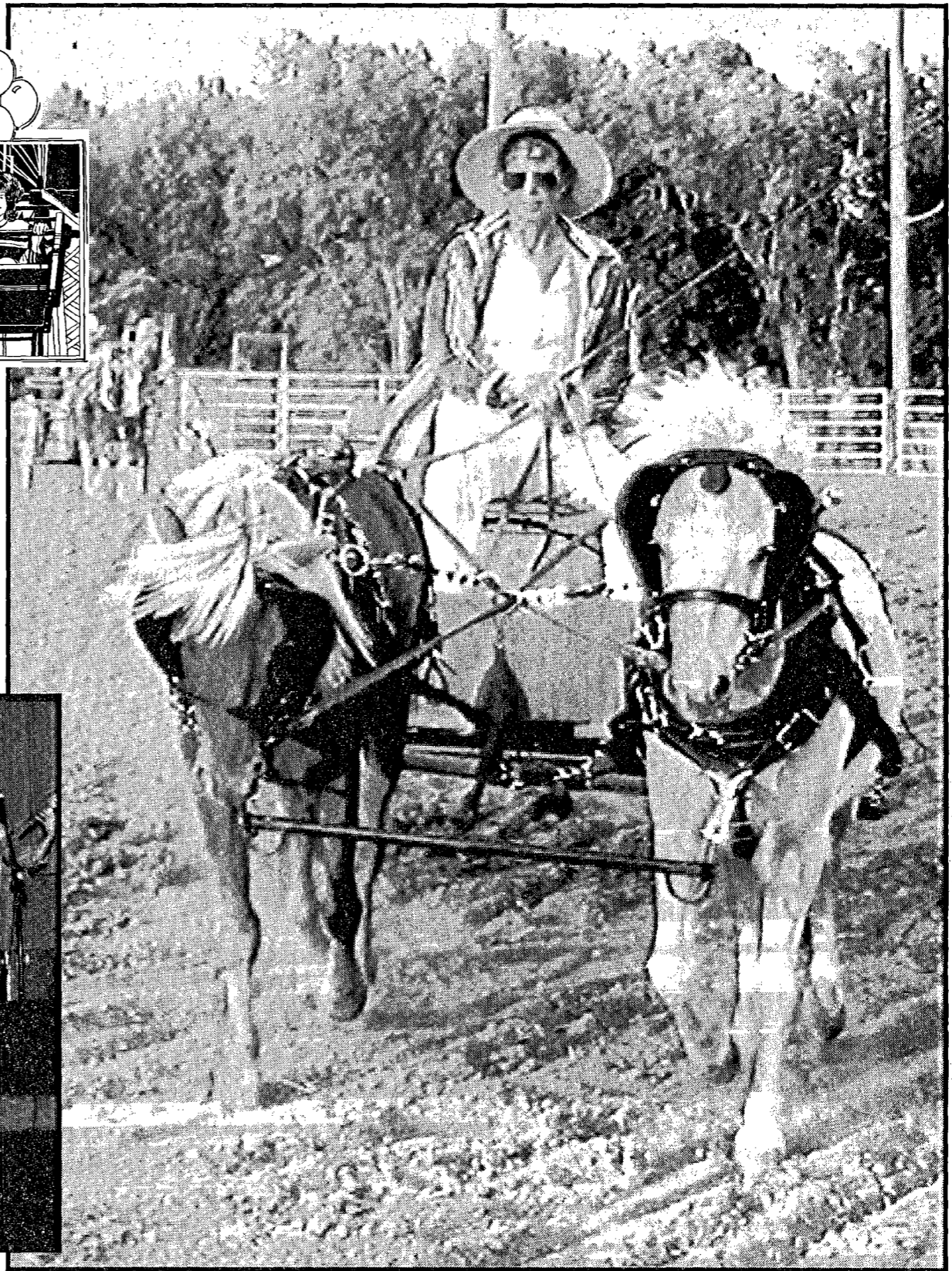
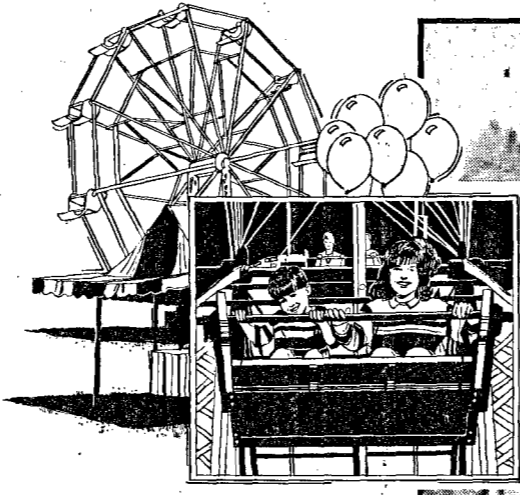
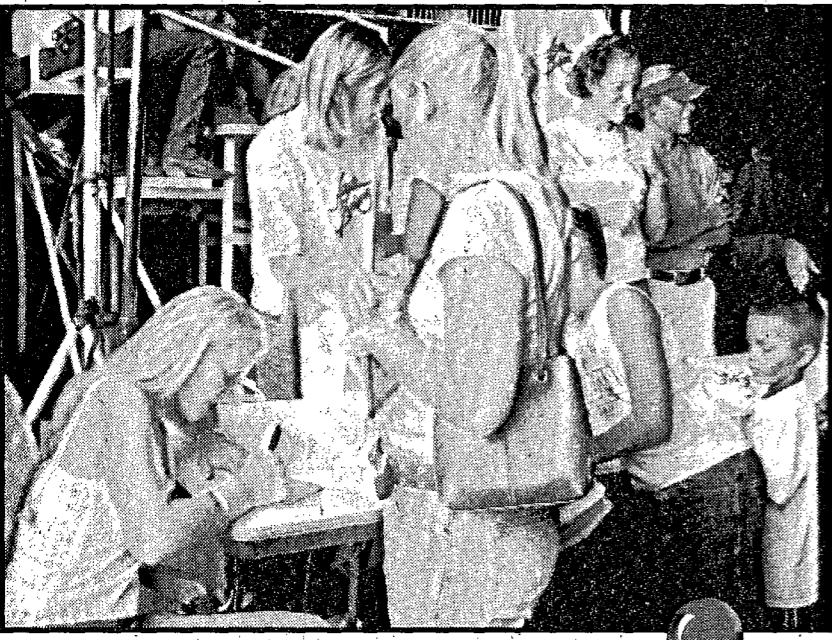

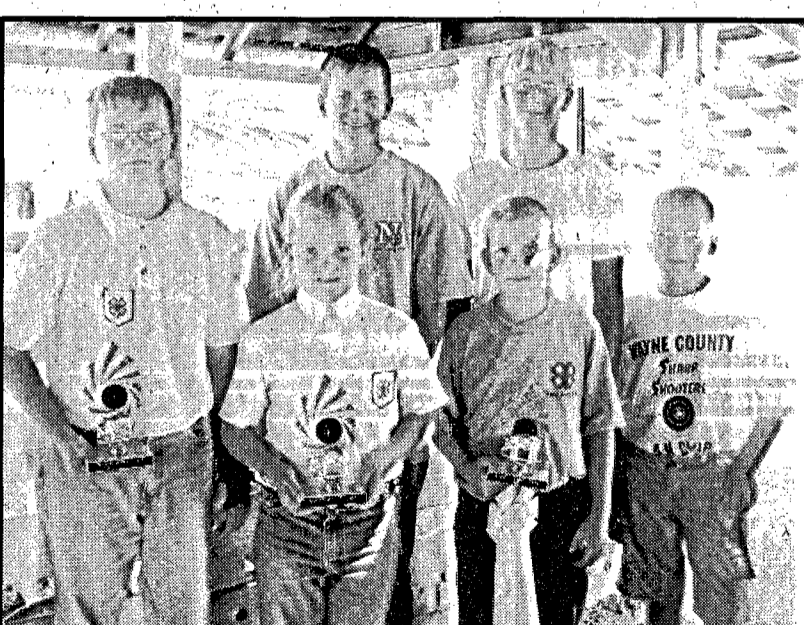

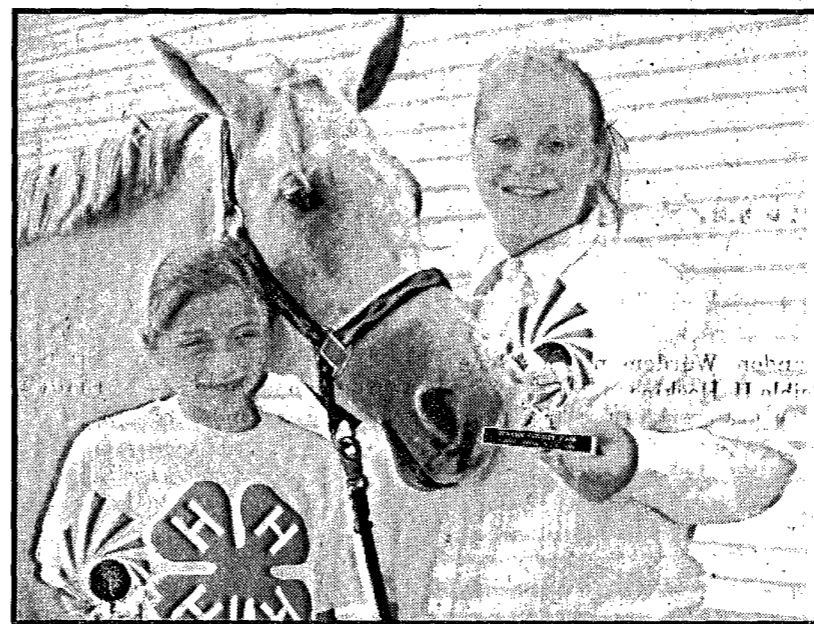

Help teens practice skills

Today's youth are put in situations where they must make important, often split-second decisions.

Some of these decisions include things such as cigarette or alcohol use, breaking laws or whether to join in activities that are hurtful to others. Parents and other adults hope teens won't hesitate to do the right thing.

The best way to prepare teens to make good, healthy decisions is to give them chances to practice under adult guidance. Teens won't always make the choices parents want them to, but when families make a habit of openly discussing tough issues, teens are more likely to think before they act.

Start by giving teens responsibility for making choices on matters involving little or no risk, such as how to style their hair or hobbies.

As youth grow, they're capable of taking responsibility for more important decisions. Even pre-teens will benefit from the experience of working through some tough decisions on their own. Parents should step in if a decision involves serious risk, but otherwise it's important to let youth take responsibility and experience the consequences, both good and bad.

Parents can work through the following activity to decide, if

they're giving their kids too much responsibility or freedom before they're ready for it:

*Make a list of some tough choices kids may face in the future.

*Decide how capable kids are of making a smart decision. Choices could be almost always, usually, sometimes, occasionally or almost never.

*List decisions kids are currently responsible for making on their own, such as bedtime, after-school activities or how to spend allowance money.

*List decisions kids already make, such as curfews or dating and driving privileges.

*Decide which decisions, such as dating, drug use or college plans, should be discussed.

*Decide which future decisions need to be discussed, such as how to spend money or set a curfew.

Make a plan to do this including time to explain the reasoning for decisions, asking youth for input, considering the changing needs of youth, adjusting rules as your teen matures and turning over responsibility to youth.

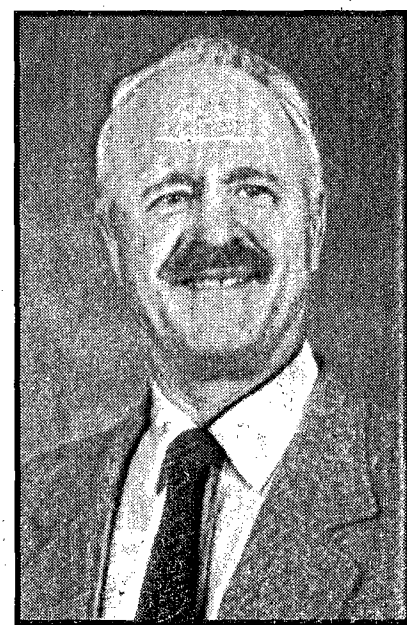

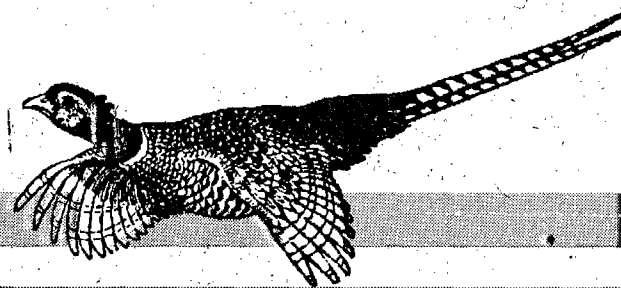

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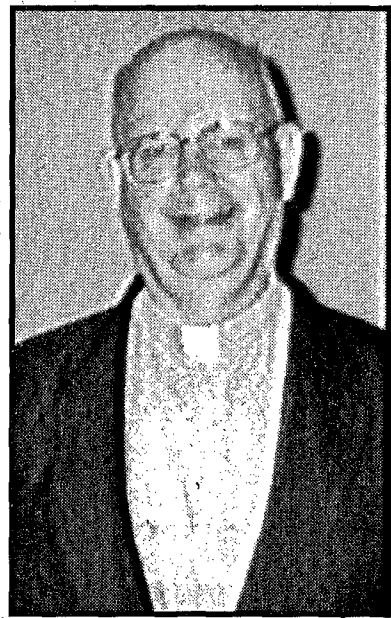

"The best beach bunny and the most talented sandman will receive their fitting rewards," she added.

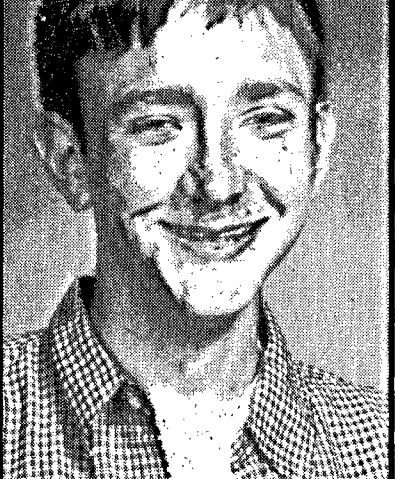
Local celebrities will be involved in a dunk tank and bingo will be available.

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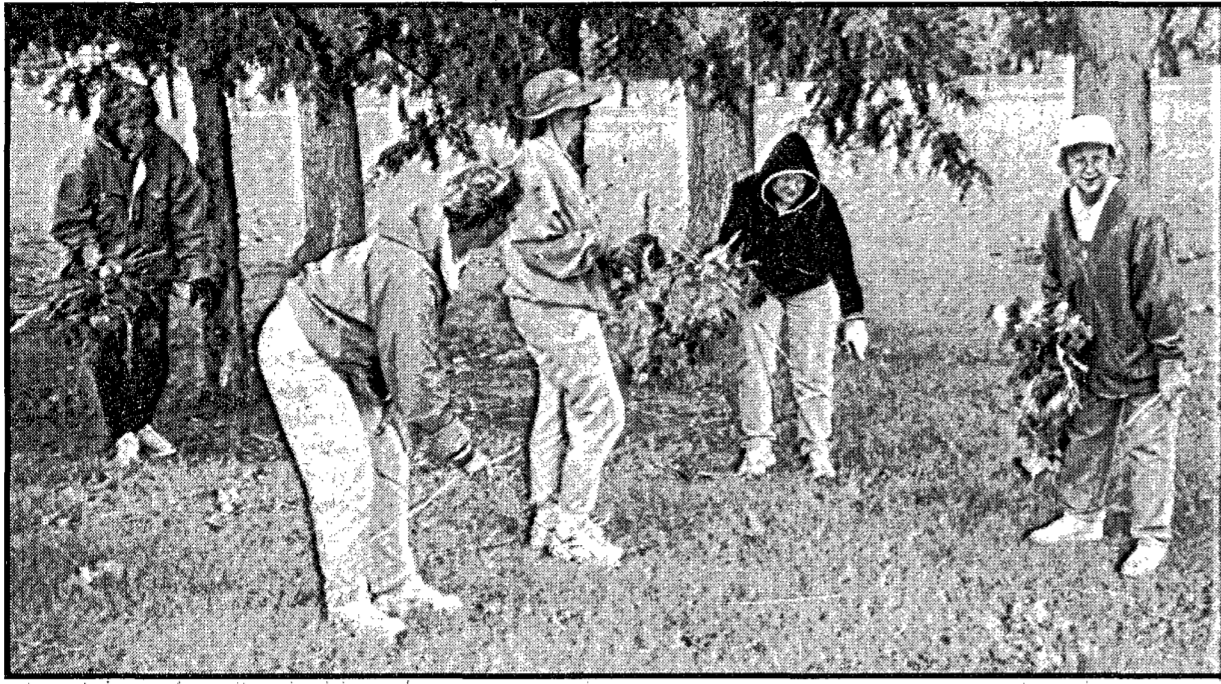
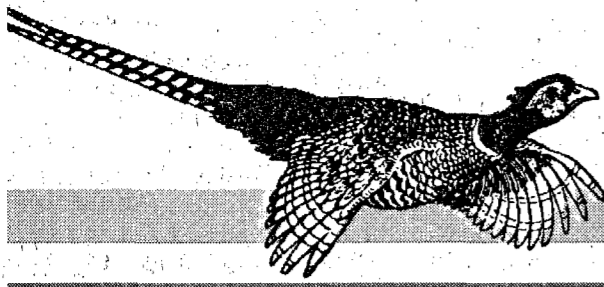

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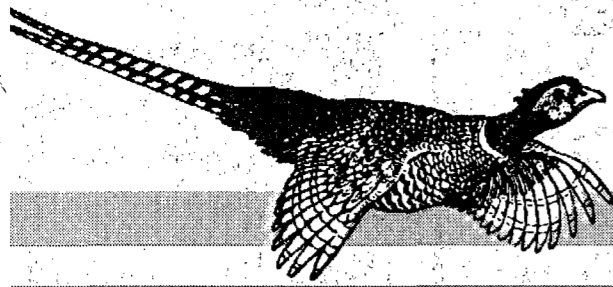

Farm Service Agency (FSA) Wayne County Office has announced that family farmers in Cedar, Douglas, Greeley, Howard, Jefferson, McPherson, Perkins, Platte, Stanton and Thayer counties who suffered physical or production losses due to severe storms and tornadoes that occurred from June 9, 2003

through July 14, 2003 may be eligible for Farm Service Agency (FSA) Emergency (EM) loans.

Arthur, Boone, Buffalo, Butler, Chase, Clay, Colfax, Cuming, Deuel, Dixon, Dodge, Fillmore, Gage, Hall, Hayes, Hooker, Keith, Knox, Lincoln, Logan, Madison, Merrick, Nance, Nuckolls, Pierce, Polk, Saline, Sarpy, Saunders,

Sherman, Thomas, Valley, Washington, Wayne and Wheeler counties also became eligible because they are contiguous to one or more of the designated counties.

Family farmers interested in finding out if they are eligible should contact either Daryl McGhee, County Executive Director (CED) Dixon County; Debra Pieper, Wayne and Stanton County CED or Mark Moser, Wayne County Farm Loan Manager for information. They can be reached Monday through Friday between 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. at (402) 755-2277 (Ponca); (402) 375-2553 (Wayne) or (402) 439-2166 (Stanton).

Emergency loan applications are available and must be submitted through the local FSA county office from any applicant who qualifies for a physical or production loss (at least a 30 percent reduction from normal) in a single enterprise from this disaster in these 45 counties.

To qualify for an EM loan, an applicant must be an established family farm operator; provide evidence of having suffered a qualifying physical or production loss; be unable to obtain suitable credit from a source other than FSA.

The low interest loans may cover up to 100 percent of their actual production losses, to a maximum amount of \$500,000. The applicants must show ability to repay the loan and must be adequately secured. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock or to refinance certain debts. The current interest rate for the EM loans is 3.75 percent. The Designation number is M1480.

The deadline for submitting an application is March 22, 2004. Applicants for all FSA programs will be given equal consideration without regard to race, color, sex, creed, marital status or national origin.

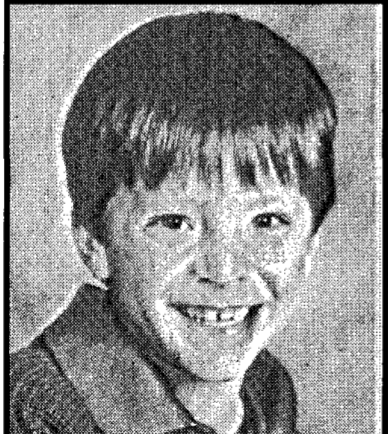
His parents and his uncle Jonnie raise cattle and sell registered bulls.

This year Local Administrative Area (LAA3) is up for election. LAA3, to the office's knowledge, has 718 eligible voters and consists of Chapin, Garfield, Hancock and Hoskins Townships. LAA1 consists of Deer Creek, Sherman, Strahan and Wilbur Townships. LAA2 consists of Brenna, Hunter, Leslie, Logan and Plum Creek Townships.

Nomination petitions for eligible voters in LAA3 are available at the

local FSA office. A petition signed by the nominee and the preparer is needed to nominate a farmer-candidate for the Committee. A statement must also be included indicating the candidate has agreed to serve if elected. A list of eligible voters is also available in the office. applicant must be an established family farm operator; provide evidence of having suffered a qualifying physical loss; be unable to obtain suitable credit from a source other than FSA. The damaged or destroyed physical property must be essential to the successful operation of the farm to qualify for an EM loan.

FSA loans covering actual physical losses may be used to repair

equipment, repair or replace buildings (including homes) or replace livestock, lost through disaster. The current interest rate for the EM loans is 3.75 percent.

The deadline for submitting an application is March 11, 2004. Applicants for all FSA programs will be given equal consideration without regard to race, color, sex, creed, marital status or national origin.

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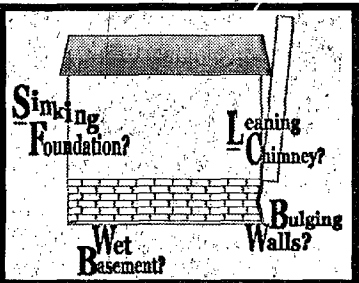

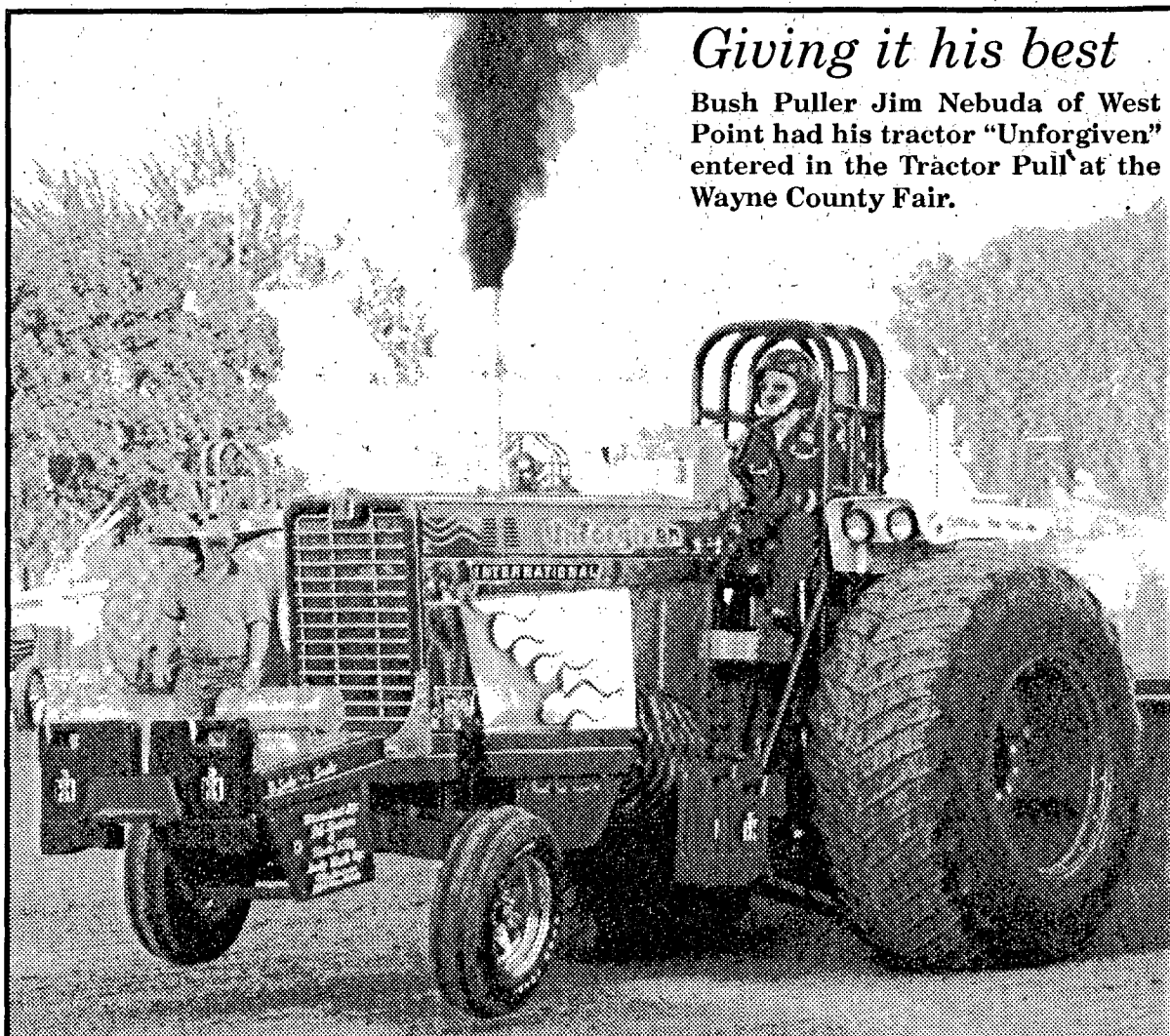

The Principal's Office

Information from the Wayne High School Student Handbook - #5

Attendance policy

Attendance is attending all classes every day. The principal will determine excused and unexcused absences. Each student must bring a signed note from parent/guardian to be readmitted to class. Pre-make-up slips must be used for all anticipated absences. Parents will be contacted after eight non-school related absences per semester.

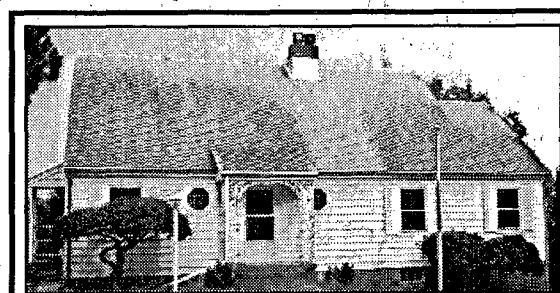
Students must appeal for credit after having more than 10 non-school related absences per semester. An appeal for credit form must be obtained from the office. The student appeals to the Appeal for Credit Committee. The committee is made up of department chairs. Students will have three to four minutes explain why they missed school. This committee and each student's teachers will decide if credit is granted or denied.

Some students who have accumulated more than 10 days of absence may remove some days by reporting five consecutive days after school for one hour each day or reporting to school Saturday morning from 8 a.m. to noon. Students will be supervised and be expected to study during this time. All make-up time must be scheduled through the principal's office. Removal of excessive days of absence will allow the student to avoid the appeal for credit process.

Classification of Absences

When written excuses are turned into the office, the absence(s) will be classified as excused, unexcused or school-related. The excused classification has the approval of the home and school and covers absences such as illness, death in the family, religious holidays and medical appointments. Approval from home does not necessarily mean the school will approve the absence. After an excused absence, the student is responsible for completing any assignments missed, and he/she should inquire of the teacher about satisfactory arrangements for making up work missed. The student should not expect the teacher to initiate these arrangements; this is the student's responsibility. Full credit is given for work made-up satisfactorily.

An unexcused absence is defined as an absence from class or school for any portion of a period or day without proper authority from home and/or school. The standard penalty for an unexcused absence is make-up time equal to twice the amount of periods, hours or days missed due to the unexcused absence. Once a student has arrived on school premises, he/she is supposed to be in school. Leaving the school campus without permission from the central office at any time after arrival is considered an unexcused absence and will be treated as such. Examples of unexcused absences may be oversleeping, shopping trips, haircuts and unauthorized attendance at tournaments. School-related absences are absences when the student is involved in school sponsored activities. Students who participate in an extracurricular activity will not be penalized for absence caused by those activities but will be required to make up all work missed. Students will have their school-related absences certified by the coach of their sport or by their activity sponsor prior to competition.

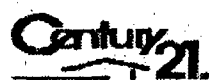

Aquila delivers franchise fee to city of Wayne

An Aquila official announced recently that the company has delivered a check for \$9,067.23 for franchise fees on gas revenues collected from April through June to the City of Wayne as required by the operating franchise agreement. In 2003, Aquila delivered more than \$27,000 in franchise fees to the city.

"Aquila is pleased to contribute to the financial health of the City of Wayne," said Scott Zaruba, field operations supervisor for Aquila. "We believe the citizens of Wayne benefit from the franchise fee payments since the result is less demand for property taxes."

The franchise fee is charged to customers based on the volumes of natural gas sold in Wayne. Payments are made quarterly and are deposited to the city's general funds to be used for services such as police and fire protection, libraries and parks and recreation.

The majority of the cities served by Aquila collect franchise fees. During 2002, Aquila paid more than \$3,868, 896 in franchise fees to the cities in Nebraska. Additionally, Aquila pays property taxes to local governmental entities and collects and pays local and state sales tax.

Aquila Networks serves approximately 1,800 customers in Wayne and 188,000 natural gas customers throughout Nebraska. The company's state headquarters is in Lincoln.

Census Bureau now updating information on nation's veterans

The nation had 24.3 million veterans as of 2001, of whom 1.6 million were women and 2.2 million had a service connected disability. Have these number increased, decreased or stayed the same since then?

The Census Bureau's monthly Current Population Survey (CPS), which began in 1942 and is the largest and longest-running household survey in the country, will yield an answer to these and other questions about the nation's military veterans.

"The survey collects information on veterans status by a variety of characteristics, such as age, sex, race, Hispanic origin, period of service, labor force status and disability status," said Susan A. Lavin, director of the Census Bureau's Denver regional office. "The Census Bureau collects these data in the CPS every other August. The statistics are used to analyze the characteristics of disabled veterans, measure the effectiveness of current veterans' benefit programs and help plan future programs and facilities for veterans."

Census Bureau field representatives also ask about the characteristics of the country's labor force. Data are collected on employment, unemployment, hours of work, earnings; age, sex, race, marital status, educational attainment, occupation and industry. From these data comes the monthly unemployment rate, which the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) is scheduled to release on Sept. 5, 2003.

By law, the Census Bureau must keep confidential all information that would identify survey respondents or their addresses. Local households selected in the nationwide sample receive a letter from Census Bureau Director Louis Kincannon. Some will be interviewed by telephone others, in person. The field representatives carry official identification cards.

Sponsored by the BLS and the Census Bureau, the CPS will be conducted this year by the Census Bureau during the week of Aug. 17. At that time, nearly 2,000 Census Bureau field representatives will conduct interviews of about 78,000 households nationwide.

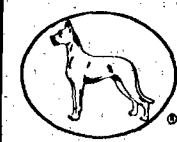

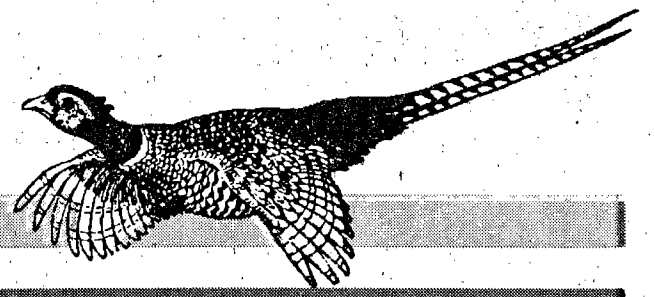

STAFF QUALIFICATIONS AND STUDENT RECRUITING

Notice Concerning Staff Qualifications:
The No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 gives parents the right to get informed about the professional qualifications of their child's classroom teachers. Upon request, Wayne Community Schools will give parents the following information about their child's classroom teacher:
