

# Council approves 2003-04 budget

Cuts have been made, reductions taken place and projects put on hold in the city of Wayne's 2003-04 fiscal year budget which has now been approved.

This was the word from City Administrator Lowell Johnson at Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council. He noted that work has been ongoing on the budget since June.

The city's budget includes two portions. The first is the general fund

### Van gets 17-30 years in prison

Former Wayne floral shop owner Roger Van received a 17-30 year prison sentence in Wayne County District Court last Friday for sexually torturing a Texas man in the basement of his business in December of 2001.

The 57-year-old Van was originally to be sentenced on five felony charges last September, but fled the area just days before his scheduled sentencing date (Sept. 23, 2002). Van told district judge Robert Ensz that it was "one of the hardest things I've ever done." He later told Ensz he felt isolated and was receiving threatening phone calls and

Ensz sentenced Van to seven to ten years in prison on the first-degree sexual assault charge, five to eight years for first-degree assault, two to five years for second degree assault, one to three years for false imprisonment and terroristic threats and one year on a failure to appear charge.

Van must serve eight and one- half years in prison before he is eligible for parole or serve 15 years before he can be released. He was given 93 days credit for time already served.

Deputy Wayne County Attorney Chris Connolly said he was very satisfied with the sentence given. "It was a good and fair sentence," said Connolly. "I believe justice was served and we're pleased with the outcome."

# Nick Klassen to receive Medal of Merit

Nick Klassen's quick thinking and lifesaving action have earned him a national honor so rare it is nearly impossible to describe how often the award is

Nick's bravery last November will be recognized formally at a Boy Scout Court of Honor to be held Sunday, Sept. 28 beginning at 6:30 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church in Wayne.


At that time his heroics will be officially commemorated by the National Court of Honor Boy Scouts of America when he receives the prestigious Medal of

Nick, 14, is the son of Mark and Audrea Klassen. He is a freshman at Wayne High School and a Life Scout — the rank immediately preceding Eagle.

To put the rarity of the highly uncommon honor. into perspective, in 2002 only 100 Scouts nationwide earned such a distinction from among the 3.5 million Scouts across the country. That means Nick's recognition is given to only .0000285 percent of all Scouts.

Nick's first-ever babysitting evening in the Jim and Denise Knotwell home started in typical fashion with the Knotwells instructing Nick how they could

be reached - in case of an emergency.

After the Knotwells left the house for a work-related informational gathering at Wayne State College, Nick began final meal preparation for the three Knotwell children: Kellen, 19 months, Hollis, 6, and Griffin, 8.

But the meal was never served.

"Just when we were about to go to the kitchen, Griffin came to me and said he smelled smoke in the basement," Nick recalled. "When I got downstairs, I saw an unused stove had been turned on."

On top of the stove were trays and rags that had ignited and the room quickly filled with dense

Nick was unable to turn off the stove due to a faulty on/off mechanism, but he did manage to throw the burning rags into the sink. Nick then ran upstairs, got the portable phone, picked up Kellen and guided the three children outside where he called 911.

According to the police report of the incident, Nick calmly and concisely gave all necessary information to the authorities - his name, address of the fire and whether the home had been safely evacuated.

# Landscaping grants for public spaces available through Arboretum, Forest Service

Tree planting and landscape enhancements for public spaces can get a boost from two grant programs coordinated by the Nebraska Statewide Arboretum and Nebraska Forest Service.

"The funding assistance is meant to help communities develop landscapes that better reflect the beauty and spirit of the Great Plains," said Justin Evertson, NSA assistant director for community programs. "The goal is to create environmentally sound landscapes that use less water and require fewer chemicals than much of what has become traditional throughout the region. We hope these projects are highly visible and that they turn people on to the potential for their own landscapes."

The two programs being offered are the Nebraska Community Enhancement Program and the Green Space Nebraska Stewardship Initiative. The community enhancement program funds tree planting and landscaping that improves the state's transportation corridors, including public streets, highways, entryways and trails. The green space initiative, on the other hand, can assist with landscape enhancements for any public space including parks, schoolyards, fairgrounds, college campuses, libraries, courthouses, hospitals and other public properties.

The maximum grants are \$20,000 for the green space initiative and \$25,000 for the community enhancement program. Application deadline is Nov. 17, with funding awards announced in December and planting beginning next spring.

Three workshops are scheduled Oct. 7-9 which Evertson says will be helpful to grant applicants. "Attendees will learn some of the tricks and recommendations that will help their grant applications be better noticed in the review process," Evertson said. The workshops also will provide infor-

mation about basic landscape recommendations and species selection to help make projects more viable.

The workshops are from 1-4 p.m. Oct. 7 at the Lancaster County Cooperative Extension Center, 444 Cherrycreek Rd, Lincoln; Oct. 8 at the Douglas County Extension Office, 8015 W. Center Road, Omaha; and Oct. 9 in a location to be determined in North Platte.

Individuals west of Grand Island are encouraged to attend the North Platte workshop, those east of Grand Island are encouraged to attend the Lincoln workshop and those from northeast Nebraska are encouraged to attend the Omaha workshop.

The community enhancement program is funded by the Nebraska Department of Roads and the green space program by the Nebraska Environmental Trust, a beneficiary of the Nebraska Lottery.

The arboretum and forest service are headquartered in the University of Nebraska Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

Over the past 20 years, the arboretum and forest service have distributed nearly \$6 million in grants to 560 projects in more than 200 Nebraska communities.

"The combined efforts are starting to have a real noticeable impact on the green spaces of these communities," Evertson

#### Street Rally to kick off United Way campaign


The third annual Street Rally for the Wayne United Way will be held Friday, Sept. 19 from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. in downtown Wayne.

The youngster never hesitated, didn't make a sad face or crack a smile. The response was very mat-


ter of fact: "Sometimes it would be scarier if they weren't around."

On a related note, the council voted to merge the city Recreation-Leisure Services Department with the Community Activity Center Department and eliminate the position of Activity Center Director. This will become effective Oct. 4. The numbers involved and costs of operating the two departments will still remain separate.

The council spent considerable time listening to arguments against passing an ordinance on third reading in regard to air pollution/ commercial smokers and cookers.

Marion Arneson told the council that this "was setting a dangerous precedent - how can we know our businesses will not be next?"

He noted that the issue was between two individual business owners and not something the council should be involved in.

Cornell Lowery, who owns the Barbecue Thief, and whose business will be affected by the passage of the ordinance told the council, "I came to Wayne because I felt the people here were fair and kind. However, I feel this ordinance affects only my business. It should serve the people. I want to know where this is coming from. Have there been 50 or 100 phone calls from people complaining about the smoke from my business?"

Councilman Doug Sturm said that the council has read the ordinance twice before Tuesday's meeting and is not "trying to sweep anything under the rug." He said he encourages businesses to be "good neighbors."

Councilman Will Wiseman said that although he has several concerns about the ordinance, "we have given this a lot of thought and it is not an easy issue. This may not be a perfect solution, but it is the best solution we have come up with."

With the passage of the ordinance, those using cookers/smokers more than 12 times per year will be required to install chimneys/ smoke stakes that are a minimum of three feet above surrounding buildings.

City Inspector/ Planner George Ellyson presented an update to the council on properties throughout the city that have had maintenance code violations. He stated that several of the properties have completed work to bring them into compliance and others are making

Following his presentation, the council voted to move forward with the abatement process on a property on Pearl Street which has not experienced notable progress.

Approval was given to the Sharpshooters 4-H Club to use the Community Activity Center for the State BB Gun and Air Rifle Championships on the weekend of March 27, 2004.

Darin Greunke with the club, spoke to the council on measures that have been taken and will be taken to insure the safety of those attending as well as protecting the floor of the facility.

The event will use the basketball court area and the community room of the facility. These two areas will be closed to members during that weekend; however, the remainder of the building will remain open.

Greunke estimates that up to 150 families could come into Wayne that week and Councilman Will Wiseman said that he felt the event would be "a genuine opportunity to showcase our facility." In addition, holding the event in Wayne will bring in revenue, both at the facility and in the community.

Approval was given for Darrel Heier to install a geo-thermal well on his property in Vintage Hills. He is building a new, all-electric home and plans call for three loops of the well, 176 feet deep.

In other action, the council

approved several ordinances and resolutions in regard to street improvement for Vintage Hills, Phase III, Country Club Road and Fairway Estates. These ordinances created street improvement districts for the projects and and the resolutions approved the hiring of engineers and plans for them.

In addition, the council approved resolutions authorizing the sale of two lots on Tenth Street and ordinances directing these sales to take place.

The three readings on all the ordinances were waived, allowing the sales to move forward.

2003-49 Resolution approved which will allow for an interlocal agreement with the village of Winside for water services. The city of Wayne will be a back up for the services and will not be in charge of the system.

Action was taken to re-bid the trail construction project. The original bid by R&W Construction was rejected because the firm could not obtain an appropriate performance bond for the project.

The council plans to hold a meeting of the committee-as-a-whole on Tuesday, Sept. 23 for the purpose of discussing proposals on work to be done at the City Auditorium. Council members felt more discussion was necessary that could be given at a regular meeting and intend to tour the auditorium prior to discussing plans.

The council took no action on a request from the Humane Society for a donation of land. Instead, several council members asked for an inventory of land the city has available, as well as information from the Humane Society as to the direction the group plans to take in the future, before any decision is

### Wayne Community Schools Board of Education approves budget

The budget hearing of the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education was held at Wayne High School just prior to the regular meeting of the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education Monday night. Dr. Joe Reinert, superintendent, gave an overview of the proposed budget. Growth this year was at 4 percent. Approval of the budget was given during the regular meeting.

At the regular meeting, the approval was given on the hiring of Theresa Kenney as SPED paraprofessional. She will be helping from 8 a.m. to noon because of the increase of SPED students.

On the subject of bids and contracts, there was good discussion at previous meetings on teachers, non-certified and administrative negotiations. The certified package shows a 6.3 percent increase from last year's package. The increase included 4.8 percent to administration, 1.3 percent in salary and 18 percent in health insurance for non-certified staff, and 6.3 percent in salary for non-certified staff without health insurance. The board approved these negotiations.

Five sealed bids were accepted for the sale of the school car. The bids were for \$3,050, \$1,100, \$2,601, \$3,700, and \$1,600. The board accepted the highest bid.

Updates on the school included a report on the Middle School from Principal John McClarnen, He noted that enrollment at the Middle School is at 262 students which is down six from last year. State-wide writing assessment grade for the eighth grade from 2003 is in and it shows that 88 percent of the class scored at or above the minimum proficiency score, Grades 4, 8, and 11 will do the assessment again this year.

Kraig Lofquist, SPED director, reported on Special Populations Data for this year. The figures have been reduced by two.

Rocky Ruhl, athletic director, gave a report on the track. He noted that Sam Fischer has been contacted about the water on the track and he isn't concerned about it as he said it's just because of the dry weather. He said that once the track settles a little, there shouldn't be a problem.

As for board committee meetings, an update was given on the Kern Dedication which is scheduled for Oct. 4.

Policies 4300, which deals with personnel - procedures for due process (second reading), Policy 5400, regarding students - students fees (second reading), Policy 3300, which pertains to business and non-instructional services - guidelines for schools regarding memorials after student/staff death or injury (second reading), and Policy 10001, which is about community use of school facilities (second reading) were approved by the board.

Future agenda items include Wayne Housing Authority Presentation, and policy on crossing state line.

# UNK outlasts Wayne State in home opener

Despite a career-high 350 yards passing from junior quarterback Brett Edwards, the Wayne State football team dropped a 32-21 decision to 22nd-ranked Nebraska-Kearney in Saturday's home opener at Cunningham

The 2,200 fans in attendance were treated to plenty of excitement and a game of big plays. UNK rolled up 529 yards in total offense while WSC picked up 446

Part of the reason for all of the offense was UNK jumping out to a 22-0 lead midway through the second quarter.

"We didn't anticipate getting down so much, so early, and it forced us into a throwing match with them," stated WSC Head Coach Scott Hoffman, a former UNK assistant.

Trailing twice in the game by a 22-point margin, the Wildcats rallied to make the game interesting until the end with several big passes.

After UNK took a 22-0 lead with 4:33 left in the second quarter, Edwards found senior receiver Eric Kjar on a 75-yard pass play to put the Wildcats on the board with 4:17 left in the first half, trailing 22-7.

the third quarter, following a WSC interception, to make the score 29-7. But Wayne State used two big pass plays to get back into the game.

A 54-yard strike from Edwards to Zach Molacek at the 3:09 mark of the third quarter made the score 29-13. Edwards then hit junior wide receiver Josh Hopwood on a 95-yard play, pulling Wayne State within 29-21 with 14:46 to play.

UNK then used an eight play, 60-yard drive, consuming 5:31 off the clock, to go up 32-21 after Jessup Pfeifer's 32-yard field goal with 9:11 to play.

Wayne State aided the drive with two costly penalties, one was an offsides that happened following an interception by WSC's Stephan Turner.

"That was as loud as I've ever heard it since I've been here," stated Hoffman on the crowd support. "But give them (UNK) credit, they put together a solid drive when we had the momentum."

Hoffman added that Saturday's game was a great small college atmosphere.

"We had great support. I hope the fans stick with us throughout the year."

Edwards completed 11 of 19 passes for his career-high 350 yards and three touchdowns.

His favorite target UNK would score again late in Hopwood, who hauled in four

catches for 167 yards. Kjar added two receptions for 83 yards and one score with Ryan Kuester adding two grabs for 22 yards.

Edwards led the Wildcat rushing attack with 37 yards on 13 carries, Molacek contributed 23 yards on five attempts.

Defensively, sophomore line backer Aaron Rodgers (Aurora) Colo.) led the team with 13 tackles six were unassisted along with one sack. Andrew Spanjers, a fresh man linebacker from York, and senior safety Kyle Lingenfelter of Plainview each added 10 tackles for the Wildcats.









The book has been reprinted twice and has sold over 15,000 copies in English and 30,000 in Spanish. 






### Defensive driving is very critical during harvest time

Therefore, it's important to remain attentive to road and traffic conditions, learn to identify slow-moving farm equipment and give it a wide berth this time of

The end of Daylight Savings Time makes road safety even more important. Sunset will occur earlier and motorists may wind up sharing the road with harvest equipment well after dark.

A car traveling 55 mph requires 224 feet to stop on dry pavement. At 65 mph, the distance increases to 302 feet. The inability to recognize slow-moving vehicles or simply not being aware of their presence until it's too late is one of the leading causes of collisions between motorists and farm equipment.

A car traveling 55 mph overtaking a tractor moving 15 mph will close a 300-foot gap, the length of a football field, between the car and the tractor in about five seconds. Traveling 65 mph decreases the time to just four seconds.

Use greater caution on hills, in bad weather and during the dim hours near dawn and sunset.

### Evergreen problems and fall care

Heat and drought stress on lawns is obvious during summer. Evergreen trees can be stressed



too but in many cases the stress does not show up until next spring when it's too late to do anything.

September and October are important months for watering evergreens and monitoring them for two spotted spider mites and spruce mites.

After a dry summer, fall watering is especially critical for evergreens (pine, spruce, fir, juniper and arborvitae). Fall watering will help trees recover from drought stress and prepare them for win-

Evergreens lose moisture from green needles during winter. This moisture cannot be replaced from frozen soils, making it important for evergreens to begin the winter with a full moisture reserve.

If evergreens go into winter drought stressed, this increases the chance needles will dry out and die as they lose moisture during winter. Evergreen needles, even if dead, often hold their green color until warmer temperatures arrive in spring and then turn brown.

By the time evergreens turn brown in spring, it is often too late to repair the damage. The key to preventing winter drying in evergreen trees is to maintain adequate soil moisture from summer through fall. This is accomplished with prop-

er watering and by mulching a three to six foot diameter area around the base of the tree with an organic mulch like coarse wood chips. Proper watering means keeping the upper twelve inches of soil moist, but not saturated.

Two spotted spider mites and spruce mites also cause needle browning and added stress. There were problems with two spotted mites this summer because of the hot, dry conditions and these mites may still be feeding. September and October is when spruce mites begin to feed on spruce again. They may be of greater concern at this time of year than two spotted mites. Mites feed by sucking sap from green needles causing the needles to dry out. Monitor spruce for mites by watching for discolored needles and a fine webbing between the needles. Check for mites by gently tapping a branch over a white sheet of paper. Wait a few seconds and watch to see if the very tiny specks begin to move, indicating

If mites are present, the tree can, be hosed down with a strong spray of water on a regular basis to dislodge mites. Insecticides such as Kelthane or Isotox are labeled for use on spruce for mites. Horticultural summer oils can be used, but they will remove the blue color of blue spruce.

A significant amount of check fraud is due to counterfeiting through desktop publishing and copying - to create or duplicate an actual financial document - as well as chemical alteration, which consists of removing some or all of the information and manipulating it to the benefit of the criminal. .

fully. The extra effort involved in carefully scrutinizing every check may pay off. When a personal check is presented, always insist on proper identification. But keep in mind, if a check is stolen or forged, then the identification presented may be forged too.

\*Compare signatures. Regardless of the type of identification you require, it is important that you compare the signature on the check with that on the identification. Be wary of people who take extreme care and much time in signing their names and who try to distract you while they are signing the check or while you are examining it.

\*Set a policy for check cashing and review it with employees frequently. Your policy may include requiring management's verifying checks approval, through the issuing bank (some


Before contracting with a check verification service, ask the service to provide proof from the Federal Trade Commission that it complies with the Fair Credit Reporting Act. You can also check with the BBB at 402-391-6712 or at www.heartlandbbb.org for a company Reliability Report.

\*Also, consider allowing you customers to use a bank electronic debit card. This transaction allows the exact amount of money to be debited from the customer's bank account at the time of purchase. If the money isn't in the account, the transaction will not be approved.


If you are a victim of check fraud, send a certified letter to the individual, if you have the name and address.

If the party does not respond to you, usually within 10 to 15 days, depending on you state law, you can file a criminal charge against the person. Report the fraud to the police and your bank immediately. Every state has a different criminal code of laws. Determine what you need to do to comply with your state law so that you will be able to press fraud charges and recover damages.






